Historian delivers tale of female Buffalo Soldier

The Buffalo Grass Chapter of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution met at the Floyd County Historical Museum on March 26 and was honored with special guest and 2006 Hall of Fame Inductee Rosieleetta "Lee" Reed.

Reed is an oral historian, specializing in teaching "what's not in the history books."

Through the Texas State Parks Division, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department she has conducted many programs on the roles of frontier women. Ascending from a family member who was a Buffalo Soldier, Lee special-

izes in presenting the story of Buffalo Soldier Cathy Williams, the first and only documented female Buffalo Soldier. Lee dressed up in military attire and took the ladies of DAR back in time, a place in time where women were made of strong substance. Williams was born outside Jefferson City, Missouri and enlisted in 1866 in the 38th Infantry Co A U.S. Army. Cathy learned to read, write, do nursing and cook. She evaded detection that she was female three times.

As well as "Williams Cathy's" story, she tells stories of "Stagecoach Mary Fields" who was the first black woman to work for the U.S. Post Office and was a stagecoach

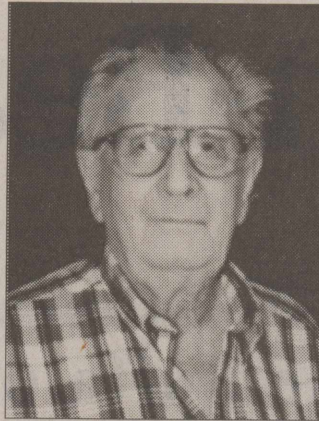
Jimmy Floyd Vick

Letter to the Editor

In reference to an article that ran in the Hesperian-Beacon titled "Lockney rallies around student battling cancer"

To clarify the events leading to the diagnosis of Hodgkin lymphoma in Janette Ybarra, there are errors in paragraphs 4 and 5. The patient was initially seen by Dr. Clinton Wolboldt on 02/11/13. He noted the enlarged lymph node, prescribed an antibiotic, and appropriately instructed the patient to return for further evaluation if there was no improvement in 10 days (his notes are available for review in the electronic medical record system of Covenant Medical Group).

As the nodal enlargement persisted, the patient was referred to Dr. Charles Bayouth of SWAT Surgical Associates and on 02/22/13 she underwent excisional biopsy of a cervical (neck) lymph node. Pathology reported on 02/23/13 revealed Hodgkin lymphoma.

On 03/05/13, I saw the patient at Joe Arrington Cancer Center at the request of Dr. Bayouth for the first time. It was at that point I discussed with Janette and

her family the significance of the diagnosis and the need for additional studies to stage her disease (extent) properly. Between this time and the initiation of chemotherapy on 04/01/13, she underwent additional required scans, a bone marrow examination, referral to a fertility specialist, and placement of her implanted venous access device (port). There were no delays in her evaluation and treatment.

The article as written, implied (but as you stated on the phone, not intentionally), a delay by me in the diagnosis and initiation of treatment of this patient. I hope the above clarifies my role in Janette's care. Again, I appreciate the intent of the article and wish more of these articles would be written to encourage cancer patients, their families, and friends in coping with serious illnesses, particularly those involving young people.

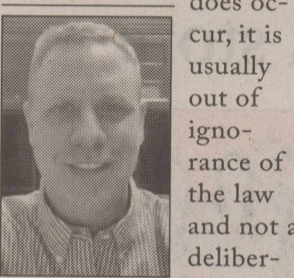

Hard to keep info away from public

On occasion, we must file a request for information. The process is easy and the outcome is usually the same. The entities cooperate.

When an instance

does occur, it is usually out of ignorance of the law and not a deliberate attempt at keeping information

from the public.

Below are some questions and answers related to the Public Information Act as provided by the Texas Attorney General's Office.

What is the Public Information Act?

The Public Information Act, formerly known as the Open Records Act, is located at chapter 552 of the Government Code. The Act provides a mechanism for citizens to inspect or copy government records. It also provides for instances in which governmental bodies wish to, or are required by law to, withhold government records from the public.

What types of records are subject to the Public Information Act?

Any information collected, assembled, or maintained by or for a governmental body is subject to the Public Information Act. The format (paper, electronic, microfilm, etc.) of the record does not affect its status as a public record.

What is a "governmental body"?

For purposes of the Public Information Act, the term "governmental body" encompasses all Texas public entities at the state and local levels. It does not include the judiciary. Private entities may be considered governmental bodies if they are supported in whole or in part by public funds or they expend public funds. The Public Information Act does not apply, however, to private persons or businesses simply because they provide goods or services under a contract with a governmental body.

How do I make a pub-

lic information request?

The request must be in writing and must be addressed to the governmental body. While the request does not need to be addressed to any particular person, it is a good practice to clearly label your correspondence as a "Public Information Request" or "Open Records Request." Requests sent via fax or email must be addressed to the public information officer or to the person designated by that officer to receive such requests.

How long does the governmental body have to respond to my request for information?

The Act provides that a governmental body must respond "promptly" to a request for information. If a governmental body is unable to produce the requested information within ten business days, the officer for public information must send you correspondence certifying that he is unable to do so and he must set a date and time when the records will be available to you.

May a governmental body ask me why I want the records?

No, a governmental body is forbidden from inquiring about the purpose for which the records will be used. However, if a request is unclear or very broad, the governmental body may ask the requestor to more clearly identify or narrow his or her request. Additionally, a governmental body may require additional identifying information to determine that the requestor is eligible to receive certain types of information.

When may a governmental body refuse to release the information I request?

If the information you request falls within one of the exceptions to disclosure found in the Public Information Act, the governmental body may refuse to release the information while it seeks an open records decision from the Attorney General. Unless the governmental body has a previous determination from a court or the Attorney General regarding the precise information requested, a governmental body cannot determine on its own to withhold information.

something blue was a blue topaz ring.

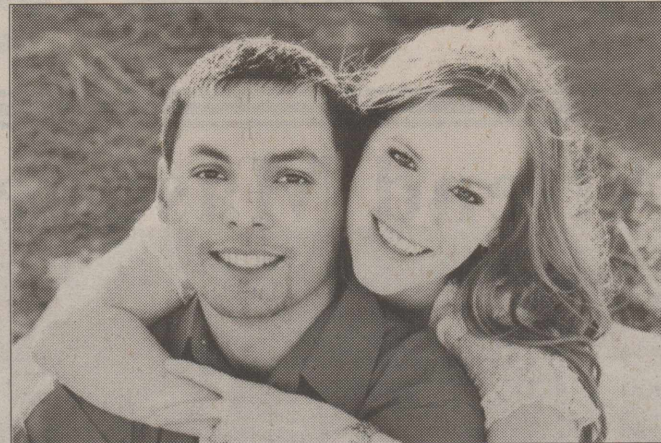

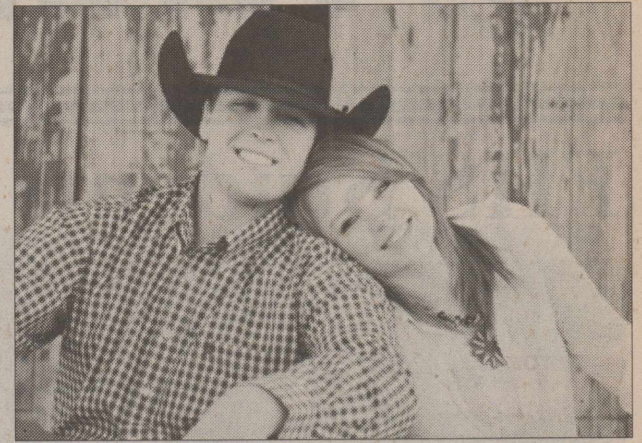
A very special thanks to Linda and Ricky Griffith. We had a

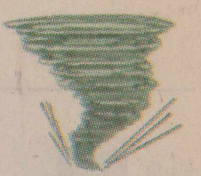

"It's a nice break and it's a chance for them to actually dress up and hangout with the teachers," said Mrs. Cox.

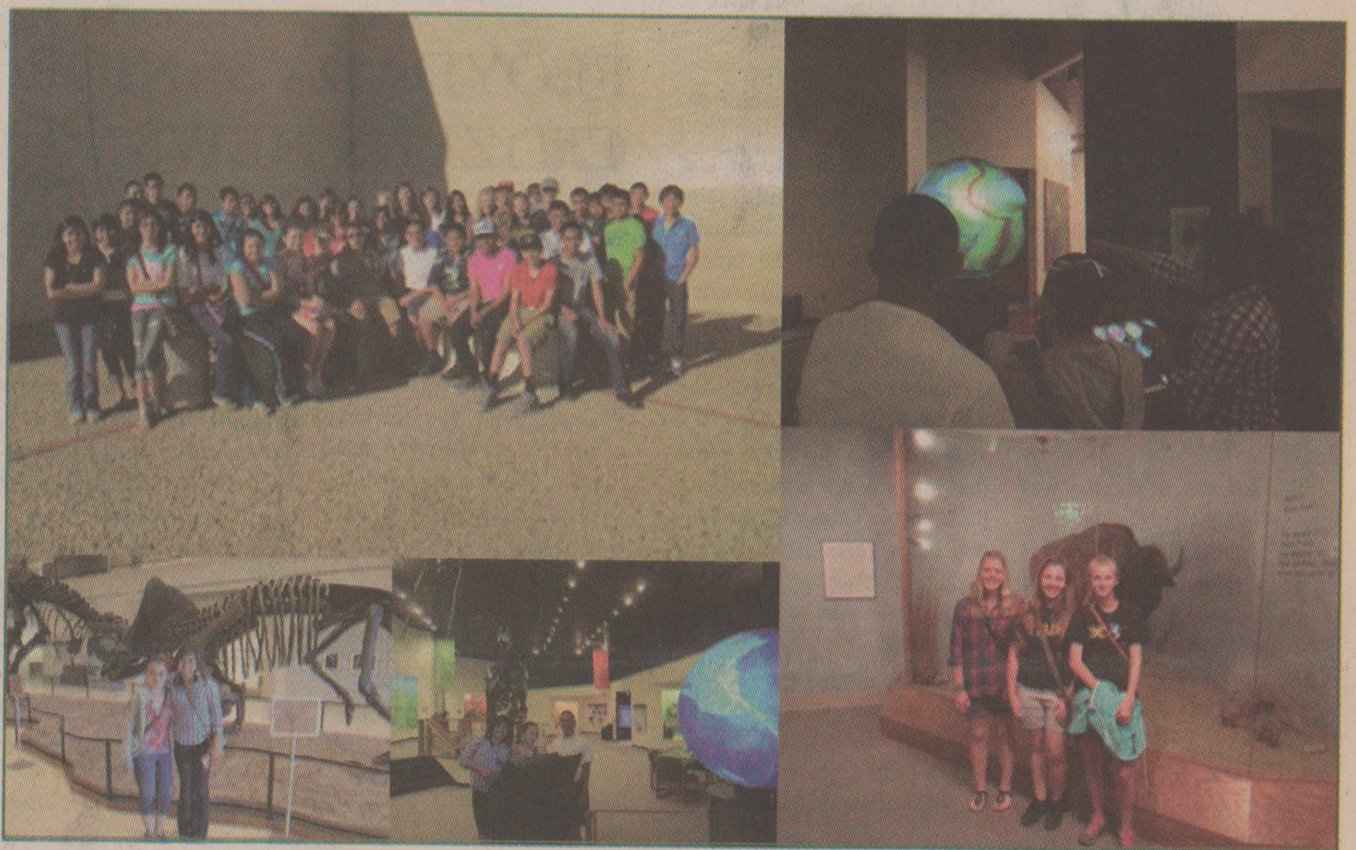
Organization can lead to an Education

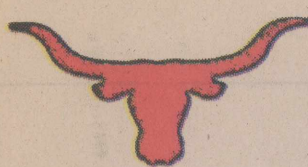

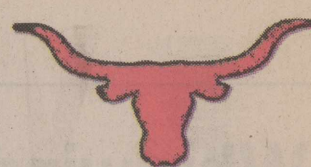

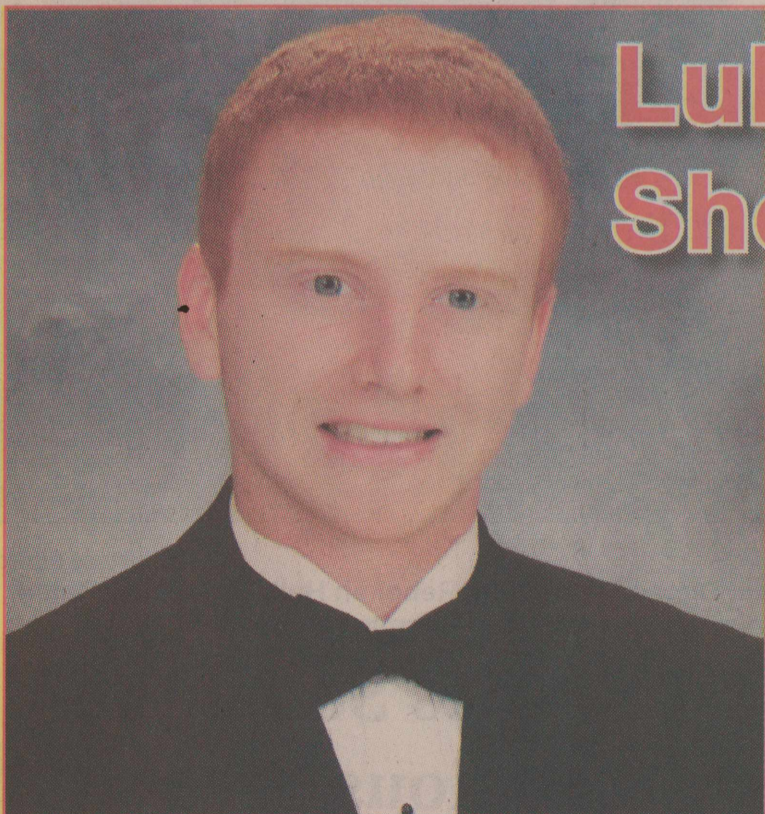


LHS Theatre

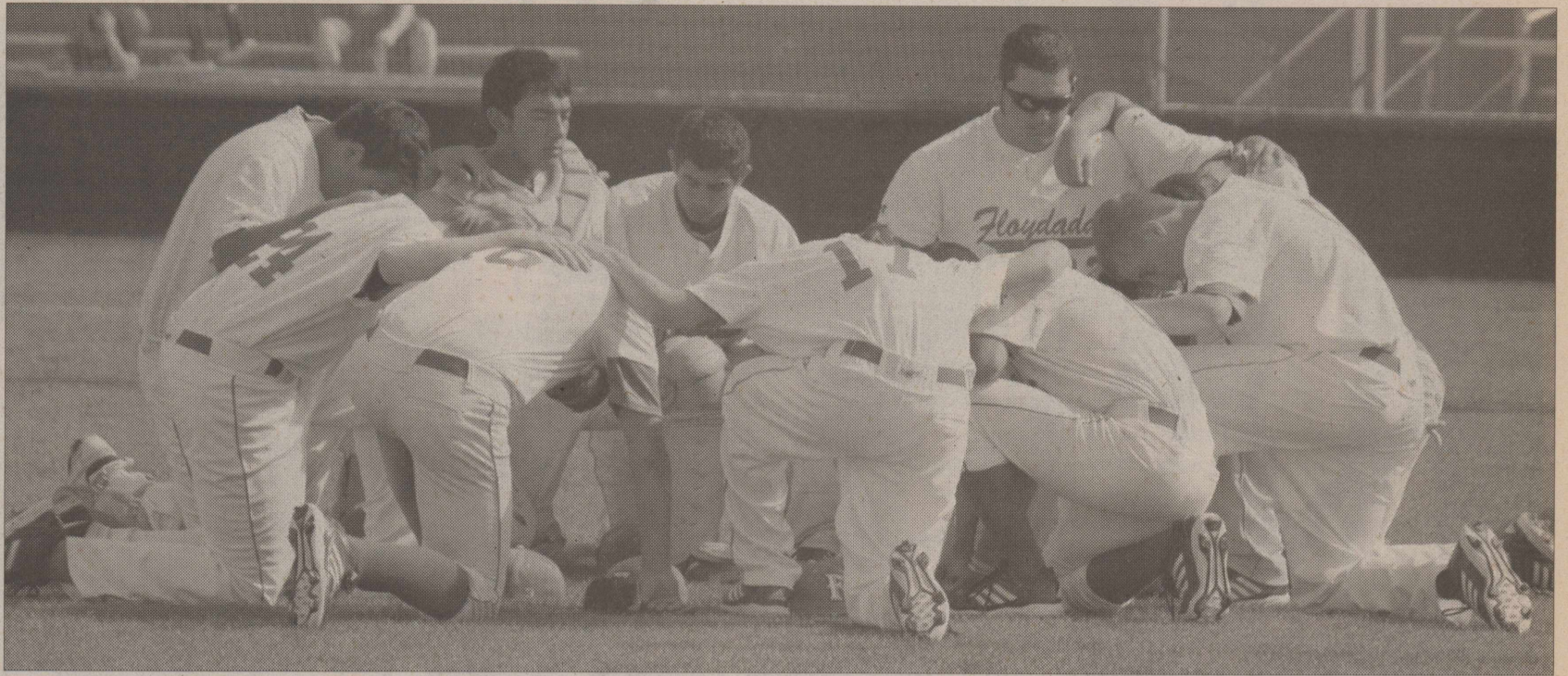

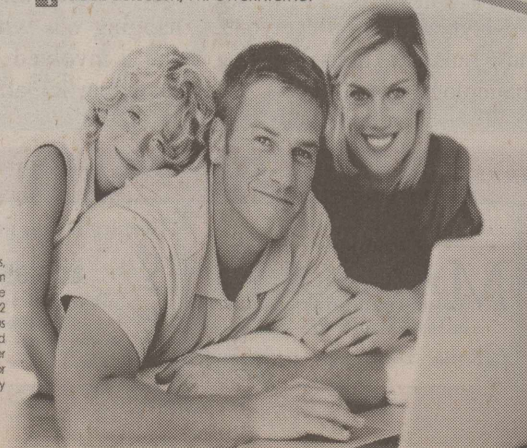

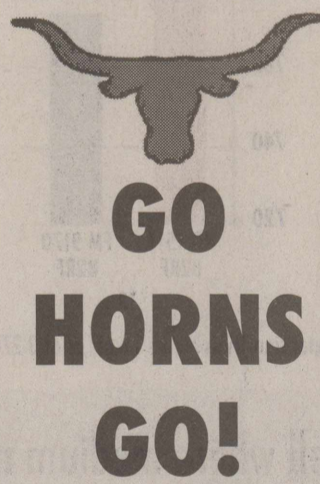
mark, and an RBI single by Jackson during the second inning helped Lady Longhorns put some runs on the board early.
