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## Cadets Start Orientation In Aircraft

Most of the 202 AFROTC cadets in summer training here will "take to the air," some of them for the first time in their lives Saturday as they are taken on orientation flights as part of the training program.

The cadets, from upward of 50 colleges and universities of many states, are learning of operation of an active Air Force base during four weeks at Reese and have orientation rides as a high point.

This week they continued intensive training which started at 4:30 a.m. and ended well after dark each day. Monday night they took time off to attend the "Command Performance — 1962" in the base theater.

Saturday morning two cadets will be interviewed on "Reese Reports" over Radio Station KFYO, Lubbock.

Drill competition between flights was started this week and inter-flight games also went into high gear in the recreation program. Cadets underwent inspections daily and continued visits to various places on the base to see how the areas operate.

Physical training took up part of each day and the instructing staff sought to improve physical being. A swim in the cold base pool each morning at 7:30 a.m. met with favor among the majority.

## ATC's Col. Wood Gets Gen. Wood's Headquarters Job

Air Training Command is still not out of the "Woods."

Col. Frank P. Wood, commander of ATC's Craig AFB, Ala., for the past two years, returns to his native Texas on July 1 to replace Brig. Gen. Clair L. Wood — no relation — as deputy chief of staff for personnel at ATC headquarters.

Colonel Wood was the deputy commander at Craig for two years before advancing to the commander's desk there in June, 1960.

The base compiled award-winning flying and ground safety records during Colonel Wood's four-year tour. Significantly, the laurels were earned during a period when the base was enlarging its flying training program under the new Undergraduate Pilot Training (UPT) concept.

Before being assigned to Craig AFB, Colonel Wood, a command pilot, served with the Military Assistance Advisory Group in the Netherlands.

Colonel Wood's predecessor at ATC headquarters, General Wood, is being reassigned to Headquarters Command, Washington, D.C., while Col. Richard L. Ault, now at the Pentagon, will take command of Craig AFB.

## Early Promotions Expected For Reese Majors, Captains

Orders were awaited this week on promotion dates for two Reese majors and four captains who are moving to higher rank.

Selected many weeks ago for promotion to lieutenant colonel were Majors Harold G. Barber and Joseph B. Burdick. Named to be majors were Captains Howard D. Roberts, Eugene M. Robinson, Joseph V. Sullivan and Ernest Wilkerson. Dates of promotion were delayed until after the start of Fiscal Year 1963 on July 1.

Air Force headquarters has announced that the "waiting" period for all selected and not immediately promoted to lieutenant colonel will end July 15 and notification to Reese and other bases is expected without delay. Most captains selected last December also will move up July 15.

Promotions will effect nearly 1,100 majors moving up and 4,000 captains who become majors.

Personnel program officials in Washington said they are hurrying the normal list refinements, computing attrition, etc., to promote the greatest possible number to major. Promotions to lieutenant colonel for FY 63 selects pose no problem.

The exact number of captains to become major is expected to be determined by the weekend.

Honored in Pentagon ceremonies in presentations by Secretary of the Air Force Eugene M. Zuckert were Major Generals Arno H. Leuhman, director of information the past five years; Glen W. Martin, military assistant to Secretary Zuckert and with him on the Armed Forces Day visit to Reese; and Thomas C. Musgrave, director of legislative liaison the past five years.

General Musgrave is retiring. General Martin is being transferred to the Pacific Air Force as deputy chief of staff for plans and operations. General Leuhman, new commander of the Sixth Allied TAC headquarters in Turkey, was honored for contributing to "liberty and integrity of the Free World."

# No Accidents For July 4th Holiday Sought

Insistent that the July 4 brief holiday result in no injuries to Reese personnel and their families, unit commanders have placed requirements on traffic which they hope will help.

The base has not had a holiday accident this year and continuation of the record is sought. Personnel is being counseled by unit commanders to use every caution on the highways, at home and wherever they might be to avert injury. Auto inspection stations have been set up and everyone going on a trip of any length is being urged to have their vehicle in shape. Some unit commanders have set up mandatory inspections before permitting personnel to leave the base area.

Texas Department of Public Safety officials have forecast eight traffic fatalities for July 4 and all available traffic officers will be on duty in "Operation Motorcade."

"Common sense says it is hard for a person to enjoy a trip if he is constantly squirming out of dangerous traffic situations caused by unlawful driving — his own or someone else's," said the department head. "With the tempo of travel picking up it is important to drive according to traffic laws and regulations."

Texas officials have announced that penalties for traffic violations will be increased sharply for the holiday period in efforts to remove bad motorists from traffic.

"Our aim for the holiday is the same — everyone back at work after the day without impairment through injury and without suffering because some loved one has been killed," said Joe Lopez, Reese ground safety director.

## 'Gus' Awarded Space Trophy

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Air Force Captain Virgil I. (Gus) Grissom, a member of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Project Mercury team and the Free World's second space traveler, became the first recipient of the General Thomas D. White Space Trophy on June 19.

Dr. Thomas W. McKnew, vice chairman of the board of trustees of the National Geographic Society, donor of the trophy established in honor of the former Chief of Staff of the Air Force, presented the award to Air Force Secretary Eugene M. Zuckert, who made the formal presentation to Captain Grissom.

During the ceremony in the National Geographic Society auditorium on June 19, Secretary Zuckert said: "Captain Grissom and the other astronauts are playing a vital role in the national space effort." He said that NASA's program is of vital importance to the Air Force and "we must build the nation's defense capability in space on the foundation which NASA lays."

## Aid Campaign Opens Aug. 1

The society was born in 1946 to give emergency relief to Air Force personnel. Society funds are carried in a general fund for emergency relief and the Gen. Henry H. Arnold Education Fund for worthy Air Force dependents to further their higher education. WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The present system of identifying members of the Air Force may go by the boards if a study now under way meets with the approval of the Air Staff.

The study is being made to determine whether the Social Security account number can be used on all Air Force personnel records instead of a combination of both the service number now assigned to each Air Force member and the Social Security account number.

The proposal to use only one identifying number would tend to simplify record keeping. Variations in rank and branches of the Air Force would be designated by use of suffixes or prefixes.

# From The COMMANDER'S DESK

It is well for each of us to remember that this, too, is as important as performing our daily tasks well. When we continually display this attitude we are adding to the confidence the American people deserve to have in their Air Force.

## Support The Boy!

Little League has become an important part of a growing boy's life and the wholesome aspects of a million youngsters taking part in the program is a highly complimentary reflection upon the spirit and contagious enthusiasm of the parents. It is often said that the boy reflects his parents. However, the sad but true fact is that many parents neglect to attend Little League games to see that reflection.

Arguments are continually waged over the value of Little League. Many quarters contend that the program is actually harmful, while a far greater preponderance of our population is of the opinion that Little League cultivates good sportsmanship and coordinated teamwork among our small fry.

One thing is certain — youngsters who play in the pint-sized circuit are at an impressionable age and sensitive to parental reaction. Indifference on the part of mothers and fathers toward their children's activities quite often tend to generate a similar attitude by the boys toward their individual efforts.

Presence of parents in the stands during a game is a source of encouragement and stimulation for the Little Leaguer. Likewise, it indicates support for the program. The parent who allows a son to participate in the program does, after all, have a responsibility in this community effort.

There is no substitute for active parent participation in the Little League — that one element is the program's life blood. Each year we see thousands of boys under the guidance of helpful adults in Little League. Most of these adults sacrifice their time and energies because of the worthwhile purpose involved. What greater investment can we make than in the moulding of our youth for the future?

## Brighter Picture Appearing For Promotion Of Officers

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—Top level Air Force personnel planners have announced that they see daylight over the horizon — a general clearing of officer promotions, particularly to field grade ranks.

Specifically, they locked on to these programs in their look ahead:

11 years to major — moving back primary zone consideration from the current 13 years.

17 years to lieutenant colonel — moving back primary zone consideration from the current 18 years.

Increased below-the-zone promotions — using the full secondary zone quota along the lines of the Bolte Recommendations (5 per cent to major, 7½ to lieutenant colonel.) The secondary quota to colonel eventually will reach 10 per cent.

Continued secondary zone eligibility for captains, majors and lieutenant colonels with six years in grade.

Behind these coming trends stood the bedrock of USAF objectives, stated in this manner by personnel planners:

"Provide a reasonable promotion opportunity at the proper service phase point under a competitive system of selections.

"Make maximum use of available grade vacancies by controlling service promotion points and limiting early advancement to a reasonable number of truly outstanding officers.

"In spite of officer grade distribution problems, provide eligibility after a reasonable number of years in grade until the offices distribution comes into balance."

On this latter point, planners noted that the Bolte Recommendations slated to go before Congress next session would provide about 4,800 additional field grade authorizations.

Base communications, effective Sunday, becomes a part of the Air Force Communications Service as the AFCS celebrates its first birthday as a separate command.

All communications personnel have been reassigned by orders and communications functions are being consolidated.

"We, here at Reese, sincerely appreciate the support of Air Training Command and Reese AFB personnel during the past year," CWO Basil Parker, commander of Detachment 2, said. "As a detachment of the 2010 Communications Squadron, with headquarters at Walker AFB, New Mexico, we have the privilege to maintain and operate communications and navigational aids services at Reese.

"AFCS navigational aids facilities, air-to-ground stations, radar approach control, ground control approach, instrument landing systems, control towers and many other facilities on USAF bases have played a contributing part in the successful completion of the Air Force mission."

The service is a world-wide organization with units on every Air Force Base and at many isolated locations scattered throughout the free world.

Although types of communications service may vary from one unit to another, "we are justifiably proud of the many dedicated men and women, military and civilian, who constantly strive to provide the most efficient, reliable and highest quality service possible," Parker added.

Support to the Reese mission is in two general types of communications services: point-to-point, ground-to-air and communications systems, and flight facilities which include operation and maintenance of electronic aids to air navigation and providing air traffic control services.

"Although many of our personnel are highly skilled technicians, we stay abreast of the increasing skill and techniques by the aerospace forces through Air Force training schools and our own on-the-job training programs," Parker cited.

Establishment of the AFCS a year ago called for incorporation of all Air Force communications into one command in an orderly fashion.

Effective Sunday, it will be the AFCS's additional responsibility to operate the message center and Military Affiliated Radio System (MARS) and to coordinate with the telephone company on installation, repair and other telephone affairs. Maintenance of the best service will be the primary aim.

"We are constantly looking ahead to the needs of ATC and Reese, and look forward to continued excellent relations in Detachment 2's communications support of Reese's role in the aerospace team," Parker said.

"As Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, Air Force chief of staff, stated on the day of the AFCS activation: 'The organization of AFCS is in keeping with the express desires of the President for improved means of effecting command and control of our global forces. AFCS provides the Air Force with the reins of Command.'

"We are proud to contribute to the support of the best pilot training base in ATC; Reese."

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The all-important eligibility dates for active duty reserve first lieutenants and active or inactive Air National Guard officers looking for promotions to permanent captain are June 30, 1957 and June 30, 1960.

Officially, USAF has set the zone-of-consideration as "Promotion Service Date (PSD) of June 30, 1960 or earlier, and Total Years Service Date (TYSD) of June 30, 1957 or earlier."

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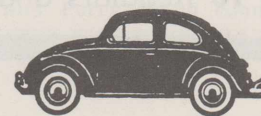
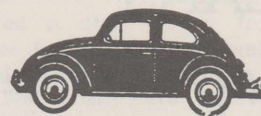
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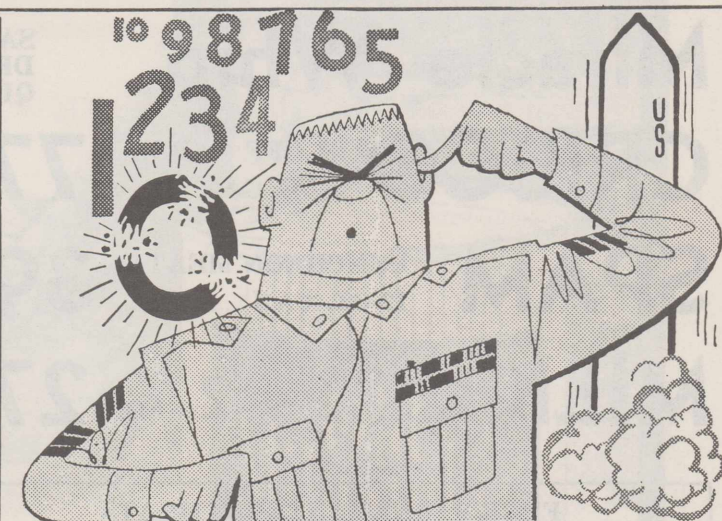
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## Boys, Girls Hold Track Meet

## Water Show Planned On Base For July 4

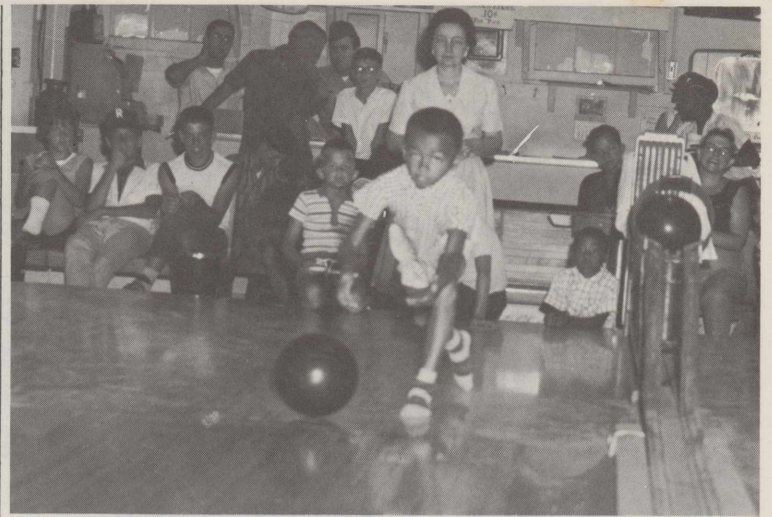

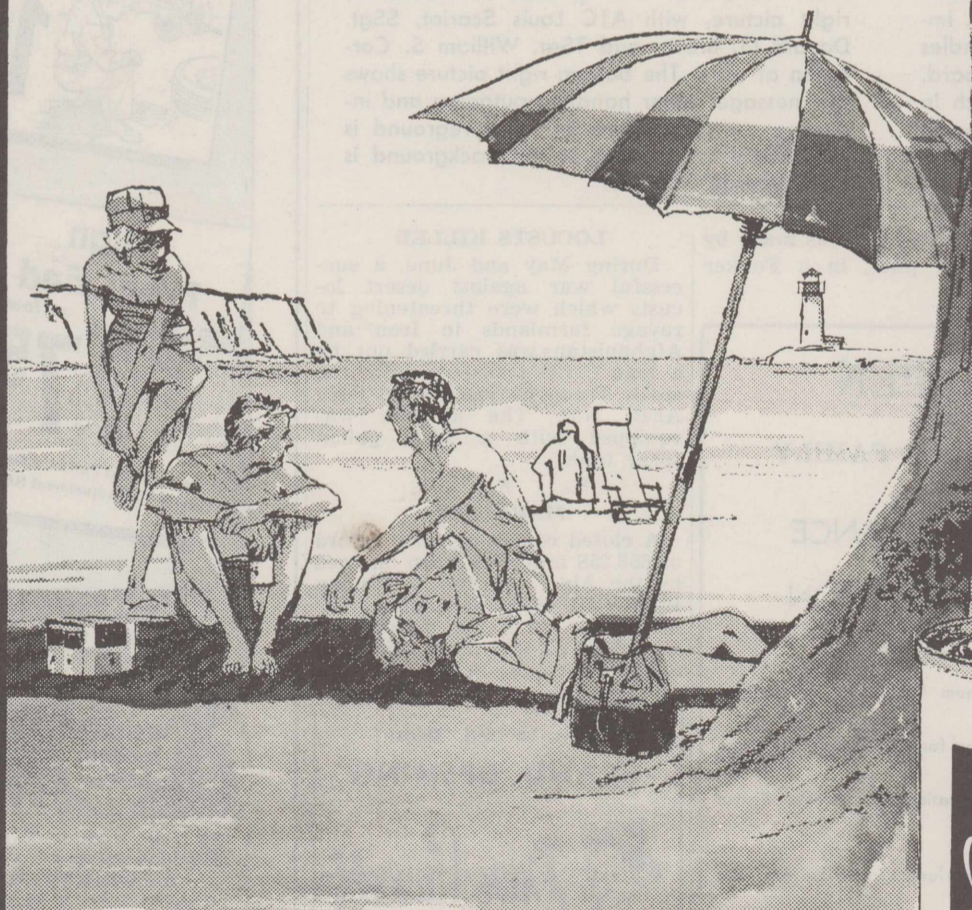
Billy Reed was losing pitcher in the opener, although Doug Peterson and Perry Gould connected

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### LOCUSTS KILLED

During May and June, a successful war against desert locusts which were threatening to ravage farmlands in Iran and Afghanistan was carried out by a lone C-123 transport from the 464th Troop Carrier Wing, Pope AFB, N.C. The aircraft was equipped with a 1,000 gallon spray tank.

### MARK SET

A closed course distance record of 656.258 miles has been claimed by the Air Force for its Kaman H-43B HUSKIE helicopter. The mark, set June 13, breaks the record of 625.464 miles, set by a Soviet helicopter in 1960.

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In a nine-minute flight at an altitude of 97,000 feet, Maj. Robert A. Rushworth flew the X-15 research airplane at a top speed of 3477 m.p.h., over California, May 22, to record pressure changes over a wide variety of flight conditions.

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
