LAKELAND, Ga., Oct. 2.—The would-be kidnaper of E. D. Rivers, former governor of Georgia, killed himself when his plan failed, was revealed today to have been a self-appointed "avenger of the people" who planned also to collect a ransom.

In his automobile trailer in which he shot himself after Rivers and fought off his attack, police found three German-English dictionaries and what seemed to be a ode book. Federal Bureau of Investigation agents were called in

He left two letters. One demonstrated that he had planned to kidnap Rivers for ransom, leaving Mrs. Rivers and anyone else who had been in the house, bound, gagged and drugged. The other indicated that he was a political grank and had planned to "avenge, the 'people" for what he fancied were the political misdeeds of Rivers and other political leaders. Both letters revealed considerable personal animosity for the former governor. Rivers was threatened with torture and death.



ninister of trade and commerce, with a group of government aides, has concluded a series of trade oacts with West Coast South American countries, and is about o reach an agreement with the

Will Aid South America The agreements not only v widen South American markets Canadian products, but will work to the advantage of South American countries by opening new markets for their roducts in Canada. Perhaps the ull effects of the treaties will not be felt until the war is ended when Canada's industry will be shifted from its present war effort to its normal status, but Canadian-South American commercial in-terchange should gain consider able impetus before long.

Increased Canadian participa in Inter-American affairs some day conceivably may be expanded to include membership in the Pan-American Union, which is now confined to the American republics, exclusively. Direct diplomatic relations between Canada and several of the South American countries have been established.

Door Open To Canada Furthermore, Canada is particis pating in more of the inter-Amer-ican conferences than ever before Canadian delegates were myited to the recent inter-American Municipalities Congress at Santi ago, Chile, and the Pan American Highway and Pan-American Tour-ist Congresses at Mexico City, & Meanwhile, megotistions for a

reciprocal trade pacy between the United States and Argentine continue in Buenos Aires, and it is believed that several weeks will elapse before the treaty is ready for signature. It had been thought that the treaty would be concluded a month ago, but virtuallysev ery commodity affected in the pac has been submitted to a thorough discussion, necessitating exchanges of cables between Washington and the Argentine capital

Well-informed . Washington quarters insisted, however, there have been no major diffrculties and they expressed the opinion that prospects for a satisfactory conclusion of the negotiations are better than ever. Nego, ations for a reciprocal pact between the two countries failed everal years ago, causing intense in the States and Argentine business circles, and it is believed tha both governments are determined that there shall be no failure this

The pact, when made effective, is expected to bring considerable relief to the Argentine national economy, which has suffered through a severe loss of markets due to the war. It would provide larger United States, markets for goods already consumed here and would establish new markets in this country for other products. Argentina's mancial position has not been aided by the politieal tactics of certain groups in the Chamber of Deputies in blocking legislation to authorize aceptance of the \$110,000,000 in

winter by the U. S. Treasury and the Export-Import Bank. Today's Journal Editorial . . . LONGER HOURS FOR AMERICAN LABOR?

Without question, some difficult problems will have to be ironed out if there should be a substantial increase in the hours of individuals working in national defense industries.

Perhaps the most difficult of the problems, as it appears from the present perspective, would be the compensation to be paid to the affected labor.

But there is one certainty about the proposition: No working man on earth is so well equipped to work additional hours as the American. At present, he is working fewer hours than in any of the major nations. The conditions under which he works are the most favorable to his physical and mental well-being. His physical standard in terms of ability to work long hours without injury is the highest on earth.

If longer hours became necessary as a further

guarantee of national safety, and if the working men can be persuaded of that necessity, then American labor will be more than equal to the job without even a slight loss of efficiency.
