



# U. S.-British Mission To Moscow Plots New Headaches For Hitler

## Reds Promised War Supplies

 MOSCOW, Oct. 2.—Lord Beaverbrook and W. Averell Harriman, chairman of the British and American delegations to the Russian war aid conference, said today the speed of the conference's decisions—concluded two days ahead of schedule—will be matched only by the speed of arrival of supplies for the Red army.

The speed with which the conference worked, Beaverbrook said, "showed how fast material will come here. That is why Harriman and I were sent here. He is a young man in a hurry and I am an old man in a hurry."

Letters Are Delivered  
 They revealed that they had brought letters to Premier Josef Stalin from President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Winston Churchill and indicated pleasure at Stalin's grasp of detail and understanding of the complex problems involved in delivering British-American supplies.

The conference ended last night with an announcement by Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov that all problems had been settled by unanimous agreement.

Technical aids, it was said, will be left behind by both the British and Americans to facilitate supply handling.

Worked "Continuously"  
 The conference of United States, British and Russian delegates convened Monday, with Molotov as chairman. The delegates worked long hours, day and night, in committees on military, naval, aircraft, raw materials, transport and medicine.

Molotov, addressing them, praised President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill, who had initiated the conference, as "outstanding statesmen of our epoch. He thanked Harriman and Beaverbrook, "whose exceptional vigor, willingness and ability helped secure the outstanding success of this conference."

Details of the conclusions were not revealed, because they are military secrets.

They were roughly outlined in a joint statement by Harriman and Beaverbrook, which said:

1. The conference granted Russia practically every requirement for which Soviet military authorities had asked.
2. Transportation facilities were examined and plans made to increase the volume of traffic in all directions.
3. The Soviet government has supplied Great Britain and the United States large quantities of raw materials urgently needed in those countries.

# Canada Spurs Trade Among Latins; Hemisphere Relations Benefit

## Stronger Ties May Be Result

The Dominion of Canada is making a quiet and little publicized trade drive in South America.

James A. MacKinnon, Canadian minister of trade and commerce, with a group of government aides, has concluded a series of trade pacts with West Coast South American countries, and is about to reach an agreement with the Argentine government.

**Will Aid South America**  
The agreements not only will widen South American markets for Canadian products, but will work to the advantage of the South American countries by opening new markets for their products in Canada. Perhaps the full effects of the treaties will not be felt until the war is ended when Canada's industry will be shifted from its present war effort to its normal status, but Canadian-South American commercial interchange should gain considerable impetus before long.

Increased Canadian participation in Inter-American affairs some day conceivably may be expanded to include membership in the Pan-American Union, which is now confined to the American republics, exclusively. Direct diplomatic relations between Canada and several of the South American countries have been established.

**Door Open To Canada**  
Furthermore, Canada is participating in a series of inter-American conferences than ever before. Canadian delegates were invited to the recent inter-American Municipalities Congress at Santiago, Chile, and the Pan-American Highway and Pan-American Tourist Congress at Mexico City.

Meanwhile, negotiations for a reciprocal trade pact between the United States and Argentine continue in Buenos Aires and it is believed that the treaty is ready for signature. It had been thought that the treaty would be concluded a month ago, but virtually every commodity affected in the pact has been submitted to a thorough discussion, necessitating exchanges of cables between Washington and the Argentine capital.

Well-informed Washington quarters insisted, however, that there have been no major difficulties and they expressed the opinion that prospects for a satisfactory conclusion of the negotiations are better than ever. Negotiations for a reciprocal pact between the two countries failed several years ago, causing intense disappointment in the United States and Argentine business circles, and it is believed that both governments are determined that there shall be no failure this time.

The pact, when made effective, is expected to bring considerable relief to the Argentine national economy, which has suffered through a severe loss of markets due to the war. It would provide larger United States markets for goods already consumed here, and would establish new markets in this country for other products. Argentina's financial position has not been aided by the political tactics of certain groups in the Chamber of Deputies in blocking legislation to authorize loans and credits extended last winter by the U. S. Treasury and the Export-Import Bank.

The credits have been available to Argentina whenever the government wished to make use of them, but a domestic political dispute over Argentine election policy has caused opposition members of the lower house to retaliate against the administration by refusing to permit action on the loans.

The opposition has no objection to the loans per se, but the urgency of the situation gives the congressmen a handy weapon in its controversy with the administration. The credits are needed now more than ever to aid in the government's crop purchase program, a relief measure to aid agriculturists, and to help in financing the armament program and otherwise develop national industry.

 LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 2. — Night Police Chief Dudley McCloy said today a suspect had been arrested at Shelbyville, Ky., in the slaying of Marion Milley, nationally known golf star, and the fatal wounding of her mother, Mrs. Elsa Milley, here Sunday.

Police Chief Roy S. Jones, of Shelbyville, about 50 miles west of Lexington, reported the suspect, about 17 years old, was being held without charge.



**Dies After Funeral**  
 Mrs. Milley, 50, died late yesterday in St. Joseph's hospital of three abdominal bullet wounds about seven hours after funeral services for her daughter.

The women were shot down by two masked intruders who entered their apartment at the fashionable Lexington Country club and demanded receipts of a Saturday night dance. In the sketchy account she was able to give police before her death, Mrs. Milley said she told the robbers where the money was and then they beat and shot her. Marion, coming to her mother's aid, was shot down and apparently killed instantly.

### Financial Campaign Is Resumed Today

Annual financial campaign here for the Salvation Army was resumed this morning after the first-day efforts Wednesday netted contributions amounting to \$1,500, according to Dr. W. B. Irvin, chairman.

# Lubbock Home Building Pace To Continue

## Lincolns Are To Be Shown

Bennett Motor company, 1008 Avenue J, is staging first-public showings of the 1942 Lincolns this week. The showings reveal three series of cars, entirely new in body styling and appointment, higher in power and presenting sharp advances in all elements of line car performance.

Mechanical high light of the 1942 line is an extra cost option, the Liquamatic Drive, which steps up car response to new top levels while reducing car control to its simplest terms.

**Height Is Reduced**  
By redesigning the Lincoln springs and using 15-inch wheels, it has been possible to reduce overall height substantially without sacrifice of head room or ample road clearance. In addition, the lateral "base" of the car has been broadened by spacing the front wheels more widely apart. The lowered center of gravity also adds to stability on the road.

Emphasizing the decrease in overall height are new elements of outside trim even more impressive than Lincoln has used in the past. A heavy horizontal grille of rustless steel extends from across the full width of the front, while the forward base of the hood carries a rounded grille of like design. **No Door Handles**

Push-button latch controls now are standard, both inside and out, on doors of all three series and on the luggage compartments as well.

New interior fittings and upholstery harmonize with body exteriors. Edge-lighted instruments are regrouped on panel of striking design. Chairhigh seats and a softer, easier ride, assure maximum passenger comfort. A one-piece "panorama" windshield and deep, wide windows afford an "observation car" field of vision. Closed bodies of all three series are Lincoln-built on Lincoln principles of built-type body-and-frame construction.

**Four Body Selections**  
Four body selections and eight color choices are offered in the medium-priced Lincoln-Zephyr series: the Sedan, a Coupe, for which opera seats are provided at extra cost; the Club Coupe and a Convertible Coupe. Individually tailored custom interiors are available for all Lincoln-Zephyr-body types.

The Lincoln-Continental, ultra-smart and sophisticated style leader of the group, comes in two body choices, a long, six-passenger Coupe and a swank Convertible Cabriolet. Convertible tops in both the Lincoln-Zephyr and Lincoln-Continental series raise and lower automatically. All bodies in these two series are on wheelbases of 125 inches, although the hood of the Lincoln-Continental is longer by seven inches.

ROSCOE, Oct. 1.—Three sisters were killed here late last night in an automobile-truck accident in which their father, Wiley McAdoo, 48, and another daughter, Grace, 16, were seriously injured. The three girls—Loraine, 13, Margaret-Dean, 12, and June, 7—were helping their father push his stalled truck when it was struck from behind by a car driven by a 17-year-old boy.

**Fourth Escapes Injury**  
A fourth daughter, Patsy Ann, 8, escaped injury. A fractured right arm, broken ribs and severely lacerated chin, and Grace a severe back injury. The two were placed in a Roscoe hospital.

McAdoo and some of his daughters had been picking cotton for a month at Loraine, west of Roscoe. McAdoo's wife is dead.

ALAMOSA, Colo., Oct. 2 (AP)—Albert Strauel, a Colorado youth who drank his only cup of tea with the king and queen of England, predicts that "if Hitler ever does invade England, he'll probably do it at tea time."

"The British fliers, even time their sweeps so they can be back in time for tea," Strauel, who served three and one-half months with the Royal Air Force, related today. "I don't know what would ever bring me away from it."

The Coloradoan had to shelve his aversion for tea when the royal family gave a reception for American fliers.

## City Placed On Priority Lists

Information interpreted as meaning that Lubbock's residence building pace probably will be maintained despite increasing nationwide shortages of many materials was received here this morning.

It tended to relieve an uneasiness that such building might be brought to a virtual standstill because of inability to secure the required materials.

More than 3,000 residences representing an investment of more than \$10,000,000 have been built in Lubbock in a little more than five years. Nearly 400 of them have been built at a cost of nearly \$1,500,000 during 1941.

The information received by several officials and builders here said that builders of houses costing less than \$6,000 in 275 designated defense areas—one of which is Lubbock—have been given first call on copper, zinc, electrical supplies, hardware and other materials needed for construction.

The report added that the government priorities order will make it more difficult to obtain building materials in other areas for other types of homes.

Donald M. Nelson, defense priorities director, was quoted in communications here as saying the order will apply to 200,000 privately financed homes and to 100,000 to be built by government agencies. Quotas have been worked out for each of the areas, but have not been disclosed.

Communications said that priority assistance may be obtained to speed deliveries of only specified items and only in quantities authorized by priorities officials. The list of materials includes such manufactured products as light fixtures, meters, water softeners, radiators, ranges, refrigerators and oil, gas and coal burners.

To obtain priority assistance, according to information here, the builder in a defense area such as Lubbock must apply to the local office of the Federal Housing Administration. The local office is located in Lubbock National bank building with J. A. Bailey, Jr., the senior evaluator, in charge.

Nelson was quoted as advising that FHA offices will be utilized to put the plan into effect quickly, although it has no connection with FHA mortgage-insured activities. The Fort Worth regional office of the FHA will handle applications from the following defense areas designated by the Office of Production Management: Lubbock, Wichita Falls, Vernon, Midland, Brady, Abilene, San Angelo, Brownwood, Mineral Wells and Dumas.

**Pledge To Be Required**  
Information here said that no application will be considered until it is demonstrated that the homes will be available to defense workers at jobs to remain their reach and in locations convenient to their employment.

The highest preference rating will be assigned to defense housing projects under construction Oct. 1 and to remodeling and rehabilitation jobs to provide additional housing for defense workers.

Lower ratings will be given to new construction for rent, and a still lower rating to houses to be offered for sale, information here said. To qualify under the plan, it was explained, a house must be designed for rental for not more than \$50 per month.

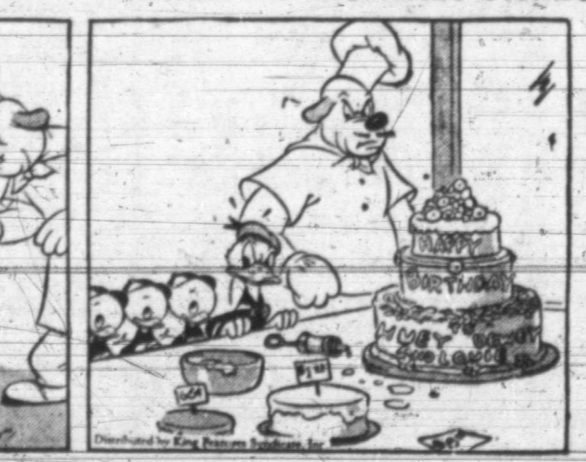

# Two Ships Bemoaned As "Ill-Starred" Brighten U. S. Naval History

## Traditions Of Navy Enriched

(In 1812, the U. S. navy was still a Johnny-come-lately among the world's great sea services. The navy held for this Yankee outpost was epitomized by a British captain's promise to "sink any U. S. ship in 15 minutes.")

"Trouble at launching, trouble at sea." The seafaring men shook their heads sadly, knowingly, as the new U. S. frigate Constitution started timidly down her long ways and then stuck fast. She's an ill-starred ship, they said. She'll bring a bad name to the new navy.

One Sunday morning fifteen years later (it was 1812), the Constitution limped into Boston harbor. She looked like an ill-starred ship sure. Her canvas was tattered, spars splintered, sides scarred from battle. Yes, she had been hurt in battle. She had met a British frigate off the banks of Newfoundland not many days before.

"Sail ho!" the lookout had called. "Six points off the starboard quarter!"

U. S. Takes Up Challenge  
The heavy-set New Englander raised his glasses and peered toward the horizon. Hull recognized her even at that distance, even though she flew deceptive pennants. Who in New England couldn't spot H. M. S. Guerriere? Hadn't the frigate been one of the main offenders against freedom of the seas who had caused the war, stepping American ships all along the New England coastline and seizing U. S. sailors for the man-short royal navy?

The master of the Guerriere was the Capt. Dacres who once scornfully wagged his head and said "I'll sink any U. S. ship that dared battle with him."

"We'll give Dacres a chance to make good his boast," mused Hull. He ordered more canvas piled on. The ship heeled to the chase.

## "Hidden" Taxes To Take Cut In America's Pocketbooks

EDITOR'S NOTE: How do the new taxes affect the average American? Perry is a general answer. But a more specific survey of the new taxes is presented in a series of three articles in this Evening Journal, one of which appears below.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—The job of paying for defense takes pennies as well as dollars.

Before this war is over you will have paid out so many pennies that the mere mention of a game of penny-ante poker will cause your face to whiten.

Every time you buy a phonograph record or a pack of cards or a glass of wine you will throw in a few extra pennies to help pay for a two-ocean navy, a drafted army, and a super air force.

These pennies will be taken from you largely in the form of hidden taxes, so-called because they are hidden in the price of a purchased article.

But look sharply and you'll get an idea of the wallop the new hidden taxes can hand out.

Sept. 10, spotted on the horizon the British flagship Detroit, 19 guns, accompanied by five other fighting ships.

It was 11 o'clock, the skies cleared by an early morning shower when the fleets met. Suddenly Perry broke out at the Lawrance's main-royal, masted a blue pennant, and roared with the dying words of James Lawrence: "Don't give up the ship." It signaled action.

Perry furled his topgallant, hauled up his foresail and closed in. 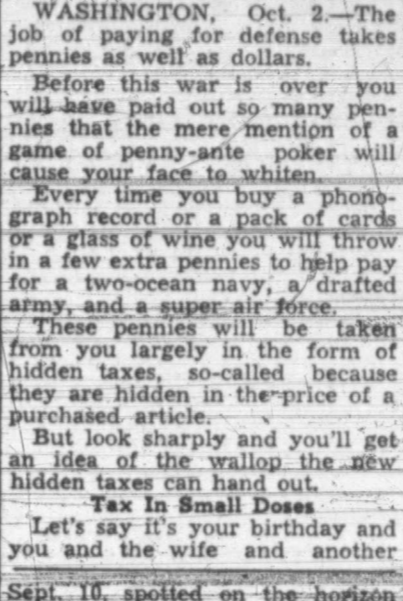
Down Came Perry's Flag  
Down came the blue pennant. The British stopped firing, broke into cheers. But they did not know later their cheering stopped. Pulling away from the battered flagship was a small boat, Perry standing erect in its stern, carrying his battle flag. The British guns roared back into action.

Cheyers of water shot up around the little boat, often obscuring it from view. Miraculously it reached the Niagara. Perry ordered her captain to bring up the American schooners, himself took command of the Niagara. He headed her straight into the center of the British. His schooners closed in behind him.

Sailing between the British ships, the Niagara let go double-shotted broadsides, port and starboard. Now the action increased in intensity. But the crisis was past. At a few minutes after 3, the British admiral hauled down the colors of his flagship Detroit. The battle was over. The Americans had lost 123 killed, scores wounded. But the west was saved.

Perry sat down to dash off a report to General Harrison, whose army was anxiously facing the British near the Canadian border. "Dear General," wrote Perry, "We have met the enemy and they are ours: two ships, two brigs, one schooner and one sloop."

couple are going to have a big time of it. First you'll have cocktails, then a show, and you'll intend to wind up the evening in a night club.

You buy a quart for the cocktails and after paying the price of the liquor you add \$1.00 for Uncle Sam.

Then you go to a show which costs you \$2 a seat. For four people you throw in an additional \$1.20 for the government. Then to the night club, and when you pay the \$24 bill, another dollar has to be thrown in for the little man who isn't there.

That means you've paid \$32.20 during the evening in hidden taxes. Remember, \$32.20 would feed you and the wife for half a week?

Suppose you're going out with the boys for an evening, to bowl or go to the amusement park, or drop in at Joe's place.

Well, the bowling alley proprietor has to pay the government a tax of \$10 per alley. That means he probably will charge the customers more to make up the difference. At the amusement park you'll have to pay a penny for every five-cent ride or for any other amusement. When you drop Uncle Sam \$50 a year just to have a slot machine in the room. And Joe figures to get it back.

Let's say your tastes run to music. All right, phonographs and records are taxed 10 per cent of the manufacturer's sales price. And if you were thinking of getting a piano or mouth-harp of your own, there's a new 10 per cent tax on the manufacturer's sales price.

If you're going on a little trip and you'll want to send a couple of telegrams. That'll cost you a 10 per cent tax. If you get a new suitcase, there's a 10 per cent tax on the manufacturer's sales price. Then you go to get your ticket and it round trip is \$40 you'll throw in an extra \$2.

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# Reich Now Forced To Deplete Own Vast Reserves

## Russians May Hold Balance

The sweeping agreement made in Moscow, under which the United States and Britain are to fill virtually all of hard-pressed Russia's requirements for war supplies, represents a move of the utmost importance when considered in conjunction with the Berlin admission that the Russo-German war will continue through the winter.

It means that the Soviet is likely to be able to repair enough of the grievous damage thus far inflicted by the Nazi invasion so that when spring comes the Red fighting machine will again be its powerful self. This will have a vast influence on the trend of the war—might even control it, for that matter.

**Reds Hold Key**

Now in order to get the full significance of the present crucial moment we've got to shear through the more spectacular aspects of the warfare and get down to certain fundamental facts. Everything else is window dressing.

One thing to be emphasized is, as Soviet Foreign Commissar Molotov remarked yesterday, that "at present the Soviet union bears the whole brunt of the struggle with Germany's Fascist hordes." He referred, of course, to the actual fighting on the battle-field, and not to the economic front. It is equally important to recognize that if Russia can be kept on her feet through the winter, and emerge strong in the spring, it may represent the weight which will swing the balance toward an Allied victory. Defeat of Russia now might easily have the reverse effect.

**Blockade Takes Toll**

Perhaps we can get at the thing better by looking at Hitler's position again. In order to keep our perspective we must remember this: Hitler created his great war-machines and piled-up resources while he had access to the outside world as well as to a comfortably supplied continent. He built a military colossus and filled his storehouses for the future.

When the war started the British blockade all but cut Europe off from the rest of the globe. This severance became almost complete when Hitler attacked the Bolsheviks and thereby stopped his supplies from them. Meanwhile, the ravages of war swept across the whole of Europe and crippled industrial and agricultural production.

**Nazis Hitting Stride**

Hitler has figured that his might would bring him a quick victory, but it didn't. Germany thus is now in the position of having to live on its own fat, like a hibernating bear. The Reich is still mighty and Hitler's armies, despite mountainous losses in men and material in the campaign against the Muscovites, are hitting their stride.

At this moment Hitler is overlord of the continent. But his resources are falling away and cannot replace them in Europe. Either he must knock the Allies out quickly—which isn't likely, especially with winter at hand—or he must break through the enemy's fresh resources, especially oil. As I have pointed out before, that is the chief object of his drive into the Ukraine. He figured on acquiring great riches there, but they have turned to ashes under Stalin's scorched earth policy. Thus we find the Nazi chief looking anxiously toward the Caucasus, and that is the apparent aim of his drive now through the Ukraine. That route leads to strategic advantage and supplies.

**Woman, 70, Directs Town Waterworks**

MUNISING, Mich., Oct. 2 (AP)—At the age of 70, Mrs. Katherine Simmons, superintendent of Munising's municipal waterworks, is believed to be the only woman in the nation holding a similar position.

Mrs. Simmons took over the job when her husband, who had been superintendent, died in 1930. As part of her duties, she must operate complicated machinery, including a chlorine gas injector.

## Uncle Sam's Sailors Are Jack Tars Of All Trades Nowadays

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—"So Joe's in the navy now, eh? What's he doing?"

Boy, that calls for a long answer if you want to list the activities a modern sailor might be engaged in. For a ship's crew of the lads who sail out beyond the ramparts we watch includes about every sort of trade you can think of, including such unexpected ones as printing, hairdressing, tailoring and even bookbinding.

If Joe has just signed up, he's at a training station, busy learning the ancient fundamentals—discipline, the manual of arms, deck and boat drill, keeping his effects and quarters shipshape. He's learning, too, a foreign language, wherein the floor is always the "deck," nothing is ever "upstairs," but is "topside," and a short, snappy "Aye, aye, sir," means "the order has been understood and will be executed."

**Starts At \$21 a Month**

The U. S. navy gets men through voluntary enlistment at hundreds of recruiting stations throughout the country, usually located in the local federal building or post office. An accepted recruit will "stand by" until shipping day, when, rounded up with others from that section, he will be shipped off to the most convenient of the navy's four training stations, located at Norfolk, Va.; Newport, R. I.; San Diego, Calif.; and Great Lakes, Ill.

At the station he goes on Uncle Sam's payroll—as apprentice seaman—at \$21 a month. After four months he gets a raise to \$30. He gets, free, uniforms and equipment numbering nearly 100 articles. He starts his 8 to 12 weeks "boot" training, usually under chief petty officers.

**Specialists Sought**

The petty officers keep sharp eyes out for recruits with special aptitudes. These are selected for special training as radiomen, cooks, bakers, electricians or any other specialists required in the sizeable, self-contained community that inhabits the navy's larger ships.

Ordinary recruits, after four months training, are usually assigned to ships of the line and then become seamen, second class, drawing \$36 per month.

In his new rating the seaman is liable to a multitude of tasks and duties. He trims the parts of the ship. He has setting-up exercises and gunnery drills. He gets an assignment on the deck in his particular division and assists in

Gradually the old government methods of buying only on competitive bidding are being replaced by negotiated contracts. What MacKeechie's idea is in all this reform is to make the purchasing division of OPM as unnecessary as possible. When it is completely unnecessary, he'll be able to go home to his family.

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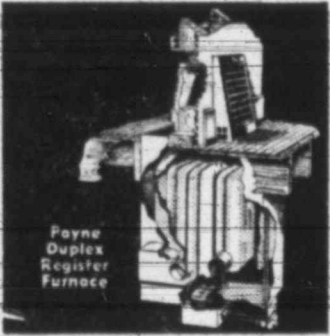
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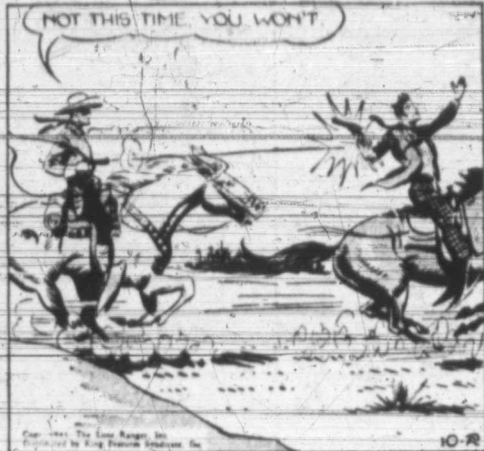

California, Here We Come! Rush For Defense Jobs Bigger Than Flight From Dust Bowl

By The Associated Press. SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2.—The famous dust bowl migration to California in the 1930s is being rivaled and perhaps exceeded by a new one—a westward rush for the well-paid jobs of a booming defense industry. Officials are looking on with alarm. They wish these would-be shipbuilders and planebuilders would use the processes of the Federal Employment Service, which can tell them before they set out when and where work is available. The first seven months of this year 58,251 automobiles poured across California's borders, three-fourths of them with out-of-state tags. This exceeds the rate at the heaviest stage of the "Okie" migration. Many arrivals are disappointed, but many are getting jobs. Aircraft employment is up 123 per cent over a year ago and shipyard personnel up 200 per cent. Half-Million Figure Debated. The most extreme estimate of the influx comes from Victor W. Killick, state motor-vehicle statistician, who believes that since the federal census was taken in 1940, California's population has increased 566,351. The Federal Social Security Board heavily discounts Killick's figures, although confirming the heavy migration and recognizing the danger of disrupted economics and human hardship. The most specific report on the new trek westward comes from the state department of agriculture, whose plant quarantine inspectors at the state line have been trained to spot "persons in need of manual employment." In the first half of 1941 these inspectors reported 46,955 in this class, but this did not include those traveling by bus or train. The largest number came from Oklahoma, the state which unwittingly gave its name to the "Okies." Over the present rosy picture of California's booming business vanishing unemployment and fairly stabilized farm-labor situation, responsible officials are inclined to cast a shadow caused by the new migration. Says Edwin Bates of the SSB: "National defense business certainly means opportunity to California, but it also means a major headache." R. G. Wagenet, state director of employment, warns that "we do not encourage migration unless specific jobs are available." Hopeful arrivals, out for big wages, find many disappointments. The SSB says many are victimized by "sly" technical schools promising to train them for defense jobs. Housing may be scarce and rents high. They may find that jobs are open for skilled workers but not for the merely ambitious. In case of hardship they run up against a stone wall in California's three-year residence requirement for relief.

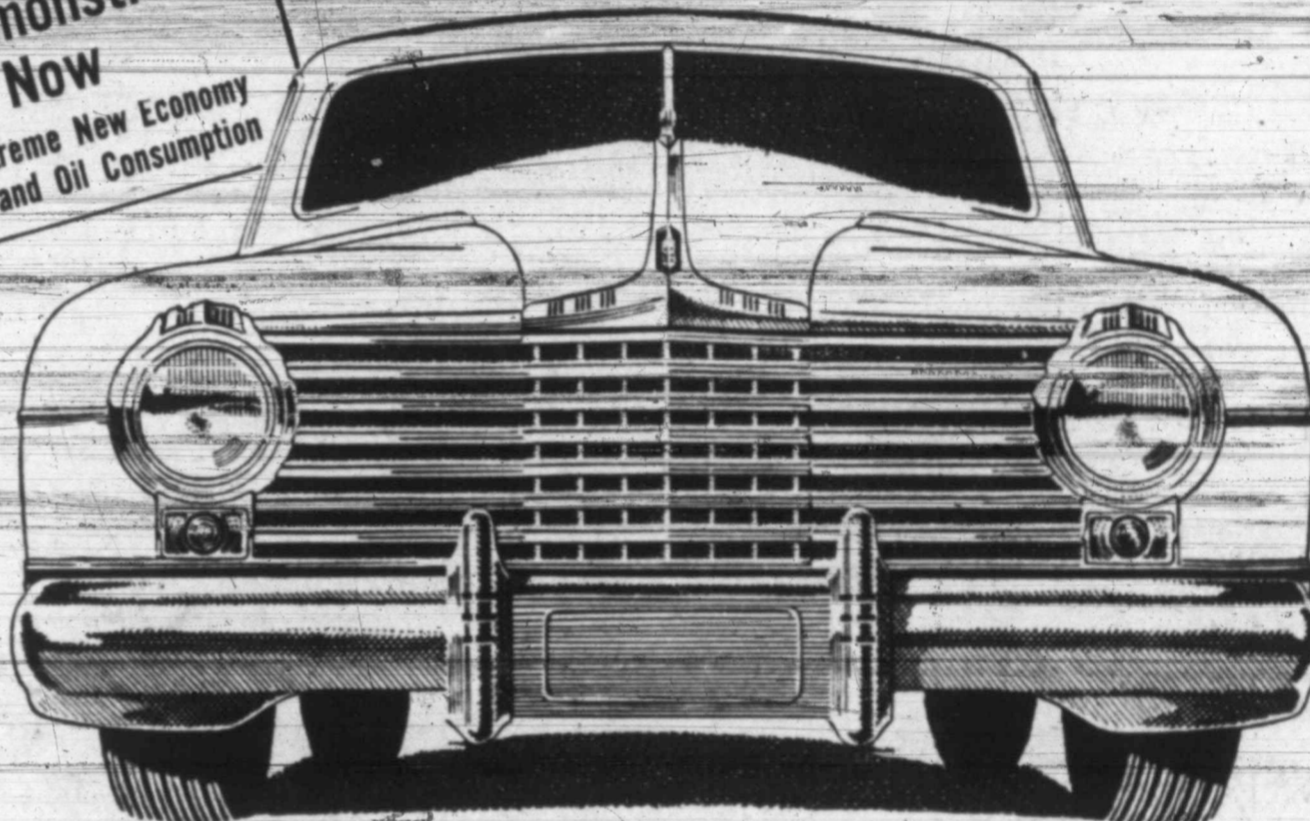
