"Victory Is Ours!" Cry Nazis; Reds Face Death

Germany's Leaders Say Russia Finished With Armies Crushed

Power To Resist Said Broken; 60 To 70 Soviet Divisions Reported As Trapped

Adolf Hitler's military steamroller, driving toward Moscow in what the Fuehrer described as "the last great, decisive battle of this year," was reported by the Germans today to have broken Russia's power to resist, with 60 to 70 divisions caught in two vast traps west of the Soviet capital.

Normally, 60 to 70 divisions would total approximately 1,000,000 troops, but a Nazi spokesman said some of the "shattered Red units consisted only of some hundreds of men."

Heavily clouded skies and flurries of rain were the weather setting this morning for the second Children's day of the 28th annual Panhandle-South Plains fair.

Only the weather, in the opinion of officials of the fair association, will prevent more broken records to add to those which already have been shattered.

One of the "big" records was set Wednesday when the first Children's Day attracted an attendance of 40,445, the largest for any Children's Day since two such days were held in 1935.

In a special message he also left the door open for further revision later to wipe out another major prohibition, that preventing American cargo ships to travel to belligerent ports.

PANAMA'S CHIEF FLEES IN BLOODLESS 'REVOLT'

PANAMA, Panama, Oct. 9.—Panama's reputedly Nazi-minded president, Dr. Arnulfo Arias, has fled the country in secrecy, apparently under political fire of a faction favoring collaboration with the United States, it was disclosed here today.

So secretly did Arias flee by airplane at 5:30 a. m. Tuesday that his departure was not revealed until a successor was sworn in this morning.

Japan Brands U. S. Actions "Arrogant"

TOKYO, Oct. 9.—Japanese spokesmen and newspapers today criticized the "arrogant" actions of the United States and warned that the war "is likely to spread to other regions" of the world at any moment.

Entry of the United States into the war, a spokesman said, would "bring ruin to civilization and might even involve America in a deadlock."

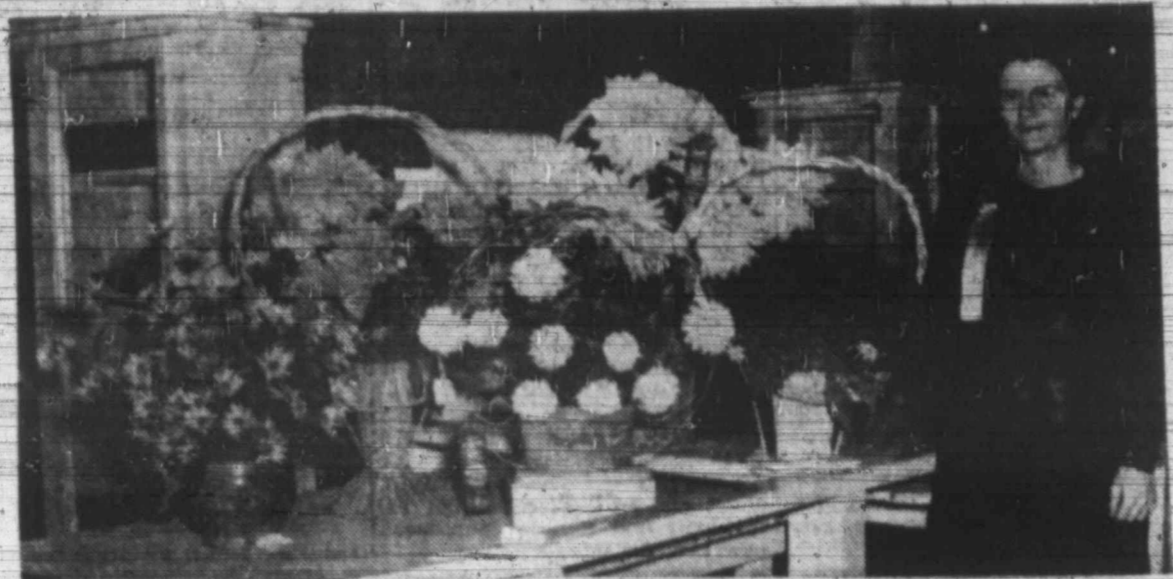
