



# Man Is Facing Forgery Count

State's case against 60-year-old Sam Thomas, held since Sunday night at Huntsville, Ark., for Lubbock authorities, was outlined Monday afternoon by Burton S. Burks, district attorney of Lubbock.

In a complaint filed in the court of J. T. Inmon, justice of peace, Burks had charged the 6-foot Arkansasian with forgery of a land deed.

**Extradition Is Sought**  
Sheriff Tom Abel and a deputy, Grady Harrist, left Lubbock Monday afternoon for Austin with application to Gov. Coke Stevenson for a requisition upon the Arkansas governor for extradition of Thomas. If the requisition is granted the officers will go to Huntsville, Ark., hoping to take into custody the prisoner and return him to Lubbock for trial.

Burks, who said he had been informed by Arkansas authorities that Thomas had figured in real estate deals at Hobbs, N. M., Abilene and Stroud, Okla., as well as in Lubbock, outlined his charge substantially as follows:

**Lots Not For Sale**  
T. A. Turner of Lubbock had wanted to buy for a client four city lots at Tenth street and Avenue T. He had approached the record owner, Charles Rutherford of Austin, bachelor and teacher in the Austin public schools, and been informed the lots were not for sale.

But on Sept. 28 the official records in Avalanche-Journal publications showed the lots and one other had been conveyed, the record transfer being announced as follows:  
Charles Rutherford to Sam Thomas, lot 11, block 137, original town, and lots 13, 14, 15 and 16, block 28, Overton addition, \$10.

**Registered At Hotel**  
Turner wondered what the lots sold for and whether they could still be bought. He learned at the county clerk's office that Thomas was registered at a small hotel. At the hotel, the clerk said, Thomas was ill, but in his room a stranger known to Burks was sitting in the lobby. He told Turner he knew Thomas and would be glad to introduce him. Upstairs, after introductions, Thomas remarked he was ill and would prefer to talk business later.

The day afterward, a Lubbock real-estate man who, Burks said, had no license, called on Turner and said he knew Thomas and that he believed a deal could be swung as a bargain for cash.

**Closed The Deal**  
Turner got in touch with another man who had been interested in the property and got \$1,000 in cash, after checking the deed records and finding an apparently good chain of title, and went to Thomas' room and closed the deal for the four lots at Tenth street and Avenue T.

The real estate man who has no license was in Thomas' room when the money was counted, and remained when Turner left. Thomas returned to Arkansas next day, leaving his address with Turner, whom he asked to sell the other lot, one near the cattle commission barns.

**Became Suspicious**  
Through correspondence, Thomas instructed Turner to sell the lot "subject to the reservation" which had been represented as willing to buy it for \$300, but Thomas wrote that he had been offered \$1,000 but would sell for \$500 "subject to the records."

Valles and Turner became suspicious. Turner went to the district attorney, who studied the deed records. Finding that another Lubbock man, H. W. Stanton, had seen the father of Charles Rutherford at Mt. Vernon, Texas, and asked him why the son had sold the property so cheaply when he could have demanded much more and being informed by Rutherford the son had sold no property, Burks had Victor H. Lindsey, assistant district attorney, and Grady Harrist, deputy sheriff, to Swisher county and investigate the authenticity of the acknowledgment to the alleged forged deed.

Acknowledgment to the deed, original of which had been mailed by the county clerk's office back to Thomas, showed up signed in the county records as J. E. Swelston, notary public of Swisher county.

**No Such Notary Found**  
Lindsey and Harrist found no such notary; rather, there is a J. E. Swelston who is a notary public there.

And Charles Rutherford in the deed records was listed as being a bachelor of Swisher county. And Swelston informed the officials he had not notarized any such instrument as that in controversy.

Another puzzling matter: the district attorney found in the deed records that the instrument was dated Sept. 27, 1940, and not filed for recording until Sept. 27, 1941, exactly a year from date.

**Traded In Other States**  
Thomas wrote letters from Arkansas to Turner on stationery of the circuit clerk and recorder, which corresponds to the district clerk in Texas, and on the Arkansas corporation commission, which corresponds to the Railroad commission in Texas.

Arkansas officials informed Burks by letter and telephone that Thomas never had figured in real estate deals in Arkansas, but transacted such business in Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico. Thomas, according to letters in possession of the district attorney, sent a draft to a Lubbock bank by which he would have negotiated for sale of the fifth lot,



# Three Dutchmen Steal German Planes To Escape To England

(By The Associated Press)  
NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—The daring exploit of three Dutchmen who took German planes from under the very eyes of Nazi guards in their occupied homeland and flew them to England on the same day from separate Netherlands airports was related today by Aneta, Netherlands Indies news agency.

The first plane reached a Suffolk airfield after being riddled with machine-gun bullets from British nests on the ground and three pursuing Hurricanes, the news agency said, while the other was said to have been piloted across the North sea to a different English landing field.

The first was a twin-engine aircraft, with German markings, which suddenly dove out of the clouds over an airfield where in Suffolk, Aneta related. Three British Hurricanes were in pursuit.

There was a hidden machine-gun post installed in a corner of the field and the supposed enemy plane was received by the continuous rattle of machine-gun fire.

However, the German plane effected a safe landing. Two men hastily clambered from the cockpit. From all sides English soldiers came running towards the plane with Tommy guns and rifles at the ready.

**Novice Makes Journey**  
"Don't shoot! don't shoot!" cried the men in English. "We are Dutch." One of the men now is serving as a pilot officer in the RAF. The other is working in the offices of the Netherlands government.

There was an amazing sequel when barely 12 hours later a Fokker hydroplane arrived in England piloted by a Dutchman who never before had flown a flying boat, but who, counting on his luck and a favorable wind, had managed to bring the stolen German plane across.

## Defense Money Aids Recovery

NEW YORK, Oct. 14—Hang on to your hats!

Don't look now, but while everybody was busy with national defense something happened to the depression.

Experts disagree on exactly when the depression ended and the boom began—in 1932 or 1933 or 1935 or yesterday. But it happened.

Out in Iowa a farmer just sold 110 head of hogs for \$8,000 and bought an electric stove.

**Reflected In Night Clubs**  
In Chicago a department store reports its best month in 22 years. It's a boom—with sound effects too. The crowd in Manhattan's night club belt was never noisier. There are those who say it's just a defense boom and will leave the nation badly hung over.

But their voices can't match the hum of airplane engines in California, New York, New Jersey, and New England where production lines move a little faster every day.

**Steel Plants Booming**  
A few years ago—in the memory of the youngest reader—the nation's steel plants had a graveyard look. Today their stacks and furnaces glow.

Last week somewhere in the land a brawny man with hair on his chest poured a steel ingot and made history.

The ingot sent tonnage for 1941 to date above the total for all 12 months of 1929. And 1929 was considered an excellent year—up to a certain black day in October, 1929. At the moment \$3,000,000 Americans are employed, more than ever before. In March, 1933, the number was about 36,000,000.

## Gillies Is Ordered To Report To Army

Instructions to report for duty as a lieutenant colonel in the engineering corps have been received by John A. Gillies, 52, general manager of western lines of the Santa Fe railroad with head-

quarters in Amarillo. He is en route to Washington.

Col. Gillies was formerly Slaton division superintendent, and, as such was said to be the youngest man on the system holding a division superintendency. He was appointed in 1928 at the age of 39 and after serving several years,

was sent to the Colorado division. In 1937 he was made assistant general manager at La Junta; later he was promoted to the Eastern Lines and came back to the Western lines July 1, 1939 as general manager.

As far as is known here, Col. Gillies is the highest railroad of-

ficial so far to be called from a reserve rank to active work. A number of lesser ranking executives have been called into service. There was no indication of how long he might remain in the army.

Santa Fe officials have not announced his successor in Amarillo.

# Voice Heckles British Broadcasts

## Laugh Brought By Comments

(By The United Press)  
 LONDON, Oct. 14.—A mystery voice, apparently of German origin, which interrupted British Broadcasting Company programs with invectives against the government, its leaders and the United States, promised today to become a star feature of British radio.

The "ghost voice" popularly tagged "Harassing Harry," was heard for the first time last night when he interrupted a BBC musical program and shouted:

**Brands Churchill Swindler**  
 "Do you know how much money Churchill is being paid by the Germans? Has Churchill played fair with you? We are being swindled; led up the garden path and sold to America."

The average Briton, at first indignant, believed "Harry" a counterpart of Russia's "Ivan the Terrible" who heckles German broadcasters, would become a welcome diversion to British broadcasts, which long have been criticized for their lack of entertainment value.

Dubbed "Von Donald"  
 The wavering intensity of the interrupter's broadcasts often gave his voice a Donald Duck quality which led some listeners to name him "von Donald."

There had been no official limitation of the source by the "crashing" of BBC wave-lengths but it was believed it emanated from a powerful station somewhere in Holland, Belgium or France.

The heckler interspersed comments between British news bulletins. One sequence went like this:

Announcer: "John B. Biggers has left for America."  
 The voice: "Poor fellow."  
 Announcer: "The Germans are keeping up pressure on the Ukraine."  
 The voice: "Wait 'til tomorrow."  
 Announcer: "The RAF made a big offensive sweep over northern France today."  
 The voice: "And got shot down."  
 Announcer: "In raids over this country, two raiders were destroyed."  
 The voice: "Ret."  
 Announcer: "Casualties were small."  
 The voice: "You wait 'til next time."  
 Announcer: "This ends the news."  
 The voice: "Thank God."

## Commander Of U. S. Forces At Archangel During World War Doubts That British Have Landed Expeditionary Force There

(By The United Press)  
 PORTLAND, Tex., Oct. 14.—Colonel George E. Stewart, who commanded American forces at Archangel, Russia, in the World War, said today he placed "very little credence" in reports that the British had landed an expeditionary force at that far northern port.

Stewart, who led the troops at Archangel in 1918 and 1919 and retired 10 years ago, said that "the time of the year" was not right for the establishment of a force at the port.

**No Comment By British**  
 The Helsinki correspondent of the Stockholm newspaper "Aftonbladet" reported that "several tens of thousands" English had landed at Archangel although they had not yet gone into action to aid the Russians. British sources have not commented on the report.

"You must remember that landing men is only the first operation and that the biggest problem is supplies," Stewart told the United Press. "It takes a tremendous amount to keep even a small force going and any time now the White sea is due to freeze over, stalling the movement of ships by sea. It would be almost impossible to keep supply routes open after the last of November."

**Would Be Cut Off**  
 He said that it took between 50 and 100 ships to supply his detachment of 5,000 officers and men and he did not understand how the British could hope to land before November enough men and supplies to be of material assistance to the Russian defense.

The port is blocked from November until mid-March, he said, and any British landed there would be virtually cut off from supplies during the long winter months in which the temperature drops to 45 degrees below zero.

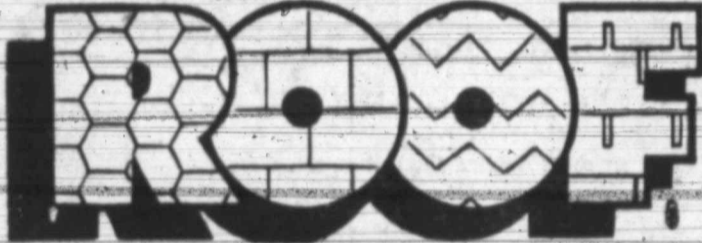

... and there the matter was ended. There was an item of \$75,000 for increasing morale at some 60 industrial centers having naval contracts.

### Handouts By The Hundreds

BOTH Army and Navy press sections have what are known as "handout" services, duplicate sheets of information on keel layings, ship launchings, new contracts, camp locations, some production figures and copies of speeches delivered by the gold strippers and the secretaries and assistant secretaries. From 50 to 100 sheets of this are issued every day and are available on request or by mail to publications, radio stations and newsmen.

The real heavy job of defense publicity, however, has fallen on the civilian Office of Emergency Management organization of OPM, OED, and the like. OPM's budget, on top of the \$750,000 listed at the beginning of this article for salaries, travel, and miscellaneous items, includes \$122,400 for press releases, the duplicating of an average of 85 pages a day. Combined Army and Navy press releases will easily double this, and on top of that are items of \$20,000 a year for national defense posters and \$26,000 for a national defense magazine, issued once a week and made up almost entirely of a compilation of the week's press releases.

Not to be overlooked in this compilation is one item of \$300,000 which goes to the Rockefeller office of Inter-American Affairs.

# Capital Of All Russia Now Faces Severest Test

## City's Fate Is "In Balance"

Berlin's announcement this morning that German artillery now is within range of the outermost defenses of Moscow gives a grim notification that the capital of all the Russians is at last under siege.

This doesn't mean that the twenty-seven square miles of the ancient metropolis are actually within range of Hitler's big guns, for the outer ring of the defenses may be from seventy-five to a hundred miles from the heart of the city, and even more in some cases. It does mean that the fate of Moscow is in the melting-pot and the flames burn fiercely.

**May Encircle Metropolis**  
The Germans are continuing to fling everything they have into this supreme effort and heavy fighting is reported all along the Moscow front. The Nazi strategy would appear to be encirclement of the capital, and in pursuit of this they are striking not only directly eastward, but from points to the north and south of this central line.

The Muscovites are resisting stubbornly, and the Nazi thrust appears to have been slowed down somewhat. However, a measure of the power being poured into this effort by the Germans is seen in the report from an authoritative source in London that Nazi units, driving at the capital from the southwest, had reached Moscow only sixty-five miles from Moscow on the main highway to Smolensk.

The Reds are said to have flung the invaders back at this point. The appearance of the enemy so close to Moscow, however, is a matter of grave concern for the defense.

**Capital's Defense Mystery**  
The Bolsheviks are continuing to fall back slowly, with heavy rear-guard actions, to prepared positions where they are awaited by fresh reserves. So far as can be judged from the very incomplete official reports, the Reds appear to have achieved their withdrawals in an orderly manner, indicating a lack of panic.

All in all, the Russians would seem to be presented a fighting front of much strength. That being so, their resistance may be expected to stiffen now that the Germans are close to the gates of the capital. The defenses of Moscow are said to be powerful, but that is another of those Muscovite mysteries which only time will bare to the outside world.

**Morale Big Question**  
That the Germans are out to make a quick killing before winter catches them there is no doubt. As this is written there comes over my news printer a Moscow bulletin saying that great mechanized battles are taking place west of the capital, with the Nazis trying to smash through the Russian barriers.

Much hangs on the defense of Moscow. If Hitler captures this first city of the Russian empire, the morale effect in favor of Germany will be great and widespread. How it might react within Russia itself remains to be seen. Leave-lead supervisor Harry Hopkins, who has just returned from Moscow, says he believes the Russians will be able to maintain an effective resistance even if they have to establish a temporary capital east of Moscow. There can be no question that the Russian people would suffer a heavy shock in losing their capital. However, as this column has insisted, the only thing which can knock the Soviet clear out of the war is a collapse of morale, and we have seen no signs of this so far.

Funeral services for five-year-old Alvin Ray Kemp, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Kemp of Robertson, will be conducted at 4 o'clock this afternoon at Robertson cemetery under direction of Rix Funeral home.

Death was at 9:45 o'clock Monday night in Lubbock sanitarium. The child had been admitted to the sanitarium for medical treatment only four hours before his death.

The mother was at the bedside when the child died. She is Mrs. Kemp, who moved to Robertson from Roby 18 months ago, have two other children.

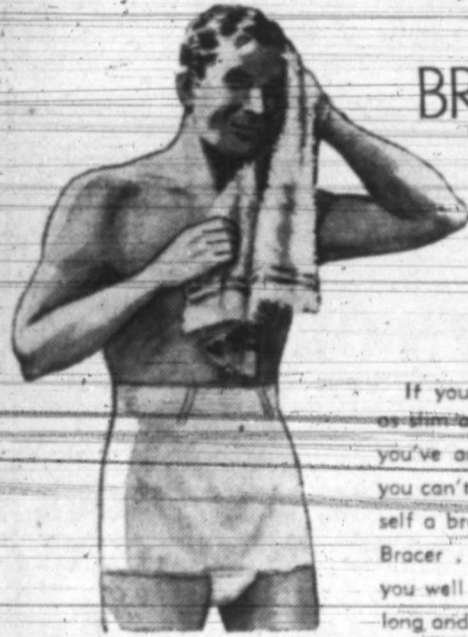
