

## U.S.-Vichy Relations Again Tense

### Economic Help To French Is Suddenly Cut

#### Vichy Cooperation With Germany Is Scored By Nation

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—The state department announced today the United States was reviewing its entire relationship with France because of the removal of Gen. Maxime Weygand as Vichy's pro-consultant in French North Africa.

The department announcement emphasized that Weygand's removal was an ominous development in growing Franco-German collaboration which might be seriously detrimental to American interests.

U. S. To Await Action.

For the moment, it was officially said, all economic assistance to French North Africa has been suspended, and the United States will await action by the French and Germans before determining "on this country's future course."

The announcement said: "According to reports reaching the department the French government has acquiesced to the express demand of Hitler to remove General Weygand from his post as delegate general of France in Africa, thus permitting a German control over French authority entirely outside of the provisions of the armistice."

All Plans Suspended

"As a result of these reports American policy towards France is being reviewed and all plans for economic assistance to French North Africa are suspended."

"It remains to be seen to what further extent Hitler will attempt to take over by force or threat of force the sovereignty and control of the French empire."

The notice carried a frank warning, informed sources said, which intimated that severance of diplomatic relations was a possibility. Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles stated the case to Gaston Henry-Haye, the French ambassador, during a conference yesterday.

Would Aid Germans

The United States attitude was made clear to the French just at the moment when a British imperial army was losing a major offensive against the Axis in Italian Libya, next door to France's North African colonies. German possession of those colonies—particularly Tunisia—would improve the strategic situation.

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## Tokyo's War Leader Appeals For "Fighting Spirit"

### Japs Warned Of "Flaming Death From Skies"

TOKYO, Nov. 20.—War in the Pacific would mean that enemy planes would bomb Japanese cities and set vast areas of wooded houses aflame, Maj. Gen. K. Sato, chief of the war office military affairs bureau, told a parliamentary committee today in appealing for a "fighting spirit" among the Japanese people.

Other indications of the seriousness with which Japan views the situation was a summons by Emperor Hirohito of Foreign Minister Shigenori Togo and an appearance by Premier Gen. Hideki Tojo before a House of Peers committee to say that Japan is confronted by an "unprecedented crisis."

Tojo said that "the nation literally stands at the crossroads of rise or fall."

The emperor summoned Togo to the imperial palace presumably to hear latest reports on the Washington negotiations being conducted by special envoy Saburo Kurusu and Ambassador Admiral Kichisaburo Nomura.

Sato told a lower House committee that the next war for Japan, "in event it occurs," would mean hostilities involving a Japanese effort to break out of alleged encirclement by Britain, the United States, China and the Netherlands East Indies. Enemy planes, he said, "undoubtedly" would bomb Japanese "wooden houses" in an effort to break morale and it was "urgently necessary," he said, to promote a fighting spirit among the people.

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## Chicago Girl Saved From Self Destruction

### Young Blonde Attempts Suicide Four Times In Five Minutes

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—Betty Austin tried four times in five minutes to kill herself. She failed.

The 18-year-old blonde was standing on the edge of a loop "el" platform last night when bystanders noticed she appeared ready to jump in front of an onrushing train. They pulled her back.

Policeman Harry E. Smith, who was waiting for the train, was attracted by the commotion. When the girl saw him start toward her, she ran to the back of the platform and attempted to fling herself over the rail to the street.

Smith ran after her and pulled her off the rail. Betty broke loose and fled down the stairs to the street with Smith in pursuit.

The girl ran across the intersection and threw herself in the path of a street car.

Again she was frustrated as the motorman brought the tram to a jerking halt.

Smith attempted to grab her again, but the girl leaped to her feet and ran down the street. With the officer still chasing her, she threw herself in front of a taxicab.

The driver stopped with brakes squeaking, and Smith captured the fighting girl.

"Let me alone," she screamed. "Let me do what I want."

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## 30,000 Nazis Facing British Desert Trap

### England Opens Big Assault To Knock Italy Out Of War

LONDON today, informed quarters in London said the 3-day-outstanding German forces under Gen. Erwin Rommel in a big-scale battle now taking shape.

Taxi divisions—about 30,000 troops—were reported wedged in between siege-girt Tobruk, 90 miles west of the Egyptian frontier, and Bardia, 75 miles west of the border.

The RAF reported its planes had bombed Axis tanks and motor transport moving westward on the road from Salum—evidently in retreat.

British warships were reported heavily shelling Axis troop columns and supply lines, and naval officers said there was no sign of any Axis naval effort attempting to engage them in battle.

British dispatches said the attack, which started at dawn on Tuesday, set German and Italian troops back on their heels in shocked surprise.

Climactic Battle Near

An authoritative London source envisioning a lightning campaign, said the climactic battle might come "within a few hours."

"Conditions in the desert are in many respects, like those of sea warfare," he said.

"I don't know whether the trial of strength has yet taken place between heavy-armed forces, but it cannot be long delayed."

"The encounter, when it is achieved, is like a clash of fleets and flotillas and, as in a sea battle, all may be settled one way or another in the course of a few hours."

Greatest Ever Assembled

Equipped with American-made tanks, planes, guns, bombs and bullets, the British striking force was described as the greatest ever assembled—North Africa—far different from the "token army" with which Gen. Sir Archibald Wavell swept across most of Libya in 34 days last winter only to be driven out again last spring.

The new assault force is commanded on land by Lieut. Gen. Sir Alan Gordon Cunningham, the man who crushed the Italian East African empire, and on sea by his brother, Admiral Sir Andrew Browne Cunningham.

A bulletin from Adolf Hitler's headquarters, deprecating the surprise element in the attack, asserted that German and Italian counterattacks had thrown back strong British forces with heavy with satisfactory mediation machinery.

Earlier, the CIO served notice that it would fight against any legislation that would deprive workers of the right to strike.

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## Texas Divided In Observance Of Turkey Day

### Some Give Thanks Today; Others To Delay For Week

PRESIDENT Roosevelt and Gov. Coke Stevenson are causing a lot of disunity in this state but Texans are thankful for it—especially the turkey growers.

The president proclaimed today official Thanksgiving day but Gov. Stevenson held to the traditional last Thursday of the month for the official Texas date.

State Thoroughly Divided

And the state is thoroughly divided. Some are giving thanks and eating turkey today. Others are sniffing the aroma from baking ovens but stoutly heartedly tightening their belts and waiting.

Turkey will grace the table in some homes today and a week hence and that means two weeks of turkey hash instead of one.

The soldiers are staunchly behind the president. Army camps are feasting today and towns in their vicinity are stringing along. Many army men are being entertained in private homes.

Tickle Lot Of Gullets

And if all the turkeys the army has prepared were laid end to end—it would be enough to tickle a lot of guttles and bolster morale no little.

And as a special treat the cooks and bakers' school at Fort Sam Houston turned out 150,000 pounds of fruit cake for southern army camps.

At San Antonio, merchants, schools, public offices and the army are observing today. Some soldiers who were to get the week end off are remaining for the turkey and trimmings. Open house was scheduled for several squadrons at Randolph field.

President Gets Noed

The president got the nod over tradition at Dallas. Banks, retail stores (except groceries), public schools, federal offices, most businesses and utilities were closed today and a majority of the churches were holding services.

But city, state and county offices, public offices and the city Methodist university, the grocers and some Dallas churches will observe next Thursday.

Austin is loyal. There only federal offices and banks were closed today. The banks also will observe the 27th along with schools, state offices and the city.

### Thousands Of Miners Idle Over Country

DETROIT, Nov. 20.—A declaration that "in this grave crisis mediation and peaceful solution of our industrial disputes is of the utmost importance" was approved today by the annual convention of the Congress of Industrial Organizations.

Delegates, who closely followed developments in the captive coal mines strike as well as the proceedings of their convocation, adopted a resolution which asserted the CIO and its affiliated unions were "firmly resolved to do all in their power" to cooperate with industry and government toward the goal of maximum defense production.

Lauds Peaceful Solution

"The CIO will utilize to the utmost degree the mediation facilities of the government in the event that no stone will be left unturned to achieve successful prosecution of our national defense program."

"Labor appreciates more than any other group that in this grave crisis mediation and peaceful solution of our industrial disputes is of the utmost importance."

Speaking in support of the resolution, Jacob Potofsky, acting president of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers union, stated that "these days call for more than ordinary restraint" in labor relations.

Must Continue Production

"We must keep the wheels of industry turning while we seek our just demands," he said. "The government must provide the machinery for satisfactory mediation machinery."

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## Woman Faces Prison Death

SAN QUENTIN PRISON, Cal., Nov. 20.—Bitter and broken by despair, Mrs. Juanita Spinelli, 32, convicted slayer, entered the cell at San Quentin prison today to await execution in the lethal gas chamber tomorrow.

She lost her last chance of escaping the death penalty for killing a member of the gang of petty thieves and holdup men she led when Governor Culbert Olson said yesterday he would not interfere with the execution, the first legal execution of a woman in California.

Once before Mrs. Spinelli was placed in the death cell but Olson spared her life.

She is blamed "police propaganda" for her plight and bitterly renounced "people who would not help me."

"Some of my blood will burn holes in their bodies," she said.

## Two Killed In Dallas Wreck

DALLAS, Nov. 20.—Two persons were killed and several injured, four seriously, in the collision of a streamlined passenger train and a truck heavily laden with steel at a grade crossing on the outskirts of Dallas today.

The truck driver, identified by police from papers taken from the body as Arthur Spearman of Houston, was killed instantly. The engineer of the Fort Worth and Denver train, D. B. Sewell of Wichita Falls, died in Parkland hospital two hours after the crash.

Several Cars Overturn

The engine and several cars of the train, en route to Dallas, overturned from the terrific impact and went into a ditch.

The injured: J. E. Worthen, fireman of the train, of Wichita Falls, serious burns about the hands; J. H. Graham, of Buffalo, Tex., fractures and burns; E. E. Ross, 43, of Dallas, fractures.

## Grave Diggers May Be Busy In Texas

AUSTIN, Nov. 20.—Since highway violence in Texas has reached a new high during the past year, State Police Director Homer Garrison today predicted grave diggers would not get much rest this Christmas.

Throughout December, he forecast, they'll dig an average of more than six graves a day for the torn and crushed bodies of persons killed in traffic collisions.

With traffic deaths for 1941 skyrocketing, Garrison forecast a total of 195 in Texas for December.

## Miami May Lose Its Title As The Nation's Divorce Capital

MIAMI, Fla., Nov. 20.—Miami may lose its title as the nation's divorce capital.

The lucrative business which has turned out divorces at the rate of more than 4,000 a year in Miami alone suddenly has hit the skids.

The cause of this slump is an investigation started by circuit judges, who discovered that some attorneys were adopting illegal short cuts to speed up the already speedy processes of Florida's divorce law.

The court ordered a detailed study of 1,000 divorce cases filed in nine months by 15 lawyers specializing in this type of business. They reported in some cases "asset-by-line" methods were being used to get divorces for husbands and wives who were not even residents of Florida.

Quickly, the court ordered disbarment proceedings against four attorneys, directed a fifth to quit practicing for five years, and sent a man (Turn to Page 8, Column 2, Please)

## Decoration Prize Money Totals \$90

Prize money posted in the downtown store front decorations contest has been increased to the desired total of \$90, according to announcement this morning at the chamber of commerce.

## Oil Proration Order Issued

AUSTIN, Nov. 20.—The Texas Railroad Commission today issued an oil proration order for December providing for allowable production of 1,585,192 barrels on Dec. 1.

This figure was 75,492 barrels above the Federal Bureau of Mines' estimate of market demand for Texas crude, 1,478,700, but the commission said actual production would be 3.5 per cent less than the allowable, or only 21,060 barrels more than the bureau estimate.

Eight Shutdown Days

It compared with an allowable of 1,833,283 barrels at the start of November and an average allowable of 1,540,517 barrels for last week.

Eight shutdown days were ordered for December, the same number as in November. The days on which wells in the state will be closed with some exceptions for special operating conditions, will be Dec. 6, 7, 13, 14, 21, 25, 28 and 30.

# Thirty-Two States To Celebrate Today

## Others Are To Wait A Week

(By The Associated Press)

Thanksgiving day, with its turkey and trimmings, will be celebrated in 32 states and the District of Columbia today, one week before the traditional Thanksgiving date.

Next Thursday, residents of the 16 others will have their day, secure in the knowledge that while they had to wait a week longer, they'll have plenty of company next year when the entire country will discard the dual holiday and return to the original last-Thursday-in-November.

**New England Divided**

Even New England, where all six states kept the traditional date a year ago, was divided on celebrating the day. New Hampshire and Vermont still cling to the last Thursday of the month. Plymouth, Mass., home of the first Thanksgiving, will hold its annual pageant today.

These states celebrate today, following President Roosevelt's proclamation:

Alabama, Arizona, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

**These Next Week**

Next week, Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Iowa, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas and Vermont.

Number one carving-knife wielder today will be President Roosevelt, who will tackle a prize 22-pound turkey hen at the White House with Mrs. Roosevelt and Mr. and Mrs. James Roosevelt, only members of the presidential family in Washington for the day. There are four other birds in the White House ice box for emergencies.

**Army And Navy To Feast**

Both branches of the service nibble drumsticks today.

Seven hundred and fifty tons of turkeys have been ordered for 1,500,000 soldiers, most of them drafters observing their first military Thanksgiving, and turkey slices will be the order-of-the-day on warships at sea.

The weather forecast for the nation looked like this:

New England—Generally clear with rain late in the day.

New York and vicinity—"Unseasonably warm" temperatures. South—Showers to moderate rains, except for eastern sections of North and South Carolina, Georgia and Florida.

Middle west—Chilly weather, with rain in some parts and snow in others. A snowstorm Tuesday night assured most of Colorado, Wyoming and Montana of a white Thanksgiving. New Mexico should be fair and cold, with some skiing, and Texas cooler but generally fair.

Pacific coast—Cold, frosty and clear.

## Feeding Test Will Be Staged At Tech

A feeding test will be conducted at Texas Technological college next week with 60 steers which have arrived, according to information given Wednesday by W. L. Stangel, professor of animal husbandry.

The experiment will be conducted by Tech in cooperation with the Texas agricultural experiment station. Jamie Caviness, 1941 graduate who holds the Texas Cottonseed Crushers association fellowship in the animal husbandry department, will feed the steers, which will be weighed early next week. They will be divided into six lots according to weight averages. Feeding in the experiment will open next Wednesday. Cottonseed hulls, sorghum silage and fodder will be used for fattening the steers, with varying levels of cottonseed meal.

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# Details Of Murder Story Are Withheld

## Men Are Held As Witnesses

(By The United Press)  
 HOUSTON, Nov. 20 — Police today withheld details of a written statement by Miss Helen O'Keefe, 30, blonde secretary charged with murder in the "flaming death" of her employer, J. C. Franklin, 57, investment broker and attorney, Marcus Burkett, 48, cafe operator, and his cook; Ira C. Latham, 38, whom police questioned for several hours in the case, were described merely as witnesses and not suspects. Burkett was released but Latham remained in jail to serve out a fine for drunkenness.

**Held Without Bond**  
 Miss O'Keefe, a beneficiary in Franklin's \$60,000 insurance policy, was held in jail without bond after making a written statement in which she denied, Police Chief Ray Ashworth said, that she killed Franklin or had somebody else kill him.

Franklin's charred body was found in his burning automobile on the banks of San Jacinto river east of here on Nov. 12. Although the murder charge was filed against Miss O'Keefe, police refused to reveal how or why Franklin was slain.

Burkett, who spent last night in his home, said that he merely wished to aid police in their investigation by supplying information about Miss O'Keefe's activities before the slaying and that he had appeared voluntarily.

**Sold Her A Pistol**  
 The cafe owner said that he was not well acquainted with the woman but that she had tried several months ago to "get someone to beat up Franklin." About a month ago, Burkett said, he sold her a .32 caliber pistol.

When this case came up, Burkett said, "I thought I ought to tell police about it."  
 Police Lieut. A. C. Thornton had said yesterday that Miss O'Keefe had made a verbal confession in which she said she hired two men for \$100 to kill Franklin. She later denied this story.

## DAR Sponsors Open Lecture

We must believe and by our actions prove that democracy is the greatest form of government in the world or our fate will be as that of France and other European countries that have fallen, D. L. McCormack, special agent of the Dallas office, Federal Bureau of Investigation, warned a Lubbock audience Wednesday night. His talk was sponsored by the Nancy Anderson chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the lounge of the Tech Women's Dormitory, No. 2 and 100 persons were in attendance.

Mr. McCormack traced activities of the FBI from its organization in 1908 as an investigating force for the department of justice through the gangster period to the present when agents are devoting much of their time to national defense and against espionage.

## Cannot Be Made Public

The FBI cannot operate in the headlines of the papers because of danger and perhaps death that might come to its agents, Mr. McCormack told his audience in referring to criticism that the bureau works too secretly. Once a foreign agent is identified he is no longer working for his government, he said. If his work was described in the papers, he would immediately be replaced by Germany in another spot. And while the activities must not be made public, methods against espionage are much the same as those used against gangsters, according to the special agent. The same plan power and equipment are used because "the criminal who will kidnap your baby will work for a foreign power if the price is great enough. If you can whip a liar, you can whip a gangster of a spy."

Keep America American

There are 2400 special agents working as many as 14 hours a day to combat undesirable influences. Mr. McCormack told his audience. They are devoting their time and energies to keeping America American, "a country whose constitution was drawn up by patriotic Americans and not by European henchmen," he said.

# Land Prices Soar On South Plains

## Oil Play Back Of Increases

By LEDGERWOOD SLOAN

Dealers report land trading at low ebb in the South Plains and Panhandle, in contrast to the situation in many other sections of Texas.

In the Lubbock territory prices are up as much as \$15 an acre above a year ago, but the gradual development of oil drilling has caused large blocks to be taken off the market.

Values are little changed around Amarillo where excessive rains during the summer curtailed drastically what promised earlier to be a bumper wheat crop. Plenty of land is for sale in that area.

**Prices Compared**  
The Texas Land and Mortgage company, Ltd., with more than 150 farms in Northwest Texas, is not offering any land in the vicinity of Amarillo, says Manager Ben Brewer.

He estimates farm land in Lubbock county, if selling at all, is from \$5 to \$15 an acre more than a year ago. Prices of \$40 to \$60 an acre, with higher prices closer to Lubbock, are asked.

During the last decade raw land has sold in the South Plains from \$10 to \$25 an acre, depending on location near a town or railroad, while cultivated tracts have sold on long-time credit from \$20 to \$35 an acre.

**Seek Oil Leases**  
Manager T. T. Badger of the Yellowhouse Land company, with holdings in Lamb and Hockley counties, says his firm has withdrawn its acreage from the market where there is a chance of it being leased for oil. Most of this withdrawal has been in Hockley county where a new development program is under way north of the Santa Fe railroad.

Badger said farms were being quoted, and a few sold, at from \$2.50 to \$5 an acre above a year ago. The firm's land has brought from \$40 an acre down, depending on course upon the improvements.

The Elwood Farms, owners of the Spade and other properties, are holding because of a wildcat oil test.

**Demand Up in Bailey**  
R. L. Brown of Muleshoe says prices in Bailey county range from \$25 to \$50 an acre, depending on improvements. He notes a 50 per cent increase in demand.

"The tendency of our ranchers is to hold them intact and not to cut them up," Brown said, adding "every man who owns land here now is thinking of oil and higher prices."

Most farms being sold are to land owners who are adding a 40 or 80 or a quarter section to their holdings.

Also off the market are lands held by the heirs of the late Col. C. C. Slaughter, who once controlled a million acres. This year four heirs sold 37,500 acres in Cochran to the federal government at reported prices of \$35 to

\$40 an acre for a development project.

**Hereford Land Selling**  
Other firms not offering their lands are the Halseil Farms of Amarillo, and the Double U company of Post.

Around Hereford land in the irrigated belt is selling as low as \$25 an acre. Some of it yearly is producing up to \$100 an acre worth of crops, but the price has been held down because of irrigation and production costs.

The Farm Security administration has about ceased buying Panhandle land, according to authorities.

A slight increase in values is noted, particularly for land bid in for delinquent taxes. Two dozen tracts in the Oklahoma Panhandle sold at 25 per cent above the prices of a year ago. City dwellers made most of the purchases.

**Business Men-Buy Farms**  
Many Panhandle business men have bought land on an operating rather than a strictly investment basis. The AAA payments about cover the cost of producing a crop, such as wheat. The owner can make a small down payment on the land. If the wheat makes a crop he profits. If it fails he has his AAA payments and crop insurance.

Many leading business men in Amarillo own farms, most of them operated as purebred-Hereford ranches. These owners, say real estate men, bought more with the idea of making money from a hobby than with the thought that if all else is gone they can move to the farm. Some are losing money.

The XIT Syndicate still has for sale at what it terms conservative prices about 330,000 acres, including some choice places, from the 3-million acres it has had on the market for 30 years. It reports sales slow.

## Manganese Is Clicking For U. S. Defense

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 21 — Manganese, war mineral which is hard to find in the United States, will now take its own picture, or make a popping sound to help the prospectors.

This discovery is reported in the Physical Review by Clark Goodman and Dean C. Picton, of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The American manganese problem is to discover ores sufficiently

rich in this mineral to be worth working. The Technology discovery is a short-cut method of analyzing samples.

**Process Explained**  
A bit of ore suspected to contain manganese is placed in a cyclotron for about an hour. Then it is taken out and laid on a photographic film.

If there is any manganese in the sample, the war mineral takes its own picture—a series of dots, large or small, of a color which means manganese.

NEW YORK (U.P.) — Gnashing and clanking of your false teeth need not embarrass you any more. If they are acrylic teeth and set in the back of plates, you can chomp noiselessly, according to Dr. Irving R. Hardy of Columbia University's dental school. He uses acrylic teeth in back of the mouth and porcelain ones in front.

The noises tick off identifies the source as manganese.

# Survivors Tell Story Of Enemy Submarines Stalking Freighter

## U-Boats Draw Nearer Canada

(By The United Press)  
**AN EASTERN CANADIAN** PORT, Nov. 20.—Five seamen, only survivors from a crew of 45 from a torpedoed freighter, said today that enemy submarines had begun stalking their vessel only 20 miles off the Canadian coast.

The submarines stalked the convoy for three days before they launched a night attack, the survivors said. Escorting destroyers began dropping depth charges when the submarines were first detected. They continued it for three days, laying such a barrage that when a torpedo finally struck the doomed vessel its crew failed at first to realize it had been hit.

The five men who reached here spent an hour in icy water after their vessel was hit. A sixth died of exposure after he had been rescued.

The men said their vessel was attacked at night. They believed that the submarine which torpedoed them was one of a pack of enemy U-boats.

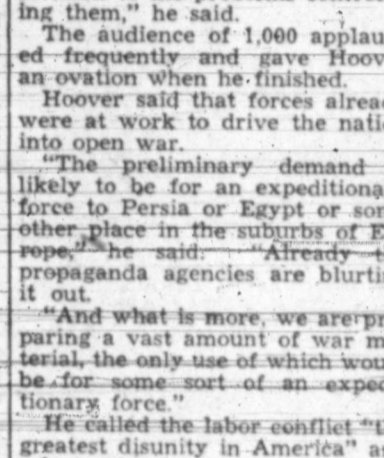
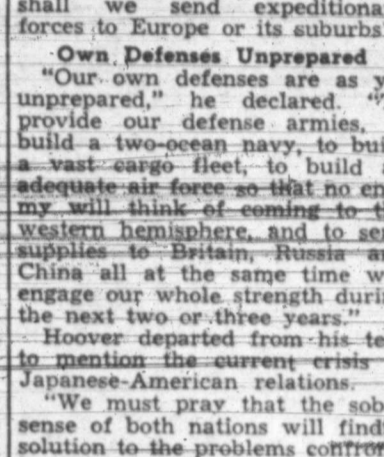

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# Fataities Soar As Uncle Sam Speeds Vast Pilot Training Program

## Record Above Other Nations

**BY MORGAN M. BEATTY**  
*Associated Press Staff Writer*  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 20—More than 400 American military fliers crashed to death in the first ten months of this year, contrasted with 88 for 1940.

That total includes army, navy, marine corps, and coast guard fliers.

In approximately the same period, the air lines of the nation flew nearly 114,000,000 miles, had four accidents and killed only 35 persons. That's one passenger fatality per 37,800,000 passenger miles.

There is no way to get at the accident rate in the army or navy. They are not telling their hours or miles flown per accident, for fear of tipping off the Germans on our training rate. But obviously, the armed services are killing off fliers at a comparatively rapid clip.

**Safety First Factor**  
Why the difference?  
The primary difference is the safety factor.

With commercial pilots, safety is the first factor. It's placed first by the air lines and the government.

In the military services, safety is no longer the No. 1 factor since those services are officially on an emergency status. Skill and training come first. If safety were first, our fliers would not be ready to fight when and if the time came.

That's the bedrock explanation of the sudden splash of air fatality headlines during October. It was coincidence that several spectacular military and commercial crashes all came at about the same time.

**Weather Has Effect**  
The weather obviously had something to do with it, too. At this time of year, the weather is very changeable. Temperatures frequently range between 28 and 36 degrees Fahrenheit—the trouble temperatures for all flying.

Yet it wouldn't be sensible to stop flying when the temperatures are between those marks on the thermometer, for flying in such temperatures in itself is not dangerous. Rare combinations of moisture and temperature and height must occur in a certain spot at a certain moment before conditions can be disastrous.

For example, take the Moorhead, Minn., commercial plane crash. Ice was forming on the wing, but it was easy to push off with the de-icer. The pilot played super-

hero instead of plunging through clouds that might have formed heavier ice, he flew down by instruments, circled the field according to regulations. Suddenly a blast of moist air hit the cold plane, and froze the controls stiff.

**More To Be Expected**  
In the case of army crashes, army general supervision and pilot failures account for close to four out of five crashes. You get the same kind of story from the navy. And, warn the services, there's going to be more and more of this kind of thing.

"But," says the army, "the number of accidents has not increased in proportion to the number of flying hours by a great deal, thus indicating increased control over military flying."

They mean the service is expanding too fast to give every man the complete supervision our fliers were getting only two or three years ago. And yet the rapid expansion is unavoidable if we are to create powerful air forces. The

Amarillo is expected to win its 23rd consecutive victory in a holiday game at Pampa, and thereby clinch a tie for the district title. Lubbock should handle Plainview with more or less ease at Plainview, thus eliminating the Bulldogs from the race and leaving Lubbock in it for another week, at least.

Both the Westerners and the Bulldogs enter the game without the services of ace backs, but each expects to be able to fill the missing one into service if needed.

Lubbock's Minger Thorne is not expected to start, even though he has recovered rapidly from a back injury suffered last week. To fill the vacancy, HOWARD Lanford has been moved to his right half post and Bob Brewer elevated to the first string left half job.

For Plainview, Mick Mason, spectacular fullback who was injured early in the season, won't be in at the beginning, although Coach Jerome Yanny expects to call him into service if needed.

Approximately 5,000 fans were expected to witness the game in Plainview's junior high school stadium.

Pampa, weakened by the loss of three squadmen on the eve of the game, isn't expected to provide too much competition for the Sandstorm. Halfback Bobby Dunham, Fullback Jack Waters and Guard Bill Abernathy were suspended from the Harvester squad Tuesday for breaking training rules.

Approximately 8,000 fans, many of them from nearby Amarillo, were expected for the contest.

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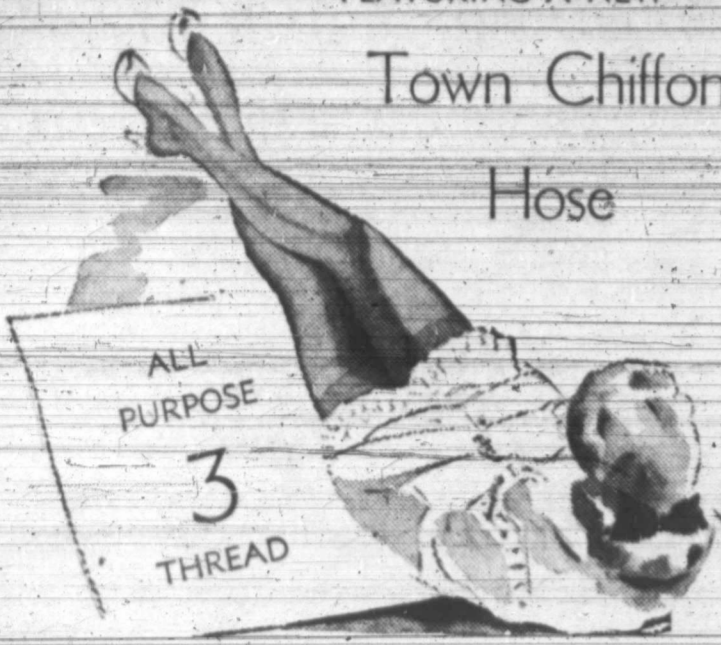
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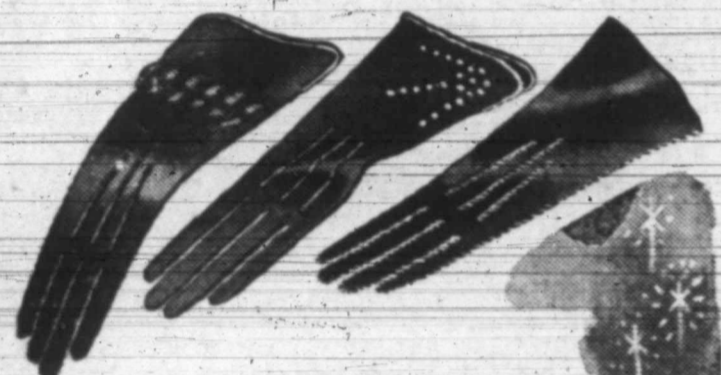

News Received On Test Well

Seven completions in the Slaughter field and a report on progress in the L. C. Harrison and Tobe Foster No. 1 S. L. Stock, wildcat test two miles northeast of Lubbock, featured the oil news received here late Wednesday.

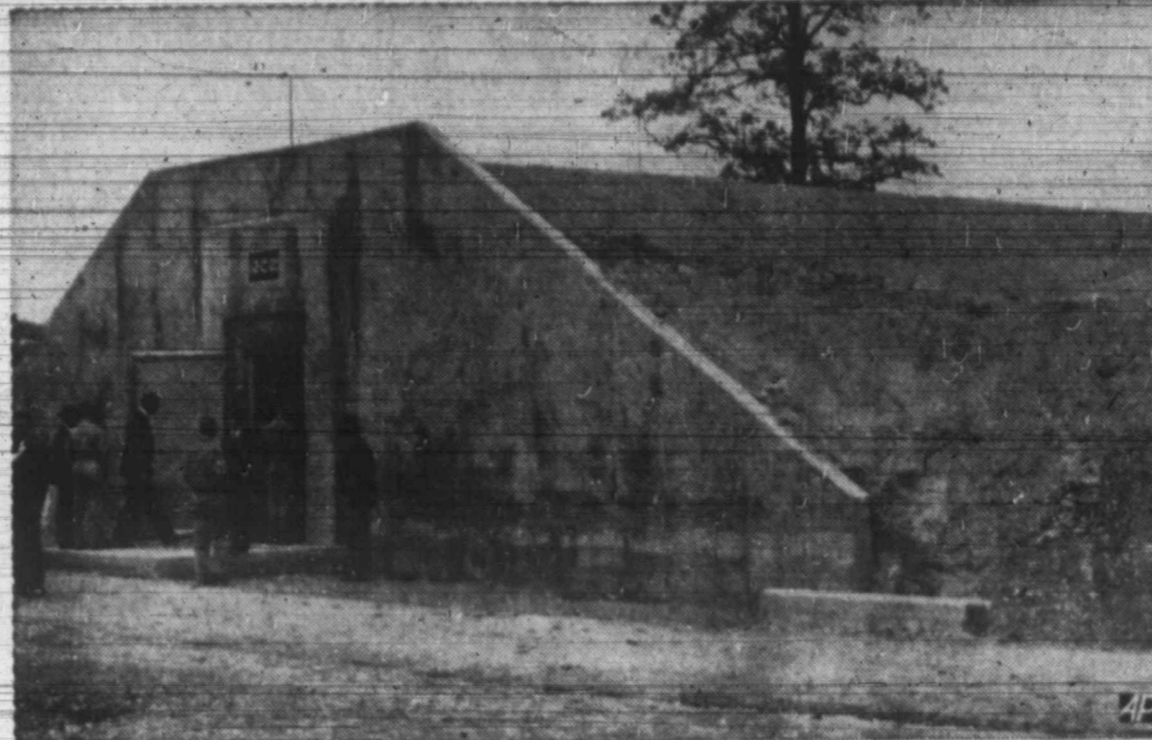
The Harrison and Foster well last was reported drilling at 5,120 feet in lime. It had been cored from 4,991 to 5,013 feet, recovering hard lime showing nothing. Operators then drilled ahead to 5,025 feet with rockbit. A core from 5,025-42 feet returned lime and anhydrite bearing slight oil staining and another core, from 5,042-53 feet, was extremely hard, dry lime, 16 hours being required to cut the core.

Second Deep Producer A second producer for the Wason deep pool of northwestern Gaines county loomed as Amon G. Carter No. 4-D A. L. Wason swabbed oil from Clear Fork, Lower Permian, zone. It is a south offset to Carter's No. 5-D Wason, discovery well of the deep play. No. 4-D Wason went originally to a total depth of 11,108 feet in Ellenburger, lower Ordovician, Dolomite but tested sulphur water, in that horizon and was plugged back to 7,700 feet. Five and one-half inch casing was run-perforated at intervals from 6,400 to 7,200 feet and the well was acidized with 2,000 gallons, following which it swabbed two barrels of fluid per hour for 24 hours. Fluid was described as 73 per cent oil and 27 per cent sediment and acid water. The well then was reacidized with 4,000 gallons and swabbed five and one-half barrels of oil hourly cut only three per cent with sediment and acid water.

Seeking the same pay Likins and Hall No. 4 Jones, northwestern Gaines wildcat 10 miles west of the Wason field, is drilling at 5,230 feet in hard lime. Three miles west of the south end of the Wason, Amerada Petroleum corporation No. 1 Ruth M. Hudson has drilled to 4,002 feet in anhydrite.

Lynn Test Reaming In western Lynn county, Dan Auld No. 1 Fee, inactive for several weeks at 5,202 feet in lime, is reaming at 1,200 feet preparatory to testing and possibly deepening. At 5,002 it is two feet past original contract. No appreciable

A core from 5,466-80 feet carried sulphur water from 5,466-1-2 to 5,469 feet, while a core from 5,532-37 feet showed water in the five feet of lime recovered. In the Cedar Lake pool of northeastern Gaines, Stanalind Oil and Gas company No. 7 J. B. Rayner was completed on swab for potential of 682.30 barrels of oil per day after a 540-quest-sterie-shot-in-pave-stone from 4,665 to 4,835 feet, the total depth.

Swabs 25 Barrels Albaugh and Richmond No. 1 Handley, prospective pool opener in northwestern Dawson county, swabbed 25 barrels of oil in six hours and continued cleaning out. It has been shot with 700 quarts and is bottomed at 4,920 feet in lime. Heavy-duty rotary is being moved back on Broderick and Calvert, Inc., Amon G. Carter et al. No. 6 H. Hayward, Bailey county wildcat nine miles southwest of Muleshoe. It is rumored the well will be drilled to the Ordovician unless granite is encountered sooner. Present depth is 4,146 feet in lime and 7-inch casing is cemented at 4,004 feet with 75 sacks.

In Briscoe county, Phillips Petroleum company No. 1 Montague is drilling below 5,040 feet in Dolomite. Honolulu Oil corporation No. 1-58 G. S. Dean "X", Cochran county extension, one-half mile north and west of the Slaughter field, is drilling below 2,135 feet in red rock. The same firm's No. 11-18 Igoo-Smith "AX", on the Cochran side of the field, flowed a rated 1,017.78 barrels of oil per day after acidizing with 10,000 gallons at 5,037 feet. Also in Cochran, Texas Pacific Coal and Oil company No. 1 N. H. Tarver rated 1,137.40 barrels of oil daily, plus seven-tenths of one per cent water, after a similar

Producers Are Completed A wildcat in northwestern Hockley county, Anderson, Prichard Oil corporation and American Drilling corporation No. 1 W. L. Ellwood estate, is drilling at 4,196 feet in lime. It is 15 miles northeast of the Slaughter field.

On the Hockley side of the Slaughter, Texaco completed four new wells while Honolulu added one producer. Texaco's No. 17-E Mallet Land and Cattle company made 1,317 barrels per day, plus 3.6 per cent water; its No. 52 Slaughter 1,604.20 barrels daily plus 1.15 per cent water; No. 57 Slaughter 1,164.72 barrels of clean oil and No. 58 Slaughter 1,573.76 barrels of oil, plus 2.53 per cent water. All were acidized and all are bottomed shortly below 5,000 feet.

The sole Honolulu completion in Hockley is its No. 17-6-49 Mallet "B", good for 1,050.16 barrels daily after 10,000 gallons of acid at 5,020 feet.

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# British Look To Reserves As War, Weather Take Heavy Pilot Toll

## 200,000 Men Are Training

By PAUL MANNING

LONDON, Nov. 20. — Britain's all-out battle in the air, and the extra hazards of flights through wintry's soupy flying weather, have combined to make a possible pilot shortage John Bull's No. 1 problem.

By no means do all of the casualties occur in brushes with enemy planes or with the enemies' anti-aircraft guns.

With the arrival of bad flying weather, more and more crashes have occurred on home airfields as fog and rain trap pilots ferrying planes from factories and points where they are unshipped after arriving from America.

**Reserves All-Important**

An unusually bad siege of flying weather recently was blamed for a whole series of crashes experienced by regular combat flyers, too. Following a week's loss of 71 Royal Air Force planes during the great bombing raids which attacked the held areas from Norway to the heel of Italy, officials said a large number of the ships crashed solely because of weather conditions.

With such losses, a backlog of reserve pilots becomes paramount. The rehabilitation of English boys injured in battle is a slow process. Slow but important because these men, when nerve and body wounds are healed again, need no training to fly an airplane into battle.

**But The Empire Training Scheme** for making recruits into flyers is the most immediate source of material for the Royal Air Force. Already in Canada they are turning out men for the front line here in England who need but a short period of final training before they can take their places at operational airbases.

**Take Wings While Young**

Just as important, however, is the reserve of young boys, 16 to 18, who have banded together into Britain's Air Training Corps. These total 200,000 now, these boys, and they are being taught navigation, radio and Morse code, engine maintenance, theory of flight. A little more than eight months ago, when the plan was announced, it was hoped 100,000 would enlist. Now, though, there are 1415 local squadrons scattered over England, and 371 school units, making 209,000 total. How practical the plan is you can gather from the single isolated fact that 5,000 boys who joined the Air Training Corps when it was first announced are now in the market in the R.A.F.

Air Ministry officials are enthusiastic about the movement. They have made the A.T.C. the personal responsibility of one of Britain's big eight of the air, Air Marshal A. G. R. Garrud. Since being formed, of course, the A.T.C. has taken on added significance. Not only will it be a long range reserve of pilot and bomber crew potential, but the boys will still be young when they get their first wings.

**Stress On Youth**

And youth is what's needed more than ever today by England and Germany. As air battles become more intense and bombing of enemy objectives becomes an increasingly difficult strain, it is the young men who can best stand the gaff.

The age levels of both German and British airmen are dropping lower and lower as each month rolls by. Not only due to air losses which kill off the older men who enlisted first, but because air chiefs have found the youngsters come back quicker after a series of ordeals.

**Are Trained Fast**

During the past summer 10,000 of these A.T.C. cadets went into camp at R.A.F. stations. They slept in tents, they learned about train-

er and operational aircraft, they occasionally took trips with pilots flying the big planes.

Like the two boys who went out over the Atlantic in a Sunderland flying boat. During the patrol the coastal station received the cryptic message from the ship wireless operator, "Am in action with the enemy."

Since followed and hours passed. But at dusk the big boat glided down to the water front, taxied up to the landing platform, and out jumped two elated young air cadets, shouting, "We got 'em."

**Youths Show Aptitude**

In the classrooms the boys vary in ability. Those with aptitude are given six months university training just before being sent into the Air Force. Recently, in London, a class group of boys, 15 and 16 years of age, took a nine-question examination. One of these questions, which indicates the complete practicality of the courses, was this:

"You have plotted a track from Cambridge (England) to Karlsruhe (Germany) at 42° degrees and found the distance 450 miles. The wind velocity is 90 degrees 30 m. You are to leave Cambridge at 07:00 hours. Flying at 12,000 feet the air speed indicator reading is 165 m.p.h. Find the course to steer and the time you should arrive over Karlsruhe."

The youngest boy, 15, gave a correct answer as did three-quarters of the group, comprising

THINGS I Just Found Out About Newspaper Features: The California legislature in 1899 passed a law prohibiting publication of cartoons in newspapers. Only one important daily newspaper doesn't run comic strips.

The first serial in an American newspaper was DeWolf Hopper's "Robinson Crusoe," in a Pennsylvania gazette. It wasn't completed because the agnostic Ben Franklin took over the paper and threw it out.

Early U. S. newspapers took care of "syndication" themselves. They clipped freely from each other, and anything good that appeared, for example, in Thomas Fleet's cartoonist. So was John Barrymore and Gary Cooper.

WILL ROGERS got his column started by telegraphing his news comments free to The New York Times, which regarded it for a while as just a publicity stunt by the actor.

Back in 1935, the editor of the Pittsburgh Press, observing the rapid circulation growth of the Hearst newspapers, asked if he could buy some of the Hearst features for the Press.

The first newspaper comic strip was the Katzenjammer Kids, which is still running. Rudolph Block got the idea for child-pictures of the European artist, Wilhelm Busch.

The first popular serial writers were Horatio Alger, Jr., and Mary Jane Holmes, developed by the N. Y. Sun. And, believe it or not, the 60-year-old "Lena Rivers," by Miss Holmes, last year topped sales of Hemingway's "For Whom the Bell Tolls" and Robert's "Oliver Twistell."

It's Just A Head Running Around With Its Chicken Cut Off! "OFF" Has No Office, No Facts, No Figures

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—The newest agency in the defense setup, the Office of Facts and Figures, will be a month-old come Nov. 23, and so far it consists principally of a head—running around—with its chicken cut off.

EDSON The presidential order creating OFF assigned to it in general terms the job of formulating programs designed to spread an understanding of the defense effort and to advise government agencies concerning the dissemination of such information.

As MacLeish sees it, the people of a democracy are entitled to know what the government is doing, and he believes the people can be trusted with this information, subject only to the limitations of giving out military information.

MacLeish feels these reports should be made without distortion, and that the dangers of any situation can be pointed out as well as the good things. ONE job for OFF will be editing existing information services, hunching them, seeing that they all work together. MacLeish has no intention of passing on government information handouts or announcements and "skating them before they are issued."

### Deer Trappers Making Plans

AUSTIN, Nov. 20. (AP)—Ever wonder how to catch a grown deer?

Experts from the Texas game, fish and oyster commission are going to trap 900 this fall to be used for re-stocking areas where the supply is low. Last year, they caught only 500.

This year the task will be doubly difficult because the deer have plenty of food and water right in their own backyards and aren't as interested as usual in the bait (and traps) set by the state's men.

Deer this year are being captured on the federal Arkansas refuge, near Austin, on the Gulf coast, and in Llano county, center of the deer-hunting country west of Austin.

Phil Goodrum, director of wildlife restoration for the state game commission, said that the latest type box trap has been unusually successful. It catches the nimble animals in such a way that they easily can be shipped by truck, and it does not injure the deer, as old-model traps often did.

**Traps Set in Clusters**

The restoration work is financed jointly by state and federal funds. Traps are set in groups of 75 to 100 supervised by a five-man crew.

The first step is to win the deer's confidence by putting out its favorite food in the vicinity of the traps. Texas deer seem to prefer a mixture of mistletoe and cottonseed cake. The baiting period lasts two weeks to a month, during which the deer are lured closer and closer to the traps.

The traps are in two parts, an area enclosed on three sides by heavy wire and a pirboard box on the back side of the wire enclosure. When the deer loses their suspicion of the wire enclosure where feed is placed, the trap's triggers are set. The triggers are concealed in the floor of the enclosure, to be tripped whenever a deer steps on one.

**Two Triggers Released**

When the deer touches the trigger, a heavy gate slams shut on the open side of the wire enclosure. This startles the deer into rushing through the opening at the opposite side, where the wooden crate is concealed. When the deer enters the crate, another door is sprung and the deer is ready for loading onto a truck for shipment to a new home. The crate is too small for the deer to move about, which reduces injury to a minimum.

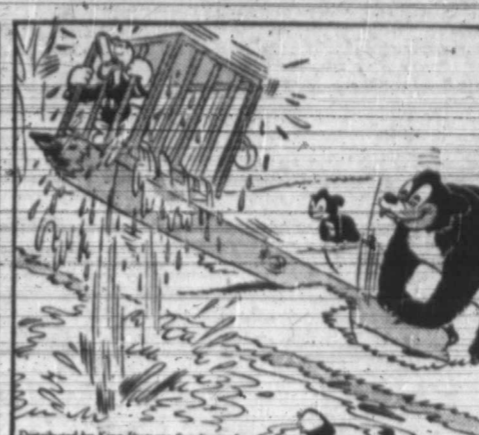
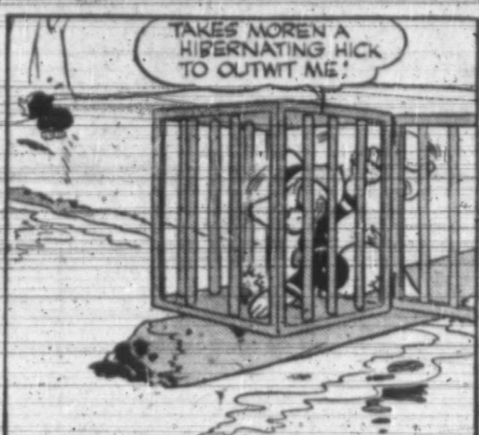
Goodrum explained that the restoration program calls for placing the deer in groups of at least 25 on reserved ranges of 10,000 acres or more each. This year, the deer will be moved to 30 localities in as many parts of the state. Owners of the preserves agree to forbid deer hunting on their property for at least five years and for 10 years if the game commission requests it.

**Deer Multiply Rapidly**

The propagation herd ordinarily contain two does for each buck. Normally, each doe produces one fawn during the first season and two a year thereafter. So a herd will multiply several-fold during its five years of protection from hunters.

## Women Man The Decks In Uncle Sam's New "Navy"

NEW YORK, Nov. 20 — Uncle Sam is sponsoring a "navy" in which all the sailors will be women.

Nautical classes started in New York recently will be the forerunners of others to be organized by the American Women's Voluntary Services, Inc., in all states bordering the Atlantic or Pacific Oceans, the Gulf of Mexico or the Great Lakes.

In time, additional classes may be started in Alaska, the Philippines, the Canal Zone and in Puerto Rico, where the organization has local branches.

Students in the New York classes, designed to give training that will be of assistance to the U. S. Coast Guard service, recently received their first actual small-boat handling experience at the Larchmont, N. Y. Yacht Club. Veteran skippers took them for a two-hour cruise on Long Island Sound to explain the ropes.

The women are being trained as thoroughly as possible so they will be able to step in and help the Coast Guard in event of national emergencies.

The only requirement is that the women be American citizens. In New York, a two-hour class is held once a week. The beginner's course lasts 10 weeks, inasmuch as most of the students are housewives or business or professional women, classes are held only at night.

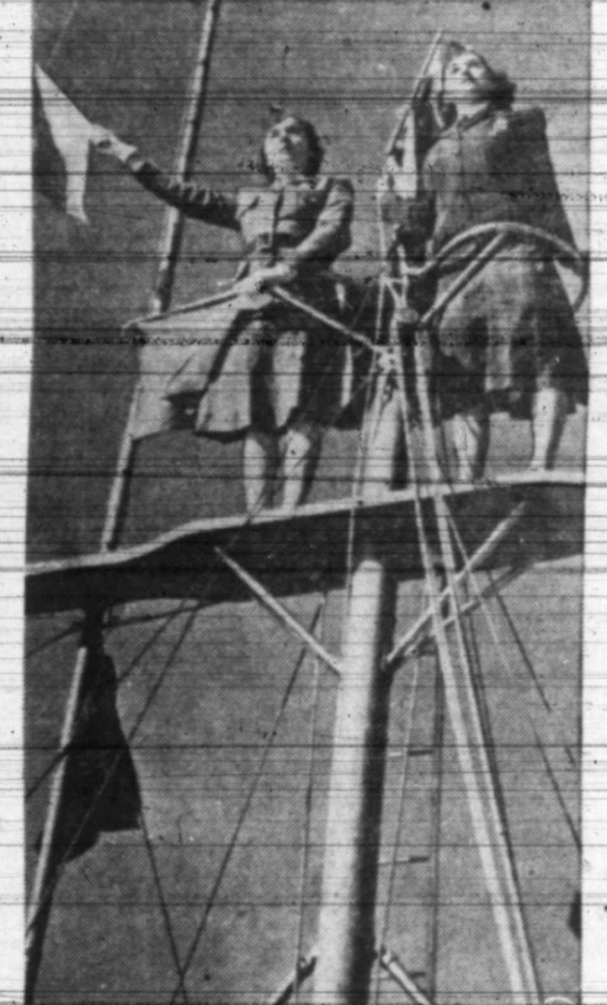
