Computer To Refine Record Maintenance

In the near future, a more refined system of recording and maintaining personnel data will come into effect. This system, known as Phase II, Base Level Military Personnel Sysstem, is



a computer supported system designed to improve the accuracy, responsiveness and usefulness of data required for personnel management at base level. Its immediate objectives will be to eliminate and/or reduce base level clerical routines, provide an immediately accessible computer repository of personnel data, permit automatic and extensive editing of personnel transaction and will provide Maj. Leewright commanders and administrators with a variable

capacity to inquire and obtain personnel data.

Present plans call for the installation of the Burrough 3500 Computer at data automation which will service us and two other undergraduate pilot training bases. All personnel data necessary for the proper management of personnel at this level will be recorded in this computer. By using standard programs we will be able to process data, produce output products and suspense personnel actions. All data maintained will be updated as changes occur using remote devices located in the various personnel shops. These devices will also be used to inquire against individual records for information which will be typed immediately, in clear text, on the same device. Other standard and special reports, lengthly or summary screenings, and/or inquiry results and other formatted reports will be requested, using these remote devices and will be produced on an overnight basis.



Before a person takes on any additional debts or payments, he should add up his fixed expenses to be sure that he doesn't overload his budget with more installment payments than it can stand. It is better to wait and save enough money to make the purchase, or use a charge account on which there is no carrying charge, than to acquire additional time payments.

The penalties for military men and women who can't pay their debts or who deliberately default on a contracted debt may be more severe than they are for the general public. This is especially true in the case of career personnel, for failure to pay just debts is a military offense and could lead to disciplinary action

If you plan to purchase something new on credit this springthink-for when a man in service becomes a poor credit risk it can damage his entire career; he may not get the security clearance or the assignment he needs for a job leading to promotion. And in the end, the man who overextends his credit winds up with fewer of the material things in life which he and his family want.

After making his installment his credit unwisely discovers he doesn't have enough left over to pay the rent-much less the groceries the family needs.

Worst of all, the man too deepstroyed and even his marriage can be soured by financial woes.

Combat Needs Increase Pilot **Duty Rotation**

RANDOLPH AFB, Tex. (AFNS) -Southeast Asia requirements have resulted in an unprecedented rotation of pilots between aircraft systems, according to officials at the Air Force Military Personnel Center.

Personnel officials point out that this rotation serves two important Personnel goals. Involuntary second tours in SEA are delayed and pilot experience in different aspects of air operations is broadened.

Since fighter pilots represent the greatest numerical need in SEA, more returnees are "fighter pilots." They must be used to replace the "most eligible" pilots. Pilots who returned from the combat zone to a tactical unit several years ago may also find themselves going into other aircraft to release pilots for SEA duty.
