Bonds - A Key To Future Plans

Military men, whether they be officers or enlisted men, often think about the future in terms of what they are going to do when separation and retirement comes. Some of our dreams are realistically attainable, some are just myths, while others are feasible providing sufficient capital is available.

It often happens that when the serviceman is ready to separate, he has only limited funds-enough possibly to tide him over until a job can be found. He finds that the cottage on the lake or that new car he dreamed of is out of the question because he has limited savings and probably little assets to use as collateral for loan.

As you can see, savings is one key to our future plans. However, we all know that saving money is not the easiest habit to acquire. One of the easiest and most beneficial ways I know to provide savings is to take out an allotment to purchase U. S. Savings Bonds and/or Freedom Shares.

The Bond Allotment Plan gives us the privilege of buying higherinterest Freedom Shares in combination with E Bonds. This series of three articles will new system is a revision of the deal with the following aspects of entire promotion program and the WAPS program: Why WAPS?; -How does the new system operate and what factors are considered?-What are the effects of the system?

> To answer the question "Why WAPS?" we must first look into the background of the new system and see how it developed.

> A special Congressional subcommittee found that the criteria used by Air Force promotion boards could not be clearly and concisely explained under the present system, thus enabling each individual to determine his standing in relation to his contemporaries. Congress concluded that the system, in its present form, could not retain the confidence of the enlisted man.

With this in mind, the special subcommittee recommended that the Air Force revise its system to have weighted criteria used for promotion purposes. This weighted criteria for all enlisted grades, E-4 and above, would have certain established factors to which a specific number of points could be applied, determining an individual's promotion opportunity. The new Weighted Airman Promotion System will place a great deal of emphasis on test results in an individual's Air Force Specialty Code (AFSC). Periodic testing in a man's speciality (SKT), the Performance Fitness Examination (PEE) and the USAF Supervisory Examination for E-7s to E-8s will play major roles in the individual's promotion opportun-
