

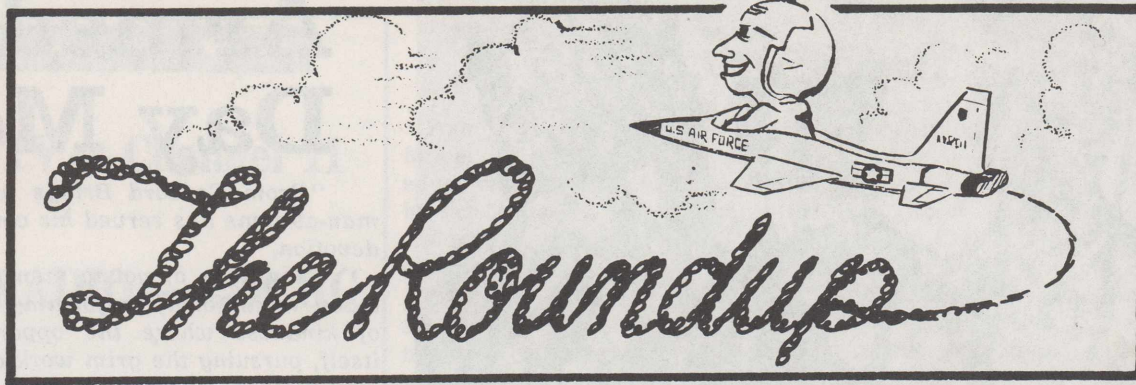

## Armed Forces Day Program Set For 11 A.M.

An estimated 10,000 persons are expected to visit Reese AFB tomorrow as the base holds open house in connection with the installation's 20th observance of Armed Forces Day.

The day was made official in Lubbock with the issuance of a proclamation by Lubbock Mayor W. D. Rogers Jr. during a City Council meeting May 8. (See color picture below.) In presenting the proclamation to Col. Clyde J. Morganti, wing commander, Mayor Rogers called attention to the long-standing friendship between Lubbock and the base and called on Lubbock citizens to support the day by visiting the base during the open house, set from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

### Luncheon Scheduled

Highlighting the day's activities will be two significant events, the base's traditional Armed Forces Day luncheon featuring Dr. C. L. Kay, assistant president of Lubbock Christian College, as principal speaker, and a groundbreaking ceremony for the base's new \$2 million hospital at 11:30 a.m. (See story column 2.)

For the general public, the open house will offer a record number of aircraft on display for an Armed Forces Day at Reese.

Featured will be a static display of aircraft including those of the Air Force, U.S. Army and U.S. Navy. Scheduled for display are the McDonnell-Douglas F-4 Phantom II, North American F-100 Super Sabre, the McDonnell-Douglas RF-101 Voodoo, Convair F-102 Delta Dagger, tentatively the Martin B-57 Canberra, Bell UH-1 Iroquois helicopter from the Army, Grumman F-9 Cougar and Lockheed S-2 Neptune from the Navy.

### Parasail Demonstration

Also scheduled for the observance is a parasail demonstration, M-16 demonstration at the small-arms range and flybys of Reese aircraft.

The observance will be concluded with a formal retreat ceremony at 5 p.m.

Project officer for the open house is Maj. Rudolph D. Rasmusson, assisted by Capt. Robert B. Cocke.

## Hospital Groundbreaking To Highlight Observance

Armed Forces Day festivities at Reese Air Force Base tomorrow, will provide the setting for groundbreaking ceremonies of the installation's new medical facility.

At 11:30 a.m. that day, Lubbock civic and business leaders as well as base dignitaries will meet north of Reese's present medical facility to break ground for the base's new \$2 million hospital building. In conjunction with groundbreaking, the base is expected to be honored with the presence of Rep. George H. Mahon, D-Tex., Lubbock Mayor W. D. "Dub" Rogers Jr., Dr. O. W. English, chairman of the Reese Relations Sub-committee,

Chamber of Commerce, and L. E. (Jack) Davis, chairman of the Armed Services Committee, and other area civic and business leaders.

At noon, activity will shift to the Reese Officers Open Mess where Col. Clyde J. Morganti, wing commander, will host an Armed Forces Day luncheon.

C. L. Kay, assistant president of Lubbock Christian College, is slated to be guest speaker at the luncheon.

Dr. Kay is well at home at the speaker's podium. He has delivered over 2,300 addresses on the principles of the American system of private enterprise, the nature of man, comparative economic systems, and the religious, historical and moral values that have contributed to our economic well being.

He holds a bachelor and master of arts degree from Eastern New Mexico University, Portales, N.M. He received a doctor of laws degree from Oklahoma Christian College, Oklahoma City, Okla., in 1967.

Dr. Kay, a native of Beavertown, Pa., is an active member of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and West Texas Chamber of Commerce, presently serving on two committees: Governmental Affairs and National Affairs

Committees. Dr. Kay is an honorary member of the Jaycees, Farmington, N.M.; the Optimist Club, Yuma, Ariz.; and the Southwest Rotary Club of Lubbock.

## Weighted Airmen Promotion System To Leave Greatest Factors Up To Individual

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a three-part series.)

We took a brief look last week into the topic "Why WAPS?" Now let's examine the all-important issue of, "How does the new system operate and what factors are to be considered?"

To gain a true perspective of what "weighted factors" in airman promotions means in terms of volume and workload, the scope of the task must be examined.

The Weighted Airman Promotion System will include airmen in grades of E-3 through E-8, a total population of approximately 660,000 individuals. Of this group, 38,000 will be eligible for promotion to grades E-8 and E-9 each promotion cycle. (One cycle per calendar years for these grades.)

A total of 380,000 airmen will be eligible for promotion to grades E-4 through E-7 each promotion cycle. (Two cycles per calendar year.)

According to the Air Training Command Personnel Programs directorate, WAPS has been deferred for E-8s and E-9s for one year. Therefore, promotion to these grades will remain as present with selections slated for this fall and promotions to be effective beginning in January 1970. The E-4 through E-7 cycle remains unchanged. This brings the eligibles for grades E-4 through E-9 to 418,000 on the first of each calendar year.

While WAPS will provide an objective evaluation of each eligible airman, it goes without saying that the individual really holds his future in his own hands. The heavy factors to be considered will be the ability of the individual to score high on the particular tests that he will take each year along with a good performance record as reflected by his Airman Performance Reports. Excellence in these areas can mean as much as 325 points out of a possible 450 for E-4s through E-7s. Time in grade and time in service will also receive consideration under the new program.

## Also Aided By Safety Briefing Good Drivers

How many times have you received your weekly safety briefing and the subject is driving safety? You sit back, close your eyes and think to yourself that you don't need this lecture because you're a good driver.

Thousands of good drivers are killed every year. Are you the person who drives a "souped up 427" and can't resist a good race on the highway? Or, to put it more bluntly, are you not man enough to say no to a childish challenge? Maybe you are the type of individual who likes to get "revenge" because another driver crowds rather close to you.

Car racing is one of the greatest sports, but it is for the race tracks and not public thoroughfares. On the track, a driver realizes there is a degree of risk involved through possible serious injury or death, but on public highways it is generally the innocent person who is involved.

The person who seeks revenge on the highway is not very smart. Usually, he loses his temper, his reasoning faculties — and sometimes his life.

Have you ever seen a serious accident, or come along just after one occurred? If not, you are lucky. This is a scene that is permanently stamped within your mind. Sooner or later all security policemen are dispatched to such a scene and it is not something that is easily forgotten.

The five or ten minutes you spend listening to the safety briefing just may save your life.

## Execute Power Of Attorney Only With Legal Assistance

low your wishes and protect your interests and those of your family. Since the buildup of personnel in Vietnam, many questions have arisen concerning power of attorney.

Service personnel who are overseas or on their way, are especially vulnerable.

A power of attorney is a legal document by which you give another person the power to act as your agent, either for some particular purpose or for the transaction of your business in general.

The power of attorney can be useful, especially while a person is overseas. But it must be realized that in the wrong hands it can be harmful. The agent who holds such power has — within the limits granted by it — full authority to deal with your property without consulting you. Power of attorney should be given only to a person whom you can trust without reservation to fol-

Check your situation carefully, for in many cases a power of attorney is not needed. Or it may be advisable for you to execute a limited or special power of attorney with authority to perform certain acts and no more. Finally, it is most desirable to limit the time of its operation. You should never execute a power of attorney until you have consulted with legal counsel.

The legal authority granted in a power of attorney is revoked by your death, the death of your agent, by any time limit set by the document itself, or by specific revocation. If it does not contain a time limit, it may be cancelled by destroying all signed copies or by written revocation. If it has been recorded in a public record, a revocation is always necessary.

# More Reese Suggestors Reap Monetary Awards

Four base personnel and one former Reesite were recommended for cash awards totaling \$1,045 by the Military-Civilian Incentive Awards Committee during the committee's meeting April 24.

Capt. Alan J. Davis, formerly assigned to Civil Engineering here and now assigned to Homestead AFB, Fla., was recommended a cash award of \$1,000 and a request for an additional \$400 from Air Training Command (ATC), for his suggestion, "Removal of Seismic Design for Reese AFB Facilities." The captain recommended that requirements for building foundations to withstand earthquakes be dropped for this base. The Air Force ac-

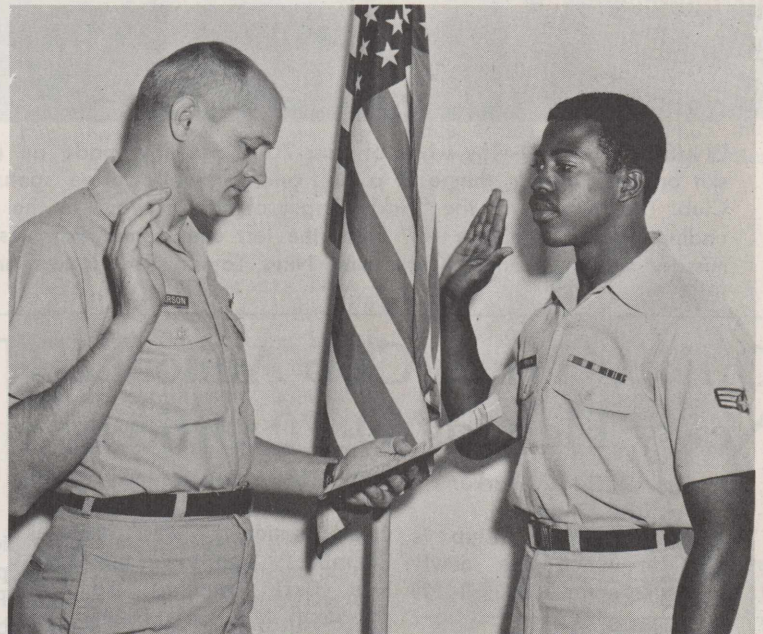
cepted the suggestion and it is expected to save \$353,370 in material on a one time basis for the base.

"Reuse of Carbon Paper from Carbon Form Sets," submitted by MSgt. Albert F. Wilson and Sgt. Joseph H. Nester, both in Personnel, was approved and a \$7.50 award recommended to each suggestor. The base is expected to realize an annual savings of \$122.40 in material.

A suggestion to eliminate countless reaccomplishments for the

Accounting and Finance Office, submitted by Wanda B. Clark, Accounting and Finance, was approved and a \$15 award recommended.

Clyde E. Merriott, Field Maintenance, was recommended a \$15 award for his suggestion, "Exhaust Temp. Harness Bolt Holding Jack." The tool is expected to afford an annual savings of \$165 in man hours and material for the base. The suggestion has been forwarded to ATC for further consideration.

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## ATC Announces Establishment Of Palace Cobra Control List

Air Training Command (ATC) structured Wednesday, with October and subsequent Palace Cobra selections being made under the revised procedure. Southeast Asia volunteer statements, Air Force Form 90, must be entered in the Uniform Officer Record and a copy on file at ATC headquarters before they can be considered.

Palace Cobra is a systematic withdrawal procedure for assignment of pilots to Southeast Asia (SEA). According to a letter signed by Col. Robert L. Bennett, deputy chief of staff, Personnel, Air Training Command, priority for consideration for SEA selection will be made in turn according to the instructor pilot's position on these lists. The list is being published in an effort to reduce instances of disappointment among the more vulnerable long term SEA volunteers.

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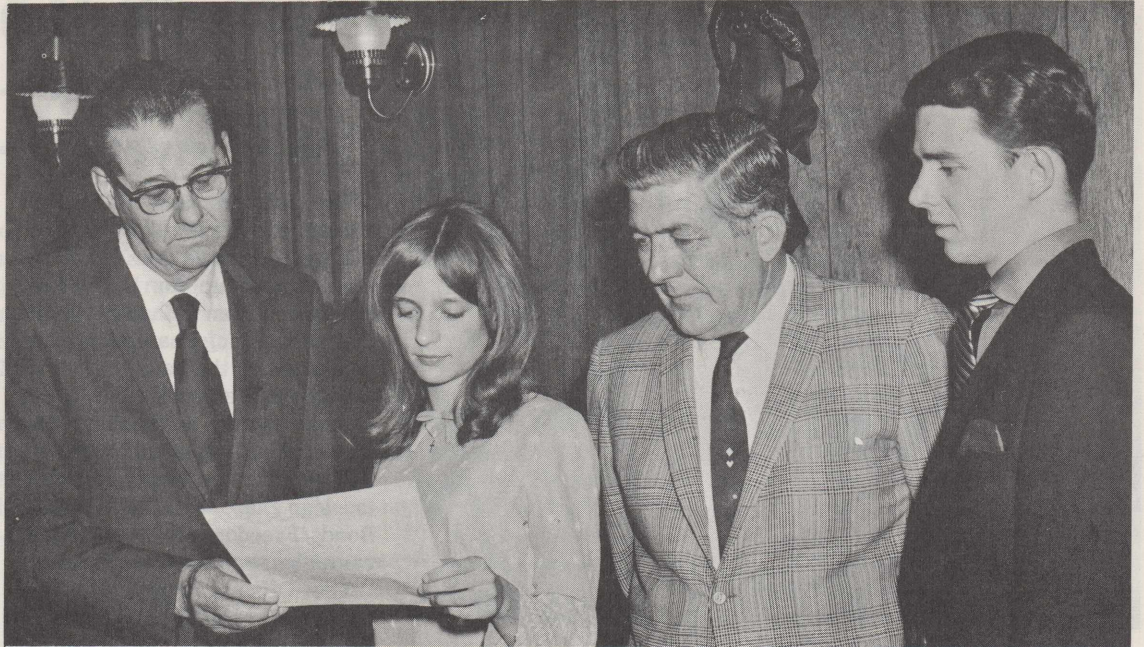
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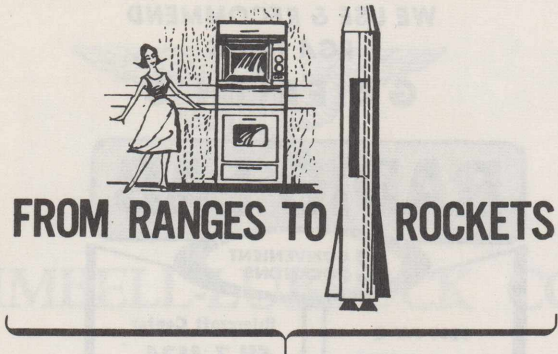

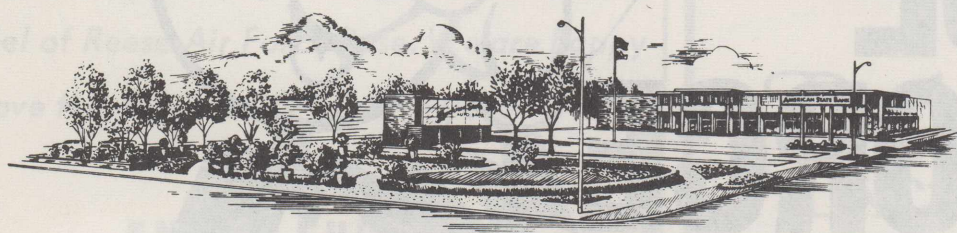
**NCO Open Mess**

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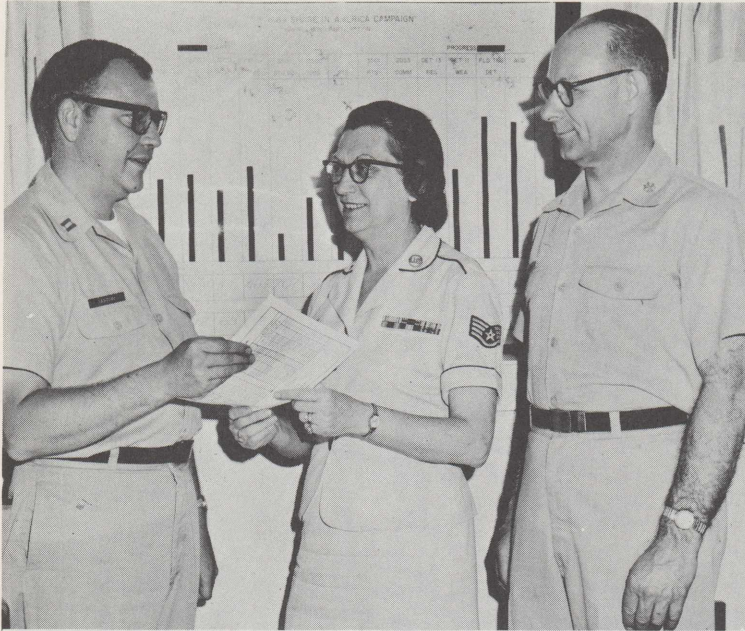

According to the Security Police, complete re-registration will be required when the new decals are distributed.

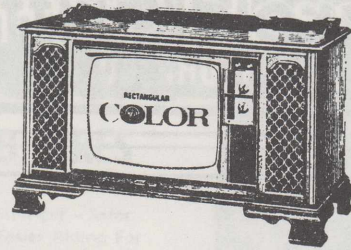
## Information Careers Open For Officers

# Chiefs Endorse Armed Forces Day Program

WASHINGTON (AFNS) —President Richard M. Nixon and Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird joined other ranking civilian and military leaders in endorsing observance of Armed Forces Day, May 17.

Since 1950, Armed Forces Day observances have demonstrated the unity and common purpose of the armed forces' role in fulfilling our national security objectives. The observances have been characterized by open houses, community - sponsored programs, and individual speaking engagements by Department of Defense uniformed and civilian personnel to report on the status of the armed forces.

Since 1966, Armed Forces Day has consisted of a national "Report to the Nation," made annually on the third Saturday in May. The theme is "Forces for Freedom."

President Nixon said: "Thousands of young men and women serve their nation today in uniform, performing countless acts of kindness where the opportunity affords itself, pursuing the grim work of battle where circumstances compel it. Each does honor to himself and to his country."

Secretary Laird added: "Throughout American history the men and women of the armed forces have always been ready to make any sacrifice to defend their country's freedom. Continuing that proud tradition today, some 3.4 million uniformed Americans serve the defense needs of the United States at home and overseas.

"It is fitting that Armed Forces Day has been set aside to honor the dedication of those men and women and their families. In return, the services on that day makes a special effort to report to the people of the Nation on their Forces for Freedom."

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## Credit Union May Drop Requirement For Car Coverage

Jack Browder, a member of the credit committee, has proposed to the Reese AFB Credit Union board of directors the elimination of the requirement for collision insurance coverage when lower grade airmen ask for loans to purchase used cars for less than \$400.

Browder said, "Liability insurance is required by the base and this costs a young airman as much as \$150 a year. Add to that \$125 to \$150 for collision insurance (the Credit Union requirement) and the insurance costs just about as much as the used car."

Browder added, "The cost of the car and the insurance raises the amount of the loan so high that it is prohibitive to the young airmen. Thus, the airman has to do without transportation.

"Dropping the requirement for collision insurance will enable many airmen to buy good used cars at a price they can afford. I have been a member of the credit union for the past 17 years and I know the financial responsibility of paying for a loan adds to a young airman's stature."

## Captain Passey In ATC Meet

Capt. Glenn T. Passey, Detachment 13, Western Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Center, will be at Sheppard AFB, Tex., next week to defend his title in the discus throw in the Air Training Command (ATC) Track and Field Championships that start Monday.

Captain Passey made last-minute arrangements that allowed him to participate in the championships that last year carried him to the very brink of the Olympics. After winning the ATC championship, Captain Passey went on to take the Air Force title, then the all-service title. 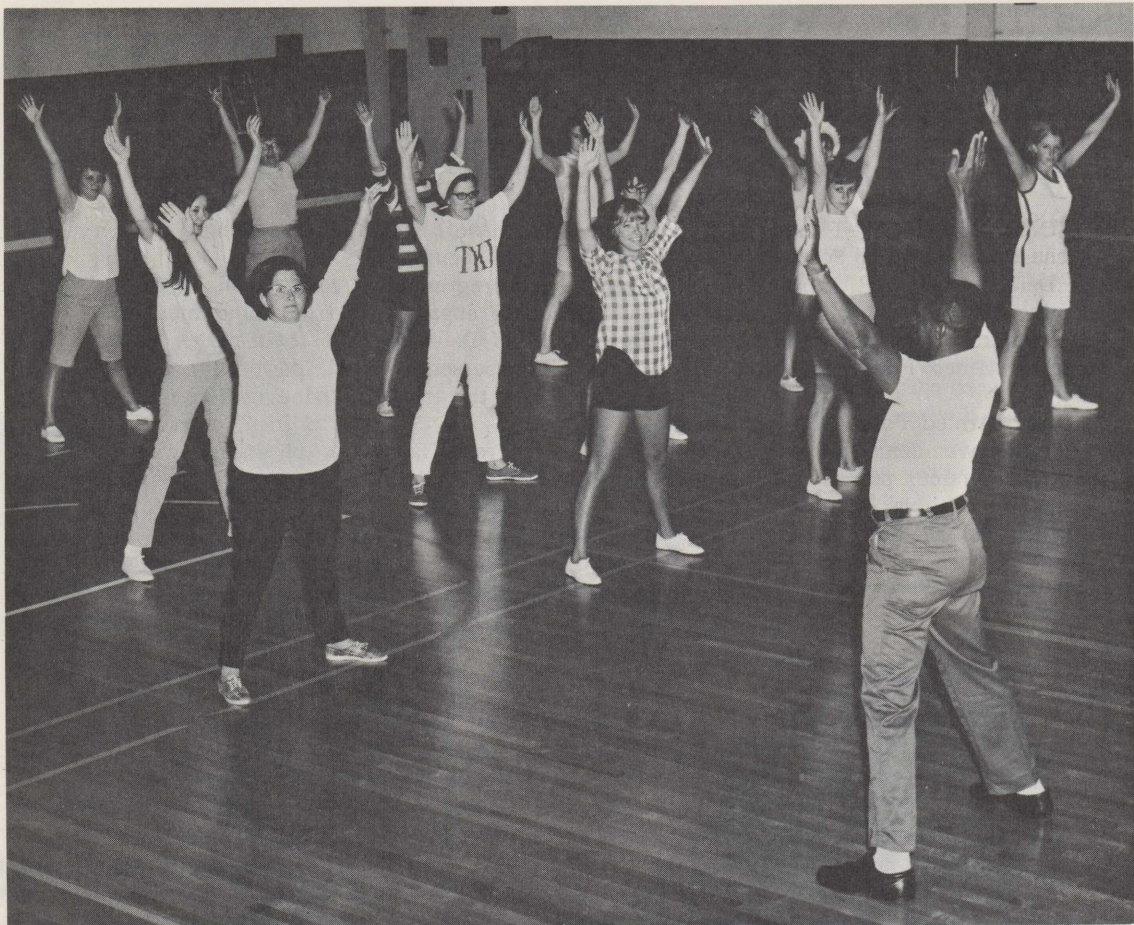

The five were among 28 Air Force Aero Clubs named by the FAA for safety honors.

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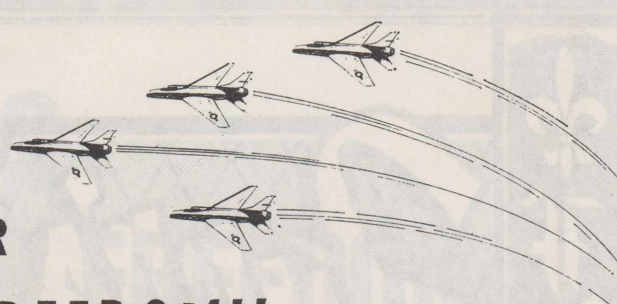
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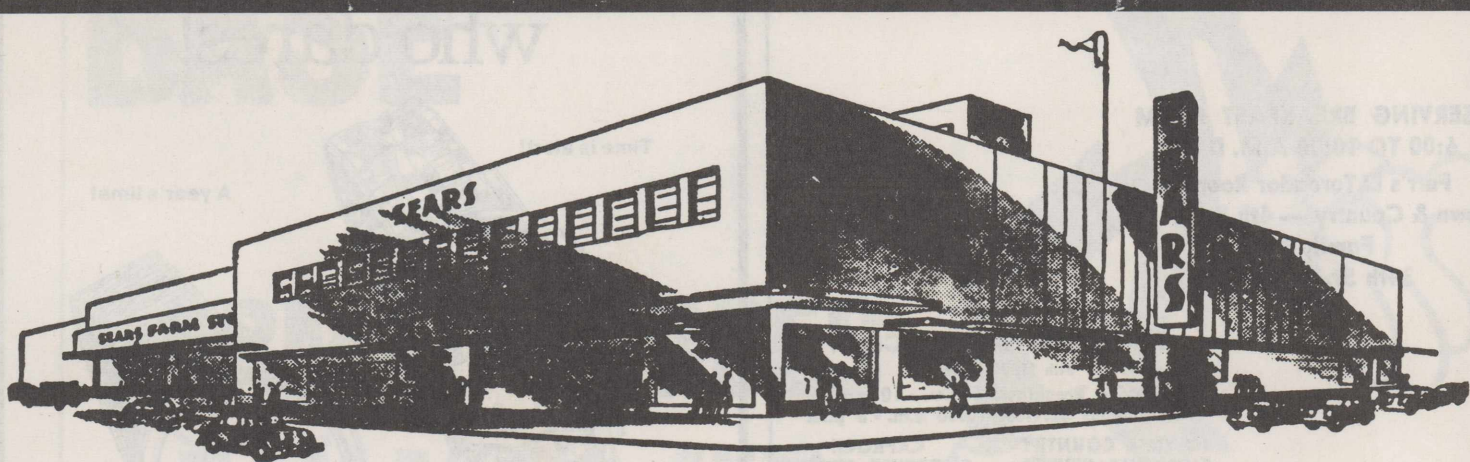
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## Bowling Meet Firmed Here

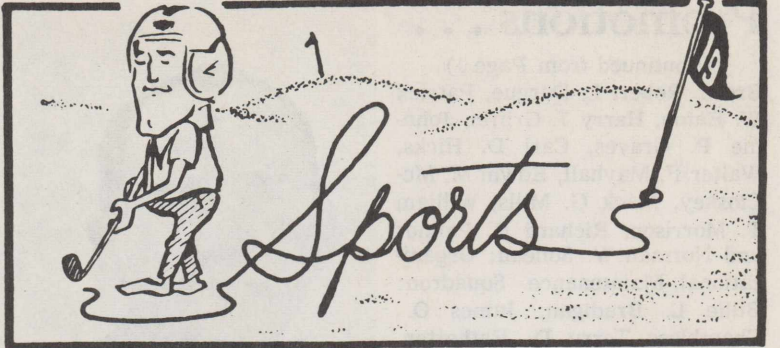
