The selection folders will be available beginning Tuesday through Sept. 5 in the special actions section of Personnel Division in Building T-1. The following schedule is suggested for personnel to review the folders: A through F, Tuesday; G through L, Wednesday; M through R, Thursday; S through Z, Sept. 5.

Selection folders are due at the U.S. Air Force Military Personnel Center Sept. 18 for senior master sergeants, Oct. 17 for chief master sergeants. The Airman Proficiency Report filing cutoff date is Oct. 1 for senior master sergeants, Oct. 31 for chief master sergeants.

The central board convenes for E-8s on Oct. 20 and is slated to last three weks. The board convenes for E-9s on Nov. 13 and is scheduled for 16 days. The selection release date is Dec. 17 for both senior grades with the beginning promotion date for each set for Jan. 1, 1970.


Higher Studies Scheduled For On-Base Course

Two graduate courses have been tentatively scheduled by the base education office in addition to undergraduate courses offered in the on-base college program this fall.

Actual registration for courses is slated to begin Tuesday, lasting through Sept. 17. Classes will begin Sept. 22 with final examinations due Dec. 10-11.

Schedules and descriptions of courses are available in the base education office, Building 815. Classes expected to be offered include accounting, economics, English, Spanish, German, government, history, French, mathematics, philosophy and sociology. Also, two graduate courses are scheduled: management decision making and marketing administration.

Let's Conserve Base Utilities

"Education makes people easy to lead, But difficult to drive, Easy to govern, But impossible to enslave."

-Lord Broughman.

I wonder how many readers of this article have recently seen the above quotation. It appeared on the latest utilities conservation brochure circulated to all units on base. The brochure goes further by asking life. everyone to, "Help the Utilities Conservation Committee identify and solve their problems."

The main objective of the Utilities Conservation Committee is to conserve HEW. In this instance HEW takes on a different meaning than

Col. Holtgrewe than what some of you may first deduce. What the committee strives to do is influcence everyone to stop wasting H-eat, E-lectricity, W-ater. Perhaps what is needed is more education to stimulate a more effective influence. If such be so, here are some educating facts you can cogitate on.

1. Last year Reese AFB spent over \$250,000 for HEW. Approximate costs last year were \$70,000 for heat (gas), \$146,000 for electricity and \$34,000 for water.

2. The water produced by base wells has a flourine content man." A moral curriculum is in hour man can ony be taught spiwhich far exceeds the optimum. Early in 1969, higher headquarters gave us permission to purchase our water from the city of Lubbock and granted additional funds to cover added costs. City water has a 0.8 part per thousand gallon flourine content which is the optimum. During the next fiscal year it will require an additional \$39,000 to purchase all our water from the city of Lubbock.

3. In July of this year the base consumed double the amount of water which had been budgeted for. Granted it has been a hot and dry summer. However, if we don't start conserving this resource now it may become imperative that strict rationing or other controls be imposed in the future.

4. Although residents in Reese Village don't receive a monthly utilities bill they do indirectly pay a share of utilities costs from

5. The water schedule for Reese Village provides a convenient choice of watering days. It is not necessary that you water lawns and shrubs each of the scheduled days. Watering every ten days will keep them alive - not necesarily green - but alive. Flower beds of course may require more frequent waterings.

6. There has been a \$1.5 billion cut in this year's defense budget. It is difficult for any of us to fully comprehend how many dollars that really is. Surely we would all agree that it is a formidable amount and a sizeable reduction in the defense bank account. With such a reduction, it should go without saying that when we have used what we now have there will be no place to go for more

The commander does not wish to harass the dwellers in Reese Village. Although increased watering abuses have been noted, every restraint has been made to avoid taking any official act of discipline against the abusers.

The quotation says that the educated cannot be enslaved, but they can be lead. The immediate problem then is one of education on conservation consciousness. Having done this, it now becomes a matter for individuals to develop an intelligent mood of cooperation and help conserve all of our utilities.

The deployed ATC teams will remain at Keesler for approximately two weeks, command Civi Engineering officials said.

Mrs. Vickie Eichmeier, co-chairman of volunteers at Reese, would like to see about 50 more vounteers attend the next orientation to be held Sept. 11 from 9:30 a.m. until about 2:30 p.m., in Ward 5 of the hospital. The orientation will include lunch and a tour of the hospital. Once a volunteer has attended an orientation, she is eligible to work in any military hospital.

Red Cross volunteers perform a variety of duties depending on the section they work in. Each unit has a chairman who handles scheduling, and if a volunteer desires to change to a different clinic, she has ony to coordinate it with the unit chairmen. Volunteers can choose where they work and can change until they find one in which they feel they can best help. "If we expect volunteers to make patients feel comfortable and at ease," Mrs. Eichmeier says, "it is essential to see that the volunteers are happy".

Critical Units Listed

Units in which volunteers assist at Reese include Ward I, family clinic, pharmacy, records, OB-GYN, X-ray, pediatrics, dental, veterinarian, laboratory and field office.

Jobs performed in each unit vary from administrative duties of typing and filing, to chaperoning during examinations, to weighing and measuring babies, and many more. In the dental clinic, volunteer work can provide the training necessary to become a quaified dental assistant.


