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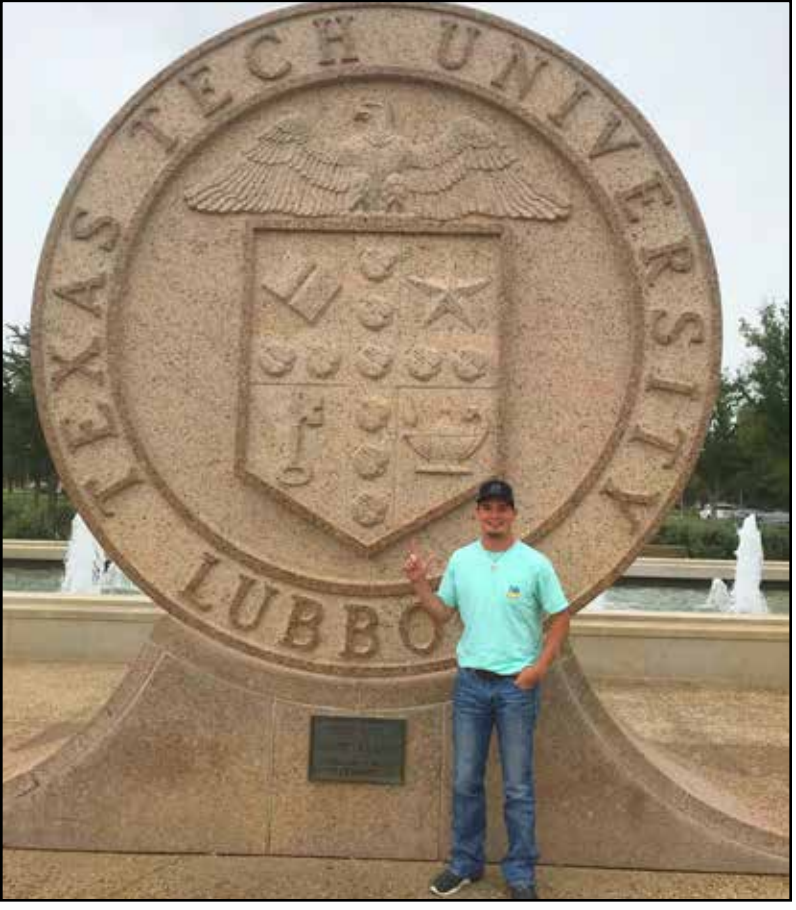

CISD going for gold Oct. 26

Bulldog fans are always proud to don the red and white but for one day in October Coahoma is going gold to bring awareness to childhood cancer.

The Coahoma High School theater department will host a community assembly at 11 a.m. Wednesday in the high school auditorium to kick-off Gold Out.

"The theater students are going to do a very touching production to show what children endure when they go through cancer and chemo," said Kristen Joslin, CISD CTE/Instructional Tech Director and theatre teacher. "Coach (Chris) Joslin (CISD head football coach and athletic director) will talk a little about what this is, how this came to be, and about Gunner and the Millers."

Coahoma ISD is joining a growing movement started by two mothers - Angel Miller and Kelly Pickel - to raise funds for children's



cancer research.

Chris and Kristen Joslin personally know Jeff and Angel Miller along with their son Gunner, who was diagnosed with an aggressive form of bone cancer when he was a high school freshman. It's why they are bringing the event to West Texas.

Until joining Coahoma ISD this year, Chris Joslin worked for Jeff Miller, the head football coach and athletic director for Rockdale High School.

"Gunner's father, Jeff, hired Chris for his first coaching job back 16 years ago at Jacksboro," explained Kristen Joslin. "Gunner and our oldest daughter are the same age."

Kristen Joslin described Gunner as a phenomenal athlete. In his freshman year, he was the up-and-coming quarterback for the Rockdale Tigers, played on the varsity baseball

so Tuesday night - that's one of two issues designated for public hearings at the Planning and Zoning Commission's meeting scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Tuesday in the City Council Chambers, 307 E. Fourth St.

The Public Hearing is in regard to a proposed zoning change from "Neighborhood

Service" to "Light Commercial" on 0.23 acres located southwest of the Wasson/FM700 intersection. The legal designation of the land is Block 1, Lot 14 in the Thorp Subdivision.

If the zoning change is approved, the plan is to place

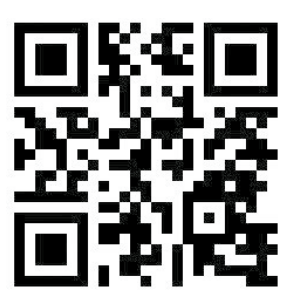

BIG SPRING – The Big Spring Heritage Museum is hosting a poetry reading/book signing party for local organic farmer, author and poet Eric Herm. The event takes place Saturday, October 27, 2018 at 6pm.

Herm's new book of poetry "I am the Tumbleweed" details his daily observations of life, death and rebirth on the rolling plains of West Texas through the form of tumbleweeds, scissor tails, coyotes, cotton crops, drought, rain, heat, cold, and fire. Herm writes, "The horizon swallows me whole, spits me out clean and naked. Unashamed, I smile. Un-wavered, I stand to greet the morning sun like it's the last dawn I'll ever see again."

Born and raised near Ackerly, Texas, Herm is a fourth-generation farmer and author of two previously published books: "Son of a Farmer, Child of the Earth" and "Surviving Ourselves." Herm has promoted a

healthier form of agriculture for over a decade through his writings, political activism and public speaking.

He and his wife, Jennie, are the co-founders and owners of Allred Farms. They have begun making home goods out of their non-GMO cotton grown right here in Howard County, Texas. The couple drove their cotton to North Carolina, where it was spun into various styles and colors of denim. The Herms have items such as pillows, quilts, pot holders, napkins, and much more on the way. A few of these items will be raffled off during the event to help raise money for the Heritage Museum. A portion of all book sales also go to the Heritage Museum.

team, and was competitive in track and field events. Then during track season, Gunner began to feel severe pain in his schin. After tests and a visit to the doctor, the all-around athlete was diagnosed with Ewing sarcoma, an aggressive form of bone cancer.

The news meant an end to this high school football playing days but not an end to his football career. Instead of leading his team on the field, Gunner served as student coach for the Tiger's special teams. He was on the sidelines when the Rockdale Tigers won the 2017 3-A State Football Championship.

In fact, it was Gunner who snapped the final

play of the game at his teammates request.

"It was a really special time for the community as a whole," Kristen Joslin recalled. "He has been so brave. After graduating in May, his cadaver bone broke. He was supposed to attend Texas Tech this year. Coach (Kliff) Kingsberry (head football coach for the Texas Tech Red Raiders) had a spot for him to do some student coaching but now he is going to be home recovering. We hope he can go back next semester. He has fought like crazy. His scans have been looking good and he is on his way to recovery until they can get that bone stable and fixed."

To honor Gunner and all youth who are fighting to survive cancer, Coahoma ISD will be raising money for the next two weeks to do-

nate to children's cancer research facilities.

Gold Out shirts will be sold for \$10 a piece of which \$3 will go towards the cost of the shirt and \$7 will be donated directly to a children's cancer research facility. This year's shirt is black with neon gold lettering.

"You can go to our Facebook site or our CISD website to find information on ordering shirts," Kristen Joslin said. "People can come into the office and purchase shirts. We will be sending order forms home with the students, and we will also be selling them at the Abernathy game and during the Stanton."

Bulldog fans are encouraged to wear the Gold Out T-shirts for the Coahoma/Stanton varsity football game set for Oct. 26, in Stanton.

creatures of the night. They don't take Halloween lightly and don't stop giving away candy until the stroke of midnight.

Johnson has been setting up Halloween displays for the public's enjoyment in addition to giving out pounds of candy to trick or treaters since 2004, and every year it seems to grow.

"We started in 2004 at our old shop by the base," said Johnson. "In 2013 we bought this location, and it just got bigger and bigger."

Just a few of the decorations you can see sitting in the front yard of Paul's Custom PC's are skeletons blowing in the wind, a witch to greet those who come to the store, blown up pumpkins, a giant spider and more. At night it turns into another world as several of the Halloween decorations light up.

"We don't do this for ourselves or the business," said Johnson. "This is nothing but for the public's benefit. We do it for almost every holiday, Valentines, 4th of July, and especially during Christmas, which is our biggest spectacle. We even set up public seats at no charge for those who want a front row view of the Christmas parade."

Johnson's Holiday-enthused, giving heart doesn't stop there. This year, he has 200 pounds of candy to give away to those in costume, and has people on stand by so he can stay fully stocked with sweet treats until midnight.

"We give away to any age in a costume. It doesn't matter if you're a baby, teenagers, mom and dads or grandmas and grandpas. We even have dog treat for the dogs!" said Johnson.

Johnson sets up a booth on Halloween in the front yard at Paul's Custom PC's, surrounded by his Halloween décor, and stays open until midnight, so that way everyone gets a chance to attend the other Trick or Treating events and Halloween functions that close early without the trick or treaters having to rush or skip other obligations. All will still get their chance for their small fortune of candy.

Federal report criticizes tactics used in fatal Texas blaze

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A report by a federal agency says some of the tactics used by the San Antonio fire department to battle a shopping center blaze last year that killed one firefighter made conditions worse inside the structure.

The San Antonio Express-News reports the review by the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health found the fire department failed to safely search the building and keep track of fellow rescuers.

Firefighter Scott Deem died in May 2017 after being sent to look for trapped civilians inside what turned out to be an empty gym. Two other firefighters were injured.

In a statement made before the report's Thursday release, Fire Chief Charles Hood says the recommendations "were accurate and fair."

The federal review mirrored conclusions by the State Fire Marshal's Office.

Prison worker sentenced for defrauding inmate families

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) — A Southeast Texas woman has been sentenced to two years in prison for her role in a scheme in which the families of federal inmates were defrauded of more than \$4 million.

Tanya Richard was sentenced Friday during a court hearing in Beaumont after previously pleading guilty to conspiracy to commit wire fraud.

Prosecutors say the 43-year-old Richard — a federal prison employee — took part in a nationwide scheme in which inmate families paid millions of dollars for reductions in their relatives' sentences.

The scheme falsely claimed the money would be used to pay for undercover drug transactions, with the inmates then being allowed to ask for reductions for helping authorities.

Prosecutors say the money was instead used for the personal benefit of Richard and others behind the scheme.

2 injured after small plane crashes in Midland parking lot

MIDLAND, Texas (AP) — Two people suffered minor injuries after the small plane they were in crashed in a West Texas parking lot.

The fixed wing small aircraft crashed in an office complex parking lot in Midland Friday morning shortly after it had taken off.

The plane landed on top of a truck in the parking lot. No one on the ground was injured.

Midland officials say the pilot and a passenger aboard the small plane sustained minor injuries and were not hospitalized.

The Federal Aviation Administration is investigating the cause of the crash.

Officials finish clearing Houston Waterways after Harvey

HOUSTON (AP) — More than a year after Hurricane Harvey's destructive flooding, officials say they've finished removing downed trees and other storm debris that had blocked the Houston-area's 22 watersheds.

The Harris County Flood Control District said Friday that it's removed about 40,000 tons (36,290 metric tons) of debris since Harvey flooded Houston in August 2017.

The flood control district has spent \$8.9 million on the cleanup.

Debris that's been removed has included refrigerators and other large objects, as well as six automobiles.

The agency says it used special storm debris contractors and in-house debris removal crews to complete the sweep of the county's watersheds.

Harvey and the devastating rain that followed caused an estimated \$125 billion in damage statewide and flooded thousands of homes in the Houston area.

George H.W. Bush returns to Texas after summer in Maine

HOUSTON (AP) — Former President George H.W. Bush is back in Texas after spending the summer in Maine.

Spokesman Jim McGrath said in a tweet Bush returned Friday to Houston.

The nation's 41st president spends his summers at his family's home in Kennebunkport, Maine.

McGrath said Bush is looking forward to supporting the Houston Astros, who are playing in the AL Championship Series, and eating some Tex-Mex food.

Bush went to Maine a little over a month after the funeral of his 92-year-old wife, former first lady Barbara Bush. She died April 17 at their Houston home.

While in Maine, Bush attended the wedding of his granddaughter Barbara and celebrated his 94th birthday.

Bush also spent more than a week in a Maine hospital for treatment of low blood pressure and fatigue.

Official: Searchers find body in hurricane-stricken town

MEXICO BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Search and rescue teams have found a body in the Florida Panhandle town nearly wiped out by Hurricane Michael, and authorities said there is little doubt the death toll will rise further.

Traffic lights remained out Saturday, with police directing traffic at intersections, and lines at the few gas stations that were open were five to six cars deep.

The tally of lives lost across the South stood at 14, including the victim found in the rubble of Mexico Beach. Authorities said there is little doubt that number will rise further.

Miami Fire Chief Joseph Zahralban, leader of a search-and-rescue unit that entered the devastated community, said: "We have one confirmed deceased and are working to determine if there are others."

Zahralban said searchers, who were using a trained dog, were trying to determine if that person had been alone or was part of a family.

He spoke Friday as his team was winding down its two-day search of Mexico Beach, the town of about 1,000 people that was nearly obliterated by Michael's storm surge and devastating 155 mph (249 kph) winds when the Category 4 hurricane made landfall Wednesday.

Michael was one of the most powerful hurricanes to ever make landfall in the U.S., and this Gulf Coast community of about 1,000 people was in its bullseye. While most residents fled ahead of the storm's arrival, others stayed to face the hurricane. Some barely escaped with their lives as homes were pushed off their foundations and whole neighborhoods became submerged.

Hector Morales, a 57-year-old restaurant cook, never even thought of evacuating. His mobile home wasn't on the beach but when it suddenly began floating during the hurricane, he jumped out and swam to a fishing boat and clambered aboard.

"I lost everything," Morales said. "But I made it."

How many others were not so fortunate was still not clear. State officials said that by one count, 285 people in Mexico Beach defied mandatory evacuation orders and stayed behind.

Emergency officials said they had completed an initial "hasty search" of the devastation, looking for the living or the dead, and had begun more careful inspections of thousands of ruined buildings. They hope to complete those inspections later Saturday.

They've received thousands of calls asking about missing people, but with cellphone service out across a wide area, they found it impossible to know who

among those unaccounted for were safe but just unable to dial out to friends or family.

Meanwhile, Federal Emergency Management Agency chief Brock Long said he expects the death toll will rise.

"We still haven't gotten into the hardest-hit areas," he said, adding with frustration: "Very few people live to tell what it's like to experience storm surge, and unfortunately in this country we seem to not learn the lesson."

Albert Blackwell, 65, was preparing Saturday to cover holes in the roof of his apartment and take a chainsaw to trees that fell and broke his windows just outside Panama City.

"I'm the idiot that rode it out here in this place," he said, sweat dripping from his face.

A team of firefighters came through Saturday to check on Blackwell and his neighbors, as well as the structural stability of their damaged homes.

"They're doing a good job," Blackwell said. "The fire chief was here earlier. The police department has come."

He figured rebuilding his home will take months. But for now he doesn't plan to leave.

"The immediate day after (landfall), I stopped looters from coming in here," he said. "We're staying to protect our place."

Authorities have set up distribution centers to dole out food and water to victims, who just were coming to grips with the brutal realities of their situation.



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Cowboys put focus on road woes after routing Jags at home

ARLINGTON, Texas — Ezekiel Elliott had a quiet 100-yard game by his standards in the Dallas Cowboys' rout of the Jacksonville Jaguars.

The star running back spoke the loudest after the 40-7 win on the home-road discrepancy for a .500 team that's perfect at AT&T Stadium and winless with three mostly anemic offensive showings on the road.

Up next before Dallas' open week: a trip to NFC East-leading Washington (3-2), a half-game ahead of the Cowboys and defending Super Bowl champion Philadelphia, tied at 3-3.

"Obviously it's something we can do, but we need to do it," Elliott, emphasizing "need," said Sunday after rushing for 106 yards and a touchdown. "If we keep not winning on the road, we're not going to make the playoffs."

Dallas has three touchdowns on the road — one in each game. The Cowboys are averaging nearly 100 yards per game more at home than on the road, and the numbers are particularly stark in the first half.

At home, the Cowboys have a 210-125 edge in yardage before halftime

compared to a 221-103 deficit at the break on the road. It's not exactly the formula for taking a crowd out of the game.

"We've been a good road team in the past," coach Jason Garrett said. "We have a young team. We have to understand how to handle the conditions on the road."

After some pregame pumping up for Dallas from UFC star Conor McGregor, Cole Beasley had his first two touchdown catches of the season against the Jaguars.

Dak Prescott threw for 151 of his 183 yards before halftime and had 82 yards rushing, the second-best total for a quarterback in franchise history behind Roger Staubach's 90 yards in 1971.

Prescott had two other career numbers: his longest run, a 28-yarder after escaping a sack, and his longest scoring run — from 17 yards after a fake to Elliott for Dallas' first TD.

The 2016 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year didn't have to throw in the second half, so the team's 30th-ranked passing game coming in couldn't really be judged by another sub-200-yard game.

HOUSTON — Deshaun Watson and the Houston Texans got their third straight win on Sunday.

But it came with a price as the already-banged up quarterback took 19 more hits in the 20-13 victory over the Buffalo Bills.

Watson was sacked seven times and took 12 other hits from the Bills. The second-year player, questionable this week with a chest injury, was slow to get up several times and didn't seem to be moving as well as he normally does.

Houston coach Bill O'Brien was asked about the performance of the offensive line and what the group can do to improve.

"I don't know, I really don't," he said. "I think we've got to go back and figure it out ... it starts with me. So, we just have to keep grinding to figure it out, figure out how to get better."

Watson brushed off questions about his health, saying he didn't "want to make any excuses," but his teammates acknowledged the injury and said it made them want to do more to help him.

"When you've got a guy that sacrifices everything when he's hurt, everybody around him better do the same thing, especially if it's your quarterback," defensive end Jadeveon Clowney said. "I think everybody put that on their shoulders this week and just tried to give it all up for him."

Watson was 15 of 25 for 177 yards with a touchdown and two interceptions. He also lost a fumble. He's been sacked 25 times this season and taken 66 other hits behind a line that was supposed to be improved this year.

O'Brien was certainly happy with the win, but knows his team must improve on offense if it hopes to compete with Jacksonville next week.

Mahomes almost rallies Chiefs to win at New England

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Patrick Mahomes has been so good this season it's easy to forget he is still learning his way around the NFL.

He was handed another lesson on Sunday night.

Mahomes passed for 352 yards and four touchdowns, but he also threw two first-half interceptions that proved to be quite costly when the Kansas City Chiefs lost 43-40 to the New England Patriots on Stephen Gostkowski's 28-yard field goal as time expired.

The 23-year-old Mahomes was the toast of the NFL coming into the weekend, with Kansas City averaging 35 points during its 5-0 start. The 10th overall pick in the 2017 draft arrived in New England with 14 touchdown passes and just two interceptions.

One more victory, and Mahomes

would become just the sixth quarterback since 1970 to win each of his first seven starts.

It just didn't work out, not with Tom Brady directing New England's prolific attack.

The Chiefs trailed 24-9 at halftime after Mahomes was picked off twice, including Duron Harmon's first interception of the season in the end zone for a touchdown in the final seconds of the second quarter.

"Yeah, I missed some throws," Mahomes said. "That happens in this league but whenever you're playing good football teams, you can't miss those throws."

Mahomes returned to form in the second half, nearly rallying the Chiefs to a dramatic victory. He found Tyreek Hill for a 1-yard TD pass that made it 33-30 Kansas City with 8:38 left.

Price, Red Sox bounce back, beat Astros 7-5, tie ALCS 1-1

BOSTON — David Price went home a winner in a postseason start for the first time in his career.

That, he insisted, is all he ever cared about.

"This is bigger than David Price," he said on Sunday night. "This isn't about me. This is about the Boston Red Sox."

Price was good enough, the Red Sox relievers were even better, and Jackie Bradley Jr. delivered a go-ahead, three-run double off the Green Monster to lead Boston to a 7-5 victory over the Houston Astros and tie the AL Championship Series at one game apiece.

Price fell one out short of qualifying for the win, which would

have been his first in 11 postseason starts. But it was the first time his team had won a playoff game he started, snapping a record run of October futility.

"It's baby steps," said Price, who entered the night 0-9 in 10 career playoff starts. "I expect myself to be great in big moments, and I haven't done that thus far in my career. But I came here to win, period. I came here to win a World Series, and to do it multiple times. And that's what I'm about."

Game 3 is Tuesday in Houston, followed by two more at Minute Maid Park and a chance for the defending World Series champions to clinch a second straight AL pennant at home. Marwin Gonzalez homered for the Astros, who had won five

straight postseason games dating to Game 7 of the 2017 Series.

"We came here and won a game, and they played well tonight," Houston third baseman Alex Bregman said. "It's going to be a fun series, so we're looking forward to going back home."

Price was spotted a two-run lead in the first inning and then fell behind 4-2 before Bradley clanged one off the left-field wall that Gonzalez chased helplessly as it bounced back toward the infield.

Price left leading 5-4 with two on with two out in the fifth before Matt Barnes struck out Gonzalez to end the inning and then pitched a perfect sixth to earn the victory.

Back in 1933, the Franklin Bridge Club of Philadelphia staged its annual team-of-four club championship. It was no world-shaking event: The winners, even if their names could be recalled, would stir no excitement. But one hand played was of a remarkable nature.

The bidding by the North-South pairs varied a great deal at the different tables, but nearly all of them arrived at six hearts, certainly a reasonable undertaking. Whenever West led his singleton diamond, declarer invariably went down one.

The South hand progressed from table to table searching for a declarer who would make the slam, but it never encountered one. It was only in later analysis that the winning line of play was discovered.

Assume South wins the diamond lead with the ace, draws trumps and cashes the diamond king, learning that East has two diamond winners.

The outlook may seem hopeless, but let's say our heroic declarer next plays the A-2 of spades. When West follows low, South finesses the ten! This hurdle surmounted, declarer then leads dummy's king of clubs and, after East plays low, discards the king of spades on it!

These spectacular maneuvers lead to a very satisfying denouement. West can do no better than win the club with the ace, but whichever black suit he returns, the contract is firmly on ice. Dummy wins, and declarer disposes of his two diamond losers on the queen of clubs and queen of spades.

The hand demonstrates once again that ingenuity in bridge has no bounds. However, it would be a harsh critic who berated himself for missing the play shown, and, in fact, not one South cut his throat that night.

But the fact remains that in theory, every declarer should have adopted this method of play, since it offered the only real chance to make the contract.

 Today's Highlight in History:
 On Oct. 15, 1991, despite sexual harassment allegations by Anita Hill, the Senate narrowly confirmed the nomination of Clarence Thomas to the U.S. Supreme Court, 52-48.
 On this date:
 In 1783, the first manned balloon flight took place in Paris as Jean-Francois Pilatre de Rozier ascended in a basket attached to a tethered Montgolfier hot-air balloon, rising to about 75 feet.
 In 1860, 11-year-old Grace Bedell of Westfield, N.Y., wrote a letter to presidential candidate Abraham Lincoln, suggesting he could improve his appearance by growing a beard.
 In 1914, the Clayton Antitrust Act, which expanded on the Sherman Antitrust Act of 1890, was signed into law by President Woodrow Wilson.
 In 1917, Dutch exotic dancer Mata Hari (Margaretha ZelleGeertruida MacLeod), 41, convicted by a French military court of spying for the Germans, was executed by a firing squad outside Paris. (Maintaining her innocence to the end, Mata Hari refused a blindfold and blew a kiss to her executioners.)
 In 1928, the German dirigible Graf Zeppelin landed in Lakehurst, N.J., completing its first commercial flight across the Atlantic.
 In 1945, the former premier of Vichy France, Pierre Laval, was executed for treason.
 In 1946, Nazi war criminal Hermann Goering (GEH-reeng) fatally poisoned himself hours before he was to have been executed.
 In 1976, in the first debate of its kind between vice-presidential nominees, Democrat Walter F. Mondale and Republican Bob Dole faced off in Houston.
 In 1989, South African officials released eight prominent political prisoners, including Walter Sisulu.
 In 1997, British Royal Air Force pilot Andy Green twice drove a jet-powered car in the Nevada desert faster than the speed of sound, officially shattering the world's land-speed record. NASA's plutonium-powered Cassini spacecraft rocketed flawlessly toward Saturn.
 In 2001, Bethlehem Steel Corp. filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy.
 In 2003, eleven people were

killed when a Staten Island ferry slammed into a maintenance pier. (The ferry's pilot, who'd blacked out at the controls, later pleaded guilty to eleven counts of manslaughter.)
 Ten years ago: Republican John McCain repeatedly assailed Democrat Barack Obama's character and campaign positions on taxes, abortion and more in a debate at Hofstra University; Obama parried each accusation, and leveled a few of his own, saying "100 percent" of McCain's campaign ads were negative. The Philadelphia Phillies beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 5-1 to win the NL championship series 4-1 for its first pennant since 1993. Pop star Madonna and movie director Guy Ritchie announced they were divorcing after nearly eight years of marriage. Actress-singer Edie Adams died in Los Angeles at age 81. Longtime game show host Jack Narz died in Los Angeles at age 85.
 Five years ago: Abu Anas al-Libi, an alleged al-Qaida member who was snatched off the streets in Libya, pleaded not guilty in New York to bombing-related charges. President Barack Obama presented the Medal of Honor to William D. Swenson, a former Army captain whose heroic actions in a deadly Afghan battle were captured on video. The Boston Red Sox took a 2-1 lead in the AL championship series as they defeated the Detroit Tigers 1-0. The St. Louis Cardinals beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 4-2 for a 3-1 lead in the NL Championship series. Hans Riegel, 90, who turned little gold bears into a global candy juggernaut — Haribo's gummi bears — over a career that spanned seven decades, died in Bonn, Germany.
 One year ago: Actress and activist Alyssa Milano tweeted that women who had been sexually harassed or assaulted should write "Me too" as a status; within hours, tens of thousands had taken up the #MeToo hashtag (using a phrase that had been introduced 10 years earlier by social activist Tarana Burke.) Police in London investigated three new allegations of sexual assault against producer Harvey

Weinstein, all made by the same woman. Former San Francisco 49ers quarterback Colin Kaepernick filed a grievance against the NFL, alleging that he was still unsigned because of collusion by owners resulting from his protests during the national anthem.

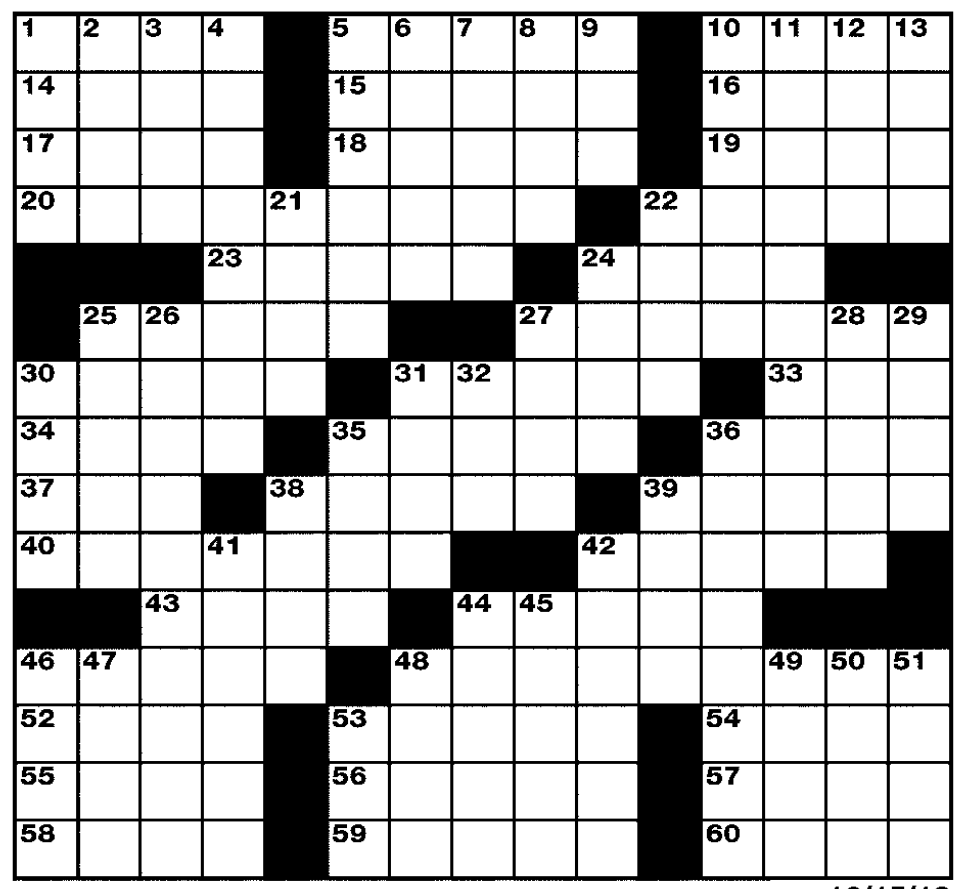

SOCCER

FRISCO, Texas (AP) — Tobin Heath and Alex Morgan each scored twice in the first half and United States earned a spot in the World Cup next summer in France with a 6-0 victory over Jamaica on Sunday in the CONCACAF qualifying tournament.

Heath's first came in the first two minutes of the match and she added a second in the 29th. Megan Rapinoe, Julie Ertz and Morgan also had first-half goals as the United States built a 5-0 lead.

Morgan's second goal was a penalty kick in the 84th minute.

The top-ranked United States is the defending champion of the sport's premier event, having won the final in the 2015 World Cup against Japan. It was the team's third World Cup

title.

Canada, ranked No. 5 in the world, also clinched a spot in France with a 7-0 victory over Panama in the earlier game Sunday at Toyota Stadium.

The top three finishers in the CONCACAF Women's Championship represent the region in France, so the winners of both semifinals earned a berth before the final. The title match and the third-place game are set for Wednesday in Frisco.

GENOA, Italy (AP) — Former Italy international Antonio Cassano has announced his retirement after training for less than a week with Virtus Entella.

Cassano says in a statement: "The day has come where you decide that it's really over. I have other priorities now."

Entella, based near Cassano's cur-

rent home in Genoa, announced a week ago that Cassano would begin training with the club "without any contractual obligation."

The 36-year-old Cassano last played for Sampdoria in May 2016. He signed with Hellas Verona before last season but left the club after two weeks, saying he missed his family.

Cassano scored 10 goals in 39 appearances for Italy. He was known almost as much for his passing wizardry and scoring abilities as for his temperamental behavior.

BASEBALL

BOSTON (AP) — The Boston Red Sox say ace left-hander Chris Sale has a stomach illness and will spend the night in the hospital.

The Red Sox made the announcement Sunday night in the seventh inning of Game 2 of the AL Champion-

ship Series against Houston.

Boston said Sale reported the illness earlier in the day and was admitted to Massachusetts General Hospital. He will be held overnight for observation.

The 29-year-old Sale struggled with his control in Boston's 7-2 loss to the Astros in the series opener Saturday night. He allowed two runs with four walks and a hit batter in four innings despite giving up just one hit.

NFL

Jim Taylor, the ferocious Hall of Fame fullback who embodied the Green Bay Packers' unstoppable ground game during the Vince Lombardi era and helped the team win four NFL titles and the first Super Bowl, died Saturday. He was 83.

Ryan Brasier pitched a scoreless inning and erstwhile starter Rick Porcello set the Astros down 1-2-3 in the eighth.

Closer Craig Kimbrel gave up Jose Altuve's RBI single with two outs in the ninth before Bregman launched a high fly to left that Andrew Benintendi caught a step in front of the Monster.

"I knew I missed it," Bregman said. "If I got it, it would have been on the street behind Fenway Park."

Gerrit Cole, who was so dominant in his Division Series start against Cleveland, gave up a double to Mookie Betts — the first batter of the game — as Boston sent eight batters to the plate in the first and scored twice.

The AL West champs tied it in the second on George Springer's two-run double down the right-field line. And when Gonzalez cleared the Monster — and the seats above them — with a two-run hom-

er in the third, it looked like Price was headed for another loss (he has won two postseason games in relief.)

But Boston, which won the AL East and a franchise-record 108 games, came back in the bottom half, starting with Xander Bogaerts' one-out single and then a double by Steve Pearce that sent Gonzalez crashing back-first into the metal scoreboard on the left-field wall. He fell to the warning track, but after the training staff and manger AJ Hinch went out to check on him he stayed in the game.

"The ball, the wall, he's back-pedaling. He's got to make a decision on whether or not to concede the wall and try to play it off the wall or try to make a catch," Hinch said. "It's a well-placed hit."

Cole walked Devers on four pitches to load the bases and struck out Ian Kinsler on three before Bradley lofted one down the left-field line and off the Monster. As the ball bounced back toward the infield, it hopped on the padding along the side wall, just out of Gonzalez's reach.

"Not really catching a break with it rolling on this awkward piece of padding all the way down was unfortunate," Cole said. "But you put yourself in that position."

Betts scored an insurance run in the seventh, walking to lead off the inning and coming around to make it 6-4 on a wild pitch and a pair of passed balls. He gave Boston a 7-4 lead with an RBI double in the eighth.

PRICE IS RIGHT
In all, Price was charged with four runs on five hits and four

walks, striking out four in 4 2/3 innings

Price's teams had lost all 10 of his previous postseason starts, the longest such losing streak in baseball history. He allowed three runs and got just five outs in Game 2 against the Yankees, the only Red Sox loss in the series.

As Price left the field on this night, the crowd rose to applaud the pitcher they booed off the mound in the Division Series, and he tapped the brim of his cap.

"It's definitely appreciated," Price said. "It wasn't the line I dreamed up to have tonight. But our offense, our defense, everybody rallied together."

SALE OUT

The Red Sox said Game 1 starter Chris Sale was hospitalized with a stomach illness but Cora said he was still hoping the he would join the team in Houston.

"He was feeling bad and he's at the hospital," Cora said. "From what I know, it's nothing serious. But obviously whenever you have to go to the hospital you've got to be 'worried.'"

Cora said it did not affect his performance in the series opener, which Houston won 7-2.

HOMER HAPPY

It was Houston's 14th straight postseason game with a homer, breaking the major league record that had been held by the Astros from 2001-04.

UP NEXT

Dallas Keuchel, who was 12-11 with a 3.74 ERA in the regular season, will start Game 3 for Houston. He allowed two runs in five innings in the Game 3 clincher against Cleveland.

With Porcello pitching in relief on Sunday, the Red Sox are expected to start Nathan Eovaldi on Tuesday. He was 6-7 with a 3.81 ERA in the regular season and allowed one run in five innings for the win against the Yankees in Game 3 of the ALDS — his first career postseason appearance.

Some things to know about Houston's win over Buffalo.

ALLEN'S HEALTH

Buffalo rookie quarterback Josh Allen's status for next week is uncertain after he left Sunday's game with an elbow injury. Coach Sean McDermott said after the loss that the Bills were still evaluating Allen's injury and he didn't have any more details on it. Allen did not speak to the media.

Allen was injured when Houston's Whitney Mercilus hit his right elbow with his helmet after Allen's pass.

Allen threw for 84 yards and ran for 20 before being replaced by Nathan Peterman. Peterman threw for 61 yards with a touchdown and two interceptions, including one that was returned 28 yards by Johnathan Joseph for a touchdown that put the Texans on top with 1:23 remaining.

Kareem Jackson intercepted him after that to seal Houston's win.

HAIRY TACKLE

Houston's Jadeveon Clowney dragged running back Chris Ivory down by one of his long dreadlocks for a 3-yard loss early in the fourth quarter. The cringe-worthy play made

Ivory's head snap back as Clowney clutched his hair for the tackle.

"I was supposed to set that edge, but I took it inside," Clowney said. "And if I go inside coach said: 'You better make that tackle.' So, I was trying to do whatever it takes to make that tackle. I tried to reach out and grab for his jersey and I pulled him by the hair."

Clowney said Ivory approached him after the play to ask him about it.

"He said: 'Come on man, why did you pull my hair?' and I said: 'Come on man, why you trying to run from me,'" Clowney said.

Clowney, who also has long dreadlocks, knows that being tackled like that had to hurt badly.

"I've been pulled by my hair a few times," he said. "They made it part of the uniform and if I can reach for him again I would."

THE "OLD GUYS"

Joseph is 34 and Jackson is 30, leading the young players on Houston's defense to joke that the "old men" were the stars of Sunday's game.

"I'm cool with that," Jackson said. "They can call us old all they want as long as we're going out there and flying around."

The two players are ranked first and second in career interceptions in franchise history.

Joseph took the lead with his 15th interception with the Texans on his touchdown return on Sunday, but Jackson regained the franchise lead when he grabbed his 16th one less than a minute after that.

With the Chiefs trailing 40-33, he connected with Hill again for a 75-yard score that tied the game with just over three minutes remaining.

Tight end Travis Kelce said Mahomes was more composed in the second half.

"He made some big (plays). He made a lot of big ones," Brady said. "The one at the end to Tyreek was a great throw, and he had some other great throws."

Mahomes was 23 for 36 in his franchise-record fifth straight game with 300 or more yards. But his second-half rebound wasn't enough to extend Kansas City's win streak.

Things to consider after the Jaguars (3-3) had season lows in total offense (204 yards) and yards rushing (65) while running just 47 plays to 72 for the Cowboys:

HOBBLED RUN GAME

Leonard Fournette's availability with a balky hamstring will remain one of the big topics for Jacksonville, which is on its third left tackle in Josh Walker while All-Pro left guard Andrew Norwell has been a disappointment as a big-money free agent.

The Jaguars want to run — they're 0-3 when they don't get to 20 carries. Four-time All-Pro Jamaal Charles, unsigned before joining the Jaguars this past week, got a taste with five carries for 5 yards and a 5-yard catch. His role going forward will be something to watch. Starter T.J. Yeldon had 41 yards on just eight carries.

"We're pretty banged up, but we've got guys that can play at any position," said quarterback Blake Bortles, who was 15 of 26 for 149 yards after establishing career highs in yards passing the previous two weeks. "We expect a lot out of everybody out there."

DALLAS D-LINE

The defensive front of the Cowboys is getting

close to full strength, and could need the help with top pass rusher DeMarcus Lawrence trying to play through a shoulder injury.

Defensive tackle David Irving made his season debut after serving a four-game suspension and missing his first possible game for personal reasons. He had an early pressure on Bortles.

End Randy Gregory had his first sack since returning from substance-abuse suspensions that sidelined him for 30 of 32 games over two seasons. Gregory had a team-high three QB hits. Tackle Maliek Collins returned after missing three games with a knee injury and had his second sack of the season.

"With that particular lineup, it's an unbelievable rush group," owner Jerry Jones said.

EARLY GOOSE EGGS

Jacksonville is in a three-way tie for first in the AFC South with one of those teams, Houston, visiting Sunday. A good place for the Jaguars to start would be to start faster. They were outscored a combined 44-0 in the first half of losses to Kansas City and Dallas. The Cowboys scored on all four first-

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half possessions against the NFL's No. 1 defense. "I'm going to figure it out, but it's my job to make sure that our team comes out and they're ready to play," coach Doug Marrone said.

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SPORTS

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He died unexpectedly at a hospital in his hometown of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, the team said.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Tennessee State linebacker Christian Abercrombie has been upgraded from critical to stable condition after sustaining a head injury Sept. 29.

University officials said Sunday night that the linebacker has been off a ventilator for over 24 hours and is breathing on his own.

The linebacker has been in the neurological intensive care unit at Vanderbilt University Medical Center since Sept. 29. Abercrombie went to the sideline during the first half of the Tigers' loss to Vanderbilt, told trainers he had a headache, then required oxygen on the sideline before being taken to the hospital with a head injury for emergency surgery.

The linebacker redshirted at Illinois in 2016 and played 11 games in 2017 before transferring to Tennessee State. He went into last week's game as the Tigers' second-leading tackler and was credited with five tackles and a quarterback hurry before being injured.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Southern California linebacker Porter Gustin will miss the rest of his senior season after fracturing his right ankle.

Coach Clay Helton said Sunday night that Gustin was hurt in the final moments of the Trojans' 31-20 victory over Colorado on Saturday night.

Gustin had made a strong return to USC's starting lineup this season after appearing in just four games last year,

missing the Pac-12 title game and the Cotton Bowl due to injuries.

He leads the Trojans with seven sacks and 10 tackles for loss, and he is their third-leading tackler overall. The rest of the defense has just six sacks combined.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Minnesota Gophers running back Shannon Brooks has been arrested on suspicion of misdemeanor domestic assault.

The Star Tribune reports the 22-year-old senior was arrested at about 1:30 a.m. Sunday in Minneapolis and was booked into the Hennepin County jail about an hour later.

Police spokeswoman Sgt. Darcy Horn says the arrest occurred on the same block near campus where Brooks lives.

It's unclear whether Brooks has an attorney who could comment on his behalf.

Head coach P.J. Fleck says he's not able to comment on the arrest.

BOWLING GREEN, Ohio (AP) — Bowling Green has fired coach Mike Jinks midway through his third season, with the Falcons winless against FBS competition.

Athletic director Bob Moosbrugger announced the move Sunday. Defensive coordinator Carl Pelini, the former head coach at Florida Atlantic, was named interim coach.

Jinks was 7-24 with Bowling Green and the team seemed to be sliding backward. The Falcons won four games in 2016, two last season and are 1-6 after falling 42-35 at home to Mid-American Conference rival Western Michigan on Saturday.

Bowling Green's only victory this season was against FCS-level Eastern Kentucky.

OLYMPICS

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Patrick Baumann, the secretary general of basketball's world governing body who was seen as a potential IOC president, has died at the Youth Olympics. He was 51.

Baumann "unexpectedly succumbed to a heart attack" in Buenos Aires despite getting immediate medical help, the International Basketball Federation (FIBA) said Sunday in a statement.

"Basketball has lost a leader, an advocate and a friend and our thoughts are with Patrick's wife and two children at this tragic time," the Switzerland based FIBA said.

Baumann was FIBA's top admin-

istrator for 15 years, and an International Olympic Committee member since 2007.

GYMNASTICS

Olympic champion Simone Biles is upset about an anti-Nike tweet from USA Gymnastics interim president and CEO Mary Bono.

Bono was appointed Friday to hold the position while USA Gymnastics searches for a permanent successor to Kerry Perry, who resigned under pressure from the United States Olympic Committee in September after spending nine months on the job.

Biles responded Saturday to a tweet from Bono last month criticizing Nike following the release of its advertising campaign featuring former NFL quarterback Colin Kaepernick. Bono, a former Republican congresswoman, had posted a photo of herself drawing over a Nike logo on a golf shoe.

Biles quote-tweeted Bono's photo and wrote: "(asterisk)mouth drop(asterisk) don't worry, it's not like we needed a smarter usa gymnastics president or any sponsors or anything."

Bono deleted her tweet about five hours later, saying she regretted the post and respects "everyone's views & fundamental right to express them."

Nike is one of Biles' sponsors.

TENNIS

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Juan Martin del Potro has fractured his right patella bone in what the Argentine called "a hard blow that leaves me without strength."

Del Potro retired Thursday against Borna Coric at the Shanghai Masters after injuring his knee. Third-seeded Del Potro fell near the end of the first set. The U.S. Open finalist had the knee wrapped but called it quits after losing the first set 7-5.

Tests on Saturday showed the fracture, Del Potro's spokesman Jorge Viale tweeted Sunday.

BOXING

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Terence "Bud" Crawford stopped Jose Benavidez with 18 seconds left in the 12th and final round to retain his WBO welterweight championship on Saturday night.

Crawford had knocked Benavidez to the canvas with a powerful right hand with 46 seconds left, and then Crawford finished him off with consecutive right hands.

After referee Celestino Ruiz stopped the fight, Crawford stuck out his

tongue at his fallen opponent, who had made this a personal grudge match with insults he's directed toward Crawford for months.

Next up for Crawford could be a unification bout with IBF champion Errol Spence Jr., something promoter Bob Arum has said he would like to make happen sometime in 2019.

AUTO RACING

HOCKENHEIM, Germany (AP) — That's one more racing title for the Schumacher family.

Mick Schumacher, son of seven-time F1 champion Michael Schumacher, secured the Formula 3 European Championship title on the final weekend in front of a home crowd at Hockenheim.

The 19-year-old German finished second in the second race on Saturday to reach an insurmountable 347 points.

"It's a slightly unreal feeling, I'm absolutely delighted," Schumacher said. "All I can say is thank you to everyone in the team for your support during this incredible season."

Schumacher had eight wins on his way to the title in his second season with the PREMA Theodore Racing squad.

CORRUPTION

Kenyan distance-running great Kip Keino is one of seven suspects in a corruption investigation and has been ordered to report to police by the end of Monday to face charges of embezzlement and the misappropriation of more than \$545,000.

The two-time Olympic champion and honorary member of the International Olympic Committee is accused of playing a role in the misuse of money meant for Kenyan athletes at the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Olympics, when he was chairman of the Kenyan Olympic committee.

The money was part of more than \$5 million given to Keino's Olympic committee by the Kenyan government to fund Team Kenya in Rio.

But prosecutors allege Keino was at the head of an Olympic committee rife with corruption.

The 78-year-old Keino was one of seven former Olympic and government officials named as suspects in the investigation. Two other high-ranking former Kenyan Olympic committee officials were named, as was the former Kenyan minister of sport, Hassan Wario, and three ministry officials who worked under him.

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
