Memorial, Blankenship stadiums to receive flooring renovations

Have you ever attended a football game at Memorial Stadium or a track event at Blankenship Stadium, and worried about the creaky old wooden plank flooring? Worry no more.

At their meeting Thursday, the Big Spring Independent School District Board of Trustees voted unanimously to spend an estimated \$730,000 to rehabilitate the flooring and seating of both stadiums, including all-metal flooring.

"Both facilities still have a lot of the old wood planks in them. Where you sit is metal,

but everything else is made out of wood, which is kind of how they used to do it a long time ago in terms of building stadiums," said BSISD Superintendent Jay McWilliams. "We've always thought that's something that needs to be replaced if we had the opportunity to do it. We have the financial means now to do it because of the increased last year's property values."

McWilliams said wood will no longer be part of either stadium's stands.

"We're going to take all the wood in both facilities out," he said. "The company's going to come in and completely redo them, and when they are finished, both Blankenship and Memorial will be completely metal stands. They'll be a lot safer, a lot better for our fans, for visiting people. At Memorial and at Blankenship, they're going to add some paint to the risers. I don't remember the exact name, but it's kind of a galvanized black. It's baked, it's not painted on. Basically,

Tidwell promoted to Eagle Scout

The Eagle Scout rank is the highest rank that can be earned in the Boy Scouts of America. Most recent studies have found that of all boys that have participated in Scouting only 4 percent achieve this high honor. Additionally, it is reported that only 4 percent of boys will ever participate in Boy Scouts. Thus, at this time less than 0.20 percent of all boys will become Eagle Scouts. Reaching this level of achievement requires the development of character traits and skills which do not necessarily come naturally. These traits and skills include: determination, tenacity, leadership, citizenship, communication, persever-

ance and patience.

David Tidwell, an eighth grader at Forsan Junior High (Big Spring, Texas), completed all the necessary requirements and on October 24, 2018 was promoted to the rank of Eagle Scout. David is currently a member of Troop 1908 in Odessa, but in the past has been member of Troop 5/Pack 305 chartered by First Nazarene Church in Big Spring, and Pack 29 chartered by the Forsan Elementary Parent Teacher Association. He began in Scouting as a Tiger Cub when he was in the first grade and has remained active ever since. In the process, he earned the highest rank in Cub Scouting, the Arrow of

Beto O'Rourke still undecided as 2020 White House buzz grows

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — When it comes to a 2020 presidential run, Beto O'Rourke is still playing hard to get — even as the buzz around him intensifies. The three-term Democratic congressman murmured "No decision. No decision on that," when

pressed by an attendee during a town hall Friday in his native El Paso who playfully demanded: "You're going to run for president, right?" A onetime punk rocker, O'Rourke became a political star in national liberal circles, raised \$80-plus million and came within three percentage points of upsetting Re-

publican Sen. Ted Cruz to become the first Democrat to win statewide office in Texas in nearly a quarter century. The 46-year-old is giving up his House seat and has said he'll wait until he finishes his term Jan. 3 before making up his mind on 2020.

Amid his indecision, O'Rourke's name has continued to rise among top potential Democratic presidential candidates — even climbing to at or near the top in

some opinion polls.

Later asked at the town hall about the "immense pressure" the eventual Democratic presidential nominee competing with President Donald Trump and his combative campaigning style could face to refrain from going negative, O'Rourke said "interesting, speculative question."

"Whoever is running may very well be running against somebody who has not the slightest respect for our norms, our traditions, civility, dignity, decency and public life," O'Rourke said. "Where you can say anything that you

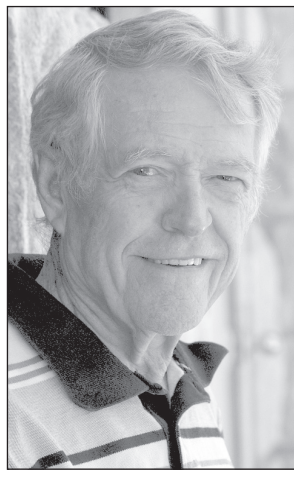
Watch where you step on slippery rocks

If I've learned one thing from this ordeal it's patience.

On October 13th I was at a friend's house near Junction looking at the Llano River flood damage. Water had been up near the house but had receded, making everything a muddy mess. The area has large uneven boulders. The bottoms of my tennis shoes had become wet and as I stepped on a slippery rock, I fell down, smashing my right foot hard against the ground. The instant it happened I knew I had done some damage. The pain was severe and went from my foot to my stomach. I limped back to the house just as supper was starting.

I wasn't all that hungry but got a bite of lasagna and a little salad. I was holding my right leg straight and someone wanted to know why I was doing that. When I explained what happened I was given a strong Tylenol. The occasion was a birthday party. During the reading of cards the pain increased and I went to a couch where I spent the rest of the evening. We went to our motel and had a sleepless night. I used the rolling chair

in the motel room to get to the car. We drove home and went immediately to the emergency room. The x-rays showed a broken metatarsal. The ER gave me some pain medicine. The next day I went to a podiatrist who

took his own x-rays and said he didn't like what he saw and suggested I go to a foot specialist. I had surgery on October 31st. The doctor said no weight on that foot for 90 days. I spent a week in a splint and am now in a cast. Later I get a boot that will come to my knee.

We had to cancel a high school reunion, an interview trip and a cruise from Barcelona to the Canary Islands. I have experienced very little pain since the surgery but have experienced much inconvenience. It's like I lost my freedom and independence. Thank goodness I can still work, though I'm wheelchair bound. My wife rolls me from place to place. She is a five star caregiver and nev-

er complains. If I want a stick of gum or some peanuts, she is quick to meet my every wish. I am one lucky man. I've always been an early riser. Now I wake up and instead of getting up, I lie there sometime for hours trying not to disturb her. I have a tool in my office I've wanted to take to the storage room but it's still there. Sometimes I want to check on something insignificant like hunt for a book or need something from across the room. I have to call Susan to get me over there. Most of the time don't ask, thinking it's not really important. Our office is separate from the house. On some rare occasions while she's in the house and I'm in the office the communication devices don't make contact and I sit quietly until she comes.

As soon as I told someone at that birthday party in Junction that I hurt my foot the hostess said, "That's your driving foot. I did the same thing and it took 4 months to heal." I immediately thought to myself I don't have time for this. Bu I do. I'm following doctor's orders because I want this thing to heal. Susan and I leave soon on an interview trip to Northeast and Southeast Texas. It'll be a special adventure.

About the time we put out to sea, the United States' 41st president was completing the final miles of life's journey, aboard a special train from a final funeral service in Houston to College Station for interment next to his beloved wife, Barbara.

Texas Highway 6, near the tracks on which the train slowly traversed, was a frequent topic. Some vacationers stopped in small towns along the way to pay respects as it rumbled through. Others purposely took different routes to the cruise port to avoid the congestion.

Conversations I overheard about this "people person" elicited smiles. Folks spoke positively, putting aside political labels. Many pointed to his being a patriotic American. Remembered were his "family values" and dry humor. And his seeming refusal to often take himself too seriously.

Topics included Dana Carvey's "wouldn't-be-prudent" TV impersonations, the president's dislike of broccoli and his endorsement of "crazy" socks that a young special needs guy introduced and now on the fast-track to favor.

One man wished to have been a "fly on the wall" during banter between "43" (when he was

vice president) and President Reagan. A story was resurrected about Bush's asking Reagan how his meeting had gone with Tutu (Desmond, the South African civil rights activist). "So-so," Reagan is said to have responded.

I'm happy to say that our granddaughter, Juliana Penney of Tyler, innocently made possible a positive laugh at our tables, where 24 friends dined. She had made it clear that she wanted no special attention at dinner about her reaching age 16.

Her parents, Kyle and Jana Penney, have long conducted "menu checks" for her and her brother Kedren, 12, both of whom have severe nut allergies. (Carnival professionals are ever alert to such situations, and carefully provide menu choices to be made one day in advance.)

Birthday observances, however, are the result of extractions from boarding records. Honorees get small cakes topped by single candles, delivered by servers singing joyfully. Juliana's server, perhaps realizing at the moment he thrust the cake toward her that it might not be "nut free," whispered, in broken English, "Don't eat cake, just blow out candle!" She "led the laughter," happy to be able to smile about an issue that usually is devoid of humor. She had her cake, and didn't eat it, too.

Come Sunday, our bunch gathered in the Winston lounge for "preachin' and singin'." An en-

trance sign invited visitors. Five joined us. Larry Martin, our church organist back home, provided piano music as we sang old hymns. Longtime Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary professor, Dr. Jimmie Nelson, preached, not once referencing Saturday's "first ever attempt at snorkeling."

He could easily have embellished, describing several minutes of observing schools of fish in the sparkling blue water. But he didn't. Before the service, he admitted he had his face underwater for a minute or two—that he saw one fish, not a school—and that it was "hand size," not the length of hands spread wide apart. Slowed by neuropathy, he has been preaching for more than 70 years. Dr. Nelson thrives on being ever-unpredictable. In the summer of his 90th year, he rode the zip line over Palo Duro Canyon. He's ever-determined to take on whatever comes next.

He is as committed to Christian service as Senator Bob Dole is to patriotism. That's saying a lot.

Many will never forget Dole's being lifted from his wheelchair-standing as upright as he could—to pay final respects at President Bush's coffin. Able to lift only his left arm for a final salute, he straightened gnarled fingers as much as he could.

Would that all of us make such efforts to pay homage to lives well-lived.

The library invites families and caregivers to come to Baby Time Tuesdays at 11 a.m. and Storytime Wednesdays at 10:15 a.m. We have also put up our holiday decorations and a couple of new displays which include new books, new audiobooks, and the Texas Bluebonnet award books.

This week's reviews include biography and fiction.

Less than twenty-four hours from each other, Carrie Fisher and her mother Debbie Reynolds, passed away in December 2016. In **"My Girls a Lifetime with Carrie and Debbie" (B FIS C)** by Todd Fisher, Todd pays homage to these two extraordinary women whose connection to each other proved so powerful not even death could separate them for long. The children of "America's Sweethearts" Debbie Reynolds and Eddie Fisher, Carrie and Todd grew up among the glamour, wealth and pretense of Hollywood.

He shares stories from that childhood-from dazzling parties to the MGM backlot- as he and Carrie learned to navigate life against the backdrop of Debbie's remarkable career. Speaking openly about Carrie's struggles he provides an honest look at some of their most challenging times together, illustrating the bonds that connected the three of them, even as they were tested time and time again. He examines the un-failing bravery that Carrie and Debbie each displayed as they dealt with their demons, how through it all, no amount of darkness ever diminished their humor, talent, or spirit. With thirty-two pages of never-before-seen photos and memorabilia from his family's private archives, Todd provides equal parts love letter and family portrait, a deeply felt journey through love, laughter, and life with Carrie and Debbie.

Ivan Rodriguez takes you through his life on and off the baseball diamond in **"They Call Me Pudge, My Life Playing the Game I Love" (B ROD I)** from when he first signed a contract as a boyish 16 year old from Puerto Rico through his 21-year career.

During his career Rodriguez earned

14 All-Star berths, 13 Gold Gloves, an MVP, and a World Series ring. His pro baseball tryout lasted just a few minutes and required one throw to second base, the scouts had seen enough- namely a special arm. When he joined the Rangers organization, at age 19, he had two suitcases one for his clothes and one for his baseball gear. It was there that a baby-faced Pudge earned his nickname from a minor league instructor. After suffering a back injury, the Rangers asked him to change positions. But Pudge was born to catch. So he signed with the Florida Marlins instead, leading the team to a World Series title.

As a free agent, Rodriguez would resuscitate another franchise, helping to take the Detroit Tigers from one of the worst teams in baseball to the 2006 World Series. Following stints with the New York Yankees, Houston Astros, and Nationals, Rodriguez earned the accolades that made him a Hall of Famer. Rodriguez's account is more than a fascinating account of baseball success; it is a poignant look at one of the sport's most talented catchers and the drive, spirit, and support system that helped him achieve his dreams.

Defense attorney Jose Baez reveals the inside story of the trial and final days of the New England Patriots superstar Aaron Hernandez in, **"Unnecessary Roughness, Inside the Trial and Final Days of Aaron Hernandez" (B HER A)**. Aaron Hernandez was already serving a life sentence for murder when Baez received a request for representation. Defending Hernandez in a second, double-murder trial seemed like a lost cause, but Baez accepted the challenge, and their partnership culminated in a dramatic courtroom victory, a race to contest his first conviction, and ultimately a tragedy, when Aaron took his own life days after his acquittal.

This closely-observed account of Aaron's life and final year is based on countless intimate conversations

with Hernandez, written with the support of Hernandez's fiancée. Baez takes readers inside the high-profile trial, offering a dramatic retelling of the race to obtain key evidence that would exonerate Hernandez, and later play a critical role in appealing his first conviction. With revelations about Hernandez's personal life that weren't shared at trial, and an exploration of the Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy diagnosis revealed by his autopsy, Baez's shares a startling courtroom drama and an unexpected portrait of a fallen father, fiancé, and teammate.

In **"White Houses" (F BLO A)** by Amy Bloom, Lorena Hickok meets Eleanor Roosevelt in 1932 while reporting on Franklin Roosevelt's first presidential campaign. Having grown up worse than poor in South Dakota she reinvented herself as the most prominent woman reporter in America. "Hick," as she's known to friends and admirers, is not quite instantly charmed by the idealistic, patrician Eleanor. But then, as her connection with the future first lady deepens, what begins as a powerful passion matures into a life and lasting love Hick never expected to have.

She moves into the White House, where her status as "first friend" is an open secret, as are FDR's own lovers. After she takes a job in the Roosevelt administration, promoting and protecting both Roosevelts, she comes to know Franklin not only as a great president but as a complicated rival and an irresistible friend, capable of changing lives even after his death. Even as Hick's bond with Eleanor is

tested by forces both extraordinary and common, she grows as a woman and a writer. From Washington, D.C., to Hyde Park, from a little white house on Long Island to an apartment on Manhattan's Washington Square, Amy Bloom's novel moves elegantly through fascinating places and times, written in compelling prose and with emotional depth, wit and acuity.

Small, perfect towns often hold the deepest secrets as **"The Family Next Door" (F HEP S)** by Sally Hepworth reveals. From the outside, Essie's life looks idyllic: a loving husband, a beautiful house in a good neighborhood, and a nearby mother who dotes on her grandchildren. But few of Essie's friends know her secret shame that in a moment of maternal despair, she once walked away from her newborn, who was asleep in her carriage in a park. Disaster was avoided and Essie got better, but she still fears what lurks inside her, even as her daughter gets older and she has a second baby.

When a new woman named Isabelle moves in next door to Essie, she is an immediate object of curiosity in the neighborhood. Why single, when everyone else is married with children? Why renting, when everyone else owns? What mysterious job does she have? And why is she so fascinated with Essie? As the two women grow closer and Essie's friends voice their disapproval, it becomes clear that Isabelle's choice of neighborhood was no accident, and that her presence threatens to bring shocking secrets to light.

Come by the library to choose one of these books, it might lead you somewhere like Terry Pratchett wrote in *Meditations on Middle-Earth*, "I started with a book, and that led me to a library, and that led me everywhere."

Remains of WWII pilot from Houston identified, crash in 1945

HOUSTON (AP) — The remains of a World War II aviator from Texas missing since a 1945 crash in the Philippines have been located and identified.

The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency on Friday announced confirmation of the remains of 21-year-old Army Air Forces 2nd Lt. Hulen A. Leinweber of Houston.

Leinweber was with the 40th Fighter Squadron, 35th Fighter Group. On June 10, 1945, he was on a strafing mission, targeting a convoy in the Philippines, when his P-51 was hit by anti-aircraft fire and crashed.

The American Graves Registration Service searched an area south of Ilap village during August 1947 and found wreckage but no remains. A site believed to be associated with the crash was excavated last year.

DNA analysis helped identify Leinweber, who was accounted for on June 20.

Use of death penalty continues to decline in Texas

HOUSTON (AP) — While Texas led the nation in the number of inmates executed in 2018, the use of capital punishment in the state continues to decline, according to a new report.

The Texas Coalition to Abolish the Death Penalty said in its year-end review report the drop can be attributed, in part, to prosecutors and the public continuing to turn away from the death penalty.

"The death penalty landscape in Texas has changed significantly over the last 20 years," said Kristin Houle, the coalition's executive director. "Not only have the number of death sentences and executions declined by staggering percentages, but the chorus of voices raising concerns about the application of the death penalty grows louder and more diverse every day."

In recent years, reform-minded district attorneys have been elected in some of Texas' most populous counties.

Voters in Dallas County and in Bexar County, where San Antonio is located, elected district attorneys in November who have expressed concerns about the use of the death penalty and who appear more willing to promote life without parole as an alternative punishment.

"We think (November's) election signals a significant shift in Texas, in the way that people in our state view criminal justice," John Creuzot, Dallas County's district attorney-elect, said earlier this month at a meeting in Houston of reform-minded district attorneys from across the country.

The coalition said in the report that Texas led the nation with 13 executions in 2018, accounting for more than half of all executions in the U.S. Tennessee was second with three.

But the coalition also said the number of executions in Texas from 2009 to 2018 is nearly 50 percent less than the number carried out from 1999 to 2008. Executions in Texas peaked in 2000, when 40 people were put to death.

In 2018, juries in Texas condemned seven individuals. From 2009 until 2018, juries in Texas sentenced to death more than 70 percent fewer individuals compared to

the previous 10-year period.

The death penalty continued to be disproportionately imposed on people of color, as more than 70 percent of death sentences have been imposed on minorities over the last five years, according to the report.

The drop in the death penalty's use in recent years is most apparent in Harris County, where Houston is located.

Death row inmates from Harris County have accounted for 129 executions in Texas since capital punishment resumed in the state in 1982, more than any other county, according to the coalition.

But 2018 was the first time in four years that a jury in Harris County sentenced someone to death.

A 2016 survey by Rice University in Houston found just 27 percent of area residents supported the death penalty over life imprisonment.

Since taking office in 2017, Harris County District Attorney Kim Ogg has focused on criminal justice reforms and has gone against expectations in various death penalty cases.

Ogg's office filed a brief last month with the U.S. Supreme Court in support of a claim from a death row inmate convicted in Harris County that he is intellectually disabled and can't be executed. The case is still pending.

"We have the responsibility and the opportunity to take justice in this country to a different level ... to bend toward a fairer system, a more effective system that still protects us from people's bad actions but recognizes the humanity and respect that everyone deserves," Ogg said earlier this month.

A look at where the investigations related to Trump stand

A look at where the investigations related to President Donald Trump stand and what may lie ahead for him:

WHAT'S THIS ALL ABOUT?

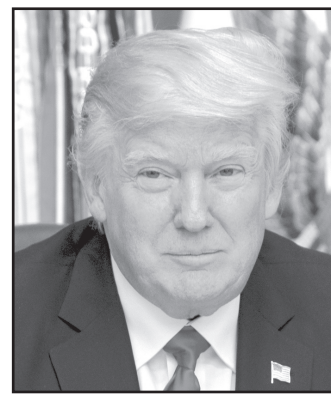
Trump is facing criminal investigations in Washington and New York.

Special counsel Robert Mueller is looking into whether the Trump campaign coordinated with Russia and whether the president obstructed the investigation. Trump also plays a central role in a separate case in New York, where prosecutors have implicated him in a crime. They say Trump directed his personal lawyer Michael Cohen to make illegal hush money payments to two women as a way to quash potential sex scandals during the campaign.

WHAT DO I NEED TO KNOW TODAY?

Shaken and facing a prison term, Cohen said Friday that Trump directed him to buy the silence of two women during the 2016 campaign because he was concerned their stories of alleged affairs with him "would affect the election." He says Trump knew the payments were wrong.

Cohen — who for more than a decade was a key power player in the Trump Organization and a fixture in Trump's political life — said he "gave loyalty to someone who, truthfully, does not deserve loyalty." Cohen spoke in an interview with ABC that aired Friday on "Good Morning America."

SO ... DID THE TRUMP CAMPAIGN COLLUDE WITH RUSSIA?

There is no smoking gun when it comes to the question of Russia collusion. But the evidence so far shows a broad range of Trump associates had Russia-related contact during the 2016 presidential campaign and transition period, and that several lied about the communication.

There is also evidence that some people in Trump's orbit were discussing a possible email dump from WikiLeaks before it occurred. American intelligence agencies and Mueller have said Russia was the source of hacked material released by WikiLeaks during the campaign that was damaging to Hillary Clinton's presidential effort.

OTHER QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER:

—WHAT ABOUT OBSTRUCTION OF JUSTICE? That is another unresolved question that Mueller is pursuing. Investigators have examined key episodes such as Trump's firing of former FBI Director James Comey and his fury over the recusal from the investigation of former Attorney General Jeff Sessions.

—WHAT DOES TRUMP HAVE TO SAY ABOUT ALL THIS? Trump has repeatedly slammed the Mueller investigation as a "witch hunt" and insisted there was "NO COLLUSION" with Russia. He also says his now-former lawyer, Cohen, lied to get a lighter sentence in New York. In a Fox News interview Thursday, he also denied directing Cohen to break the law.

J&J hammered by report it knew of asbestos in baby powder

NEW YORK (AP) — Johnson & Johnson on Friday forcefully denied a media report that it knew for decades about the existence of trace amounts of asbestos in its baby powder.

The report by the Reuters news service sent the company's shares into a tailspin, suffering their worst one-day sell-off in 16 years.

Reuters cited documents released as part of a lawsuit by plaintiffs claiming that the product can be linked to ovarian cancer. The New Brunswick, New Jersey company has battled in court against such claims and on Friday called the Reuters report "one-sided, false and inflammatory."

Johnson & Johnson's stock fell \$14.84, or 10 percent, to close Friday at \$133, its most severe single-day decline since 2002.

In the report, Reuters noted documents show consulting labs as early as 1957 and 1958 found asbestos in J&J talc. Further reports by the company and outside labs showed similar findings through the early 2000s, according to the Reuters story.

In its statement Friday, Johnson & Johnson said "thousands of independent tests by regulators and the world's leading labs prove our baby powder has never contained asbestos."

Oklahoma City streetcar system opens to the public

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Oklahoma City's new streetcar system has opened to the public, and rides are free for now.

Local public school student leaders and city and state officials were among the first passengers Friday after a ribbon-cutting ceremony. Transit officials expect 10,000 to 15,000 passengers this weekend.

Rides are free for three weeks and will cost \$1 per ride or \$3 for a 24-hour pass after that.

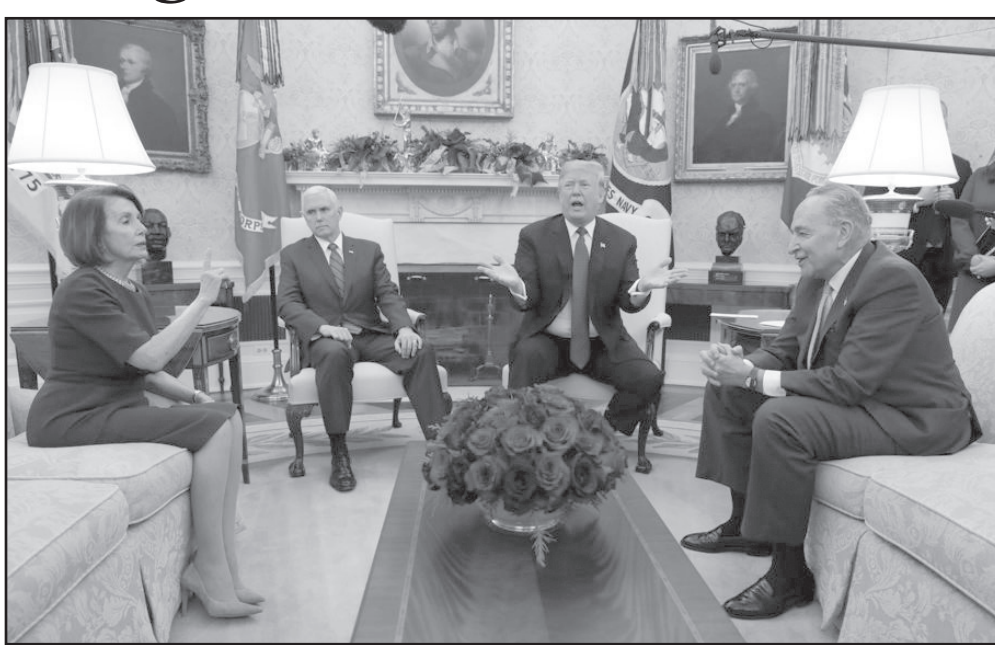
Construction of the

Streetcar drivers are employed through Herzog Transit Systems, which has handled passenger rail in Kansas City, Missouri, and Fort Worth, Texas.

Officials tout the streetcar as part of a mass transit plan that includes improved bus service and Amtrak service to the Dallas area.

Shutdown looms as Trump weighs next move on border wall

WASHINGTON — Congress is racing to avoid a partial government shutdown next Friday over President Donald Trump's border wall. But you wouldn't know it by the schedule, as lawmakers left town waiting for the White House's next move.

The House is taking an extended five-day weekend, returning Wednesday night. The Senate returns Monday after a three-day absence.

The ball is in Trump's court, both sides say, and the president met Friday with top aides to discuss his spending strategy. There's an expectation on Capitol Hill he'll reach out soon to offer lawmakers a plan.

The president said this week he'd be "proud" to shut down the government over the \$5 billion he wants for the wall on the southern border, but he has since taken a softer tone, tweeting, "Let's not do a shutdown, Democrats - do what's right for the American People!" But Trump doesn't have the votes from the

Republican-controlled Congress to support funding for the wall at the level he wants.

Democratic congressional leaders, Sen. Chuck Schumer and Rep. Nancy Pelosi, made a counter offer during a contentious meeting at the White House of no more than \$1.6 billion, as outlined in a bipartisan Senate bill. The money would not go for the wall but for fencing upgrades and other border security. Democrats also offered to simply keep funding at its current level, \$1.3 billion.

Without a resolution, parts of the federal government would shut down at midnight Dec. 21.

Trump met on Friday with legislative affairs director Shahira Knight and budget director Mick Mulvaney to discuss strategy. Some White House aides were startled by Trump's embrace of a shutdown during his meeting with Democratic leaders, though others argued that it was another example of Trump sticking with his campaign promises.

"The president made it very clear: He does want a border wall. He does want border security. He wants to protect the American

people," White House spokesman Hogan Gidley told reporters on Friday.

While Trump has long rallied for the border wall with Mexico, a centerpiece of his 2016 campaign, Republicans on Capitol Hill never fully warmed to the plan, and they are less likely now to round up the votes for it after losing the House majority in the November election.

Each passing day brings Democrats closer to taking control of the House, and with Christmas approaching, enthusiasm for a prolonged fight over the wall was waning even among some Republicans who support it.

"We're out of time," said Rep. Jeff Denham, R-Calif., who lost a bid for re-election last month.

Denham backs the wall as part of a broader immigration overhaul, but said Republicans would be better served by approving a short-term budget resolution that postpones the wall fight until January while keeping the government open.

"Allow the next Congress to come in, get seated, committee chairs to get filled, and then actually have a full debate on a bipartisan solution," Denham told CNN Friday.

Democrats, meanwhile, are not inclined to give an inch, as seen by the backing Pelosi received after confronting Trump during their televised meeting in the Oval Office. She's poised to become House speaker when the new Congress convenes Jan. 3.

As of Friday, Trump had neither accepted nor rejected the Democrats' proposal, according to the Democrats. He told them he would take a look. Trump will need Democratic votes either way, now or in the new year, for

As US life expectancy falls, West Virginia offers lessons

LAS VEGAS — The head of the federal agency controlling the Colorado River said Thursday the U.S. government will impose unprecedented restrictions on water supplies to the seven Southwestern U.S. states that depend on the river unless everyone agrees by Jan. 31 on a plan to deal with an expected shortage in 2020.

Water users from Arizona, California, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming should have had a pact to sign at an annual water users' conference this week in Las Vegas, Bureau of Reclamation Commissioner Brenda Burman said.

They didn't. However, a flurry of approvals in several states in recent weeks signaled urgency and set a stage for an overall agreement to use less water from a river beset by drought and locked into promises to deliver more water than it takes in.

Burman identified California and Arizona as the holdouts.

"Close isn't 'done,'" she told a standing-room crowd at the Colorado River Water Users Association conference at a Las Vegas Strip resort. "Only 'done' will protect this basin."

The river that carries winter snowmelt from the Rocky Mountains to the Gulf of Mexico is

plumbed with dams to generate hydropower and meter water releases. It provides drinking water to 40 million people and cities including Los Angeles, San Diego, Denver, Phoenix and Las Vegas. It irrigates crops in wide areas once deemed as reclaimed desert in the U.S. and Mexico.

The keys to contingency plans are voluntary agreements to use less water than users are allocated from the river's two largest reservoirs, Lake Powell behind the Glen Canyon Dam on the Arizona-Utah state line and Lake Mead behind Hoover Dam just east of Las Vegas.

Lake Powell is currently at 43 percent capacity; Lake Mead at 38 percent.

To date, entities including agricultural districts and municipal suppliers in five states have reached what Burman characterized as a complex puzzle of agreements.

Indian tribes also are involved, and Burman on Thursday announced publication of a report called the Colorado River Basin Ten Tribes Partnership Tribal Water Study. It charts water claims and use by tribes that hold rights to divert almost 20 percent of the water in the river.

A drought-shortage declaration next year would cut 11.4 percent of Arizona's usual river water allocation beginning in 2020, and 4.3 percent of Nevada's

share. That amount of water, combined, would serve more than 625,000 homes. California would voluntarily reduce its Colorado River use by about 6 percent.

Arizona gained approvals for conservation, mitigation and payment plans from its Department of Water Resources and the key Central Arizona Project irrigation district. Unlike the other states, it also needs state Legislature approval for water agreements. Lawmakers convene in January.

In California, the largest municipal suppliers have signed on, including the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California serving some 19 million people.

However, the sprawling Imperial Irrigation District, which holds some of the largest and oldest rights to river water, has so far granted only tentative approval. James Hanks, board president, said in an interview the district wants to be last to sign so it can see what others agree to.

It also wants government help to save the Salton Sea, a briny shallow desert lake east of Palm Springs, California, that is fed primarily by agricultural irrigation runoff. Dusty hot winds blowing across exposed former shorelines are blamed for asthma by area residents who also complain of sometimes brackish smells.

Burman didn't say what the federal government plans if it is left to impose restrictions.

But local officials warned that a free-for-all could lead to crippling lawsuits and legislative gridlock.

John Entsminger, chief executive of the Southern Nevada Water Authority in Las Vegas, predicted "complete chaos" if negotiations that he compared with nuanced scalpel work are overriden by federal sledgehammer rules.

"Everyone thinks their own water use is justified and no one else's is," observed Kathryn Sorensen, Phoenix city water services director.

Keith Moses, vice chairman of the Colorado River Indian Tribal Council in Arizona, offered what he saw as a key to complex water questions.

"To me, the best way of conserving water is not to use it," he said before adding that he knew that would mean limiting growth so as not to continue to drain the Colorado River.

"Realistically," he added, "looking at it, that's not going to happen."

Authorities: Wave of hoax bomb threats made across US

NEW YORK — A wave of bomb threats emailed Thursday to hundreds of schools, businesses and government buildings across the U.S. triggered searches, evacuations and fear — but there were no signs of explosives, and authorities said the scare appeared to be a crude extortion attempt.

Law enforcement agencies across the country dismissed the threats, saying they were meant to cause disruption and compel recipients into sending money and were not considered credible.

Some of the emails had the subject line: "Think Twice." They were sent from a spoofed email address. The sender claimed to have had an associate plant a small bomb in the recipient's building and that the only way to stop him from setting it off was by making an online payment of \$20,000 in Bitcoin.

"We are currently monitoring multiple bomb threats that have been sent electronically to various locations throughout the city," the New York

City Police Department's counterterrorism unit tweeted. "These threats are also being reported to other locations nationwide & are NOT considered credible at this time."

Other law enforcement agencies also dismissed the threats, which were written in a choppy style reminiscent of the Nigerian prince email scam.

The Palm Beach County, Florida, sheriff's office and the Boise, Idaho, police said they had no reason to believe that threats made to locations in those areas were credible. One of the emails wound up in a spam filter, Boise Police Chief William Bones said.

The FBI said it is assisting law enforcement agencies that are dealing with the threats.

"As always, we encourage the public to remain vigilant and to promptly report suspicious activities which could represent a threat to public safety," the FBI said in a statement.

Thursday's scare came less than two months after prominent Democratic officials and CNN's Manhattan offices were targeted with package bombs. The suspect in that case, Cesar Sayoc,

is in jail while awaiting trial.

In 2015, an emailed bomb threat prompted different reactions from the nation's two largest public school systems. The Los Angeles school system closed down under threat of a mass attack, but New York City officials quickly saw it as a hoax.

In the wake of Thursday's emails, some schools across the country closed early and others were evacuated or placed on lockdown. Authorities said a threat emailed to a school in Troy, Missouri, about 55 miles (88 kilometers) northeast of St. Louis, was sent from Russia.

The bomb threats also prompted evacuations at city hall in Aurora, Illinois, the offices of the News & Observer in Raleigh, North Carolina, a suburban Atlanta courthouse and businesses in Detroit.

"Organizations nationwide, both public and private, have reported receiving emailed bomb threats today," Michigan State Police spokeswoman Shannon Banner said. "They are not targeted toward any one specific sector."

Penn State University notified students via a text alert about threats to a half-dozen buildings and an airport on its main campus in State College, Pennsylvania. In an update, the school said the threat appeared to be part of a "national hoax."

Officials at Columbine High School in Colorado were dealing Thursday with a bomb threat of a different sort. Students were being kept inside for the rest of the school day after someone called in a bomb threat against the school.

The Jefferson County, Colorado, Sheriff's Office said the caller claimed to have placed explosive devices in the school and to be hiding outside with a gun.

Sheriff's spokesman Mike Taplin said nothing was found at Columbine, where 12 students and a teacher were killed by two students in 1999.

Two dozen other Colorado schools were also temporarily placed on lockdown, meaning their doors were locked but classes continued normally, as the threat was investigated.

Little pleaded guilty to murder Thursday in the 1994 strangulation of a Texas woman, and he was convicted

days of the GOP's majority in the House.

Even if a bill with the wall funding passes the House, it is almost certain to fail in the Senate, where Republicans hold a slim majority, and Democrats have pledged to block it from receiving the necessary 60 votes needed to advance.

Rep. Kevin McCarthy, R-Calif., the incoming minority leader, said on the House floor as lawmakers left for the long weekend that he thinks "going into a shutdown is stupid," but he offered no immediate plan to resolve the standoff.

Fellow California Rep. Lucille Roybal-Allard, the top Democrat on a subcommittee for homeland security spending, said it makes no sense to be "squandering" \$5 billion on the wall when the na-

tion has so many other security vulnerabilities.

"Republicans are driving our nation to the brink of another disastrous government shutdown - at a time of great economic uncertainty and right in the middle of the holiday season," Roybal-Allard said in the Democrats' weekly address.

For now, Republicans still control the House, the Senate and the White House, she reminded listeners. "They have the responsibility and the power to keep our government open."

If the two sides do not reach agreement, about one-quarter of the government would be affected, including the departments of Homeland Security, Transportation, Agriculture, State and Justice, as well as national parks.

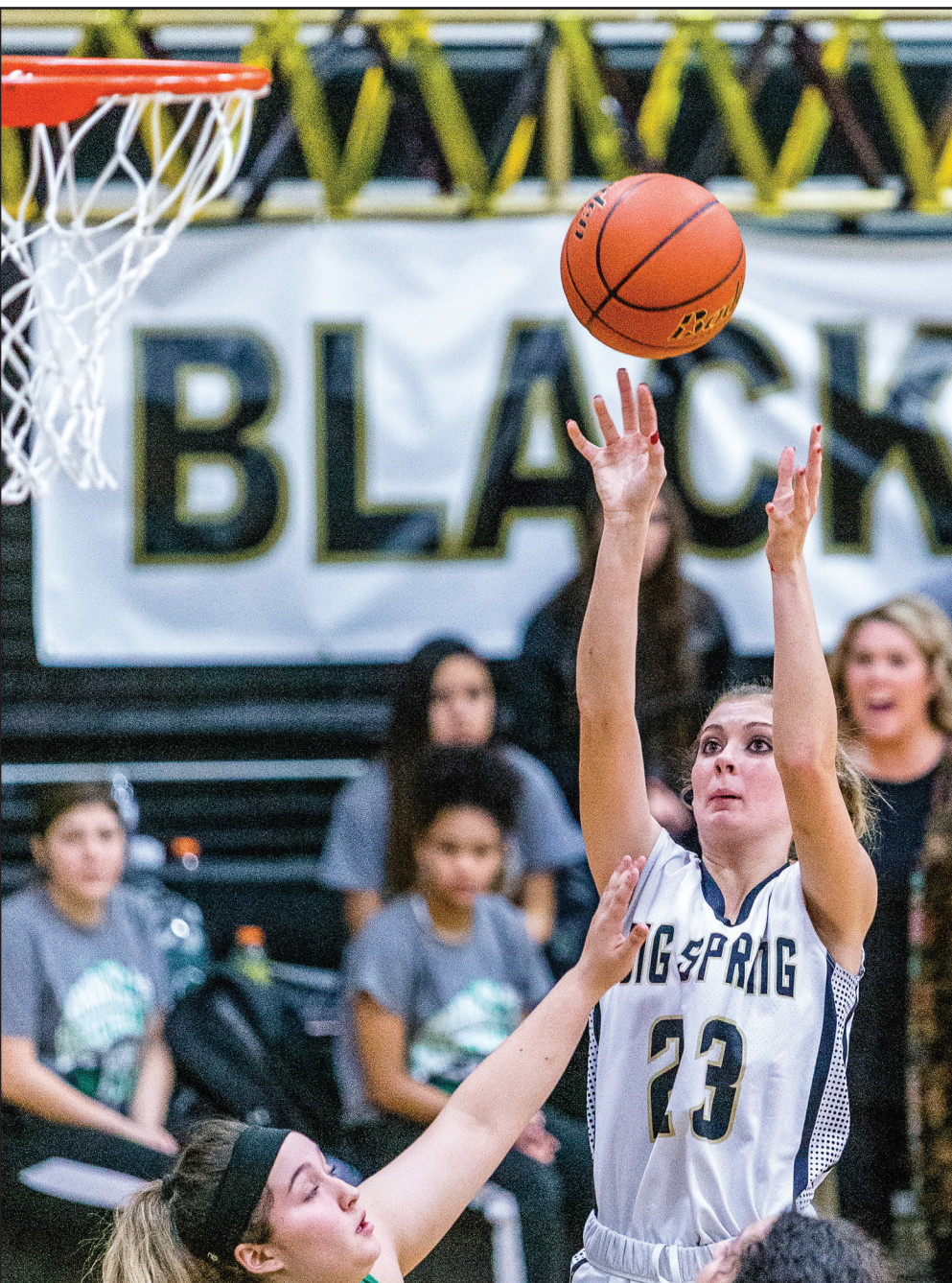

Gift from Brees: Football for helping set NFL passing record

METAIRIE, La. — When Drew Brees became the NFL's career leader in yards passing, he wanted to come up with some sort of gift to thank those who coached him, caught the 6,357 completions it took to set the record and blocked while he threw.

His solution was an exhaustive process than involved the production of about 175 unique commemorative footballs and the enlisting Saints front office and public relations staff to help track down 99 receivers, 56 offensive linemen, 11 head or assistant coaches from his 18 pro seasons as well as others instrumental in his success.

They began receiving their custom-made footballs this week, which pleased Brees because he wanted it done before Christmas.

"Naturally you start thinking, 'OK, well, a lot of people have caught those balls,' Brees said. 'So let's get a list of all the pass catchers and the number of catches and the number of yards and let's put together a game ball for them and put those statistics on there for them, so they know that they have a piece of this and they were an important part of it.'"

That's how the effort started. But Brees soon realized he couldn't just limit it to receivers.

"It's not just about the receivers. It's about the guys blocking.' So it's like, 'All right, let's find every offensive lineman that's ever started a game.' So we did that," Brees said. "Then I started thinking about coaches. Then I started thinking about other people as well. So it was actually a long list. But I just wanted to do that for them."

Even current Saints players, such as veteran tight end Ben Watson,

received the balls at their homes — not the mail room or locker room at Saints headquarters.

"It's him. It's surprising but it's not surprising at the same time that he would give a special thanks to the guys that helped him along the way," Watson said. "Obviously, this is his accomplishment. But him being the

leader that he is, he loves to defer praise to other people."

Watson said he was "Just thankful to be able to play with him and be able to contribute to the greatness that he's achieved."

Recipients included rookie receiver Tre'Quan Smith, who caught the 62-yard touchdown pass in Week 5

against Washington on which Brees surpassed the 71,940 yards passing of previous record-holder Peyton Manning.

Smith said Brees' gesture "shows what kind of guy he is, and you want to be around somebody like that, who shows appreciation."

The package with ball included a typed letter signed by Brees. Receivers, linemen, coaches and other "contributors" each got different variations of the letter, depending on the nature of their roles in the record.

The balls sent to retired players included the number of passes they caught from Brees and the total yardage of those catches. For example, the ball sent to Saints career receiving leader Marques Colston specifically recognized his 705 receptions for 9,709 yards.

For current players, Brees didn't include such stats, which grown since Manning's old mark was eclipsed in October.

Brees said he was gratified by text messages he'd received. Brandin Cooks sent him a video from the locker room at the headquarters of the former Saints receiver's current team, the Los Angeles Rams.

Former Chargers fullback Fred McCrary sent a video of himself holding his ball in a barber shop, boisterously bragging that he's "famous today."

Brees said he'd also received a text Friday from former Chargers running back LaDainian Tomlinson.

Recipients that Brees considered "contributors" included Dr. James Andrews, the surgeon who repaired the quarterback's heavily damaged throwing shoulder in 2006, as well as independent throwing coach Tom House, Saints owner Gayle Benson and Saints general manager Mickey Loomis.

Texas freshman Jaxson Hayes is rising hoops star

AUSTIN, Texas — As a high school football player, Jaxson Hayes had a slight problem that was only getting bigger: His body.

He was getting taller. An extraordinary growth spurt shot him up to about 6-foot-7, and he was taking a pounding at wide receiver.

"They were going at my knees and back and stuff," Hayes said.

Basketball beckoned. His career on the court was about to take off. And it hasn't stopped.

From a 6-foot, 125-pound freshman, to a 6-10, 200-pound senior, Hayes has made an extraordinary leap from a player who barely got on the court to an elite-level prospect courted by some of the top college programs in the country.

Hayes landed at Texas, where his early play has twice earned Big 12 newcomer of the week honors, and his raw talent is showing so much potential that he's generating buzz as a potential one-and-done NBA draft pick in 2019. And he's still growing, having now reached 6-11.

"I call him Halley's Comet," said Carl Kremer, Hayes' coach at Cincinnati's Archbishop Moeller high school, an Ohio basketball power. "He's once in a lifetime."

Hayes is averaging 10.3 points and 4.9 rebounds off the bench for the Longhorns (6-3) and has a team-high 23 blocks. He's coming off one of his best games when he was 6-of-6 shooting in a win over Purdue.

All this from a kid who didn't start a game in high school until he was a senior and wasn't rated as a top-100 recruit. Texas plays Saturday against Grand Canyon (5-4).

"This has been a whirlwind," Hayes said. "I always dreamed of this as a kid. I thought I could be a mid-major player when I was 6-7. I just wanted to at least get one Division One offer."

Everyone could see Hayes' athletic potential, Kremer said. His father is Cincinnati Bengals tight end coach Jonathan Hayes, who played 12 seasons in the NFL. His mother, Kristi (Kinne) Hayes, played basketball at Drake University and averaged 52 points as a high school senior in Iowa.

But basketball developed slowly for Jaxson. Kre-

mer describes Hayes at "No. 20 among 20" on the Moeller freshman teams. By his junior season, he was averaging about six minutes and less than two points on a team that played for the state championship.

But he could block shots and that got noticed when Middle Tennessee State offered a scholarship.

"As soon as I got that offer, I quit football. That's when I thought this could really take off," Jaxson said.

Hayes joined an AAU team and his first tournament game produced a play that his mom says changed everything: He pinned an opponent's dunk attempt against the backboard. That player was Zion Williamson, one of the top recruits in the country, who is now a freshman sensation at Duke.

"Suddenly," Kristi said, "everyone was talking about Jaxson."

Texas coach Shaka Smart, who had connections in Ohio from his playing days at Kenyon College and as an assistant at Akron, came calling. So did Kentucky's John Calipari.

"Going into the summer, I had one offer. By the end, I had 42," Jaxson said. "That fall, I was in my English class and Patrick Ewing walked in (at school) with all the Georgetown coaches. My phone was blowing up."

Smart sent assistant Darrin Horn to scout Hayes. The report back to Austin was quick and emphatic.

"I watched him run the court twice," Horn said. "I said, 'Yeah, this kid can play.'"

Landing at Texas made for more than a few family jokes. Hayes was born in Norman, Oklahoma, when both of his parents were assistant coaches at the University of Oklahoma. Kristi recalls Smart making her flash a "Hook'em Horns" hand sign for a picture he wanted to send to Sooners' women's basketball coach Sherri Coale.

"I struggled with that at first," Kristi said, laughing. "But I did it. Now we bleed burnt orange."

Jaxson's game is raw and he knows it. When he calls home, younger sister and high school hoops star Jillian jabs him for not getting more rebounds. His outside shooting touch remain inconsistent at best.

This week, Horn put him through 45 minute of drills on how to use his body against defenders in the physical play of the Big 12. And he's developing a baby hook shot that he used last week against Purdue's 7-3 center Matt Haarms. Of his 37 field goals through the first nine games, 28 have been dunks.

Westbrook, Murray tussle as Nuggets beat Thunder 109-98

DENVER — For all his offensive contributions and rebounding, Nikola Jokic's most important role in the end was peacemaker.

Jokic scored 24 points, Jamal Murray had 19 and the Denver Nuggets beat the Oklahoma City Thunder 109-98 on Friday night after Murray and Russell Westbrook had a heated exchange.

Westbrook and Murray pushed each other and argued after lining up next to each other for a jump ball in the final seconds. Jokic tried to get between them, and Westbrook threatened to beat up Jokic while being restrained. No blows were exchanged, but the final moments played out amid heightened tensions.

Asked what Westbrook said to him, Jokic said he didn't remember and dismissed the dustup as "nothing."

"He's a competitive guy," Jokic said. "He didn't want to lose. All is good. I just wanted to separate them."

Westbrook said there was a reason behind his initial shove of Murray. "He was in my way," Westbrook explained.

Murray said he hadn't done anything to provoke the incident.

"He tried to move me out of the way," Murray said. "He shoved me first. It is what it is. I didn't do anything."

Jokic also had 15 rebounds and nine assists, just shy of a third triple-double this season. Nick Young, signed as a free agent Monday, scored six points in his Nuggets debut, including a key 3-pointer in the fourth quarter.

Paul George had 32 points to lead the Thunder, who lost their fourth in

a row to the Nuggets.

"From an identity standpoint and how we want to play, we want to play downhill," Thunder coach Billy Donovan said. "I think when we got around the basket, they have a lot of physicality. They have Jokic and (Mason) Plumlee, but we had some opportunities to finish plays. Jerami Grant got into the teeth of the defense, but couldn't finish. Steven Adams had a great offensive game and had opportunities to score as did Russell Westbrook. We had a lot of guys in there, but we just weren't able to finish."

Adams scored 26 points, while Grant and Westbrook finished with

13 apiece. Westbrook and Adams also had 14 rebounds each.

Trailing by 10 late in the third quarter, Oklahoma City got a layup and a 3-pointer from George in the final minute to pull to 82-76.

With a 9-2 burst capped by another layup from George, the Thunder trimmed it to 99-96 with 3:20 remaining. The Nuggets scored 10 of the last 12 points down the stretch, four of them on a jumper and a pair of free throws by Murray.

The teams were gathered for a jump ball with 35.7 seconds left when Westbrook, apparently upset over Murray's positioning around the circle,

began pushing him. As Murray pushed back, teammates and officials quickly rushed in to separate the two, who exchanged words before the skirmish ended.

Murray said the lesson he's taking from the game's finish is the resiliency the Nuggets have shown despite missing key players because of injuries.

"We're taking every game seriously," Murray said. "We're playing with a lot of confidence and everybody is a threat. It's not just me or Joker or Gary (Harris). Everybody on the court is taking shots and setting each other up. We go out there and we win games. We have fun doing it. We all stand up for each other. We all look out for each other. And the more we win games, we know we can beat anybody."

The Nuggets took a 60-52 lead at halftime, boosted by Torrey Craig's perimeter shooting as he made three of his first four attempts from 3-point range.

Adams scored 17 points in the first half, helping to keep the Thunder within striking distance.

Curry, Thompson help Warriors beat Kings 130-125

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Golden State coach Steve Kerr praised his team's smothering defense for providing the spark it needed to bounce back from a disappointing loss. He also chided the Warriors' offense for a lack of focus that made the late run necessary.

Not much is coming easy for the two-time defending NBA champs this season, not even on a night when they got another big night from the All-Star trio of Stephen Curry, Kevin Durant and Klay Thompson.

Thompson made a go-ahead 3-pointer with 38.5 seconds left, Curry added four free throws down the stretch and the Warriors ended the game on a big run after a sluggish start to the fourth quarter, beating the Sacramento Kings 130-125 on Friday night.

"I don't know what they shot over the final six minutes but it wasn't good," Kerr said. "We knew we could get back in it if we were just poised and a little more patient offensively. We had several spurts in that second half where we sort of lost our composure and just couldn't get anything

going."

The Warriors have been searching for some consistency after starting the season 10-1. They went into Sacramento having split their previous 18 games and were on the verge of a complete collapse against the Kings before holding on.

Curry finished with 35 points, seven rebounds and six assists. Thompson had 27 points and nine rebounds while Kevin Durant added 33 points, eight rebounds and eight assists.

"Late in the game we just simplified everything," Durant said. "We were down 10 points in the fourth with three minutes to go, we just simplified it."

Two days after a 20-point home loss to NBA-leading Toronto, the Warriors put up 103 points through three quarters, went stagnant for more than eight minutes in the fourth before outscoring the Kings 17-2 over the final 3:03.

Durant had 13 points in the fourth quarter, including eight of the first 10 during Golden State's late surge, but Thompson came up with the biggest shot with his fourth 3-pointer of the night.

The Kings repeatedly left Thomp-

son unguarded throughout the game and paid for it in the end when his 27-footer put the Warriors up 126-125.

"Just wide open on the right wing," Thompson said. "I knew one was going to fall eventually."

After De'Aaron Fox missed a jumper, Curry made two free throws with 14.8 seconds remaining. Buddy Hield's desperation 3-point try also missed, and Curry added two more free throws to close out Golden State's second win over Sacramento this year.

"They just got us with their experience at the end," Kings coach Dave Joerger said. "We struggled to finish some shots once a lot of their switching happened. They made some plays but we made some mistakes and they made us pay."

Draymond Green had 14 rebounds and 10 assists for the Warriors.

Hield scored 27 points for the Kings. Fox had 25 points, nine assists and six rebounds. Willie Cauley-Stein finished with 22 points and 11 rebounds.

The wild ending was in stark contrast to the first half when Golden State controlled the pace and the flow while leading by 16.

The Warriors came out much crisp-

er and sharper offensively than they had been in their 113-93 loss to the Raptors two nights earlier.

Curry, Durant and Thompson combined for 51 point and nine 3s, and Golden State had a 13-2 run late in the second quarter to go up 76-64.

Warriors: Andre Iguodala (sore right hip) was held out for a third consecutive game, although Kerr is hopeful that Iguodala will play against Memphis on Monday. ... Shaun Livingston did not play after suffering a pelvic contusion in the fourth quarter of Wednesday's loss to Toronto.

Kings: Marvin Bagley III left in the first half with a left knee bone bruise and he's expected to miss 10 to 14 days.

Golden State is 4-1 this season and 33-3 overall when the three each score 20 points or more.

"We've been to two straight Finals together so we know how to make plays on the highest stage," Thompson said. "A game in December I don't think is going to faze us. Just play under control and that's what we did in the last three minutes."

OLYMPICS

Salt Lake City got the green light to bid for the Winter Olympics — most likely for 2030 — in an attempt to bring the Games back to the city that hosted in 2002 and provided the backdrop for the U.S. winter team's ascendance into an international powerhouse.

The U.S. Olympic Committee said it was selecting Utah's capital, which stood out as a predictable, slam-dunk pick in a process that also included Denver and Reno, Nevada.

With venues still in place — some of them upgraded — from the 2002 Games, Salt Lake claims it can host again at a lower cost than other candidates, which aligns with the International Olympic Committee's new blueprint for the Games.

NFL

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Carson Wentz's back injury means Nick Foles gets another opportunity to rescue the Philadelphia Eagles.

Eagles coach Doug Pederson said Wentz does not require surgery for a stress fracture in his back and the injury could take up to three months to heal. The quarterback is listed as "doubtful" for Sunday night's game against the Rams in Los Angeles and is scheduled to travel with the team. Foles wasn't available to speak to reporters, but teammates expect the Super Bowl MVP to start.

Pederson is optimistic about Wentz's recovery. He wouldn't rule him out for this week or the rest of this season. The Eagles (6-7) are still in the chase for a playoff spot.

ALAMEDA, Calif. (AP) — Oakland Raiders receiver Martavis Bryant has been suspended indefinitely for violating the NFL policy on substance abuse.

The NFL announced Bryant has violated the terms of his condi-

tional reinstatement in April 2017 and has been placed back on the suspended list for an indefinite period of time.

Bryant is currently on injured reserve with a knee injury. He is in the final year of his contract and eligible for free agency next year.

MIAMI (AP) — A person familiar with the move says the NFL has fined umpire Roy Ellison \$9,300 and reinstated him from administrative leave after his dispute in Miami with Buffalo Bills defensive end Jerry Hughes.

The fine is the amount of one game check for Ellison.

TV video showed Hughes confronting Ellison in the tunnel near the locker room after the Dolphins' win over the Bills on Dec. 2 and accusing the official of using a derogatory term. Ellison was placed on administrative leave last week.

BASEBALL

CHICAGO (AP) — First baseman Yonder Alonso was traded to the Chicago White Sox by the Cleveland Indians in a deal between AL Central rivals that could have broad implications for both teams the rest of the offseason.

A person familiar with the trade confirmed it on condition of anonymity because the clubs had not yet announced the swap.

Chicago sent minor league outfielder Alex Call to Cleveland for Alonso, who hit .250 with 23 homers and 83 RBIs in 145 games this year during his only season with the Indians.

Cleveland reacquired first baseman and designated hitter Carlos Santana from Philadelphia in a three-team trade on Thursday, making Alonso expendable.

BALTIMORE (AP) — The Baltimore Orioles hired Brandon Hyde to be their new manager, hoping his experience as Cubs bench coach will help the team move for-

ward while in rebuilding mode.

Hyde takes over for Buck Showalter, who was fired after Baltimore finished 47-115 — the worst record in the majors. This will be Hyde's first stint as a major league manager.

The 45-year-old Hyde was selected by general manager Mike Elias, who began an extensive search for Showalter's replacement after being hired last month to replace Dan Duquette.

NEW YORK (AP) — Jeury Familia and the Mets finalized a \$30 million, three-year contract, bringing the reliever back to New York, where he figures to serve as a setup man for newly acquired closer Edwin Diaz.

Familia gets a \$2 million signing bonus payable on equal installments on July 1 and Dec. 10 next year. He has salaries of \$6 million in 2019 and \$11 million in each of the final two seasons. The Mets will defer \$1 million of his 2020 salary, payable on Jan. 15, 2022. They will defer the same amount of his 2021 pay, payable on July 1, 2022.

He gets a \$500,000 performance bonus in any season he has 50 games finished. He would get a \$1 million assignment bonus if traded.

NBA

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Klay Thompson made a go-ahead 3-pointer with 38.5 seconds left, Stephen Curry added four free throws down the stretch and the Golden State Warriors ended the game on a big run after a sluggish start to the fourth quarter, beating the Sacramento Kings 130-125.

Ovechkin's three goals gave him an NHL-best 28 this season and nine in his last five games. His 13-game point streak matched his career high set in 2006-07.

Tom Wilson and Travis Boyd also scored for the defending Stanley Cup champions, who have won 11 of 13. The Metropolitan Division leaders got three goals in a 5:42 span of the second to tie it at 4, a burst capped when Boyd redirected in John Carlson's shot with 1:41 left in the period.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL

FARGO, N.D. (AP) — Quarterback Easton Stick ran for 169 yards and three touchdowns and threw for another score to help North Dakota State defeat rival South Dakota State 44-21 in the FCS semifinals.

Bruce Anderson added two rushing touchdowns for the undefeated and top-seeded Bison (14-0), who will be seeking their seventh FCS title in the last eight years. North Dakota State led 14-7 at intermission and then won a shootout in the second half.

Stick, a first-team AP All-American selection, finished with 316 total yards. He was 12-of-15 passing for 169 yards and no interceptions.

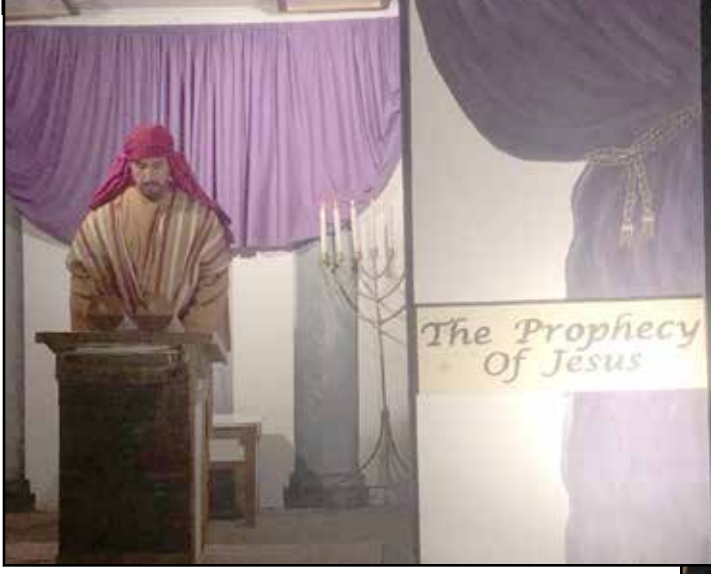

Texan accidentally shot by Dick Cheney recalls 2006 incident

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Harry Whittington was a longtime Austin lawyer and a largely behind the scenes player in Texas Republican politics in February 2006 when he became a central actor in what came close to being a life-or-death drama involving then-Vice President Dick Cheney.

The Corpus Christi Caller-Times reports Whittington, then 78, was part of a quail-hunting party on a South Texas ranch with Cheney and others when the vice president accidentally shot him in the face and torso after a covey of game birds took flight.

Dozens of tiny bird-shot pellets peppered his face and torso. Whittington lost consciousness and was taken to the hospital.

He suffered what at the time was called a minor heart attack because some of the lead shot hit blood vessels near his heart.

The incident, first reported by the Corpus Christi Caller-Times in South Texas, was extensively covered locally, nationally and internationally at the time. Now, it's part of the movie, "Vice," due for release on Christmas and depicting the political life the man sometimes described as the most powerful vice president in history.

Here's what Whittington, now 91 and still practicing law, told the Caller-Times he remembers about what he says "just keeps coming back":

— The movie trailer shows Cheney firing from the back seat of a vehicle. Is that what happened?

"The quail hunting that we were doing was behind bird dogs. So we were walking and as the dogs found the birds, well then, you walk up on the

covey and then they flush and you shoot.

"So there wasn't any automobile involved in the hunt at all."

— What do you remember after the shot was fired?

"I remember passing out smelling the gun powder, and then I was out of it a while after that."

— Have you seen any of the promotion for the movie?

"No. Some of my children have seen the trailer. It (the hunting scene) doesn't sound too familiar.

But if they're (the movie studio) spending as much money as I've heard they're spending on it, they must think it will sell at the box office."

— Do you plan to see the movie once it's released?

"We'll see it. I've heard so much about it, but I wouldn't expect it to be an Academy Award (winner) as far as the hunt itself went."

— Do you and the former vice president keep in touch?

"Yeah, occasionally. He was here, I guess it was sometime a few months ago. He and I went to dinner. We're just acquaintances."

— Do you still hunt quail?

"I'm not hunting anymore. I've aged a little bit since then. That was 12 years ago."

— Have you made a full recovery?

"I guess so, I'm able to navigate and get around. I still have a lot of 'quiet pellets,' but some of them had to be lifted and removed.

"When I go to the doctors, they all want to look at my pellets I still have. Usually everybody in the clinic wants to come look. I get a lot of questions and discussions about it.

"Needless to say, I'm very, very fortunate.

Roger's Reviews: Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse

This past Monday was the deadline for my article for January's issue of "Living" Magazine, in which I recap the best and worst movies I've reviewed this year.

I really wish that deadline had been a week later. Granted, I would have had a difficult choice...the first animated movie in the short but brilliant history of Roger's Reviews to win Best Movie, or keep the current winner on top (no spoilers...see the magazine for that result) and name "Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse" the Best Animated Feature of 2018.

I will spoil one thing, though. You won't have to wait 'til the end of this review to learn that I gave the new feature, which centers on a young boy struggling with all the pressures of early teenage years, a police officer father (Brian Tyree Henry), being the new kid at an elite private school, and having a "bad boy" Uncle Aaron (Mahershala Ali) who facilitates his graffiti art hobby. Not to mention he develops a crush on the new girl at his school, "Gwen...Wanda." It's actually Gwen Stacy (Hailee Steinfeld) from another dimension trying to be incognito. Other dimensions? Yeah, we're getting to that.

Miles Morales (Shameik Moore) has some issues, but he gets a whole bunch more loaded onto his plate when he gets bitten by a radioactive spider and gains Spider-Man powers. Suddenly his hands begin sticking to everything like super-strength velcro, he begins getting weird tingles as his Spider Sense manifests, and he can jump several times higher than normal.

While running away from his problems, Miles stumbles across Wilson Fisk (Liev Schreiber), aka the Kingpin of Crime, along with some henchmen, fighting Miles' favorite superhero, Spider-Man (Chris Pine). Suddenly, Kingpin's stooges turn on a big science-y device, causing a big, weird explosion.

Spider-Man dies. Miles buys a cheap Spider-Man costume (from a familiar face, in a bitter-sweet moment) and begins trying to figure out how his powers work, but soon realizes he's not alone. There are



several more Spider-Men and -Women in the mix.

There's older, disheveled Peter Parker Spider-Man (Jake Johnson); there's Spider-Woman/Gwen Stacy (Steinfeld, as mentioned); there's black-and-white broody Spider-Man Noir (Nicolas Cage); there's anime-inspired Peni Parker (Kimiko Glenn), who pilots a spider-inspired robot mecha with a radioactive spider as a companion; and there's the one, the only, Spectacular Spider-Ham (John Mulaney), aka Peter Porker, an anthropomorphic cartoon (even to the rest of the animated characters) pig with spider powers.

I won't spoil any more of this masterpiece for you, but I'll give you a few more voice talents to listen for: Lily Tomlin as Aunt May; Luna Lauren Velez as Miles' mom Rio Morales; Zoe Kravitz as Mary Jane; and Kathryn Hahn as Olivia, a scientist working with Fisk.

It's probably obvious to all loyal readers of Roger's Reviews that I'm a fan of superhero movies. It's not too much of a stretch to believe that, in my misguided youth, I might have been a comic book fan. Back in those days, I read a graphic novel (like a book-sized comic book) called "Under-

standing Comics" by Scott McCloud. In it, McCloud explained using art and words how the frames, pictures, speech bubbles, and other elements of comic book art blend together to bring a story to life on the page.

I haven't been able to find his reaction yet, but I wonder what McCloud makes of "Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse."

The movie feels like a comic book leapt off the paper pages and plastered itself all over the screen of the Cinemark Cinema 4, complete with smooth, fluid motion, sound and music. Yeah, I know there have been superhero movies before – both live-action and animated. I'm not a newcomer to the genre. But this is something different. It steps things up about 10 notches from either of those two forms.

On the one hand, animated art is much more flexible than live-action could ever be, no matter what special effects the movie-makers wow us with. The human body comes with weight and limitations.

On the other, animated superhero movies have always seemed like attempts to make live-action movies out of drawings, where "Spider-Verse" tries quite successfully to ramp the

action and movement up while making it feel like a comic book. The effect is amazing, and if you are a superhero or comic fan at all, you need to give this a look. If you're not a fan of the genre, you might not enjoy it, though I'd hope you still appreciate the art. This is my first, and probably only, 10 stars out of 10 movie of the year.

Even the Most Humble Gift...Christmas Plants

Christmas has always been my favorite time of year. I love the contrast of the traditional red and green colors amid the lights and decorations. Plants have played an important part of decorations throughout the centuries. At Christmas there are some plants that have become such an intriguing part of the season that it is now unusual not to find them among the decorations. The evergreen tree is one of the first plants that come to mind although in recent decades the marketing world has given us everything from aluminum reflective branches to fluorescent pink and even black colored trees. Evergreens, used in many forms including wreaths and garland, were a symbol of the hope of returning spring in the barren winter landscape. Bringing trees inside as part of Christmas has been attributed to the German church reformist Martin Luther. The story describes Reverend Luther coming home one night to see the stars twinkling between the branches of fir trees. Overcome with the beauty of that amazing sight, his family brought a tree indoors and decorated it with candles to celebrate the season. The tradition took hold with Queen Victoria and Prince Albert in England while the German immigrants brought the practice to America. The Texas Christmas Tree Growers Association (TCTGA) is an organization of over 120 Texas farmers that grow, sell and promote Texas-grown Christmas trees. Some Christmas tree farms also offer special events, such as field trips, pumpkin patches in October, group picnic facilities and more. Concho Christmas Tree Farm in Christoval (south of San Angelo) and Double Shovel Christmas Tree Farm in Post are probably the closest tree farms to Howard County. Another evergreen popular at the holiday season are the holly and the ivy plants. The bright green leaves in winter are symbols of

eternal life and the red berries of the holly are reminders of the blood of Christ. The song "Holly and the Ivy" has increased the popularity of the decorations. The mistletoe is another favorite used to remind us of love, peace and greetings of friendship.

In the southern states, the Christmas cactus is gaining popularity. A common houseplant, the Schlumbergera blooms in the winter with its bright red and pink flowers. The Red Amaryllis is also known as the "Christmas Lily" because it blooms during the festive season. The plant can also be found in a wide range of colors from white to pink to orange and even one like a candy cane.

Undoubtedly the most popular Christmas plant is the poinsettia. Transplanted to the United States from Mexico by the first Ambassador to Mexico Joel Robert Poinsett, their unique character comes from the fact the red "flowers" are actually the leaves of the plant. The Poinsettia is also known as "The Christmas Star", because its leaves turn red around the holiday season however like the marketing of the Christmas Tree the poinsettia is now seen in a wide variety of colors and patterns. According to legend, a small Mexican girl and her brother were on their way to Christmas Eve church services but due to their poverty they didn't have anything to give the Christ child and this upset the girl greatly. Her brother told her, "Even the most humble gift, if given in love, will be acceptable in His eyes." As they walked to church, she gathered some weeds and fashioned them into a bouquet. Other children laughed at the gift she brought, and she cried from embarrassment, however, as she approached the altar she remembered the kind words of her brother. She presented the gift of humble love at the manger and the weeds miraculously blossomed into the red flowers we know as poinsettias. They are called Flores de Noche Buena (Flow-

ers of the Holy Night) and return each year at Christmastime. In Big Spring, the poinsettia reappears each year at the "Festival of Lights". Each December our Comanche Trail Park and various areas of town are transformed with beautiful lighted poinsettias giving our community the state designation of the "Lighted Poinsettia Capital of Texas". Started in 1997 by Pat Simmons, the Comanche Trail Festival of Lights is a volunteer effort of the residents of Howard County. Donations of time, money, and materials makes this event a success. Between the first week of December and ending Christmas night, the festival has drawn over 25,000 guests from over 14 different countries of the world. Over a mile and a half in length and including walking paths near the historic Spring, it also receives a timely visit from Santa Claus at the gift shoppe. For further information contact the Big Spring Convention and Visitors Bureau (432-264-2516) or the Area Chamber of Commerce.

Whether you enjoy the beauties of nature or the man made lighted versions, plants can be a joyous addition to our holiday seasons however take care with pets and children. Plants like mistletoe and the poinsettia can be toxic or irritating to the skin to children and family pets even though some

wildlife have been known to eat them. On behalf of the Howard Soil and Water Conservation District I want to wish all a safe and joyous season.

California mandates 100-percent zero-emission bus fleet

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — California moved Friday to eliminate fossil fuels from its fleet of 12,000 transit buses, enacting a first-in-the-nation mandate that will vastly increase the number of electric buses on the road.

Board voted to require that all new buses be carbon-free by 2029. Environmental advocates project that the last greenhouse-gas-emitting buses will phase out by 2040.

While clean buses cost more than the diesel and natural gas

vehicles they'll replace, advocates of the mandate say they have lower maintenance and fuel costs. Supporters hope creating demand for thousands of clean buses will bring down the price of those buses and eventually

GM says it has 2,700 jobs for workers slated to be laid off

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors' plans to lay off 14,000 salaried and blue-collar workers might not be as bad as originally projected.

The company said Friday that 2,700 out of the 3,300 U.S. factory jobs slated for elimination will now be saved. Blue-collar workers will still lose jobs at four U.S. plants slated for closure next year, but most will be able to find employment at other GM factories where jobs are being added. Some would have to relocate.

GM still plans to lay off about 8,000 white-collar workers and another 2,600 factory workers in Canada.

In November, the company announced plans to end production at the U.S. factories and one in Ontario as part of a major restructuring designed to cut costs and divert resources to development and manufacturing of trucks, SUVs and electric and autonomous vehicles.

Legislators and President Donald Trump have hammered GM over the moves.

While some of the 3,300 U.S. factory workers will retire, most of the rest will be offered one of 2,700 jobs the company plans to add at factories where production will increase, GM

announced on Friday. Some would have to move to other cities for jobs.

"Our focus remains on providing interested employees options to transition including job opportunities at other GM plants," CEO Mary Barra said about the factory workers in a statement Friday.

That still leaves the majority of the cuts hitting white-collar workers. A small number will be able to transfer to other openings, and those who can't will get help in finding work elsewhere, the company said.

Since the announcement, GM has faced withering criticism from Trump, legislators from affected states and the United Auto Workers union, largely over the plant closure plans. Trump has focused on a plant in Lordstown, Ohio, that's slated to stop making compact cars on March 1. He has promised to return factory jobs to the U.S. and Ohio, a key state in his 2020 re-election campaign.

GM is cutting six car models as buyers have dramatically shifted their preferences to SUVs and trucks, which will account for about 70 percent of new-vehicle sales this year. Just six years ago, that number was 51 percent, so now

GM has too many factories making cars.

The automaker's attempt to close the factories still has to be negotiated with the United Auto Workers union, which has promised to fight back. Other factories that could go are assembly plants in Detroit and Oshawa, Ontario, and transmission plants in Warren, Michigan, and near Baltimore.

Patrick Morrissey, a GM spokesman, said Friday's job announcement had nothing to do with the criticism the company has been facing. The automaker, he said, knew some of the laid-off workers would be placed at other plants, but it didn't know the number of jobs available until this week.

"We have opportunities for just about everybody who wants them," Morrissey said.

Tommy Wolikow, 36, who was laid off from the Lordstown factory in January of 2017, said he would be interested in openings at a factory in Toledo, Ohio, and a plant in Tennessee. But he's not happy about the prospect of moving. "I want to go back to Lordstown," he said. "The last thing I want to do is uproot my family and leave my parents."

Under GM's contract with the union, more senior active workers

at the four factories targeted for closure will get first crack at transferring to another plant. There may not be enough jobs for workers with less seniority. Of the 3,300 factory workers slated to lose their jobs, 2,800 are active and 500 are on leave. In addition, there are about 830 who were laid off previously at the Lordstown and Detroit plants.

Morrissey said the number of workers placed in new posts depends a lot on how many senior factory workers decide to retire. About 1,200 are eligible.

Some workers also could decide they don't want to relocate because of the distance. For instance, Toledo is the closest plant to Lordstown with jobs available, but it's about 160 miles away.

GM said jobs will be added mainly at truck and SUV plants including about 1,000 at a Flint, Michigan, factory that makes heavy-duty pickup trucks. The company wouldn't release exact numbers but said several hundred will be added at each of four other assembly plants in Arlington, Texas; Bowling Green, Kentucky; Spring Hill, Tennessee; and Lansing, Michigan. In addition, jobs will be added at a transmission plant in Toledo, Ohio.

Another 50 will be added at a casting plant in Bedford, Indiana. Despite Friday's announcement, the criticism of GM continued from politicians and workers.

Ohio Republican Sen. Rob Portman said the transfers may be helpful for employees who are willing to move, but many are unable to. He said in a statement that he will continue "to urge GM to do the right thing by these workers and bring new production to this plant."

Dave Green, president of the auto workers local at the Lordstown plant, says he's still hoping the factory can stay open by

getting a new vehicle to build. Although the job transfers will help laid-off workers, he said they will do nothing for the area of Northeast Ohio that has already been devastated by job losses over the years.

Wolikow isn't sure if he has enough time in with GM to get a transfer to another plant. He has found work as a diesel engine technician, but it pays \$10 per hour less than the \$28 per hour plus profit sharing that he'd be making if he was still working for GM.

"It's hard not to follow the money," he said. "You know that you can make a great living, have a great career."

other heavy-duty vehicles like trucks.

California has 153 zero-emission buses on the road today with hundreds more on order. Most of them are electric, though technology also exists for buses powered by hydrogen fuel cells.

"Every state could do a strategy like this," said Adrian Martinez, an attorney for Earthjustice, an environmental legal group that supports the rule. "This is something that California did first because we have major air quality and pollution problems, but this is something other states could pursue.

Existing state and federal subsidies are available to help transit agencies absorb some of the higher costs of carbon-free buses, along with money from the state's settlement with Volkswagen over the German automaker's emission-cheating software.

In approving the mandate, air board members cited both a reduction in greenhouse gas emissions and improved air-quality along heavily trafficked transit corridors in smog-polluted cities.

The transportation sector accounts for 40 percent of California's greenhouse gases, and those emissions are rising even as electrical emissions have fallen substantially.

California needs to drastically transportation emissions to meet its aggressive climate-change goals.

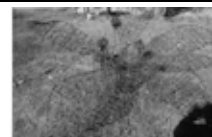

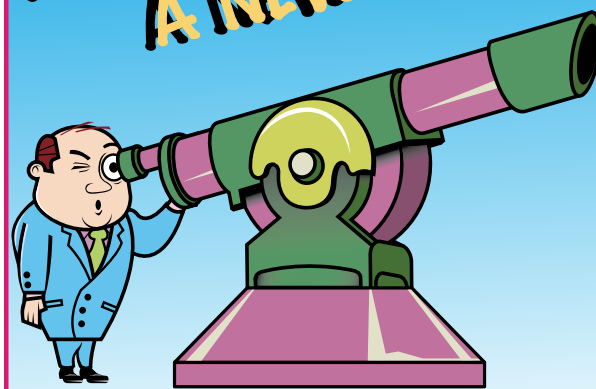

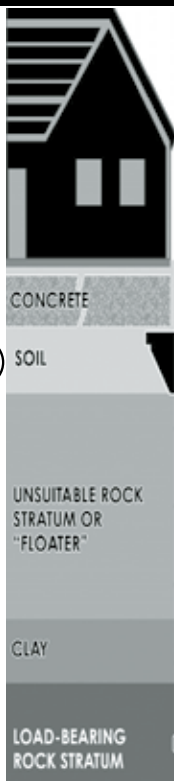

Declarer does not have the advantage of seeing the defenders' cards when he is playing a hand, but he is nevertheless expected to do as well in the majority of deals as if he had actually seen the opposing hands.

In most situations, declarer does not have much trouble meeting this goal. Many hands play themselves, so to speak, and declarer attains par without much bother. But other hands do require a modicum of skill, and it

is these that pose a challenge to the serious student of the game.

To demonstrate, take this case where South finds himself in five hearts and gets a chance to display his wares. After a spade lead, how should declarer play the hand?

If we examine the East-West cards, it seems South is destined to go down regardless of what he does. He takes two club finesses, both of which lose, and, since a diamond loser is inescapable, he finishes down one.

This result can be attributed to bad luck, of course, but actually, South should not rely on the hope that one of the club finesses will win. He should adopt the line of play that guarantees the contract regardless of how the defenders' cards are divided.

The issue can be settled at trick one. On the king-of-spades lead, South plays low from dummy and discards a diamond from his hand! West's next play does not matter. Let's assume he leads another spade.

Declarer discards another diamond on the ace, cashes the ace of diamonds and ruffs a diamond. He then crosses to dummy with a trump and ruffs dummy's last diamond.

The stage is now set for a surefire endplay. Dummy is entered with a trump, and a club is led and finessed. West wins, but whatever he returns gives declarer the contract.

"It's going to be talked about, and hopefully people pull out their phones and it goes viral because that's my favorite show, 'Mystère' by Cirque Du Soleil. I know I was a great athlete, but these guys are some of the finest athletes in the world. Every time I'm in Vegas for the past several years I always hit up a show."

Pain, plus Grammy-award winning producer and DJ Diplo. O'Neal also will perform a set as DJ Diesel. The Fun House also will feature a carnival midway and food from Atlanta restaurants.

"There's two things that bring people closer together despite what's going on in the country," O'Neal said. "That's sports and music, and I happen to dominate in both. So when I was putting this together I was saying, 'OK, I want part music festival. I want a carnival. I want to do it on a nice, big platform, and I want to have fun doing it.'"

O'Neal said he learned approximately a thousand people couldn't get into his Miami party, which was secret invite only earlier this year. That's why this party will be held at Live! At Battery Park at Sun-Trust Park, home of Major League Baseball's Atlanta Braves. A limited number of tickets will be available to the general public for this party starting Thursday morning beginning at \$249.99, with VIP tickets for \$999 for access to a fast entrance and other VIP areas.

"We're going to have a good time," O'Neal said.

4 journalists and a newspaper are Time's Person of the Year

Time magazine named four journalists and a newspaper on Tuesday as its 2018 Person of the Year for what it said was standing up for the truth in the face of persecution and violence.

The group, which Time called "the guardians," consists of slain Saudi journalist Jamal Khashoggi; the Capital Gazette in Annapolis, Maryland, where five people were shot to death at the newspaper's offices in June; Philippine journalist Maria Ressa, who has been arrested; and Reuters journalists Wa Lone and Kyaw Soe Oo, who have been detained in Myanmar for nearly a year.

"They are representative of a broader fight by countless others around the world — as of Dec. 10, at least 52 journalists have been murdered in 2018 — who risk all to tell the story of our time," Editor-in-Chief Edward Felsenthal wrote in an essay.

Time selected them "for taking great risks in pursuit of greater truths, for the imperfect but essential quest for facts that are central to civil discourse, for speaking up and speaking out."



Khashoggi was killed two months ago when The Washington Post columnist, who had lived in the U.S., visited Saudi Arabia's consulate in Turkey for paperwork so he could get married. He had been critical of the Saudi regime.

Ressa is an award-winning Philippine journalist who, along with the online news service she heads, has been accused of tax evasion. Her website has been critical of the government of Philippines President Rodrigo Duterte, and she claims the charges are politically

motivated.

Wa Lone and Kyaw Soe Oo have been imprisoned for nearly a year in Myanmar after investigating a massacre of Rohingya Muslims.

Four journalists and a sales assistant were killed by a gunman at the Capital Gazette newspaper last spring.

Forty-six journalists worldwide were killed in 2017, according to data collected by the Committee to Protect Journalists. The nonprofit group reported 50 deaths in 2016 and 73 in 2015. There were 262 journalists imprisoned worldwide in 2017.

Since 1927, Time has selected individuals or groups to appear on its cover for the end-of-the-year feature. This was the first time someone named was no longer alive. Those

chosen this year will appear in four different cover photos.

President Donald Trump, who was chosen Person of the Year in 2016, was runner-up. "His ultimate impact may be determined as much by the resistance he engenders as by the goals he pursues," the magazine said.

Special counsel Robert Mueller, who is leading the investigation into contacts between Trump associates and Russia, was the next runner-up.

'Lidia Celebrates America: A Heartland Holiday Feast' salutes rural communities

Lidia Bastianich sees food as a universal language and a way of bringing people of disparate backgrounds and viewpoints together.

Which is why she chose Middle America as the subject and setting for her latest "Lidia Celebrates America" installment, titled "A Heartland Holiday Feast."

"I wanted to get to know more and more of America and I do that with food," she explains. "What I found out was America truly is a patchwork of different cultures which found the comfort, which were given the opportunity to come to live, whether it's their parents or grandparents, find the freedom - whatever it is, religious, political - and become part of America but still keep their tradition alive."

In the hourlong program, which airs Tuesday, Dec. 18, on PBS (check local listings), the renowned chef and author visits in a pie crust across the country to explore their diverse culinary traditions and how the food itself helps to shape and preserve the identities of the people and places. Returning to her own home, she then prepares a holiday feast for family and friends that's inspired by these travels.

Among the locales she visits is Natchitoches, La., to learn about Creole cooking; Wausau, Wis., home to a thriving Hmong community of Laotian and Vietnamese refugees; Sunbury, Pa., to retrace her rural roots in Pennsylvania Dutch country; and Walker, Minn., a largely Swedish and Norwegian community where she got to

experience ice fishing and catch and cook a local fish known as eelpout.

"I'd never done that before and I loved it," she says. "This lake was completely frozen and it became like a small town - all these little tents and little houses that they have on the lake. It's amazing. And then they make this hole right in the floor of the house and they stood there and they fished for eelpout. ... This eelpout resembled very much cod and we made fritters with it and it was delicious."

"It was like a big party," she continues. "We had dog-sleigh rides and all kinds of good food and getting together."

In Sunbury, Bastianich revisited the Central Pennsylvania burg where she spent a year in high school in the late 1950s. Here, she connected with a local chef known for her shoo-fly pie, a molasses crumb cake baked in a pie crust.

"We made shoo-fly pie together," she says. "What's interesting about this is that I get into their family, into their culture and then they teach me, you know, food is the way to connect with people."

"Food is the basic of life," she continues. "You wish somebody well. You wish somebody to be full, to be nourished and so when you talk food people really open up. So I went to visit her house and we made shoo-fly pie together and it brought me right back to when I was there as a teenager spending my sophomore year at Sunbury High School."
