It's almost time for your annual opportunity to enjoy a glass of beer or wine for a great cause. The Fourth Annual Pints For Polio is coming up March 23, and plans are well underway for the event. Organizer Barney Dodd said the event, put on each year by the Greater Big Spring Rotary Club, is going to be bigger and better than ever this year. Dodd said local beer distribut-

ers have stepped up to provide more different types of beer for your tasting pleasure than ever before. "It's going great. We have Glazer's who will be coming in with 35 different brands, and we have Ben E. Keith who will be coming in with another 10 to 12 brands," said Dodd. "So instead of 30-something brands we'll be having more than 40 different varieties of beer, and ales and ciders. And then we'll also have wine from Llano Estacado."

Escamilla also said everyone who attends will be entered to win a drawing for

some "Relay swag."

"We need need help planning the 2019 Relay For Life event and for more people to join in. We need to bring this event back to it's former glory, and we can't do it without volunteers," said Escamilla. "It's so sad that this event used to be HUGE. It generated \$200,000 for the Relay for Life, had thousands of walkers, and last year we generated only \$89,000 and had much less walkers."

As the largest voluntary health organization in the United States, the American Cancer Society is passionately committed to saving lives from cancer, but there must be volunteers to make it happen.

"I think what's happening is the older generations are having to step down and nobody is stepping up," said Escamilla. "Volunteers give their time and effort because they believe it's time to take action against cancer."

Teresa Darden, Executive Assistant of the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation (EDC), said Howard County Day is a way to show that Big Spring's leadership and citizens are interested in the decisions the legislature makes that affect our area.

"We like to be able to show our support to our legislators, as well," she said.

"The goal is to remind our legislators in the House and Senate that we're still alive and kickin' out here in West Texas," said Terry Wegman, Executive Director of the Big Spring EDC. "There are more representative east of I-35 than all of West Texas combined. We've only got about 10 percent of the representation in the state, so it's very important that we have a good relationship with our representatives. polio eradication effort End Polio Now, has outgrown its venue, the Courtyard event venue in downtown Big Spring.

"We kind of outgrew it last year. We were pretty tight," Dodd said. "This year we're going to have the Courtyard as well as Main Street out in front of the Courtyard. We'll have live

music and a tent outside."

Dodd said that, while the entertainment will be outside, the Courtyard will still be the location for both the live and silent auctions.

"We'll have lots of Cowboys memorabilia," he said. "We have a helmet signed by Hall of Famer Randy White with all of his stats written in his handwriting on there. I have a football signed by Jerry Jones and Jimmy Johnson, which is very rare after their breakup. But the football

has both their signatures on it. We're excited about that. We'll have both those items, as well as some jerseys and some items donated by local businesses."

Dodd said half the money raised will go to help fund projects locally, while the other half will go to End Polio Now.

"That money that goes to End Polio Now is matched two-to-one by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, he said. "So for every one dollar that we

send in, three dollars goes to End Polio Now."

The Greater Big Spring Rotary Club is still working on a date for the start of ticket sales.

"We're still working on that," Dodd said. "I'd say about mid-February we'll start selling tickets."

Police: 3 dead, 4 injured in bowling alley shooting



Brandon Tyre, 31, told the Los Angeles Times that he was inside celebrating a friend's birthday when he heard fighting, then the sound of gunshots. He turned to find his brother had been shot in the chest. The brother's condition is unknown.

Witness Dana Scott, whose bowling league was meeting Friday night, told CNN: "A lot of people ran back into the bar area — behind the seats and onto the floor, under the benches. People were crying. It was not comfortable."

Investigators were at the scene Saturday trying to "identify the suspects and whoever else was involved," Harris said.

Damone Thomas was in the karaoke section of the bowling alley, a regular stop for him and his friends after work on Fridays, when people ran in saying there was a shooting. The 30-year-old Los Angeles resident said his friend flipped over one of the tables to shield them as they heard gunshots.

Thomas said he didn't feel scared because he was "just trying to survive." But when he was driving back home, he said he realized how traumatic the situation was and said he hasn't been able to fall asleep. "Closing my eyes, all I can see is the women against the wall crying, not knowing what to do," he said.

Both Thomas and Hamad said they had never witnessed any violence there in the past, but Hamad said he had stopped going for a while because he heard someone with a gun was recently seen there.

"I definitely won't be going back anymore," he added.

A late-night fight at a suburban Los Angeles bowling alley turned deadly late Friday night, killing three men and injuring four.

Police in the coastal city of Torrance responded shortly after midnight to calls of "shots fired" at the Gable House Bowl, which is described on its website as a gaming venue that offers bowling, laser tag and an arcade. They found seven people with gunshot wounds.

Three men were pronounced dead at the scene and two others were taken to a hospital with injuries, said police spokesman Sgt. Ronald Harris. Two other men were struck by gunfire but "opted to seek their own medical attention," Harris said.

Authorities have not released details about what led to the shooting, but witnesses said it stemmed from a fight between two large groups of people at the bowling alley.

Wes Hamad, a 29-year-old Torrance resident, was at the bowling alley with his 13-year-old niece and cousin when he saw a "huge fight" break out. Hamad said the brawl, which lasted about five minutes, blocked the entrance of Gable House Bowl and devolved into "complete chaos."

"I grabbed my niece and started running toward the far end of the bowling alley," he said. "As we were running, we heard 15 shots."

As he was leaving, Hamad said he saw a woman weeping over a man who was had multiple gunshot wounds in his head and neck.

Funeral will be held in California for slain police officer

MODESTO, Calif. (AP)

— Funeral services will be held in central California Saturday for Cpl. Ronil Singh, the police officer who authorities say was shot to death by a man in the country illegally.

Singh was killed Dec. 26 when he pulled over a suspected drunk driver.

Just hours earlier, the 33-year-old officer had been home celebrating Christmas with his wife, 5-month-old son and K-9 dog before starting his night shift.

An intense, dayslong manhunt led to the arrest of a man who authorities said was preparing to flee to Mexico. Gustavo Perez Arriaga, also 33, has been charged with murder and seven others arrested on suspicion of helping him evade authorities.

The case has rekindled a debate over California's sanctuary law that limits cooperation by local authorities with federal immigration authorities. President Donald Trump has cited Singh's killing to call for tougher border se-

curity amid a fight with congressional Democrats over funding for a border wall, which has forced a partial government shutdown.

Trump mentioned at a news conference Friday that he called Singh's family to offer his condolences.

Singh, who emigrated from his native Fiji to pursue a career in law enforcement, joined the 12-member Newman police force in 2011.

On Friday, his casket was draped in an American flag and driven about 25 miles in a procession from Modesto into a theater in the small town of Newman for a viewing. People lined up along the streets to honor the fallen officer.

He will be remembered at a memorial service Saturday at a community church in Modesto. After that, Singh's body will be taken on a procession to its final resting place at Lakewood Memorial Park in the nearby town of Hughson.

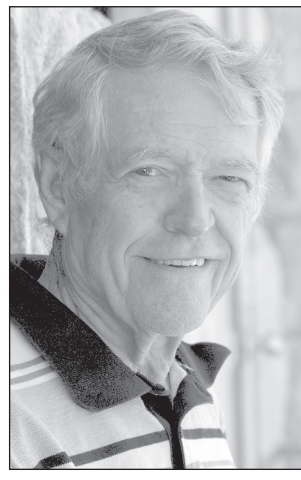
Daffodils and crepe myrtles

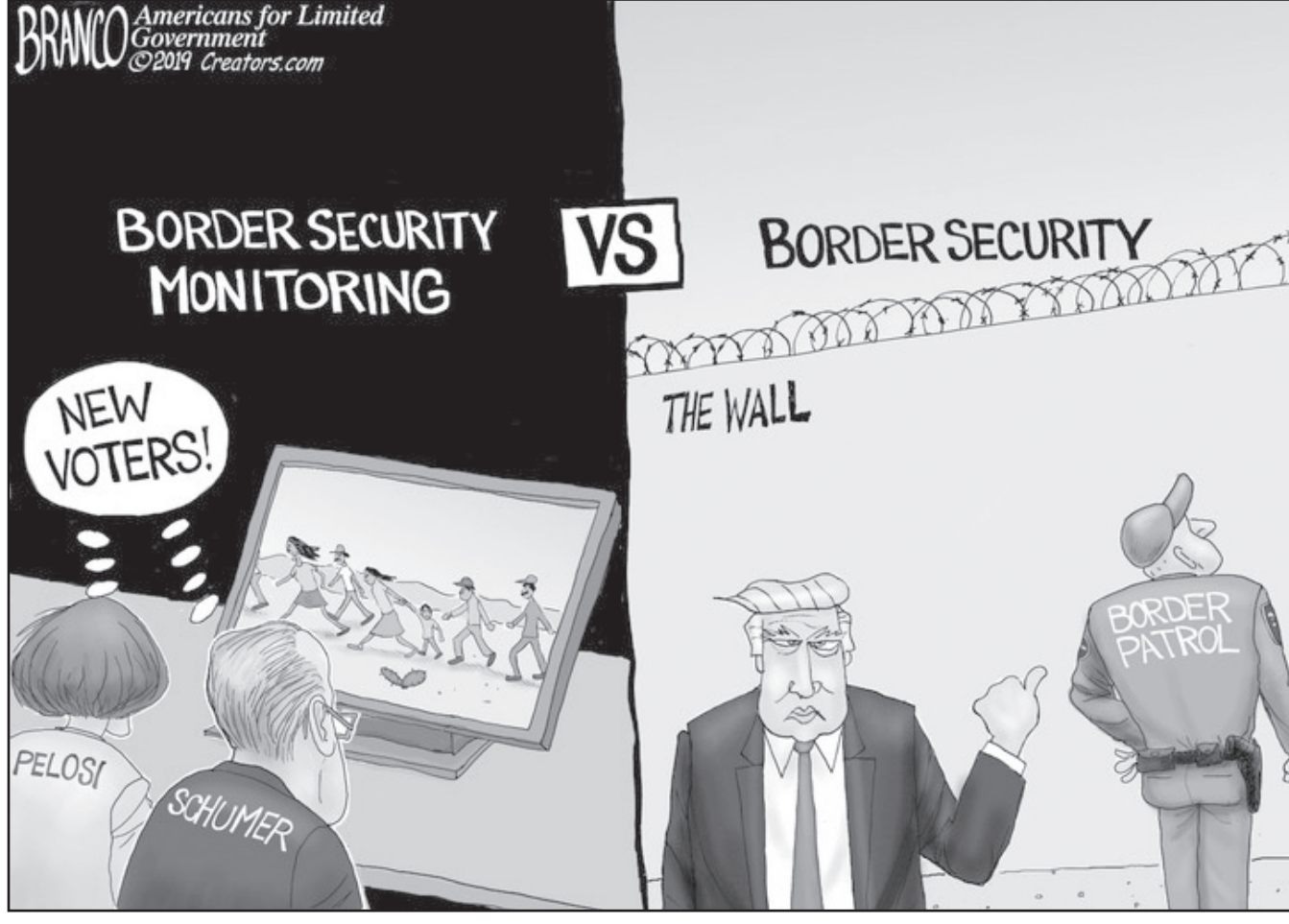
"My chair said, 'let's order 5,000 crepe myrtles.' I said I was thinking about just one thou-

Mormons in the news...

I don't know much about the Mormon Church, but I've always viewed most adherents as being generous with both their gifts and their time.

They number some 15 million worldwide, and in Utah--where about two million of three million citizens are Mormons--there's considerable "co-mingling" of issues at both the state house and the church house. (Since Utah attained statehood in 1896, all of its governors--save two--have been Mormons.)

Most "church news" is spawned during semi-annual meetings, but a surprising new law from the state house kicked in on January 1. Permissible blood alcohol content for drivers is now 0.05 percent, the lowest of any state. driving while drinking. They believe their constituents agree. Decades ago, Utah was first to lower the limit to 0.08 percent.

Officials in several states have discussed the possibility of lowering DUI alcohol blood level percentages to 0.05, like Utah, and four states put it to vote.

The measure was voted down in Washington, Hawaii, Delaware and New York....

This week's reviews are all mystery.

The Minneapolis private detective, Nils Shapiro is back for another thrilling stand-alone adventure in "Broken Ice" (M GOL M) by Matt Goldman. When Nils Shapiro is shot through the arm with an arrow, he knows he is getting closer to discovering what happened to missing teenager Linnea Engstrom. He should be in the hospital recovering from his near-fatal injury, but the clock is ticking. Linnea could be anywhere, and someone doesn't want her found. As bodies start piling up, the clues lead Nils and his partner, Anders Ellegaard, north to Warroad, a small, quiet town with many secrets to hide.

Seattle homicide detective Tracy Crosswhite is plunged into a case

of family secrets and murder in "A Steep Price" (M DUG R) by Robert Dugoni. Called in to consult after a young woman disappears, Tracy Crosswhite has the uneasy feeling that this is no ordinary missing-persons case. When the body turns up in an abandoned well, Tracy's suspicions are confirmed. Estranged from her family, the victim had balked at an arranged marriage and had planned to attend graduate school. But someone cut her dreams short. Solving the mystery behind the murder isn't Tracy's only challenge. The detective is keeping a secret of her own: she's pregnant. And now her biggest fear seems to be coming true when a new detective arrives to replace her. Meanwhile, Tracy's colleague Vic Fazio is about to take a fall after his investigation into the murder of a local community activist turns violent and leaves an invaluable witness dead. Two careers are on the line. And when more deadly secrets emerge, jobs might not be the only things at risk.

Intricately layered and told by multiple voices across time, "The Clockmaker's Daughter" (M MOR K) by Kate Morton is a kaleidoscopic story of murder, mystery, and thievery, of art, love and loss. In the summer of 1862, a group of young artists led by the charismatic and talented Edward Radcliffe descends upon Birchwood Manor on the banks of the Upper Thames. Their plan: to spend a se-

cluded summer month in a haze of inspiration and creativity. But by the time their stay is over, one woman has been shot dead while another has disappeared; a priceless heirloom is missing; and Edward Radcliffe's life is in ruins. More than one hundred and fifty years later, Elodie Winslow, a young archivist in London, uncovers a leather satchel containing two

seemingly unrelated items: a sepia photograph of a beautiful woman in Victorian clothing, and an artist's sketchbook containing the drawing of a twin-gabled house on the bend of a river. Why does Birchwood Manor feel so familiar to Elodie? And who is the mysterious unidentified woman in the photograph? As Elodie pursues these clues, the lives of the many people who have passed through

the house are revealed. There is Radcliffe, whose love affair with his model and muse consumes him; his sister Lucy, who opens a school for young ladies; Leonard Gilbert, a soldier and scholar who retreats to Birchwood after World War I to heal and to write a biography of Radcliffe; a young widow who takes refuge there with her small children during the Blitz; and, in the present day, Jack Rolands, who has come from far away to search for lost treasure and who meets Elodie when she eventually arrives at the house. Flowing through its pages like a river is the voice of a woman who

stand outside time, whose name has been forgotten by history, but who has watched it all unfold: Birdie Bell, the clockmaker's daughter.

A spellbinding standalone "The Witch Elm" (M FRE T) by Tana French asks what we become, and what we're capable of, when we no longer know who we are. Toby is an easygoing charmer who has dodged a scrape at work and is celebrating with friends when the night takes a turn that will change his life - he surprises two burglars who beat him and leave him for dead. Struggling to recover from his injuries, beginning to understand that he might never be the same man again, he takes refuge at his family's ancestral home to care for his dying uncle. Then a skull is found in the trunk of an elm tree in the garden - and as detectives close in, Toby is forced to face the possibility that his past may not be what he has always believed.

3 members of Mississippi family killed in Texas wreck

SHAMROCK, Texas (AP) — Authorities say three members of a Mississippi family were killed and three others injured when their SUV slid off a slick Texas Panhandle highway and struck an oncoming vehicle.

Texas Department of Public Safety Sgt. Cindy Barkley says 35-year-old Elizabeth Johanson of Cleveland, Mississippi, was driving too fast in wintry weather when the SUV careened off Interstate 40 near Shamrock on Thursday.

The SUV crossed the median, traveled into westbound traffic and struck a recreational vehicle carrying a California couple.

Johanson and her husband, 35-year-old Adam Johanson, died at a hospital. Their 10-year-old daughter died at the scene.

Two of their other children, one 3 and the other 5, were taken to a hospital with life-threatening injuries. A 12-year-old daughter was treated and released.

The California couple was not injured.

League City settles suit filed by former Missouri city manager

JOPLIN, Mo. (AP) — A Houston-area city has agreed to pay \$145,000 to settle a free-speech lawsuit with its former city manager who took the job after he was fired from the southwest Missouri city of Joplin after a deadly tornado.

The Joplin Globe reports that Mark Rohr was hired in League City, Texas, in 2014. The Joplin City Council fired him in a split vote after an investigator's report described him as a vindictive manager who couldn't get along with department heads.

Person of interest in slaying of 3 Texas children charged

TEXAS CITY, Texas (AP) — The father of one of three children found shot to death in Southeast Texas was charged Friday with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, police said, but has not been named a suspect in the killings.

Texas City Police Department said in a statement that 27-year-old Junaid Hashim Mehmood was arrested late Thursday, just hours after the slain children and their wounded mother were discovered by officers in an apartment in Texas City. The mother, 24-year-old Kimaria Nelson, had been shot in the head.

Mehmood had earlier been identified as a person of interest in the shootings, but he was arrested on an unrelated warrant. Police provided no information on the incident that led to the assault charge.

Police have not identified Mehmood as a suspect in the killings but said more charges would come Friday. He was being held without bond.

Police officers responding to a request for a wel-

fare check at an apartment in Texas City Thursday evening discovered the bodies of 1-month-old Ashanti Mehmood, Prince Larry Brown, who would have turned 2 later this month, and 5-year-old Angela Pilot. Nelson was alive but unable to speak, police said.

Mehmood is Ashanti's biological father and lived with the family at the apartment where the children were killed, police said. Texas City is about 50 miles (80 kilometers) southeast of Houston.

Nelson was taken the University of Texas Medical Branch in nearby Galveston. Police said she was in stable condition Thursday evening. A hospital spokesman said Friday he had no information for a patient by her name.

Houston-area legislator out of jail in time for new session

CONROE, Texas (AP) — A Houston-area lawmaker and attorney who was convicted of illegally soliciting clients and won re-election while in jail has been freed just days before the Texas Legislature convenes.

Rep. Ron Reynolds was released Friday from the Montgomery County jail in Conroe after nearly four months behind bars.

The Democrat from Missouri City was convicted of misdemeanor barratry, so-called ambulance chasing charges, and was sentenced in 2015 to up to 12 months in jail. Appeals failed and he reported to jail Sept. 7.

Reynolds, who's served in the Texas House since 2011, was not required to resign from the elected office because the criminal case involved misdemeanor counts. He won re-election in November after running unopposed.

The Legislature convenes Tuesday in Austin.

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Powell says he would reject any Trump request to resign

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell said Friday that he will not resign if asked to do so by President Donald Trump, and that he is prepared to be patient in deciding when to raise interest rates again.

Both of those messages cheered stock market investors who had been worried about Trump's repeated attacks on his hand-picked choice to lead the nation's central bank and also the Fed's seemingly inexorable march to higher rates.

"There is no pre-set path for policy," Powell said during an appearance at a conference of economists in Atlanta. "With the muted inflation readings we have seen coming in, we will be patient as we watch to see how the economy evolves."

Private economists viewed Powell's comments as a strong signal that the Fed, which in December had projected another two rate hikes in 2019, may end up deciding to pause hikes for several months.

"With Chairman Powell's remarks today, I would say they will do just one hike or maybe no hikes this year," said Sung Won Sohn, chief economist at SS Economics. "Powell is definitely trying to calm the markets."

Wall Street, which opened sharply higher after a report showing 312,000 jobs gained in December, surged even higher during Powell's appearance. The Dow Jones industrial average finished the day up 746 points or 3.3 percent.

Powell called the jobs report "very strong" and said he was also encouraged by the rise in the labor force participation rate and gains in wages, which he said "for me at this time does not raise concerns about too high inflation."

Trump has complained that the Fed has pushed rates higher despite the fact that there is no evidence that inflation was getting out of control.

The president's attacks had become so intense that they had raised concerns that he might be considering firing Powell, a development which could send the market into a tailspin.

Trump would appear to be on shaky legal ground if he tried to fire Powell. Under the law that governs the Federal Reserve, a president can only remove a Fed chairman for cause. Courts in cases that involved other agencies have interpreted that language to not cover policy differences.

Asked if he would resign if Trump asked him to do so, Powell responded with a short "no."

signs the U.S. economy was cooling off a little.

On Friday, Powell said, "We are always prepared to shift the stance of policy and to shift it significantly if necessary" to meet the goals of maximum employment and stable prices.

Powell gave as an example the fact that in 2016, when Janet Yellen was Fed chair, the central bank began the year with a projection that it would raise rates four times that year but ended up raising rates only once because the economy hit a soft patch.

Appearing on a panel with his two predecessors — Yellen and Ben Bernanke — Powell also said that the Fed could alter its approach to trimming its huge balance sheet if it determines such a change is needed.

The pace of Fed rate hikes and the lowering of the balance sheet, which tends to put upward pressure on interest rates, had both been concerns of investors in recent months. The stock market has seen stomach-churning declines since October, a development that Trump has blamed on the Fed's continued rate hikes, although the president's trade dispute with China as well as concerns about global economic growth also played a part in the market volatility.

The Fed had increased the size of its balance sheet four-fold to a record \$4.5 trillion in an effort to push long-term interest rates lower. But it has been gradually reversing that stance over the past year, although the balance sheet still remains above \$4 trillion. But some investors have worried that that process could push long-term rates higher at a time when the economy was slowing.

Powell on Friday stressed that the Fed was prepared to adjust the pace at which it trimmed the balance sheet if necessary to support economic growth.

While Trump has sent out a number of tweets criticizing Powell and calling the Fed the biggest threat to the economy, Powell said that he had not received any direct pressure from the White House. Asked if he had had any face-to-face meetings with Trump, Powell said he had not although he said previous Fed leaders have had discussions from time to time with previous presidents.

Asked if any future meeting with Trump was scheduled, Powell said, "I have no news on that. Nothing is scheduled."

Impeachment talk flares after Democrats take power in House

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Nancy Pelosi had only been in office for a few hours when a handful of Democrats defied her persistent call not to begin the new Congress by talking about impeachment.

Just after Pelosi was sworn in Thursday, long-time Democratic Reps. Brad Sherman of California and Al Green of Texas introduced articles of impeachment against President Donald Trump. That evening, newly elected Rep. Rashida Tlaib of Michigan riled up a supportive crowd by calling the president a profanity and predicting that he will be removed from office.

Tension over impeachment is likely to be a persistent thorn for Pelosi, who will have to balance between a small, vocal group of the most liberal members of her caucus, who want to see Trump removed immediately, and the majority of her members who want to wait for special counsel Robert Mueller's Russia investigation to finish. Pelosi purposely avoided — and encouraged most fellow Democrats to avoid — any talk of impeachment during the election, believing there could be backlash from voters.

While eager to paint impeachment as the Democrats' only agenda, Trump has also expressed some worry both publicly and privately at the prospect. He has told confidants that he finds the impeachment talk somewhat unnerving, according to an outside adviser who spoke to him in recent days.

The president, who has long fashioned himself as the ultimate winner, told the confidant that he worried that impeachment, even if he retained office, would be a stain on his legacy. And while he thought the impeachment would rally his own base in the 2020 election it could hurt his standing with foreign leaders as he negotiates trade deals, according to the adviser.

While many Democrats might favor impeachment, those calling for it now are largely outliers. Most Democratic lawmakers listened to Pelosi and campaigned on kitchen table issues such as health care and jobs and prefer to keep them at the forefront of the party's focus.

Still, it will be hard for Pelosi to quiet some on her left flank who see their new majority as a direct challenge to Trump.

"Impeachment is on the table," Sherman said. "You can't take it off the table."

Tlaib, who represents a liberal district in Detroit, exclaimed at an event late Thursday that Democrats were going to "impeach the mother-----." She didn't back down Friday, tweeting that "I will always speak truth to power." She added the hashtag, "#unapologeticallyMe."

Her spokesman, Denzel McCampbell, said in a statement that Tlaib, one of only two Muslim women in Congress, "was elected to shake up Washington" and will not stay silent.

"The congresswoman absolutely believes he needs to be impeached. She ran and won by making this very clear to the voters in her district," McCampbell said.

Pelosi said Friday at an MSNBC town hall said she wouldn't censor her colleagues, and that Tlaib's language was no worse than things Trump has said.

Still, Pelosi said she didn't like the language and wouldn't use it. She said, as she has many times before, that the House shouldn't move to impeach Trump without more facts and that she believes impeachment is divisive.

The prospect of that division delights Republicans, who have used impeachment calls to fire up their base of voters. Trump immediately seized on the topic, asking in a tweet Friday, "How do you impeach a president who has won perhaps the greatest election of all time, done nothing wrong?"

Speaking later Friday to reporters in the Rose Garden, Trump said he thought Tlaib's comments were "disgraceful" and she "dishonored herself."

At a meeting at the White House Friday on the government shutdown, Trump opened his remarks with his concerns about impeachment, according to a White House official and a tweet from Pelosi's spokesman Drew Hammill.

Trump said that Pelosi assured him during the meeting that "we're not looking to impeach you," and that he replied "that's good, Nancy, that's good."

Hammill later tweeted a slightly different recap: "Speaker Pelosi made clear that today's meeting was about re-opening government, not impeachment."

There has been some discussion in Trump's orbit about how to deal with a possible impeachment effort. Former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, who led impeachment efforts against President Bill Clinton two decades ago, encouraged conservatives to foster what he believes would be

Mother: Jazmine Barnes' killing was a hail of glass, bullets

HOUSTON (AP) — It was still dark outside when LaPorsha Washington drove her four daughters, including 7-year-old Jazmine Barnes, in the family's silver car at 6:30 a.m. Sunday to a grocery store on the eastern outskirts of Houston.

Each daughter was in her assigned seat in the family car, with Jazmine sitting behind her mother in the back seat.

Fifteen-year-old Alxis Dilbert, Washington's oldest daughter, was sitting in the front passenger seat when she noticed a red truck pull up beside their vehicle. She described the driver as a blue-eyed white man wearing a black hoodie and looking sickly.

The family, who is black, didn't give the truck a second thought

until it changed lanes, moving around from behind to the driver's side of Washington's vehicle and the driver opened fired. Washington was hit by gunfire in her arm. Jazmine was shot in the head and died at the scene.

"I didn't see anything but shattered glass and bullets coming toward my car," Washington said.

Authorities have yet to identify or find the man suspected of killing Jazmine, whose death her family and community activists believe was racially motivated. They say the attack is similar to an incident in the area in 2017 in which a suspect described as white shot into a vehicle carrying at least two black people. That shooting remains unsolved.

Harris County Sheriff Ed Gonzalez, whose agency is leading the investigation into Jazmine's death, said he is "not tone deaf"

to concerns Washington and her children were shot at because of their race. But investigators have not determined a motive and their focus remains on catching the killer, he said.

A composite sketch of the driver and surveillance video of his truck was released on Thursday and a reward for information leading to his arrest has climbed to \$100,000. Jazmine's death has prompted an outpouring of support for her family from across the country, including celebrities and sports stars. A community rally to show support for Jazmine's family was planned for Saturday. Her funeral is set for Tuesday.

"It's just amazing how ... this beautiful angel, 7 years old, just touched so many lives and her

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Navy SEAL accused of killing ISIS teen will plead not guilty



against an elite special warfare operator and because prosecutors' case includes the accounts of fellow Navy SEALs, an extremely tight-knit group even by military standards.

Stackhouse said his client is being falsely accused by disgruntled SEALs who wanted to get rid of a demanding platoon leader. Gallagher was awarded the Bronze Star twice.

Navy prosecutors have painted a picture of a highly trained fighter and medic going off the rails on his eighth deployment, indiscriminately shooting at Iraqi civilians and stabbing to death a captured Islamic State fighter estimated to be 15 years old, then posing with his corpse at his re-enlistment ceremony.

If convicted, the 19-year Navy veteran faces life in prison.

At a two-day preliminary hearing at the Navy base in November, investigators said Gallagher stabbed the teen in the neck and body with a knife after he was handed over to the SEALs in the Iraqi city of Mosul to be treated for wounds sustained by the Iraqi Army and its prisoners during an airstrike in May 2017.

Naval Criminal Investigative Service Special Agent Joe Warpinski told the court that a SEAL medic told him he believed he had just stabilized the teen when Gallagher "walked up without saying anything at all" and started stabbing him.

Afterward, prosecutors say he took photos of himself with the corpse, holding up his knife in one hand and propping up the body by holding the head with his other hand. He also posed with the body during his re-enlistment ceremony captured in the footage, Warpinski said.

Warpinski said that when another SEAL questioned Gallagher, he replied, "I was working on him, and he just died." Gallagher's attorney also indicated to the court that

the teen died from injuries from the airstrike.

Warpinski, who spoke to nine members of SEAL Team 7, said he was told Gallagher would fire into crowds of Iraqis. He is accused of shooting an elderly man carting a water jug in Mosul in June 2017 and a girl walking along a riverbank in the same area a month later.

Investigators told the court that Gallagher had threatened to publicly name fellow SEALs if they reported his actions.

Warpinski said some SEALs were so concerned that they did not tell him his sniper rifle settings were off so his shooting would be less accurate and they would fire warning shots to clear away civilians.

There has been speculation that the case may widen to implicate others for not reporting what they witnessed.

Prosecutors have already accused Gallagher's platoon commander, Navy Lt. Jacob Portier, of not acting on the allegations. His attorney, Jeremiah Sullivan, said Portier was the first to report them to superiors and did so as soon as he learned of them. His arraignment has not been scheduled yet.

Navy spokesman Brian O'Rourke said the case for now is focusing solely on Gallagher and Portier.

"There is zero interest in taking action against any witnesses at this time," O'Rourke said.

Stackhouse, Gallagher's attorney, said his client looks forward to clearing his name at trial.

"He's never run from a fight, and he's not going to run from this one," Stackhouse said.

The Navy SEALs Fund has raised more than \$200,000 through an online fundraiser for his defense.

"Eddie's record and reputation as an elite warrior is rivaled only by a few men who have served by his side as special warfare operators and heroes who have gone before him," according to the foundation's posting online.

counter-productive impeachment talk among Democrats. The 1998 battle backfired on Republicans, who were seen as overreaching while Clinton's poll numbers rose.

"Make it the speaker's problem, make her deal with the nutty wing of her party," Gingrich said in a recent interview with The Associated Press.

Top Democrats have so far supported Pelosi's cautious approach to impeachment, with House Judiciary Chairman Jerrold Nadler also saying that it is a divisive, even traumatic, process that should only be done with Republican support. Both Nadler and Pelosi were in Congress during Clinton's impeachment.

Sherman and Green forced votes to impeach Trump in 2017 and 2018, but the Republican House blocked those resolutions twice, with the help of many Democrats who said the effort was premature.

Even if the House should approve articles of impeachment — very unlikely at present — a two-thirds-majority vote to convict Trump in the Republican-led Senate and remove him from office would seem out of the question, barring new revelations or a dramatic decline in the president's political support.

Many Democrats on Friday distanced themselves from Tlaib's words. House Majority Leader Steny Hoyer said he doesn't think "comments like these particularly help." House Oversight and Reform Committee Chairman Elijah Cummings, D-Md., said the comments were "inappropriate" and go against efforts to reclaim civility.

Other Democrats were more forgiving, even if they disagreed.

"I think some of our new members probably don't realize that you are always on, that when you are a member of Congress, there's always someone listening," said Rep. Jan Schakowsky, D-Ill.

Virginia Rep. Gerry Connolly said the comments were just "red meat" for Tlaib's supporters.

"I think it's a forgivable sin, an outburst of exuberance with her and her supporters, and I think we all need to move on," he said. "It doesn't reflect the caucus, and I'm sure upon reflection, she might choose other words to describe her feelings."

SAN DIEGO (AP) — A decorated Navy SEAL is facing charges of premeditated murder and other crimes in the stabbing death of a teenage Islamic State prisoner under his care in Iraq last year and the shooting of unarmed Iraqi civilians.

Special Operations Chief Edward Gallagher planned to plead not guilty to all the charges Friday during an arraignment hearing at Naval Base San Diego, his attorney, Phil Stackhouse, said.

The judge said a trial will be held between Feb. 19 and March 1, and Gallagher agreed to a jury of one-third enlisted personnel. Attorneys also were discussing whether he might be released from the brig, where he has been held since his arrest on Sept. 11.

Pentagon asked for more help, concertina wire, on border

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Department of Homeland Security has asked the military to provide more help securing the U.S.-Mexico border, two defense officials said Friday amid a political standoff over President Donald Trump's demand for more money to build a border wall.

The acting secretary of defense, Pat Shanahan, has not decided how to respond to the DHS request, but in the past the Pentagon has provided help when asked. At one point last fall there were nearly 5,900 active-duty troops along the border in Texas, Arizona and California to assist border patrol agents and to erect wire barriers. That number now is about 2,350.

The defense officials said DHS asked for certain military capabilities, not any number of troops. It will be up to Shanahan to decide whether more active-duty troops are dispatched. The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because the request for assistance has not yet been fully processed.

One of the officials said DHS wants the military to put up concertina wire as barriers along 160 miles of border. That

would be in addition to 70 miles of concertina wire that combat engineers put up last fall. If the new work is taken on by the military, it might require an extension of the current deployment beyond its scheduled end Jan. 31. The official said DHS did not specifically ask for an extension, but it has not been ruled out.

The troops have been erecting and reinforcing border barriers but are not perform-

ing law enforcement tasks or engaging with migrants. Some also have been providing transportation and logistical help as well as medical assistance to troops and to Customs and Border Protection personnel along the border.

Many in Congress, including leading Democrats, have criticized the troop deployments as a waste of money and a misuse of military resources.

light shined very, very bright," Gonzalez said. "It's upon us as a community, as leaders, as just our humanity to find justice for Jazmine."

The sheriff's office tweeted on Friday that investigators have received "many potential leads" since releasing the sketch but declined to comment on any specific tips.

At a news conference on Thursday with Alxis, a tearful and emotional Washington recalled how she and her family were going to Joe V's Smart Shop near their home when their car came to rest at a stoplight on a feeder road next to a tollway. Nearby was a Walmart and strip malls with restaurants, banks, a Starbucks and other businesses.

Washington said her 13-year-old daughter, Ebonee Dilbert, who sat behind Alxis in the back seat, then noticed the truck go behind their car, change lanes and pull next to them on the driver's side.

Authorities have declined to say what type of weapon was used when the driver opened fire.

Washington said she can't remember how many shots were fired but "he emptied out his gun. I know that for a fact."

Washington said no words were ever exchanged between her and the driver and she doesn't believe this was a case of mistaken identity.

"We didn't do anything wrong to this man," Washington said. "This is something that I believe was a hate crime."

Washington described Jazmine, whose nickname was "Jaz," as a lovable person who enjoyed music, dressing up and trying to sit on her mother's lap while driving.

Jazmine, who was in second grade, had said she wanted to be a teacher when she grew up and was already practicing as she kept her 6-year-old sister in line.

"She was always bossing people around ... She liked to eat a lot," Alxis said of Jazmine.

Washington and Jazmine's father, Chris Cevilla, said they remain hopeful that their daughter's killer will be found.

"I won't stop. I won't quit. I don't care how long it takes," Cevilla said.

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — An Illinois company has won a \$92 million contract to deepen and widen the Corpus Christi Ship Channel to accommodate larger oil tankers.

The Port of Corpus Christi on Thursday announced the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers selected Great Lakes Dredge & Dock Company. The federal government and the Port of Corpus Christi are funding the overall \$360 million ship channel project.

Plans include expanding the Corpus Christi Ship Channel from the Gulf of Mexico to Harbor Island. The depth would increase from 47 feet (14 meters) to 54 feet (16 meters) from the jetties at the entrance to the channel.

The project comes amid replacement of the Harbor Bridge, which opened in 1959 and has a 138-foot (42 meters) clearance, with a larger span.

Local, state gas prices stay below \$2

Texas (AP) —As 2018 came to a close, Texans enjoyed low gasoline prices as global demand for the fuel fell and supplies increased. It's a trend that's continued into the new year, producing some of the lowest gas prices in the state in years.

Fuel-tracking service GasBuddy said the average price per gallon of regular unleaded gasoline in Texas today was \$1.90 per gallon. The state's average has been falling rapidly and is down 4 cents since Wednesday. It's down 34 cents since the same time last month, according to online price data. In Lamar county, the average is slightly higher at \$1.94 per gallon, though some Paris gas stations were offering regular gas for as low as \$1.82 per gallon. Average prices in surrounding counties was slightly lower, according to GasBuddy, with the average per gallon price in Red River County falling to \$1.91 and in Fannin County falling to \$1.85. Texas is one of nine states now seeing its average per gallon price of regular gas fall below the \$2 mark, according to motorist association AAA. Ameriprise estimates every 10-cent drop in average gas prices equates to about \$14 billion in consumer savings over the year, CNN reported. It sounds all well and good, but GasBuddy petroleum industry analyst Patrick DeHaan warns rapid declines in gas prices could strain the U.S. economy.

"Motorists shouldn't rejoice too much because what it means is the economy is maybe in more of a frail position than anticipated,"

DeHaan told the Associated Press. DeHaan said the price of crude oil fell from almost \$80

in October to just under \$50 by late December. The situation is caused in part by the United States easing sanctions against Iran in early November and by issuing waivers to China, India and more foreign countries allowing them to continue purchasing Iranian oil, DeHaan said.

"That effectively negated what could have been upward pressure on the price of oil," DeHaan said. "There's a connection between oil prices and economy. There's been no shortage of worries: economic growth, the trade battle with China. All of that is factored into the price of

oil. As goes the economy, goes gas prices." DeHaan added, however, the situation is so volatile, it can quickly change based on trade tensions between the United States and China. Tensions dying down, he said, could bring oil prices back to normal. As 2019 kicks off, gasoline demand is predicted to wane, a normal pattern following the busy travel of the holiday season. At the same time, OPEC began production cuts Tuesday

in an attempt to raise oil prices. The effectiveness of the cuts is not expected to become apparent for several months.

"All eyes are on OPEC to kick off the year," AAA spokesperson Jeanette Casselano said. "Many are waiting to see if they stick to their promise to cut crude production by 1.2-million barrels per day and if the proposed cuts will be enough to restore balance to the market." DeHaan predicts the "party at the pump" will likely wrap up by March because of OPEC's production cuts and the strong U.S. economy.

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Cowboys' Prescott seeks 1st playoff win vs Wilson, Seahawks

ARLINGTON, Texas — Russell Wilson won a wild-card game with Seattle as a rookie, a Super Bowl in his second season and another NFC championship the third time around.

The best Dak Prescott can hope for with the Dallas Cowboys is to join Wilson on that list of title winners in his third year, a quest that will start with the first playoff meeting of quarterbacks with quite a bit in common.

Both were mid-round draft picks who became instant NFL success stories. The difference is that Prescott lost his first playoff game after guiding the Cowboys to the top seed in the NFC two years ago, then had to wait two years for his second chance. It comes in a home wild-card game Saturday night.

"When you say success of a quarterback or a quarterback's success depending on what they do in the playoffs, I think that's where the checks are written and they make their money," Prescott said. "Our job is to win no matter what happens, no matter how you played individually. At the end of the day, it's to get the job done."

When Wilson finally missed the playoffs in his sixth season last year, the Seahawks were eliminated on the final weekend — after they bounced Prescott and the Cowboys from contention with a road win in Week 16.

Seattle was 0-2 this year when the season turned on a 24-13 win over the visiting Cowboys (10-6), with the Seahawks following a familiar formula from their Super Bowl days: an efficient Wilson, strong running game and playmaking defense.

The Seahawks (10-6) kept it up despite overhauling the roster, mostly notably dismantling key pieces of the "Legion of Boom" defense. An important exception has been linebacker Bobby Wagner, who was just selected an All-Pro for the fourth time in five

seasons.

"The great thing about this team is the fact that everybody was telling us we couldn't," Wilson said. "It shows the heart of this team and it shows the mindset of this team to be able to think the way that you want to think and the places that you want to go. To think big, to believe big."

Wilson was a third-round pick out of Wisconsin in 2012 and won the job in his first training camp. Prescott was drafted in the fourth round out of Mississippi State four years later and became the starter after preseason injuries to Tony Romo and backup Kelvin Moore.

In his first three years, Wilson won more games than any other NFL quarterback with 36. Prescott just finished tied for fifth on that list with 32. Two quarterbacks have an NFL-leading 24 games with at least a 100 passer rating in their first three seasons: Wilson and Prescott.

Now it's time for their third — and most meaningful — meeting, with Prescott looking to beat Wilson for the first time.

"Dak had a phenomenal year to get started and get rolling and has just been solid since," Seahawks coach Pete Carroll said. "I think it's the dynamics of the mobility that when you

add that together, and of course they can both throw the ball way down the field. You've got the same kind of problems."

RUN FIRST

Both teams figure to try to control the pace with their running games. Ezekiel Elliott just won the NFL rushing title for the second time in his three seasons, and Chris Carson heads a group of Seattle backs that led the NFL in rushing. The Cowboys were 10th, fueled by Elliott, and have had a top-10 defense most of the season led by pass rusher DeMarcus Lawrence and young playmaking linebackers Jaylon Smith and Leighton Vander Esch. Dallas was fifth against the run.

"We're feeling great," Elliott said. "I believe we have the best defense in football and a pretty good offense, a lot of weapons. I think we have the right recipe to make some noise."

WILD-CARD STREAK

Seattle has won six straight wild-card games, a streak that started when Romo, a first-year starter and still the holder, flubbed the snap on a potential go-ahead field goal in the final two minutes of the Seahawks' 21-20 home win during the 2006 season. Oddly enough during this streak, Seattle has lost every time in the divisional round.

ORIGINAL LINE

With left guard Xavier Su'a-Filo listed as doubtful because of an ankle injury, the Cowboys are likely to have this season's original starting offensive line before Su'a-Filo replaced injured rookie Connor Williams and kept the job.

The starters are left tackle Tyrion Smith, Williams, center Joe Looney, All-Pro right guard Zack Martin and right tackle La'el Collins. Looney has filled in all year for four-time Pro Bowler Travis Frederick, who was diagnosed with a nerve disorder during the preseason.

Texans, Colts meet in playoffs after turning around seasons

HOUSTON — Saturday's wild-card game between the Houston Texans and Indianapolis Colts is a matchup that seemed improbable early this season after Houston dropped its first three games and the Colts limped to a 1-5 start.

Instead of letting their tough starts lead to disappointing years, these teams which both finished 4-12 last season turned things around to lead the AFC South and charge into the postseason.

Houston's rebound began at the expense of the Colts (10-6) and it was thanks in part to a controversial call by Indianapolis coach Frank Reich in overtime. The game was tied 34-34 when, instead of punting on fourth-and-4 from his 43-yard line and likely settling for a tie, Reich called for a short pass from Andrew Luck to Chester Rogers. Luck's pass fell incomplete, Houston got a 24-yard completion on the next play, and Ka'imi Fairbairn made a 37-yard field goal as time expired to give the Texans (11-5) a 37-34 victory.

"We knew that to be able to come out on the winning end of that game was a big thing for us, but that's a long time ago," Houston coach Bill O'Brien said. "The teams have evolved over time, so it's a new ballgame now."

The win was the first of nine straight for Houston. The Texans didn't lose again until a visit from the Colts on Dec. 9, a 24-21 Indy victory. Houston then won two of its last three games, capped by a 20-3 victory over the Jaguars on Sunday to clinch the division — and become the sixth team since 1980 and first since 1998 to make the playoffs after a 0-3 start.

The Colts' loss to Houston in Week 4 was the second of four straight that dropped them to 1-5. Indianapolis then won its next five and nine of its last 10 to make its first playoff appearance since a 2014 AFC championship game loss at New England. Yes, the "Deflategate" game.

The Colts are the third team in NFL history to reach the postseason after losing five of the first six games.

These teams have more in common than their difficult starts. They're both led by a player making a comeback after an injury.

Luck returned after missing the 2017 season with a shoulder injury to throw for 4,593 yards and rank second in the NFL with 39 touchdown passes. His best games this season have come against Houston, piling up 863 yards passing with six touchdowns.

Trying to slow him down on Saturday will be Houston's comeback star J.J. Watt, who played all 16 games after starting just eight games combined in the previous two years because of back surgeries and a broken leg. Watt led the AFC with 16 sacks, had 25 quarterback hits, 18 tackles for losses and forced a career-high seven fumbles, which tied for most in the NFL.

Watt said Luck has been getting rid of the ball

quicker this season, which makes his job as a pass rusher much more difficult.

"You try and do different things, but at the end of the day, you try and get there, and if you can get your hands up, you get your hands up," he said. "You just try and get there. You can't really let it affect you, and you hope maybe he holds it for an extra second."

Some things to know about Houston's game against Indianapolis:

HILTON'S IN

Some of T.Y. Hilton's most memorable moments have come against the Texans — especially when

he visits Houston.

The Colts' top receiver has caught 41 passes for 933 yards with seven TDs in seven games at NRG Stadium, and in the last two trips to Houston Hilton has 14 receptions for 374 yards and two TDs. So even though he's been hobbled by a bad ankle, which he initially injured at Houston on Dec. 9, Hilton insists he'll be fine Sunday.

"That's probably why it's starting to feel better," Hilton joked earlier this week when asked about playing in Houston for the second time in a month.

DESHAUN'S DEBUT

Houston quarterback Deshaun Watson will make his playoff debut in his second year in the NFL. Don't expect the 12th overall pick in the 2017 draft to be daunted by the challenge after he played plenty of huge games at Clemson, highlighted by leading his team to the national title game twice. The Tigers lost to Alabama when Watson was a sophomore before he helped Clemson beat Alabama 35-31 for the 2016 national championship.

"It's just another opportunity for myself and this whole team to be able to show what we've got and put in the work," Watson said. "I've played in a lot of big games before in college and stuff, but you can't really pit college playoffs with the NFL. This is the hardest business, top-notch. It's a whole new season, a whole new speed of game. So it's going to be new for me (and) it's going to be a lot of fun."



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Hayward has 16 points, 11 rebounds, Celtics beat Mavs 114-93

BOSTON — Gordon Hayward followed up his top scoring game of the season with his best overall performance since coming to the Boston Celtics.

Gordon Hayward had 16 points, 11 rebounds and eight assists for the short-handed Celtics in a 114-93 victory over the Dallas Mavericks on Friday night.

"It was fun," said Hayward, who was coming off a season-high 35 points Wednesday night in a victory over Minnesota. "I think when we have good spacing, we have talented players and it just makes the game easier. If you make the right read, everybody gets involved and it's fun."

Jaylen Brown scored 21 points, Jayson Tatum added 18 points, and Al Horford had 10 points, eight rebounds and eight assists.

The Celtics won easily despite playing their second straight game with star guard Kyrie Irving sidelined by scratched corneas. Without Irving, the Celtics moved the ball around and had 35 assists on 42 field goals.

Hayward and Horford had eight apiece and Terry Rozier, who started for Irving, added seven assists for the Celtics.

"We've really tried to emphasize that all year," coach Brad Stevens said. "For the most part everybody was in a good rhythm and playing well together and seeking out the right shot. We've just got to keep doing that as much as possible."

Luka Doncic had 19 points and nine assists for Dallas. Harrison Barnes scored 20 points, and DeAndre Jordan had 12 points and 15 rebounds.

FOND FAREWELL?

Dirk Nowitzki, who received two standing ovations, was scoreless and had two rebounds for Dallas. Celtics fans chanted "Dirk! Dirk!" in the final minute, hoping he would make a shot in what might have been his final appearance in Boston.

"It's sweet when not only your home fans, but fans on the road appreciate what you've done for the last two de-

acades," Nowitzki said after going 0 for 10. "I appreciate the fans of Boston. Unfortunately, I'm really disappointed I couldn't even make one. I had some great looks."

Nowitzki said he hasn't made up his mind about a 22nd season, but was grateful to Boston's fans for the send-off they gave him if Friday was it.

"They're great sports fans. It's a great sports town. They know the game and they appreciate the game," Nowitzki said.

DOUBLE TIME

Hayward was flirting with his first career triple-double before going to the bench midway through the fourth quarter with Boston up by 22.

Hayward said he's never had a triple-double, but has thought about it.

"I'm big enough to see over the defense and make skip passes and those type of things. It's something I've been working on," Hayward said. "It's a little bit of a different role. I've always enjoyed making plays for others more than for myself. I like getting assists."

Hayward, who missed all but a few minutes of last season after breaking his leg in the season opener, started the week with his only scoreless game of the season.

"It's good to see him getting back to his movement and looking like his old self, and being more consistent," Dallas coach Rick Carlisle said.

ROAD WOES

Dallas, which ended a nine-game road losing skid Wednesday with a victory at Charlotte, fell to 3-14 on the road.

The Mavs committed six of their 14 turnovers in the first quarter and never recovered.

"The early turnovers were a big problem. It got us behind the eight-ball early," Carlisle said. "Then you're playing from behind all night. They

took advantage of it."

The Mavericks trimmed an 18-point first-half deficit to a point early in the third quarter, but could get no closer.

The Mavericks had a 13-0 run late in the second quarter, to pulling to 53-46 on Matthews' 3-pointer with 2:13 left. Jordan followed with a layup to cut it to 53-48 before Tatum hit a 3-pointer for Boston with 39 seconds left, ending a 4:01 scoring drought. Boston hadn't scored since Smart's 3-pointer with 4:40 left put Boston up 53-36.

TIP-INS

Mavericks: Nowitzki received a standing ovation when he was introduced and entered the game with 1:07 left in the first quarter. Boston fans stood and cheered again in the final minute for Nowitzki, playing in his 21st season, who put his hands to his head after his final attempt bounced off the rim at the buzzer.

Celtics: Tatum, a last-minute starter at forward with Marcus Mor-

ris out because of a stiff neck, scored 10 points in the first quarter. ... Daniel Theis had 13 rebounds. ... Rookie Brad Wanamaker scored a career-high eight points, three better than his previous high. ... Irving was on the bench, still recovering after scratching both corneas in a collision Monday at San Antonio. Irving also sat out Wednesday against Minnesota.

Baylor women turn to Big 12 play after win over No. 1 UConn

WACO, Texas — Kallani Brown knows No. 8 Baylor can't get complacent after ending top-ranked UConn's 126-game regular-season winning streak.

That big win, though, gave a glimpse of what is possible if the Lady Bears keep playing that way.

"The energy we had was crazy," said Brown, the 6-foot-7 senior post player who had 22 points and 17 rebounds against the Huskies. "If we play every game like that, there's no telling where we may end up."

The Lady Bears (10-1) have little time to celebrate their 68-57 winover UConn. The eight-time defending Big 12 champions, who haven't been to the Final Four since their 2012 undefeated national championship, open conference play Sunday at Texas Tech.

"We will enjoy this, and they should enjoy it, but you can't overemphasize it. You just can't," Baylor coach Kim Mulkey said. "We're one of the elite programs. They're the elite of the elite, and we want what they have. They have a lot of them, and we have just two."

UConn (11-1), which has won 11 national titles under Geno Auriemma, had not lost a regular-

season game since an overtime loss at Stanford in November 2014, just the second game of what ended up being a championship season. The last time the Huskies lost in regulation was at home in February 2013 — to Baylor, then the defending national champion and in Brittney Griner's senior season.

"Listen, we're all chasing Geno. Let's be real," said Mulkey, who has two national titles in her 19 seasons at Baylor. "I want people to be proud of this program. I want them to be proud that we win on a consistent basis. We're an elite program. ... We're still there. We're still relevant, and that's all I want to do."

Before a raucous sell-out crowd of 10,248 that gave Auriemma a nice ovation when he walked out on the court just moments before tipoff Thursday night, the Lady Bears trailed only after UConn made the game's first basket in the opening minute. The Huskies ended the first half with a 12-4 run to get within a point, then tied the game at 32 on Katie Lou Samuelson's 3-pointer soon after halftime. But Baylor then went ahead to stay on Brown's jumper with an assist from Lauren Cox, who added a three-point play.

Two days off are fol-

lowed by their league opener on the road.

"We have to focus on Lubbock because Texas Tech isn't afraid and they're not going to back down just because we beat UConn," Brown said. "We can't get complacent because we beat UConn because we still have a lot more games to go. Yes, this was a great win, but off to the next one."

UConn shot only 29 percent (20 of 68), its worst in 20 years, and lost by double figures for the first time since the final regular-season game of 2011-12. The Huskies play their American Athletic Conference opener Sunday at Houston.

The Huskies were visiting Waco for the first time in five years, since a 66-55 win in 2014 that snapped the Lady Bears' 69-game home winning streak that was then the longest in the country. That was Baylor's last nonconference loss in the Ferrell Center.

"We're fixing to go into our league. ... I do know we're the hunted. We're fixing to see that for 18 basketball games. And it's hard to get up and stay up and take everybody's best shot," Mulkey said. "It's difficult. Geno's the best at it. He's done it all."

Air Force to Industrial Park

The life of Webb Air Force Base

Webb Air Force Base, previously named Big Spring Air Force Base, was a United States Air Force facility of the Air Training Command that operated from 1951 to 1977 in West Texas within the current city limits of Big Spring.

A History of the Airpark

The facility was first used by the United States Army Air Force as Big Spring Army Air Field, opening on 28 April 1942 as part of the Central Flying Training Command. The mission of Big Spring AAF was to train aviation cadets in high altitude precision bombing as bombardiers. The airfield had received its first class of cadets in September 1942. The AT-11 (Beechcraft Model 18 and the B-18 Bolo) were the primary aircraft flown for training.

The 79th Bombardier Training Group continued operations until the surrender of Japan, when the cadets who agreed to remain in postwar service were transferred to Midland AAF, Texas. The last class graduated on 26 September 1945. The base was declared surplus and reverted to city control in November 1945 and it served as the Big Spring Municipal Airport for 6 years.

World War II

The facility first was used by the United States Army Air Forces as Big Spring Army Air Field, opening on 28 April 1942 as part of the Central Flying Training Command.

Activated on 26 June 1942, the mission of Big Spring AAF was to train aviation cadets in high-altitude precision bombing as bombardiers. It was one of the "West Texas Bombardier Quad-

rangle" schools of the Army Air Forces Training Command. The other bases in the quad were Midland Army Airfield, San Angelo Army Airfield, and Childress Army Airfield.

Cold War

The airfield was reactivated as Big Spring Air Force Base on 1 Oct. 1951 by the United States Air Force for the Air Training Command(ATC) which established the 3560th Pilot Training Wing (Advanced Single-Engine). However, the command was not formally able to operationally activate the base until 1 January 1952 because the City of Big Spring had difficulty acquiring clear title to some of the property it intended to transfer to ATC.

The facility was brought back into service as a primary training installation because of the Korean War and the need for additional pilots. Four months later, on 18 May 1952, ATC changed the name of Big Spring Webb Air Force Base to memorialize 1st Lieutenant James L. Webb, a Big Spring native and World War II combat pilot in Europe, who was killed in a mishap off the Japanese coast flying a P-51 Mustang in 1949 during a training mission.

Webb Air Force Base

As a result of the Korean War, and the need for trained pilots, the airfield was reopened on October 1, 1951. The base was renamed Webb Air Force Base in 1952 to memorialize Lt. James L. Webb, a Big Spring native and World War II combat pilot, who was killed off the Japanese coast in 1949.

The 3560th Pilot Training Wing (later redesignated the 78th Flying Training Wing) was stationed at the base, and instruction of the first class began in April 1952. The base popula-

tion soon passed the 2,000 mark. By the end of 1968 almost 9,000 pilots had been trained at Webb.

331st Fighter Interceptor Squadron

In 1956 the 331st Fighter Interceptor Squadron was transferred to Webb from Stewart Air Force Base in New York to defend the southern United States border on air intercept missions. In March 1967 the 331st was redesignated the 4760th Combat Crew Training Squadron and charged with training Jordanian Air Force students. It was inactivated when the Jordanians were recalled because of the war with Israel in the summer of 1967.

Webb was also the site of annual summer training for ROTC (Reserve Officers' Training Corps) cadets throughout the 1950s and most of the 1960s. In 1977 the end of the Vietnam War meant a decrease in the need for Air Force pilots. Webb was formally deactivated, and the property it had occupied was turned over to the Big Spring Industrial Park.

Big Spring McMahon-Wrinkle Airport

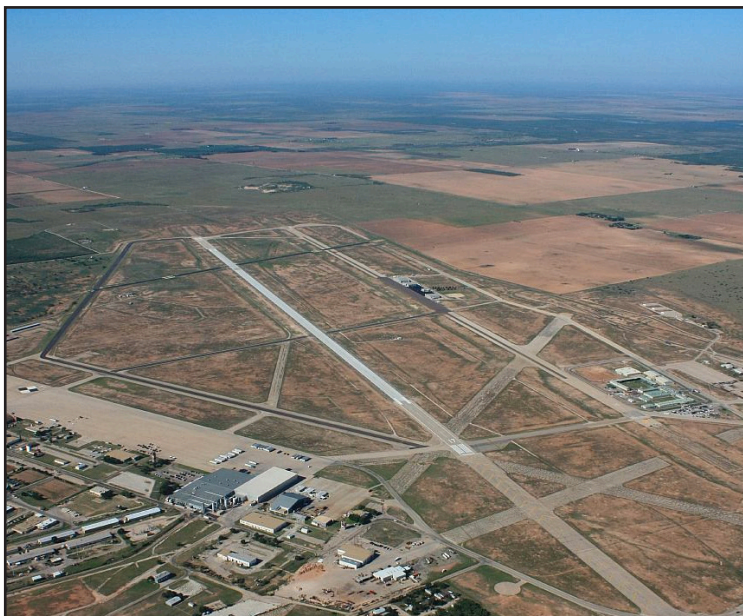
The area currently serves as the general aviation airport for the City of Big Spring, known as Big Spring McMahon-Wrinkle Airport. In addition, three units of the Big Spring Correctional Center (a federal prison privately operated by Cornell Companies) are located on the base grounds (as well as FCI Big Spring, which is a separate facility and operated directly by the Bureau of Prisons).

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What to watch for at this Sunday's Golden Globes

NEW YORK (AP) — Dramatic period pieces will vie for the top comedy-musical awards and song-stuffed movies are poised to dominate the dramatic categories. Welcome to the 71st annual Golden Globes.

Category confusion often reigns at the Globes. Remember when laughers like "The Martian" and "Get Out" competed as comedies? But the Globes, reliably the frothiest, quirkiest and most entertaining stop in the awards-season march to the Academy Awards, might feel especially upside down this year.

The night, to be broadcast live Sunday on NBC, may ultimately belong to Bradley Cooper's "A Star Is Born" revival. It's the favorite for best picture (drama), best actress (Lady Gaga), best song ("Shallow") and best actor (Bradley Cooper). The film's stiffest competition may come from another music movie: the Freddie Mercury biopic "Bohemian Rhapsody," whose star, Rami Malek, some believe could pull off the acting upset over Cooper.

Despite their copious tuneage, the campaigns of both "A Star Is Born" and "Bohemian Rhapsody" elected for the more serious dramatic category. For "A Star Is Born," it's a kind of power move to firmly establish itself as the Oscar front runner many believe it is.

Oscar voting, as it turns out this year, commences Monday, the morning after the Golden Globes. If "A Star Is Born" runs away with the Globes, it will enter the nominations period of the Academy Awards as the favorite by a wide margin.

With "A Star Is Born" (along with "Black Panther," "If Beale Street Could Talk" and "BlacKkKlansman") up for best picture as a drama, that's left a few humor-tinged movies many would peg as dramas — "The Favourite," "Green Book" and "Vice" — to give the comedy/musical side of the Globes a bit more heft than usual.

Of those, "Vice" comes in with the most nominations of any film (six), but the chances of "The

Favourite" are probably the best on Sunday. "The Favourite," Yorgos Lanthimos' triangular power struggle in Queen Anne's court, is the most decorated film of the bunch in an awards season that, despite any other fluctuations, has been rigid in its acclaim for the powerhouse trio of Olivia Colman, Rachel Weisz and Emma Stone.

Emily Blunt, nominated twice this year by the Hollywood Foreign Press Association (best actress for "Mary Poppins Returns" and best supporting actress for "A Quiet Place") could give Colman — named the lead of "The Favourite" — a run for her money. But Colman's tragicomic performance as Queen Anne has made her the definite front-runner and potentially Lady Gaga's stiffest competition come the Oscars when the two best-actress contenders will presumably go head to head.

The awards season of "Green Book" has been marred by backlash, so Peter Farrelly's 1960s road trip tale probably has the most to gain from a strong showing at the Globes.

The film's best actor (comedy) contender, Viggo Mortensen, may not be able to challenge Christian Bale's Dick Cheney, but the HFPA — which overlooked Mahershala Ali for "Moonlight" — may right that wrong with an award for his supporting performance in "Green Book."

But if the lines of comedy, musical and drama are particularly blurred at this year's Globes, they are even more so between film and television.

There are as many movie stars nominated in the TV categories as there are in the film ones. Among them: Julia Roberts ("Homecoming"), Jim Carrey ("Kidding"), Amy Adams (up for both "Vice" and "Sharp Objects") Michael Douglas ("The Kominsky Method"), Benedict Cumber-

batch ("Patrick Melrose"), Penelope Cruz ("The Assassination of Gianni Versace: American Crime Story"), Patricia Arquette ("Escape at Dannemora"), Hugh Grant ("A Very English Scandal") and Laura Dern ("The Tale").

Their shows and others ("The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel," "Barry," "Bodyguard," "Killing Eve") will be in the mix, and the victors may well muddy another awards show boundary: that between host and winner.

Sandra Oh, the star of "Killing Eve," is favored to win best actress in a drama series, potentially giving her a welcome respite from hosting duties alongside Andy Samberg.

Oh and Samberg will have the challenge of marshalling a broadcast that last year fell 11 percent in viewership for NBC. That ceremony, when women attendees wore black, was atypically solemn for the Globes, and rife with protest, coming as the first major awards show of the post-Harvey Weinstein #MeToo era.

But for a Globes full of head-scratchers, Samberg and Oh — each hailing from different realms of comedy and drama — are a fittingly, charmingly incongruous pair.

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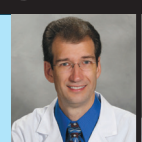

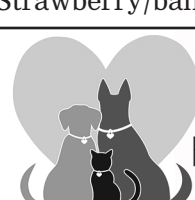
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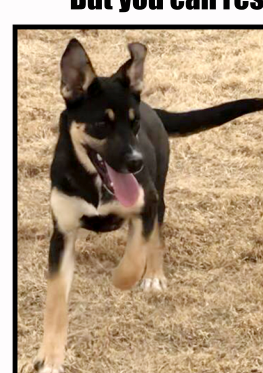
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Roger's Reviews: Bumblebee

In 1984, the Transformers saga began with a series of toys and comic books, and an animated television show centered on the alien race of transforming Autobots and Decepticons, giant robots able to take the form of Earth-based devices such as cars, trucks, aircraft, and...boom boxes. Director Michael Bay brought the Transformers to the big screen in 2007 in a heavily CGI-ed live action format. Since then there have been four sequels to the original "Transformers" live-action movie... and now, one prequel: "Bumblebee."

The new movie starts out on the Transformers' homeworld Cybertron. The two factions – the Autobots led by the powerful Optimus Prime (voiced by Peter Cullen), and the Decepticons led by Shockwave (voiced by Jon Bailey – iconic Decepticon leader Megatron is presumably already crash-landed on Earth in the 1800s, as shown in the 2007 "Transformers" movie) – are engaged in a desperate civil war... and the Autobots are losing. Optimus Prime orders yellow warrior B-127 (voiced by Dylan O'Brien) to travel to Earth to establish a base for the Autobots to regroup, while he holds off the Decepticon's pursuit.

B-127 crash-lands in the middle of a military training exercise in which the team led by Col. Jack Burns (John Cena) has just defeated the opposing team. Several people are injured by the crash landing, and Burns orders reinforcements to help track down the giant robot. There's a battle, during which Decepticon Blitzwing (voiced by David Sobolov) ambushes B-127, eventually damaging his voice emulator. B-127 kills Blitzwing, then collapses from his injuries, managing to scan and transform into a yellow Volkswagen Beetle first.

Teenage girl Charlie Watson (Hailee Steinfeld) is living with her mom Sally (Pamela Adlon), stepfather Ron (Stephen Schneider), and younger brother Otis (Jason Drucker). She's still broken up about the sudden heart-attack death of her father (Tim Martin Gleason), and a bit rebellious toward her family. She has a job at a corndog stand at a local amusement park, and works unsuccessfully on an old Corvette in her spare time. She

also frequents the junkyard of her Uncle Hank (Len Cariou), searching for parts for the Corvette.

On one such trip she discovers a dilapidated yellow Volkswagen Beetle, and convinces Hank to give it to her for her birthday if she can get it started. After a bit of tinkering, she starts it up and drives it home, where she sets to work in her garage. When she discovers a robotic head concealed underneath the car, B-127 transforms into his robot form, startling them both. B-127 has no memories and cannot speak, but he can understand her words. She nicknames him Bumblebee because of a hive bees had built in his undercarriage, and because of his coloration.

The two undergo a series of fish-out-of-water adventures, while two more Decepticons – Shatter (voiced by Angela Bassett) and Dropkick (voiced by Justin Theroux) – track Bumblebee to Earth and negotiate with secret government agency "Sector 7," which includes now-Agent Burns (Cena again), to cooperate in locating the "fugitive" Transformer. Both sides plan to double-cross the other after Bumblebee is located.

I'll go ahead and stop the summary there. Other characters include Charlie's neighbor Memo (Jorge Lendeborg Jr.), who works at the churro stand next to Charlie's corndog stand, and has a crush on her; Sector 7 scientist Dr. Powell (John Ortiz); General Whalen (Glynn Turman), head of Sector 7; and Charlie's classmates Tripp (Ricardo Hoyos) and Tina (Gracie Dzienny).

Transformers has never been one of my favorite franchises. I have noth-



ing particularly against it, it's just one that I never got into very much as a kid. That said, I have seen most of the live-action movies, and this is one of the better ones.

It's still pretty formulaic. Random teenager gets introduced to Autobot and forms a friendship. Decepticon attacks. Robot helps random teenager overcome teenager problems. Random teenager helps giant shapeshifting robot defeat the other giant shapeshifting robots. Everybody's happy. Roll the credits.

But "Bumblebee" explains some things about previous films in the future of the franchise's timeline. It explains how Bumblebee got his "speech defect," using the car radio to pick out words and phrases to speak. It explains why the Transformers came to Earth in the first place. It serves as an earlier introduction to Sector 7 than we've seen before.

I didn't particularly enjoy the amount of fish-out-of-water antics in this movie. They were cute, but essentially served as time-wasters and

filler material to stretch the movie out to its 1 hour, 54 minutes. Probably about half as much of these shenanigans would have been plenty. They could have cut out the entire scene with Bumblebee destroying the Watson household with his giant clumsiness, and it wouldn't have bothered me a bit.

The actual action scenes were well done, though. I'll give "Bumblebee" seven stars out of 10.

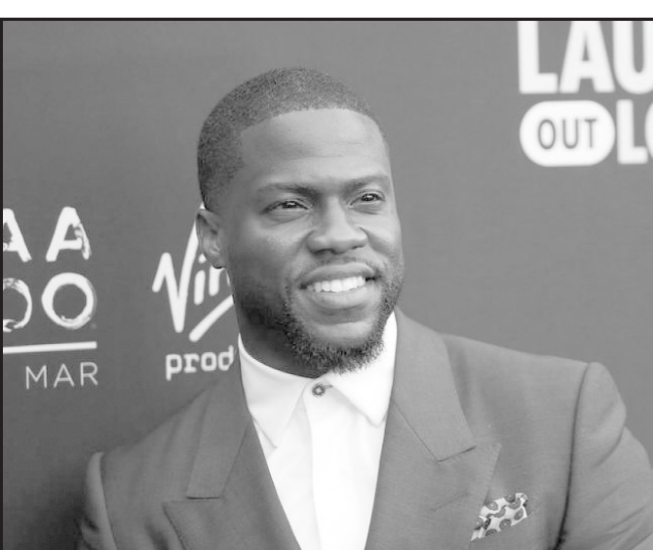
Kevin Hart says he's considering Oscar hosting gig again

NEW YORK (AP) — Prodded by Ellen DeGeneres, comic Kevin Hart says he'll reconsider his decision to step down as host of the Academy Awards.

Hart had backed away two days after being named host last month when some homophobic tweets he had made a decade ago resurfaced. But DeGeneres urged him to host the show during an interview that aired Friday on her talk show.

The motion picture Academy has not named a replacement host for its Feb. 24 awards show.

"You have grown," DeGeneres told him. "You have apologized. You're apologizing again right now. You've done it. Don't let these people win. Host the Oscars."

She applied subtle pressure by saying after one commercial break, "We're back with this year's Oscars host, Kevin Hart."

Hart told her that "you have put a lot of things on my mind" and that he would think about their conversation.

If there's a campaign to get him back, it couldn't have started more slickly: on the hugely successful talk show run by one of Hollywood's most prominent gay celebrities, who hosted the Oscars herself in 2007.

DeGeneres said she called the Academy this week to urge that Hart be brought back, and was told that officials would be "thrilled" if he did. An Academy representative did not immediately return messages for comment.

Hart wrote homophobic remarks on Twitter mostly between 2009-2011, including one where he said: "Yo if my son comes home & try's 2 play with my daughters doll house I'm going 2 break it over his head & say n my voice 'stop that's gay.'" It was later deleted. He has also made anti-gay comments in his standup in the past.

Hart told her that when his old messages resurfaced, "what was once the brightest light ever just got real dark." He initially said he wouldn't apologize because he had addressed the issue several times. But given an ultimatum to apologize, he did so and stepped down.

Hart said it was hard for him because he considered it an attack when his tweets resurfaced a day after he got the Oscars gig.

"That's an attempt to end me," he said. "That's not an attack to just stop the Oscars ... Somebody has to take a stand against the ... trolls."

DeGeneres received some resistance on social media, with some commenters saying that Hart's homophobic jokes were a legitimate issue for discussion, and it wasn't a case of people maliciously trying to hurt him.

In a column posted Friday in the trade publication Variety, Caroline Framke argued that Hart hadn't proven that he'd learned much.

"If he gets the job back, it won't be because he's convinced his detractors that he actually cares about gay people," Framke wrote. "It'll be because he spun a story about vicious trolls going after him for no good reason. It might be a compelling enough angle to convince DeGeneres and her audience, but even if it manages to sway the Academy, it still won't actually be true."

DeGeneres responded to critics on Twitter: "I believe in forgiveness. I believe in second chances." The Oscars are looking for something to juice Hol-

lywood's biggest night, after the ceremony drew its smallest audience ever in 2018.

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Ford recalls over 953,000 vehicles to replace inflators

More than three years after the U.S. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration took over management of recalls involving Takata inflators, one third of the recalled inflators still have not been replaced, according to an annual report from the government and a court-appointed monitor.

The report says 16.7 million faulty inflators out of 50 million under recall have yet to be replaced. And 10 million more inflators are scheduled to be recalled this month, including the Ford vehicles. Also, Honda recalled 1.4 million vehicles in September, months ahead of schedule.

DETROIT (AP) — Ford is recalling more than 953,000 vehicles worldwide to replace Takata passenger air bag inflators that can explode and hurl shrapnel.

The move includes over 782,000 vehicles in the U.S. and is part of the largest series of recalls in U.S. history.

Included are the 2010 Ford Edge and Lincoln MKX, the 2010 and 2011 Ford Ranger, the 2010 to 2012 Ford Fusion and Lincoln MKZ, the 2010 and 2011 Mercury Milan, and the 2010 to 2014 Ford Mustang.

Some of the recalls may be limited to specific geographic areas of the U.S.

Takata used the chemical ammonium nitrate to create an ex-

plosion to inflate air bags. But it can deteriorate over time due to heat and humidity and explode with too much force, blowing apart a metal canister designed to contain the explosion. At least 23 people have been killed worldwide and hundreds injured by the inflators.

Ford says it doesn't know of any injuries in vehicles included in this recall. Dealers will replace the inflators.

Ford will notify owners about the recall starting on Feb. 18, and the company has replacement parts available for dealers to order, said spokeswoman Monique Brentley. In previous Takata recalls, parts availability had been an issue.

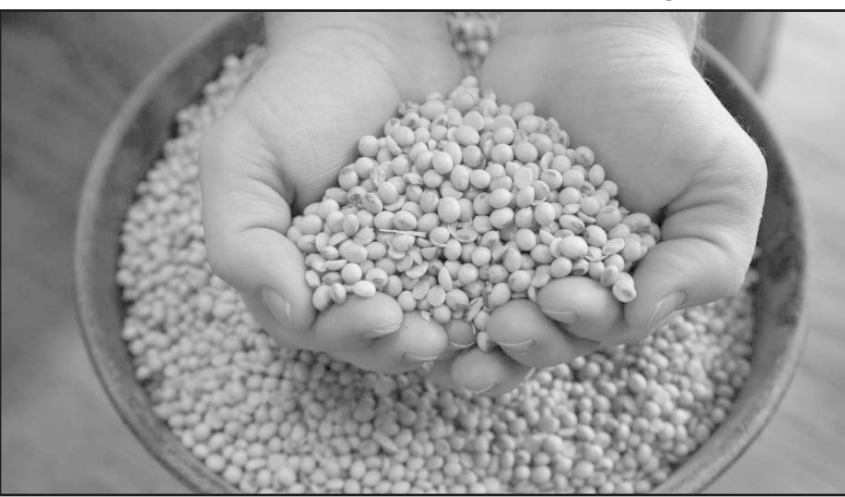
more inflators are scheduled to be recalled this month, including the Ford vehicles. Also, Honda recalled 1.4 million vehicles in September, months ahead of schedule.

Safety advocates said the completion rate should be far higher given the danger associated with the inflators.

The recalls forced Takata of Japan to seek bankruptcy protection and sell most of its assets to pay for the fixes.

The inflators grow more dangerous as they get older because ammonium nitrate deteriorates due to high humidity and cycles from hot temperatures to cold. The most dangerous inflators are in areas of the South along the Gulf of Mexico that have high humidity.

Investors, farmers guessing as shutdown delays crop reports

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced Friday that it must delay the release of key crop reports due to the partial government shutdown, leaving investors and farmers without vital information during an already tumultuous time for agricultural markets.

The USDA had planned to release the closely watched reports Jan. 11 but said that even if the shutdown ended immediately, the agency's staff wouldn't have time to release the reports as scheduled. Congressional leaders met with President

Donald Trump on Friday but there were no indications the shutdown would end soon.

"The longer it goes on, the more distorted our reference points get," said grain market analyst Todd Hultman, of Omaha, Nebraska-based agriculture market data provider DTN. "It's a lot of guesswork."

The reports detail the size of the 2018 harvests of corn, soybean, wheat and other crops and give an early estimate for what farmers will plant in the upcoming season. Depending on the estimates, the price of the commodities can rise or fall as they show the current supply and forecast how many acres will be devoted to different crops in the coming months.

The government shutdown has now forced the delay of such reports for two weeks, and uncertainty about the commodity supply will only grow as more time elapses, Hultman said. USDA reports provide the foundation for understanding the U.S. agricultural industry, and because they also estimate farm production in other countries, they are essential for understanding global crop markets.

Although the government is still releasing some information, such as the Labor Department's monthly jobs report, the USDA hasn't released key reports since Dec. 22. This includes the closely watched World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates report and information about specific crops, such as winter wheat and canola seedings.

The lack of information comes amid the uncertainty of trade with China, where tariffs led to an abrupt drop in U.S. agricultural exports to the

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Stocks swing to huge gains after jobs report, trade talks

NEW YORK (AP) — Global stocks soared Friday and reversed the big losses they suffered just a day earlier. The Dow Jones Industrial Average rallied 746 points in the latest twist in a wild three months for markets.

Hopes for progress in the U.S.-China trade dispute, a strong report on the U.S. jobs market and encouraging comments from the head of the U.S. central bank about its interest rate policy all combined to cheer investors.

China's Commerce Ministry said trade talks will be held Monday and Tuesday in Beijing, and investors will again look for signs the world's largest economic powers are resolving their dispute. The tensions have dragged on for nearly a year, slowing business and dragging down stock indexes worldwide.

Meanwhile the Labor Department said U.S. employers added 312,000 jobs last month, a far stronger result than experts had anticipated. U.S. stocks have tumbled since October as investors worried that the economy might slow down dramatically because of challenges including the trade dispute and rising interest rates.

The stock market's plunge also threatened to shake up the confidence and the spending plans of businesses and consumers. Some analysts said investors were acting as if a recession was on the horizon, despite a lack of evidence that the U.S. economy is struggling.

"It's hard to square recession worries with the strongest job growth we've seen in years," said Alec Young, managing director of global markets research for FTSE Russell.

Stocks rose even further after Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell said the central bank will

be flexible in deciding if and when it raises interest rates. He added that the Fed is open to making changes in the way it shrinks its giant portfolio of bonds, which affects rates on long-term loans such as mortgages.

Until recently, the Fed had suggested it planned to raise short-term interest rates three times this year and next, and Powell said the Fed's balance sheet was shrinking "on auto-pilot." Wall Street feared that the Fed might be moving too fast in raising borrowing costs, said Phil Orlando, chief equity market strategist at Federated Investors.

The Fed's interest-rate and bond portfolio policies "were at the top of the list of things we were concerned about, which is why the statement Powell made today is so supportive of the market," Orlando said. "The Fed understands that what they attempted to communicate last month was inartful, that they didn't get the right message across, and Powell tried to reset."

The S&P 500 index climbed 84.05 points, or 3.4 percent, to 2,531.94, more than wiping out Thursday's loss. The Dow rose 3.3 percent to 23,433.16 after gaining 832 during the afternoon. The Nasdaq composite jumped 275.35 points, or 4.3 percent, to 6,738.86.

About 90 percent of the stocks on the New York Stock Exchange traded higher.

Stocks sank Thursday after Apple said iPhone sales in China are falling, partly because of the trade fight, and a survey suggested U.S. factories grew at a weaker pace. Technology companies took their biggest losses in seven years.

The U.S. and China have raised tariffs on billions of dollars of each other's goods in a fight over issues including Beijing's technology policy. Last month, President Donald Trump and Chinese leader Xi Jinping agreed to 90-day ceasefire as a step toward

defusing tensions, but that failed to calm the stock market.

Technology companies, banks, health care and industrial companies all made strong gains. Most of the companies in those industries stand to do better in times of faster economic growth.

Smaller and more U.S.-focused companies did even better than larger multinationals. The Russell 2000 index surged 49.92 points, or 3.8 percent, to 1,380.75. Smaller companies have fallen further than larger ones in the last few months as investors got nervous about how the U.S. economy will perform in 2019 and 2020.

Stocks have whipsawed between huge gains and losses for the last few weeks after their big December plunge. Katie Nixon, the chief investment officer for Northern Trust Wealth Management, said investors

will continue to react to the health of the economy, and to concerns about high levels of corporate debt as interest rates rise.

"We don't expect that this will be the end to the volatility," she said. "There's mounting evidence we're going to see a slowdown," albeit not a severe one.

Bond prices also changed course and moved sharply lower. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note rose to 2.66 percent after it plunged to 2.55 percent Thursday, its lowest in almost a year. That helps banks, as higher interest rates allow them to make bigger profits on mortgages and other loans.

European shares also overcome losses from a day earlier, with Germany's DAX gaining 3.4 percent and France's CAC 40 rising 2.7 percent. Britain's FTSE 100 advanced 2.2 percent.

In Asia, Hong Kong's Hang Seng jumped 2.2 percent. South Korea's Kospi added 0.8 percent. Japan's Nikkei 225 index fell 2.3 percent on its first day of trading in 2019 as technology and electronics makers slumped on Apple's report that Chinese iPhone sales were slipping.

U.S. crude oil added 1.8 percent to \$47.96 a barrel in New York. Brent crude, used to price international oils, was up 2 percent to \$57.06 per barrel in London.

The dollar strengthened. It rose to 108.51 yen from 107.77 yen. The euro rose to \$1.14 from \$1.1391. The British pound moved up to \$1.2740 from \$1.2630.

Wholesale gasoline dipped 0.1 percent to \$1.35 a gallon and heating oil added 1.6 percent to \$1.77 a gallon. Natural gas rose 3.4 percent to \$3.04 per 1,000 cubic feet.

In other trading, gold fell 0.7 percent to \$1,285.80 an ounce and silver slipped 0.1 percent to \$15.79 an ounce. Copper rose 3.1 percent to \$2.65 a pound.

country. There were indications that China was beginning to resume at least limited purchases of U.S. crops, but because of the government shut-

down it's unclear what's happening.

"We certainly don't want to be in the dark and miss any big changes like that," Hultman said.

University of Illinois professor Todd Hubbs, who studies agricultural commodity markets, said he finds the report delays especially frustrating

because he thinks they could confirm a belief that the U.S. soybean crop was smaller than earlier forecast. If true, that information would mean a smaller supply and could raise soybean prices, helping farmers who have struggled with low prices worsened by the trade dispute with China.

Until the USDA releases its information, investors and farmers can't be certain about where they stand, he said.

"Those kinds of numbers are fundamental," Hubbs said. "When the USDA produces the numbers, they are the numbers. They move markets."

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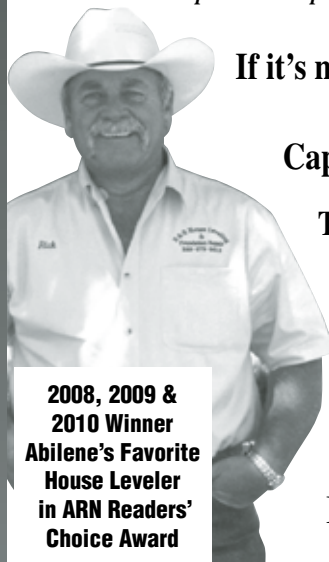
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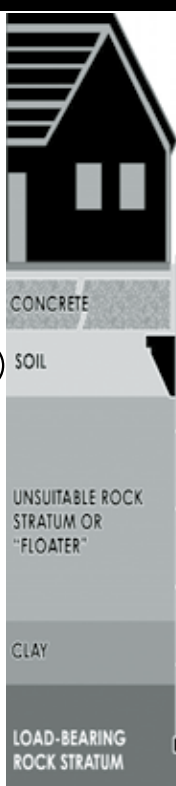

All of which leads us to today's unusual exercise where kibitzer, butcher and teacher alike are all challenged to score 10 tricks with spades as trump.

This is strictly a double-dummy affair, by which is meant that the reader is invited to study all four hands and take full advantage of seeing the opposing cards. Of course, best defense is assumed.

To get right to the meat of the matter, all declarer has to do to make the contract is to win the opening heart lead with the ace and play his king on it! This extraordinary stroke increases South's losers from four to five -- but at the same time it renders the defense helpless. Without this highly unusual play, four spades cannot be made.

Three rounds of trump are next drawn, after which South cashes the ace of clubs and ace of diamonds. West is then presented with his heart trick. Not only that, but West is also allowed to win the next two heart leads while dummy discards two diamonds and declarer two clubs.

South then takes the rest of the tricks, trumping two diamonds in dummy and two clubs in his hand!

When I used to write every day, I was deeply depressed, and writing was an outlet, a stress reliever. I still want to write, but I never seem able to get myself to actually put pen to paper. I don't want to believe that I have to be depressed in order to write. I know I'm also a good writer when I'm not depressed. I think that part of the problem is I'm scared of writing something bad, thinking that if I can't write a beautiful first draft, there's no point in writing at all. (Obviously, that's a rather toxic mindset.) Do you have any tips for how I could discipline myself to actually write something while not worrying about the outcome? -- Wrestling a Writing Rut

Dear Wrestling a Writing Rut: Every writer intimately knows the feelings you describe, including yours truly. Here are a few points to keep in

mind. Deadlines are your friend. If columns weren't due weekly, I would never finish them. I know it can be hard to meet self-imposed deadlines. One way to get external ones is to join a writing group or to take a writing class online or through a local college. Perfectionism equals paralysis. Fortunately, the deadlines should help with this, too. When something is due, you have to make peace with the fact that it's not perfect. Done is better than perfect. Confront the fear of failure by writing a deliberately crummy story. Read it back to yourself. See that the world did not end because you wrote something lackluster. This might also help to infuse some levity into your practice, which can be wind beneath the creative wings. "Gamify" the process. Look for writing prompts online. Set a kitchen timer, and don't pick up your pen until it dings, no matter what you're writing. Lastly, remember that the only way to really fail is to not try. So get writing.

Dear Annie: I'm a teenage boy. My mom hates that I'm gay. She says that the whole family is disappointed in me. But it's only my dad's side of the family who hates me for it. My mom can't accept me for me. I try to ignore her, but it will always be there. I've started drinking to block out the memories, but that only works for a little while. 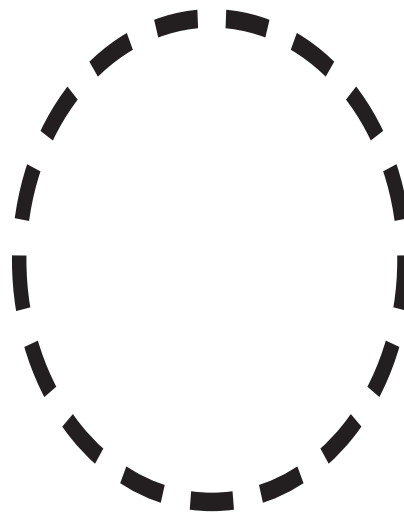

US employers went on a surprising hiring spree in December

and could help ease fears that the economy's expansion — now in the middle of its 10th year — may be coming to an end.

"The labor market is very strong even though the economy appears to be slowing," said Eric Winograd, senior U.S. economist at the investment management firm Alliance-Bernstein. "Those two things cannot coexist for very long. Either weakening demand will lead firms to dial back the pace of hiring or the robust pace of hiring will lead firms to ramp back up production."

In recent weeks, financial markets have plunged amid concerns that the U.S. could be in a recession by 2020. The Dow suffered its worst December since the middle of the Depression in 1931.

Major companies such as Apple say their sales are being jeopardized by the tariff war between Washington and Beijing, and an important gauge of U.S. manufacturing posted its steepest decline in a decade Thursday.

China, the world's second-largest economy, is also mired in a slowdown, its consumers losing much of their appetite for real estate, iPhones, Ford vehicles and jewelry from Tiffany & Co.

The U.S. government shutdown and Trump's attacks on the Fed and its chairman over the central bank's rate increases have also worried investors, though Powell may have eased some of those concerns Friday when he stressed that he would not resign if the president told him to do so.

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. employers went on a hiring spree in December, adding a surprising 312,000 jobs and providing a dose of reassurance about the economy after a turbulent few months on Wall Street.

The job gains reported Friday by the Labor Department came despite a trade war with China, a global slowdown and a partial government shutdown now entering its third week.

The nation's unemployment rate rose slightly to 3.9 percent last month, but that, too, was considered a positive sign, reflecting an increase in

Americans beginning to look for work. And average hourly pay improved 3.2 percent from a year ago.

Stocks surged on the news, along with word that the U.S. and China will hold trade talks next week and comments from Federal Reserve Chairman Jerome Powell that the Fed will be flexible in judging whether to raise interest rates further. The Dow Jones industrial average shot up 747 points, or 3.3 percent.

President Donald Trump called the job growth "GREAT" on Twitter.

The torrid hiring in December far outstripped the 180,000 jobs investors had been anticipating

Watchdog group urges probe of Ivanka Trump tax break role

WASHINGTON (AP) — An ethics watchdog group asked the Justice Department on Friday to investigate whether President Donald Trump's daughter Ivanka violated federal conflict-of-interest law by promoting an Opportunity Zone tax break program from which she could potentially benefit.

The complaint from the Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics in Washington follows an Associated Press investigation last month. The AP found that Trump and her husband Jared Kushner, both White

House advisers, could benefit from the Opportunity Zones program they pushed that offers tax breaks to developers who invest in downtrodden communities.

AP reported Kushner owns a \$25 million to \$50 million non-management stake in Cadre, a real estate investment firm which has announced plans to invest in several cities under the Opportunity Zones program. Separately, the couple has interests in at least 13 properties held by Kushner's family firm that may qualify for the tax breaks because

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American officials due in Beijing for talks on trade battle

BEIJING (AP) — American officials are due in Beijing Monday for talks aimed at easing the U.S.-China trade battle that threatens to hobble global economic growth.

The talks are going ahead despite tension over the arrest of a Chinese tech executive in Canada on U.S. charges related to possible violations of trade sanctions on Iran.

The two governments have expressed interest in a settlement but have given no indication that their stances have shifted. After several tit-for-tat tariff increases last year, Presidents Donald Trump and Xi Jinping agreed Dec. 1 to postpone further hikes.

The two countries hope to have "positive and constructive discussions," said a Chinese foreign ministry spokesman, Lu Kang.

The trade war has its roots in American anxiety about China's emergence as a competitor in telecoms, solar power and other technologies and complaints by Washington, Europe and other trading partners that Beijing's tactics violate its market-opening obligations.

China's leaders have offered to narrow its politically sensitive trade surplus with the United States by purchasing more soybeans, natural gas and other American exports. But they reject pressure to scrap technology initiatives they see as a path to prosperity and global influence.

Both governments face economic pressure to reach a settlement.

Chinese economic growth fell to a post-global crisis low of 6.5 percent in the quarter ending in September. Auto sales tumbled 16 percent in November over a year earlier and weak real estate sales are forcing developers to cut prices.

Third-quarter U.S. growth was 3.4 percent and unemployment is at a five-decade low. But surveys show consumer confidence is weakening due to concern that

growth will moderate this year.

Beijing has tried in vain to recruit France, Germany, South Korea and other governments as allies against Trump. They criticize his tactics but echo U.S. complaints about Chinese industrial policy and market barriers.

The European Union filed its own challenge in the World Trade Organization in June against Chinese regulations it said hamper the ability of foreign companies to protect and profit from their own technology.

Washington has imposed punitive tariffs of up to 25 percent on \$250 billion of Chinese goods. Beijing responded by imposing penalties on \$110 billion of American goods, slowing down customs clearance for U.S. companies and suspending issuance of licenses in finance and other industries.

Trump and Xi agreed to a 90-day postponement of more tariff increases due to take effect Jan. 1. But economists say that is too little time to resolve the sprawling disputes that bedevil U.S.-Chinese relations.

The decision to hold this week's talks at a deputy minister level reflects the need to work out technical details before higher-level officials make "hard political decisions on major issues," said Tu Xinquan, director of the China Institute for World Trade Organization Studies at the University of International Business and Economics in Beijing.

The U.S. team will include Deputy U.S. Trade Rep. Jeffrey Gerrish; the top U.S. trade negotiator on agricultural issues, Gregg Doud; Treasury Under Secretary for International Affairs David Malpass; Commerce Under Secretary for International Trade Gilbert Kaplan; the U.S. Agriculture Department's undersecretary for trade and foreign affairs, Ted McKinney; the U.S. Department of Energy's assistant secretary for fossil energy, Steven Winberg; and other senior officials.

The strong job growth suggests employers believe U.S. consumer spending will stay robust.

Health care and education added 82,000 jobs last month, the largest jump in nearly nine years. Restaurants and drinking places posted a net gain of 40,700 jobs. Builders added 38,000 construction jobs, while manufacturers increased their payrolls by 32,000 workers.

Businesses are still searching for more workers.

Fresh Coat Painters, based in Cincinnati, plans to nearly double the 300 employees who paint homes and businesses as it expands this year across this country. The franchiser is also launching an apprenticeship program to attract workers, in addition to providing higher pay and benefits.

Tara Riley, president of Fresh Coat, said that franchise owners are having to actively search for workers instead of simply posting ads.

"We realized it was a mindset change: You have to be recruiting, rather than hiring," Riley said.

Still, Kevin Hassett, chairman of the White House Council of Economic Advisers, cautioned on Thursday that the jobs report for January could be weak if the shutdown continues. Job totals could be lowered by hundreds of thousands of government employees being temporarily put out of work.

"So when we see the January jobs number, it could be a big negative," Hassett said.

In 2018, employers added 2.6 million jobs, or an average of nearly 220,000 a month, according to the Labor Department.

At some point, even if the economy remains healthy, monthly job gains will likely downshift to a more gradual pace. This is because there is a dwindling pool of unemployed people. There were 6.3 million people looking for a job in December, down from 6.5 million a year ago.

"People should not get used to numbers like the one we saw this month," said Martha Gimbel, director of economic research at the jobs site Indeed. "Eventually, job growth is going to start slowing down. When that happens, we shouldn't panic."

they are in Opportunity Zones in New Jersey, New York and Maryland.

The CREW complaint says that, under federal law, Kushner's financial interests are considered of value to Ivanka Trump as well.

In a 12-page letter sent to Deputy Attorney General Rod Rosenstein, CREW Executive Director Noah Bookbinder said that as a result of the 2017 decision by Ivanka Trump and Kushner to "retain a sprawling portfolio of investments after entering government," the couple "assumed responsibility for exercising due diligence to avoid participating in any particular matter that directly and predictably affects the interests of the companies they retained."

Ivanka Trump, Bookbinder wrote, "may have failed to live up to this responsibility."

Bookbinder told the AP that CREW's complaint focused on Ivanka Trump because "there is so much public information about her role in the Opportunity Zones program."

The AP report noted that Ivanka Trump publicly promoted the program and coordinated with its main congressional sponsor, Republican Sen. Tim Scott of South Carolina. President Trump lauded his daughter last February for "pushing this very hard." Hours after the AP story ran last month, Ivanka Trump tweeted her public support for Opportunity Zones and appeared at a White House event promoting the program.

AP reported that Kushner also backed the program, but had more limited involvement behind the scenes.

A spokesman for Abbe Lowell, the couple's ethics lawyer, dismissed the CREW complaint as "meritless." Ivanka Trump "adheres to the ethics advice she has received from counsel about what issues she can work on and those to which she is recused," said the spokesman, Peter Mirijanian.

The Justice Department declined to comment, a spokeswoman said.

The White House did not provide a response to the complaint. Last month, administration spokesman Hogan Gidley said the White House had "nothing to do with" the designations of the zones.

The zones, which channel where investments are made, were chosen by state governors and agencies and then approved by Treasury Department officials.

Bookbinder said that if the Justice Department looks into the complaint, it would most likely be probed as a civil matter. But he cautioned that the department is "not obligated to tell us what they're doing."

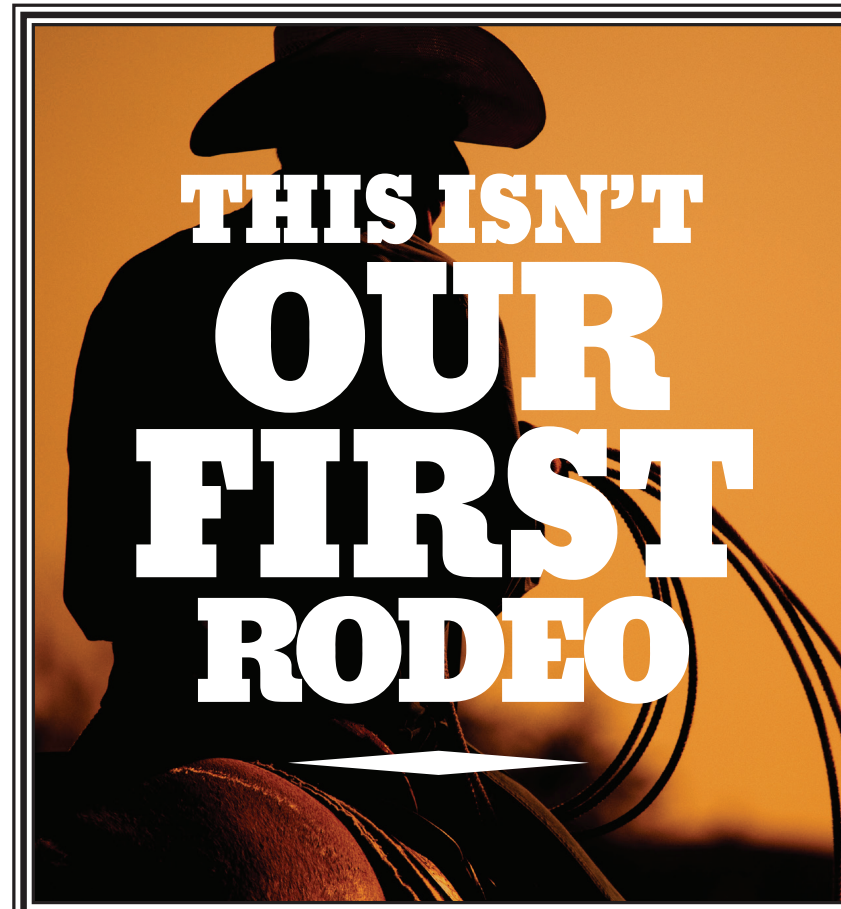

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Netflix criticized for yanking comedian's episode in Saudi

NEW YORK — Netflix faced criticism Wednesday from human rights groups for pulling an episode in Saudi Arabia of comedian Hasan Minhaj's "Patriot Act" series that criticized the kingdom's powerful crown prince.

Minhaj, a former correspondent with "The Daily Show" on Comedy Central, told The Associated Press this summer that his Netflix show would fuse his personal narrative as a first-generation Indian-American with the current political and social backdrop to examine deep issues confronting the world.

In the roughly 18-minute now-censored "Patriot Act" monologue, Minhaj also mentions the ruling Al Saud family and its vast wealth, saying: "Saudi Arabia is crazy. One giant family controls everything."

Human rights group Amnesty International said Saudi Arabia's censorship of Netflix is "further proof of a relentless crackdown on freedom of expression." Netflix said it was simply complying with a local law.

Khashoggi, who wrote critically of the crown prince in columns for the newspaper, was killed and dismembered by Saudi agents inside the Saudi consulate in Istanbul last year. The U.S. Senate has said it believes the crown prince is responsible for the grisly killing, despite insistence by the kingdom that he had no knowl-

edge of the operation.

"It blows my mind that it took the killing of a Washington Post journalist for everyone to go: 'Oh I guess he's not really a reformer,'" Minhaj said in the episode.

Netflix, in a statement Wednesday, said the episode was removed from the kingdom as a result of a legal request from authorities and not due to its content.

"We strongly support artistic freedom worldwide and removed this episode only in Saudi Arabia after we had received a valid legal demand from the government — and to comply with local law," the streaming gi-

The Saudi-led coalition's airstrikes in Yemen have also come under intense scrutiny since Khashoggi's killing. The war, which began in March 2015, has killed thousands of civilians and pushed millions to the brink of famine.

The Financial Times first reported that Netflix yanked the episode. The episode had been available in Saudi Arabia since late October but was pulled in December after the legal request. Only the second episode has been pulled and it is available to

WWE: Wrestling stars interviewer 'Mean Gene' Okerlund dies

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Eugene "Mean Gene" Okerlund, who interviewed pro wrestling superstars "Macho Man" Randy Savage, The Ultimate Warrior and Hulk Hogan and became a ring fixture in his own right, has died. He was 76.

World Wrestling Entertainment announced Okerlund's death on its website Wednesday. No details were given, but Okerlund's daughter-in-law, Patricia Okerlund, confirmed his death to The Washington Post. A woman who answered the phone at a number listed for Eugene Okerlund in Osprey, Florida, declined comment and referred questions to WWE.

Okerlund started as an interviewer in the Minneapolis-based American Wrestling Association. He moved to WWE in 1984 and hosted several shows, including "All-American Wrestling," "Tuesday Night Titans" and "Prime Time Wrestling."

Former wrestler and ex-Minnesota Gov. Jesse Ventura dubbed Okerlund "Mean Gene."

A native of Sisseton, South Dakota, Okerlund was known for his natty attire and mustache. He was inducted into the WWE Hall of Fame in 2006.

The kingdom's Communication and Information Technology Commission said the episode was in violation of Article 6, Paragraph 1 of the Anti-Cyber Crime Law in Saudi Arabia. Officials at the commission could not be immediately reached for comment.

But Samah Hadid at Amnesty International said "Netflix is in danger of facilitating the kingdom's zero-tolerance policy on freedom of expression and assisting the authorities in denying people's right to freely access information."

The Saudi cyber-crime law states that "production, preparation, transmission, or storage of material impinging on public order, religious

Terry Crews is an artist in the body of a defensive end. At different times in his life, the host of “America’s Got Talent: The Champions,” which premieres Monday, Jan. 7, on NBC, has assumed the roles of actor, presenter, comic, author, social activist, pro football player and even amateur IT guy (he built a computer with his son and plans to do another).

And three years ago, the 50-year-old native of Flint, Mich., and co-star of NBC’s “Brooklyn Nine-Nine” added another title to his resume, that of furniture designer, creating the Terry Crews Collection for Bernhardt Design.

“It’s mainly modern living room furniture. 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Healthy recipes - They're only a remote-click away on Food Network

OK, you're a week into 2019 - how are your New Year's resolutions doing?

If any of them have to do with dieting and weight loss and you haven't yet gotten started, then Food Network has a few ideas for meals that can help you tip that balance scale in your bathroom (or doctor's office) in your favor.

The calorie-conscious cooking of "Healthy Weekend" gets going early the morning of Sunday, Jan. 6, with "Southern at Heart," in which host Damaris Phillips shows how to make sesame tuna salad, miso-seared sweet potatoes and sauteed apples, dishes that are low in carbs and high in taste.

Next on "Farmhouse Rules," Nancy Fuller whips up a get-up-and-go smoothie, a chicken and veggie soup with beef-bone broth and salmon with maple dijon glaze. Yum.

Valerie Bertinelli offers up "Clean Eats" in an episode of "Valerie's Kitchen," walking viewers through the steps in making a grilled vegetable salad, a kale and artichoke chicken casserole and slow-cooker oats. Then in the episode titled "On the Road Again," she creates food to keep her energy up for a quick business trip to Chicago.

Conversely, Ree Drummond is home alone in the snow in Oklahoma, where she's planning to exercise and eat low-carb. That means a hike and a lettuce burger for dinner, followed the next day by a "carb-

buster breakfast" of poached eggs and a lunch of butternut squash and kale stir-fry, topped off with an orange resolution smoothie. A meal that's ideal for getting the metabolism going.

Later that morning on "Girl Meets Farm," host Molly Yeh gets a visit from her sister-in-law, for whom she prepares her favorite meal of hummus with meat all over it, homemade whole pita, pita salad with tahini dressing and for dessert, mint cupcakes with cream cheese frosting.

Immediately following on "Barefoot Contessa," Ina Garten shows how to roast vegetables like a pro, starting with butternut squash hummus followed by a roasted vegetable paella and a roast potato fennel soup. Then chef Yotam Ottolenghi gives the lowdown on roasted baby vegetables with sumac and yogurt. Low-cal fare that's also interesting.

Then on "Irish's Southern Kitchen," Trisha Yearwood gets into the post-holiday spirit by trying out goat yoga, then heading to the kitchen to whip up baked green bean fries, garlicky shrimp in crispy tortilla cups and a goddess brown rice bowl. And for dessert, it's a crustless apple pie with granola frozen yogurt.
