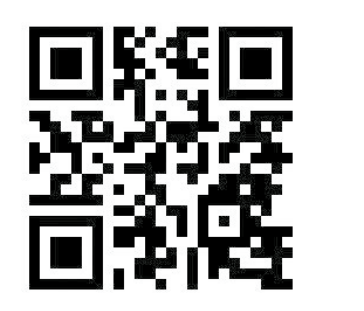

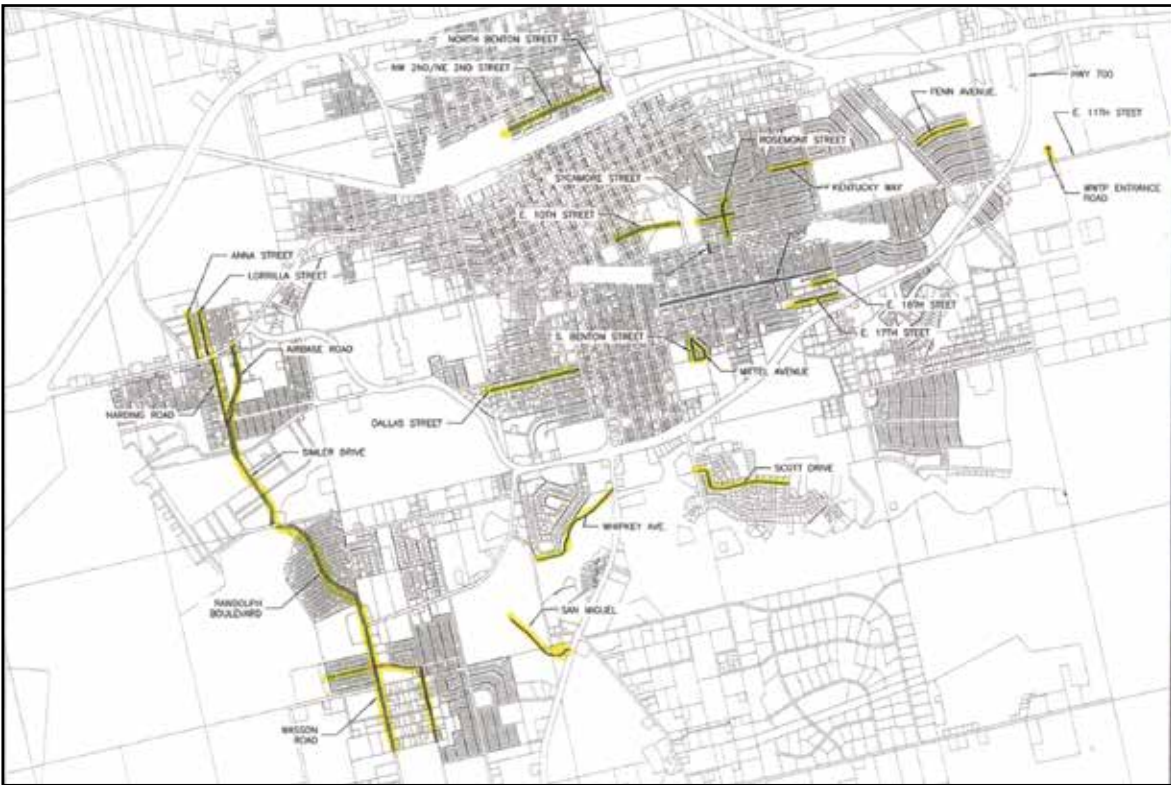
The cyber security item, listed under the heading of Election Administrator Jodi Duck and IT Director Reagan Howard, will be presented by Tom Juhnke.

Shooting suspects apprehended outside Big Spring

Just before 4:00 a.m. on Friday, July 5, 2019, Officers with the San Angelo Police Department's Anti-Crime Unit were conducting burglary prevention patrol in an unmarked unit when they observed a suspected intoxicated driver traveling in the 1100 block of North Van Buren Street.

After observing several traffic violations and erratic driving, ACU Officers requested a marked patrol unit to conduct a traffic stop as they maintained visuals of the vehicle from a safe distance.

While waiting for the marked unit, the ACU Officers observed the suspected intoxicated driver pull into the parking lot of the Lillie Street Church of Christ when

the vehicle's occupant began to discharge a firearm from the vehicle before fleeing the area at a high rate of speed.

The suspect vehicle, a white Cadillac Escalade, eluded pursuing patrol units and was last seen near Arden Road and HWY 2288. A shotgun that was discarded from the Escalade during the suspect's flight was located and seized.

The vehicle was later discovered by Howard County Sheriff's Deputies outside of Big Spring, Texas. The occupants, identified as 21-year-old Jaden Wiggs and 28-year-old Morning Star Brazeal, were apprehended after a vehicle

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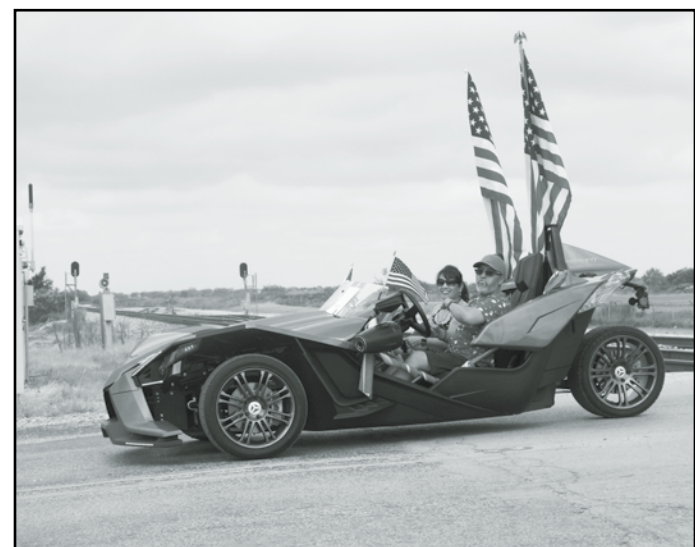
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Patriotism highlighted in Coahoma Freedom Parade

The physicals requirement applies to marching band members entering the first and third years of high school. Students in seventh and eighth grades who march in band also need physicals. A medical history form is required for marching band students in the second and fourth years of high school.

All paperwork is due by Aug. 1.

Some Texas school districts already require physical examinations for marching band students.

The UIL is the governing body for educational extracurricular academic, athletic and music contests.

Man charged in July 4 road rage attack that hurt family of 4

HOUSTON (AP) — Authorities say an 18-year-old man accused of firing a semi-automatic rifle into a car, igniting fireworks in the vehicle and leaving two child passengers severely burned has been charged with assault.

Harris County sheriff's officials said Monday that Bayron J. Rivera surrendered to investigators and is charged with four counts of aggravated assault.

Officials say Rivera unleashed his attack on the car in a fit of road rage July 4, causing the fireworks to erupt and engulf the car in flames. A 1-year-old child and another child believed to be 1 to 3 years old were seriously hurt. Their parents also suffered injuries.

Rivera is being held in the Harris County jail. Online jail records don't indicate whether he has an attorney to speak on his behalf.

Dallas unveils memorial to police officers killed in 2016

DALLAS (AP) — Officials have unveiled a monument to five police officers killed in a sniper attack in downtown Dallas.

The sculpture showing the faces of the fallen officers was revealed in front of police headquarters Monday, three years and a day after a U.S. Army veteran opened fire on a peaceful protest.

Micah Johnson killed four Dallas police and one transit officer before authorities killed him using a robot-delivered bomb. The July 7, 2016, shooting is considered the deadliest day for U.S. law enforcement since the Sept. 11, 2001, terror attacks.

The slain were Dallas officers Lorne Ahrens, Michael Krol, Michael Smith, and Patrick Zamarripa, and Dallas Area Rapid Transit Officer Brent Thompson. Police Chief U. Renee Hall said Monday "it is always our responsibility to honor their life and their legacy."

Texas A&M Sea Aggies on floating classroom from California

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — A borrowed ship from California has become the floating summer school home for more than 300 maritime students and staff from Texas A&M University at Galveston.

The Galveston County Daily News reports the Golden Bear departed Saturday from the Port of Galveston as part of Sea Aggies training. The 500-foot vessel is normally operated by the California State University Maritime Academy.

The Golden Bear set sail with about 260 members of the Corps of Cadets, plus 70 faculty and staff, for two months in the Gulf of Mexico and ocean experience. Daryn Taylor, who's a senior, says the voyage combines the stresses of college life and being on a working vessel in the open sea.

Texas A&M has a smaller training ship, the General Rudder, which can accommodate 50 students.

Houston man accused of trying to join IS pleads guilty

HOUSTON (AP) — A Texas man who planned to travel overseas and shared information on making bombs and using machetes has pleaded guilty to trying to join the Islamic State group.

Prosecutors say 20-year-old Kaan Sercan Damlarkaya of Houston pleaded guilty Monday to attempting to provide material support to a foreign terrorist organization.

Damlarkaya, who is a U.S. citizen, was arrested in December 2017 following an undercover FBI investigation. He remains in custody pending sentencing in Houston and faces up to 20 years in federal prison.

Investigators say Damlarkaya shared information on making and using weapons with people he thought also supported IS.

Authorities found a machete near Damlarkaya's bed.

Retrial begins for Texas man accused of killing wife in 1999

HOUSTON (AP) — A former Houston-area high school football coach is being tried for the second time in the killing of his pregnant wife 20 years ago.

David Mark Temple returned to a Harris County court Monday, less than three years after Texas' top criminal court overturned his previous murder conviction because prosecutors withheld evidence.

In 2007, a jury found Temple guilty in the 1999 killing of Belinda Temple, a high school teacher who was seven months pregnant. Prosecutors said Temple staged a burglary of their home in Katy and shot his wife because he was having an affair.

But in 2016, the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed a lower court's ruling that the trial would have gone differently if prosecutors had given Temple's attorneys hundreds of pages of police reports.

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AL's Verlander, NL's Ryu starting pitchers in All-Star Game

CLEVELAND (AP) — Sitting next to Justin Verlander, American League manager Alex Cora cheekily declared "we've got the opener" as he described his pitching plans.

Touché!

Houston's ace has been among the players most critical of some teams' practice of using relief pitchers as ersatz starters for an inning or two.

Verlander will be making his second All-Star start on Tuesday night. Los Angeles Dodgers manager Dave Roberts selected Hyun-Jin Ryu from his own staff to make his first start for the National League.

A 36-year-old right-hander, Verlander is 10-4 with a 2.98 ERA this year for the Houston Astros, striking out 153 in 126 2/3 innings.

He allowed five runs in the first inning during the 2012 All-Star Game at Kansas City, including the first-bases loaded triple in All-Star history, to Pablo Sandoval.

"I kind of halfway blame it on Prince Fielder," Verlander said. "He was at first base, and he kept whispering at me, 'Ver, Ver, Ver, throw 100.' OK, Prince, here we go. So that was back then."

Verlander, then with Detroit, threw five pitches clocked at 100 mph and another at 101 during a 35-pitch inning.

"I don't quite throw 100 anymore. Maybe I'll try tomorrow," he said. "The goal is to get guys out.

That's it."

All-Star starters were openers before the term was coined. No starter has pitched more than two innings since Greg Maddux threw three in 1994, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

"This game has 120-plus years of history, and I think we're riding this little wave of things that are a little different right now," he said. "But I think it will come back around."

Verlander also is not a fan of the dominance of power and strikeouts — even though he has 2,859.

"The game goes in cycles. I think at a certain point I think analytics will catch up to things where it's hard right now," he said. "I think the ability to put the ball in play will come back in a big way and probably in the not-too-distant future."

Ryu, a 32-year-old left-hander from South Korea, is 10-2 with a major league-leading 1.73 ERA for the NL champion Dodgers. He is the second Asian All-Star starter after Dodgers rookie Hideo Nomo of Japan in 1995.

"When I signed with the Dodgers, all I wanted was to get a chance to compete with the best in Major League Baseball," Ryu said through a translator. "I wasn't necessarily thinking about pitching in an All-Star Game. But like I said before, this is all surreal to me."

Roberts envisions the Dodgers' Clayton Kershaw following Ryu and then the New York Mets' Jacob deGrom. Cora plans to have the Yankees' Masahiro Tanaka pitch second and then decided to go back-

ward: New York's Aroldis Chapman would pitch the ninth if the AL is ahead, Cleveland's Brad Hand the eighth and Houston's Ryan Pressly the seventh.

"We've got the opener. We've got the close, and the setup guys," Cora said. "It should be fun."

Houston's George Springer leads off and plays right field for the AL and is followed in the batting order by New York Yankees second baseman DJ LeMahieu, Los Angeles Angels center fielder Mike Trout, Cleveland first baseman Carlos Santana, Boston designated hitter J.D. Martinez, Houston third baseman Alex Bregman, Yankees catcher Gary Sánchez, Astros left fielder Michael Brantley and Minnesota shortstop Jorge Polanco.

Milwaukee's Christian Yelich tops the NL order and plays left field. Chicago Cubs shortstop Javier Báez hits second, followed by Atlanta first baseman Freddie Freeman, Los Angeles Dodgers right fielder Cody Bellinger, Colorado third baseman Nolan Arenado, Pittsburgh's Josh Bell at designated hitter, Cubs catcher Wilson Contreras, Arizona second baseman Ketel Marte and Atlanta center fielder Ronald Acuña Jr.

Cora joked about LeMahieu's success against the Red Sox in his first season after leaving the Rockies for New York — especially when Boston played the Yankees in London last month.

"People in the offseason thought that he wasn't going to be able to hit outside of Colorado. Well, he hits outside of Colorado and in Europe, too," Cora said.

Big 3 not slowing down as Wimbledon heads to quarterfinals

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — The Big Three sure do not appear to be slowing down. If anything, they are as dominant as ever.

Roger Federer, Rafael Nadal and Novak Djokovic head into Wednesday's quarterfinals at Wimbledon owning 14 of the last 16 championships at the All England Club. They have won the past 10 Grand Slam titles overall and 53 of 64. And the way they made it through the fourth round, dropping a combined total of 19 games across their three victories, served as simply the latest reminder of the gulf between them and everyone else.

"The best guys now are fully engaged, they know exactly what to expect from the court and the conditions. That helps us to play better. I think with experience, that's good. We haven't dropped much energy in any way. It's not like we're coming in with an empty tank into the second week," said Federer, an eight-time champion at Wimbledon. "All these little things help us to then really thrive in these conditions."

Sam Querrey, the American ranked 65th whose task is to take on Nadal for a semifinal berth, was asked what message the trio has sent with its supremacy over the last 15 years.

"Just: 'We're better than you guys,'" Querrey replied.

Well put.

For the 24th time, Federer, Nadal and Djokovic reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam tournament together. On 20 of those previous occasions, one eventually walked away with the trophy. Would be rather surprising if this doesn't become the 21st.

In addition to No. 3 seed Nadal vs. Querrey, the other matchups Wednesday are No. 1 Djokovic vs. No. 21 David Goffin, No. 2 Federer vs. No. 8 Kei Nishikori, and No. 23 Roberto Bautista Agut vs. No. 26 Guido Pella.

The most excited member of the group was Pella, a 29-year-old from Argentina who eliminated 2016 runner-up Milos Raonic and 2018 runner-up Kevin Anderson on his first trip past the third round at a major tournament.

"It's the first time in my career I feel important," Pella said.

If Federer and Nadal both win, they would meet in the semifinals, just like they did at the French Open last month, when Nadal was on his way to a 12th championship in Paris. They haven't played each other in any round at Wimbledon since the marvelous 2008 final, when Nadal edged Federer 9-7 in the fifth set in dwindling daylight.

First things first, though.

Querrey's serve could be the key to his matchup against Nadal, who has won

All-Stars make attractive trade targets as deadline nears

CLEVELAND (AP) — For a day, Will Smith was in for quite a treat — teammates with Clayton Kershaw, Freddie Freeman and Christian Yelich.

Soon, the San Francisco reliever could be playing with one of them for real.

Smith woked into the All-Star Game on Tuesday night well aware his days with the last-place Giants might be dwindling.

"If I get traded, it'll be the fourth time," the left-hander said. "After the first one, you're kind of numb to it."

Fellow All-Star pitchers Marcus Stroman, Shane Greene and Brad Hand also are possible trade targets as the July 31 deadline approaches.

Hand is an old hand at this. The San Diego Padres sent the left-hander to Cleveland just two days after the 2018 All-Star Game, during the break.

"I didn't really think I was going to get traded last year," Hand said Monday. "It's part of what we signed up for. ... There's really nothing you can do about it unless you have a no-trade clause."

"I mean obviously there's a select handful of guys whose names are always thrown out there, so it's always the teams at the top of the division looking to get stronger and teams at the bottom looking to get something in return, so we'll see what happens," he said.

At last year's All-Star Game, there was little doubt it was Manny Machado's last time in a Baltimore uniform. He even gave a hint of what to come when he pulled out his phone — while playing shortstop — and posed for a selfie with Dodgers outfielder Matt Kemp.

The next day, the Orioles traded Machado to the Dodgers.

Greene has 22 saves and a 1.09 ERA for the last-place Detroit Tigers, making him an attractive option for teams in the playoff chase.

"It's a business and it's part of the game. Right now, I'm here. I'm going to enjoy myself," Greene said.

Stroman is 5-9 with a 3.18 ERA for Toronto, a team that hopes to build for the future with the likes of Vladimir Guerrero Jr. and Cavan Biggio.

"I don't know if I'll be part of it," Stroman said.

Some teams, such as the Indians, will see where the next few weeks take them. They've recently closed the gap on Minnesota in the AL Central, meaning Hand and his 23 saves and 2.17 ERA might not be so expendable.

Same goes for Cleveland pitcher Trevor Bauer. There's bound to be talk about San Francisco lefty Madison Bumgarner and Mets pitcher Zack Wheeler.

But contending clubs can't take too long. There used to be two trade deadlines — July 31 for swaps without restrictions, then Aug. 31 to deal

Breeders' Cup to add to safety measures at Santa Anita

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Breeders' Cup will increase the number of veterinarians on site during its world championships this fall at Santa Anita, where 30 horses died during the racing meet that recently concluded.

That's according to Craig Fravel, president and chief executive of the Breeders' Cup, who said reaction to the board of directors' decision to keep the two-day event at the historic Southern California track has been "very supportive."

"People had every opportunity to know what the facts are before they decided," he said by phone Monday while driving from San Diego to Los Angeles. "The fact that it was a unanimous vote is reflective of the sentiment in the room."

Santa Anita will host for a record 10th time on Nov. 1-2.

Besides the 14 vets on-site during Breeders' Cup week, there will be 20

on hand during the two days of racing, Fravel said.

"Every horse gets examined two times, probably more," he said. "We have the strictest medication rules. We'll be looking at horses throughout the summer and fall before we get to the Breeders' Cup. We certainly don't mind people asking those questions."

The event will be run under the house rules adopted by track owner The Stronach Group to improve safety. Those include a reduction in the use of race-day Lasix, an anti-bleeding medication.

Fravel said there wasn't one factor that swayed the Breeders' Cup board to keep the event at Santa Anita.

"We've been following the situation since it began to evolve in January, February, March," he said. "It was a combination of things: medication reforms, track surface improvements and changes in management."

Belinda Stronach, president and chief executive of TSG, addressed the

board at last month's meeting in Lexington, Kentucky.

Fravel is traveling to Europe next week to meet with racing officials there.

"The Europeans were incredibly supportive," he said. "I think they believe the problems are being addressed. They have confidence in the Breeders' Cup team."

At the same time, Fravel received emails from others who are unhappy about keeping the event at Santa Anita.

"People who have different perspectives have let me know, some more politely than others," he said. "I certainly understand people's perspectives on this."

Racing at Santa Anita resumes Sept. 25.

If more deaths would occur at the track during racing leading up to the Breeders' Cup, would it still be possible to change locations at the last minute?

"Anything is possible," Fravel said. "We're focused on doing the event the best way possible."

Animal rights activists protested outside the track throughout its winter-spring racing season, toting signs and urging the end of racing in California. It's possible they'll make their presence known during Breeders' Cup as well.

"Plans will be made to allow those people to express themselves," Fravel said. "We certainly don't disregard those points of view. The self-examination we're undergoing is an important part of growing as an industry."

Fravel said ticket sales are "about on par" with where they were the last time the event visited Santa Anita, in 2016. He said he remains hopeful that organizers will hit their projected sales numbers.

"I'm confident Santa Anita has been through a rough experience," he said, "and I'm sure they've learned a lot of lessons."

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Contract Bridge

Out of the blue

East dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

NORTH

The bidding:
East 2 NT South Pass West 6 NT North Pass

Opening lead — ten of spades.

In choosing his line of play, declarer tries to give himself the maximum chance to make the contract. If there is more than one way to play the hand, he selects the one that — mathematically — offers him the greatest probability of success.

Consider this deal where West leads a spade against six notrump and declarer can count only 11 sure tricks. The 12th can come from either of two sources. One possibility is to lead the K-A and another club, hoping the opposing clubs are divided 3-3.

The other alternative is to lead a low diamond toward dummy, hoping West has the queen. If he does, declarer makes three diamond tricks instead of two.

In choosing between the two alternatives, South is governed by the law of probabilities. He compares the chance that West was dealt the queen of diamonds (50 percent) with the chance that the clubs are divided 3-3 (36 percent).

Since the percentages clearly favor attacking diamonds, South wins the spade lead in his hand and leads the diamond three to the jack. East wins with the queen, which is a nasty blow — but not necessarily fatal.

After winning the diamond, East returns a diamond. South takes the ace and cashes all his spades and hearts, reducing everyone to four cards.

This leaves South with the K-7 of diamonds and K-4 of clubs, while dummy has the A-7-6-5 of clubs. East, however, runs into serious difficulty as the last heart is being cashed. Holding the 9-8 of diamonds and the Q-10-9 of clubs, he cannot find a safe discard. Whatever he decides to do, South scores the rest of the tricks, making the slam on a squeeze that was not even contemplated at the outset.

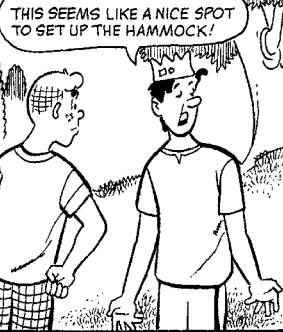

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Tuesday, July 9, the 190th day of 2019. There are 175 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On July 9, 1850, the 12th president of the United States, Zachary Taylor, died after serving only 16 months of his term. (He was succeeded by Millard Fillmore.)

On this date: In 1755, British General Edward Braddock was mortally wounded as his troops suffered a massive defeat during the French and Indian War (he died four days later).

In 1776, the Declaration of Independence was read aloud to Gen. George Washington's troops in New York.

In 1816, Argentina declared independence from Spain.

In 1918, 101 people were killed in a train collision in Nashville, Tennessee. The Distinguished Service Cross was established by an Act of Congress.

In 1937, a fire at 20th Century Fox's film storage facility in Little Ferry, New Jersey, destroyed most of the studio's silent films.

In 1947, the engagement of Britain's Princess Elizabeth to Lt. Philip Mountbatten was announced.

In 1962, pop artist Andy Warhol's exhibit of 32 paintings of Campbell's soup cans opened at the Ferus Gallery in Los Angeles.

In 1974, former U.S. Chief Justice Earl Warren died in Washington at age 83.

In 1982, Pan Am Flight 759, a Boeing 727, crashed in Kenner, Louisiana, shortly after takeoff from New Orleans International Airport, killing all 145 people aboard and eight people on the ground.

In 1992, Democrat Bill Clinton tapped Tennessee Sen. Al Gore to be his running mate. Former CBS News commentator Eric Sevareid died in Washington at age 79.

In 1995, Jerry Garcia performed for the final time as frontman of the Grateful Dead during a concert at Chicago's Soldier Field (Garcia died a month later).

In 2001, a divided court in Chile ruled that Gen. Augusto Pinochet could not be tried on human rights charges because of his de-

teriorating health and mental condition, a ruling that effectively brought the 85-year-old former dictator's legal troubles to an end.

Ten years ago: The Group of Eight industrialized nations opened their summit in L'Aquila, Italy, to Group of Five developing countries Brazil, China, India, Mexico and South Africa, as well as Egypt. The Dutch government turned over dozens of antiquities stolen from Iraq to Baghdad's ambassador. Michael Phelps broke the then-world record in the 100-meter butterfly at the U.S. national championships in Indianapolis, swimming the two-lap final in 50.22 seconds.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama began a two-day visit to Texas, where he met with state officials, including Gov. Rick Perry, to discuss the influx of unaccompanied children at the U.S.-Mexico border. Modeling agency founder Eileen Ford, 92, died in Morristown, New Jersey.

One year ago: President Donald Trump chose Brett Kavanaugh, a solidly conservative, politically connected federal appeals court judge, for the Supreme Court to fill the seat left vacant by the retirement of Justice Anthony Kennedy. (Kavanaugh would be confirmed in October after a contentious nomination fight.) Starbucks announced that it would eliminate plastic straws from all of its locations within two years, citing the environmental threat to oceans. Former movie mogul Harvey Weinstein pleaded not guilty to new sexual assault charges involving a third woman.

Querrey's reward for Wimbledon quarterfinal? Facing Nadal

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Sam Querrey is in the Wimbledon quarterfinals for the third time in four years. His reward as he seeks to reach his first Grand Slam final? A matchup against 18-time major champion Rafael Nadal.

"It's going to just get harder and harder," the American said. "It's his least favorite place of the Slams — and he's 'finaled' it five times. And he's been rolling through guys."

Querrey, who is ranked 65th after recently returning from an injured abdominal muscle, used his big serve to get past Tennys Sandgren 6-4, 6-7 (7), 7-6 (3), 7-6 (5) on Monday in the first meeting between two U.S. men in the fourth round or later at Wimbledon in 19 years.

Querrey hit 25 aces and saved all four break points he faced.

"I love playing here and I'm getting more comfortable every year. I like playing on the grass," Querrey said. "It's becoming more of a thing when I get here: I don't care so much who I'm playing, because I have just the confidence that I can make a run, regardless of who's in front of me."

In 2016, he upset defending champion Novak Djokovic on the way to the quarterfinals.

In 2017, he upset defending champion Andy Murray on the way to the semifinals.

Now comes Nadal, who won Wimbledon twice and was the runner-up three other times in a span of five appearances from 2006-11.

"I'm going to have to serve incredibly well, take my chances when I get them," Querrey said, "and,

you know, hopefully I can have a good day out there."

Nadal, who is seeded third, carries a 16-match winning streak into Wednesday's quarterfinal against Querrey. That includes a 12th trophy at the French Open last month.

"When he plays well, he can be very, very dangerous in all surfaces," Nadal said. "But, of course, in fast surfaces, when he serves with his aggressive game, maybe more."

Nadal never had a bit of trouble during his 6-2, 6-2, 6-2 victory over Joao Sousa of Portugal on Monday. Djokovic and Roger Federer also breezed through.

Federer overwhelmed No. 17 Matteo Berrettini of Italy 6-1, 6-2, 6-2, and Djokovic did the same to Ugo Humbert of France 6-3, 6-2, 6-3.

On Wednesday, Djokovic meets No. 21 David Goffin of Belgium, Federer plays No. 8 Kei Nishikori of Japan, and No. 23 Roberto Bautista Agut of Spain faces No. 26 Guido Pella of Argentina.

This is the 24th time the Big Three all reached the quarterfinals of a major tournament; one of them ended up with the title on 20 of the previous occasions.

"It's pretty incredible, their dominance. They don't seem to take a Slam off, rarely a Masters Series off," Querrey said. "They're engaged and focused — match-in, match-out — for 15 years."

LOVE MATCH

The best Grand Slam tournament of Alison Riske's career is happening as her wedding date approaches. So after upsetting No. 1 Ash Barty in three sets Monday to reach Wimbledon's quarterfinals, Riske joked: "I wish I could get married more

often."

No word on how her husband-to-be, Stephen Amritraj, feels about that sentiment.

"Maybe we'll have to renew our vows, because it's worked out well having that on the horizon," said Riske, a 29-year-old from Pittsburgh. "I'm looking forward to it so much."

The 55th-ranked Riske will take on 23-time major champion Serena Williams on Tuesday.

And what about all the planning involved in having a wedding?

"Everything is pretty much already in stone. I'm not really stressed about it. I haven't been stressed about it, really, from the beginning," Riske said with a laugh, "probably because my fiancé has been doing all the work."

SERANDY OR MURRENA?

Since every celebrity couple needs a nickname, there's been some discussion about what the all-star mixed doubles pair of Serena Williams and Andy Murray should be called.

He tweeted a suggestion of "SerAndy," which combines the first syllable of her name with his name — and also is a play off the fact that he's known as Sir Andy, on account of his knighthood.

Williams responded on Twitter by offering up the alternative of "MurRena," using the first syllable of his last name and last syllable of her first name.

She then repeated her preference for that one when speaking to reporters Monday.

Williams is scheduled for double duty at Centre Court on Tuesday: She plays her singles quarterfinal to open the day's program there, then returns with Murray for their second-round doubles match.

Pogba in spotlight as Manchester United arrives in Perth

PERTH, Australia (AP) — France midfielder Paul Pogba's future with Manchester United was in the spotlight as the team arrived in Perth for a 10-day visit that includes two friendlies, a corporate golf day and a soccer clinic with disadvantaged children.

The English Premier League team plays its first match on Saturday against the A-League's Perth Glory. On July 17, Leeds United will be the opposition at the same Perth Stadium.

Pogba, who is considering a move from Manchester United, likely to Real Madrid or Juventus, was among the players despite speculation that he might not make the trip to Australia.

Pogba said last month in Tokyo that he feels ready for a change.

"For me, you know I've been here for three years in Manchester, it's been great," he said then. "(But) I think for me it can be a good time to have a new challenge somewhere else."

Pogba has two more years remaining on his United contract.

On Tuesday, Pogba's agent Mino Raiola told London-based TalkSPORT radio that he is hopeful that Pogba will soon be allowed to leave Manchester United.

"The player (Pogba) has done nothing wrong," Raiola said. "He has been re-

spectful and professional in every way and always.

"The club has known his feeling for a long time. Hopefully there will be soon a satisfying solution for all parties."

United's Twitter feed showed players signing autographs at the airport and others walking around the Western Australia state capital.

State government officials, who said they expect about 20,000 fans to come to Perth for the matches, said the team will also participate in a training session in front of about 14,000 fans, attend a dinner at the stadium and appear at other corporate functions.

Premier Mark McGowan said most of the tourists expected in the city are from Britain.

"They won't just watch the soccer. They'll go shopping, they'll go to restaurants, they may well have a holiday around WA," McGowan said.

He would not disclose what the state government paid to bring the team to the city.

"You don't reveal what you bid or what you pay because then you give a competitive advantage to your competitors when you bid for something else," he said. "So these things are always kept relatively secret."

two of his 18 Grand Slam trophies on the All England Club's grass. Querrey — whose best showing at a major was reaching Wimbledon's semifinals two years ago — leads the tournament with 100 aces and by winning 71 of 72 service games.

But Nadal, who is 33, is no slouch as a returner. He has converted 49% of his break chances so far, 19 of 39, which is second-best to Federer among the quarterfinalists.

"He doesn't take a point off. Just being lefty is kind of a challenge in itself. You know, he's intense. He's a shotmaker. He's energetic," Querrey said. "You know when you go out there, he's going to make you beat him."

The same could be said of Federer, who seeks his 21st Grand Slam title as his 38th birthday approaches on Aug. 8, or Djokovic, who is aiming for his 16th at age 32.

While Nishikori has only been to one Grand Slam final, at the 2014 U.S. Open, and Goffin has yet to reach the semifinals, getting to this portion of a major tournament is old hat for their opponents.

That, of course, makes a difference.

"The experience we have helps confidence. Everything that we have achieved in our careers, obviously, we carry onto the court, then most of the players feel that, feel pressure," Djokovic said. "For us, it's another match on the center stage that we've experienced so many times."

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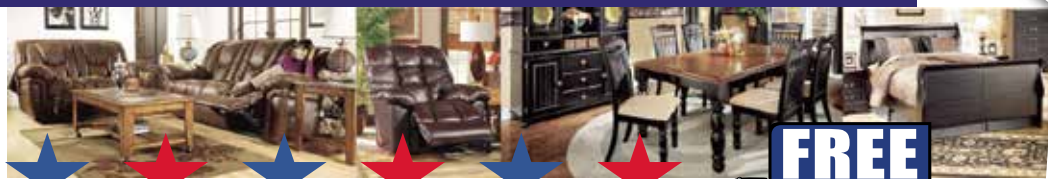
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
