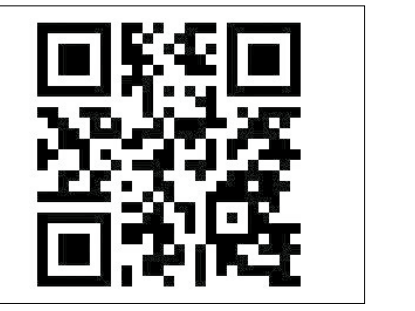

riders from Howard County. There were a total of 115 registered riders who took part in the Bike Run.

“Each rider had to visit seven locations in order to make their hand, and the rider with the best hand at the end of the two-hours was the winner,” Clark said. “Not only did it give the bikers an opportunity to get out and enjoy a ride around Howard County, but it highlighted several local businesses and raised awareness while helping a good cause.”

Through registration fees, sponsorships and wild card sales, \$5,254 was raised to benefit CASA

and the new Big Spring location. The monies will help build up the new location in order for CASA to serve Howard County locally, instead of sending clients outside of their home area. The official ground breaking for the new location is set for Oct. 9 at 10 a.m.; the community is invited to attend.

“Whether you are traveling around in a truck, in a car, or on a motorcycle we want to encourage you to be cautious, follow traffic laws and be courteous,” Clark said. “We all have places to go, but we are more likely to get there safely if we just slow down a bit and stay alert and avoid distractions.”

She continued, “The first annual Bikes Across Big Spring

thanks to all the wonderful volunteers – Chamber Ambassadors, Danielle Owens and others – along with local businesses who sponsored the event. We are looking for an even bigger and better event next year.”

Clark has already started planning the 2020 event and is looking for sponsors, supports and bikers to ride in the event.

“I was truly impressed, amazed and encouraged by the support this event was given this year, and there is no doubt that next year will even better.”

located on the other side of the Airpark grounds from Hangar 25 at 3200 Rickabaugh Drive.

The movie for the occasion will be the 2013 animated Disney movie "Planes." Set in the same universe as the "Cars" movie franchise, "Planes" follows the adventures of Dusty Crophopper, a crop duster plane who dreams of becoming a racing plane.

Admission to movie night is free. Families, including kids, can bring their own blankets and/or chairs to enjoy the movie; popcorn and bottled water will be provided free, and prizes will be awarded.

Pilots will fly in to the airport and breakfast will be served starting at 8 a.m. Saturday. Breakfast is provided free to participating pilots; non-pilots can join the flyers for \$5 per breakfast plate.

Pilot awards will be distributed and some comments about the airport will be delivered at 10 a.m. Saturday, according to Airport Director Col. Jim Little.

Earlier this month, the first airport in Big Spring started business with a bang.

Big Spring already had some experience with aviation by that time. The first plane touched down in Big Spring in 1911 – in an area near what is today the intersection of Settles and East 12th St.

In the 1920s, several U.S. Army biplanes spent some time in town, based east of the present Howard College campus, and the giant dirigible Shenandoah passed by overhead in 1924.

Big Spring moved a step closer to acquiring its own airport in 1925 when rancher H.F. Taylor offered 225 acres of his land west of town for the facility's site.

In October 1928, the City of Big Spring proposed a \$150,000 bond package including \$65,000 for purchase of the site, but the bond was defeated in November of that same year.

In May 1929, the Big Spring Airport Company was founded with \$65,000 capital stock at \$50 a share. The board of directors included Ray Wilcox, president; B. Reagan, vice president; Frank B. King, secretary; A.J. Crawford; Fox Stripling; and T.S. Currie. Construction was soon underway for a five-room terminal including a ticket office, communications center, rooms for the U.S. Dept. of Commerce and U.S. Weather Bureau. A steel hangar, shops, concrete apron and border lights for night flying were also in the mix.

Sept. 12 and 13 marked the formal opening of the Big Spring Airport. The Big Spring Municipal Band was augmented by the world-famous Hardin-Simmons Cowboy Band to provide entertainment

for the occasion, and quite a few then-modern aircraft – the all-aluminum fuselage Ford Tri-Motor, and a Lockheed Speedster were on-hand.

Renowned aviator Amelia Earhart was contacted to see if she would come out and participate in the opening ceremony, but her schedule didn't permit it. She did promise to talk up Big Spring's opening ceremony at her events around the country.

There were a couple of tragedies marring the opening ceremonies. Frank King, the original Big Spring Airport Company's secretary on the Board of Directors, was killed on a flight returning home from Amarillo, where he publicized the event. G.H. Byrne, another backer of Big Spring aviation, was killed along with a Miss Williams when their plane went down just half a mile from Big Spring's airport.

And also in 1929, the dirigible Akron became lost in a violent thunderstorm near Big Spring when the storm disrupted communications with the terminal. That incident ended happily enough, though. The dirigible eventually managed to get signals through the storm, and the crew indicated the craft was fine.

The airport closed its doors during World War II in 1942 and was converted into the Big Spring Army Air Field – which was the home of the Big Spring Bombardier School. By the end of the war, more than 6,000 trainees had completed bombardier training, including the use of the top secret Norden bomb sight.

The Air Force became involved in the site in 1951, when it was announced that Big Spring would be the site of an Air Force base. Big Spring's Webb AFB was home to the 3560th Air Training Wing, and began training pilots on T-28 trainers in 1952. T-33 jets, T-37s, and T-38s were also used at the facility for training pilots.

In 1977 the word came down that Webb would close.

These days, the Airport is known as McMahon-Wrinkle Airport. It includes a civil air terminal and the former Webb runways, as well as a large business Airpark – home to several industrial tenants and the GEO Flightline Unit prison – and rail access through the Big Spring Rail System company.

Congratulations on 90 years of airport history, Big Spring!

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Ex-Dallas officer who killed neighbor found guilty of murder

DALLAS (AP) — A white former Dallas police officer who shot her black unarmed neighbor to death after, she said, mistaking his apartment for her own was convicted of murder Tuesday in a verdict that prompted tears of relief from his family and chants of "Black Lives Matter" from a crowd outside the courtroom.

The same jury that found Amber Guyger guilty in the September 2018 death of her upstairs neighbor, Botham Jean, will consider her fate after hearing additional testimony starting Tuesday afternoon. She could be sentenced to from five to 99 years in prison under Texas law.

The jury took a matter of hours to convict Guyger, 31, after six days of testimony.

Cheers erupted in the courthouse as the verdict was announced, and someone yelled "Thank you, Jesus!" In the hallway outside the courtroom, a crowd celebrated and chanted "black lives matter." When the prosecutors walked into the hall, they broke into cheers.

After the verdict was read, Guyger sat alone, weeping, at the defense table.

Family members are testifying about how they were affected by the killing of Jean, an accountant from the Caribbean island nation of St. Lucia.

Allison Jean, the victim's mother, was the first to address the jury during the sentencing phase of Guyger's trial. Jean said her son's death has torn her apart.

"My life has not been the same. It's just been like a roller coaster. I can't sleep, I cannot eat. It's just been the most terrible time for me," she said.

Guyger's defense attorneys can argue that she deserves a light sentence because she acted out of sudden fear and confusion. The judge is expected to provide guidance on sentencing law;

It is unclear how long the punishment phase of the trial will last.

The basic facts of the unusual shooting were not in dispute throughout the trial. After a long shift at work and still in uniform, Guyger walked up to Jean's apartment — which was on the fourth floor, directly above hers on the third — and found the door unlocked. Thinking the apartment was her own, she drew her service weapon and entered.

Jean had been eating a bowl of ice cream when Guyger entered his home and shot him.

The shooting drew widespread attention because of the strange circumstances and because it was one in a string of shootings of unarmed black men by white police officers.

"A 26-year-old college-educated black man, certified public accountant, working for one of the big three accounting firms in the world ... it shouldn't take all of that for unarmed black and brown people in America to get justice," Benjamin Crump, one of the lawyers for Jean's family, said at a news conference Tuesday.

Crump said the verdict honors other people of color who were killed by police officers who were not convicted of a crime.

Attorney Lee Merritt, who also represents the family, underlined Crump's words.

"This is a huge victory, not only for the family of Botham Jean, but this is a victory for black people in America. It's a signal that the tide is going to change here. Police officers are going to be held accountable for their actions, and we believe that will begin to change policing culture around the world," Merritt said.

The jury that convicted Guyger was largely made up of women and people of color.

Dallas Police Association President Mike Mata declined to comment Tuesday afternoon, saying Guyger's lawyers asked

him to wait until after sentencing. The group, which represents city police officers, has paid for Guyger's legal defense and security.

The verdict may have defused tensions that began simmering Monday when jurors were told they could consider whether Guyger had a right to use deadly force under a Texas law known as the castle doctrine — even though she wasn't in her own home.

The law is similar to "stand your ground" measures across the U.S. that state a person has no duty to retreat from an intruder. Prosecutor Jason Fine told

jurors that while the law would have empowered Jean to shoot someone barging into his apartment, it doesn't apply "the other way around."

Guyger was arrested three days after the killing. She was later fired and charged with murder. Tension has been high during the trial in Dallas, where five police officers were killed in an attack three years ago.

Guyger tearfully apologized for killing Jean and told the jurors she feared for her life upon finding the door to what she thought was her apartment unlocked. Guyger said Jean approached her when she entered the unit with her gun out. Prosecutors suggested he was just rising from a couch toward the back of the room when the officer shot him.

In a frantic 911 call played repeatedly during the trial, Guyger said "I thought it was my apartment" nearly 20 times. Her lawyers argued that the identical physical appearance of the apartment complex from floor to floor frequently led to tenants going to the wrong apartments.

But prosecutors questioned how Guyger could have missed numerous signs that she was in the wrong place, asked why she didn't call for backup and suggested she was distracted by sexually explicit phone messages with her police partner.

Odessa man accused of fatally shooting man whose car stalled

ODESSA, Texas (AP) — A man has been arrested after authorities say he killed one person and injured another when he opened fire several times last week on people whose vehicles stalled in the Odessa area of West Texas.

Troy Lee Wilson of Odessa was arrested and charged Friday with murder and evading arrest. The 36-year-old remained jailed in the Midland County Detention Center on Tuesday on \$550,000 bond. The jail record didn't list an attorney for him.

An affidavit says that in four incidents last week — three on Sept. 24, one on Thursday — Wilson shot at people after offering to help with their vehicles. Juan Leonardo Ro-

salez, 31, was killed Thursday. A man who was shot on Sept. 24 was treated and released and no one was injured in the other two incidents.

In the area about a month earlier — on Aug. 31 — seven people were killed and about two dozen injured during a shooting that spanned 10 miles (16 kilometers). Before officers killed 36-year-old Seth Ator, he spread terror across Odessa and Midland while firing indiscriminately from his car into passing vehicles and shopping plazas. He also hijacked a U.S. Postal Service mail truck, killing the driver.

Ector County Sheriff Mike Griffis said he "couldn't speculate" whether last week's shooter could have been copying Ator.

Soto lifts Nats to 4-3 comeback wild-card win over Brewers

WASHINGTON (AP) — After all the heartache and close calls, all the early exits, maybe it makes sense that a 20-year-old kid who never had been to the post-season, Juan Soto, would help the Washington Nationals finally advance.

And maybe, just maybe, it makes sense that it would be this particular edition of the Nationals, a club that went from 12 games under .500 in May to playoff participant, that demonstrated the necessary never-give-up fortitude when things looked bleak.

Soto delivered a bases-loaded single against Milwaukee closer Josh Hader that scored three runs with two outs in the eighth inning, thanks in part to an error by rookie outfielder Trent Grisham, and the Nationals came back to beat the Brewers 4-3 in the NL wild-card game Tuesday night.

"We started off horrible, as we all

know, and we vowed that we wouldn't quit," Nationals manager Dave Martinez said, talking about the year as a whole but sounding like he could have meant this particular evening. "I told the boys, 'I promise you, stay with it, don't quit, this will turn around.' And it did. And here we are today."

The Nationals carry a nine-game winning streak into their best-of-five NL Division Series against the league-best Dodgers.

Game 1 is Thursday in Los Angeles, and some in the sellout crowd of 42,993 chanted "Beat LA! Beat LA!" as members of the Nationals began their celebration on the infield with family members.

That included Soto's father leaping onto his back and tackling him amid the excitement.

The Nationals, who moved to Washington from Montreal before the 2005 season, had been 0-3 in winner-take-all postseason games — all NLDS

Game 5 losses at home, by a grand total of four runs. Indeed, eight of their past nine playoff losses had been by one run apiece.

This time, it went the other way.

"We've been here a bunch of times. Never kind of broke through," said Ryan Zimmerman, the Nationals' first draft pick back in 2005, so someone who has been through all the disappointment. "Finally caught a break tonight."

It was Zimmerman's broken-bat bloop single as a pinch hitter that helped load the bases in the eighth off Hader, who took the loss.

Hader hit another pinch hitter, Michael A. Taylor, a ruling that stood up when the Brewers challenged, according to Major League Baseball, because there wasn't "clear and convincing evidence to overturn the call."

Said Hader: "Definitely looked like it got the bat, but it also got his hand." Hader, who had 37 saves this sea-

son, also walked Anthony Rendon, filling the bags and bringing Soto to the plate.

What was Soto thinking right then? "Just get a base hit up the middle," he said, "and try to help to tie the game."

The runner-up for 2018 NL Rookie of the Year did more than that. Soto ripped a 96 mph fastball to right, and the ball slipped under Grisham's glove for an error. That allowed the go-ahead run to cross the plate and Soto to get to second, then turn for third.

"Right guy, right spot," winning pitcher Stephen Strasburg said about Soto.

Eventually, Soto was caught in a rundown to end the inning, but that didn't matter: He had turned a 3-1 deficit into a lead, and so he clapped his hands, then pounded his chest and high-fived third base coach Bob

Andy Murray, Bianca Andreescu win at China Open

BEIJING (AP) — Andy Murray won consecutive singles matches for the first time since undergoing hip surgery in January while U.S. Open champion Bianca Andreescu won her 15th in a row at the China Open on Wednesday.

The 32-year-old Murray beat British countryman Cameron Norrie 7-6 (6), 6-7 (4), 6-1 to make the singles quarterfinals at a tournament for the first time in 12 months.

Murray will face either top-seeded Dominic Thiem or Chinese wild-card entry Zhang Zhizhen on Friday.

The No. 6-ranked Andreescu beat Elise Mertens of Belgium 6-3, 7-6 (5) in a second-round match. It was a rematch of a U.S. Open quarterfinal, which Andreescu won en route to her first career Grand Slam title last month.

Andreescu, a 19-year-old Canadian, will face Jennifer Brady in the next round. Brady earlier beat fellow American Madison Keys 2-6, 6-4, 6-4.

Chisora-Parker heavyweight fight is off, says promoter

LONDON (AP) — Boxing promoter Eddie Hearn says Joseph Parker has been forced to pull out of his heavyweight fight with Dereck Chisora on Oct. 26.

Hearn, who promotes Parker, posted a tweet on Wednesday to say the former world champion from New Zealand has withdrawn "due to illness" and that an announcement regarding a replacement would be made this week.

Parker's manager, David Higgins, has previously told the New Zealand Herald newspaper that trainer Kevin Parry had identified a sore on the boxer's thigh during camp and thought it looked like a spider bite.

Hearn didn't disclose the nature of Parker's illness.

Parker and Chisora were scheduled to fight on the undercard to the World Boxing Super Series super-lightweight final between Josh Taylor and Regis Prograis at the O2 Arena in London.

Panthers lose DL Short for the season to shoulder injury

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Panthers two-time Pro Bowl defensive lineman Kawann Short will miss the remainder of the season after being placed on the injured reserve with a partially torn rotator cuff.

Short injured the shoulder in Week 2 against Tampa Bay and has missed the past two games.

Panthers general manager Marty Hurney says in a release Short will need surgery to fix the problem.

Hurney says Short did everything he could possibly do to try to play the past two games, "but we have made the decision that it is in the best long-term interest of KK and the team that he undergo surgery to fix his shoulder and focus on his rehab and get ready for next season."

LEADING OFF: A's choose Manaea, Rays start Morton in WC game

A look at what's happening around the majors today:

THAT'S WILD

Oakland tabbed left-hander Sean Manaea (4-0, 1.21 ERA) to start the AL wild-card game against Tampa Bay. The 27-year-old Manaea was sidelined last year when the Athletics lost the wild-card game to the Yankees, and missed most of this season following shoulder surgery. He returned in September and has been sharp over five starts. He'll start opposite Rays right-hander Charlie Morton (16-6, 3.05) — that's right, no openers for either of these forward-thinking clubs — although neither manager will shy away from an early hook.

GOING TO CALIFORNIA

So familiar with playoff heartache, the Washington Nationals have finally advanced in October. Juan Soto delivered a bases-loaded single against closer Josh Hader that scored three runs with two outs in the bottom of the eighth inning, and the Nationals rallied past the Milwaukee Brewers 4-3 in the National League wild-card game Tuesday night.

Soto's sharp single skipped by rookie right fielder Trent Grisham for an error that allowed the go-ahead run to score. Stephen Strasburg threw three scoreless innings to win in the first relief appearance of his major league career, and Washington now heads to Los Angeles for Game 1 in a best-of-five Division Series against the NL West champion Dodgers on Thursday. Left-hander Patrick Corbin will start for the Nationals.

Nagging injuries to third baseman Justin Turner, starting pitcher Rich Hill and reliever Joe Kelly have improved enough that all three will be available for the Dodgers.

OCT-HOMER

Hitters smashed a record 6,776 home runs in 2019, and pitchers are preparing for a big fly bonanza this postseason. Justin Verlander told the AP "the game has changed completely" this year, and he's blamed that on adjustments to the baseball. Commissioner Rob Manfred has acknowledged the ball has less drag but says the league isn't sure why. He denied charges from Verlander and other pitchers that the balls have been deliberately altered. Either way, it's been a frustrating year for pitchers, and that's unlikely to change under October's bright lights.

"You know there are going to be a few more runs scored and balls are going to leave the ballpark," A's manager Bob Melvin said.

Might this postseason look something like the 2017 World Series? Pitchers claimed the balls were slicker then, too, and that slugfest between the Astros and Dodgers featured a record 25 home runs and went down as an instant classic. Exciting for fans, certainly. Pitchers remain less enthused.

"Before, it was like the big wreck at a NASCAR race," Braves reliever Shane Greene said. "You might see one, and everybody showed up to see that one homer. Now, you're going to see six."

MOUND MATCHUP

The starting pitchers are set for the NL Division Series opener between the Cardinals and Braves in Atlanta on Thursday. Veteran left-hander Dallas Keuchel will face St. Louis right-hander Miles Mikolas.

Keuchel, who has made nine career postseason starts, went 8-8 with a 3.75 ERA in 19 starts after signing a one-year deal with Atlanta in June. He will pitch against the Cardinals for the first time since 2016.

Mikolas was 9-14 with a 4.17 ERA in 32 starts for the Cardinals. He will make his playoff debut.

MEDICAL REPORT

Two days before opening their AL Division Series, the Twins and Yankees could have updates on a few injured players.

Hot-hitting Minnesota rookie Luis Arraez sprained his right ankle Saturday, and as of Sunday, the club wasn't sure what his timeline might be for a return. He hit .334 in 92 games, splitting time between second base, third base, shortstop and left field.

Yankees slugger Edwin Encarnación hasn't played since Sept. 12 due to a left oblique strain, but he's been adamant he'll return for the playoffs. Third baseman Gio Urshela sprained his left ankle in the regular-season finale Sunday, but the Yankees said it was mild with no swelling.

New York is scheduled to work out at Yankee Stadium.

STILL SEARCHING

For the second consecutive offseason, the Reds are looking for a new hitting coach. Cincinnati fired Turner Ward on Tuesday after one season. Ward was hired as part of first-year manager David Bell's staff last offseason after three years in the same role with the Los Angeles Dodgers, but Cincinnati's offense mostly declined. The Reds dipped in batting average and on-base percentage, struck out more often and narrowly improved their output from 696 runs to 701. A number of key players regressed, notably star Joey Votto, who hit .261 with 15 home runs.

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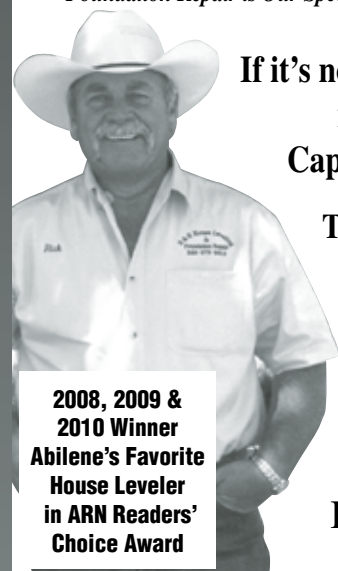

gives in to this temptation, he is headed for certain defeat, since by the time the A-K of diamonds are driven out, the defenders will have scored at least three heart tricks and two diamond tricks. South must therefore find his ninth trick elsewhere. The only remaining source is in spades, where a simple finesse against the queen is available. If West dealt the queen — a straight 50-50 shot — finessing the jack will succeed, and declarer's troubles will be over. However, while this line of play raises South's chances from zero to 50 percent, it is still not the best approach. An even better plan, which raises his chances to 75 percent, is to lead the nine (or eight) of spades at trick two and let it ride if West follows low. In the actual deal, the nine forces East's queen, so the jack of spades becomes declarer's ninth trick. (If West covers the nine with the ten, dummy's jack is played, and the eight becomes the ninth trick.) If the nine happens to lose to the ten, South can finesse the jack next time. This line of play succeeds whenever West dealt either the ten or queen of spades, or both. Mathematically, the odds are about 3-to-1 that West has at least one of these cards. All South need do at the outset is to recognize the value of the 9-8 of spades.

Today in History
Today is Wednesday, Oct. 2, the 275th day of 2019. There are 90 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:
On Oct. 2, 1967, Thurgood Marshall was sworn as an associate justice of the U.S. Supreme Court as the court opened its new term.

On this date:
In 1919, President Woodrow Wilson suffered a serious stroke at the White House that left him paralyzed on his left side.

In 1941, during World War II, German armies launched an all-out drive against Moscow; Soviet forces succeeded in holding onto their capital.

In 1944, German troops crushed the two-month-old Warsaw Uprising, during which a quarter of a million people had been killed.

In 1950, the comic strip "Peanuts," created by Charles M. Schulz, was syndicated to seven newspapers.

In 1970, one of two chartered twin-engine planes flying the Wichita State University football team to Utah crashed into a mountain near Silver Plume, Colorado, killing 31 of the 40 people on board.

In 1971, the music program "Soul Train" made its debut in national syndication.

In 1984, Richard W. Miller became the first FBI agent to be arrested and charged with espionage. (Miller was tried three times; he was sentenced to 20 years in prison, but was released after nine years.)

In 1985, actor Rock Hudson, 59, died at his home in Beverly Hills, California, after battling AIDS.

In 2002, the Washington, D.C.-area sniper attacks began, setting off a frantic manhunt lasting three weeks. (John Allen Muhammad and Lee Boyd Malvo were finally arrested for killing 10 people and wounding three others; Muhammad was executed in 2009; Malvo was sentenced to life in prison.)

In 2005, a tour boat, the Ethan Allen, capsized on New York's Lake George, killing 20 elderly passengers. Playwright August Wilson died in Seattle at age 60. Actor-comedian Nipsey Russell died in New York at age 87.

In 2013, a jury in Los Angeles cleared a concert promoter of negligence, rejecting a lawsuit brought by Michael Jackson's

mother claiming AEG Live had been negligent in hiring Conrad Murray, the doctor who killed the pop star with an overdose of a hospital anesthetic.

In 2017, rock superstar Tom Petty died at a Los Angeles hospital at the age of 66, a day after suffering cardiac arrest at his home in Malibu, California.

Ten years ago: The International Olympic Committee, meeting in Copenhagen, chose Rio de Janeiro to be the site of the 2016 Summer Olympics; Chicago was eliminated in the first round, despite a last-minute in-person appeal by President Barack Obama. A man accused of stalking ESPN reporter Erin Andrews and secretly videotaping her inside her hotel room was arrested at Chicago's O'Hare International Airport. (Michael David Barrett later pleaded guilty to interstate stalking and was sentenced to 2 1/2 years in federal prison.)

Five years ago: President Barack Obama acknowledged his pivotal role in the midterm political campaign, arguing in a speech at Northwestern University that the November congressional elections were a referendum on his economic policies and blaming Republicans for blocking his efforts to boost wages and create more jobs. Hong Kong's embattled leader, Chief Executive Leung Chun-ying, refused demands by pro-democracy protesters to step down.

One year ago: President Donald Trump ignited a crowd at a campaign rally in Mississippi by mocking Christine Blasey Ford over her claim that she had been sexually assaulted by Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh decades ago; Trump also said it's a "very scary time for young men in America" who could be considered guilty based on an accusation. The New York Times reported that Trump had received at least \$413 million from his father over the decades, much of it through dubious tax dodges including outright fraud; a lawyer for Trump told the Times that there was no "fraud or tax evasion." Amazon announced a minimum wage of \$15 an hour

for its U.S. employees. (Some longtime workers said the higher pay wouldn't make up for benefits they were losing.)

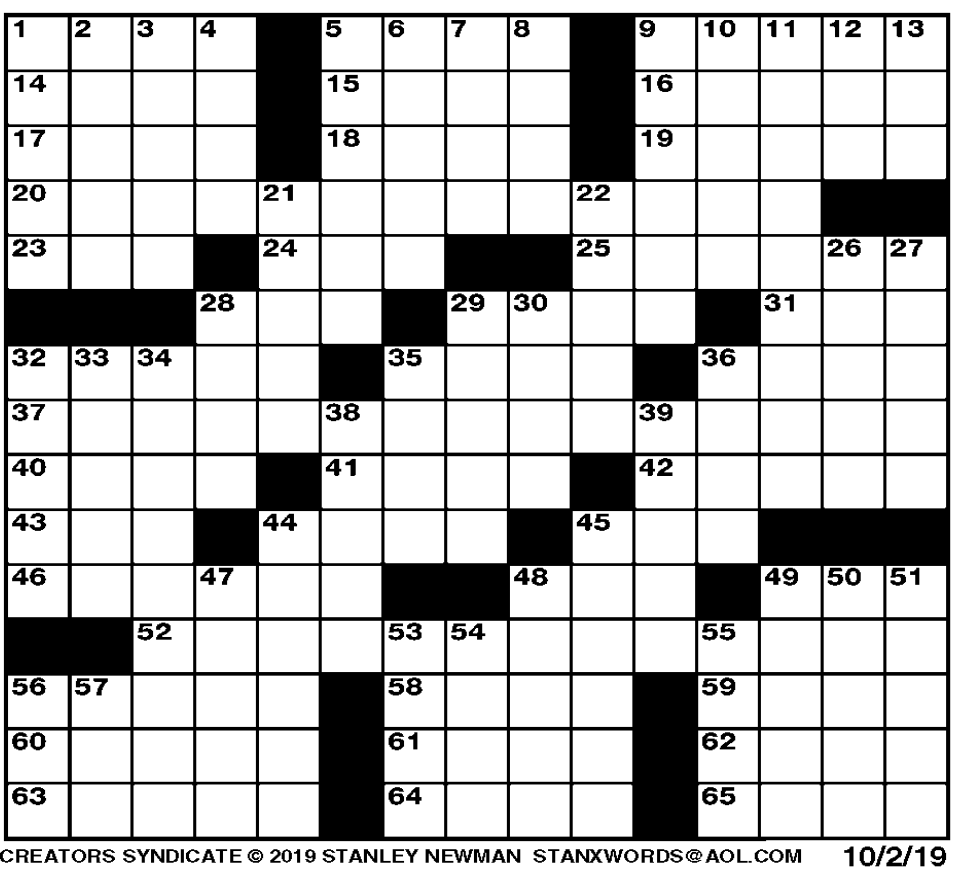

After Max Scherzer fell behind 3-0 by giving up homers to Yasmani Grandal in the first and Eric Thames in the second, Strasburg replaced him in the sixth and threw three scoreless innings to earn the win in the first relief appearance of his major league career, regular season or playoffs.

Daniel Hudson pitched the ninth for the save, getting Ben Gamel to fly out to the warning track

in center with a man on to end it.

"Hats off for us to for continuing to fight, because we know if we could keep it close we could have a chance at the end," said Trea Turner, who got Washington within 3-1 with a solo shot off Brandon Woodruff in the third.
