Proposed Constitutional Amendments:

Proposition No. 6: Fund Cancer Research?

Editor's note: This is the sixth in a series of stories about the 10 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution which will be voted on by Texans Nov. 5

The State of Texas has funded research into cancer prevention through the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT) for 10 years now. The institute was founded in 2009 after it was approved by voters in 2007. As of May of this year, it had issued \$2.26 billion in grant money, and is projected to exhaust the \$3 billion in bonds it's currently authorized to issue sometime between 2020 and 2022.

Proposition No. 6 on the ballot this November is titled "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to increase by \$3 billion the maximum bond amount authorized for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas." It would increase CPRIT's authorization by an additional \$3 billion, while continuing to limit the institute to issuing \$300 million in bonds annually.

The proposed amendment would do this very simply, by striking out a "3" and changing it to a "6," altering the phrase in Section 67(c) of Article 3 of the Texas Constitution to "...in an amount not to exceed \$6 billion...".

"We had (founded CPRIT), I guess about 10 years ago or longer, and those bonds have run out," said Texas State Rep. Drew Darby (R -San Angelo) who represents District 72 in the State Legislature. "A lot of great work has happened, so we need to further that mission."

Darby said CPRIT has done plenty of good work in the 10 years since it was founded.

"This institute was stood up and it has made grants and funded other initiatives that have brought very meaningful research and discovery into the treatment and/or prevention... and hopefully ultimately will bring the elimination... of cancer, perhaps, as one of the largest scourges on humanity we have," he said. "There's not a family in Texas that's not touched by the effects of cancer. We have world-renowned brought professors, researchers, to Texas. We have funded these research projects. We have made very meaningful discoveries. There has been a Nobel prize arise out of it in Houston for work with our own immune system. But again, this work needs to continue, and again, a lot of these initiatives require ongoing support."

Downtown hauntings and history

Big Spring's first Ghost Tour begins Friday

Would you like to learn more about the original town of Big Spring?

Big Spring grew up around the T&P Railroad, and many of those buildings are no longer there, but during the 1880s and early 20th Century, most people in Big Spring lived and worked in the downtown area close to the railroad tracks.

"This is the first time we're having a Ghost Tour in Big Spring," says Shonda Folsom, one of the organizers of the ghost tour. "There are other ghost tours like this, closest one being in San Angelo, but they are done all over the U.S. A lot of these tours focus on local

history."

A tour guide will lead participants through the Downtown Area. The tour will begin and end at The Train Car Cigar Bar and stop at 13 different points along the way, including Desert Flower, Krazy Kow and the Heritage Museum, among others. Continues Folsom, "At each stop,

we'll talk about some of the historical things that have taken place at that location," continues Folsom. "When the railroad was being built up, Big Spring started to get a lot of people, which can create a lot of conflict, which leads to a lot of the stories we'll be telling."

"For example, there was a building where The Train Car currently sits

that burned down. The first cemetery in town was placed just north of the tracks by T&P Railroad. Several years later, the city wanted to expand, and some of the bodies were moved, but not all of them. Up until the 1930's, kids playing in that area would still find fragments of coffins laying on the

ground." The tour will tell of a lot of the original buildings in town, such as the Nip and Tuck Saloon, where the first murder in 1882 occurred. There will also be stories of what people have experienced in some of the historical buildings, like

"But God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world." Galatians 6:14

The preaching of the cross is not merely a theological proposition but a practical application. It is a practical application because Christ died for sinners - real sinners in real time.

If the cross of Christ is nothing more than theology, then His cross is not applicable to sinners in real time. But if His cross is more than just theology, then every sinner, who by faith confesses Him with their mouth, and in their heart, believes that God has raised Him from the dead, is

If God expects us to live by the Law or by some impossible rule of impeccable moral standards and expectations, then the cross of Christ is only symbolic, and as sinners, we have no hiding place.

If clean moral living is the standard by which we are obligated to measure our Christian lives, then the world has not been crucified unto us, and we have not been crucified unto it, because the world always measures the worth of a human being in terms of moral standing.

In the cross of Christ, the world has been crucified unto us and we are crucified unto the world because He uses a different measuring stick to prove the sinner's worth. Christ does not enter into the court house of the law, but rather into the chambers of faith when He says, "I will have mercy and not sacrifice. "

Paul says, "but God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ." Why does he say this? Because man, at his best

Dallas judge's hug not embraced by all after officer's trial

I can only stand in awe of Him. Read it. It's all In His book.

DALLAS (AP) — A Texas judge who hugged a former Dallas police officer convicted of murder and gave her a Bible is coming under scrutiny over whether she crossed an ethical line.

The Freedom From Religion Foundation on Thursday filed a complaint against Judge Tammy Kemp with a Texas state agency that investigates allegations of judicial misconduct.

The Wisconsin-based group says Kemp went too far after Amber Guyger was sentenced to 10 years in

prison. Guyger, who is white, was convicted of fatally shooting her black neighbor in his apartment.

Kemp, who is black, has also been criticized by activists who wondered whether a black defendant would get the same treatment.

Kemp didn't return requests for comment.

Her former boss, ex-Dallas prosecutor Craig Watkins, says Kemp is guided by faith and that he doesn't think her actions were out of bounds.

Reflections: Age of Outrage

Ours has been called the "age of outrage." Perhaps it began with news anchor Howard Beale



throwing open his window in the1975 movie Network and screaming into the crowded streets, "I'm mad as h---and I'm not going to take it anymore!" Whatever BILL Beale was mad about T_{INSLEY} seemed to simmer for decades until the 2016 election. Name call-

ing, finger pointing, screaming and yelling soared to new heights and hasn't seemed to diminish since.

Now that we are approaching 2020, the noise is escalating. With the advent of social media, all accountability seems to be thrown to the wind. In this age of outrage, people say things they shouldn't say including prejudicial bullying, ridicule and false accusa-

Even Christians seem to be outraged. It seems that Christians are primarily outraged because they sense they are losing control of their "Christian" culture. Step by step over my lifetime the cultural advantages for Christians have been curtailed. There is a sense that Christians are losing the battle as America becomes increasingly secular.

Last year, Ed Stetzer wrote a book entitled, "Christians in the Age of Outrage." In his introduction, he writes, "Terrorism, sex trafficking and exploitation, systemic racism, illegal immigration, child poverty, opioid addiction ... the list goes on. These issues deserve a measure of outrage, don't they? They certainly deserve our anger. And this is part of the problem. What do we do when the anger becomes too much? When our righteous indignation at injustice morphs into something completely different? How do we know when righteous anger has made the turn into unbridled outrage?" In March of this year, he wrote,

"The comments sections on You-Tube are a greater testament to human depravity than all the reformers' doctrines combined. Arguments, bullying, conspiracy theories, vitriol and irrational cesspools of misinformation and misdirection abound in our digital communication and marketplace. There is outrage everywhere sometimes targeting Christians, but unfortunately, often coming from Christians."

Outrage has never been the means by which the Christian faith has flourished at any time. In fact, the Bible outlines a very different path if we want to influence the culture in which we live.

Jesus said, "But I say to you who hear, love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat vou" (Luke 6:27-28). The Apostle Paul echoed these instructions, "Bless those who persecute you, bless and do not curse" (Romans 12:14).

The Psalmist writes, 34:13, "Keep your tongue from evil, and your lips from speaking deceit. Depart from evil and do good. Seek peace and pursue it" (Psalm 24:13). "I said, 'Lord I will guard my ways that I may not sin with my tongue; I will guard my mouth as with a muzzle.'" (Psalm 39:1).

Does this mean Christians should never speak up? Of course not. Paul clearly spoke up and defended himself when he was falsely accused at Philippi, Jerusalem, Ceasarea and Rome. But, for the Christian, there is no place for name calling, ridicule, misinformation and outrage.

Wilson throws 4 TD passes, Seahawks hold off Rams 30-29

SEATTLE — For all the other times when Seattle's Russell Wilson was the best player on the field and made highlight plays, this was different.

It could have been the stage of prime time or facing a division nemesis in the Rams. Or the circumstances of building an early lead, losing it and then rallying once more in the fourth quarter.

Whatever the reason, Seattle received a performance from Wilson that'll be hard to top.

"It was one of the best, I think," Wilson aid.
Wilson's 5-yard touchdown pass to

Chris Carson on fourth-and-goal with 2:28 gave Seattle the lead, and the Se-

ahawks held on for a 30-29 win over the Rams on Thursday night when Greg Zuerlein's 44-yard field goal with 11 seconds left missed wide right.

Seattle earned a needed win against its NFC West foe after losing six of the past eight to the Rams. And while there were contributions from plenty of others, Wilson orchestrated a memorable night.

Whether it was his throws from the pocket or when he was forced to improvise, Wilson was at his best. It was one stunning play after another from Seattle's star, continuing the best start to a season in his career.

Even his opponents were left in awe.

"Russell Wilson is playing out of his mind right now," Rams safety Eric Weddle said.

Wilson was 17 of 23 for 268 and four touchdowns, and rushed for another 32 yards. He had touchdown passes of 13 yards to Tyler Lockett and 40 yards to DK Metcalf in the first half. He threw a 10-yarder to David Moore in the third quarter and he had a final answer after the Rams' had taken a 29-24 lead.

Wilson led Seattle 60 yards in 12 plays, helped during the drive by a roughing-the-passer call on Clay Matthews. After stalling inside the 10, Seattle faced fourth down at the 5. Wilson scrambled as he had all night, buying enough time to find Carson open in the corner of the end zone.

Astros set MLB record with zero intentional walks in 2019

HOUSTON — The Houston Astros share a division with the American League's most intentionally walked player in Angels star Mike Trout.

But despite Trout facing the Astros as much as any team in the league, none of his 14 intentional walks this season came against Houston.

That's because manager A.J. Hinch didn't intentionally walk anyone this season, making the Astros the first team in MLB history to finish a year with zero intentional walks.

Hinch said many factors played into Houston setting this

"Some of it is comfort with what I've learned on adding runners on base for free," he said. "Some of it has been pure luck on not having situations that have come up to where I play a National League game and I want to walk the eight-hole hitter to get to the pitcher or call it (Christian) Yelich, Trout and MVP-caliber players being up at the wrong time with a base where I should walk them. But most of it has just been out of the pure education of what that does to run-scoring and runprevention."

Intentional walks became a statistic in 1955 and Houston entered the season as the record-holder for fewest intentional walks after Hinch handed out just four last season. Before the Astros set the mark, the Royals had the record for fewest intentional walks issued in a season with eight in 2016.

The last time an Astros pitcher intentionally walked anyone came last season, on Aug. 17, 2018, when Hector Rondon walked Jed Lowrie in the bottom of the ninth inning.

Rondon doesn't love that he was the last Astro to intentionally walk anyone, but what he does love is what Hinch's decision not to do it says about the staff.

"I think all that happens because the way we've been pitching this year and the confidence that we get from our manager," Rondon said. "That's why he doesn't make that decision because he trusts us and the way we pitch and that's huge for

On the other end of the spectrum, Miami led the league with 52 intentional walks this season. But the Marlins actually cut back on them quite a bit this year after also topping the list in 2018 when they issued a whopping 73.

With the designated hitter, intentional walks in the AL are far less common, and the White Sox led the AL in that category with 30 this season. The Twins had the second-fewest behind the Astros with 10 intentional walks and the Orioles, Rangers and Angels all finished with 11.

Not only did the Astros face Trout multiple times this season, they also played against two of the top four most intentionally walked players in the National League in Yelich and Pittsburgh's Josh Bell, who were intentionally walked a combined 29 times.

Hinch hasn't always shied away from intentional walks. In 2017 the Astros had 17. But even though Houston had a ton that year compared to the last two seasons, they were still tied for second-fewest in the majors with Oakland that year.

And although Hinch got through 162 games without intentionally walking anyone this year, he was quick to note that he isn't ruling it out as the Astros begin the postseason on Friday against the Tampa Bay Rays in Game 1 of the AL Division Series.

"I'll do it," he said. "I'm not trying to hold onto some record or be stubborn about it. If it's the right play, it's the right play." However it didn't sound likely that he was planning to re-

However it didn't sound likely that he was planning to sort to it.

"It's just rarely the right play," he said before a long pause, "in my opinion."

State parks supporters to launch 7 city, 13 park tour to promote Prop 5

The constitutional amendment would guarantee funding for state parks

AUSTIN - Environment Texas today announced a statewide tour to build public support for Proposition 5, a constitutional amendment on the ballot November 5, which would guarantee sales taxes on sporting goods go to fund state and local parks. The group will visit 13 different state parks and hold events in seven cities to encourage Texans to help make sure parks are properly funded.

"From camping under the stars at Big Bend

"From camping under the stars at Big Bend Ranch to exploring the cypress swamps of Caddo Lake, our state parks make life better here in Texas," said Luke Metzger, Executive Director of Environment Texas. "They protect the clean water we depend on and provide a home for some of Texas'

most wondrous wildlife, like the black bear and the leatherback sea turtle. But chronic underfunding has placed a strain on an aging system with outdated infrastructure. Prop 5 is a historic opportunity to make sure our parks get the funds they need and deserve."

Texas parks already have a dedicated funding

Texas parks already have a dedicated funding stream—sales taxes on sporting goods. But from 1993 to 2017, the state collected nearly \$2.5 billion in revenues from the sporting goods sales tax (SGST), yet only 40 percent has been appropriated for parks.

yet only 40 percent has been appropriated for parks.
Proposition 5 will amend the Texas Constitution
to dedicate revenue from the SGST, so those dollars
can only be used by the Texas Parks and Wildlife

Department and the Texas Historical Commission

on public parks and historic sites, and not for any other purposes.

"The Legislature has done its part, and so now the

"The Legislature has done its part, and so now the measure goes to the people," wrote Sen. Lois Kolkhorst and Representative Cyrier in a recent Dallas Morning News Editorial. "Surely we can all agree that these special places are vital to our economy and to our Texas heritage, culture and way of life."

Environment Texas will kick off the tour with an event in McKinney Falls State Park in Austin on Oct. 7 and continue with events in Houston and Dallas on Oct. 8, in San Angelo Oct. 10, in Midland Oct. 11, in El Paso on Oct. 14. The tour will then conclude with an event in Government Canyon State Park in San Antonio on Oct. 16.

Dear Annie: I'm the mother of six children, three girls and three boys. I've discovered something that is hurtful to me. At my daughters' homes, they have lots of photos of me and their dad and me alone or with them. But at my sons' homes, there are no photos of me or even me with one of them. One son has a group photo with me in it. They have their own photos as parents out prominently though. They seem to like me. I know it isn't true in all families, but I'm wondering if boys are just not aware of things like this or what? Our daughters-in-law are uncaring. -- Dumbfounded

Dear Dumbfounded: There are many ways of expressing love. Just because someone isn't showing you that they love you in all the ways you'd prefer doesn't mean they don't. Your sons are inviting you into their homes, and that matters far more than the decor. Let this one go, and be grateful for your time together.

Dear Annie: I

am writing about my stepdaughter, who is 64 years old. My first husband passed away in an accident when my son and two daughters were very young. Later, I got remarried, to a man named "Steve." Steve had two sons, and his oldest child was a

daughter, "Jill," who was 13 when we married. At first, Jill seemed fine with our marriage. As time went on, it was obvious she was extremely jealous of my daughters and resentful of me. She stayed with her mother, who was an alcoholic and unfaithful to my husband. My husband's two sons came to live with us. When my daughters grew up and got married, Jill did not come to either of the weddings.

Though Jill hardly visited us, we paid for her college tuition, books and car insurance, and we gave her spending money. Once she graduated from college, we paid for her wedding and helped her and her husband with other expenses.

As time passed, I would remember Jill and her husband with cards on holidays and on birthdays. She never acknowledged the cards, and after about six years or so I stopped sending all cards except for on Christmas and birthdays.

Over the years, Jill had a bad habit of lying, didn't pay her bills in a timely manner, and she and her husband had to take bankruptcy. My husband co-signed a note at the bank for them. They finally paid the loan. My husband didn't trust her in general because of her lying.

Jill's dad and I were married 40 years. He passed away of complications of Alzheimer's eight years ago. I cared for him at home during his illness. Jill came to see her dad after his diagnosis rarely, maybe twice a year.

My oldest stepson passed away about six years before my husband. The other stepson passed away four months after my husband's death. I was responsible for his funeral expenses.

I have sent text messages, and she will respond to those, but that is the extent of our relationship.

Partner will thus be apprised of you singleton diamond. Two hearts is forcing because it is a new suit named after a constructive response

on the two-level. 5. Four notrump. This is clearly Blackwood and asks partner how many aces he has. After he replies, you will know exactly how high to


Thus, if partner's response to four notrump is five clubs (no aces), you will pass; if he bids five diamonds (one ace), you will carry on to six clubs; and, if he happens to bid five hearts (two aces), you should have no compunctions about jumping to

seven clubs. After partner responds two clubs, you should not be interested in any factor other than the number of aces he has. Whatever he replies will leave you in an ideal position to determine whether to contract for 11, 12 or 13 tricks.



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



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Harden has 37, Rockets top Clippers as Leonard, George watch

The Los Angeles Clippers' new superstar duo isn't available yet, and the Houston Rockets aren't ready to use theirs.

At some point, those will be two of the teams that following a summer of change around the NBA can put a pair of All-Stars into a championship-contending lineup.

In the meantime, James Harden can still deliver a dazzling one-man show.

The league's leading scorer had 37 points, seven rebounds, seven assists and a role in the league's new coach's challenge, leading Houston to a 109-96 victory over the Clippers.

A three-game schedule that features the league's first game in India later Friday started in Honolulu, but without many of the biggest names on the rosters. Houston gave Russell Westbrook another game off while he recovers from knee surgery in the spring, hoping to get the former Oklahoma City point guard onto the floor when it heads to Japan to play a pair of exhibition games against Toronto.

Los Angeles is easing Kawhi Leonard into the season after he led the Raptors to the NBA championship, and Paul George is still recovering from shoulder surgery and not ready for contact. With those two swingmen together, the Clippers are one of the favorites to win their first title.

They will also give Los Angeles a pair of defensive stoppers to throw at Harden. Without them, the Clippers couldn't contain the 2018 MVP.

Coming off a triple-double on Monday against Shanghai, Harden played 28 minutes and shot only 8 of 22 from the field and 4 for 14 from 3-point range, but hit 17 of 20 free throws.

He also committed an offensive foul in the first half that Houston coach Mike D'Antoni tried to overturn by using the one challenge coaches get per game this season. Replay showed that Harden hooked his defender's arm with his right arm while he dribbled with his left hand, so the call was upheld.

The remainder of the schedule includes Sacramento and Indiana playing the first of their twogame set in India, followed by the Brooklyn Nets hosting Brazilian club Franca. Kyrie Irving is not expected to play after sustaining a facial fracture late last month.

In Honolulu, rookie guard Chris Clemons scored 15 points and Clint Capela had 14 points and 11 rebounds. Houston finished 11 for 48 from behind the arc, with Ben McLemore making

Montrezl Harrell scored 17 points and fellow reserve Lou Williams had 13 in the Clippers' preseason opener. Rookie Terance Mann had eight points and nine rebounds.

Cooks was being evaluated for a concussion after the play and did not return. Carroll challenged there should have been offensive pass interference, but the call on the field stood. The catch led to Zuerlein's field goal that gave the Rams a 29-24 lead.

INJURIES

D.J. Fluker suffered a hamstring injury in the first quarter. He was replaced at right guard by Jamarco Jones, who typically is a backup tackle, but was forced to play guard with normal backup Ethan Pocic out because of a back injury.
