Building Big Spring *Marcy Elem. finds out what makes a community*

What makes a community?

That is the question Shanna Biddison, Marcy Elementary teacher, asked her Kindergarten class. As part of the new curriculum at Marcy Elementary, the students read "Map My Neighborhood" by Jennifer Boothroyd and "Places in my Community" by Bobbie Kalman.

"As a class we discussed what makes a community," Biddison said. After the class discussion, students mapped out the city of Big Spring and received their assignments. The students were tasked with building something from the community.

The result was a collection of dioramas that captured Big Spring in a way that only children can. The finished products range from small, shoe-box dioramas to large displays with flashing lights.

This is the first year that the kindergartners have been assigned this project, according to Biddison.

The northeast corner of Main and Second Streets seems to have a lot of "ghostly" occurrences that have been reported over the years. One of the recurring stories, regarding the loft above what is now Desert Flower, is as follows:

A young lady rented the loft and felt a menacing presence. She was excited at having the opportunity to rent a downtown Big Spring loft. She loved the architecture and the fact of being off by herself. She was the only tenant in the surrounding area at the time. The bottom portion of the building was vacant and the Downtown area was not yet thriving, as it is today.

What was perceived as something new and exciting quickly turned to constant fear. Once she moved in, she noticed a very strong pungent odor

like urine. The smell appeared at night and when she would investigate it, the odor dissipated. The tenant reported being woken up by someone playing with her hair, moving it back and forth swiftly. Always the problem solver, she figured it was the air conditioner vent that ran the length of the loft. One night she felt her hair going wild; she realized the AC was not on and there was no draft. There was a closet in the middle of the loft behind the kitchen where the washer/dryer were located. The doors were the type that slid back and forth and were very hard to open and close. Since the doors were hard to open, she decided to leave them open all the time. When she would return to the room the doors would be closed. Later, she would come back into the room and the doors would be open all the way – no one ever touched them.

One night when she came home later than usual she decided to leave the lights on because she was feeling uneasy. She woke up to the covers of her bed being yanked off with great force. The lights were turning on and off and the sounds coming from within the walls were almost unbearable. She said the walls were thick with brick construction and insulated so well the nearby trains could not be heard. After the incident, she called her boyfriend and asked him to come stay the night with her. As the couple fell asleep, they were awakened as her boyfriend was shoved out of the bed with great force. The only time he returned to the loft was to move help her move.

The tenant's sister wanted to help her and asked the family minister to stop by and say a prayer inside the loft, in hopes of clearing the loft. They were joined by their parents, and they all spent an evening in prayer. The prayers did not work. The next night, the strange occurrences began again.

Spring." Principal Dana Pannell, said.

As part of the project, now that the students have explored the community and built their assigned businesses, the staff intends to take the students to explore. The teachers will take classes to visit to the newly renovated Spring and the Heritage Mu-

seum, as a way of furthering the kids' knowledge about Big Spring.

After that, she said she would become physically ill walking into the front door. After two months, she could not take it anymore and decided to give up her beautiful loft. She made arrangements with the building's owner to move into another one of his properties so she would not have to break her lease.

While time has passed, the hauntings still exist. The owner of the Desert Flower Art Bar has shared a few of her own experiences. There have been nights where bottles mischievously are moved around; she has reported someone playing with her hair during the night, and even an apparition of a cowboy figure. However, some tenants never experienced any unusual happenings or ghostly occurrences, which makes the tales every more haunting.

What could have happened in that particular area so many years ago?

The lower portion of Main was the hub of activity during the early days of Big Spring. Main street was the place many cowboys had shootouts and ladies of the evening walked the sidewalks. Thirteen saloons doted the streets on both sides, at one time.

I.D Eddins, one of the first settlers of Big Spring stated the town had a floating element that gave much trouble where, drunkenness, violence and murder were common. Eddins added that the first six people buried in the cemetery (which was located on the site of the Southern Ice Company) met death by violence.

While many of these stories can be traced back to the early days of Big Spring and have been chronicled in Howard County in the Making by John Hutto, the stories aren't over. As the final Ghost Tour is set to take place this Friday, those attending should beware as they search for the ghosts of Main Street.

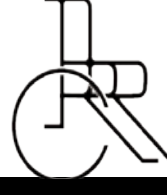

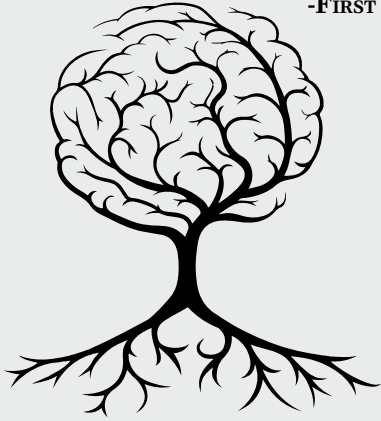

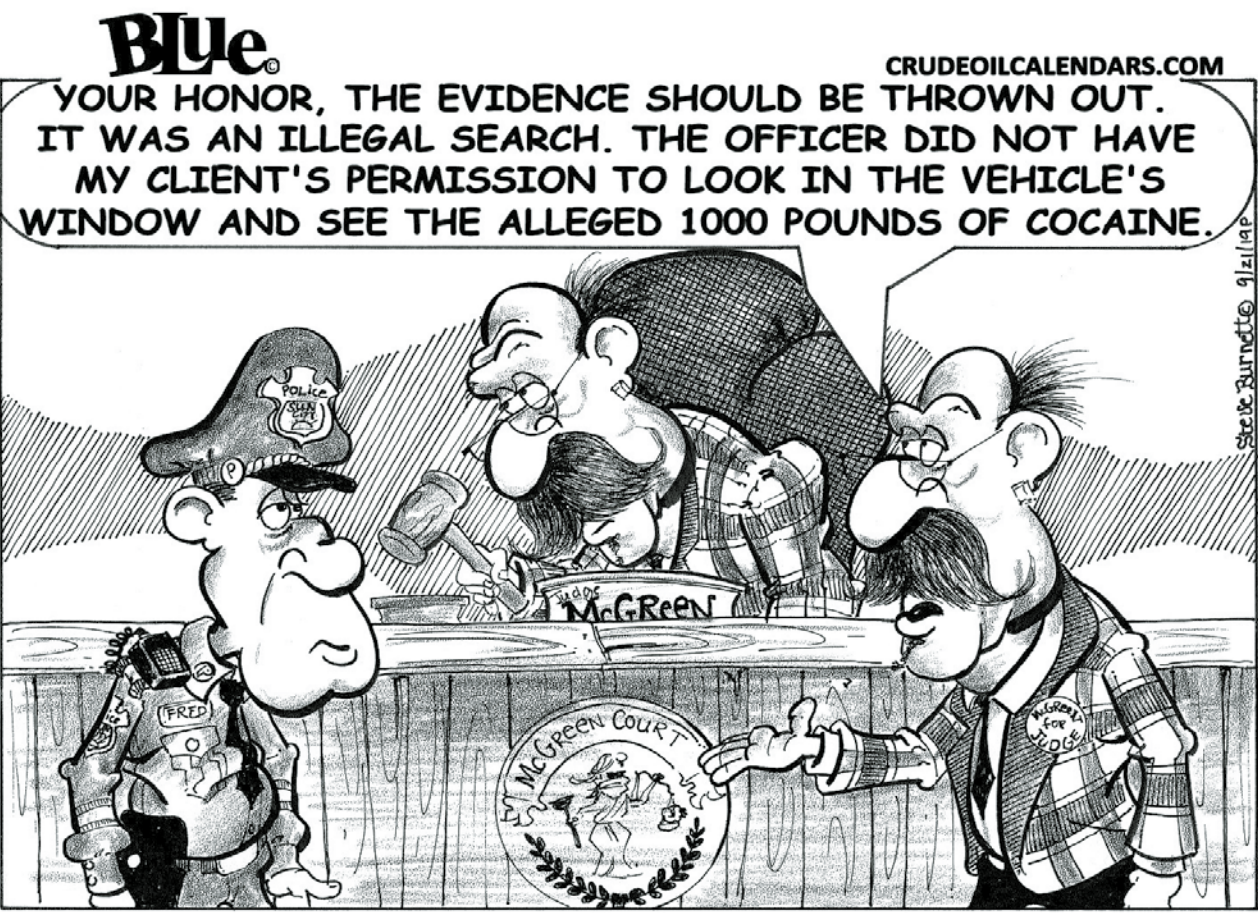
Accept that someone (a lot of people actually) out there whether they are right or wrong is going to be different from you, but in the end our blood flows through us just the same.

When I got back to my parents' cabin, I told my mother what had happened. My mother looked at the bright red apple for a long moment.

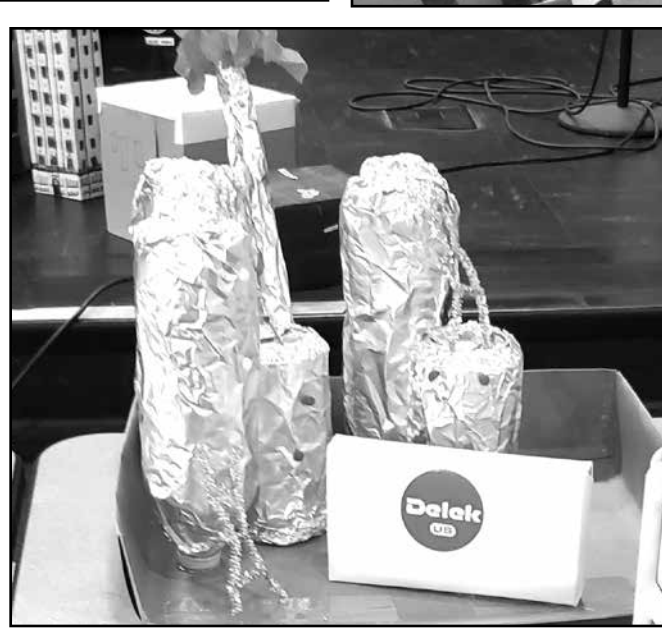
"Maybe we should just keep that apple for decoration," my mother said.

Maybe we should.

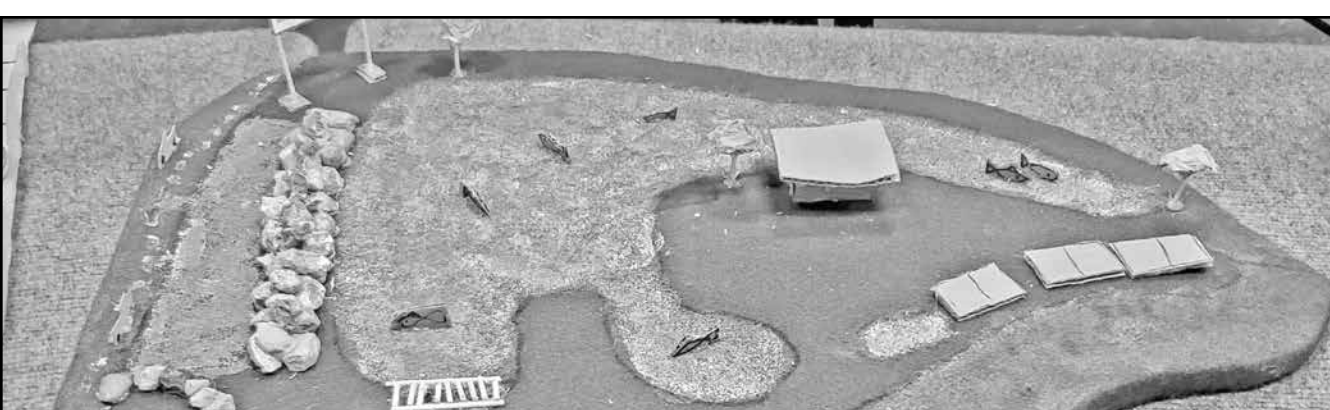

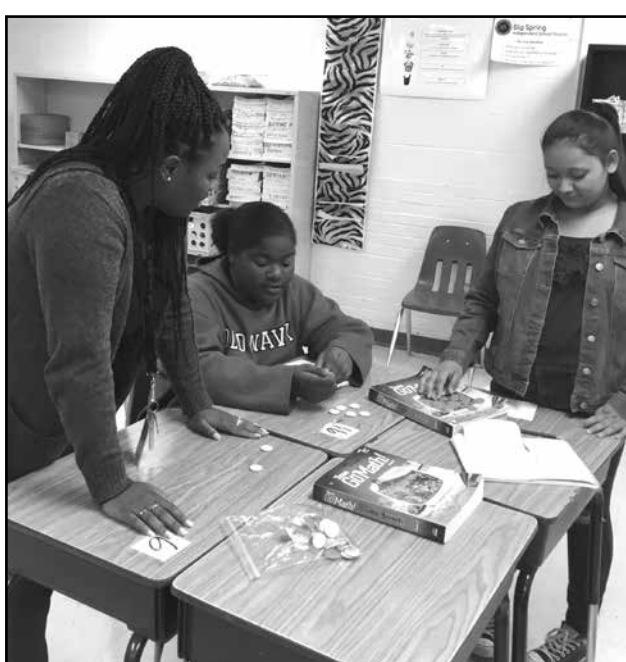

Unforgiven Infidelity

Dear Annie: Soldiers still cry 50 years after their experiences with horrendous trauma. The letter writer, "Grieving," is touched forever, too, by her trauma. The list goes on and on of the many things that people experience that they find very difficult to "get over." Most people are sensitive enough to realize which traumas are the ones that affect the suffering person for many, many years.

I'd like to add one trauma that I find gets zero sympathy from others -- infidelity. My husband cheated on me when I was seven months pregnant with our second child. When he informed me about it, he added that he had "never loved me," and, when I asked, he said that yes, he "loved his mistress." This came as a complete shock to me. In fact, I shook so violently that I saw a doctor the next day, fearing that I might lose the baby, and I was put on tranquilizers. Once on them, I could barely care for my oldest child.

We parted for a while and, during that period of time, I felt as if he had died. In addition, I felt that he had gone out of his way to hurt me on purpose. My "best friend" never contacted me after finding out. My mother-in-law called me a "heathen."

My parents eventually said they could help me but only for a while -- not for any length of time. I had no one else to count on or even talk to.

At that point, I spent a night thinking about the gun kept in our closet and using it on myself to end my hopeless future. I reconsidered, after thinking about who would care for my older child. I absolutely did not want this mistress raising my baby. Yes, the mistress knew I was pregnant. There is much more ugliness to this story, but my point is that for more than 50 years I've suffered in silence. At my prompting, we tried to make a go of the marriage, but it has been a pretentious sham from that moment on.

Did I lose whatever love existed between us? Yes. I cry at weddings when people promise to love and be faithful for the rest of their lives. I cry at shows that bring back the memories.

Do I think my children appreciate what I felt I did for them? I told them when they were adults, and no, I don't think they realize the gravity of the situation at the time.

Therapists? The last one announced, "What needs to be done here is for you to forgive your husband." What about his learning to be ashamed and make

things better with what he has said since?

Spouses of cheaters don't get any sympathy, help or chances to talk it out with friends. People seem to think this is one trauma that gets healed on its own. -- Still Hurting

Dear Still Hurting: I am very sorry that you suffered from emotionally shocking and painful distress. You are correct that infidelity, while you were pregnant and completely alone -- combined with hearing that your husband loved his mistress and didn't love you -- constitutes a trauma.

But I would suggest examining why your therapist advised, "What needs to be done here is for you to forgive your husband." It is not to get your husband off the hook for what he did to you, but to get yourself off the hook. Holding a grudge is hurting you more than anyone else. As Mark Twain wrote, "Anger is an acid that can do more harm to the vessel in which it is stored than to anything on which it is poured." Theologian Lewis B. Smedes added, "To forgive is to set a prisoner free and to discover that the prisoner was you."

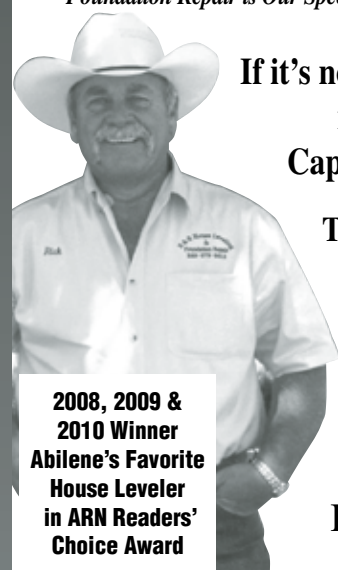

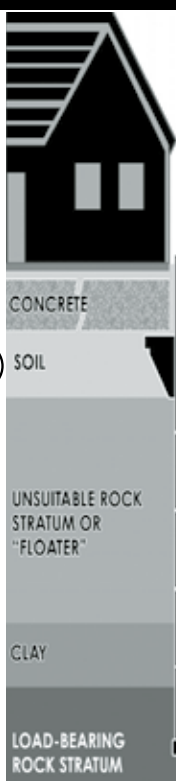

Planning the play is declarer's most important task, but he does not meet that responsibility fully unless he formulates his plans down to the last detail.

Take this case where West leads a spade against five diamonds. It seems normal to win the spade with the ace, draw trump, lead the three of hearts to the king and then finesse the jack of hearts. The finesse succeeds, but the contract fails when the hearts

prove to be divided 4-2. Declarer goes down one, losing two clubs and a heart.

The flaw in this method of play is that it does not allow for the possibility that West might have been dealt the singleton or doubleton ten of hearts. This possibility is certainly far from remote and therefore should not be ignored.

Planning to take a heart finesse is surely correct, but precisely when to take it should be a matter of equal concern. The proper time is at trick two — that is, immediately after winning the spade lead with dummy's ace.

Observe the effect of leading a low heart to the jack at trick two. The jack wins, and, after drawing trump, South leads the heart three to the king, on which West plays the ten. Another heart through East's Q-8 allows declarer to score the A-9, and the contract is home.

It requires a certain amount of foresight to recognize the importance of taking the initial heart finesse at trick two. But declarer should realize from the outset that his only real chance for the contract lies in winning four heart tricks, so he should plan his play to give himself the maximum chance to achieve that goal.

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Thursday, Oct. 24, the 297th day of 2019. There are 68 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On Oct. 24, 1940, the 40-hour work week went into effect under the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938.

On this date:

In 1861, the first transcontinental telegraph message was sent by Chief Justice Stephen J. Field of California from San Francisco to President Abraham Lincoln in Washington, D.C., over a line built by the Western Union Telegraph Co.

In 1931, the George Washington Bridge, connecting New York and New Jersey, was officially dedicated (it opened to traffic the next day).

In 1945, the United Nations officially came into existence as its charter took effect.

In 1962, a naval quarantine of Cuba ordered by President John F. Kennedy went into effect during the missile crisis.

In 1972, Hall of Famer Jackie Robinson, who'd broken Major League Baseball's color barrier in 1947, died in Stamford, Connecticut, at age 53.

In 1989, former television evangelist Jim Bakker (BAY'-kur) was sentenced by a judge in Charlotte, N.C., to 45 years in prison for fraud and conspiracy. (The sentence was later reduced to four for good behavior.)

In 1991, "Star Trek" creator Gene Roddenberry died in Santa Monica, California, at age 70.

In 1992, the Toronto Blue Jays became the first non-U.S. team to win the World Series as they defeated the Atlanta Braves, 4-3, in Game 6.

In 1997, in Arlington, Virginia, former NBC sportscaster Marv Albert was spared a jail sentence after a grudging courtroom apology to the woman he'd bitten during a sexual romp.

In 2002, authorities apprehended Army veteran John Allen Muhammad and teenager Lee Boyd Malvo near Myersville, Maryland, in the Washington-area sniper attacks. (Malvo was later sen-

tenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole; Muhammad was sentenced to death and executed in 2009.)

In 2005, civil rights icon Rosa Parks died in Detroit at age 92.

In 2008, singer-actress Jennifer Hudson's mother and brother were found slain in their Chicago home; the body of her 7-year-old nephew was found three days later. (Hudson's estranged brother-in-law was convicted of the murders and sentenced to life in prison.)

Ten years ago: Pakistani officials announced that their soldiers had captured Kot-kai, the strategically located hometown of Pakistan's Taliban chief, Hakimullah Mehsud (hah-kee-MUH'-lah meh-SOOD'), and one of his top deputies, after fierce fighting.

Five years ago: Jaylen Fryberg, a student at Marysville-Pilchuck High School in Washington state, fatally shot four friends he had invited to lunch and wounded a fifth teen before killing himself. A coordinated militant assault on an army checkpoint in the Sinai Peninsula killed 31 Egyptian troops. Actress Marcia Strassman, who'd played Gabe Kaplan's wife, Julie, on the 1970s sitcom "Welcome Back, Kotter," died in Sherman Oaks, California, at age 66.

One year ago: Authorities said they had intercepted pipe bombs packed with shards of glass that had been sent to several prominent Democrats, including Hillary Clinton and former President Barack Obama; none of the bombs went off, and nobody was hurt. Saudi Arabia's crown prince told a business forum in his country that the killing of journalist Jamal Khashoggi (jah-MAHL' khahr-SHOHK'-jee) at the Saudi Consulate in Istanbul was "heinous" and "painful to all Saudis;" some business leaders had pulled out of the conference after

Turkish reports said a member of the prince's entourage was involved in the killing of Khashoggi, a critic of the Saudi royal family.

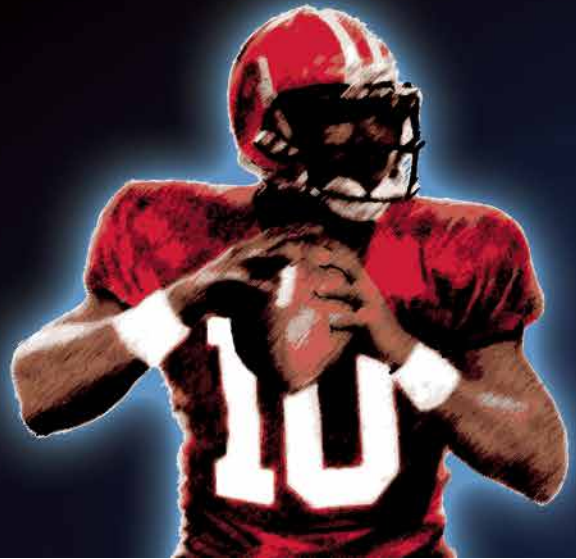

Steers to start district play vs. 6-1 Andrews Mustangs

The Big Spring Steers will leave their 1-6 non-district record in the past, and move forward this week as they travel to Andrews for the first game of their district season against the Mustangs.

"It's our first district game so the good thing is, everybody starts 0 and 0," said Steers Head Football Coach Cannon McWilliams. "The biggest thing is, we're as healthy as we've been and just looking forward to going over there and competing."

Zeroing out the record comes at an opportune moment for the Steers, who haven't managed to put a dent in the scoreboard for the past three games, as their rivals have hovered around the half-century mark: vs. Wall, 0-40; vs. Canyon 0-62; and vs. Dumas, 0-46. The week off gave the team time to recuperate and regroup, McWilliams said.

"The bye week helped us to get some people healthy that hadn't been since, really, the start of the season," he said. "It helped us improve on a few areas offensively and defensively that we could specialize and work on, work some of the kinks out while still preparing and getting ready for this week. It was beneficial, but I'm glad it's over."

That said, Andrews will probably be the Steers' toughest opponent in their district matchups. Their non-district record is exactly opposite that of the

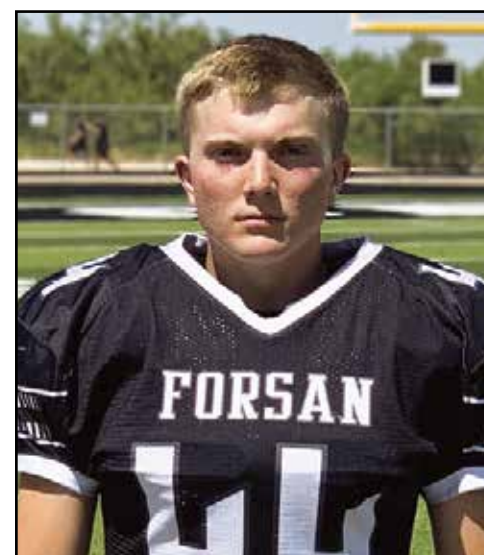
