## Early voting complete, General Election Tuesday Voting Centers open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Friday was the last day of early voting, and Election Day is Tuesday, on 10 proposed amendments to the Texas State Constitution.

Howard County Elections Administrator Jodi Duck said early voting totals are just about average for an election which has no candidates running for office.

"It's going really well," said Duck. "The numbers have been over 60 people every day. We should probably have a 5 percent in-person turnout for this election, and we may reach 7 percent turnout including the ballot by mail. We're on average for what we normally do. We're usually between 7 and 9 percent. So we're on par. We're doing pretty good."

While all early voting has been done at the Howard County Courthouse, during Tuesday's General Election, voters will be able to cast their ballots at any of Howard County's four Voting Centers

from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Voting locations within Howard County are no longer based on residence in a particular precinct.

"We do have a change in one of the locations," said Duck. "The Community Center in Coahoma is being rebuilt, so we will be having that one at Coahoma City Hall."

The four locations Howard County residents may cast their ballot are:

- Ryan Hall/St. Thomas Church, 605 N. Main St.;
- Coahoma City Hall, 122 N. First St. in Coahoma;
- First Baptist Church, 705 W. FM 700;
- Dorothy Garrett Coliseum, 1001 Birdwell Lane.

Those casting their ballots on Tuesday should remember to bring an appropriate form of photo ID, which can include:

- A Texas Driver's License issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety;
- A Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS;

- A Texas Personal Identification Card issued by DPS;
  - A Texas Handgun License issued by DPS;
  - A United States Military ID Card containing the person's photo;
  - A United States Citizenship Certificate containing the person's photo; or
  - A United States Passport.
- The 10 propositions up for vote are:
- Prop. No. 1: Allows persons to serve as more than one appointed or elected municipal judge.
  - Prop. No. 2: Allows the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$200 million in bonds.
  - Prop. No. 3: Authorizes temporary property tax exemption for disaster areas.
  - Prop. No. 4: Prohibits the state from levying an income tax on individuals.
  - Prop. No. 5: Dedicates revenue from the sales tax on sporting goods to parks, wildlife, and historical agencies.

## Toasty Tuesday Twilight Trashoff wrapped up

After more than 30 weeks, Big Spring is a bit cleaner as the result of Keep Big Spring Beautiful's Toasty Tuesday Twilight Trash off efforts. More than 400 volunteers came together over 32 weeks and gathered 497 bags of trash.

"We made a good impact on the community. We were able to get to several areas of town and in total, we picked up about 14,000 pounds of trash," Liz Hefley, Vice President of Social Media for Keep Big Spring Beautiful, said.

Throughout the course of Toasty Tuesdays, there were only two weeks that were put off due to weather. Strong winds and one night of rain put a halt on the clean up efforts, but still didn't detour the impact the group was able to make.

"The most trash was picked up from the FM 700 stretch of roadway. This was a spot visited by our volunteers six times over the course of the clean ups," Hefley said. "There was a total of 27 bags of trash picked up on just one Toasty Tuesday."

She continued, "FM 700 is one of the most traveled areas of our community by residents and outside visitors. It's important that we keep this area presentable and picked up."

When looking at the impact made by all the volunteers, Hefley and the KBSB members calculated the amount of money

## Events that Changed History lectures wraps up

What started out as a work assignment turned out to be one of the highlights of my week. For 36 weeks, a group of people met at either the Heritage Museum or Howard County Library to hear lectures about Events That Changed History. This was a lecture series orated by Dr. J. Rufus Fears and several events that he felt had a lasting impact on our society.

Dr. Fears did many lectures, and he was the David Ross Boyd Professor of Classics at the University of Oklahoma. Dr. Fears was voted Professor of the Year by the student of the university on three occasions and was named by the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence as a Medal for Excellence in College and

University Teachings. Many of those attending said, Dr. Fears most definitely has a way of speaking that keeps you engaged.

Dr. Fears states, "History is made by great individuals, great ideas and great events that are propelled by these individuals and ideas. The events were chosen with the following criteria in mind: The event itself fundamentally changed history; the aftermath shows that history was, in fact, changed by the event; the event still reverberates with us today."

The lecture series began in 1750 B.C., Hammurabi Issues a Code of Law which is referred to as the first known code of law and the first expression of the idea that rulers are also beholden to the law. Moses, Buddha and Confucius followed. In 594 B.C., Solon asked to become

governor of Athens, but he refused to be a dictator. He wanted to solve the problems in Athens but then take a step back from power. His first act was to buy out of slavery all Athenians who had been sold outside of Athens and to prohibit enslavement as payment for debt. He also wanted to take the power away from the few wealthy who exploited that power, while still acknowledging that those with the greatest wealth had the biggest stake in the government. So he created a written constitution establishing a democracy. Although all male citizens were granted the right to vote, serve on juries and to bring legal action against others, the wealthiest were the only ones granted the right to hold office. He also established a supreme

- Prop. No. 6: Authorizes the legislature to increase bonds for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute.
- Prop. No. 7: Increases distributions to the state school fund.
- Prop. No. 8: Creates a Flood Infrastructure Fund.

- Prop. No. 9: Authorizes property tax exemption for precious metals held in depositories.
  - Prop. No. 10: Allows for transfer of law enforcement animals to handlers or others if in animal's best interest.
- Voters with mobility issues can vote in their vehicle, curbside, at any of the four polling locations. To do so, travel to a Voting Center, then call the Elections Office at 432-264-2273 and let them know

what center you're at. An assistant will bring a voting machine and ballot out to your car to allow you to vote.

that was saved through the use of volunteers. When factoring the average cost of \$25.43, through the use of volunteers a savings of \$10,000 was made possible.

"The use of volunteers cleaning up our community is beneficial in so many ways," she said. "While Toasty Tuesdays may be wrapped up for 2019, the impact the community can make in beautifying Big Spring is far from over."

With the holidays coming up the amount of trash that will accumulate will be vast. However, that trash doesn't have to make it's way to the streets and float around our city.

"When you go out to throw trash make sure bags are tied and the dumpster lid is closed correctly," Hefley said. "These two simple things will help ensure trash doesn't get picked up by the wind and animals are less likely to get to it and drag it out of the dumpster."

Hefley also mentioned that KBSB will be at Walmart on Dec. 14 hosting Tips for Trash.

"We will be going up and down the aisles allowing people to empty out the trash from their cars," she said. "We have several of the groups from the (Big Spring) high school who have signed up to help us out."

Clean up efforts may not be scheduled weekly for the remainder of the year, but Hefley encourages those in the community to continue to do their part to keep their area clean and pick up where they can.

"We want to extend our sincere gratitude and appreciation for all those who came out and volunteered during Toasty Tuesday," she said. "A special thank you to Geraldo Delgado with Adult Probation. He was at every Toasty Tuesday and truly made a big impact."

Toasty Tuesdays will resume March 10, 2020.

court that could declare laws unconstitutional. The rise of democracy began.

In 430 B.C., we see the birth of scientific medicine. Hippocrates became the most famous doctor of ancient times. In addition to studying injury and disease, Hippocrates was also very concerned with diet and the concept of preventative medicine. We are a world where we want a pill to fix everything, but we need to remember that we are made of what we eat, as well.

You can't study history without studying Caesar, Jesus and Muhammad and the impact they had on modern-day history. After Muhammad, the series moved to the year 1088 and what is known as the first university in Bologna, Italy. Dante followed, who had studied at the University of Bologna.

Black Death, Columbus, Michelangelo painting the Sistine Chapel were all topic covered in this lecture series, as well. Erasmus was to study and collate Greek manuscripts to compile a version of the New Testament that was to be as close as possible to the original text of the early church. Then came Martin Luther and the Protestant Reformation. The Battle of Lexington, Charles Darwin, the World Wars and stock market crash were all also covered in this series.

The last three lectures were more modern, and most who attended the lectures remembered these

events, so we were able to add our personal histories to add to what Dr. Fears had discussed.

Although we all lived through these same events, they all had different impacts on our lives. History proves that man cannot go without fighting. War after war were discussed in these lectures. There is always a winner and loser, and it is said that history is written by the victors. Someone's take on history may be different than yours, but that doesn't make anyone wrong.

# Howard Hawks dominate over weekend

The Howard Hawks opened their 2019-20 season on a mission.

Over the weekend, the 2010 NJCAA Division I Champions started their season with dominating wins over Nation Wide Academy (OK) and Loyalty Prep (TX).

In the 101-53 season opening win on Friday night, the Hawks hounded the visiting Nation Wide Bengals early and controlled the game for the entire 40 minutes with their efficient offense.

"It's the first game," Howard head coach Scott Raines said. "And even though it's not the biggest crowd, they're still nervous. We've got a lot of guys that are getting playing time that they're not accustomed to, and I thought it was good."

The Hawks controlled the pace of the game from the opening tip and were led by two sophomore transfers: guard Dominik Fragala and forward Lacey Watson.

A high school basketball legend in his home state of Virginia who averaged 36.9 points per game up to the hype in the season opener. While slightly undersized at 6 feet tall, Fragala showed a strong display of hustle and playmaking ability that is needed from the point guard position. The former Niagara University guard also showed off his shooting ability with a pair of made shots from beyond the arc and was averaged from the free throw line.

After averaging 25.0 points per game last season at Edison State Community College (OH), Watson came off the bench and scored 18 points while dominating in the paint and making the most of his opportunities around the rim.

"He was tremendous," Raines said. "Lacey knows one thing: let me put this orange ball through that orange ring up there. He's one of 12 or 13 guys who we think could be tremendously huge for us this year and we think he's one of our tougher guys."

Even with a lead that almost reached 50 points, Raines had his team stay aggressive on both sides of the ball for the entire game. Midway through the second half, with the Hawks holding a 33-point lead, Raines had his team running a full-court

press defense.

Raines also introduced a deep rotation in the season opener that reached double digit players. The longtime head coach is extremely satisfied with the depth of this year's roster but knows that there are always areas to improve and that the coaching never stops.

"One of the things about having depth, one of the negatives, is the flow that these guys get in," Raines said. "When you only play seven guys, those guys know they play for long stretches. We were a little frustrated with our fouling tonight and our rebounding, so we just started subbing. When you foul out on here on the floor, then we're going to sub for you. Or if you don't go rebound, we're going to sub for you. We have to do something to be accountable."

Even with a quick turnaround Saturday afternoon at home against the Liberty Prep Wildcats, the Hawks picked up right where they left off on Friday night with a familiar face paving the way to another blowout victory.

Leading the team with a double-double that included 27 points and 10 rebounds, Watson could not be stopped from anywhere on the court. The sophomore showed off his ability to take over offensively by converting 11 field goals and even knocking down a shot from long-range on the way to his team's outstanding 125-53 win.

But that was not all.

Watson also lead the team in assists, dishing out six throughout the game with a consistent effort to drive the lane and kick out to the open man on the perimeter.

"I know I have a lot of shooters around me," Watson said. "I'm going to let my shooters shoot and I'm going to go to the basket and make opportunities for them. Drive and kick. Penetration and kick. Find the open man. That's what I'm here to do."

If that is what the Rock Island, IL native is at Howard College to do, then Watson is beyond exceeding expectations.

"Everywhere I go, I know I'm going to have to prove myself," Watson said. "That's what I'm out here to do. I'm going to keep pushing myself to be better every day."

If the rest of the Hawks hold the same mindset as

Watson, then the rest of Division I should be on the lookout. After a convincing 2-0 start to the season, the Hawks will continue to grow and solidify their contender status as the schedule begins to toughen.

"This team's mix of talent, depth, and experience is a Top 10 in the country kind of team," Raines said.

The potential seems endless for this group of ballers.

# Doncic has triple-double, Mavericks rout Cavaliers 131-111

CLEVELAND — Luka Doncic showed off his all-around game — at the Cleveland Cavaliers' expense.

Doncic had his second straight triple-double and third of the season, finishing with 29 points and 14 rebounds and matching his career high with 15 assists in the Dallas Mavericks' 131-111 victory over Cleveland on Sunday night.

It was the 11th triple-double in 78 career games for the 6-foot-7 Slovenian, extending his NBA record for players below the age of 21. Magic Johnson held the previous mark with seven, which could be obliterated before Doncic's next birthday on Feb. 28, 2020.

"He's a magician with the basketball and at that size, it's hard to stop," Cavaliers forward Kevin Love said. "I can't say enough good things about him. It's unbelievable, even from last year when he was extremely impressive, but this year he's taken it to a whole new level."

Kristaps Porzingis added 18 points, nine rebounds and a season-high six blocked shots and Boban Marjanovic had 12 points and eight boards for the Mavericks. They are 3-0 on the road for the first time since their championship season of 2010-2011.

Doncic completed his triple-double with 3:44 left in the third quarter on an entry pass to Marjanovic. He's averaging 26.7 points, 10.3 rebounds and 9.5 assists through six contests.

"I enjoy playing basketball and I had a lot of fun tonight, for sure," said Doncic, who had 31 points, 13 rebounds and 15 assists in an overtime loss to the Lakers two nights earlier. "I want to play good every game because I have a lot of fun playing basketball."

Doncic sank his first five shots, including three 3-pointers, and delivered a highlight-worthy, behind-the-back pass while driving down the lane to Porzingis for a trey. Dallas outscored Cleveland by 15 points in his 34 minutes, delighting the two full sections of fans of Slovenian decent cheering his every move.

"When the ball is in his hands, we know our job as teammates is to make his

job easier," Mavericks guard Tim Hardaway Jr. said. "We know he's going to make the right play. He does a great job attacking and pushing the pace, getting us into situations to be successful."

Love had a season-high 29 points and eight rebounds, Jordan Clarkson scored 17 points and Tristan Thompson had 11 points and 12 rebounds for the Cavaliers, who lost for the first time in three home games under coach John Beilein. Cleveland seized a 23-15 lead as Love scored 13 points in the first seven minutes.

Dallas had seven players reach double figures in points and shot .532 from the field. Jalen Brunson had 14, Seth Curry scored 13, Hardaway had 12 and Dorian Finney-Smith chipped in 10.

"That's on us to improve our defense," Beilein said. "They're really a tough team to match up with and we had no answers for them because of their height at the guard and big man positions."

### TWIN TITANS

The 7-foot-4 Marjanovic made a significant impact playing alongside the 7-3 Porzingis in 15 minutes off the bench. The duo combined for 30 points and 17 rebounds, helping Dallas win the glass battle 51-41. "I love being out there with Bobie because he's my boy, he's my friend," Porzingis said. "It's got to be interesting to see two giants out there as fans."

### TIP-INS

Mavericks: C Maxi Kleber (right knee bruise) was inactive, but Carlisle said his injury was "not serious" and expects the third-year pro to return to practice Tuesday. ... Curry played in one game with Cleveland as a rookie on March 22, 2014. ... Assistant coach Jenny Boucek was a member of the Cleveland Rockers of the WNBA.

Cavaliers: G Matthew Dellavedova (personal reasons) was unavailable for the second straight game. G Brandon Knight, who did not appear in the first four contests, had 10 points while filling in for him as the backup point guard. .... Love had a streak of five straight double-doubles to open the season snapped.

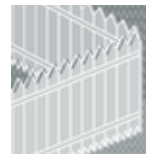

no chance of winning a club finesse, the slam appeared to depend entirely on East's holding the ace of hearts. But the doctor formulated a magnificent scheme that succeeded even though West held the ace.

He began by cashing four diamonds, discarding a club from his hand. Next he cashed all five of his spades, discarding two clubs and a heart from dummy. With three tricks remaining, this was the position:

East had been forced to part with three hearts in order to keep a guard against dummy's jack of clubs. West, having no choice at all, was left with three hearts. Apfel now led the heart three toward dummy's jack. If West played low, East would win with the queen and be forced to return a club from the Q-6 into dummy's A-J. And if West rose with the ace instead, he'd have to return a heart, yielding declarer's 12th trick.

Note that the outcome would have been the same had East held the heart ace and West the queen. Only if West had been dealt the A-Q would the slam have failed, but in that case not even a doctor could help!

Today in History

Today is Monday, Nov. 4, the 308th day of 2019. There are 57 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On Nov. 4, 1980, Republican Ronald Reagan won the White House as he defeated President Jimmy Carter by a strong margin.

On this date:

In 1862, inventor Richard J. Gatling received a U.S. patent for his rapid-fire Gatling gun.

In 1879, humorist Will Rogers was born in Oologah, Oklahoma.

In 1916, CBS newsman Walter Cronkite was born in Saint Joseph, Missouri.

In 1922, the entrance to King Tutankhamen's tomb was discovered in Egypt.

In 1955, Baseball Hall of Fame pitcher Cy Young died in Newcomerstown, Ohio, at age 88.

In 1956, Soviet troops moved in to crush the Hungarian Revolution.

In 1979, the Iran hostage crisis began as militants stormed the United States Embassy in Tehran, seizing its occupants; for some of them, it was the start of 444 days of captivity.

In 1991, Ronald Reagan opened his presidential library in Simi Valley, California; attending were President George H.W. Bush and former Presidents Jimmy Carter, Gerald R. Ford and Richard Nixon — the first-ever gathering of five past and present U.S. chief executives.

In 1995, Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin was assassinated by a right-wing Israeli minutes after attending a festive peace rally.

In 2001, Hurricane Michelle roared across Cuba, forcing the government to shut down power for much of the communist island and evacuate 750,000 people. The Arizona Diamondbacks won their first World Series by beating the New York Yankees 3-2 in Game 7.

In 2007, King Tutankhamen's face was unveiled for the first time to the public more than 3,000 years after the pharaoh was buried in his Egyptian tomb.

In 2008, Democrat Barack Obama was elected the first

black president of the United States, defeating Republican John McCain. California voters approved Proposition 8, a constitutional amendment outlawing same-sex marriage, overturning a state Supreme Court decision that gave gay couples the right to wed just months earlier.

Ten years ago: An Italian judge convicted 23 Americans in absentia along with two Italians in the kidnapping of an Egyptian terror suspect, delivering the first legal convictions anywhere in the world against people involved in the CIA's extraordinary renditions program. The New York Yankees won the World Series, beating the defending champion Philadelphia Phillies 7-3 in Game 6 behind Hideki Matsui's record-tying six RBIs. Former NBA referee Tim Donaghy was released after serving most of a 15-month sentence in a gambling scandal.

Five years ago: Riding a powerful wave of voter discontent, resurgent Republicans captured control of the Senate and tightened their grip on the House during the 2014 elections. A Russian member of the Taliban made his first appearance in a federal court in Richmond, Virginia, marking the first time a military detainee from Afghanistan had been brought to the U.S. for trial. (In August 2015, a federal jury convicted Irek Hamidullin of planning and leading a Taliban attack on U.S. forces in Afghanistan; he was sentenced to life in prison.)

One year ago: Lelisa Desisa of Ethiopia and Mary Keitany of Kenya were the men's and women's winners in the New York City Marathon, which organizers said had set a record for the most finishers of any marathon worldwide - 52,812. The Freddie Rhapsody biopic "Bohemian Rhapsody" collected \$50 million in weekend ticket sales

in the U.S. and Canada on its opening weekend, beating expectations.
