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**Tenants Assigned Additional Duties**

Maintenance of real property facilities including buildings, roads, taxiways, runways, grounds, underground and above ground utility systems, and budgeting for funds to cover the cost involved in preserving these needed features on an Air Force installation are the mission and responsibility of the base civil en-

gineer.

The Department of Defense and the Air Force are now facing the most austere period they have experienced in many years. Guidance from higher headquarters in the form of various directives are being received, and indications are that more and more of the routine work, especially in family

Col. Buckberry housing, will be accomplished by the tenants.

It has been indicated that each base tenant will approach maintenance and minor repairs of quarters similar to the approximately three-quarters of our personnel who live off base. Before calling a local company for expensive services, they weigh the cost involved in the work needed on the quarters they are occupying in the local community. Rates vary, of course, by trade and location, but in most instances the labor cost is approximately \$10 per hour per man, time costed to you which begins from the time the man leaves the shop until he completes his work and hands you that substantial bill. After seeing the bill, you are determined that in the future you will do the work and save these much needed dollars for other family requirements.

This approach of self-help by the tenant will require close coordination with the base civil engineer and his staff so that the tenant may do his part in saving government funds, but not to the point of working on dangerous or unknown areas, especially utilities. It may be necessary for civil engineering personnel to assist the tenants to assure a more professional accomplishment of the needed maintenance.

Additional guidance will be forthcoming from higher headquarters within the next few days or weeks and we propose to keep all personnel fully informed of these developments. Your cooperation and coordination with the Civil Engineering Division and staff is highly desirable in the furtherance of this program.

Capsule Law 'Taking Fifth' **Can Include** Ramifications

"Taking the Fifth" has already become part of the nation's slang. This is an unusual mark of distinction for what is, after all, a technical rule of evidence. What does the expression really mean?

Literally, it means claiming the protection of the Constitution's Fifth Amendment, which says that "no person shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself."

Assistant Staff Judge Advocate This is the second in a series of articles designed to assist you in the preparation of your federal income tax return. As promised in last week's article, this week we are presenting a sample Form 1040, the completion of which is based on a set of hypothetical facts set forth below. The sample form as completed herein should provide guidance for all personnel, single or married, whose adjusted gross income was less than \$5,000 for the tax year 1969 and who do not itemize their deductions. The new 1040 is the only form on which a return may be filed, as the old 1040 and the 1040A have been eliminated.

#### Sample Problem
