During his tour at Chanute, he served as a student class leader in his assigned student squadron. While serving as student leader, he was honored as Student Airman of the Month and was presented a letter of appreciation by his squadron commander for his outstanding contribution to the squadron. He was graduated from the school as the top student in his class.

After arriving at Reese, Airman Brent was placed in training to qualify for his duties as an instructor. According to CMSgt. Paul Jantzen, training devices supervisor, "Airman Brent approached this task with abounding aggressiveness and displayed initiative by practicing and studying many hours during off-duty time." The honored airman was qualified in half of the alloted training time.

Lt. Col. Brower and air navigational aids for the Air Force and other Government and civilian agencies. Through its more than 600 operating locations around the world, AFCS provides five principal services essential to effective command and control. These

(1) On-base communications - Services are customized to the needs of each of the more than 200 USAF bases throughout the world, providing telephone service, teletype and data communications, maintenance of supply computers, intercom, fire and crash alarm, air police and security alerting systems and on-base closed circuit television, all an AFCS responsibility. Many stateside bases such as Reese have leased commercial telephone services managed

(2) Long-line communications - Long-haul or inter-base communications facilities and operations constitute the major portion of the overall Defense Communications System (DCS). The DCS complex provides the Department of Defense with a global system of teletype, facsimile, data and voice communications necessary for command and control of military forces. These systems are also designed to support specific requirements of the nation's aerospace force. Transoceanic systems, such as radio, teletype, telephone and data circuits and special networks providing communications for aircraft and missile early warning systems are part of the long-

(3) Air Traffic Control - Operate and maintain air traffic control facilities and navigational aids world wide. Provide point to point and ground to air radio stations, airdrome control towers and precision radar control services permitting aircraft landings and takeoffs under all weather conditions. USAF and Federal Aviation Agency (FAA) air traffic controllers use the same basic procedures manual and FAA writes the basic air traffic control regulations under which AFCS operates. The two organizations work closely on air traffic control matters and in some locations facilities are manned jointly by FAA and AFCS.

(4) Navigational Aids — This service involves electronic aids to air navigation (the signposts of the sky necessary for flight crews to determine their position). Air navigational aids include tactical air navigation aid (TACAN), VHF omni direction range (VOR), co-located VOR and TACAN site (VORTAC), direction finders (DF) and home beacons, radar beacons, marker beacons, instrument landing systems (ILS), radio homing beacon (RBN), and mid-range radar and radio.

(5) Emergency mission support - AFCS has five mobile communications groups spotted strategically around the world and that purpose. 



### **Base Education** Office To Offer Reading Course

The base education office has announced the summer term scheduled for the on-base education program and the beginning of another speed reading course to begin later this month.

Provided by the Extension Division of Texas Technological University, the on-base program will begin April 27 and 28 with final examinations slated for June 24-25. Tuition will be \$15 per semester hour for all students and military personnel may receive tuition assistance at the rate of \$11.25 per semester hour.

Registration for the courses should be done in the education office by April 16. All interested personnel are encouraged to preregister as soon as possible. The university requires an overall average of 15 students per class.

Those classes to be offered on Mondays and Wednesdays, 5:30 to 8 p.m., include: College Rhetoric I (freshman English), History of the U.S. to 1877, Elementary Accounting I, General Psychology I, College Algebra and Masterpieces of Literature.

Classes offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 5:30 to 8 p.m., include: Introduction to Philosophy, College Rhetoric II, History of the U.S. since 1877, Elementary Accounting II, American Government Organization, and Introduction to College Math.

The speed reading course will be offered for six weeks beginning April 20. Applicants should contact the education office for a reading test to determine which class and times for the course.


