Infill Development Incentive Program back up for discussion

The Big Spring City Council members will convene for a special meeting this afternoon at 5:30 p.m. to finish up the agenda that was started at last Tuesday's City Council before conversations got heated and four city council members walked out. The main item that has drawn attention from the community is the first reading of a resolution that authorizes the Finance Director to direct the Howard County Tax Appraiser/Collector to calculate the voter - approval tax rate of the City of Big Spring under Texas Tax Code using the special taxing unit cap rate of 8% instead of the recently amended 3.5% cap rate as a result of the Declaration of Disaster issued by the President of the United States and the Texas Governor; clarifying to the citizens of Big Spring that this cap rate increase does not reflect the City Council's intent to raise taxes by 8%, but instead to increase the cap as a precautionary measure as permitted during times of disaster; and providing for an effective date.

According to the agenda, the conversation surrounding the

Gov. Abbott's order limits business, Howard Co. to follow guidance

Today, Governor Greg Abbott issued Executive Order No. GA-28 limiting certain businesses and services as part of the state's efforts to contain the spread of COVID-19. The order includes the specific guidelines that each business shall follow.

What this means for the City of Big Spring and Howard county is that the following business may open at 100% of capacity provided they that operate with at least six feet of social distancing between workstations: cosmetology salons, hair salons, barber shops, nail salons/shops, and other establishments where licensed cosmetologists or barbers practice their trade, massage

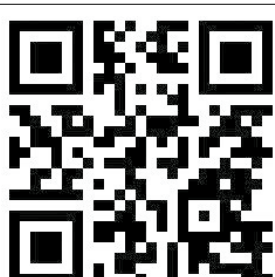

West Texas Centers provides crisis services

BIG SPRING - Crisis services will be provided to those affected by COVID-19 through a program offered by West Texas Centers, the mental health authority for a 23-county region in rural West Texas.

West Texas Centers, along with funding provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency or FEMA will provide the Crisis Counseling Program (CCP) "Texans Recovering Together." The White House declared Texas a major disaster area because of the outbreak of the novel coronavirus, thus freeing up federal funds.

"We are very excited to be offering assistance to the people of West Texas," West Texas Centers CEO Shelley Smith said. "We have been challenged since early March to adapt to the changes brought about from COVID-19, and we

believe we are in a strong position to deal with its fall-out."

Many people have either been ill, lost work, been isolated or kept apart from loved ones, which are all major stressors, said Smith, who is a licensed master social worker.

"Many are isolated, suffering financially, or doing without healthcare or are fearful of the health of a loved one" she said. "They are unable to leave their homes and if they are able to leave the house it's often with the belief that they aren't safe."

The Crisis Counseling Program provides short-term interventions to assist disaster survivors in understanding their current situation and reactions, mitigating stress, reviewing their disaster recovery options, promoting the use or development of coping strategies, providing emotional support, and encouraging links with other individuals and agencies who may help survivors

in their recovery process.

Services are provided at no cost, are confidential and available to anyone living in the 23-county region served by West Texas Centers.

West Texas Centers will provide:

- Information
- Education
- Emotional support
- Links to resources
- Trained members of the West Texas Centers team can assist with:

- Recognizing common reactions to disasters
- Building coping skills for the recovery process
- Managing disaster-related stress
- Identifying and meeting children's needs

SCOT rules for Father in most significant parental rights case in Texas history

AUSTIN, TEXAS - Just this morning, the Supreme Court of Texas (SCOT) handed down a decision in a landmark court case for parental rights, *In re C.J.C.* The case sets major precedent for future parental rights cases that are heard in Texas.

A recent review of the last 20 years of cases found that Texas courts are systematically ignoring the constitutional rights of parents. Advocates hope that today's decision is the new beginning that Texas families need to turn this statistic around.

For months, Chris and his five-year-old daughter Ann have been fighting a decision made by a Texas district court to grant an unrelated man custody of Ann over Chris' objections. Today, that fight came to an end as the Supreme Court of Texas ruled to permanently reunite Chris and Ann.

Nearly two years ago, Ann's mother died in a tragic car accident. Shortly after the death of Ann's mother, the man that Ann's mother had been dating (and was briefly engaged to) at the time of her

death sued Ann's father for custody of Ann.

Despite spending less than six months with Ann and being completely unrelated to her, this man argued that briefly being engaged to (and living with) Ann's mother should give him the right to custody of Ann. He also argued that he had just as great a right to custody of Ann as Ann's father did.

However, this unrelated man acknowledges openly that Ann's father, Chris, was an entirely fit parent. In response to the unrelated man's lawsuit, a district court gave custody of Ann to the unrelated man over Chris' objections.

In the Supreme Court of Texas' landmark ruling, the Court overturned the lower court rulings, and squarely rejected the unrelated man's argument that the law does not presume that Chris has a right to raise Ann.

The Supreme Court of Texas reaffirmed the long-standing constitutional rules that parents are presumed to be fit and that the actions of fit parents

are presumed to be in the best interests of their children.

Chris and Ann's case may be the most significant parental rights case in Texas history. Had Chris and Ann lost their case, parents in Texas would have been opened up to possible lawsuits from a slew of non-parents. Those non-parents could have taken custody of children from entirely fit parents had the Supreme Court of Texas ruled differently.

Instead, the court ruled in favor of families, finding that Chris was a "loving and attentive parent" and that "a court must apply the presumption that a fit parent—not the court—determines the best interest of the child in any proceeding in which a nonparent seeks conservatorship or access over the objection of a child's fit parent."

Today's decision follows a months-long legal battle before the court in which numerous organizations and the State of Texas filed briefs before the court defending Chris and Ann.

establishments and other facilities where licensed massage therapists or other persons licensed or otherwise authorized to practice under Chapter 455 of the Texas Occupations Code practice their trade; and other personal-care and beauty services such as tanning salons, tattoo studios, piercing studios, hair removal services, and hair loss treatment and growth services;

In accordance with Governor Abbott's order, the following guidelines are in effect for Big Spring and Howard County:

- All bars and similar establishments that receive more than 51% of their gross receipts from the sale of alcoholic beverages are required to close at 12:00 PM today, June 26, 2020. These businesses may remain open for drive-thru, pickup or delivery including for alcoholic beverages, as authorized by the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

- Restaurants may remain open for dine-in ser-

vice, they will operate at a capacity not to exceed 75% of total listed indoor occupancy. The use of drive-thru, pickup, or delivery options for food and drinks remains allowed and is highly encouraged.

- All other business establishments may continue to operate at 75% capacity.

Howard County and the City of Big Spring establishments are able to operate at the 75% capacity due to filing of the required attestation form with DSHS.

We strongly recommend that citizens continue to practice social distancing, wash your hands, stay home if you're sick, and wear a mask when in public areas. Citizens should also simply stay home when possible and don't make unnecessary trips into public.

We as a City and County will follow Governor's Abbott's Executive Order. We are each called upon to act as Texans, to act responsibly and continue following all health precautions and sanitizing guidelines. new infill development incentive program will continue. This program is designed to facilitate private investment toward the construction of single family housing within the city limits of Big Spring and therefore encourage economic development that benefits the health, safety and welfare of Big Spring community.

Last Tuesday, this is the agenda item that was in discussion when conversation tensions rose and Mayor Shannon Thomason began to utilize Robert's Rules, which did not allow City Council members to speak. The frustration in the room led to Councilman Jim DePauw to walk out of the meeting. Councilmembers Camilla Strande, Terry

McDaniel, and Raul Marquez Jr. followed suit. Since Tuesday's incident, a petition to recall Councilmembers DePauw and Strande has been filed.

An Executive Session with the City Attorney to discuss anticipated litigation with Oncor, Jake Tiner Construction, GEO Group, and Whiting Oil will be held towards the end of the meeting. Should any action need to be taken from this discussion, the Council will reconvene for an open meeting and take any necessary action before the meeting adjourns.

Other items on the agenda include:

- Approval of the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation Board of Director's Minutes of the Regular Meeting of May 19, 2020 and the Special Meeting of June 9, 2020.

- Consideration and possible action to grant an easement and right of way to Oncor Electric Delivery Company, LLC for purpose of improving the value of property at 5412 I-20 West.

Eli Cranor's Athletic Support: "Summertime soreness"

Dear Athletic Support: My son's summer football workouts are back in full swing. With the days getting hotter (not to mention having so many weeks off due to COVID) he's really feeling the impact of the weight room. He can barely walk! As a single mother, I'm not up to date on strength and conditioning programs. I guess what I'm saying is, I'm worried! When he gets home from workouts in the morning, he usually spends the rest of the day lying around the house. Just wanted to check with you and make sure this was normal, or if I should touch base with the coach. — Working It Out

Dear Working: There's nothing quite like the soreness that comes from summer workouts. A combination of squats, deadlift, and power clean can produce a very distinctive hobble. The good news is it goes away, eventually.

If your son keeps attending his workouts, the pain and soreness will gradually subside. But he has to keep going.

Summer workouts are a proving ground. They're what separates an athlete from a student not involved in extracurricular activities. For most teenagers, summer means vacation, two months of pure freedom!

But for athletes, summer means work. Hard work. Early mornings, tournaments on the weekends, and of course, the dreaded workouts.

There is, however, a method to the madness. What your son is doing is preparing his body for the coming season. He's training his muscle to endure the strain of a four-quarter football game.

This is no easy task. Most coaches realize their players won't actually achieve "game shape" un-

til somewhere around the middle of the season. There's nothing like real competition to get a young athlete's heart pumping.

I always wanted my practices to be so hard that the games were easy. This philosophy is especially important for the summer of 2020.

You mentioned your son having "so many weeks off due to COVID." He's not alone. When the schools shutdown in the spring, so did many student athletes' training regimens. I'm sure some very devoted athletes continued trying to work out from home (see my previous column, "Staying in shape during a pandemic"), but it's almost impossible to match the intensity a good coach can provide.

So take peace in the knowledge that your son's coach is getting him ready. He's working him out hard now so the games will seem easy. If your son sticks it out over the duration of the summer, he'll also be less likely to suffer nagging injuries.

And the best part?

Your son is learning the value of hard work. While other boys his age are sleeping in, he's waking up early and putting in sweat equity toward his future. With the country currently upended

and each week seemingly more uncertain than the last — this is a lesson that will serve him well for years to come.

Lynn named Rangers' opening day starter over Minor, Kluber

Veteran right-hander Lance Lynn has been named the Texas Rangers' starter on opening day, a game that will be played more than four months after manager Chris Woodward actually made that decision. Woodward revealed his choice Thursday. The hard-throwing Lynn got the nod ahead of All-Star lefty Mike Minor and Corey Kluber, the two-time AL Cy Young winner Texas acquired in a December trade from Cleveland.

The manager had planned to make the announcement March 13, but that ended up being the day after MLB abruptly shut down spring training because of the coronavirus. The season opener will be July 23 or 24, but the Rangers don't know where or who they will play since baseball hasn't released the 60-game schedule for the pandemic-delayed and shortened season.

"I can announce it now," Woodward said when discussing the upcoming resumption of spring training, which will take place at the team's new home ballpark instead of Arizona. "I've talked to all of them before this

thing. I was actually going to announce it the next day. Unfortunately, we got shut down. They're very aware of it."

Lynn led Texas in wins last season, going 16-11, with he and Minor (14-10) both pitching 208 1/3 innings. Lynn's career-high 246 strikeouts were the third-most in a season for the Rangers, behind MLB strikeout king Nolan Ryan (301 in 1989) and Yu Darvish (277 in 2013).

There is nothing wrong with reaching out to them, sharing memories of how great their mother was and learning about her life. The main point to stress is

this is not about romantic love but rather how you care deeply about her as a friend. The man she married is probably their father, so I would not tell them your opinion of him.

Dear Annie: I was raised by a very strict mother. I am now a middle-aged man.

Several years ago, out of the blue, my mother asked me if she had been too strict when I was young. I told her I thought she was. Do you think this was her way of apologizing or something else? -- Strict Mother's Son

Dear Strict Mother's Son: It very well could be an apology. If that is something you are looking for, why not ask her? You are very sparse with your words in discussing this issue. Opening lead — ace of hearts.
This deal occurred in the semifinal of the 1996 United States Open Team trials. The match brought together two powerhouse squads captained by Howard Weinstein of Chicago and Zia Mahmood of New York.

The final contract was five spades doubled at both tables, but only one of the declarers got home safely.

At the first table, Michael Rosenberg of the Zia team wound up as declarer after the auction shown. The

bidding was relatively straightforward up to East's four-notrump bid, which asked West to choose a suit for the purpose of sacrificing against four spades.

West, Bruce Ferguson, led the heart ace and cashed the spade ace. He then exited with the king of clubs, a play that would have been harmless on most occasions, but not this one.

Rosenberg won the club king with the ace, discarding a diamond from dummy, drew a second round of trump and led the jack of clubs. West covered with the queen, ruffed in dummy, and declarer subsequently discarded another diamond from dummy on the ten of clubs. Rosenberg then made the rest of the tricks on a crossruff for plus 650.

At the other table, North rather than South wound up as declarer at the same contract, and East led the jack of diamonds. Declarer, Steve Weinstein, won the ace and conceded a spade to the ace. Lew Stansby, West, then cashed the heart king and exited with the diamond queen. Weinstein won with the king, but, without any assistance from West in the club suit, he could not avoid a diamond loser at the end and finished down one, minus 100.

The combined pickup of 750 points for Zia's team gave it a 13-IMP gain on the deal and helped put the team into the final.

This Date In History

Today in History: Today is Monday, June 29, the 181st day of 2020. There are 185 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On June 29, 1613, London's original Globe Theatre, where many of Shakespeare's plays were performed, was destroyed by a fire sparked by a cannon shot during a performance of "Henry VIII." On this date: In 1520, Montezuma II, the ninth and last emperor of the Aztecs, died in Tenochtitlan (tay-nohch-TEET'-lahn) under unclear circumstances (some say he was killed by his own subjects; others, by the Spanish). In 1767, Britain approved the Townshend Revenue Act, which imposed import duties on glass, paint, oil, lead, paper and tea shipped to the American colonies. (Colonists bitterly protested, prompting Parliament to repeal the duties — except for tea.) In 1776, the Virginia state constitution was adopted, and Patrick Henry was made governor. In 1880, France annexed Tahiti, which became a French colony on December 30, 1880. In 1927, the first trans-Pacific airplane flight was completed as U.S. Army Air Corps Lt. Lester J. Maitland and Lt. Albert F. Hegenberger arrived at Wheeler Field in Hawaii aboard the Bird of Paradise, an Atlantic-Fokker C-2, after flying 2,400 miles from Oakland, California, in 25 hours, 50 minutes. In 1933, actor-director Roscoe "Fatty" Arbuckle died in New York at age 46. In 1946, authorities in British-ruled Palestine arrested more than 2,700 Jews in an attempt to stamp out extremists. In 1970, the United States ended a two-month military offensive into Cambodia. In 1974, Isabel Martinez de Peron was sworn in as acting president of Argentina, two days before the death of her ailing husband, President Juan Peron. In 1995, the space shuttle Atlantis and the Russian Mir space station linked in orbit, beginning a historic five-day voyage as a single

ship. A department store in Seoul (sohl), South Korea, collapsed, killing at least 500 people. Actress Lana Turner died in Century City, California, at age 74. In 2006, the Supreme Court ruled, 5-3, that President George W. Bush's plan to try Guantanamo Bay detainees in military tribunals violated U.S. and international law. In 2009, disgraced financier Bernard Madoff received a 150-year sentence for his multibillion-dollar fraud. Ten years ago: China and Taiwan signed a tariff-slashing trade pact that boosted economic ties and further eased political tensions six decades after the rivals split amid civil war. Talk show host Larry King announced he would step down from his CNN show in the autumn after 25 years on the air. Five years ago: A deeply divided Supreme Court upheld the use of a controversial drug, midazolam (mih-DAZ'-oh-lam), in lethal-injection executions. (Executions that employed midazolam took longer than usual and raised concerns that the drug did not perform its intended task of putting inmates into a coma-like sleep.) A car bomb killed Egypt's chief prosecutor, Hisham Barakat, in the country's first assassination of a senior official in 25 years. Stanley Cup winners Nicklas Lidstrom, Chris Pronger and Sergei Fedorov and former NHL star Phil Housley were among the seven newcomers in the Hockey Hall of Fame. One year ago: Former New York City police detective Luis Alvarez, who was a leader in the fight to maintain the Sept. 11 Victims Compensation Fund, died of cancer at the age of 53. In Major League Baseball's first game in Europe, the New York Yankees outlasted the Boston Red Sox 17-13 in a London game that stretched for four hours and 42 minutes, just three minutes shy of the record for a nine-inning game.
