At the regular meeting of the Commercial Club Tuesday night besides other questions discussed and acted on, the committee appointed at the previous meeting to investigate the law, etc., and ascertain the best plan to be pursued to provide means for building a new school house reported a plan believed to be feasible and which involves an increase in the school tax of only five cents on the \$100. The matter was referred to the trustees for further investigation and action if they shall find it satisfactory. The committee to report on a plan and the cost of providing adequate fire protection also reported and were of the opinion that any plan they had been able to hit upon so far would cost more than the town would be willing to invest in it at this time, and that project was dropped temporarily. The same committee also had in hand the question of tree planting and beautifying our public grounds and providing public watering places. The committee was continued as to this part of their work and authorized to make a proposition to the commissioner's court looking to joint action by the people and the county.
