





DPS Increases Enforcement for Thanksgiving Holiday

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is encouraging drivers to make safety a top priority this holiday, as increased travel can present additional challenges for drivers.

As part of the nationwide Operation CARE (Crash Awareness and Reduction Effort) initiative, DPS Troopers will be increasing patrols through Sunday, Nov. 29. DPS Troopers will be looking for drivers who violate the law, including those who are speeding, driving while intoxicated, failing to wear a seat belt, driving without insurance and not complying with the state's Move Over, Slow Down law, among other traffic violations.

"As we prepare for the Thanksgiving holiday, we want to remind every Texan of their duty to drive defensively and help keep our roadways safe," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "The holidays may look different this year, but it is still up to each of us to obey traffic laws and make safety our top priority behind the wheel."

During DPS' 2019 enforcement effort, a total of 59,146 warnings and citations were issued, including 6,460 for speeding; 716 for seat belt and child seat violations; 1,247 for driving without insurance; and 406 for violations of Move Over, Slow Down. Last year's enforce-

ment efforts also resulted in 304 DWI arrests, 231 felony arrests and 183 fugitive arrests.

In addition to Operation CARE, DPS Troopers are also participating in the annual Click It or Ticket initiative, which runs through Nov. 29, with an emphasis on enforcing seat belt use for both drivers and passengers.

- DPS offers the following safety tips for the Thanksgiving holiday:
- Don't drink and drive. Make alternate plans if you are consuming alcohol.
- Move Over or Slow Down for police, fire, EMS, Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) vehicles and tow trucks stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated. Show the same courtesy to fellow drivers who are stopped on the side of the road. This year alone, between Jan. 1 and Nov. 9, DPS issued 11,349 warnings and citations for violations of this law.
- Buckle up everyone in the vehicle it's the law.
- Slow down, especially in bad weather, heavy traffic, unfamiliar areas or construction zones.
- Eliminate distractions while driving, including the use of mobile devices. Texas law prohibits the use of portable wireless devices to read, write or

send an electronic message unless the vehicle is stopped. Also, if you're using a navigation device or app, have a passenger operate it, so you can keep your eyes on the road.

- Drive defensively, as holiday travel can present additional challenges.
- Don't drive fatigued allow plenty of time to reach your destination.
- On multi-lane roadways, use the left lane for passing only. Not only is it courteous driving and avoids impeding traffic, Texas law requires slower traffic to keep to the right and to use the left lane for passing only (when posted).

If you can Steer It, Clear It: If you are involved in a non-injury crash and your

vehicle can be moved, clear the traffic lanes to minimize traffic impact. Leaving vehicles in a traffic lane increase traffic congestion and leaves those in volved with an increased risk of harm or a secondary wreck. On some high ways, if you don't move your vehicle when it's safe to do so, it's against the law.

Check your vehicle to make sure it i properly maintained and always ensure your cargo is secure.
Report road hazards or anything sus

picious to the nearest law enforcemen agency.

Monitor weather and road condition



Big Spring Swim & Dive team puts together strong performance in Pecos

The Big Spring Swim Team participated in their seventh meet of the season and second meet of the year that was held in Pecos last weekend. The schools that participated were Big Spring, Lubbock Coronado and Lubbock Monterey. It was an overall strong day in the pool for Big Spring as a team with the girls finishing second (85.5) behind Lubbock Coronado (98) and the boys were victorious (121) over both Lubbock Monterey (57) and Lubbock Coronado (16). This meant that the Steers and Lady Steers finished first (206.5) in the combined team scores in front of Coronado (114) and Monterey (71.5). The next time the Big Spring swim team will take to the pool is Dec. 1 in Abilene at McMurry University for a Double Dual meet with Abilene High and Abilene-Cooper.

The following are the results for Big Spring's swimmers from the Pecos Tri-Meet this past weekend out west:

In the Girls' 200-Yard medley relay, the quartet of freshman Arely Cruz-Garcia, sophomore Naomi Reyes, freshman Katherine Greene and sophomore Malaki Vaughn finished in second-place with a final time of 2:22.54.

In the Boys' 200-Yard medley relay, the group of sophomore David Summers, sophomore Ismael Castillo, senior Manuel Castillo and sophomore Toby Phillips took home the gold in that race on the day (2:12.90).

In the Girls' 200-Yard Freestyle, sophomore Jayda Overton finished in third-place with a strong performance (2:52.72). Her teammate, freshman Katherine Greene (5th, 3:00.78), rounded out the top five for that particular race.

Freshman Ethan Barker finished fourth in the Boys' 200-Yard Freestyle (3:13.62) and was the only

Steer swimmer to place in the event.

Sophomore David Summers was the only Steer or Lady Steer to compete in the 200-Yard IM and was able to finish in first-place (2:54.10).

Sophomore Malaki Vaughn finished in first-place in the Girls' 50-Yard Freestyle with a final time of 29.82 seconds. Her teammates Brooklynne Heffle (5th, 35.12) and Steffany Pina Arment (7th, 39.21) also finished in the Top 10 performers for that specific race.

In the Boys' 50-Yard Freestyle, Manuel Castillo (1st, 25.33) was the top Steer finisher. Fellow Steer swimmers Ismael Castillo (2nd, 30.16), Toby Phillips (4th, 32.45), and Carson Millsap (5th, 33.10) also placed in the Top Five.

Freshman Katherine Greene finished in firstplace (1:36.06) in the Girls' 100-Yard Butterfly as there was no competition for her to go head-to-head against.

Senior Manuel Castillo was the only Steer competitor in the Boys' 100-Yard Butterfly and finished in first-place (1:04.68) over Anthony Lucero from Lubbock Monterey (1:16.06).

Sophomore swimmer Malaki Vaughn finished infirst-place (1:04.77) of the Girls' 100-Yard Freestyle. Her teammates Naomi Reyes (2nd, 1:04.96) and Jayda Overton (6th, 1:20.37) all finished inside the Top 10

Carson Millsap finished third in the Boys' 100 Yard Freestyle with a final time of 1:15.73. His teammate, freshman Matthew Nieves, finished fourth with a time of 1:27.70.

Cruz-Garcia was the only Lady Steer swimmer to participate in the Girls 500-Yard Freestyle race and finished in 7:05.46.

Two of the three swimmers to take part in the Boys' 500-Yard Freestyle race were from Big Spring. They ended up finishing in second (Pantoja-Strickland, 6:44.96) and third-place (Griffith, 7:06.07).

The group of Naomi Reyes (48.86), Malaki Vaughn (15.28), Jayda Overton (56.74), and Arely Cruz-Garcia (29.37) took home second-place in the Girls' 200-Yard Freestyle Relay with a total time of 2:30.25.

Big Spring finished first in the Boys' 200-Yard Freestyle Relay with the grouping of David Summers, Christian Pantoja-Strickland, Ismael Castillo, and Manuel Castillo (1:54.78). Ethan Barker, Matthew Nieves, Carson Millsap, and Morgan Griffith finished in third with a time of 2:23.83. Cruz-Garcia finished in first-place (1:21.17) in the

Girls' 100-Yard Backstroke. Heffle finished behind her as she tied with a Lubbock Monterey swimmer for third-place (1:36.69). On the boys' side, Pantoja-Strickland placed second (1:19.76) while Summers placed third (1:20.58) and Barker finished in fourth (1:41.71).

Naomi Reves finished in second-place in the Girls'

Naomi Reyes finished in second-place in the Girls' 100-Yard Breaststroke (1:28.53), while Pina Arment was disqualified. On the boys' side, Ismael Castillo (2nd, 1:27.94), Griffith (3rd, 1:38.10), and Nieves (4th, 1:52.88) rounded out the race.

Lastly, the grouping of Overton, Heffle, Pina Arment and Greene finished in second-place in the Girls' 400-Yard Freestyle Relay (5:34.44). On the boys' side, the quartet of Pantoja-Strickland, Phillips, Griffith and Millsap were the only group to race and finished in first-place (4:57.72) to close out Big Spring's strong day in the pool.

Big Spring's divers took the pool last Friday and they also finished strong from the diving board. Toby Phillips placed in second (211.10) and Pantoja-Strickland finished third (185.05). Vaughn placed in third (212.60) on the girls' side of the competition.

Williams Claims Victory At Tough Bassmaster Central Open On Lewisville Lake

LEWISVILLE, Texas — Enduring a tough day marked by mishaps and disappointment, Tommy Williams of Shepherdsville, Ky., won the Basspro. com Bassmaster Central Open on Lewisville Lake with a three-day total of 41 pounds, 15 ounces.

On Day 1, Williams caught a second-place limit of 18-8 and trailed early leader Brandon Dillard by 6-1. Adding a Day 2 limit of 15-8 sent him into Championship Saturday with a 6-3 lead.

On Saturday, that margin proved essential as Williams found only three keepers for 7-15, but held on to claim the top prize of \$35,933 and a berth in the 2021 Academy Sports + Outdoors Bassmaster Classic presented by Huk

scheduled for March 19-21 on Lake Ray Roberts.

"Everybody knows how tough it is to win a tournament when you have a missed opportunity and I had a couple of them," Williams said. "The fish bit funny today. I had fish blow up on a spinnerbait and I lost fish on a flipping stick.

"I fished clean all week, but today, they just pulled off. But it's been a wonderful experience. Texas has treated me well. This is the first time I've been in contention to win one of these events."

Williams spent his tournament in three areas. Two comprised windward pockets with baitfish blown into dense tangles of shallow wood. The third was a main-lake flat. "I spent seven days of practice and it came together on the third day," he said. "I fished my strengths through the whole thing."

He flipped the wood with a Texasrigged green pumpkin creature bait with the tails dipped in chartreuse. On the flat, he fished a 1/4-ounce spinnerbait with a single No. 3 willow-leaf blade and a chartreuse curly tail grub for a trailer.

The two-pronged attack served him the first two days, but he struggled in the final round.

"My first fish this morning came off when I pinned him against a log," Williams said. "He was about a 2 1/2-pounder and I said 'This is how it's gonna go."

"The next bite, I caught a good one,

then the next fish came off. Then it was the dink-fest. I caught more short (undersized) fish in an hour and a half than I caught all week."

Williams added another keeper mid-morning, but after multiple days of fishing pressure from him and other competitors sharing the area, the shallow wood bite fizzled.

"I told the camera crew 'I have some spinnerbait fish that I'm going to have to go fish sometime today," he said.

Making that move in the latter part of the day, Williams experienced one of his most frustrating moments around 1:30. Williams had a big fish boil under his spinnerbait without committing. When he followed up with the creature bait, the fish bit but missed the hook.



Opening lead — five of diamonds. This deal comes from a team-offour championship. Six hearts was reached at both tables, but only one of the declarers made the slam.

At the first table, South won the diamond lead with the ace, played a heart to the ace and continued with a heart to the king. When West showed out, declarer played the king of diamonds, ruffed by East. With two small diamonds remaining in his hand and only one trump left in dummy, South had to lose another

diamond for down one.

At the second table, against the same opening lead, declarer played the hand with far more cunning. He drew a round of trump with the king and then, to cater to the possibility that East had started with a singleton diamond, crossed to dummy with a spade and returned a diamond.

Had East ruffed, South would easily have made the rest of the tricks by drawing a second round of trump and then ruffing his remaining diamond loser in dummy. But East correctly discarded a spade on the diamond lead, and declarer won the trick with the king.

South thereupon led a third round of diamonds and ruffed with dummy's ace! He then returned to his hand by ruffing a spade.

Next came the fourth round of diamonds, ruffed by declarer in dummy and overruffed by East to produce the first and only trick for the defense

Thus, the second South made six hearts thanks to his far more cautious and thoughtful approach to the play. He established a trump trick for East by ruffing his third diamond with dummy's ace, but by doing so assured that he would be able to ruff both of his diamond losers in dummy and so finish with 12 tricks. South may have lost the battle not to lose a trump trick, but he won the war.

This Date In History

Today in History

Today is Thursday, Nov. 26, the 331st day of 2020. There are 35 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On Nov. 26, 2000, Florida Secretary of State Katherine Harris certified George W. Bush the winner over Al Gore in the state's presidential balloting by a 537-vote margin.

On this date:

In 1789, Americans observed a day of thanksgiving set aside by President George Washington to mark the adoption of the Constitution of the United States.

In 1883, former slave and abolitionist Sojourner Truth died in Battle Creek, Mich. In 1917, the National Hockey League was founded in Montreal, succeeding the Nation-

In 1933, a judge in New York ruled the James Joyce book "Ulysses" was not obscene and could be published in the United States.

al Hockey Association.

In 1941, U.S. Secretary of State Cordell Hull delivered a note to Japan's ambassador to the United States, Kichisaburo Nomura (kee-chee-sahboor-oh noh-moo-rah), setting forth U.S. demands for "lasting and extensive peace throughout the Pacific area." The same day, a Japanese naval task force consisting of six aircraft carriers left the Kuril Islands, headed toward Hawaii.

In 1943, during World War II, the HMT Rohna, a British transport ship carrying American soldiers, was hit by a German missile off Algeria; 1,138 men were killed. In 1950, China entered the Korean War, launching a counteroffensive against soldiers from the United Nations, the U.S. and South Korea.

In 1973, President Richard Nixon's personal secretary, Rose Mary Woods, told a federal court that she'd accidentally caused part of the 18-1/2-minute gap in a key Watergate tape.

In 1986, President Ronald Reagan appointed a commission headed by former Senator John Tower to investigate his National Security Council staff in the wake of the

Iran-Contra affair. In 1992, the British government announced that Queen

Elizabeth II had volunteered to start paying taxes on her personal income, and would take her children off the public payroll.

În 2007, Sen. Trent Lott announced his retirement after a 35-year career in Congress. Washington Redskins star safety Sean Taylor, 24, was mortally wounded during a botched armed robbery at his home in Palmetto Bay, Florida. (Taylor died the next day.)

In 2008, teams of heavilv armed Pakistani gunmen stormed luxury hotels, a popular tourist attraction and a crowded train station in Mumbai, India, leaving at least 166 people dead in a rampage lasting some 60 hours.

Ten years ago: Nineteenyear-old Somali-born Mohamed Osman Mohamud was arrested by federal agents in Portland, Oregon, after an elaborate sting operation in which Mohamud was led to believe he would be detonating a van of explosives during the city's Christmas tree lighting ceremony. (Mohamud was later sentenced to 30 years in prison.) President Barack Obama received 12 stitches in his upper lip after taking an errant elbow during a pickup basketball game with family and friends visiting for the

Thanksgiving holiday. Five years ago: French President Francois Hollande and Russian President Vladimir Putin agreed to tighten cooperation in the fight against the Islamic State group. Pope Francis celebrated his first Mass in Africa; later that day in Nairobi, Kenya, the pope met with several hundred priests and nuns, urging them to serve others and not be served. The White House underwent a Thanksgiving Day lockdown after a man draped in an American flag jumped the fence. One year ago: Heavy snow

and wind shut down highways in Colorado and Wyoming and forced more than 1,000 travelers to sleep over-

night in Denver's airport after hundreds of flights were canceled as the Thanksgiving travel period went into high gear. Top-ranked Duke lost to Stephen F. Austin, 85-83, for the Blue Devils' first home loss to a nonconference foe since 2000.
