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

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

Big issues await lawmakers in next legislative session

AUSTIN-Now that it's 2011, eyes turn toward the state Capitol in earnest, as weighty tasks lay in store for the 82nd Texas Legislature convening Jan. 11.

going into this legislative session:

1. Because 2010 was a census year, Texas, thanks to its swelling population, will gain four seats in Congress and district boundaries must be redrawn to accommodate those seats. If there's pushing and shoving it'll be no surprise. Federal court refereeing is par for the course.

2. Republicans dominate the House in number: 101 seats to the Democrats' 49. But among the GOP contingency are twenty-some freshmen with a strong, conservative bent and constituencies expecting them to break the mold in Austin. Moderate GOP incumbents will feel pressure not only from the loyal opposition, but from within their own party ranks. The GOP edge in the comparatively chummy state Senate is 19 seats to the Democrats' 12.

3. Lawmakers must pass a budget while facing a deficit somewhere between \$8 billion and \$25 billion, and those who aim to trim or mow down their least favorite state and federal programs and services likely will face challenges from many directions.

Then, what about the usual flood tide of proposed laws our elected representatives and special interest groups spend so much time and effort trying to pass? Well, the state constitution requires the Legislature to do one thing when it meets: pass a budget bill. Not just any budget: a balanced budget that makes the state pay as it goes while observing spending limits in various categories.

## Snack choice matters

Did you snack yesterday? If you are like most Americans the answer is yes. According to research by Dr. Barry Popkin 97% of adults snack and snacks account for about 25% of total calorie intake.

Some research suggests that snacking can help with satiety and is associated with lower body weight. However, snacking research is inconsistent; other studies suggest limiting caloric intake to three meals a day is a better approach to weight management.

Should you decide you need a little caloric pick me up, choose wisely. "Fruit, vegetables; low fat dairy products such as string cheese and yogurt; whole grains; and lean meat and beans such as hummus with whole grain crackers are good choices," says Dr. Sharon Robinson, Nutrition Specialist and Registered Dietitian with the Texas AgriLife Extension Service. The secret is to keep portion size under control to avoid eating too many calories during the day. Consuming more calories than needed (as snacks and/or meals) can lead to unwanted weight gain especially when not offset with increased physical activity.



**Debt Relief Companies** 

**Prohibited From Collecting Advance Fees** 

On Oct. 27, federal rules governing debt relief services were changed in order to help prevent debtors from not exchange any referral being defrauded.

Under new provisions of the Federal Trade Commission's (FTC) Telemarketing Sales Rule, debt relief service companies are prohibited from charging advance fees. Before the change, many debt relief service companies required

•The provider does not own, control or have any affiliation with the financial institution administering the account; and

•The provider does fees with the company administering the account.

In addition to these protections, the new FTC rule requires debt relief service companies to disclose a debt reduction settlement's potential negative consequences to the client. Debt relief service companies their customers to pay must also tell clients how large up-front fees for debt long it will take to see a consolidation and reduction settlement's results. Finally, the new rule prohibits debt relief service companies from misrepresenting success rates or falsely claiming to be a nonprofit company. The new rule applies to telemarketers of forprofit debt relief services, including credit counseling, debt settlement and debt negotiation services. The rule does not cover nonprofit firms, but does cover companies that falsely claim nonprofit status. The FTC has issued a guide to help debt relief General's Office will have service companies comply with the amended debt relief rule. The guide describes the key changes to the Telemarketing Sales Rule-including how those changes affect debt relief services-help businesses determine if they are covered by the new rules, mandatory disclosures to customers and the collection of debt settlement fees. Today, however, debt relief service companies can only charge customers after they have successfully reduced, settled or otherwise negotiated the terms of at least one of the customer's debts. Additionally, any debt settlement fees must be clearly detailed in a formal written contract between the company and the customer. All fees must be proportionate to the amount of debt at issue. Both the FTC and the Texas Attorney authority to enforce the new rule.

The new federal rule also allows debt relief service companies to require that their customers set aside service fees-along with savings for creditor payments-into a separate, dedicated account. Providers may only require a dedicated account if five conditions are met:


•The account is maintained at an insured financial institution;

in the customer's name and under the customer's full control;

•The customer has the right to withdraw the funds at any time without penalty;





We have all heard that most crashes occur close to home; this, in fact, also applies to crashes involving children. Partners for Child Passenger Safety, a research collaboration between The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and State Farm released a study crashes took place on a unrestrained. So often we see the results of these crashes on the evening news and in the local newspapers but do not stop to consider that the majority of these crashes are happening on local streets and roads and

By using ageappropriate child safety seats and keeping children 12 and under properly restrained in the back seat of the vehicle, parents can greatly reduce the risk of injury.
