About a County Exhibit.

Dr. Gilbert, who always comes to the front when anything is to be done in the public interest, suggests that the business men of the town and farmers throughout the county unite in getting up a first-class collection of Haskell county products, such as could be used for exhibition at fairs or displayed in some convenient place in town to show to prospectors, who will doubtless be legion, during the fall and winter. As farmers and all are alike interested in the settlement and development of the country, we hope to see everyone take hold of the proposition with a will and determination to get together an exhibit that will be a credit to the best county in West Texas.

The Prairie Dog Election.

In the election held throughout Haskell county last Saturday to determine whether or not the law enacted by the last legislature providing penalties to enforce the destruction of the prairie dogs in which said law should be adopted by a majority of the qualified voters, resulted in an almost unanimous vote. It was known that there would be but few opposition votes, hence the turnout to the polls was light. The Haskell box polled only 96 votes, but they were solidly against the dogs. The Brushy box gave 26 votes, 21 of them being against the dogs and—well, we don't know what the other fellows wanted. The Wild-horse box turned in 51 votes against the dogs and none the other way.

The returns not having yet been officially canvassed, we did not get the figures from the three other boxes holding elections, but they are reported as being about unanimous for the adoption of the law. Two boxes failed to hold the election, explaining that they were satisfied that the other boxes would "do a plenty" for the dogs without their bothering about it this hot weather.
