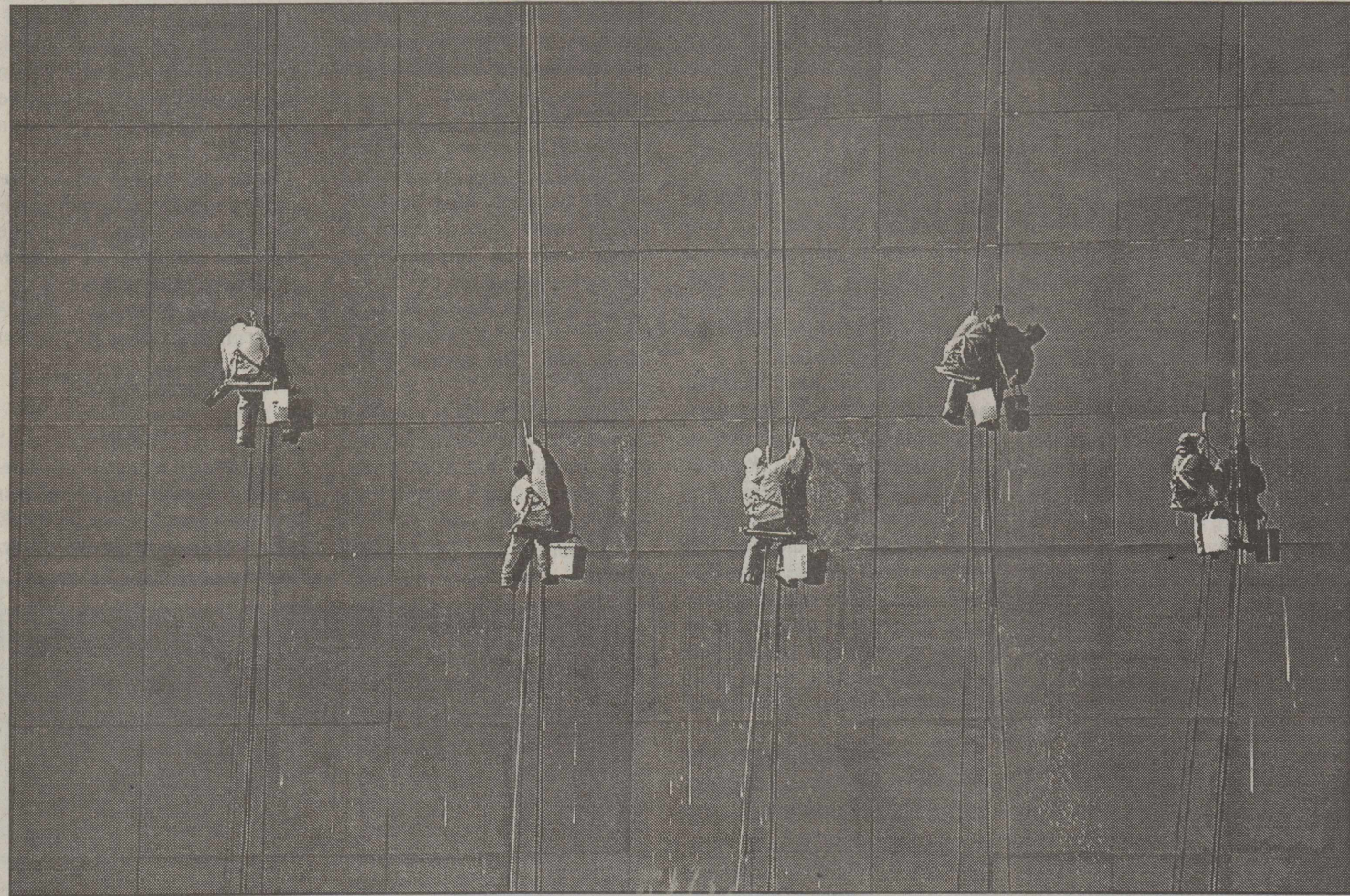

Press Association to give out two scholarships

The Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon and Publisher Alice Gilroy are pleased to announce applications are currently being accepted from area students for two \$2,000 Bob Craig Memorial Scholarships awarded through the West Texas Press Association and the Texas Press Association.

The contest is open to applicants in the area served by WTPA member newspapers, and whose career goals include working with a community newspaper.

Floyd County students are eligible to apply for the scholarships through the Hesperian-Beacon membership in WTPA.

Each scholarship is divided into two payments of \$1,000 each

semester. The winners must be enrolled in at least three hours of college or university journalism courses each semester the scholarship is awarded. College students must have at least 60 hours of college course work. Each applicant must also fill out an application form and write an essay based on the theme, "My Future and Career Plans in Community Journalism."

One scholarship will be presented to a graduating high school senior and the other to a student attending a college or university as a print journalism or advertising major. Broadcast or public relations majors do not qualify.

Application forms have been sent to member newspapers, high schools in the areas served by WTPA members and to college journalism departments. Applications may also be downloaded from www.wtpa.org. Applicants must be from the area served by WTPA membership.

Applications and essays should be sent to Bob Dillard, WTPA Scholarship Chairman, P.O. Box 1097, Fort Davis, TX 79734-1097, and be postmarked no later than June 19, 2007.

Winners will be chosen by the West Texas Press Association board of directors, and announced during the association's

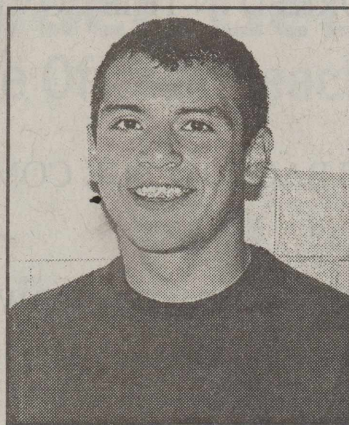

Rainwater to compete in State Tournament

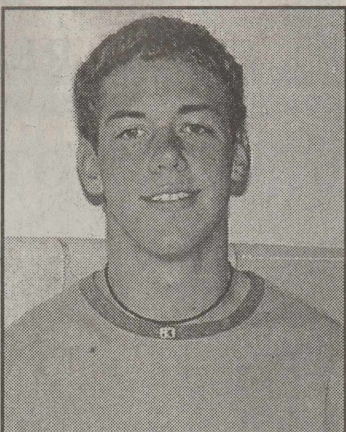

Water line break leaves City dry

The City of Floydada experienced a water line break on the Ralls Highway Saturday, April 28th, which caused the entire City water system to be shut down for over 3 hours.

The major break was on the east side of the Ralls Highway at the intersection W. Ollie Avenue.

City Manager Gary Brown told the Hesperian-Beacon, "When we began digging above the break around 3:15 p.m., the water started gushing straight up in the air. With the help of five City Sanitation/Water Department workers, myself, several City patrolmen and a salesman out of Lubbock, we were able to bring in enough parts from Lubbock and our own supply to fix the broken pipe."

A large portion of the general public was warned beforehand, by phone and by television, of the coming shut down of the entire City water system, which was necessary to make the repairs, according to Brown.

"The water supply was shut off at the towers and at the Mackenzie supply line at 8 p.m. Saturday," said Brown.

The water was off until around 11:30 p.m. Saturday night, while the repairs were made. "The water must be tested for three different days and our last test day will be the afternoon of May 2. We advised our citizens to boil their water or drink bottled water until that day. No pollutions have been detected," concluded Brown.

The U.S. Marines will conduct a ceremony at 10:30 a.m. to honor fallen comrades, and lunch will be served following

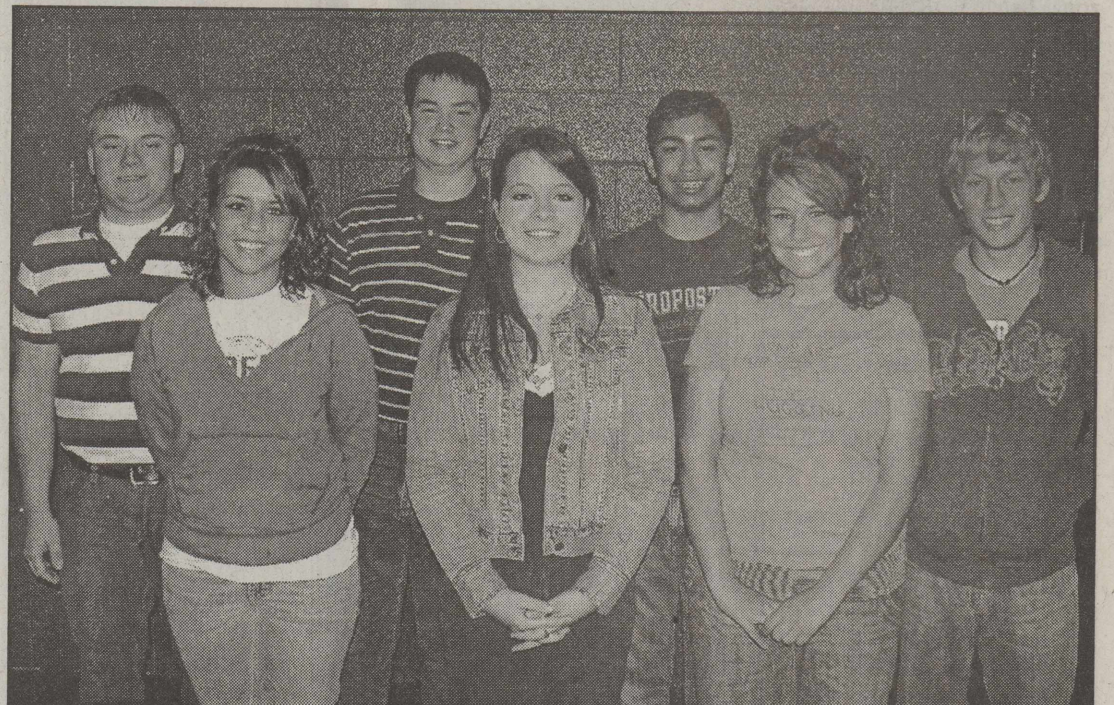
the ceremony.

I have debated for quite some time over whether or not I should write this column. It may very well lead to "killing the messenger" from those who disagree with my views or simply from those who preferred not to think about this subject. It is easier to pretend a problem doesn't exist than it is to face it head on. I know because I wanted to pretend.

I'm writing this column not because of my dislike for another human being and their lifestyle, but because of my love for the good people in this County. You are about to be faced with situations that you have never confronted before.

I'm writing because I believe it is better to face a challenge when you know the facts.

You may have heard recently that the Tye Company was selling to a man who was going to bring a "furniture making business", or a "cabinet making business" to Lockney. Depending on who you talked to, the business was going to hire 3 people, or 100 people, or no "outside" people.

The man who is buying the business, Samuel C. Fischer described himself as a Mormon from the town of Hildale, Utah.

As a member of the Lockney Economic Development Committee (and By the Way, my thoughts are my own-I am not speaking for the EDC), the news first brought great jubilation. But it was very short lived. It was pointed out to me that Hildale (of which I had never heard), was the home base of the Fundamental Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. The group, called FLDS for short, is not connected to the modern Mormon Church, and Samuel C. Fischer is not the kind of Mormon that you are familiar with.

The group of almost 10,000 is a polygamist sect of Mormon fundamentalists that has a long history of skirting the law. The FLDS is ruled by their prophet, Warren Jeffs, who was recently arrested in Las Vegas, Nevada, on warrants out of Arizona and Utah on four total counts of Rape of a Child, stemming from his practice of arranging child marriages to older men. He was on the FBI's 10 Most Wanted List and featured on America's Most Wanted TV show.

The Temple for the FLDS (and new world headquarters of Warren Jeffs) has recently been built, along with a city, in the hillsides of Eldorado in Schleicher County. The city has large houses, a concrete plant, and even its own waste-water treatment plant.

Before I go any further it must be emphasized the FLDS is separate from the Mormon Church. The FLDS have developed their own rules, their own interpretations of the Book of Mormon, and added their own prophet-Warren Jeffs.

Hildale is the twin city of Colorado City, Arizona. They are basically one in the same.

The history of the fundamentalists of Hildale, Utah (located at the border of Utah and Arizona) began with the town originally known as Short Creek (and is still referred to that way by some Fundamentalists).

Mormon doctrine research and polygamy research dates back to July 1843 when Joseph Smith recorded the Church's doctrine by what he said was a vision.

The doctrine provided the

foundation for polygamy. Political pressure in 1904 led to a "Second Manifesto" which forbade polygamy. A few refused to accept this. Within this new group arose new leaders and they needed new locations to congregate.

Short Creek, Arizona became the settling place for the fundamentalist Mormons as early as the 1930's. Early financiers in the movement were Nathaniel Baldwin, Lorin Woolley, John Y. Barlow, Israel Barlow, Leslie Broadbent, and Lyman Jessop. (I tell these names because the surnames will continue to surface throughout the FLDS history).

As laws became stricter against "unlawful cohabitation" the border town became attractive as a place where practitioners of plural marriages could step across the Utah line to avoid arrest. More laws in Arizona created an even better deal as polygamist could escape prosecution in either direction.

Eventually bad press led the FLDS to rename Short Creek to Hildale in Utah, and Colorado City in Arizona.

In 2002 Warren Jeffs took over as the FLDS prophet when his father, Rulon T. Jeffs, died.

Rulon Jeffs (after taking power in 1986) was responsible for abolishing the 7 member Priesthood Council that had previously governed the sect. He now claimed "One Man Rule".

Jeffs is considered "God's Mouthpiece".

Warren Jeffs says a man must have at least 3 wives to secure a place in Heaven while a woman gets there only if married to a worthy man. The prophet decides who marries whom and when. Many times the girls will only get a few hours notice before being taken to her new husband. Many of the girls have been young teenagers-13 and 14 years old. Many have never met the man who is now called their husband.

"Getting" a wife requires the men to be useful and ready to serve. It also often requires you to have the right last name-be in the right position-or just give the right amount of money to the church. Then-maybe, Jeffs will put you on the list for a 2nd or 3rd wife. (Jeffs himself is rumored to have as many as 70 wives).

Dating is prohibited. The first contact with the opposite sex comes in the marriage ceremony performed by the prophet. If a married man falls "out of favor" the man is sent to repent "from afar" and his wives and children may be told to leave him. They are often given to another. This is the power of the prophet. If the man continues to work hard for the church and tithe he hopes Jeffs will allow him back in the fold. This very rarely happens.

In January 2004, Jeffs expelled a group of 20 men, including the mayor, and gave their wives and children to other men. According to news reports Jeffs said he was acting on the orders of God. The men said they were expelled for disagreeing with Jeffs.

There is not a single newspaper or magazine in Hildale/Colorado City. Television and radio are banned. The sounds you hear coming from the homes will be Jeffs teaching on tape. Because

of no outside communication, Jeffs' recent arrest in Las Vegas was not even known. The fact that he was driving a red Cadillac Escalade (red is a forbidden color), and his "wife" was wearing jeans (also forbidden) was never known.

You may wonder how this cult gets around the laws of polygamy. For one thing the polygamy laws aren't enforced. They also admit to having only one legal wife. The other wives are then technically single women with many children entitled to all the welfare benefits of the state.

The Hildale/Colorado City area (according to Wikipedia) has the world's highest incidence of fumarase deficiency, an extremely rare genetic condition which causes severe mental retardation. This is attributed to the prevalence of cousin marriage between descendants of two of the towns founders-Joseph Smith Jessup and John Yeates Barlow. At least half, according to Wikipedia, of the population of 8,000 inhabitants (of the two towns) are descended from one or both.

The way to Heaven for the followers of FLDS is following the words of their prophet. They are very hard working because they believe the hard work affords them a better chance at Heaven.

Jeffs has issued more than one "end of the world" date. Followers are encouraged to work hard and turn over more money to show their faithfulness before the date arrives. When the date comes and goes followers are simply told it is their own fault Jesus didn't come. If they had been found worthy and worked harder Jesus would have come.

While his followers work and the women and children are reduced to slavery, Jeffs (and his lieutenants) live high on the hog.

When Jeffs was arrested in his Cadillac, authorities also found ten sets of keys to other luxury cars-a Porsche Cayenne sports SUV valued at more than \$100,000, a Volkswagen Touareg, a BMW, and an Audi just to name a few.

Also in his possession were envelopes containing letters from Jeffs' repentant followers begging to be forgiven. Referring to their tithes and donations lawmen assumed the letters contained cash.

The letters had been opened with a narrow slit so the money could be removed. The letters, however, had never been read. And, a large amount of cash-\$54,000 was found when Jeffs

was arrested.

The stories of abuse of the child brides are horrendous. The women and children who know no other life, and have no idea there is freedom or a place to escape to, seldom get away from the bondage cult. But there have been some. Those testimonies will be heard at Jeffs' trial. Many can be found on the website: childbrides.org.

Christians in the community who believe they will be able to "witness" to the FLDS are simply uninformed about the ways of the cult. You will not be allowed anywhere near the women and children. In fact, according to the Eldorado editor you will seldom see the women and children in the community. If you do they will not be alone. You will see the men walking around but their dress will not distinguish them from anyone else. The women and children will be dressed in long dresses.

The members work hard but the society is closed and very very secretive. So secretive in fact, that anyone in this community who deals with a member of FLDS needs to know that "lying for God" is the new rule. You will find that there will be many different answers to questions because you are told what you need to hear at the time. Telling you (a Gentile) anything about what goes on in their church is deemed a sin.

The fear that the FLDS will come and snatch up your children is ungrounded. In fact, the FLDS wants nothing to do with "outside" people. The FLDS does not engage in missionary work or proselytizing. Their money does not go to "spread the Word", it appears most of it goes to the prophet and whatever he deems necessary.

According to the editors at the "The Eldorado Success" some of the businesses owned by FLDS include cabinetmaking and candy making-to name a couple.

Samuel Fischer has also been to Floydada and inquired as to the purchase or lease of the Labor Camp. He has also stated that he has bought several homes in Plainview-but that can't be confirmed at this time.

The FLDS is looking to expand their communities and the panhandle is attractive because of lots of land at a better price. Homes and buildings are also cheaper than in Utah. When I first started making my calls to find out more about FLDS, Hildale, etc., I was told that rumor had it that the FLDS was expanding into the Panhandle-but no one was sure where. Now, it is appar-

ent that they want to expand here in Floyd County.

I have no idea how many families will move to the area, but I do know that this business will not bring new jobs for local people-not unless you happen to be a member of one of the FLDS families.

I have been told that the property appraisals actually go up when FLDS move into an area.

In Eldorado they are the 4th largest taxpayer in the County next to oil and gas. I was told that probably in the near future they will be listed as the 2nd largest taxpayers (as a group).

The group will be very self contained. More than likely they will bring in young men to work for the prophet. This business will be established to be an income base to support the Eldorado compound.

In answer to the question, "Is the sale of the Tye Company a 'done deal'". The answer is Yes and No.

There has been a contract signed with intention to buy and earnest money has been given. Until the closing I suppose the buyer could back out.

Do not despair. Do not fear.

Be prepared.

Who knows, FLDS may decide the Bible Belt of Texas was more than they bargained for.

I encourage everyone to do their own research on Warren Jeffs, Hildale, FLDS, child brides, and the "Lost Boys". Get on the internet or go to the Library. A book that has been recommended to me, but which I have not read, is "The Polygamist-A History of Colorado City, Arizona", by Benjamin G. Bistline. On the internet, check out the site: "Banking On Heaven", or the book "Under the Banner of Heaven", by Jon Krakauer.

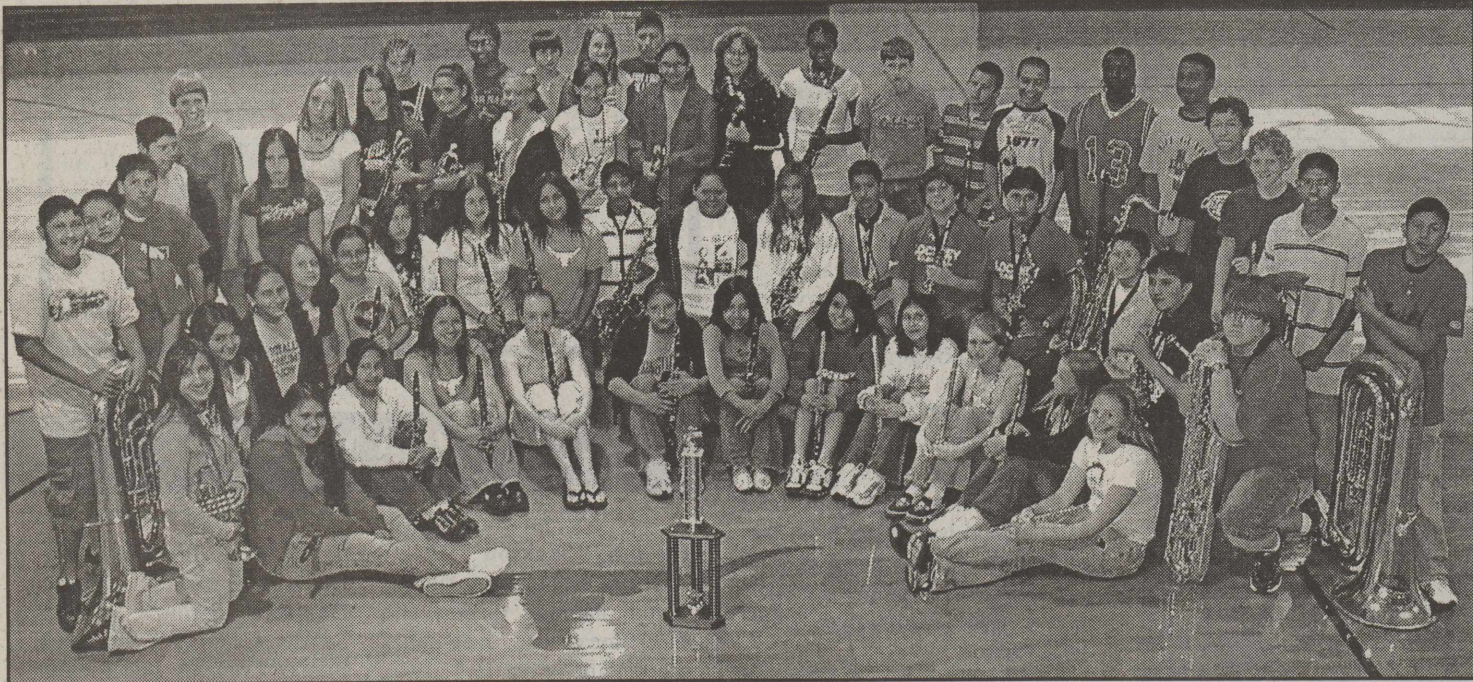

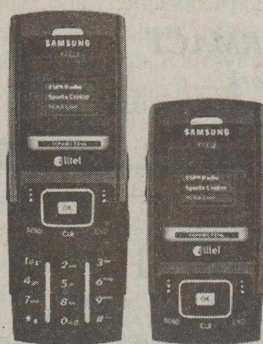

A food box will contain different items each month. In May the box contains items such as: riblets, chicken nuggets, stew meat, beef patties, pizza rolls, drumsticks, cooking oil, carrots, eggs, and potatoes.

For May you can also order a 7 lb. seafood special, a 9 lb. pork special, or a 8 lb. steak combo.

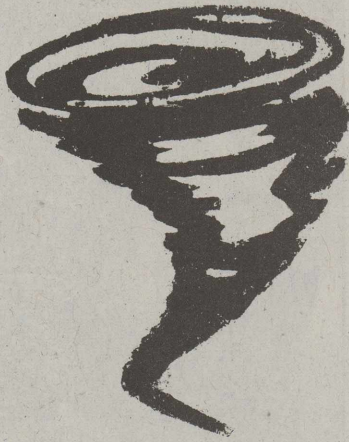

Floyd County Extension Service provides Reality Check for LISD and FISD students

Floyd County Extension Agents J. D. Ragland and Melissa Long recently conducted Pathways to Success/Reality Check programs at both Floydada ISD and Lockney ISD schools.

This reality check "hands on" program is geared for 8th graders through the High School Seniors level. It puts the student into the 'real world' of getting a job and then experiencing the real need to watch your dollars when it comes to spending your paycheck on certain necessary items.

After getting their "pay checks" the students went from station to station to pay for bills, clothing, housing, etc.

The handbooks used and filled out by the students involves everything from the amount of dollars you receive at different job levels, and the amount of dollars you can spend on certain items, such as, housing, food, clothing, transportation, medical, college,

child care, health & beauty, entertainment and miscellaneous.

Certain higher paying jobs allow one to spend more dollars on their favorite items, while a lower paying job will only allow a minimum amount of dollars to be spent on necessary items, such as food, clothing, transportation and housing.

According to the program, if you cannot survive on your low pay check, then you have an option of going to a 2 year, 4 year or trade school, or even back to college, in order to get a better paying job.

To make things a 'reality check' for the students, cards are handed out at random and the individual student must try to live on what his or her salary is. There is even a 'Life's Unexpected Card' that may be handed to you and you must then adjust your dollar budget to make you budget balance out.

There were volunteers from both Floydada and Lockney com-

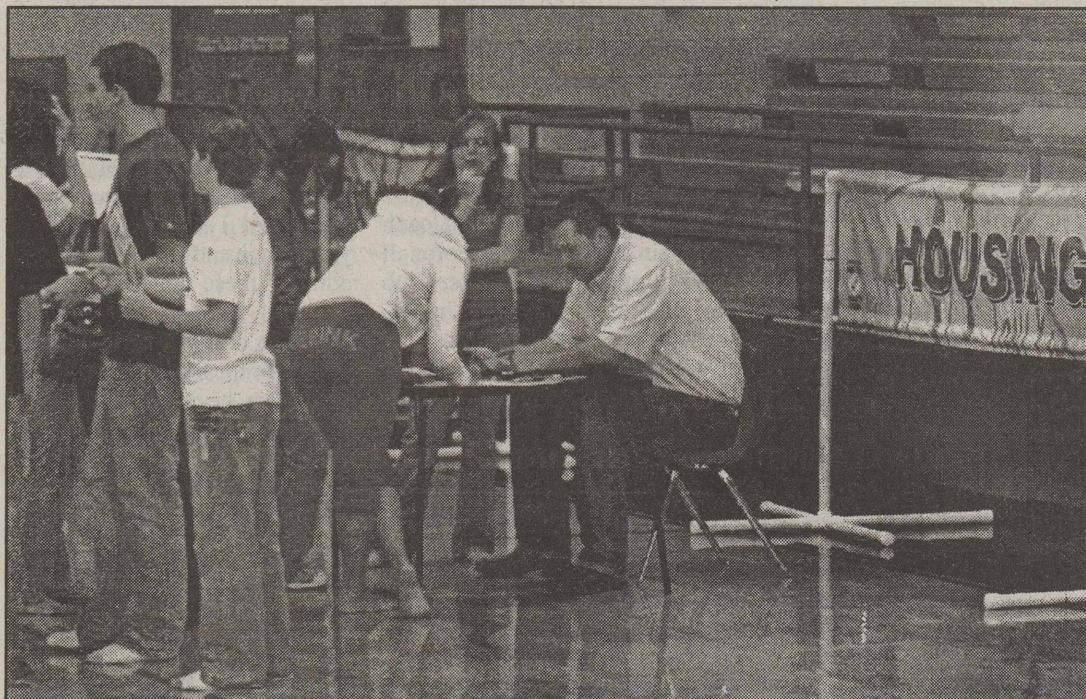
munities, who were stationed at the different 'purchasing tables', such as for food, clothing, etc. They helped the students keep their 'finance books balanced.'

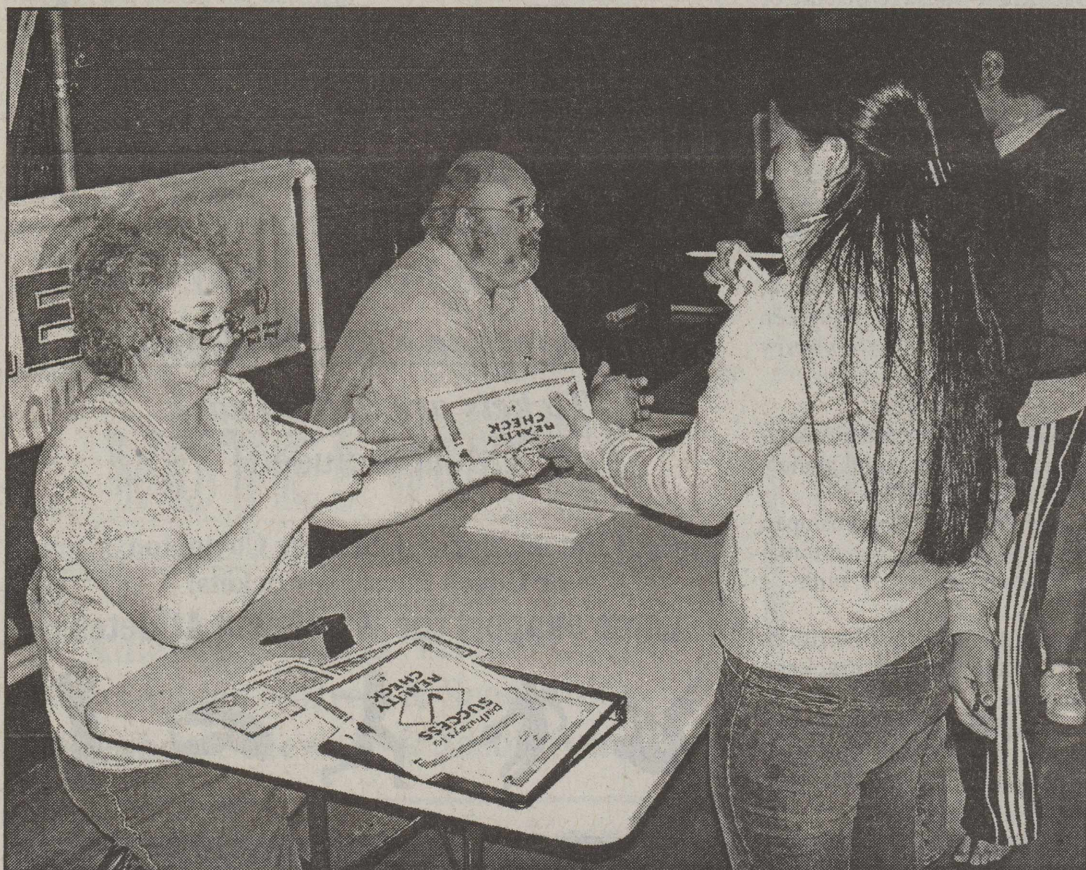

Lighthouse Electric holds annual meeting

Lighthouse Electric Cooperative members voted to return three incumbents, Gaylord Groce, Scott Graham, and W.D. "Sandy" Thornberry, to three year terms on the board of directors at the cooperative's 68th annual meeting on April 26.

The day's activities began with a health fair featuring informational booths manned by volunteers from the American Heart Association and American Cancer Society, and health and wellness screening sites staffed by area health care providers including Doctors Webb and Webb-Optometrists, University Medical Center, Calvert Home Health, Accolade Home Health, and Angela Ragland, Massage Therapist.

The pre-meeting meal, catered by Danny's Fins & Hens, was followed by a dance number performed by Sherry Fogerson's dance troupe, a group of area youngsters who will compete at the national contest in San Antonio later this year. A video tribute to "Texas Heroes", active duty military members who are employees or family members of employees of electric cooperatives in Texas, was shown just prior to the Posting of the Colors by Boy Scout Troop 357 of Floydada. Blanca Suarez, daughter of Lighthouse employee Jaime Suarez, sang the National Anthem.

Lighthouse president Don Bean called the business meeting to order. After the invocation by MC Mark Hegi, board secretary/

treasurer Gaylord Groce introduced special guests in attendance. Mark then conducted the first of three prize drawings, followed by the secretary's roll call, reading of minutes, and notice of meeting. Lighthouse attorney Harry Jung presented the nominating committee report and conducted the director elections.

After the audit report, Golden Spread Electric Cooperative general manager Bob Bryant reported on the activities of Lighthouse's wholesale power supply cooperative. He listed several things he termed as signs of a storm brewing in the electric industry in our area, including the increasingly urgent need for new transmission capacity. He explained that new transmission lines are needed for reliability to keep our lights on and to harvest the wind resources in the region.

Lighthouse General Manager Bill Harbin told the audience that this was the 20th time he had stood before them as general manager. He told the crowd that as he addressed the regional meeting of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association in St. Louis last fall, someone had asked him how Lighthouse got its name, since it obviously is nowhere near the coast. He explained to them how in 1953 the directors of the then Floyd County Rural Electric Cooperative decided they needed another name for the co-op since they had by then expanded to serve in five counties. A contest was held, soliciting suggested names from members, and a member from rural Floyd County

won the contest with the suggested name Lighthouse. She explained on her entry, "This wonderful electricity lights up our home at night like a lighthouse on the plains."

Harbin paid tribute to his co-workers, the employees of Lighthouse Electric Co-op, for their efforts in assisting Rita Blanca Electric Cooperative of Dalhart after an ice storm hit their system January 1, their work in the past to help the people in Louisiana and East Texas after hurricanes Katrina and Rita, and their help to Lamb County Electric Cooperative in restoring power after the recent tornado near Olton. He also praised them for their efforts in restoring power to the Lighthouse system after the ice storm in mid-January which destroyed over 300 poles, 500 cross arms, and "miles and miles of line". Harbin also expressed the cooperative's thanks to others who helped with the storm restoration, including members, contract crews, Lamb County Electric Cooperative crews, the City of Floydada, and others who offered their help, their encouragement, and their prayers.

The oldest and youngest members present were recognized during the meeting. The oldest member present was W.B. Tilson, 94, of Plainview, and the youngest member present was Steven Walker, 21, of Crosbyton. More than 50 door prizes were awarded throughout the meeting. Lucky members Mr. & Mrs. Harold Bertrand of Floydada won the \$500 grand prize.

Any allusions that the farm bill process hadn't shifted into a higher gear were quickly swept away by this week's hearing schedules for the House and Senate Agriculture Committees should eliminate any remaining doubt.

During the week the Senate Agriculture Committee completed the last two in a series of three hearings held under the theme "Economic Challenges and Opportunities Facing American Agricultural Producers Today." The House Agriculture Committee was equally as busy holding a pair of Subcommittee hearings this week as well.

During the week, the cotton industry was represented on witness panels before both the House and Senate. In terms of providing industry-wide testimony however, only National Cotton Council Chairman John Pucheu's testimony to the Senate panel could be labeled as an industry statement.

The House Ag Committee's General Farm Commodities and Risk Management Subcommittee hearing on April 25 included participation from Joseph Nicosia, Second Vice President of the American Cotton Shippers' Association. Nicosia's testimony presented a set of ACSA farm policy recommendations to the panel that primarily address marketing loan performance issues following the elimination of the Step 2 program.

As a whole the cotton industry, through the National Cotton Council policy development process, is working to develop a unified position on all of the issues addressed in the ACSA testimony. ACSA's testimony does not currently reflect the views of either the American Cotton Producers (ACP) or the NCC.

In regard to possible changes or enhancements to the cotton loan program, ACP representatives continue to work on a set of policy recommendations that can be forwarded to the NCC's Farm Program and Economic Policy Development Committee for consideration. From there a unified recommendation would be developed and submitted to the NCC Board of Directors for approval.

The industry has already established a number of key policy stances which Pucheu, a cotton producer from Tranquility, California, communicated to the Senate Agriculture Committee. Pucheu presented similar testimony to the House Ag Committee's General Farm Commodities and Risk Management Subcommittee at a hearing held March 28, 2007.

•Top cotton industry recommendations presented by Pucheu to both the House and Senate panels included:

•Patterning the 2007 Farm Bill after the highly successful 2002 Farm Bill, including continuation of the Direct and Counter-cyclical Payment Programs and the Marketing Loan Program.

•Oppose any effort to further

reduce payment limitation levels or impose more restrictive producer eligibility rules.

•Maintain planting flexibility.

•Encourage consideration of legislative adjustments to the cotton marketing loan program, in consultation with the cotton industry, to restore the effectiveness of the program.

During his testimony before the House's General Farm Commodities Subcommittee ACSA's Nicosia, who is CEO of Allenberg Cotton Company in Memphis, TN, boiled the merchant segment's recommendations down to several key points, several of which he pointed out were still the subject of ongoing discussions within the cotton industry.

ACSA's recommendations included:

•Maintaining the marketing loan and the use of generic certificates to facilitate moving cotton from the loan.

•Oppose efforts to establish more restrictive payment limitation or means testing regulations.

Retain current cotton loan program provisions including establishment of base quality as a Color 41 Leaf 4 Staple 34, use of generic certificates, and forgiveness of all or part of applicable storage and interest charges when the Adjusted World Price (AWP) is below the loan redemption amount.

Modify current cotton loan program through determination price support loan rate on a percentage of a five-year Olympic average price, modification of the loan premium and discount discovery mechanism, allowing holders of CCC 605 Designation of Agent forms to ship cotton prior to loan redemption, allow producers that forego loan to fix LDP payment amount in any week within ten months of module formation, elimination of location differentials and changing loan terms to FOB Car/Truck.

In his testimony Nicosia noted that several industry segments, including producers, do not agree with many of the specific recommendations put forward by ACSA.

Plains Cotton Growers and producer leaders from across the country continue to work through regional produced organizations and the ACP to resolve those differences.

The goal, as always, is to provide a unified industry message on these extremely important issues.

HPWD issues 2007 Depth to Water Survey results; maps available at: www.hpwd.com

Annual depth-to-water level measurements made in early 2007 by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 show an average decrease of -1.01 feet in the groundwater levels of the Ogallala aquifer during 2006 within the district's 6.8 million acre service area. As a comparison, the 2006 depth-to-water level measurements had indicated an average decrease of -0.54 of a foot during 2005.

The district 10-year average annual change decreased from

0.84 of a foot for the 2006 report to -0.77 of a foot for the current report. The district five-year average annual change increased from -0.58 of a foot for the 2006 report to -0.63 of a foot for the current report.

High Plains Water District officials were concerned that the 2007 depth-to-water level measurements would reveal a greater decline in groundwater levels as a result of drought conditions occurring in 2006.

"Initially, Water District staff thought that there could be a greater decline in the average annual change in groundwater levels due to the rainfall patterns over much of the district during the 2006 growing season," stated District Manager Jim Conkwright.

Depth-to-water level measurements are normally made during January to March each year to allow stabilization of water levels in the aquifer following pumpage during the previous year of groundwater production. The district maintains a network of 1,205 privately-owned observation wells.

The April issue of the High Plains Water District's newsletter, The Cross Section, will feature the results of the annual 2007 depth-to-water level measurements. It contains individual county maps, which provide the approximate location of each well in the district's observation well network. Each map is accompanied by available 1997, 2002, and 2007 depth-to-water level measurements for individual wells in that county. Also listed are available total changes in water levels for each observation well for the periods 1997 to 2007, 2002 to 2007, and 2006 to 2007.

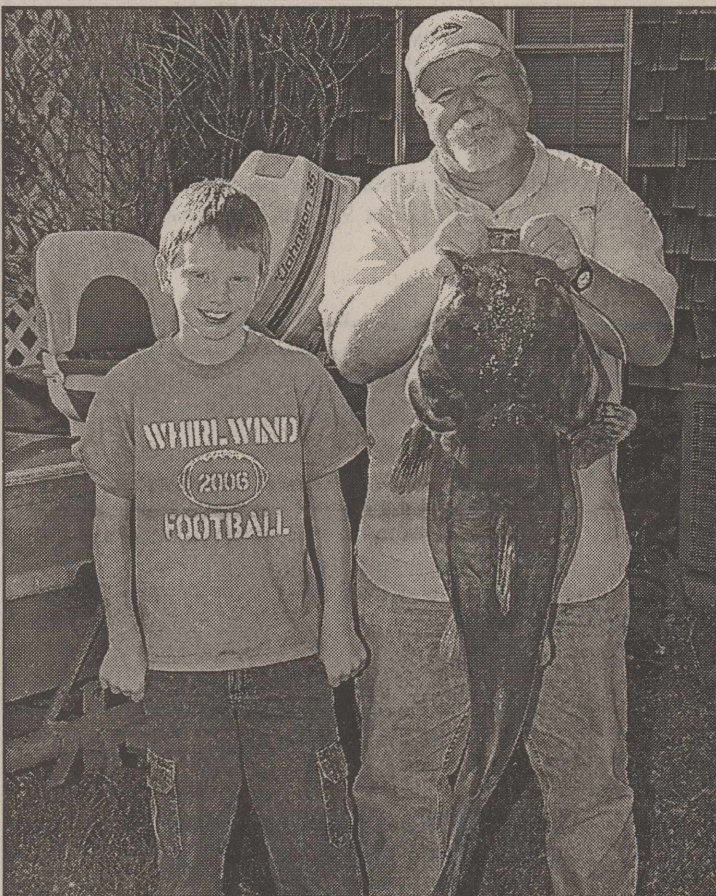

A study of personalities-- the perfectionist and the helper

Our country and our leaders need your prayers

The individual with a personality of a Perfectionist is one who learned to behave properly. They were "good little boys/girls" in the eyes of others. They learned to take on responsibility. They may remember being painfully criticized for mistakes and they learned to deny themselves pleasure.

They are preoccupied with "should" and "what must be done." The Perfectionist has an internal critic or judge, which they really struggle with when they have feelings that are "bad" (not correct). There is one ultimately correct solution for every situation and they may develop resentment for those who appear to be breaking the rules without remorse.

The Perfectionist personality type will admit anger when certain it is correct. Anger is usually expressed through a "righteous cause" and usually they are unaware of the anger. Relaxation and fun comes after everything is in order. They may have two lives - one around family and friends and another life where they are unknown.

The Perfectionist can be the most patient and constructive people when it comes to mending a mistake once they or others can admit one has been made. They are usually out of touch with what they really want but in touch with what they believe should be done.

In an intimate relationship their deepest need is to feel loved though "imperfect." They approach intimacy with the belief pleasure must be earned. Once they see the good in someone, they can hang in there with them in hopes of restoring the "good" traits of that person. They are very responsive to people who are willing to admit their mistakes.

In authority relationships they want guidelines so they will know what is precisely expected. They prefer a predictable structure and rules. They are reluctant to go first in "at-risk" situations. Bad environments are:
Jobs that require risk of error and interactions that require acceptance of other view points.

It is wise for Perfectionists to be aware of:

The need to recognize and act on real needs.

A sense of two selves may emerge - one punitive, one playful.

Tying up time so there is none

left for pleasure.
Overcomplicating simple things to delay a final commitment.

The need to find fault; assigning blame.

Intolerance of multiple points of view.

Next week's column will focus on the "Giver" Personality Type. If you missed last week's introductory article for this series, refer back to it.

This type of personality can also be called a "helper." They approach people as if asking the question, "Will I be liked?" They have a marked need for affection and approval. They want to be loved, be protected and to feel important in other people's lives.

These were children who earned love and security by meeting other people's needs. They learned they were loved for be-

ing pleasing. The Giver has excellent personal radar to detect moods and preferences of others and they adapt their feelings accordingly. The problem with this is they may feel confusion due to the many "selves" they present and the Giver runs the risk of losing touch with their authentic feelings.

In relationships, the first part is dominated by the Giver living to flatter the partner's needs. The latter part of the relationship is dominated by the feeling of being controlled by the partner. Therefore, they may have a desire to be free. The relationship may be off balance with the Giver doing more giving than getting.

They can become very valuable to people in power. They get their own desires met through people who can make these desires materialize. They are at-

tached to power. They can place themselves in strategic position of a leader's operation and can spot potentially powerful people. They will not admit to needing anything of powerful people but are very demanding of their presence and advice. What they give they want in return. If they remember a birthday, they want their birthday remembered in return.

A Giver can have a seductive manner. In intimate relationships they focus on getting a response more than on their own self-disclosure. They tend to go for someone slightly out of reach or difficult to meet. Challenge seems to be the key word.

A Giver personality should be aware of: Confusion between the several selves; Fears of having fooled others into being friends; The belief that gaining approval

is equal to gaining love; Attraction to difficult relationships and going after the hard to get; and Forestalling real intimacy.



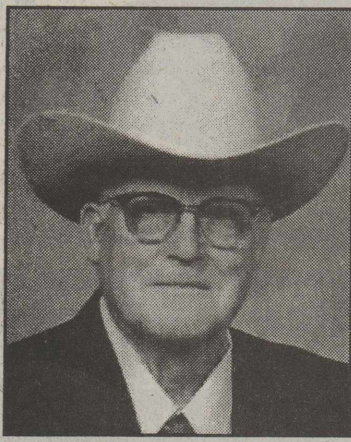

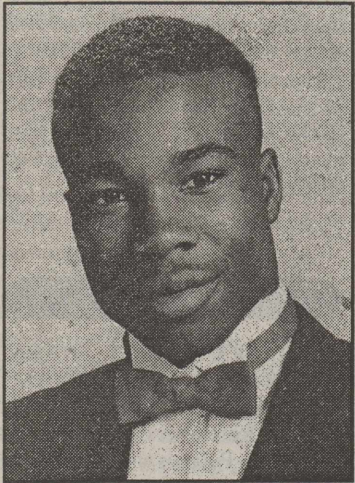
