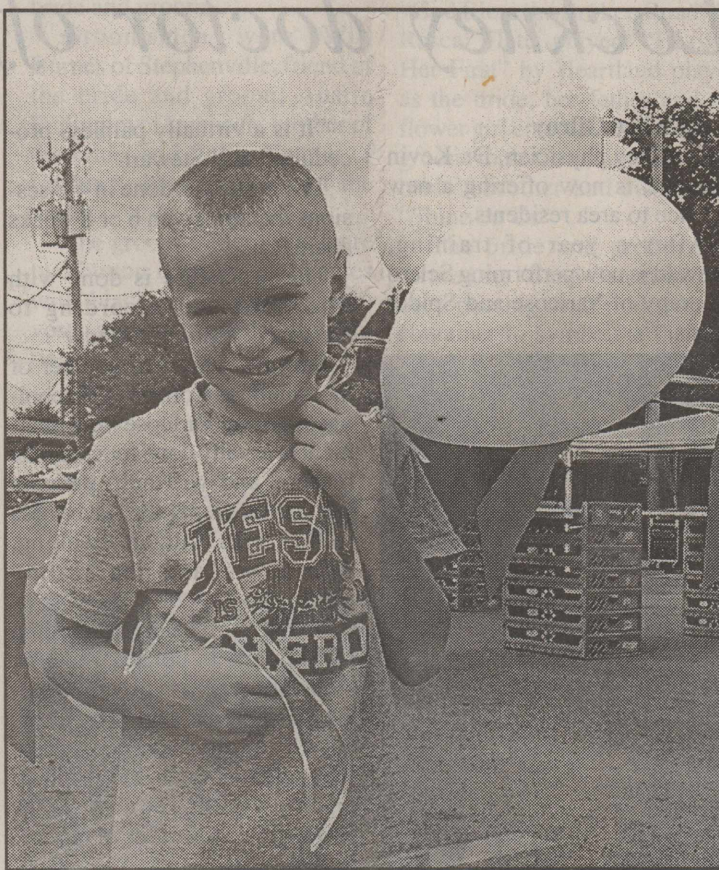

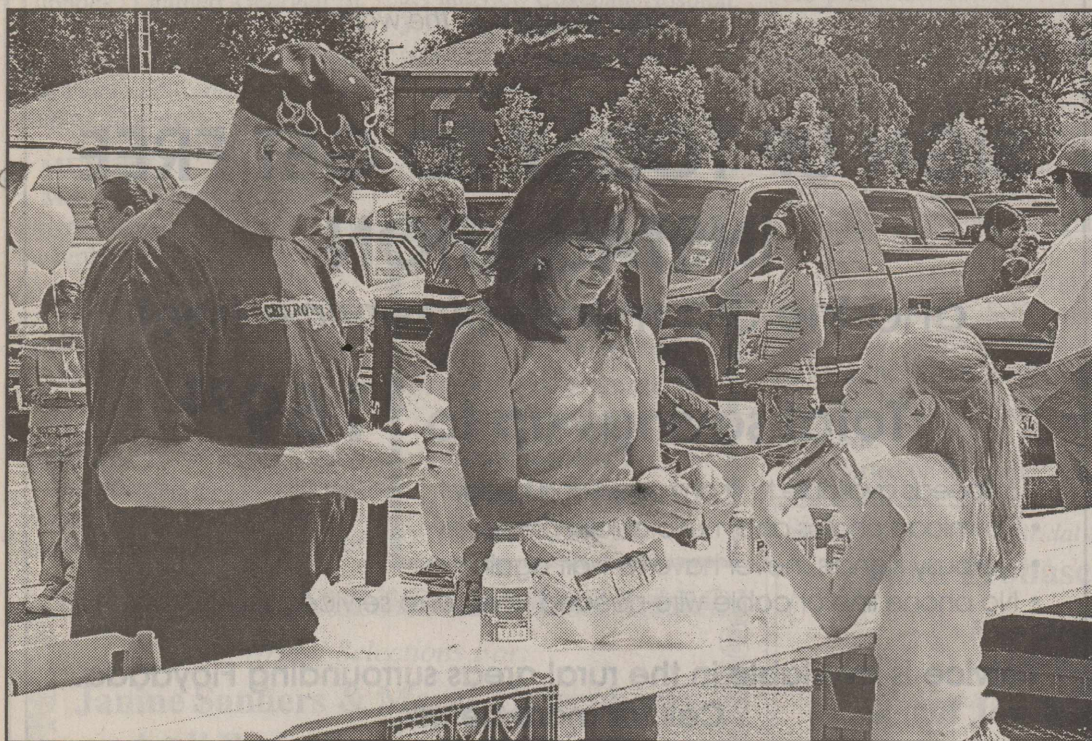

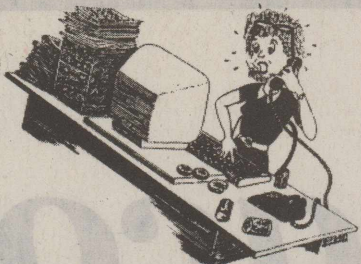

Last week I was eating lunch at the Lions Club and enjoying the company of my fellow Lions, including Lion Bill Harbin.

Bill overheard me complaining that my gravy never turns out the same. Well, actually I guess if you consider that it is almost always bad--that would be "the same".

I told everybody that my husband says my gravy could be used to fill pot holes in Houston.

David True piped up and said, "Why don't you use a sure thing and get those packaged gravies that you just add water too?"

I told him I had tried but I thought those packages lacked a certain "zing".

Bill chimed in about now and offered to send his gravy recipe. He assured me that it was fool proof and easy to follow.

That's just what I needed. I was so excited. True to his word he went straight back to work and emailed it to me.

Here it is for all of you who have the same trouble as I do making good gravy! I'm sure you'll all be as excited as I was to get it!

(Bill said you will probably want to keep these detailed instructions).

### Uncle Bill's Cowboy Gravy

**Ingredients:** mess of quail, lard or vegetable (cottonseed) oil, flour, salt, pepper and milk or water.

**Instructions:** Fry up mess of quail (breaded in flour) in an experienced black iron skillet in lard or oil. Pour off some of the oil but leave just enough with the crumbles from the quail. Put in

some flour with your skillet real hot. Put in some salt and pepper and stir until it is scorched a little bit. By now you should have sort of a paste. If it is too thick you may want to add a little more of the drippings (you should have kept them) or if it is too thin maybe add just a little more flour (or maybe not.) Now add milk or water. (I prefer milk.) If it doesn't go, "Shhhhh..!" your skillet was not hot enough. Keep stirring while the milk is boiling. Now this is the tricky part. The gravy will get thicker as it cooks but you don't want it to get too thick but you want to cook it long enough for it to be gravy and not just milk with flour in it. So if it gets too thick too quick you just add a little milk, but if it doesn't get thick enough, you maybe add a little flour (or maybe not) and you probably will want to add some more salt unless it is already too salty. Take it off the fire at just the right time. It will also get thicker as it cools down. Add more pepper if you want to. Its easy. Makes about 2 to 40 servings unless it is not fit to eat in which case you will want to feed it to the dogs but sometimes they won't eat it either. (Sometimes it's real good!)

Bill attached a note to his gravy recipe. He said he thought he should probably join a recipe club.

# New highway named after Craig Gilly

The Floyd County Commissioners met Tuesday, July 9, and approved honoring Craig Gilly with a county road name change, and heard from two members of the Floyd County 4-H Livestock Judging Team. The team placed 2nd in the State 4-H contest.

County resident Clar Schacht addressed the court with a proposal to declare FM 689, located in the northeast part of the county, to also read 'Craig Gilly Memorial Highway.'

Schacht told the commissioners, "The two signs, at each end of the highway, will be on private property and will cost \$120

each."

The commissioners voted unanimously to honor former Commissioner Gilly in this manner.

Two members of the 2007 Floyd County 4-H Livestock Judging Team, Senee' Foster and Segayle Foster, were presented to the court by County Extension Agent J. D. Ragland. Other members of the winning team, not present, were Brady Ragland and Brazos Williams. The team won 2nd Place, competing against 36 teams, at the State Contest in College Station on June 8th.

Ragland told the court, "I am very proud of this 4-H Livestock

Judging Team. They trained for this competition late at night and on weekends, in order to achieve this success. I had told them they must be committed to take time to train for this competition. It is not like sports, where you must be the fastest or the tallest, but you must train for it."

Segayle Foster told the court, "We owe 'Our Journey To Success' to our coach, J.D. Ragland. This was our goal - to win. We lost first place by only 2 points."

Senee' Foster said, "We won the District competition with our 'reasons'. We were down by 20 points before the 'reasons' part, and following 'reasons', we won

by one point. We had 9 contests this year before we went to state."

In a related matter, County Extension Agent Melissa Long told the commissioners, "Brady Ragland was elected 4-H District Council President. Brady will attend the State 4-H Council Workshop in Brownwood on July 16-19."

According to Long, the Walk Across Texas ended with 13,333 miles walked by 9 teams. A celebration of the event will be held July 19 at the Extension Office meeting room.

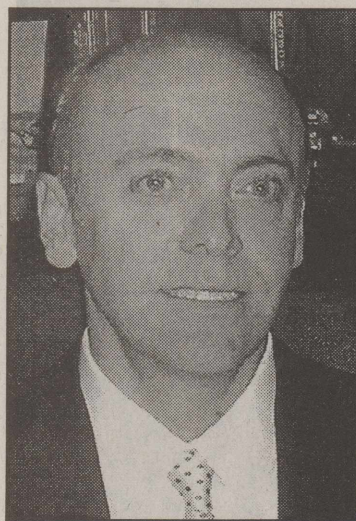

# Lockney doctor offering new service

Lockney physician, Dr. Kevin Stewart, is now offering a new service to area residents.

After a year of training, Stewart is now performing Sclero Therapy of Varicose and Spider veins.

"It is a virtually painless procedure," said Stewart.

The therapy is done in 4-8 sessions that are given 6 or 8 weeks apart.

The procedure is done with injections and according to Stewart is "patient friendly".

Stewart, who is a member of the American College of Phlebology, says the Varicose Vein treatment is usually done for cosmetic reasons and will help patients who suffer from pain, heaviness in their legs, fatigue, swelling, skin ulcers, and non healing sores.

The Sclero Therapy, according to Stewart, is considered low technology for small vein problems and is not covered by insurance. "The more serious cases of leaky valves from the groin to ankle would require laser therapy, which I offer in clinic," said Stewart.

"Insurance usually covers Laser surgery because it is looked at as more medical than cosmetic" said Stewart.

Stewart says the laser treatments are much more patient friendly than in years past.

"The laser is non surgical and

done as an out-patient procedure," said Stewart. "There is minimal discomfort and the patient is walking the same day. This technology has only been around for the last 5 years and I can offer this treatment too."

"Before the laser method surgeons would operate on you and dissect the area in your groin. It was very painful and involved hospital stays and took 2-3 days to walk again.

"Also, sonograms now pin-

point the vein causing the problem."

Stewart says treating spider veins early could prevent them from getting worse.

Although cosmetic reasons may not be covered by insurance, Stewart says his prices are reasonable and are priced per session, or per bundles of sessions.

"In fact," said Stewart, "if you mention reading this article you'll get a free consultation."

Travel arrangements are being finalized and commodity groups are working out strategies to ensure their interests are protected and their ideas fully debated during the House Agriculture Committee's planned July 17 mark-up session to finalize its version of the 2007 Farm Bill from what is now a hodge-podge of individual legislative titles.

By the end of what is scheduled to be a three day session ending July 19, HAC Chairman Collin Peterson plans to have a rock-solid recommendation for the 2007 farm Bill ready to go to the House floor where debate could begin as early as July 26.

Plains Cotton Growers leaders are readying themselves for both debates and have already hit the ground running. In addition to the organization's July 11 Board of Directors meeting that will be an important source of guidance heading into the HAC mark-up July 17, PCG leaders are continually discussing issues with the National Cotton Council, other cotton industry groups and representatives from general farm and commodity organizations. Having those discussions now will enhance PCG's efforts to secure the continuation of the effective and predictable policies of the 2002 Farm Bill.

When it comes to policies impacting cotton, protecting the safety net provisions contained in the current Commodity Title is of primary importance says PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett. He notes that the HAC's Subcommittee on General farm Commodities and Risk Management voted unanimously to extend provisions of the current Commodity Title during deliberations late last month thanks in large part to the input of groups like PCG and the NCC.

The subcommittee's recommendation to extend the current program's structure with only a few minor tweaks was good news for High Plains cotton producers and the cotton industry in general adds Verett.

The unanimous vote to extend the provisions of the 2002 Farm Bill was also a strong signal to farm bill opponents in Congress and the Administration that U.S.

agriculture strongly supports the provisions of current farm law and that calls for significant reform do not represent the position of a majority of the agriculture sector.

Verett warns that there is still a considerable amount of work left to be done heading into the full HAC mark-up session and that a number of issues are expected to trigger additional debate and even undergo some modification. Among the top issues falling in this category are program pay limits and eligibility guidelines, two of the most misrepresented and often challenged provisions in recent farm policy debates.

It is clear that while there is no guarantee that everything will go exactly to plan, the groundwork that has been laid by PCG and others over the past few months is paying off, says Verett.

"The issues driving this debate are largely centered around the budget and there not being enough guaranteed money available to do all the things we would want to extend and improve on the current program," concludes Verett. "Through the years PCG has developed strong relationships with key leaders in Congress and their staff members which allow us to effectively communicate cotton's issues. The coming weeks are a culmination of those ongoing efforts and PCG is well positioned to represent High Plains cotton producers."

**May average cotton price plunges; increases likelihood for maximum 2006 CC Payment**

The May Average Price Re-

ceived by farmers for Upland cotton plunged 2.5 cents per pound from the previous month while the number of bales marketed during the month rose slightly to 1.55 million for the month.

Adding in these new marketing and price figures results in a lowering of the year-to-date Weighted Average Price Received to 47.39 cents per pound. Cumulative Upland cotton marketings through May 2007 total 13.406 million bales according to the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service.

The downward movement of the Average Price Received significantly increases the likelihood of the 2006 Counter-cyclical program (CCP) payment rate for Upland Cotton being 13.73 cents per pound, the maximum allowed by current law.

Only a near miraculous combination of June-July marketings in excess of 6 million bales and average prices above 60 cents could pull the Weighted Average Price Received calculation close to the 52 cent Upland cotton Base Loan rate, which is the point where the calculated CCP payment rate for cotton would begin to decline.

For cotton the 12 month Weighted Average Price will reflect price and marketings for the 2006 marketing year that began August 1, 2006 and ends July 31, 2007.

The following table shows the average price received each month by farmers and the associated weighted average price based on prices and cumulative marketings from August 1, 2006 through May 31, 2007.

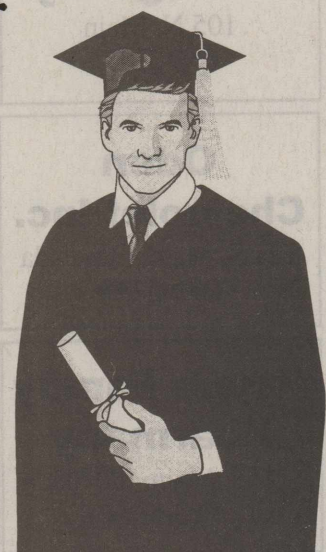
