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Hardy inducted into Hall of Fame

Longtime Floydada resident and race car builder, Don Hardy, has been selected to be inducted into the prestigious Dick Harrell Hall of Fame Center located in Sylmar, California.

The 2007 induction ceremony will be held this year at the Forge Invitational Muscle Car Show at the new Convention Center in Sevierville, Tennessee on October 26.

Hardy was chosen, as one of five inductees, from hundreds of Drag Racings finest nominees. He will be presented with a Dick Harrell Hall of Fame race jacket during the ceremonies.

Hardy already has two other Hall of Fame awards to his credit. In 1980 Hardy was inducted into the Division 4 NHRA (National Hot Rod Association) Hall of Fame and in 2001 he was inducted into the Texas Drag Racers Hall of Fame.

Hardy told the Hesperian-Beacon, "In 1965 I started building 'funny cars' for race car driver, Dick Harrell. I built cars for him until 1972, when he was killed in a racing accident.

"The 1965 the 'funny car' was

one of my innovations for racing and I was in on their (national) certifications, flip tops, tubing sizes and weights. I won the 'Car Craft Chassis Builder of the Year' award four years in a row from 1977 to 1981," Hardy said.

Hardy stopped building race cars in 1984. He now specializes in irrigation engines and bio-gas engines being shipped to the Philippines.

He moved to West Texas from Oklahoma with his parents in 1957 and attended school in Olton, where his parents were teachers. He met coach Kelley Chadwick of Floydada. "With Kelley as the driver and me as the builder, we won the 1962 NHRA Division IV Race Car Championship in the B/Gas category with a 1932 Ford," Hardy said.

Hardy was one of the first to use torque converters to control the stall speed on his race cars. This gave him a big advantage over the other cars. "His chassis design was ahead of its time and was greater than the horsepower available," said Ro McGonegal of Hot Rod Magazine.

Hardy served in the Army from 1962 to 1965. Following his

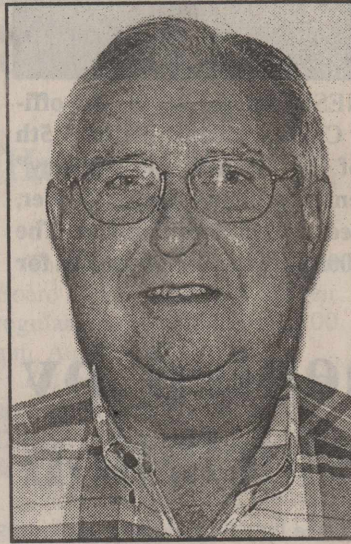
armed service term in 1965, he opened his shop in Floydada and began building race cars full-time. Hardy averaged building from 10 to 20 cars per year, which included a rolling chassis and body reproduction from Fiberglass Limited out of Chicago.

Hardy told Hot Rod Magazine, concerning his Floydada shop, "The best years were 1970 to 1973. We did a crazy amount of mail business (from his own mail order catalog), and it told me that we could stay and make it work. I had 14 employees then, and that was a lot of people."

"In 1968, with Kelley as the driver, we raced cars in 33 states with the Coca-Cola Cavalcade of Sports," Hardy told the Hesperian-Beacon.

Hardy and his son, Donald, together completely rebuilt a 1957 two door Oldsmobile about six years ago. They completely rebuilt the engine and replaced the carburetor with an award winning fuel injected, self-invented, super charger on top of the engine and lowered the re-conditioned body.

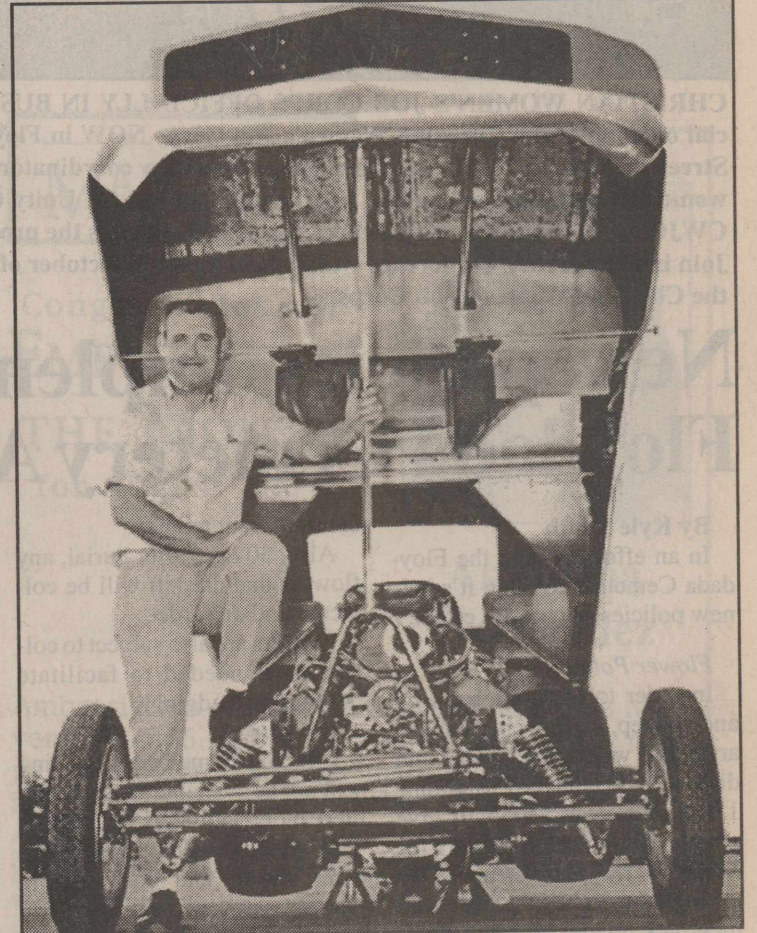
Hardy said, "A man at our first car show with the Olds made us



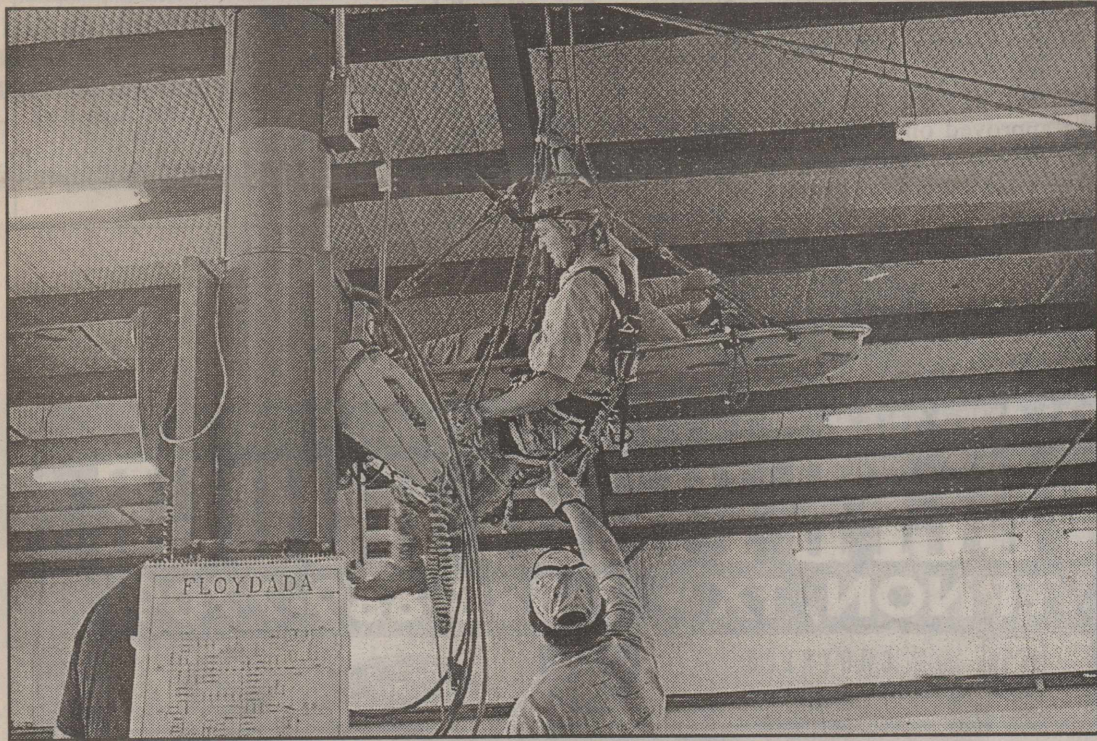

an offer to buy the car. We both said, no. Five years later, the same man, after having a heart attack and recovery, called us and again made another offer, which we took."

Don and wife, Carolyn, live in Floydada. They have three children, Erin Wilson of Lockney, Donald Hardy and Dedra Thomas, both of Floydada; 7 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren.

Future looks good for local pumpkin and cotton production

Floyd County Extension Agent J. D. Ragland reported to the County Commissioners Court Monday morning, August 13, and said, "Ag wise, our cotton crop in the county this year is looking really good. We had some good rains this year. Last year at this same time we had received 6 inches of rain compared to 24 inches received in the county this year.

"However, this year we are lacking heat units, which is soil and air temperatures. As of last Friday, we were 740 heat units behind last year, but last year we had less rain and too many heat units. We are probably still

around 500 heat units behind and heat units are very important for cotton growth and development.

"Our cotton crop is probably running behind (schedule) right now by about two to three weeks. However, heat units can be added up real fast with some hot weather. The crop can gain about 30 to 34 heat units per day in real hot sunny weather of about 95 degrees. In cloudy weather, cotton gains only around 10 to 12 heat units.

An early freeze this year would be devastating to Floyd County's cotton crop, according to Ragland.

Ragland added, "We are finding some weeds and grasses that

are beginning to be resistant to Roundup. I would recommend the rotation of crops so the Roundup will work better. Mares Tail is one of the weeds that seems to be resistant to Roundup, but it hasn't been scientifically proven yet," Ragland said.

"The pumpkin crop in Floyd County is the best ever, according to producer Hulon Carthel. According to Carthel, the pumpkin vines are loaded up. The rains and cool temperatures have really helped. Our 750 pumpkin acres are down from the 2000 acres planted in the beginning of our planting pumpkins in the county. We planted 900 acres last year," Ragland concluded.

New leash law will soon be in place for City of Floydada

The City of Floydada has implemented a new leash law prohibiting extended periods of restraint for dogs.

The new law states, "An owner may not leave a dog outside and unattended by use of a restraint that unreasonably limits the dog's movement between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m., or within 500 feet of a school."

The law also states you cannot restrain your dog outside in extreme weather conditions, including conditions in which the actual outdoor temperature is below 32 degrees, or the area is under a heat advisory, or a tornado warning has been issued.

The restraint cannot be a collar that is pinch-type, prong-type, or choke-type, or not properly fitted to the dog.

The restraint cannot be shorter than five times the length of the dog or 10 feet (whichever length is greater).

The restraint cannot cause injury to the dog or be considered in an unsafe condition.

Exceptions include: training the dog in an activity pursuant to a license issued by the state; restrained by owner while engaged in conduct related to shepherding or herding livestock.

Other exemptions include being restrained by a running line,

pulley, or trolley system, if not restrained by an "illegal" collar (as mentioned above); or being restrained in a "camping" or "recreational" area; or having to be restrained for the owner to complete a temporary task and does not exceed 3 hours in a 24 hour period.

Failure to comply is a Class C misdemeanor. A subsequent offense would be a Class B. Also multiple dogs would each be a separate offense.

The law, which becomes effective September 1, 2007, does not prohibit a person from walking a dog with a hand held leash.

New policies implemented by Floydada Cemetery Association

In an effort to keep the Floydada Cemetery looking it's best new policies are now in effect.

Flower Policy:

In order to facilitate mowing and upkeep, all flowers (real and artificial) will be picked up and discarded on January 15 and June 15 of each year. This will give people time to place flowers for Memorial Day and Veteran's Day through the end of the year, and then pick up any artificial flow-

ers they want to keep.

Also, 30 days after burial, any flowers that are left will be collected and discarded.

Flowers are also subject to collection if needed to facilitate mowing and edging.

Curbing:

Effective immediately, curbing will not be available around cemetery plots (individual or family). This creates obstructions for the riding mower and requires more edging. Any family agreeable to having their curbing removed,

please let a board member know as it would be appreciated.

Pricing:

Also effective immediately, the price of the cemetery plots will rise from \$100 each to \$200 each. Payment for any plot or plots is to be made when the plots are chosen, otherwise, they are considered available for someone else until paid for.

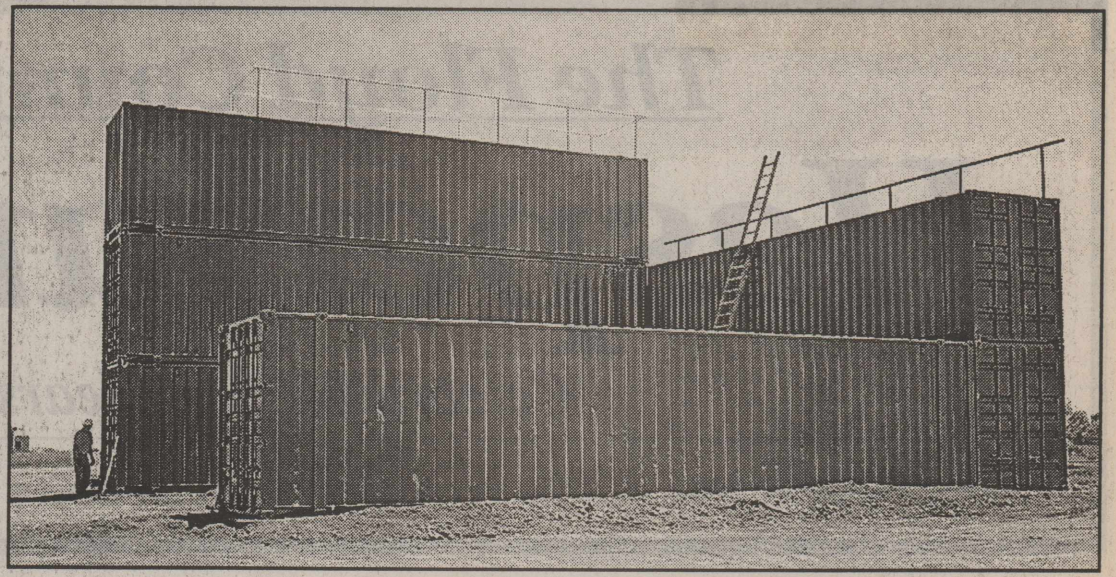

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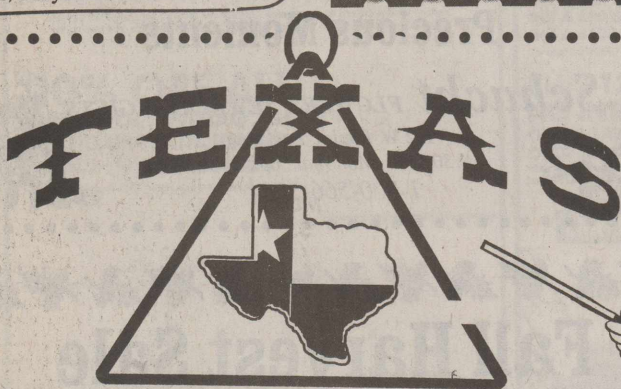
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Gillespie and Rainwater exchange vows

The groom's cake was in the form of a John Deere tractor. His table also featured a chocolate fountain.

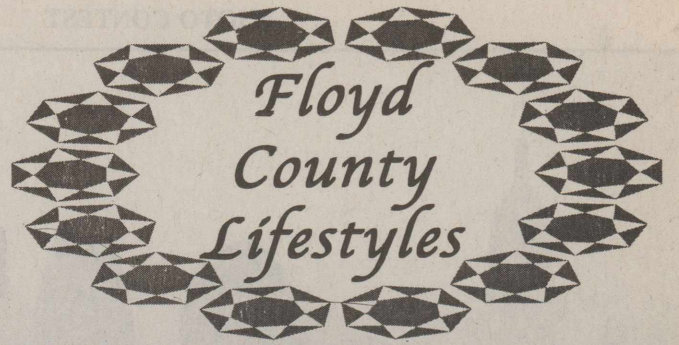
The bride is a graduate of Motley County High School and Angelo State University. She is currently employed by Floydada ISD.

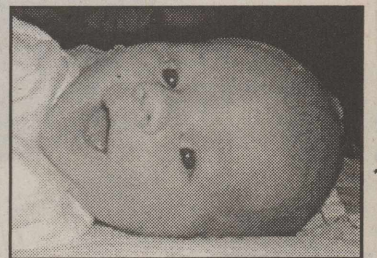

Britnee Kay Brotherton, a graduate of Floydada High School, has been awarded a scholarship by the Texas Interscholastic League Foundation.

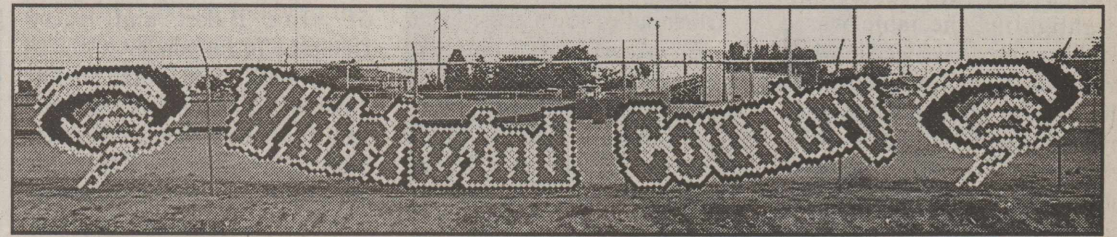

awarded to a student who plans to major in nursing. She plans to attend Texas A&M University-College station and major in agricultural communications and journalism.

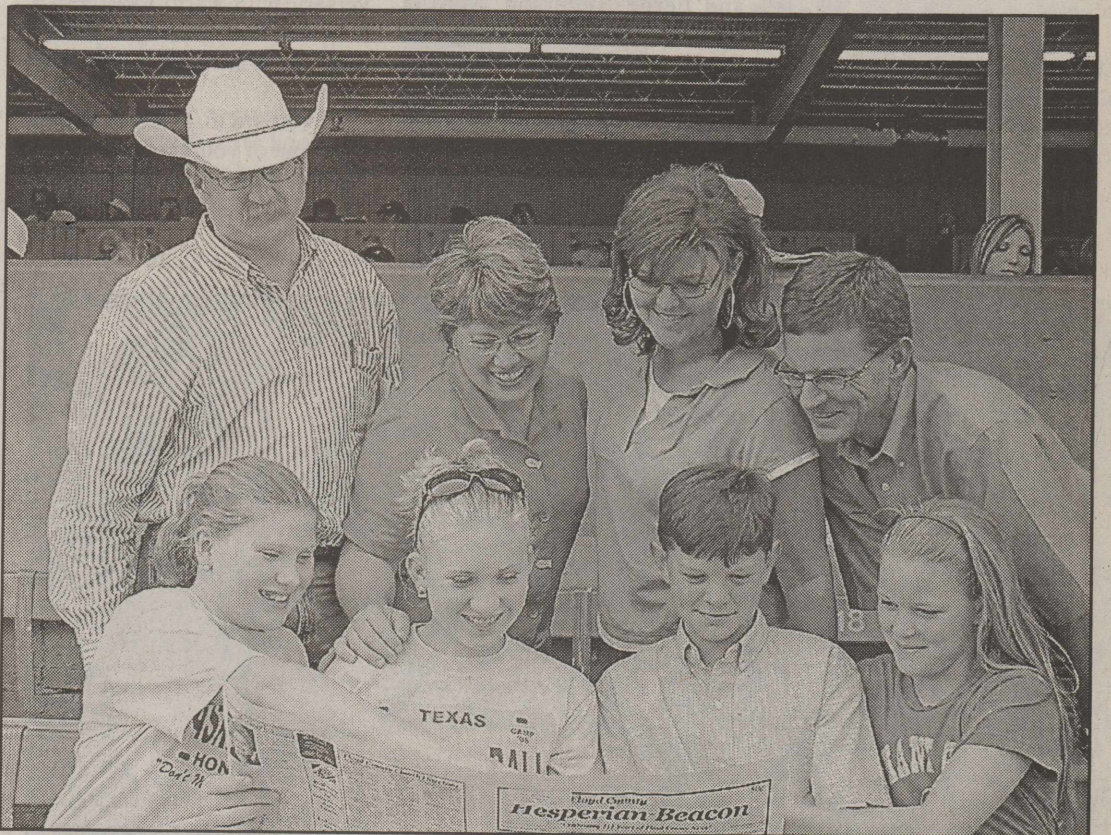

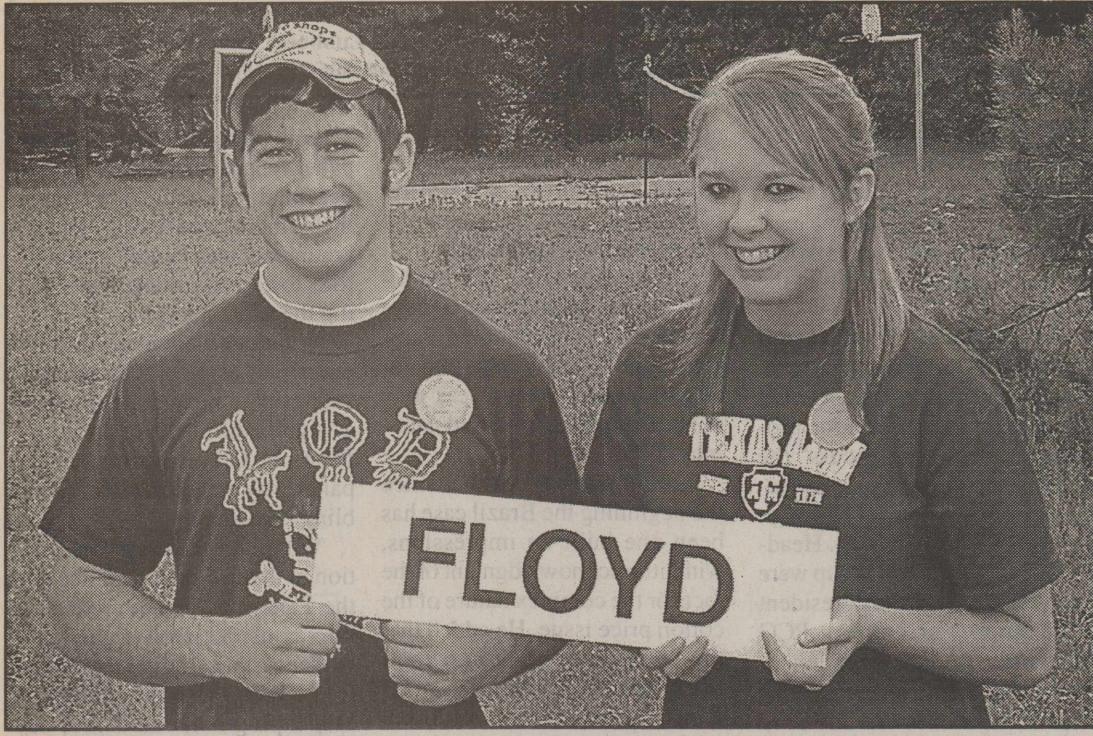

Texas A&M University Crop and Ag Report Local Conditions

COLLEGE STATION—In many cases, high temperatures across the state are just what producers ordered, reported area Texas Cooperative Extension officials.

Many areas have been extremely wet and needed the dry-down to promote growth in the cotton and forage crops, Extension agents reported. Some grasses are stressing in the high temperatures, but overall crop production is benefiting from the summer warm-up that finally arrived.

The following condition reports are from Extension officials:

PANHANDLE: Temperatures were above average all week with 100 degree plus (F) reported on several days over much of the area. Isolated thunderstorms brought some moisture, but most of the region received no rain. Soil moisture is rated very short to adequate with most areas reporting short to adequate. Corn is rated fair to excellent with most areas reporting good. Much of the crop is entering the dent stage. Irrigation remains heavy. Spider mites are on the increase and corn borers continue to be very active. Cotton is rated mostly fair with much of the crop setting bolls. Cotton aphids continue to increase. Peanuts are rated mostly good with no pest problems. Soybeans are rated mostly good with no pest problems. Range grasses continue to dry out from the lack of rain and hot temperatures. Cattle are in excellent condition.

SOUTH PLAINS: Weather has been hot and dry this week with highs reaching in the mid to upper 90s F. Corn is in good to excellent condition and is currently being harvested for ensilage. The harvest should be in full swing by the middle of next week. Cotton is in fair to good condition and progressing well with warmer weather. Irrigation continues on cotton. Grain sorghum is in good condition, but will need an open fall to reach maturity because of a late start with planting. Peanuts continue to be in good condition. Pumpkins are doing well, with harvest expected around mid- to late-September. Pastures and ranges are in good condition. There is some drying of pastures due to heat, but quantity is mostly good. Cattle are in good to excellent condition.

ROLLING PLAINS: Temperatures have been in the 100s F this week. The cotton crop definitely needed this warmer weather. Pastures are still looking good and green, although ranchers are worried how much hot weather the grass can withstand. Livestock are in good condition. Even though the warmer weather has been good on crops and pastures, producers are ready for another rain.

NORTH: Soil moisture is adequate. Warmer temperatures and dryer conditions prevailed this past week. Summer has hit with 100-plus F temperatures. Soils are beginning to dry out. These high temperatures have stressed grasses, which have shallow root systems from drought and recent saturated soils. Hay harvest is in full swing with producers just now getting the second cut completed due to extended rain periods this spring. Despite a shortage of hay-baling equipment, the dryer conditions have helped forage producers harvest a bumper crop. The hay crop is mature, and quantity is there but not quality. An estimated one to one-and-a-half cuttings of hay were lost due to wet weather in the early summer. The corn and soybean harvests are beginning. Yield prospects soybeans, corn and grain sorghum are excellent. Sorghum harvest is getting started. Wheat has been harvested, but losses are still being added. Livestock are in good condition. Insect populations are very high. Range and pasture conditions are good to excellent. Drying time is needed.

No rain has been received for the past several days now. More rain is needed to keep grasses growing in the pastures so there will be more hay to cut.

EAST: Rainfall has stopped and conditions are extremely hot, quickly drying out the sandy soils. Pastures are in good condition and the hay harvest continues. Forage quality is low, but the next cutting is expected to have higher yields and better quality. Cattle are in good to excellent condition. Spring calves are being weaned. Blueberry and blackberry harvest is near completion. Tree diseases are an increasing problem. There are reports of fall armyworm outbreaks in hayfields. Many people are preparing their fall gardens. Weather conditions have gone from an extended spring to extremely hot temperatures with high humidity. Goats have had serious problems with internal parasites this year.

FAR WEST: Soil moisture ranges from very short to adequate, and crops and pastures are in very poor to good condition. Cotton is in poor to excellent condition. Sorghum is in good condition. Very hot temps and scattered precipitation reported across the region, with Terrell County reporting 2.17 inches of rainfall. Pecan are in good condition, with very little aphid pressure. Cotton was sprayed with growth regulators to control vegetative growth and enhance fruiting. Perennial grasses are doing well. Recent rains have complicated the melon harvest in the Cuyanosa area. Shrimp production is on schedule for an October harvest. Cotton farmers are saying the potential is there for four-bale-an-acre cotton, which could salvage some of last year's poor production. Alfalfa growers are grinning from ear to ear with stable, moderately high prices, with more hay coming off about every six weeks.

WEST CENTRAL: Temperatures reached into the upper 90s F. Soil moisture remained in good condition in most counties. Crops continue to look good. Most hay producers are cutting and baling as fast as possible. Quantity is excellent, but quality is low. Some fields are being prepared for fall planting. Corn harvest is in full swing. Cotton needs to be monitored for bugs. Bollworm egg quantity appears to be very high due to moisture. Range and pastures continue good growth. High temperatures will cause rangelands to decline rapidly. Livestock are in fair to good condition. Producers are beginning to supplement cattle with proteins.

CENTRAL: Hot, dry weather is finally allowing hay baling. Corn yields look promising. Cotton is three to four weeks behind its normal schedule. Soybeans set pods and began to dry down and desiccate. Early-planted grain sorghum showed poor yields, while fields planted later were good on both bushel weight and moisture. Producers are beginning the planning stages for winter wheat, oats and ryegrass. The heat prevented cattle from grazing during the middle of the day. Cattle remain in good shape.

SOUTHEAST: Not available.

SOUTHWEST: Hot, dry weather has prevailed since the last significant rainfall during July 28-30. The region remains green, however. Forage availability is above average for this time

of the year. The hot, dry weather and good moisture conditions continued to help cotton make good progress. Peanuts are also making good progress. The corn and sorghum harvest resumed after delays of 3 to 4 weeks. Sorghum received some market quality discounts, due to the excessive rain in July. Hay cutting and baling resumed, but a substantial amount of the early hay was lost to excessive rain. There was fruit drop in pecan orchards due to saturated soils and in susceptible varieties, due to scab disease. Early planted cabbage is struggling in the heat.

COASTAL BEND: The dry, hot weather has helped grain harvest and cotton maturation. In some areas, field crop adjusters are evaluating damage levels to determine if sorghum fields will be harvested. Cotton will be below average on yield and quality.

SOUTH: Dry, hot conditions this week in the western parts of the region caused quite a bit of corn harvesting activities. Grain sorghum harvesting was also very active this week. Fields of grain sorghum were dry enough for harvesting equipment to get into water-logged areas. Seedbed preparations or preparations for fall planting have also started in some fields in the area. Most cotton is still setting bolls, and producers are concerned harvest may not begin until late October if plant growth continues under current levels. In the mid-parts of the region, cotton defoliation continues, and the sorghum harvest has concluded. Range and pastures are in good to excellent condition. Livestock are in excellent condition.



When cotton producer leaders from across the United States gathered in St. Louis this week there was no doubt that at least some of their discussion would involve that latest news from the WTO.

A strong West Texas contingent joined their producer colleagues from across the Cotton Belt at the American Cotton Producers to "cuss and discuss" the WTO and other top issues facing the industry midway through the 2007 growing season. Heading up the West Texas group were Plains Cotton Growers President Mike Hughes of Lamesa, PCG Chairman Rickey Bearden of Plains and PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett.

National Cotton Council General Counsel William A. Gillon provided leaders from the American Cotton Producers group an in-depth report on the status of ongoing WTO issues. During his report, Gillon discussed the recent announcement by Brazil that yet another WTO panel has supported their claims of serious prejudice by the U.S. cotton program. He also provided some insight about the latest wrinkles introduced by the WTO in the case.

He began by noting that while the draft WTO report outlining the Panel's findings is supposed to remain confidential, Brazil immediately announced the fact that the Panel had upheld their claim against the U.S. Since that time U.S. trade officials have also acknowledged that the report's conclusions went against the U.S.

Gillon reported that despite the latest ruling, the timetable from this point on in the case is still a lengthy one. Among the steps remaining to be completed by the WTO include the issuance of the formal report by October 1. The final report will remain confidential until it is translated into the official languages of the WTO membership, a process that is likely to take until December 1.

After the final report is issued the U.S. will have the opportunity to file an appeal of the decision. According to Gillon, a U.S. appeal of the latest decision is expected to be filed in January or February 2008 and that the WTO appeal process would likely be complete around May 1.

Following the U.S. appeal it is expected that Brazil will announce retaliatory measures against the U.S. and that the U.S. would request an arbitration panel to calculate the amount of injury involved in the case.

Once named, the WTO arbitration panel would have 60 days to calculate the assumed damages. With so many steps remaining, it appears the process may not be completed until mid-Summer 2008.

Gillon pointed out that since the beginning the Brazil case has been one built on impressions, with little acknowledgment of the facts or the complex nature of the cotton price issue. He added that the persistence of the assumptions that drove the first WTO Panel decision in favor of Brazil appears to have been carried over in the latest finding.

Little else, according to Gillon, can explain a Panel decision that says the U.S. cotton program without Step 2 and with significantly altered export credit guarantee programs continues to cause serious prejudice to Brazil's interests.

He explained that among the facts that were apparently ignored in the recent ruling are that U.S. cotton acreage and production have both dropped significantly since the start of the U.S. compliance effort - while cotton prices, production and acreage have all increased around the world during the same period.

Gillon also noted that one significant contradiction on Brazil's part that surfaced during the hearing process, but apparently not considered by the Panel, is the fact that while Brazil was arguing that the U.S. cotton program continues to depress prices and cause them harm, Brazil was actively selling off significant amounts of its internal cotton supply to drive down cotton prices that they deemed were too high in their own country.

Gillon noted that he hopes the panel report can explain the apparent discrepancies between their findings based on Brazil's arguments and Brazil's own efforts to depress cotton prices during the same period.

Without a clear description of exactly what the U.S. program is supposed to have done to create a "significant" level of price suppression, Gillon warns that the panel may have created a troubling precedent.

Without a thorough explanation to the contrary, he notes that the Panel has apparently taken into consideration significant evidence that the U.S. program (even with the now eliminated Step 2 program) could have had no more than a 2-3 percent impact on world cotton prices.

If the observed 2-3 percent fluctuation in cotton prices is the basis for the Panel's decision it is possible that such small changes could now be considered a "significant impact" and change the way future claims are measured.

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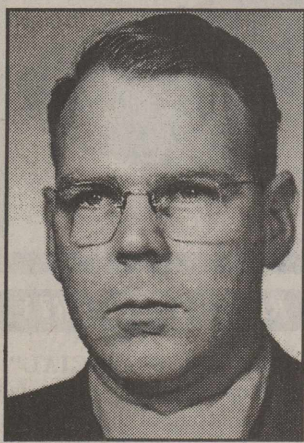
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Obituaries

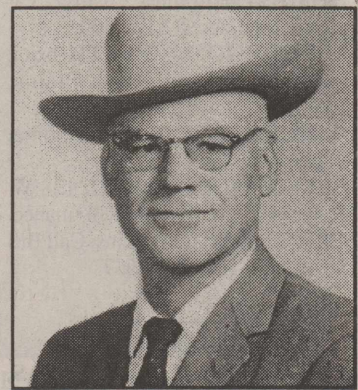
