Jurors sentence Dickens County woman to 9 years

Floyd County Jurors were called to duty, November 12 and 13 to decide an Injury to a Child case out of Dickens County. In the end, the defendant, Stephanie Louis, was sentenced to 9 years.

The offense occurred in Spur however because of pre-trial publicity and other factors enough jurors could not be found to hold a trial in Dickens. So the case was moved Floyd County's District

District Judge Bill Smith presided over the trial and the 110th District Attorney Becky McPherson argued the State's case. Attorney Mark Skelton argued for the defense.

After McPherson presented the evidence for the State (Louis did not testify) jurors retired for 25 minutes and came back with a guilty verdict and eventually with a sentence of 9 years of Injury to a Child (a 2nd degree Felony) and 2 years for Endangering a Child (a State Jail Offense). The sentences will run concurrently. Louis will serve the lesser sen-

Louis, who is now 23, was 21 years old at the time of the of-

According to the District Attorney's office, on January 20, 2006, Louis gave birth to a 7 lb., 20 inch, baby boy while sitting on a toilet at a friends home. The

birth was in the early morning became very upset. hours and other household members were asleep.

Louis had kept her pregnancy a secret and after the baby was born Louis left him head down in a toilet bowl for 1 to 2 min-

Louis then cut the umbilical cord, cleaned up the bathroom, placed the baby in 2 plastic bags, then a laundry bag and hid his body in a trash bag containing some of her clothes without waking anyone else.

Louis then went to bed and went to sleep.

According to McPherson, the following morning the other occupants of the house saw blood running down her leg and insisted she go to a doctor.

"She did not tell them about the baby," said McPherson.

"A friend took her to Sweetwater to see a doctor at the hospital but they were unable to find the hospital.

"While Stephanie Louis and the friend were gone the residents of the house found the baby and called law enforcement."

McPherson said the friend who took Louis to the hospital stated Louis was in a "partying mood" coming home, "even singing and laughing", until they arrived back in Spur and saw the Texas Ranger at the house, at which time she

"The medical examiner determined that there was air in the baby's lungs and that he was alive when he was born," said McPherson.

A fact which also weighed heavily on the jurors minds was that by the time the autopsy was completed and reviewed by several doctors, and she was indicted and arrested, Louis was pregnant

That baby was born while she was an inmate and CPS took immediate custody of it.

McPherson said she was pleased with the sentence of 9 years. "The jury did an excellent job with the evidence they had before them," said McPherson.

According to McPherson the Medical Examiner couldn't really tell the jury how the baby died so there could be no indictment for murder.

"However we do know her actions could have endangered the baby," said McPherson. "The Reckless Injury to a Child Indictment was returned based on the Medical Examiner's testimony."

McPherson also praised the law enforcement involved in the case. "Texas Ranger Tony Arnold, the Spur Police Department, and Dickens County Sheriff's did an excellent job investigating the case.'



BURR FIRE--A long burning burr fire, northwest of Floydada, has not only brought an assault to the nasal passages of county and city residents for 2 weeks, but according to fireman Craig DuBois, it also burned some pasture belonging to Bill Hardin and out buldings and old trucks on other property. DuBois stated firemen have been called to the fire 4-5 times in the past 2 weeks and have logged 200-300 man hours. "The burrs are over a year old," said DuBois. "We finally backburned 500-600 feet to keep from being called out again, but we still had to go back Sunday night." DuBois said people will probably still be smelling the smoke for another week because "it's still churning out there."

Lockney Council briefed on "Wreaths Across America"

The Lockney City Council met Thursday, November 15 and officially set a pay increase of \$100 for all city employees who had received their water and wastewater license. Council also heard a presentation about the upcoming Wreaths Across America ceremony to be held in Lockney.

Ed Marks told the council the 'Wreaths Across America" ceremony would take place December 15 at the Lockney Veterans Memorial Park.

"News media will be here," said Marks. "This is a good opportunity to showcase our Memorial Park. The Park is putting some pride back in the neighborhood. We will have bands from Floydada and Lockney, a speaker, and 80 Floydada kids the ceremony.'

Tina Graves spoke on behalf of the council, thanking Marks, "For all you have done and do with the park.

The council considered a resolution denying Atmos Energy rate increase. City Attorney Lanny Voss advised no action would be necessary as Atmos had settled with the cities involved. Atmos agreed to a 10% drop and to reimburse legal fees from last

The council was to consider Sgt. Casey Wallace as replacement for retiring Chief of Police Jerry Edwards. However they tabled this item of business to set another time when all council members would be present.

Chief of Police Jerry Edwards reported another successful and 80 Lockney kids involved in Hunter's Education class com-

pleted. "We had 22 students this year, making a total of 385 who have gone through the class over the years. I plan to continue holding this class after I retire.'

Job applications received for City Secretary position were discussed. A date and time was set to interview applicants.

In other business the council considered and unanimously passed two variances; one for business in residential district at 100 blk. of NE 3rd and one for a fence at 313 W. Spruce to be set 15 feet behind the curb.

Kelly Prayor presented the financial report for LEDC. Income for October 2006 through September 2007 was \$34,512.01 and the total expenses were \$26,602.46 for a net income of

Roaming around the world in peared in the Austin paper as ing News that included Allan whatever time it takes.

Each day we read newspapers from all around the world. Obviously, this involves the internet. Sometimes, we comment on what we have read, but not often. Our usual schedule is 1st, the Israeli papers, simply because what happens there will happen here as soon as the authorities in the White House and in Congress get their marching orders. Then, as a usual rule, it's the papers in Hong Kong, Taipei, Manila, Singapore, London, Tokyo and Moscow. Sometimes, there are others thrown in the mix, maybe even Sidney or New York, or Houston or Dallas.

(It's gotta be a slow day before we check in with New York, simply because the local paper usually carries all the stories--the anti-Bush ones that Associated Press has not already carried-that would normally appear in the NY Times first.)

One has to be somewhat careful, though. The other day we saw a story in the Manila Times, dated on a Sunday, dealing with the death of the idiot hero Norman Mailer. We had not seen the story anywhere else, and, knowing the importance the world attached to the name Norman Mailer, wondered why. Sure enough, next day it ap-

All of which brings up another time, another place. We went through an entire war thinking World War Two started when the

Japanese bombed America's naval base in Hawaii on December 8, 1941. Then, after Corregidor and several years in several Japanese POW camps, we find out that it all happened on the 7th, not the 8th. What was Sunday morning at daylight in Pearl Harbor was early Monday morning where we were. When the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor Sunday morning, it was already Monday morning in the Philippines. So perhaps America's media can be excused in this in-

I must confess, though, that long ago I began to become disillusioned with America's daily press. And one would have to include t.v. in that mix. My own problem is that I have a long memory, and I remember very vividly when television first be-

came a part of America's way of life. We used to have a good friend, Margaret Meyers, who worked for many years as a Capitol reporter for the old Dallas

Times Herald. She was a very good reporter, competing with the group from the Dallas Morn-

Duckworth, Dawson Duncan, Richard Morehead, and occasionally Jimmy Banks, and beating them on many stories. Margaret's name was well known in both Austin and Dallas.

Then television came along. (Yes, gentle reader, we had a television station even in those days, courtesy of Lyndon B. Johnson, who just happened to be the Democratic Majority Leader and

in position to make sure that no one else qualified for a t.v. station in Austin, and no one did, thanks to Lyndon and Lady Bird.) Margaret had made her mark, not only as a good reporter, but as something of a spokesperson for women's rights, whatever those rights are. So they (Austin's only t.v. channel) had her on one of those panels discussing that particular matter. Anyhow, she told me later that when she got home, the phone was ringing, and it kept ringing. Very few people, she said, commented on what she had said. Most just wanted her to know, "I saw you on television." Even then, it became apparent that what was said on television was of less importance than merely showing up. That was the important thing, just appearing.

One can only hope that we, in the weekly newspaper business, command the same brand of loyalty. Our readership demands that we cover, thoroughly, certain kinds of stories. So you will note that we try to cover all those things going on in our rural areas. We try to cover sports thoroughly, as we do the agricultural situation. We admit, right off, that we do not do as good a job on any of those situations as we would like, but we think we do a

better job than many of our contemporaries in the daily media. And, after all, we have limited resources. We remember once, apropos of nothing, when we became owner of the Hesperian many years ago, we went by his office to see Kinder Farris, the principal stockholder at that time in the First National Bank. Kinder was very kind, unlike what a banker is supposed to be, when we were outlining our problems. As I remember things, we were discussing the situation over at the sheriff's office (at that time). He was urging us to "get off Fred's back," referring to the then Sheriff Fred Cardinal. I didn't think we were "on his back." Then he said, off-handed, "I read two newspapers: The Wall Street Journal and the Floyd County Hesperian. That's all I figure I ever need. One of them keeps me informed about what's going on nationally, the other keeps me informed about what's going on in this community." I did not spend much more time, thereafter, worrying about what



At the conclusion of two weeks work on the legislation continues muster the 60 votes needed to approve a cloture motion put option of last resort. forth by Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV). If successful the cloture vote would have limited debate on H.R. 2419, better known as the 2007 Farm Bill, and set the stage for its final con-

A final tally of the votes shows the cloture motion received 55 Yea votes, just 5 short of the 60 needed to be approved, and 42 Nay votes largely divided along party lines. Senators Norm Coleman of Minnesota, Chuck Grassley of Iowa, John Thune of South Dakota and Gordon Smith of Oregon were the only Republican Senators voting for the mea-

Texas Senator John Cornyn did not cast a vote on the measure, while Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison recorded her vote against the cloture motion.

Had the motion passed and cloture invoked the Senate would have been poised to immediately take up the measure and proceed to a final vote no more than 30 legislative hours after the passage of the cloture motion.

As it stands, the status of H.R. 2419 is unchanged and the fate of the legislation, which ironically is something both sides would prefer was passed before the end of the year, will hinge on the willingness of Democrat and Republican leaders to agree on a process both sides can live with upon their return. Otherwise, the only option will be to take another shot at invoking cloture and thereby force the debate to move forward under expedited rules.

Farm bill advocates concerned about this latest set-back should remember that delays in the Senate are nothing new, especially with major legislation like the farm bill, and should not be seen as a sign that the process is dead in the water. Instead, it is wise to remember that protracted Senate farm bill debates are more the norm than the exception.

This was certainly the case in late 2001 when it appeared the Senate was set to pass a new 2001 farm bill, only to have an apparent deal blow up at the last minute. Ultimately, U.S. agriculture ended up with a good 2002 Farm Bill, but not until May of

Circumstances are slightly different this year, since the fiveyear 2002 farm bill has now technically expired. This is one of the primary reasons why there is almost universal agreement that the best course of action is for the Senate to keep working diligently to move the process forward.

> Feedback from inside the Washington Beltway indicates that principles involved in the Senate process are still upbeat and believe that the process will not only move forward when they return after Thanksgiving, but that the bill has a good chance of getting finished before Christ-

Although they share the belief that the best possible course is to pass and approve a new farm bill as quickly as possible, West Texas Representatives Mac Thornberry, Randy Neugebauer and Mike Conaway, have signed on as co-sponsors of a bill to extend the provisions of the 2002 Farm bill for one year.

They explain that should the Senate fail to get their bill completed, this measure could be used to extend the current farm safety net through the 2008 growing season. The extension bill was introduced by the House Agriculture Committee's ranking Member Bob Goodlatte (R-VA) and would extend current law through September 30, 2008.

Farm bill supporters are encouraged to keep communicating the importance of passing this legislation to their Senators even though they aren't in Washington. It is important that they continue to be impressed with the importance of getting this legislation completed as quickly as
