Winds make basketball history

The Whirlwinds Regional ter.

Quarterfinal historic win, February 26, against the Idalou Wildcats, was just the beginning of history in the making for Floydada boy's basketball.

Although the Winds have advanced to Quartefinal playoffs before, this win and the subsequent Regional semi-final and final playoff games were a first for the boys.

However, after their strong 2008 playoff run, the Floydada Whirlwind Basketball fell short of their quest for the State Tournament, held this weekend in Austin.

The Winds season came to a close on Saturday, March 1, in Midland. The defeat came in the final Region 1-2A Championship game at the hands of the Jim Ned Indians, 65-61.

The 2008 playoffs were filled with many wonderful memories for the Whirlwinds and their fans.

The Regional Quarterfinals, Feb. 26, featured the Idalou Wildcats who had beaten Spearman in the Area round of the playoffs. The Whirlwinds met the Wildcats at the Coronado Gymnasium in Lubbock. Floydada jumped out on Idalou quickly, outscoring them 36-16

The game never got closer as Floydada came away with a 74-51 victory.

Payte Beedy led all scorers with 28 points and had 8 rebounds. Titus Miller had 15 points and 11 rebounds. Kevin Smith had 13 points.

"The entire team contributed in this long awaited victory," said the Whirlwind's Coach, Brattain.

With the win over Idalou, Floydada next moved to the Region I AA Regional Tournament, against the Comfort Bobcats in Midland, February 29.

The whole community got behind their Whirlwinds as they anticipated their match-up with

Again, Floydada jumped out to an early lead and took a 8 point tense during the second half with Comfort getting within striking distance to start the fourth quar-

Floydada used a 20 point quarter to hold them off however and to take the 62-47 win.

Payte Beedy led all scorers with 17 points to go along with 9 rebounds. Kody Smith chipped in 11 points in the win. This victory set up a match-up for a trip to Austin with Jim Ned.

Jim Ned made it to the finals with a 69-59 victory over Shallowater the previous night. Floydada's overall record stood at 26-9 heading into the game with Jim Ned.

The Regional Final was another first for Floydada boy's basketball. The opponent was a team with a lot of basketball tradition that had previously been to the state tournament in 2005. Both teams came in excited and both team's had tremendous support in the stands.

Floydada jumped out to an early lead just like they had done with the past two games.

The first quarter was Floydada 25 and Jim Ned 13. Payte Beedy had an explosive 14 points in the first quarter alone. The game was far from over though as Jim Ned cut the lead during the second quarter to 4 as the Whirlwinds took a 32-28 lead into halftime.

The third quarter was very competitive and the Whirlwinds began the fourth quarter with a one point, 43-42 lead.

Jim Ned took over in the fourth winning this critical period, 23-18. Jim Ned hung on to win the game, 65-61.

The game was very exciting from start to finish, ending with Floydada falling short of their first trip to the State Tournament in Austin.

Payte Beedy led the Whirlwinds in scoring with 24 points. Titus Miller had 17 points and 13 rebounds in the loss. Kody Smith contributed 11 points while his brother Kevin added 9 points.

The Floydada Whirlwinds ended their 2007-2008 season with a 26-10 record.

"Overall, the season was exlead to halftime. The game was citing," said Brattain. "The district schedule was so tough; it seemed to make the team more prepared for the playoff sched-



Mike Anderson received 180 votes, 42.06%; Jerry Finley received 102 votes, 23.83%; and Tanner Smith got 146 votes, 34.11%. A run-off election will be held April 8 between Ander-

Early voting for the run-off will be held March 24 April 4.

The winner of the run-off will face off the Democrat winner, Cecil Jackson, who got 93 votes, 54.71. Jackson's democrat opponent, O.B. Smith, got 77 votes, 45.29%

In the Republican primary, Raissez won the Sheriff's race easily with a total of 722 votes, 74.74%, against challenger Charles Dunn's total of 244, or

The South Plains Hobby Club met at the South Plains Baptist Church on Wednesday, February 13, 2008. Members present included Ann Hartman, Peggy Roberts, Margaret Kitchens, Kay Gilbert, Mary Carter, Virginia Taylor, Donnie Bowman, Mildred Smitherman, Carolyn Marble, Janis Julian and Sandra Lass. Carolyn Marble distributed the Hobby Club folders and we all cheered when we saw the great job she had done. She prepared each month's activities on regular notebook sized paper and used extra large type for which we were all grateful.

Donnie Bowman introduced Mary Carter, hostess and chocolate expert in making molded confections and Mary's husband, Dennis, who assisted Mary during her presentation. Mary said that she learned how to use molds to make seasonal figures such as Santa faces, reindeer, Christmas trees, candy canes, snowmen, Easter bunnies, Easter eggs as well as Ninja turtles, computers, musical instruments and notes, stars, bake sets, teacups, roses and leaves, to mention just a few.

Over the years Mary collected a variety of molds as well as inherited a few from the friend who had talked her into learning how to make molded confections, but later lost interest in continuing with them herself.

Mary said she learned that to make successful confections, only certain types of chocolate could be used, such as using only milk and white chocolate of good quality (good chocolate has less wax in it), is easier to work with and easier to remove the chocolate figures from the molds without having them stick. Mary said

Merken's chocolate comes in a variety of colors and that gold dust could be used as well.

She said most of her confections were entirely edible (including the gold dust!) and that there was no cooking involved in making molded chocolate confections. Mary said some of her molds had a place to put sticks so you could have a lollipop.

Mary said making the chocolate confections was a step-bystep process and the weather has a lot to do with her success. If it is too cold the chocolate hardens too fast and if it is too hot the chocolate gets runny. Mary had several colors of chocolate in plastic bowls on a warming plate to keep the chocolate pliable and warm but not too thick or too runny. Mary said in filling her molds she uses squirt bottles with several sized holes, toothpicks and several small sized spoons.

Mary then showed us how to make Santa faces by first using a toothpick to put his white eyebrows into the mold. Dennis put the mold into the refrigerator freezer and Mary set a timer for 15 minutes. Mary said Santa's eyebrows had to set first before she could put the next part of his face into the mold.

While Santa's eyebrows were hardening in the freezer, Mary showed us samples of chocolate roses with stick stems wrapped in green florist tape, a chocolate deviled egg, on which she had used yellow colored rice crispies for the yolk and white chocolate for the white, using an oval shaped mold. She also showed us a small plate with beige chocolate french fries (with red chocolate ketchup on them) and a chocolate hamburger in which the brown hamburger, yellow mustard, white mayonnaise, red tomato, white onion and green lettuce (all chocolate as well) could be seen between the beige chocolate bun.

After Santa's eyebrows were done, Mary proceeded step-by-step to complete his face: beard, eyes, nose and smile, after each, Dennis placed them in the freezer

Mary said she used to sell her chocolate figures and shipped them all over the country as well as sold them to local customers.

But, the right kind of molds and plastic dishes to hold the chocolate were getting harder to find and other tools she needed were becoming scarce as well. The time and expense in preparation and cost of shipping were

also deciding factors.

By the time Mary finished her presentation, all of our mouths were watering. Mary, Dennis and co-hostess Janis Julian gave each of us a chocolate red rose on a green florist tape wrapped stem and a slice of pizza that looked astonishingly like a real pepperoni pizza, with chocolate green and red peppers, beige chocolate mushrooms and red chocolate pepperoni.

Donnie thanked Mary for her presentation and we all began to eat our chocolate goodies. As we were eating, Carolyn said she noticed Mary had not once licked her fingers as she was preparing her chocolate figures, but most of the rest of us had as we were eating ours.

The next meeting will be held March 12, 2008 at 2:00 p.m. at the South Plains Baptist Church. Pat Nelson is going to show us how to make hooked rugs and boiled wool purses.





GOOD DAY BLIMPS CONDUCTED A DEMONSTRATION for Lockney Third, Fourth and Fifth grade elementary students Thursday, February 28 inside the elementary gym. Randy Doss, of Good Day Blimps Incorporated, Normal, Illinois, gave instruction on the inner workings of blimp flight to one class at a time and answered their questions. Doss told the students the remote controlled blimp, which is 1/3 the size of the Goodyear blimp, was purchased used for \$20,000 and he had then done restoration work on it. "My job is to be a flying billboard," Doss told the students. "The blimp is more readily seen by many more people as it flies approximately 300 feet in the air than a billboard fastened to the ground in one location." Large interchangeable signs attach to either side. Currently the Syngenta Company has hired Good Day Blimps to advertise their AVICTA complete cotton seed. "This trip, the blimp will fly from Muleshoe to Stanton," Doss told his young audience. "The amount of extra weight the blimp can carry varies with how far above sea level it is at any given location. For instance, back home in Normal, Illinois, which is 860 feet above sea level, it can carry an extra 15 pounds. Here in Lockney, 3,800 feet above sea level, the blimp can only carry 8 pounds of extra weight." Randy and his brother, Dennis Doss work together, with Dennis being the cameraman and navigator.

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A meeting of high level community has been largely sup-Democratic leadership from the House of Representatives and Senate early this week ended with a tentative agreement to seek an additional \$10 billion for the farm bill and instructions to programs put forward by the U.S. the Chairmen of the Agriculture, Ways and Means, and Finance Committees to "get it done." safety net for U.S. producers.

Following the meeting House Agriculture Committee Chairman Collin Peterson, (D-MN) said he will continue working closely with the Agriculture Committee's ranking member, Rep. Bob Goodlatte (R-VA), and the Administration to find agreement on how the \$10 billion in additional funds could be secured.

The pending March 15 expiration of farm bill funding authority and the release of new budget projections from the Congressional Budget Office were key motivators and the primary reason for the meeting earlier this week.

The meeting was attended by House Speaker Rep. Nancy Pelosi (D-CA), Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV), Peterson (D-MN) and Senate Agriculture Chairmen Tom Harkin (D-IA), House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Rep. Charles Rangel (D-NY), and Senate Finance Committee Chairman Max Baucus (D-MT),

Unfortunately for Congressional leaders and Agriculture leased February 29 by the USDA Committee members wanting to National Agricultural Statistics develop a compromise with the Service. Bush Administration on farm bill funding issues, USDA Deputy January 2008 cotton marketings Secretary of Agriculture Chuck Conner failed to provide much hope that compromise was possible when he reiterated the Upland Cotton Weighted Aver-Administration's position that only program cuts would be deemed acceptable to pay for increases elsewhere.

Such a hard line stance probably will not set to well with High Plains members of the House Agriculture Committee, Rep. Randy Neugebauer (Lubbock) and Rep. Mike Conaway (Midland) who have both issued statements in recent weeks noting the importance of getting the farm bill completed.

Equally comforting to High Plains agriculture interests is the strong language both area Congressmen have used regarding the importance of the Administration getting on board with the bipartisan compromise that Congress will ultimately develop once the funding details are finalized.

Both Neugebauer and Conaway have clearly indicated that if the Administration carries out the veto threat, despite the bipartisan efforts of Congress, they would ultimately act in the interest of their district and their agriculture constituents.

In regard to how the extra funding would be used, it is important to note that commodity program participants aren't expected to directly benefit from the additional funding. Instead the main benefit of the additional funds will be paving the way toward a final agreement and passage of the bill.

Upland Cotton Average Price Received by Growers **Through January 2008**

Cumulative Upland cotton year totaled 7.916 million bales according to information re-

According to USDA estimates totaled 1.839 million bales with an average selling price of 60.7 cents per pound. So far the 2007 age Price calculated through January 2008 stands at 55.14 cents per pound.

January prices continued to reinforce the fact that prices are steadily moving upward, although no one has yet been able to determine where the move is likely to end or how much of an effect it might have on the final 2007 Counter-cyclical Program payment rate.

With the first six months of the marketing year now past, the calculated 2007 Weighted Average Price is 3.14 cents above the 52-cent threshold where 2007crop Counter-cyclical payment rates begin to drop. The preliminary mid-month price reported for February 2008 was 60.7 cents per pound.

The following table shows the average price received each month by farmers and the associated weighted average price based on prices and cumulative marketings from August 1 through January 31, 2008.

The 2007 Counter-cyclical payment rate authorized under the 2002 Farm Bill will be based on the 12-month Weighted Average Price Received by growers. For cotton the 12-month Weighted Average Price will reflect price and marketings for the 2007 marketing year. The 2007 cotton marketing year began August 1, 2007 and ends July 31,



No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of the Cooperative who is a close relative of an incumbent director or an employee of the Cooperative, or is not a member in good standing of the Cooperative and receiving service within the District he represents; PROVIDED, that the operating or chief executive of any member which is not a natural person, such as a corporation, church, etc., or his designee, shall be eligible to become a director, from the Directorate District in which such member is located, if he or such designee (1) is in substantial permanent occupancy, direction or use of the premises served by the Cooperative, and (2) is a permanent and year-round resident within or in close proximity to an area served by the Cooperative; BUT PROVIDED FURTHER, that no more than one (1) such person may serve on the Board of Directors at the same time. No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of, or to hold any other position of trust in, the Cooperative who does not have the legal capacity to enter into a binding contract or is in any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise, or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the Cooperative, or a business primarily engaged in selling electrical or plumbing applicances, fixtures or supplies to, among other, the members of the Cooperative. No personal shall take or hold office as a Director who is the incumbent of or candidate for an elective public office in connection with which a salary is paid.

SECTION 4.05 DIRECTORATE DISTRICTS

The territory served by the Cooperative shall be divided into nine (9) Directorate Districts. Each District shall be represented by one director and the Districts are described upon the map on the territory served by the District attached to the Bylaws and made a part hereof.

SECTION 4.06 NOMINATIONS

It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to appoint, not less than thirty (30) days nore more than one hundred (180) days prior to the date of the meeting of the members at which directors are to be elected, a Committee on Nominations, consisting of not less than five (5) nor more than eleven (11) members. The Committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least twenty (20) days prior ro the meeting a list of nominations for directors to be elected, listing separately the nominee (s) for each Directorate District from or with respect to which director must, pursuant to this Article, be elected at the meeting. The Committee may include as many nominees for any director to be elected from or with respect to a Directorate District as it deems desirable. Any fifteen (15) or more members of the Cooperative, acting together, may make additional nominations in writing over their signatures, listing their nominee (s) in like manner, not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting, and the Secretary shall post such nominations at the same place where the list of nominations made by the Committee is posted. The Secretary shall mail to the members with the notice of the meeting, or separately, but at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the meeting, a statement of the names and addresses of all nominee (s) for each Directorate District from or with respect to which a director must be elected, showing clearly those nominated by the Committee and those nominated by petition, if any. The chairman at such meeting, after all nominations so made have been duly announced, shall call for additional nominations from the floor and shall ascertain and announce, after any nominations made from the floor, the particular Directorate District from or with respect to which any additional candidates have been nominated.
