

We've reached a stage...in fact we reached it a long time ago...when we have begun to write obituaries for friends we used to think would long since outlive us. That situation has prevailed quite often here in Floyd County, where we have written of the passing of Walt Hale, Kinder Farris, Carl Lemons, and a host of others.

The latest is William F. Buckley, probably the most intelligent, witty, patriot we've ever known. He was the father, if we may say that, of the conservative movement in America. He was an influence to many of us. It was he who welded, and gave voice to, the various elements of the then-floundering anti-liberal movement.

We've known Bill, as he was affectionately known by is friends, since the 1960's shortly after he started publishing National Review magazine. That followed his tenure as a student at Yale University, after which he wrote his famous "God and Man never read "God and Man at Yale", but I remember the times. (And I have read many other books by Buckley.) It was during a period in America, shortly agreed to write the foreword,

after World War 11, during which so terribly much of academia had decided, and taught, that "God is Dead." Buckley took the position that the whole "God is Dead" argument was hogwash, and had no hesitancy in saying so. His magazine, National Review, followed his lead for many years.

Above my desk is a photo of he and I in my office in Washington, with the inscription of "Ken Towery is the greatest living American." I know if he had time to reflect on the situation, he would have written something different, but nevertheless I appreciate his thoughts and his actions. In fact, Bill was one of the few men I've ever met whose

actions tended to mirror his thoughts. For many, many years he would call from wherever he might be in the world to send a "happy birthday" message to your editor, Alice Gilroy. He had simply made a commitment much earlier to do so, and he kept his commitments. In fact, one at Yale." I must confess I've - such commitment was when he wrote a foreword for my own book, "The Chowdipper". The only stipulation he had was that he first read the draft. He did, and

After the affair we flew back home to Washington, and he stayed with the group, playing the piano, doing those things which a host does, until the wee hours of the morning, at which time he and his wife packed their bags and flew to

Bill died at the age of 82. He had suffered from emphysema for many years. He died, according to things we have read, at his desk, working until the end. For which a few of us give thanks.
