Flores qualifies for State in 5 events

800 Meter Relay Team Also Going to State

Aarrhon Flores has proved he's one of the fastest and most versatile male athletes in West Texas in Class 2A by taking 3gold and 2-silver medals at the Region I-2A Track and Field Meet at Elmer Gray Stadium in Abilene on April 25-26. Flores along with 3-teammates in the 800 relay have all qualified for the U.I.L. Track Championships on May 9-10 at Mike A. Meyers Stadium in Austin on the University of Texas campus.

These efforts had Floydada knocking on the door in the team standings by finishing in 3rd place with 56-points. Idalou won the Region I Title with 70-points, Crane was the runnerup with 64points, and Childress was right behind Floydada in 4th with 55-

The performances in Abilene also set Floydada HS Track records in 4-events:

800 relay of Flores, Joe Suarez, Sammy Rameriz and Magdiel Alvarado (1:29.81); and Flores set new marks individually in the 200 Meter Dash (21.56 in pre-lims), 100 Meter Dash (10.68 in pre-lims), and Triple Jump (45'7"). He missed the school record in the Long Jump





"No Excuses" for High Gas Prices Local citizens show support By Congressman Mac Thornberry

Normally I wouldn't quote CBS News, but with oil closing at over \$119.00 per barrel it is worth noting a recent CBS report on gas prices. How fast are gas prices rising? Well, according to CBS they've now nearly doubled in just over three years. A lot of folks in our part of Texas have been asking what Congress is going to do about high gas prices. Unfortunately it seems to me Congress is doing exactly the opposite of what it should be doing to lower energy prices generally and gas prices in particular.

Everyone understands supply and demand. In the past year Congress has passed a bill, which I opposed, to raise taxes on energy and to make production of domestic energy resources more expensive. Just this week another Member of Congress announced a plan to make drilling in parts of the Gulf of Mexico off limits. Saudi Arabia has announced a hold on plans to further increase long-term production capacity from its vast oil fields, and unrest in Nigeria and other oil producing countries has shown how vulnerable supplies from those areas can be. In short, our own government and world politics are making supplies tight and artificially more expensive.

Between price and the use of alternative fuels U.S. oil consumption is projected to fall by as much as 2% over the next year, but world demand during the next five years is projected to rise about 30%. Meaning that while supplies are going down or suffering from artificial inflation through new taxes, demand due to the growing energy consumption of such nations as China and India is increasing, despite our efforts to reduce consumption here in America.

The result is a "perfect storm" of falling world supply, rising world demand, and rising taxes driving prices up for average Americans. What's worse there are some who appear to be quietly happy with this situation believing that rising prices in America will discourage fossil fuel consumption and reduce global warming.

My approach to solving our energy supply problem is to increase production of ALL types of energy here in America. Until we produce more energy of all kinds here at home we will be at the mercy of unstable overseas producers and in daily competition with the emerging economies of China and India. I've written to you before about the "No Excuses Energy Act" and I'm honored to report that slowly, but surely, this approach is gaining support. To-date 19 Members of Congress have signed on as cosponsors of the bill and there continues to be media attention as more and more people recognize that conservation has its place, but until we increase domestic supply of ALL types of energy we are only dealing with half the answer to our



to wind energy at hearing

House of Representatives Committee on Regulated Industries held a meeting last Thursday in Amarillo to get input from wind energy supporters in the panhandle area. The main focus to the meeting centered around the building of transmission lines in the panhandle area. State Representative Joe Heflin requested Floyd County citizens to attend this important meeting and show support from District 85.

Floyd County was represented well by a number of citizens and elected officials, including: Commissioner Lennie Gilroy, County Judge Penny Golightly, Floydada City Manager Gary Brown, Sheriff Paul Raissez, Matt Williams and Joe Taylor.

The meeting was attended by approximately 300 citizens in the standing room only Panhandle Conference Center. The message was clear. Texas is leading our nation in the wind energy field but without transmission lines to move the electricity to the ERCOT, Electric Reliability Council of Texas, we are at a standstill.

Testimony was given to the committee by elected officials, wind energy companies, and companies ready to build the transmission lines. Estimates vary on the cost of transmission lines between this area.'

A formal hearing by the Texas 3 and 6 billion dollars. However payback is expected to be between 2 and 4 years in fuel cost savings alone. The message was clear to the committee that these transmission lines needed to be built as soon as possible.

No one could come up with a figure on the economic impact this industry could have on West Texas but all were in agreement that it would be enormous. It was suggested that there is interest in manufacturers locating in this area that will build towers, generators and blades for the wind industry.

Judge Penny Golightly said there was a lot of enthusiasm at the meeting over economic development for Texas.

'Wind farms will add to Texas counties' tax base," said Golightly.

Commenting on the meeting Commissioner Gilroy said, "Wind energy will not solve all of our energy problems but it is an important step. It is a clean, cheap fuel that does not use our precious water. Wind energy is here to stay and I am confident the transmission lines will be built.

"I appreciate the hard work of our State Representative Joe Heflin working on our behalf in


In his report to the membership, Harbin talked about "The Bad, the Ugly, and the Good", with the Bad being the weak dollar, the price of oil, gasoline, diesel, natural gas, and the resulting increases in electricity prices. "These high energy costs affect every facet of our lives," he said.

"I recently read where big national chains such as Cosco and Sam's Club are rationing rice. While not for me, it is an important food staple for many, many people in the world, and there is Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert and a shortage. Energy costs and Moss assured the members that food prices are inextricably food costs must also go up. Prior to his report, General That's the law of supply and de-

"Another word for food demand is hunger," he added. "Current news reports say there is more hunger in the world today than at any time since World War II, and hunger affects the weakest and the most vulnerable - little children. When you think of it in those terms, it's worse than Bad, it's Ugly."

He also addressed the looming public policy decisions regarding climate change which are anticipated out of Washington, and the need to balance environmental concerns with the reality of needed affordable power to prevent devastating the economy and people's lives. "The Good includes renewable energy sources such as wind we are seeing developed in our area. The reality is, though, that we cannot rely on renewables alone. Here in this country, coal is our most abundant fuel resource. We must develop environmentally friendly ways to use it, but in the meantime, with the technologies in place today, there must be a place for conventional fuel sources, coal and natural gas, to meet our energy needs.'

Following the General Manager's report, Member Service Advisor Larry Ogden recognized the Annual Meeting Planning Committee members before awarding \$50 electric bill credits to the youngest and oldest members present. The youngest member was Britney Walker of Crosbyton, and the oldest member present was Guy Ginn, 92 years young, of Floydada.

Kingdom of Keaven Ecclesiastic Court Causae ecclesiae publicis causis aequiparantur. (The cause of the church is a public cause.)

By the Authority and Power delegated to me solely by the Grace of God, in and through our Lord, Savior, and King, Jesus, the Christ, in accordance with His Commandments, Precepts, Judgments, Statutes, Ordinances, and Testament in and of His Holy Writ, solely by and under the Leading of His Warrant in Law and by His Will, do I, an ordained Minister of His Gospel, Doctor of Divinity, Doctor of Ecclesiastic Law, and Bishop in and of His Body issue this:

DECLARATION

Know All men by these Presents and to Whom these Presents shall Come, that:

We are traditional Christians of various denominations, not cultists, or extremists; Therefore, take further notice and Hereby know:

Firstly:

The Authority and Commission of ecclesiastic courts is given by Our Lord, Savior, and King, Jesus, the Christ, who is the foundation of law; that the ecclesiastic court is not simulating law. Its Warrants, Writs, Decrees, Demands, and Edicts are Lawful and real, issued under Ministerial Authority, Right, and Power.

Secondly:

All judges and officers of ecclesiastic courts are ambassadors, diplomats, and Lawful emissaries of the King; having both Diplomatic Immunity and Sovereign Immunity. Neither the United States Congress, nor any individual State, county, or municipality has power to abrogate sovereign immunity; and be advised: Christ has not waived or abrogated His immunity but has retained it with full dignity.

In ecclesiastical courts, the judges, by authority of the King, sit "in the place" of the King and render His Orders, Decrees, Demands, and Edicts. They do so without rendering an "opinion", contrary to civil court procedure; therefore,

Be it known: It is contrary to the law of nations to do violence to ambassadors because an ambassador fills the place of the king by whom he or she is sent, and is to be honored as he is whose place he or she fills; and,

Thirdly:

Time does not bar the right of the King (Jesus); nor does it bar the right of His ecclesia, nor does it par the exercise of the right; and, one cannot claim the King's prerogatives or sovereighty without being an heir of the King. Birthright inherits the common law sovereign immunity and is a prerogative of the sovereign and his heirs; and by common law, this is extended to those adopted by the King as His heirs. See: Romans 8:15-17. Hence, Ignorance of one's right does not prejudice the right.

Fourthly: Mark:

Ecclesiastic courts are true and lawful tribunals recognized by federal and state laws. Is Texas still part of the United States, or has it succeeded from the Union?

The following United States laws, regulations, codes, and statutes confirm the authority and

jurisdiction of ecclesiastical courts or tribunals:

Short y. Stotts/58 Indiana 29 (1877): The whole system of English ecclesiastic courts, as separate from the civil, is foreign to our (i.e., United States) institutions, and has no place in our (i.e., United States) jurisprudence. There is no distinction between the lay and ecclesiastical jurisdiction; ecclesiastical courts are considered as much spiritual as a temporal tribunal. There is here, therefore, no conflict of jurisdiction between the courts of the one class and the other (i.e., civil and ecclesiastical courts).

First English E.L. Church v. Dysinger/120 C.A. 139, 6P.2nd. 522: Civil courts may not substitute their opinions for the determinations of the authorized tribunals of the church; see also: Maxwell v. Brougher/99 C.A. 2nd. 824, 222 P.2nd 910.

The Serbian Eastern Orthodox Diocese v. Dionisije/426 U.S. 697, 720-25 (1976): a court can not interpret the church constitution to make an independent determination of the power but must defer to the interpretation of the body (i.e., church or ecclesiastic court) authorized to decide.

Wheelock v. First Presbyterian Church/119 C. 477, 51 P.841: The rule may be stated that in ecclesiastical matters, the decision of the ecclesiastic body empowered to determine those matters is conclusive, not only on the church, but also on the civil courts; see also: Permanent Committee of Missions v. Pacific Synod of Presbyterian Church/157 C. 105, 106 P.395 (Decision of church general assembly); and, Maxwell, supra. (Decision of the Congregation of the Baptist Church).

Grant v. Chambers/34 Texas 573 (1871): The several tribunals (i.e., which included ecclesiastic courts) of the rebel states were recognized and never abrogated by the reconstruction acts, and also by the military authorities of the United States.

Handlin v. Wickliff/12 Wall. 173: As to this class of courts, it is to be said in general - that they are as legally authorized as any other courts of the land; and that their orders, decrees, and records are entitled to the same full faith and credit as those of any other lawfully constituted tribunals. See also: Lanfear v. Mestier/18 La. Ann. 497; Taylor v. Graham/id.656; Scott v. Billgerry/40 Miss. 119; and, Murrell v. Jones/i- 565.

Leitensdorfer v. Webb/ante.: A judicial system consisting of a superior or appellate court and circuit courts (i.e., to include lawfully constituted provost tribunals, military tribunals, and Christian Jural Tribunals) whose jurisdiction is specifically defined...with both civil and criminal jurisdiction. See also: 9 Wall. 129; United States v. Reiter and Louis/13 Am. Law Reg. 534; Hefferman v. Porter/6 Coldw. (Tenn.) 391; and G.O. 6, Department of the Gulf (Texas) (1864).


