"We need the help of the neighbors and property owners to get this under control," said

Ramon said he has taken prisoners out to clean up debris but has noticed that as soon as they are done someone has brought more items to the alley.

"It's almost as if people expect the City to eventually clean it up so they make no effort to do it themselves," said Ramon. "It finally gets so bad that the City has to do it and then violators start the process all over again."

According to City Judge Tali Jackson the fine per violation will cost approximately \$180 and can go as high as \$500.

No alcohol in Nolan Armstrong

#### Blood tests show driver not intoxicated

Official blood tests have shown that Nolan Armstrong had not consumed any alcohol before the April 20, 2008 accident that left two Floydada teens dead.

Five teenagers occupied the Chevrolet Avalanche which was being driven by Nolan Armstrong, 18, of Lockney. Also in the car were: Tanner Sue, 17, Dylan Thomas, 15, Chris Hayter, 18, and Dru Carthel, 17, all of Floydada.

The accident occurred between the hours of 4:30 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. on County Rd. 91. The dirt road runs north and south and is about 10 miles west of Floy-

The vehicle was registered to Arleen Nixon, (Chris Hayter's mother), but Armstrong was driv-

The teens had driven to Floydada to get something to eat after having been at an "after prom party". They were returning to the house where the party had been held when Nolan lost control and the vehicle rolled. Every boy, except Dru Carthel, was thrown from the vehicle.

Tanner Sue and Dylan Thomas were killed.

Because of the circumstances surrounding the deaths blood tests were done. These tests show the driver, Nolan Armstrong, was not intoxicated and had no alcohol in his system.

According to District Attorney Becky McPherson the case will be presented to a Floyd County Grand Jury, June 11, for

### Vernon preserves grandfather's memories in shadow box

was the theme for the special shadow box Tami Vernon of Plainview, created in memory of her late grandfather, Benjamin Bert Vernon, a WWI Army veteran. Most of the items given to her from various members of the Vernon family are connected with his service.

About three years ago, Vernon had the idea to do the shadow box. "I arranged and rearranged the items for about an hour, until I was pleased with the result," she said. "I took it to the next Vernon family reunion and immediately a cousin offered me \$250 for it. I told him no way!"

"Memories of Papa Vernon" years old I asked if I could have it. He saved it for me rather than donating it to the Floyd County Historical Museum. After dad's death, mom gave it to me," said Vernon, who is the daughter of Ethelyn Garnett of Lockney and the late Don Vernon.

> The two dog tags still fastened together were also given to her by her mother, who found them in a filing cabinet along with the Award of Disability Pension letter dated June 14, 1919.

> Vernon said, "I'm told the two tags still together means a veteran came home and was not killed in action, as one tag is sent to the family when a soldier is killed. The tags were hand stamped and

Bert Vernon served as the VFW Post Chaplain in Lockney for many years and his cap is included in the shadow box display

The display includes three photographs: one of Mr. Vernontaken in 1918 in his full uniform, one of him and his wife taken in the 1960's, and one in which he was wearing a suit and hat. > Vernon brought the shadow box with her to the May 26 Memorial celebration held at the Lockney Veterans Memorial Park. She showed it to the veterans attending, their families, friends, and others gathered, many of whom had known her grandfather.

> Bert Vernon was born to James Franklin Vernon and Annie Brown Vernon in Holland, Texas on February 9, 1891. According to Tami Vernon, Annie Brown Vernon was a full blood

so they stamped out the incorrect ingly referring to each other as on an Indian reservation in Oklahoma. However, he lived most of his life in Lockney, where he met and married Essie Mae Eiland.

They had nine children (one died at birth), Bert Benjamin (Junior), Royce, Norma, Bettye, Nina, Don, Alvin, and Jerry. Of those eight, five are still living. His wife died in 1968. He died peacefully in his sleep at the age of 91, November 13, 1982 at a

nursing home in Ft. Worth. "When our family would go visit Papa Vernon at the nursing home, I would run to him and give him a big hug. He gave me a gift one time. It was an abstract animal print pillow case. It's the only gift I remember receiving from a grandparent. He died two

years later," she said. Vernon was in the second grade when he died, so her memories of her grandfather are from her early years. Other information was "I've been told" by older siblings, parents, aunts and

"I remember his selling poppies, and I still have some of those," Vernon said. "I also remember my grandparent's home was behind the First Baptist Church in Lockney, where they were members. Their house is gone now and that location is just an empty lot.

Vernon continued, "My T-Ball baseball team was the VFW Team and I was so proud to have a VFW hat. I couldn't wait to show it to Papa Vernon."

According to Ethelyn Garnett Mr. Vernon loved Lockney and the VFW, "Those men conducted the Honor services at his grave

Mr. Vernon had brothers who were in the military during the same time he served, but they were stationed in other places and never saw each other.

Vernon said she mostly remembers her grandfather as a proud man who helped others.

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


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### Ethanol supporter gives benefits of production for energy

Ethanol is one of the answers to the high fuel prices, not the cause. When a great many of the ethanol facilities that are being built all over the United States, are in full production, it will greatly affect the price of gas. It will be a major competition for imported oil.

Many in the media are blaming ethanol for the high food prices and for the high corn prices. Nothing can be further from the truth. The high food prices have nothing to do with ethanol production. High food prices are a direct result of high oil prices.

The high food prices are directly related to the cost of transportation of the nation's food supply, at every step of the food production, from the fields and feedlots, to the grocery store

In addition, the high corn prices are again a direct result of the high fuel prices. High oil prices, single handily, drive up the cost of production of the nation's food crops, in every step of production and delivery.

The truth is that, "cow feed quality" corn, not "human food quality" corn, does come into the ethanol plants everyday, and ethanol does go out, but that is about as far as most media re-

What you do not hear in the media, is that the corn is processed into, ethanol, "corn squeezin's", denaturalized white

lightening", whatever you wish to refer to it as. Then the corn itself is shipped back out of the plant, as "cow feed" called "wet cake", properly referred to as distillers grain. The feed is then shipped at a rate of up to 90-100 truckloads a day. It is shipped to the dairies and feedlots, to feed the cattle, just as it was originally grown for.

The funny thing is that the corn actually has a higher protein level when it comes "out" as cow feed from the plant, then when it originally went in. The distiller's grain, i.e. "wet cake" is trucked

immediately to the nearby dairies and feedlots.

The ethanol plants are being located very close to the major dairy and feedlot areas of Kansas, Texas, Iowa, and California. Ironically the "used" corn is fed sooner to the cattle, then if it had not of gone through the ethanol processing, and the dairy or feedlot, had to grind and prepare the corn for feeding themselves.

The ethanol plants are also good environmental neighbors. I teach across the highway from the Plainview facility. A few days ago we had a stiff wind, from the North, and you could smell the baking corn and yeast. It smelled much like a bakery, not at all like an oil refinery.

Many of the teachers and TDCJ staff members from the Formby and Wheeler prison facility, across Hwy 70 from the ethanol plant, had the opportunity to tour the plant recently. A comment heard repeatedly was that it was so clean and not at all dirty

I believe ethanol production is also clean and environmentally friendly. It is not oily and does not leave a greasy film after it burns. It burns cooler in your car engine as well.

Do your own little experiment, if you like. Pour some rubbing alcohol out on the sidewalk along side a little gasoline. Then set them both on fire and watch what is left after it burns. The ethanol burns clean on the sidewalk and inside your car. It does not leave that burnt oil residue on the sidewalk or in the motor of your vehicle, that gas does.

Our family is putting our money where our mouth is. We recently went up to Amarillo and purchased a new, Ford F150 pickup. We flipped every gas tank cover on the whole row of pickups until we found three available that were already E85, ethanol, ready. We then picked our new truck from those three.

Also just an interesting fact--Did you know that Henry Ford actually built the first cars to run on ethanol?

Yes, that was his design because at that time there were no gas stations, however many people did have their own private "still" out back.

The result of all of this is that Ethanol has little, to nothing to do with the high cost of food. However, Ethanol will have a great deal to do with the cost of gasoline in the United States within the next 10 years.

I believe you should convert your cars to ethanol as soon as it becomes readily available in your area. Many of the lager cities are already requiring that the fuel sold in their cities should contain at least 10% ethanol. They recognize the value of burning clean fuel on their environment and air

I believe we should help promote the ethanol industry, and aid them in their fight for a clean environment and against big oil profits. The ethanol industry as a whole does not invest money in lobbyists and expensive ad campaigns. Instead, they invest their money and energy into providing a more affordable alternative to high fuel prices.

I would rather put our fuel dollar in the pocket of an American farmer, than in the bank account of some Middle Eastern

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### Dr. Schacht retires after 35 plus years of involvement with the U.S. Armed Forces

Since May 20, Dr. Otto B. Schacht has had a little more free from a 35-plus year involvement with the U.S. Armed Forces. While his full-time job as professor of business at Wayland Baptist University is not ending, Schacht will definitely spend less time juggling his two lives.

A native of Lockney, Schacht joined the U.S. Air Force in 1971 shortly after earning his bachelor's degree in agricultural engineering, serving as a missile systems analyst specialist stationed at Whiteman Air Force Base in Missouri. After an honorable discharge from active duty in 1975, Schacht completed his master's degree at Central Missouri State University in agriculture technology.

He remained in the inactive reserves for two years, finally ending his Air Force stint formally in 1977. While in the inactive reserves he pursued the doctorate in agricultural engineering at Texas A&M University in Bryan. Upon completion of the Ph.D. he began his civilian career in teaching at Texas Tech

His break in military service ended two months after starting at Texas Tech. Schacht returned to the military in October of 1978 in the U.S. Army Reserves, serving with the 4166th Reserve Forces School in Lubbock a part of the 90th U.S. Army Reserve Command in San Antonio. At this same point in time Schacht began working his way up the educational ladder. He served as an assistant professor at Texas Tech University and then at South Plains College before moving into division leadership at SPC. He came to Wayland as W.A. Mays Professor of Business in 1999 and was named chairman of the Division of Business in

All the while, Schacht was also working his way up the military ranks in the Army Reserve. Starting as a Specialist 4, he made Specialist 5 in October of 1979, in October 1980 he received a direct commission to

Captain and then made Major in 1987. He was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel in 1994 in the time on his hands after retiring 4166th U.S. Army Reserve Forces School and was named the first Commander of the 5th Battalion (Civil Affairs/Psychological Operations), 95th Regiment, 3rd Brigade (Combat Support), 95th Division (Institutional Training) in Lubbock

In 1999, the Army transferred him to the 95th Division (Institutional Training) Headquarters in Oklahoma City, where he served as Assistant Deputy Chief of Staff, Operations. With the promotion to Colonel in 2000, Schacht assumed the role of Deputy Chief of Staff, Logistics. In October 2002 he was named Commander of the 3rd Brigade (Combat Support), 95th Division (Institutional Training) in Tulsa.

As he retires, Schacht's final assignment brings him almost full circle, ending his military career in the same state where he began: Missouri. Since August 2005, he has served as Executive Officer to the Deputy Commanding General, Army Reserve, for Training and Mobilization at the Maneuver Support Center and Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

A juggling act was a perfect metaphor for Schacht as he led his two lives and helped raise his family. Having supportive employers helped immensely, he noted, and it didn't hurt that most were connected to the military themselves.

"When I first came to Texas Tech, my boss and the Chairman of the Agricultural Engineering Department was Marvin Dvoracek, who was also the Colonel commanding the 4166th Army Reserve School that I joined," Schacht recalled. "That fact probably helped me more than some others starting out as service personnel in other organizations. He understood from his perspective about jugging the two - military service and civilian job - and that made it easier for me. Plus, being in a school unit, we were teaching classes on military subjects, so it was very similar to what I was doing in my civilian life."



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Schacht said he found the same type of support at SPC, where Vice President Earl Gerstenberger was a retired Lieutenant Colonel from the New Mexico Army National Guard. When coming to Wayland, he made it clear up front in interviews that he hoped to continue serving his country in the Army Reserves as long as possible.

"I never had even a questioning word concerning what I was doing, and I strived to get done ' everything in my civilian job so my military career didn't jeopar-dize that," he said. "I felt like I needed to do both, and my employers were always very helpful in allowing me to do that."

Reflecting on the past few decades, wife Madonna noted that her husband's biggest challenge has been working his classes around his assignments out of town. Schacht planned far in advance for his absences, leaving tests or projects with division secretaries so his students kept up with their work... much to their

"They didn't get off easily, that's for sure," Madonna chuckled. "He worked hard to make sure he kept up with every-

Schacht was honored by 200plus family and friends on May 24 with a retirement/birthday party at Quaker Avenue Church of Christ in Lubbock. While preparing for the party, Madonna said his dual career of teaching and reserve duty has "been a good life," allowing the family to live well and serve their country. She and the couple's two grown sons, Fritz of Denton and Jackie-Don of Houston, have been involved in most of Schacht's military endeavors when possible, attending ceremonies, unit gatherings and other events over the years. All are supportive of his two loves: teaching and service to our nation.

'Madonna was very supportive of me and of the soldiers under my command. She was called the Donut Lady of the 95th Division in Oklahoma City because she'd bring donuts every morning before drills," he recalled.

Even with a changing military force and heightened security due to the Sept. 11 attacks on America, Schacht feels he's able to look back with fondness at a life well spent in service. Though he may not have ever imagined spending 30 years in military service, he doesn't regret the sacrifices that he made to achieve it.

"When I signed up in the Air Force, I thought that would be the end of my military career, but thankfully it has not been. I've been very blessed to be in the Army Reserves over the years," he said. "I'll miss the people more than anything, and that's always true."



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### USDA to open 24 million acres of CRP to haying and grazing

Washington, D.C. - Pheasants Forever (PF) and Quail Forever (QF) have a mix of reactions as a result of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's announcement to open more than 24 million acres of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) lands to having and grazing later this summer.

While the move holds some habitat benefits, it does create problems for hunters this fall and sends the wrong message about the value of CRP to America. Also looming is the recurring discussion about "early-outs" from CRP contracts.

On the positive, haying and grazing can be an excellent tool for landowners to perform the contractually required mid-contract management activities on their CRP acres. Disturbance of "old" grass stands does improve

ground-nesting birds.

In fact, nearly one-third of these acres are eligible for having and grazing every year without this USDA announcement. The USDA appropriately opened these acres after the primary nesting season for ground-nesting birds has ended. Appropriately, this announcement also did not make some of the most environmentally sensitive CRP acres eligible for this activity. CRP practices that include CREP, CCRP, riparian buffers, bobwhite buffers, and the new state-specific CP 38 wildlife practices are not eligible for haying and grazing.

tat, as well as the stand's ability working farm operation. Simito produce insects for young larly, USDA also recently began the soil rental rate up-date process; a move PF & QF supports as an excellent step to maintaining CRP as an economically competitive program.

However, there are significant negatives to this USDA move. First, the USDA's announcement sets the end date to having and grazing at November 10th. This late date is detrimental for habitat and hunters, and should be moved up to October 1st or earlier. By November 10th, it is too late for the growth of residual grass critical as nesting habitat

The decision also will have a dramatic impact on hunter access in states where public walk-in programs for hunters are tied to CRP acres. "Core pheasant hunting states like South Dakota, North Dakota, and Nebraska and quail states like Texas and Oklahoma stand to lose considerable fall cover for hunting opportunities depending upon how widely haying and grazing is implemented," explained Dave Nomsen, PF/QF's Vice President of Government Affairs.

"This USDA action sends a clear message to conservationists that while we finally have a new Farm Bill, our work to continue CRP's legacy for wildlife and natural resources is on-going," added Nomsen.

'The message conservationists need to deliver back to decision makers is that CRP acres should never be the rainy day solution to every hurdle in their path. For two years, we've heard of the demand for early-outs to CRP contracts to solve issues of limited commodity supplies and corn-based ethanol production. Today, it's a different use. Tomorrow, some other special interest group will want CRP acres for something else. Acres enrolled in CRP are already 'working lands;'

they are cleaning our waters, keeping our soils on the ground, creating habitat for wildlife, and providing opportunities for hunters. These are tangible benefits all Americans receive from CRP. We're hopeful this USDA announcement represents a onetime action to help farmers and ranchers that will also curtail pressures for early-outs. Compromising CRP's array of natural resource benefits will not be tolerated by conservationists, hunters, Pheasants Forever, or Quail Forever."

Pheasants Forever and Quail Forever are non-profit conservation organizations dedicated to the protection and enhancement of pheasant, quail, and other wildlife populations in North America through habitat improvement, land management, public awareness, and education. PF/QF has more than 127,000 members in 700 local chapters across the continent.



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### Applications are being accepted for emergency farm loans

Farm Loans for damages and losses caused by fires and high winds on January 1, 2008 and continuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Floydada and Crosbyton, Texas, for production and physical losses said Farm Loan Manager Becky V. Rainer.

Floyd County is one of ten (10) contiguous counties in Texas recently named by the Secretary of Agriculture eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the damand high winds.

Becky V. Rainer said, "Farmers may be eligible for loans up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial leaders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30% loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Ms. Rainer said. Farmers participat- It is authorized to provide disas-

proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

'Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until January 15, 2009 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Ms. Rainer said.



ciation of Texas Washington, DC - In a recent news conference, the U.S. Department of Agriculture joined in the public conversation about the relationship between food prices and biofuels, declaring the debate should be about the fact that we can have food and fuel, rather

than food "versus" fuel. Agriculture Secretary Ed. Schafer said higher oil prices affect much more than just the cost of driving, and are actually one of the major factors behind

higher food costs. "For food products, higher oil prices mean higher costs of transportation, processing, packaging and distribution, and all the other intermediary steps that bring commodities form the farm gate to the retail store," Schafer said. "Those steps account for approximately 80 cents of every retail dollar that is spent on food here in the United States.

Schafer reiterated that devel-

oping diversity in this country's noted. portfolio of fuels is an urgent matter and one that remains central to the country's energy and food security.

USDA's data revealed that higher food marketing and transportation costs, along with export restrictions have impacted food prices. USDA Chief Economist Dr. Joe Glauber stated that biofuels—such as ethanol—contribute to higher prices, but acknowledged that higher corn prices pass through to retail prices at a small rate. Glauber referenced a study by the Council of Economic Advisers showing the total global increase in corn ethanol production accounts for about 3 percent of the recent increases in global prices. Glauber noted the farm value of food costs is approximately 19 percent and farm input costs have been rising.

"While corn is the feedstock for over 90 percent of the biofuels that we produce, it is actually an ingredient in less than one-third of the everyday food items whose retail prices we track," Schafer

Schafer added that the growing middle class abroad, prosperity in developing markets, and drought have impacted global food prices. And he also responded to a reporter who asked about the Grocery Manufacturers Association's "undercover campaign" against ethanol. Schafer acknowledged that the associa-

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
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
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
