FISD votes to pay stipends for three assistant principals

During their regular board meeting, Tuesday, June 10, FISD Trustees voted 4-3 to have an assistant principal on each campus.

Trustees discussed, at length, whether or not to have assistant principals but in the end the vote came down to Bill Dean, Rachael Castillo, Lyle Miller, and Amado Morales voting in favor of Assistant Principals. Voting against were: Kerry Pratt, Bart Greer, and Marty Lucke.

FISD Superintendent Jerry Vaughn said the best case scenario would be to have an assistant at each campus.

"Since I've been here we did not have assistants at the two elementary campuses," said Vaughn.

Vaughn suggested to the Board that a consideration could be made to pay a stipend for the added duties of assistant principal, or set a salary for an assistant.

Vaughn told he Board that the district would be short one principal's salary of \$60,000 with

"Not yet," said Vaughn. "One is in the process of getting certified. Robin Nixon and Zach Logan are the closest we have."

At one point Trustee Amado Morales said, "I would rather see whoever gets the job continue to do what they're doing and give stipends for the extra work. I would recommend an extra \$10,000 on top of what they are getting."

Trustee Bill Dean said, "We are basically just adding one principal since we went down one position. We will be going back to the same structure as before."

"But when we sold the bond," said Trustee Kerry Pratt, "one of the things we said was we would be saving with the loss of one principal.'

"The principal's salary was

the closing of Andrews Elemen- \$60,000," said Vaughn, "this would be approximately \$30,000."

Discussion was also held on the amount of time the district would want the assistant to spend in the classroom.

Some of the trustees were concerned that a teacher taking Trustees went back and forth on the responsibility of an assistant would then have to quit teaching classes. Then the district would be faced with the expense of paying for another teacher.

Morales and Dean both made comments that they felt the administration could be trusted to be as efficient as they could be in assigning duties to staff to fill in the voids.

After several motions and amended motions the board ultimately voted on having an assistant principal at each campus with dual service contracts. Voting for the motion were Bill Dean, Rachael Castillo, Lyle Miller and Amado Morales. Voting against were Kerry Pratt, Bart Greer, and Marty Lucke.

TAKS scores up for FISD students

Preliminary TAKS results are out and FISD continues to show improvement in many subject areas, adding to their tremendous success over the past 5 years.

TAKS results are up in FISD and in most cases they have exceeded State averages.

FISD's new Director of Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment, Christine Bierman, presented the TAKS results for trustees during their regular meeting, Tuesday, June 10.

A six year review of results started in 2002-03 with TAKS results showing passing scores from the low of 38 in 10th grade Math to a high of 84 in 4th grade writing.

In 2003-04 scores showed a marked improvement from highs of 99 in 7th grade writing to the lowest score of 52 in 9th grade Math.

In 2004-05, 05-06, and 06-07 most scores had dropped again, but from 2004-2007, scores continued to show a steady and solid

increase in all areas. Several of the 2007-08 scores are once again at the high end of the charts.

Third grade reading had a score of 92--up from 66 in 2002-03. Math was down to 67 from last year's 70 but up from 05-06 score of 50.

Fourth grade reading, math, and writing were also up to 77, 85, and 89 from 54, 70, 84, respectively.

Fifth grade reading went from 57 in '02-'03 to 83 in '07-'08.

Sixth grade reading went from 69 to 91. 6th grade Math rose from 60 in 2002-03 to 70 in 2007-08, but fell from the previous year's score of 86.

Seventh grade reading was 77 in 2002-03 and is now holding steady at 82. Math went from 45 to 87. Writing went from 76 in 2002-03, 99 in '03-'04; and 95

in '04-'05. It has stayed consistent and now has a score of 95.

Eighth grade has shown dramatic improvement in reading and math. Reading scores in

2002-03 were 74 and are now 97. Math was 45 and is now 83. Social Studies has gone from 72 in 2002-03 to 73 this year. However last year's Social Studies score was 89. Eighth grade Science testing began in 2005-06 with a score of 76. It dropped to 60 in 2006-07 and to 49 this year.

Ninth grade scores in reading have climbed since 2002-03 from 66 to 90. Math has also climbed from 52 up to 86 in 2005-06 and back down to 78 in 2007-08.

Tenth grade scores were excellent. In English/language arts the 2002-03 score was 66 and has climbed to 94.

Math scores for 10th grade went from 38 to 82. Science scores went from 38 to 65. Social Studies went from 70 to 93. Exit level testing showed a

jump in the 2002-03 English/language arts score of 66 to the 2003-04 score of 89, then 88, 84, 91, and this year's score of 90.

Improvement was seen in the exit level math score of 67 in

2002-03, to 76, 75, 79, 93, and this year's 92.

Exit level Science went from 68, to 79, 54, 61, 86, and then 79.

Exit level Social Studies have fallen from the score of 99 in 2002-2003 to 93 in 2007-08, consistent with the region's average of 94.

Bierman told the board that the multi-year TAKS history for 2003-2007 shows an overall 36% increase change in "all students, all tests taken" compared to the State change of 23% in the same time period.

FISD is responsible for supplying teachers for PAC, budgets, and meeting state education requirements.

During the June 10th board meeting FISD Trustees reviewed projected expenditures and revenue for PAC.

The total budgeted for PAC was \$182,211.76. This included salaries, insurance, retirement, etc., for staff: Lee Hurt, Anne Jones, Shelly Miller, Chuck Bischoff, Chris Brattain, Corina \ Suarez, and Debbie Bertrand.

State and federal revenue for PAC in 2007-2008 was \$185,758.00.

'Seventy four percent of the kids that go through PAC are not from the 110th (Floyd County's Judicial District)," FISD Superintendent Jerry Vaughn told Trustees.

Of the 81 students served at PAC, 16 were from Floydada.

"All these students (except for Floydada because they are already counted) can be added into our ADA (Average Daily Attendance) count," said Vaughn. "We get paid for those extra students."

When asked by Trustee Bart Greer if "this was a good thing?", Vaughn said, "It's a wash."

"It is better now that the State has granted FISD 'alternative accountability'," said Vaughn.

According to Vaughn it no longer counts against FISD if a student from another district does not graduate while in PAC.

"Whether or not they graduate now goes back to the school district they are from," said Vaughn.

Vaughn said he had applied for the alternative accountability and as long as the district continues to get that the district won't be penalized.

'It (accountability) didn't hurt us last year and it won't hurt us this year," said Vaughn.

"We have also seen a marked improvement on re-enrollment into school of the students from PAC," said Vaughn.

Construction upgrades and changes reviewed by trustees

FISD Trustees met for their regular board meeting, June 10, and spent a great deal of time reviewing upgrade proposals on Duncan Elementary's construction from Grimes and Associates.

Bert Moffitt, architect for Grimes and Associates presented proposals for upgrades to tile in the classroom toilets, medallions at corridor intersections, and mud bed for quarry tile in the kitchen.

The mud bed was an unforeseen, but necessary, expense for the school.

According to Moffitt, the original drawing said the new quarry tile was to be installed over the existing concrete slab. When the old tile was removed, it was discovered that a thin/ unreinforced concrete topping slab had been used when the school was originally built. By not having any reinforcing in it, the old topping slab broke into

to furnish and install a new mud bed for the quarry tile. The total cost will be \$10,424.04.

Moffitt provided a cost to upgrade the floors in the old bathrooms

Originally the district had planned on not replacing the ceramic tile in the old toilet areas. To revise the floor finish to vinyl tile in each bathroom would add an expense of \$2,061.70.

Another upgrade provided for colored medallions in the floor tile in the corridors. Each additional color would be \$130. The three additional colors would cost the school \$498.20.

The medallions were considered good "gathering" points for students.

Trustee Marty Lucke made the motion to accept the upgrades and changes and Bill Dean made the second. In favor were Kerry Pratt, Rachael Castillo, Lucke,

During upgrade discussions trustees were told that the contingency fee for construction costs now stood at \$317,762.29. The original set aside contingency fee had been \$250,000. This grew to \$472,130.48 after refunds were given and lower bids came in.

The board asked for a detailed report on contingency money spent and details for any future costs for upgrades.

Trustees also entered into discussion concerning putting fiber optic connections to the campuses. The connections will be necessary in the future for PEIMS programs.

Vaughn told the board that up until the day of their meeting he was going to bring a proposal from Advanced Wiring LLC, of




During the summer months we meet once a month and do different activities with any child





Since 1929 the United States Department of Agriculture has been prohibited from publishing forecassts of cotton prices except for its own internal use. That all changed with the passage of the Food, Conservation and Energy Act of 2008 last month, which removed the ban and allows USDA to resume the practice.

USDA's first Upland Cotton

price forecast was included in this week's Economic Research Service's (ERS) World Supply and Demand Estimates report released June 10.

In the report USDA forecast the 2007;2008 Upland Cotton weighted average price received by farmers at 57 cents per pound, very much inline with the yearto-date weighted average price received for 2007-crop Upland Cotton calculated using the monthly sales and marketing information reported by USDA in the monthly National Agricultural Statistics service (NASS)

also included a forecasted range for 2008/2009 crop cotton prices of 58-72 cents per pound with a

mid-point near the 65-cent level. According to the WASDE report the latest information available to USDA points to future reductions in both U.S. and world cotton stocks and a slight increase in overall cotton use that will be a net positive influence on 2008crop cotton prices.

Roundup this year attracted some 2,900 4-H members, parents and volunteers for a series of statewide competitions, scholarship awards and fun.


