Duncan Elementary School construction continues and Floydada High School to receive new roof

"Construction is going very well," stated superintendent Jerry Vaughn concerning the progress on the Duncan Elementary construction site. "We've poured the terrazo on the floor. Sheetrocking is about 50 percent complete. About 99 percent complete on the masonry work. The rest of the windows should be on site within 10 to 12 days."

When asked if there had been any more copper pipes stolen from the construction site since the last board meeting, Vaughn said, "Since we put it under a watchman, we haven't had any more thefts."

"(We're) still online for the original completion date," Vaughn stated. "It (the building) is really pretty impressive. It's not oversized; it's very functional. It's something the community can be proud of."

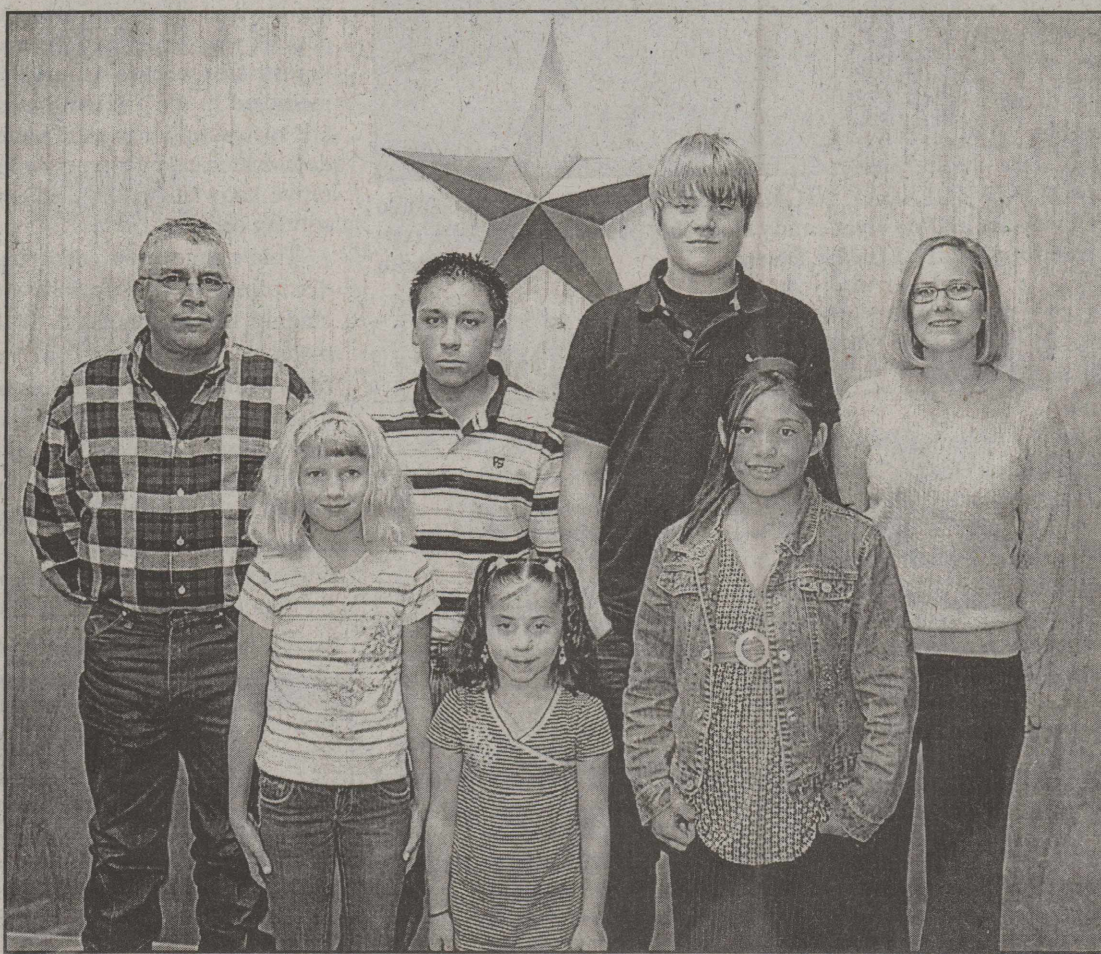
Another topic discussed at the regular Floydada Independent School District board meeting was the FISS District and Campus Improvement Plans for 2008-2009. According to Vaughn, these plans consist of educational improvements the school district is making based on last year's ABIS report (Academic Excellence Indicator System). The plans shows that a few of these improvements include new science and math curriculum for the elementary school and making available college classes for those in high school.

Also discussed at the Oct. 14 meeting was the need for a new roof on the high school. Vaughn said concerning the current roof, "It leaks like a sieve."

According to school records, the current metal roof was put on around 1988 and the original building and roof was built in 1956-1957.

The board unanimously approved the motion to use Grimes and Associates as the architects and engineers for roofing the Floydada High School. Grimes and Associates has already begun getting specifications for the roof and will start the bidding process soon.

When asked if the roofing project would be done over the summer or before, Vaughn said,

"We can certainly roof while school is in session."

Also unanimously approved was the track resurfacing project to be carried out by Hellas Construction Inc. The new track surface will be laid over the original asphalt surface once repairs have been made to the asphalt, and then the Sports Zone 200 surface (a synthetic sport surface with rubber) will be installed.

Another exciting addition for the district is the Global Connect automated calling system. Vaughn is very excited about this addition and especially with the first nine months being free says, "It's real affordable."

According to the superintendent's report, the cost of the system is only two dollars per student per year.

Vaughn says this automated calling and notification system will be used to inform parents of

everything from bad weather and school closings to things like their child's class party and disciplinary notifications.

November 16-20 Vaughn and a few high school students will be traveling to Washington, D.C., where the students have been asked to speak at SETDA, the State Educational Technology Directors Association Conference.

"I spoke there last year," Vaughn said of the SETDA conference. "Dr. Mary Ann Wolf, SETDA's executive director, wants us to bring the students to D.C."

The students will speak at the SETDA conference on Tuesday, Nov. 18.

Students of the month from A.B. Duncan Elementary were Azaela Garza (1st grade) and Whitney Renfro (4th grade). The junior high's student of the month

was Bethany Morales (6th grade) and the high school's was seniors Rallo Mercado.

Kari Calcote, special education teacher at the high school, was named educator of the month and Abe Enriquez was named support staff of the month.

Upcoming events for the district are the school Thanksgiving dinners. The high school will have their dinner on Monday, Nov. 17; pre-kindergarten's through second grader's dinner will be Tuesday, Nov. 18; the junior high will enjoy their meal on Wednesday, Nov. 19; and the third through fifth graders will have their Thanksgiving dinner on Thursday, Nov. 20.

Vaughn says times will be announced later and to please make reservations with your campus before Friday, Nov. 14. The cost to parents and community members is \$5.

Early voting continues

Many of Floyd County's citizens have taken advantage of the early and absentee voting options.

As of Tuesday afternoon, Lockney has had 323 early voters and more than 660 have voted in Floydada.

The county clerk, Marilyn Holcomb, says she has sent out around 210 absentee ballots this year. Currently, she has received back around 75 percent of those ballots.

Polling Locations

Election day, November 4, promises to be another busy day, and hopes are high for a good

\$27 million undeliverable refunds and stimulus payments await Texans

Twelve Floyd County residents included

The Internal Revenue Service is looking for Texas taxpayers who are missing more than 30,700 economic stimulus checks totaling more than \$19 million and more than 9,000 regular refund checks totaling more than \$8 million that were returned by the U.S. Postal Service due to mailing address errors.

Nationwide, more than 279,000 economic stimulus checks totaling about \$163 million and more than 104,000 regular refund checks totaling about \$103 million were returned to the IRS.

"All you have to do is update your address with the IRS so we can send it to the right place," said Clay Sanford, an IRS spokesman in Dallas.

Stimulus Checks

It is crucial that taxpayers who may be due a stimulus check update their addresses with the IRS by Nov. 28, 2008. By law, economic stimulus checks must be sent out by Dec. 31 of this year. The undeliverable economic stimulus checks average \$583.

The "Where's My Stimulus Payment?" tool on IRS.gov is the quickest and easiest way for a taxpayer to check the status of a stimulus check and receive instructions on how to update his or her address. Taxpayers without internet access should call 1-866-234-2942.

Regular Refunds

The regular refund checks that were returned to the IRS average \$897 in Texas. These checks are sent as soon as taxpayers update their address.

Taxpayers can update their addresses with the "Where's My Refund?" tool on IRS.gov. It enables taxpayers to check the status of their refunds. A taxpayer must submit his or her social security number, filing status and

amount of refund shown on their 2007 return. The tool will provide the status of their refund and in some cases provide instructions on how to resolve delivery problems.

Taxpayers checking on a refund over the phone will be given instructions on how to update their addresses. Taxpayers can access a telephone version of "Where's My Refund?" by calling 1-800-829-1954.

Unsure?

Taxpayers not sure of which type of check they may be due should check on a potential economic stimulus check first because of the looming deadline. See instructions above.

For Most People

The vast majority of checks mailed out by the IRS reach their rightful owner every year. Only a very small percent are returned by the U.S. Postal Service as undeliverable.

Through September 2008, the government distributed 116 million economic stimulus payments with only about 279,000 checks being undeliverable. Meanwhile, the IRS has distributed more than 105 million regular refunds this year with only about 104,000 being undeliverable. In both cases, well under one percent of refunds or stimulus checks were undeliverable.

Avoiding Future Problems

The IRS encourages taxpayers to choose direct deposit when they file their return because it puts an end to lost, stolen or undeliverable checks. Taxpayers can receive refunds directly into personal checking or savings accounts. Direct deposit is available for filers of both paper and electronic returns.

The IRS also encourages taxpayers to file their tax returns

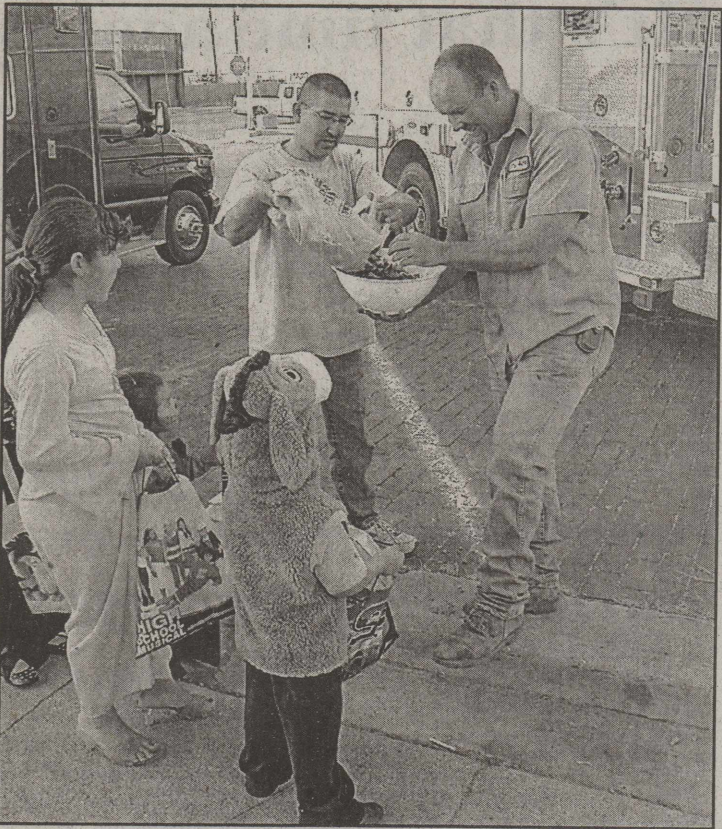

Change the channel on TV medication commercials

Irma Lerma Rangel College of Pharmacy:

The next time you see a pharmaceutical commercial on your television, the best thing for your health is to change the channel. "Once a patient believes a medication causes certain side effects, it is very hard for physicians to prescribe it to the patient," said Juan Castro, M.D., assistant professor of pharmacy practice at the Texas A&M Health Science Center Irma Lerma Rangel College of Pharmacy. "You have to do a lot of talking and hope they decide to take the prescription as part of their treatment."

Some patients will even begin to experience the side effects they hear during the commercials psychologically, Dr. Castro said. "There are patients who hear something and then come down with those side effects," Dr. Castro said.

On the opposite end of the spectrum are the patients who hear about the medications from high-profile actors or doctors on television and decide those are the medicines they need to get better. "Remember, it is a sales pitch," Dr. Castro said. "If you have a question, call your pharmacist or physician, and that health professional will direct you to do what is best for your health."

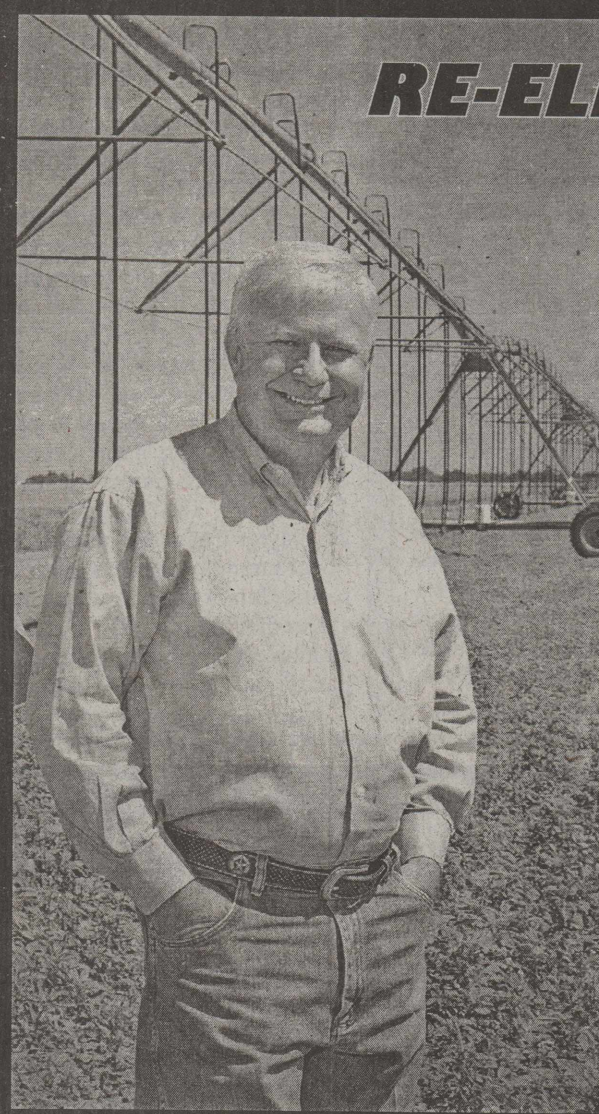

Halloween safety tips from TxDOT

On Halloween, your neighborhood will literally be swarming with children, and it's your job to be sure they take their treats home safely. Trick-or-treating, a fun-filled activity that little ghosts and goblins look forward to each October, can quickly turn into a night of horror if someone is hurt.

For motorists, the scariest part of Halloween is children, dressed in dark colors and in costumes that cover their eyes, out walking on streets and roadways at dusk when many adults are still driving home from work.

Sadly, Halloween is a dangerous night. While excited trick-or-treaters may forget the rules of the road and be oblivious to the hazards, motorists must be vigilant. The CDC found that the number of deaths among young pedestrians (ages 5-14) is four times higher on Halloween evening than any other evening of the year. Data from the USDOT shows that:

Fatal collisions between motor vehicles and young pedestrians (under 15 years of age) happen most frequently between 4 p.m. and 8 p.m. - prime trick-or-treating time.

84% of deaths among young pedestrians occurred at non-intersection locations (indicating children are most likely to dart and dash from mid-block into the street).

Halloween is also one of the year's most dangerous holidays on the road due to alcohol-related crashes caused by those who drink and drive after parties and festivities. Two-thirds of all highway fatalities at Halloween are alcohol-related. Don't even think about getting behind the wheel if you're impaired.

Halloween Driving "Tricks" To Keep Everyone Safe!

Don't use a cell phone while driving through neighborhoods. A single distraction could lead to a tragedy.

Stay well below the posted speed limit.

Pay attention to what's happening on sidewalks and roadways. Watch for children darting across streets, especially between parked cars.

Be extra alert when pulling in and out of driveways.

Do not assume children can see you or are paying attention. You need to take that responsibility.

Drivers should also check that all lights on their car are working.

Do not pass other vehicles that have stopped in the roadway.... they could be dropping off children.

If you're driving a group of children, but staying in the running vehicle at the curb, be sure to put on your hazard lights to alert other motorists.

And, if you're driving to a Halloween party, put that mask on after you park the car.

Parents can help motorists, too!

Make sure drivers can see the children. Give them flashlights and glow sticks. Dress kids in bright, reflective clothing or use reflective tape on their costumes.

Use makeup, rather than masks, so children have a clear, unobstructed view of their surroundings.

Be sure children know how to cross a street - look left, right and left again, as well as over their shoulder, before crossing.

Instruct children to stay on sidewalks and to cross only at corners or crosswalks.

Accompany your children as they trick or treat.

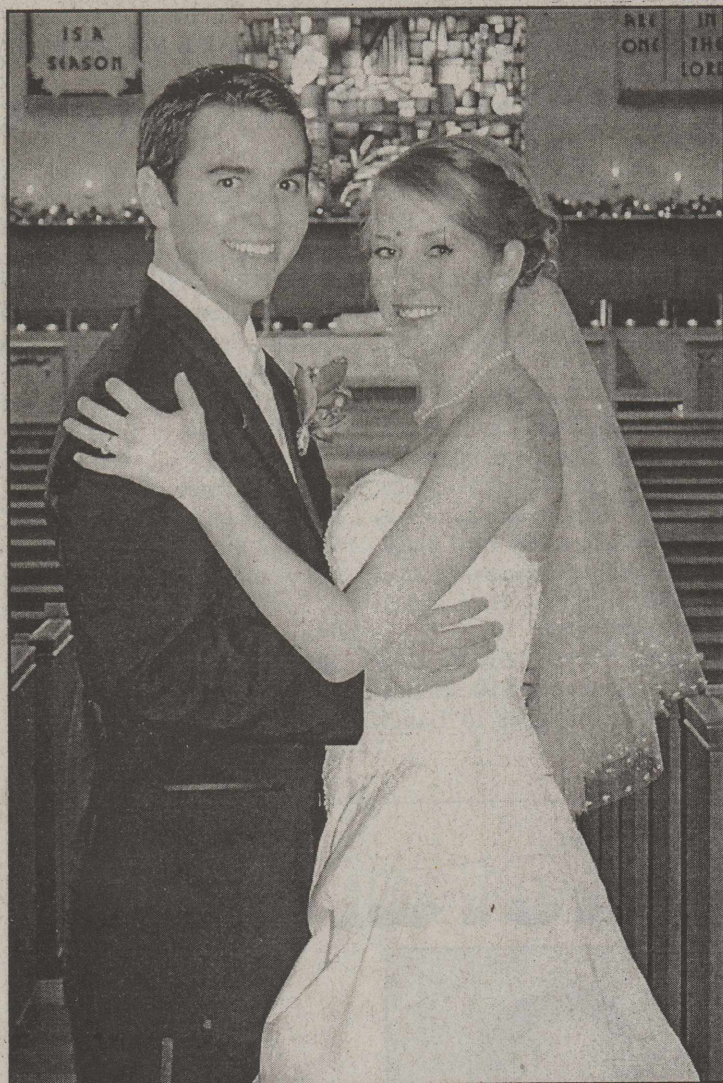

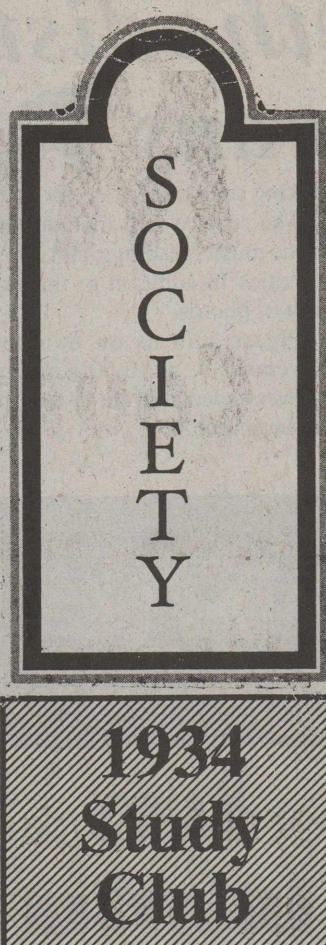
The registry table was hosted by high school friends, Robin Sanders and Jenna Payne, both of Floydada.

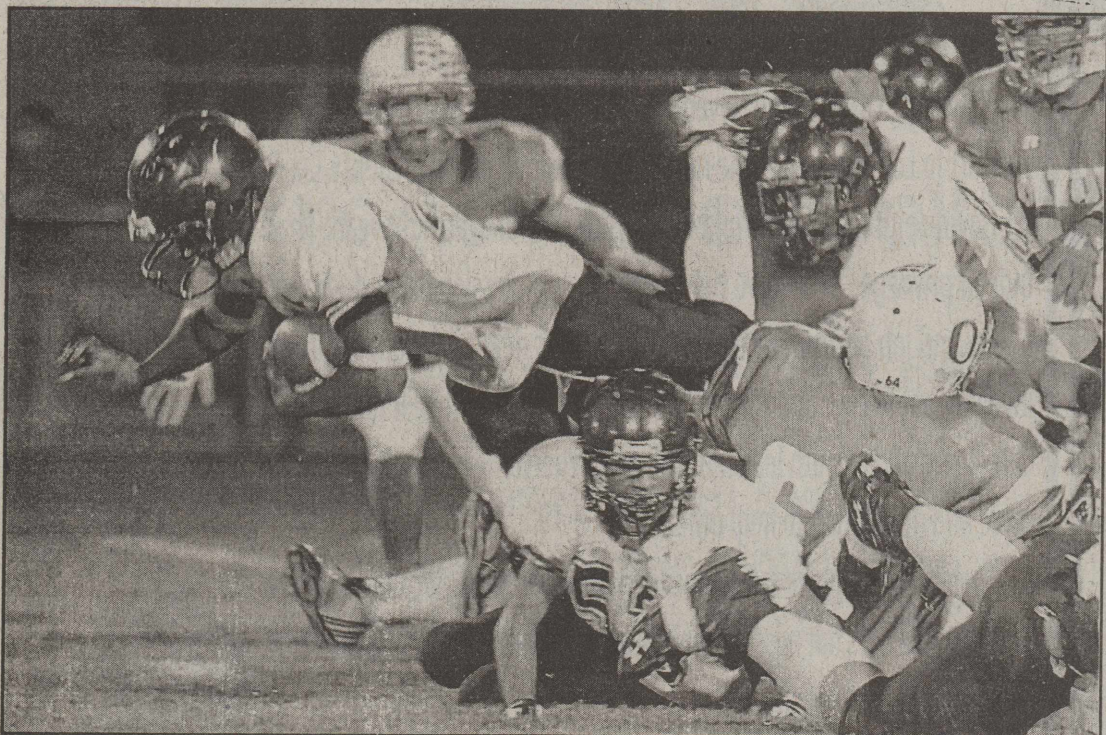

The game ended with Friona collecting a win and keeping their playoff hopes alive with a final score of 24-0.
