■ After years of searching, Lockney's Lori Smith-O'Neal reunited with her birth mother and family

On Sept. 22, 2008, Lori Smith-O'Neal talked to her birth mother for the very first time. "I've been looking for her for 20 years," Lori said in an interview. "I finally

Lori's story starts 38 years ago when her 15-year-old mother, Rebecca O'Neal, gave birth to her in a Dallas hospital. Becky, as Rebecca is known, had three options from which to choose, she told Lori as they talked

about what happened all those years ago. She could keep Lori whom she wanted to name Monica - and have her own mother help raise her, she could give Lori to an aunt and uncle to raise her or she could give

her up for adoption. Becky said her mother already had eight kids, so that option wasn't very viable and that she couldn't stand the thought of having to pretend she was her own daughter's cousin. So, Becky chose to give Lori up for adoption.

Lori was excited as this was just shortly before her birthday, "I thought, oh, wow, this is what I've wanted for my birthday all my life. I'm going to get it this year."

Floyd County tax abatement might not be allowed by law

After unanimous approval from the commissioner's court, a tax abatement agreement with Texas Land Partners, LP, was signed by Judge Penny Golightly Monday, Nov. 10.

However, the tax abatement included in the leased lands. agreement may or may not be allowed by law.

According to Renewable Systems' (RES) representatives, Wes Jackson and Philip Moore, the attorney general (AG) has issued an opinion that says counties cannot enter into tax abatement agreements. This AG opinion will probably be discussed in the next legislative session.

Jackson and Moore said if the opinion is overturned, the tax abatement will already be in place, but if not, the abatement agreement will be null and

Judge Golightly asked what would happen if the legislature does not judge in favor of the abatements. Moore's reply was, "It would definitely put a cloud over the project."

The court was asked to consider the Justice Court Technology Fee resolution. Judge Golightly explained this was a small fee that would be taken out of court fees to help pay for the technology and computer programs the county

But, the first time around, the Dallas County courthouse lost her request. Then, their first response was lost by the post office.

Lori finally called them and asked, "Is there any information you can give me over the phone because I've been waiting so long?"

The lady said, "Hang on; let me look." She came back on the phone and said, "Her name is Rebecca O'Neal."

"Our first encounter was over the phone," Lori explained. "I tracked down one of her brothers (found through the information given her from the Dallas County courthouse)... and he said he'd have her call

me."

"Within three hours I was talking to her."

When asked what the first thing she said to her birth mom over the phone after the facts had all been confirmed, she said she told her mom, "I have been looking for you for 20 years."

"Really?" Becky asked, "Because I've been looking for you."

At the end of October, Becky flew out to Dallas from her home in Chattanooga, Tenn., and she and her 35-year-old son Jonathan drove straight to Lockney to meet Lori in person.

When she saw her, Becky said, "Hello, baby, it's been a

long time coming."

"We both cried," Lori said.

Lori now has a new, very large, family. She has six aunts and uncles still alive, as well as a great-aunt and great-uncle.

She also has two brothers and one sister, Jonathan, 35, Jeanette, 30, and Sean, 20.

Lori also discovered she has a second cousin living here in Floyd County: Allen Samuel, the manager of Producers in Floydada.

When asked how she felt now that she has found who she's been looking for all these years, Lori said, "I feel complete. I feel like I don't have to live a lie anymore, 'cause I know who I am."

For the last eight years the relationship between agriculture and the Bush-led USDA has been a challenging one, says Plains Cotton Growers Executive Vice President Steve Verett.

"We hope that the new Secretary of Agriculture will be an outspoken advocate for American agriculture's interests, and work to ensure a safe and reliable supply of food and fiber to American consumers," said Verett.

He concluded, "We look forward to working with the Obama administration at USDA and hope they will find a way to communicate their opinions about agriculture policy while simultaneously deferring to the will of Congress, and the bi-partisan spirit from which U.S. agriculture policy is developed, when delivering these programs."

Final 2007-Crop Cotton Price Calculation

Reveals Need to Tweak NASS **Procedures**

The recent announcement that end of year revisions to preliminary price and marketing data for Upland cotton during the 2007 marketing year ended July 31 had resulted in a 2.2-cent decline in the anticipated 2007-crop Upland cotton Counter-cyclical program payment had many growers scratching their heads and left more than a few bankers scrambling to refigure balance sheets.

Initial frustration was directed at the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service, which conducts the survey tracking cotton price and marketing data throughout the marketing year. The real crux of the problem, however, is that NASS waits until the end of the year to make adjustments to the preliminary price and marketing information they receive.

The use of this number by the Farm Service Agency to calculate the final Counter-cyclical program payment rate creates a situation that encourages cotton farmers, bankers and producer organizations track the monthly marketings being reported by NASS to anticipate what the final payment rate might be at the end of the year.

Unfortunately, the procedures NASS follows to ensure the accuracy of the final number, which includes not including late-filed monthly reports until the end of the marketing year and allowing survey respondents to revise previously reported data after the end of the year, are not very conducive to a running, end-of-year

price projection. "PCG discussed and made recommendations about the procedures used to gather the survey information with our

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friends at NASS several years ago and we understand the process by which these numbers are gathered," explains Verett.

Understanding the process and the interest of producers in keeping track of prices and marketings during the growing season, Plains Cotton Growers Executive Vice President Steve Verett suggests USDA NASS consider modifying their procedures to provide for quarterly revisions to their preliminary data to provide a more timely reflection of the impact that late-filed survey responses and mid-year data corrections are having.

He explains that by revising the preliminary data "on the fly," USDA will limit the potential for a big surprise at the end of the marketing year when the final price calculation is made.

"Our suggestion isn't designed to add to the data collection burden on the folks at NASS," says Verett. "All we would really like to see is for them to take the initiative to update their preliminary numbers on a more timely basis as additional data is made available to them. We have the utmost respect for the job NASS does and this change would further enhance the confidence cotton producers have in the NASS data used to calculate key provisions of the safety net underpinning their operations."

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
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
