

ress," Joe Grimes of Grimes & Associates reported about the elementary school project to the Floydada Independent School District Board of Trustees at their monthly meeting on Nov. 13. "The brickwork is almost done. The kitchen is beginning to look like a kitchen. The ceiling tile people are moving through the building at a pretty good rate (and) within the next heat on.'

"We're pretty comfortable with what's going on now," he continued. "Most of the contractors are getting their jobs done."

Grimes brought up a few additional items that needed to be addressed by the board, such as a cafeteria sound system, an intercom system and enlarging

the northeast parking lot. The board unanimously passed the purchase and installation of an intercom system that runs the class bells, clocks, and even IP phones. The system to be purchased must meet final approval by Superintendent Jerry Vaughn per the FISD Board of Trustees.

Also, the board passed the motion to purchase the built-in sound system recommended by Grimes to install in the new

elementary school cafeteria. Spotlights with dimmers for the cafeteria stage were also considered, but the motion

"We're making good prog-failed three to three, with board members Lyle Miller, Rachael Castillo and Bart Greer voting against it at this time. They explained this is a project that can wait until a later date to be considered.

Another item considered was the installation of electrical outlets in the ceiling of each classroom for the potential use of ceiling-mounted projectors. This item would cost \$10,000 two weeks we should have if done at this point in the conthe building enclosed and the struction project, but information was still being gathered at the time of the meeting concerning whether the school district could afford the mounting devices and installation of those mounting devices for the projectors they already own.



According to Grimes, the northeast parking lot, designated as the staff parking lot, is currently large enough to hold only the staff. There was a motion made to double the size of the lot while the workers and the equipment are already in Floydada.

Grimes informed the board this project could easily enough be done at some future date if the need was made evident without much additional cost to the school district. Lucke, Greer and Morales voted to enlarge the parking lot now; Kerry Pratt, Miller and Castillo voted to wait. The vote was a tie, so the motion failed.

Another item the board approved unanimously was to install a swipe card door lock system on all seven external doors. This will allow the elementary school greater security by giving them the ability to change the lock code on all swipe cards as frequently as they desire. According to the figures provided by Grimes, this particular system will cost the district approximately \$10,000.

This swipe card door lock system was chosen over a similar system (costing approximately \$30,000) that would have included a computer monitoring system to record who entered and exited the building throughout the day. Vaughn suggested the board "take the difference between the \$30,000 and \$10,000 and put in security cameras." He explained that this would allow not just the comings and goings to be monitored for safety and security reasons, but would give the staff the ability to monitor all school hallways.

Another subject discussed at the meeting was the sale of Lot 22 in Dougherty to Mike and Carol Rainwater. The motion to sell was unanimously approved.

The school district's insurance policy was also up for consideration. Vaughn explained to the board

that their agreement with their current provider had already been bid but the board had the option to open it up for bids from other insurance providers.

He said, "We can go out for bids, but (they) can

The motion to stay with the district's current provider failed with a tie: Miller, Lucke and Morales voted for; Pratt, Castillo and Greer voted against.

After more discussion concerning the district's insurance, a motion was made to go out for bids on insurance. This motion passed five to one, with Morales voting against.

The board also decided to go out for bids on the proposed parking lot across from the FHS gymnasium. Bids for both blacktop and caliche will be

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

I love Chicken Parmesan at Italian restaurants and I usually order it or Veal Parmesan when I visit one. However, there s nothing like a homemade version. Try this and you ll agree

A few tips before the recipe I I can. This is not mandatory but I like mine thin and crispy. Also, you can make your own sauce; Panko bread crumbs, pinch of salt, ously sprinkle the Mozzarella I m just too lazy for that. So I use pinch of pepper, 3 eggs whatever looks good in the jar at the store. I ve literally made good. I prefer to make this recipe and pepper. Wash the chicken in the pasta and enjoy.

I guess I should go ahead and with Panko bread crumbs. Those are Japanese style bread crumbs which cannot be purchased here. I order them online from a Japanese grocer but regular ol bread crumbs work too.

Ingredients

1 large jar spaghetti sauce, 1 can roasted garlic tomato sauce, 6 chicken breasts, Angel Hair pasta, 2 tbs. butter, 1/4 cup white pound the chicken breast as flat as wine, Parmesan cheese (grating your own is best, but Kraft is fine)shredded Mozzarella cheese,

Pound the chicken breasts as it with 10 or 12 different jarred flat as you like. In a pie plate, sauces and it always turns out beat the eggs with a pinch of salt

Heat just until butter melts. Pour over the chicken. Generously sprinkle the Parmesan to cover the chicken and sauce. Cover with foil and bake at 350 for 45 minutes.

Remove from oven and generover the chicken.

Bake uncovered for 10 more minutes. Prepare the Angel Hair per the package instructions. Serve the chicken and sauce over



Second, viewers might consider purchasing a more recently manufactured TV set that has a digital tuner already built-in.

Third, they can connect all TV sets to a cable or other TV service provider. While Effros recommends that all TV viewers prepare in advance for the Feb. 17. transition, he believes advanced preparation is especially critical for people who select the first option: a converter box.

"The federal government has a limited supply of coupons to help with the cost of those boxes," he said. "Meanwhile, demand will







The early returns are in and it appears that the 2008 crop will not be able to meet expectations. The main culprit is, as usual, the weather.

USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service's November 10 Crop Production Report illustrated the declining fortunes of the. 2008 High Plains Upland cotton crop with a season high 160,000 bales reduction in the production forecast for Texas crop reporting districts 1-N and 1-S. The November forecast calls for the area to produce 3.41 million bales, down from the previous month's estimate of 3.57 million.

NASS's initial production estimate, released August 12, estimated the High Plains area would produce an even higher 3.67 million bales. Statewide the Texas cotton crop forecast mostly followed the High Plains lead with a 200,000bale reduction to 5.1 million bales. The U.S. Upland cotton forecast was down one percent from the previous month as well coming in at 13.1 million bales.

The reasons for a declining High Plains crop estimate can be traced to the start of the 2008-growing season. Early on it was a persistently dry and windy Spring weather pattern that provided very little in the way of planting moisture and exacerbated a planting season dry spell. Those conditions led to the failure of approximately one million acres of mostly dryland cotton that never came up and a smaller percentage of irrigated acres that were lost to hail or blowing sand.

During the season the area added several hundred thousand acres to the "failed" column from scattered hail events and other causes. Altogether an estimated 1.32 million acres of cotton have been abandoned so far on the High Plains.

Most of the 1.97 million acres of cotton that remain was classified from the start as being 'fair' to 'good' with precious few acres garnering an 'excellent' rating.

Despite the challenges, by mid-season things appeared to be

turning around. Timely rains had PRODUCER'S COOPERATIVE

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allowed the remaining crop to set an abundant, but late, number of bolls. All that was needed to pull a noteworthy crop out of a disastrous start was a little help from Mother Nature.

Unfortunately, the late-season weather growers needed never materialized and the crop was brought to an early termination with a near-killing freeze that zapped the top out of many fields and is now the prime suspect in the high number of barky bales being reported from both the Lubbock and Lamesa cotton classing

Reducing Bark Is Biggest 2008 Harvest Challenge

USDA-AMS Cotton Division Classing office reports through November 13 indicate 34.3 percent of the 361,344 bales classed at Lubbock and 39.3 percent of the 118,606 bales classed at Lamesa have been marked down for bark content.

Reducing or preventing bark content in harvested cotton is one of the biggest challenges a grower faces, but is also one of the quality parameters that growers have some ability to impact with a few modifications in what they are doing in the field. History tells us that it is virtually impossible to completely eliminate barky cotton when a crop is predisposed to that unwelcome condition.

Evidence is mounting that says the combination of late, succulent cotton and an early freeze has created a huge potential for bark

Fortunately, years of experience and research into the issue have provided a set of harvesting guidelines and recommendations for growers that can help reduce harvested cotton.

The first source for guidance on this topic is the 2008 Harvest-Aid Guide published by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service.

High Plains AgriLife Extension Cotton Specialist Dr. Randy Boman notes that page eight of the 2008 Harvest-Aid Guide, (http://lubbock.tamu.edu/cotton/pdf/harvestaidhandout2008. pdf), contains a nice overview of recommendations to growers for setting up stripper harvesters to minimize the potential for bark contamination.

Two other publications can also be downloaded that provide a similar set of recommendations for reducing bark content in harvested cotton. The first is a pamphlet put out in the early 1990's by the High Plains Barky Cotton Task Force. The second is the Texas Agricultural Extension Service publication "Reducing Barky Cotton," which is of slightly newer vintage, but still contains pertinent information and strategies that can help growers combat barky cotton this harvest season.

Both publications, as well as the 2008 Harvest-aid Guide, are available for download from the Plains Cotton Growers website. Just go to the PCG Home page (www.plainscotton.org) and click on the links provided.

- · Try to harvest cotton in the 8-10 percent moisture range.
- Make stripper adjustments and reconfigure as necessary when moving from field to field.
- · Consider modification of stripper paddle rolls to reduce plant material in seed cotton.
- Don't build cotton modules on top of old cotton stalks or other crop material to avoid con-

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

This week, Congress may vote on legislation that would provide government assistance to the automotive industry and attempt to stimulate the economy by further increasing spending on government programs. As Members of Congress assess this legislation, I ask my colleagues to consider the question, "Where do you draw the line?"

From the beginning, I have been against major government intervention into our financial markets. I voted no against the first economic rescue package because I believed the legislation was not the best way to solve the problems faced by our economy.

I continue to believe that American taxpayers, who made conservative lending and investment decisions, should not have to pay for the mistakes made on Wall Street, nor should future generations have to pay for these mistakes as well.

Unfortunately the decision to intervene in our marketplace has created a situation in which future generations will pay a significant price and a situation in which a large portion of our country's economic activity is now backstopped by the

federal government. After speaking with many financial professionals, I'm not yet convinced that further government intervention will address the issues of these struggling

automotive companies or the current state of our economy. As Congress reconvenes to consider additional legislation, we must decide where to draw the line.




