

Sergeant Willis receives top ATC award

Being a good cop these days is no simple task. Being the best in all of Air Training Command is a monumental chore.

But to TSgt. Valton J. Willis it was a matter of just "doing my job."

Speaking in the slow drawl of a Wapanucka, Okla. native, Sergeant Willis explained his feelings about being named Air Training Command Security Police NCO of the Year for 1972.

"It was a great honor to me personally," the sergeant noted amid a series of short telephone interruptions. "I don't know just why I was selected, but it makes me very proud."

Air Force Competition

Sergeant Willis will now move on to represent ATC in the Air Force-wide

competition. Referring to that competition, Col. Walter H. Baxter, wing commander, remarked, "It is my sincere hope that USAF will recognize his (Sergeant Willis') many efforts, deeds and talents as all of us do at Reese AFB."

A veteran of more than 18 years in the Security Police field, the graying sergeant attributes much of his success to his "people approach". "I have an 'open door' policy with my people and encourage them to come to me with their problems."

Additional Duties

During 1972 Sergeant Willis served as Operations sergeant in addition to his regular duties as superintendent of the Security Police Division, an E-8 slot.

He was honored twice in 1972 at Reese

as NCO of the Quarter for January through March 1972 and as Wing NCO of the Year for 1972.

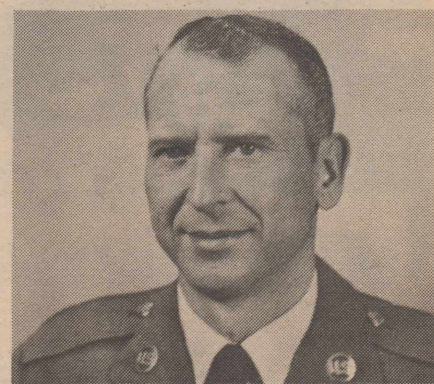
A graduate of the NCO Academy, the sergeant's duties also include acting as Security Police on-scene commander during Broken Arrow exercises and actual or simulated aircraft accidents.

Commander's Commendation

In nominating Sergeant Willis for the Command award, Colonel Baxter stated, "He is one of the most outstanding Security Police noncommissioned officers I have had the pleasure to have in my command. His bearing, demeanor and performance of duty would make him an asset to any Security Police unit in the Air Force."

The 35-year-old sergeant came to

Reese in 1970 following a tour in Vietnam. His wife is the former Miss Joyce E. Elmore and they have three children.

Savings Bond drive reaches half-way point

About half-way through the 1973 Savings Bond Campaign, Reese and local military agencies have done quite a bit of advancing toward achieving their units' goals.

At the outset of the drive, the records showed that the participation rate was about 30.2 per cent. Since that time, the participation rate has risen to 43.8 per cent as of May 11.

Red and Blue

When you drive in to the main gate you see the "How Goes It" board with red and blue markings on it. The red represents the participation rate before the campaign started and the blue is the progress that has been made since the beginning of the program.

The ultimate payoff will come from the benefits that accrue to our enlisted force as they receive well-deserved recognition for their learning experiences in the Air Force.

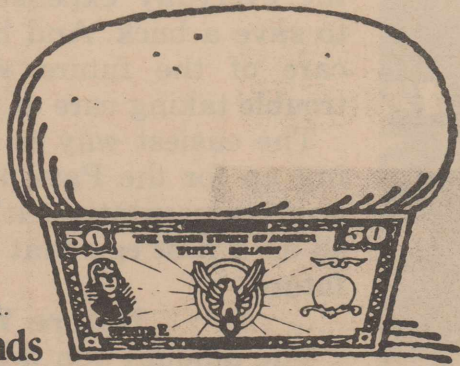
Future challenges are formidable. As the all-volunteer force takes shape over

Why can't we use eight lanes of the Reese bowling facility for the league's play instead of splitting the league into two shifts and using two lanes for open bowling?

Research reveals that while league play comprises less than one fourth of

the Reese Lanes' operational hours it accounts for more than three-fourths of its business. This means few non-league bowlers have used the lanes during league play.

Consequently, in the future leagues will use all eight lanes at the Reese facility but with a slight change in hours—from 7:45 p.m. to 10 p.m. instead of from 7 p.m. until 9:15 p.m. This will allow open bowling for an additional 45 minutes before league play begins and still make all eight lanes available for league play.

NCO/Airman council meets for discussion

The Wing NCO/Airman Advisory Council held its monthly meeting April 30 in the NCO Open Mess with Col. Walter H. Baxter, wing commander, presiding as chairman.

Items under the old business classification at the meeting included the discussion of changing loan policies at the Reese AFB Federal Credit Union. Capt. John R. Beaty, Credit Union Board president, explained why the loan policies would not change. He mentioned that credit union auditors have found the facility in excellent order and a change in policy would not be necessary.

Special Order Meat

The next item was on the subject of special order meats in the Commissary. The meat market

manager has had to discontinue large locker orders due to austere manning. However, small special orders will continue to be filled on a time available basis.

After a report was delivered to the NCO/Airman council, it was determined that the best possible service was being given in the Wing Dining Hall. It was also suggested that anyone having complaints about that service should direct their comments to the dining hall supervisors and should not make sarcastic remarks to any of the employees.

Colonel Baxter explained to the council members and guests the procedure that is used in naming

the airmen's dormitories at Reese. He also explained why names of enlisted members have not been used. Colonel Baxter also went on to explain how the closure of Laredo AFB, Tex., will affect Reese.

Directional signs have been instituted in the Reese Commissary to lighten the traffic load. It was reported at the meeting that this program is working well.

New Business

Items under the new business heading at the meeting included an encouragement to patronize the NCO Open Mess. It works and exists only on the support of Reese personnel. Plans were also discussed for the Enlisted Wives

Tour that will take place today from 8 a.m. until 12:30 p.m., today. Free nursery service will be available for participating wives.

Retention Discussion

The last item of business at the meeting was the discussion of retention. TSgt. Darrell E.

LaMontagne, base career advisor, cited some of the reasons for retention rates being the way they are at Reese.

The next meeting of the Wing NCO/Airman Advisory Council will be held at 10 a.m., Tuesday, in the NCO Open Mess.

74-06 runs away with it at second UPT field day

Overall Winner

Class 74-06 was the overall winner with 30 points and a tally of taking first place in four of the eight events. The first segment was a tennis match that saw the doubles team of Bob Alley and Robin Dailey taking first place for Class 74-02 who finished closely behind the field day winners.

Flickerball competition brought a few bruised knees but it also brought the first victory for 74-06. The action then moved to the running track.

The ¼-mile relay saw the standing record broken as the team from Class 74-02 won it. The quartet of Mike Dobbs, Kevin Patty, Phil Schoewe and Tom Stites ran it off in 42.85 seconds, just a fraction under the winning time from the last field day.

The winning combination from '02 seemed too hot to stop as they also swept the ¼-mile relay with their winning time of 1:30.2.

The next big event was the mile relay and those field day winners "ran" up the points as they took that event with an overall time of

3:19.6. The members of that winning team were Randy Harville, Ed Groeninger, Jim Gross and Jim Krejci of Class 74-06. The prevailing weather conditions were a threatening sky and cold temperatures but that didn't slow the spirits or the times at the field day.

Singles Events

The first singles event was the 100-yard dash. Mike Dobbs zoomed down the track with twin winning times of 11.9 seconds and 11.8 seconds. Dobbs is in Class 74-02. The other singles event was the 220-yard dash. Randy Harville of Class 74-06 had winning times of 26.5 seconds and 27 seconds even.

The final event of the day was the 1½-mile run. The second record of the meet was broken from the bindings as Jim Krejci of Class 74-06, fresh from the re-

lays, blasted around the track for an amazing 7:46.

Final Standings

The final standings for the event saw 30 overall points going to Class 74-06 with Class 74-02 not far behind, gaining 25 points. Third position was taken by Class 74-03 with their six points. Classes 74-04, 74-01 and 74-05 logged four points each and the defending champions, Class 73-09 tallied only one point.

All officiating and judging were done by class commanders. Capt. James E. Nickel and others in the Student Branch of the 64th Student Squadron coordinated for the event. The awards were presented by Col. Alain G. Boughton, operations officer. It was noted that the new champions will be around to defend their title in October when the next Field Day will be held.
