

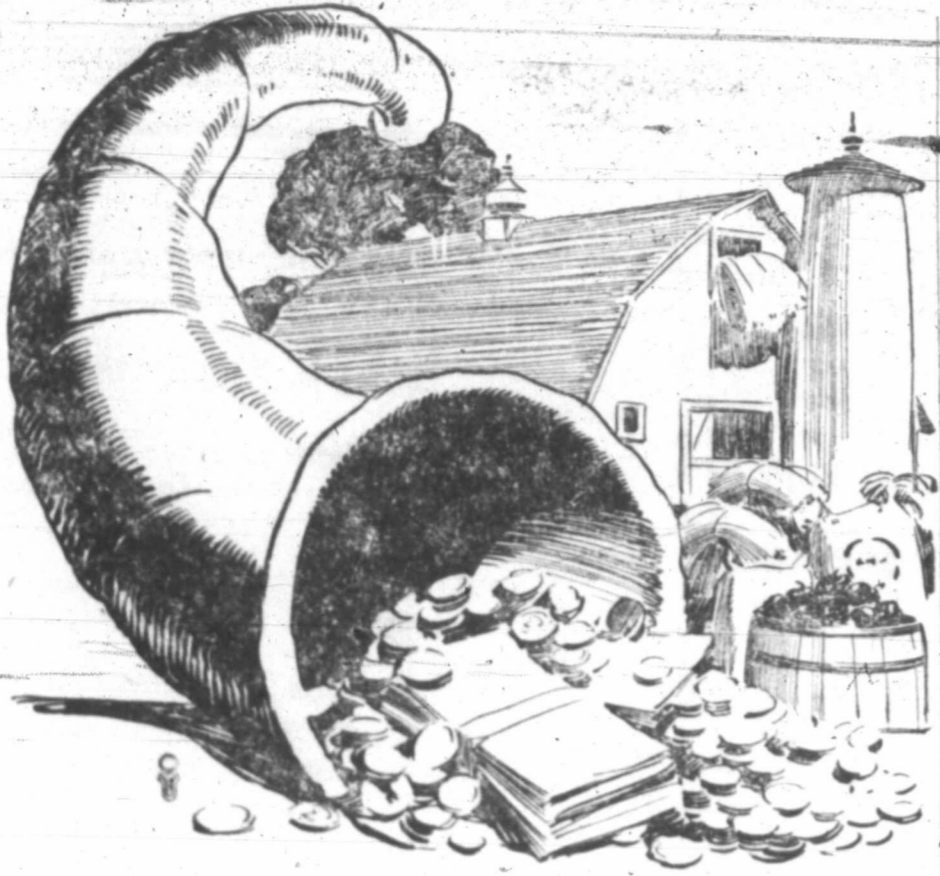

#### ALL SCURRY COUNTY GETS GOOD RAINS

Local rains, ranging from an inch and one half to two inches, has fallen here since last Friday. They have come slowly and at intervals so that the ground has retained it all. There is a good season in the ground. Plenty of moisture to make all the feed and cotton the country can care for. No great lot of damage from hail has been reported except a small area around Snyder where a light hail is reported to have fallen. Wind removed a few houses from their foundations with but slight damage, it is reported.

The cotton in this section was very greatly damaged by hot winds early this season and had just begun to out live the backset when this nice rain came. Nothing means as much to the cotton production as the tap root. The cotton this year, as the result of this dry season, is well rooted. The weed is small but is exceeding well formed. The present rain will give it the necessary growth to produce a good crop. According to the present prospects we shall have a fine crop again this year.

This is a lucky strip of country through here. At the least it has been for the last decade. We have had ten reasonably good years here right in succession. The country is already in fairly good shape, but we should like to have a few new automobiles and some new clothes. These we begin to figure on as soon as the crop begins to show up fairly good.

The feed crop since the rain is looking good. In places it had begun to burn before the rain, but it is now recovering. A good feed crop is always welcomed. It is always needed. Horses, cows, hogs, and chickens have to eat as well as does the man, the woman, the boys and the girls have to eat.

#### MAN PROVES INNOCENT AFTER 20 YEARS

Edinburg, Scotland, July 20:—Oscar Slater, convicted of the murder of Miss Mary Gilchrist, an aged woman, twenty years ago, Friday won his fight to clear his name of the conviction.

Slater, who originally was sentenced to death and then served more than eighteen years of a commuted life sentence, before he was released, began a fight to prove his innocence soon after he was released from prison. His case had attracted wide notice and interested many prominent people including Sir Conan Doyle, noted writer.

Sitting in the Scottish Criminal Court of Appeal, the presiding Judges found unanimously that there had been a misdirection in law at the original trial. The decision was announced by Lord Justice General Lord Clyde.

It is understood that the Government will consider the question of compensation to Slater for his wrongful conviction.

Slater was arrested in New York early in 1909 as he stepped off the liner Lusitania. He waived extradition and was returned to Glasgow for trial.

#### HIGH SCHOOL FAILED TO GET CREDIT IN ENGLISH AND ECONOMICS

Dear Mr. Norman:

You may already have the information I am writing to ask you to pass on to the Patrons of Hermleigh School District, but if not, will you kindly publish this letter, that all may know the result of the effort made by the school last term for additional accrediting.

The school already had eleven credits earned the year before, and last year asked for the following credits: English (4 unit), Physics (one unit), Spanish (two units), Civics and Economic [one-half unit each], a total of five units. Credit was granted in Spanish, Physics, and Civics, three and one-half units, making a total of fourteen and one half units now held by the schools, or within one and one-half units of the sixteen units needed to make a fully accredited High School.

Credit was refused in English and Economics. I had personally no hope of securing credit in Fourth year English, as that unit is very hard to secure, especially in small schools. So we came within one-half unit getting all the credits we had expected to get.

I am personally proud of the teachers and pupils whose work made it possible to place the school on this high standing in the short time used in doing so and I believe the community may justly feel some pride in the accomplishment also, and I am sure they do.

Prospects look very bright indeed for Hermleigh Schools. While it is doubtful if credit can be had in English Four for another year or two, with some rearrangement of the work now offered, and perhaps the addition of some new subjects, it will be possible obtain credit in Domestic Economy and possible in Manual Training and new sub-

jects, so that the school may soon be able to take its rightful place among the fully accredited schools of the County and State.

Here's hoping that Mr. Kerr and the management of the school may have the co-operation and freedom of action that will enable them to push forward to the accomplishment of all that means so much to a community in its schools.

#### ASSISTANT IS IN SCHOOL PLANT DIVISION

Austin, Texas, July 22.—The appointment of Arnold Wittman of Austin as assistant to Fred Horn in the division of the school plant, a newly created division in the Department of Education, was announced Saturday by state Superintendent S. M. N. Marrs. Wittman has been associated for a number of years with Austin architectural firms.

The division of the school plant was established July 1.

"Its services will be confined largely to small schools, especially those in rural districts, where the establishment of architect is not practicable," Marrs said. "The division, however, when requested, will co-operate with officials and architects of the larger school districts in the improvement of their school plants."

#### MEN AT WORK ON TYPE SIMPLIFICATION

Washington, D. C.—The Simplified Practice Division, Department of Commerce, is communicating with several associations to see what they think of the possibility of type face simplification. Letters have been sent to the International Advertising association, the Direct Mail Advertising association, the National Association of Book Publishers, the International Association of Printers, the International Association of Printinghouse Craftsmen, and the National Publishers association.

Ralph Gross, managing editor of the Typotheta Bulletin has sent a communication to the division in which he says that replies received from printers about the proposed simplification seemed to indicate that the step should come through the manufacturers and not through the printers. The replies were not so encouraging, he said.

## EITHER POLITICAL OR MORAL, WHICH ONE?

He, that is for captivity, into captivity he goeth; he that killeth with the sword, with the sword shall he be killed." Rev. 13: 10.

The above scripture reference is to religion in connection with politics. The symbolism of this and the previous chapter picture human governments. The Beast referred to is the Papal government from about 550 A. D. to the Protestant Reformation in 15th. century. The beasts which follow in these symbolisms are also governments. The second beast, which has two horns like a lamb, in all probability, refers to the United States government. In connection with these symbolisms there is a repeated warning against the "Mark of the Beast." This is the most serious warning in all the Bible. Certainly Christian people should be fearful of it.

What is meant by the "Mark of the Beast?" Any action the on part of any church or church official characterized by the spirit and ambition of the mediaeval church which led gradually into the condition of the dark ages, would look like a "mark of the beast. The church's getting into politics during the mediaeval centuries, caused the government symbolized "the Beast" to develop. If this be true any similar act on the part any similar organization would be a "mark of the beast," and of which many of us religionists are exceeding fearful.

This is the greatest political question of the day. It is engaging the attention of our ablest clergemen of to-day. Bishop Chandler, of Georgia, and Bishop Moore of Texas, in connection with the Methodist Church, have both made public their views with reference to this very thing which is pending in our national politics today. Bishop Chandler considers the issues in this presidential campaign to be purely

political, and advises that his ministers all "keep their hands clean."—Avoid the "Mark of the Beast." But on the other hand Bishop Moore considers the question as moral and seemingly insist that his ministers treat it as such. He fears anything which has the appearance of the possible return of the old days of the open saloon.

These Bishops are outstanding men, both of them, and what they say has its weight; but they differ, and which one is right?

It is probable we have given this subject as much study as either of these great men have. We have little hesitancy to speak in the presence of any one concerning these things. History is among our great teachers.

The two great questions are these: Is the present national issue a purely temperance issue or is it a religious issue? Is the question of prohibition in this campaign strictly a moral question, or is it a political question? The answer of these questions determine your position. You have your right to your view the same as any other man.

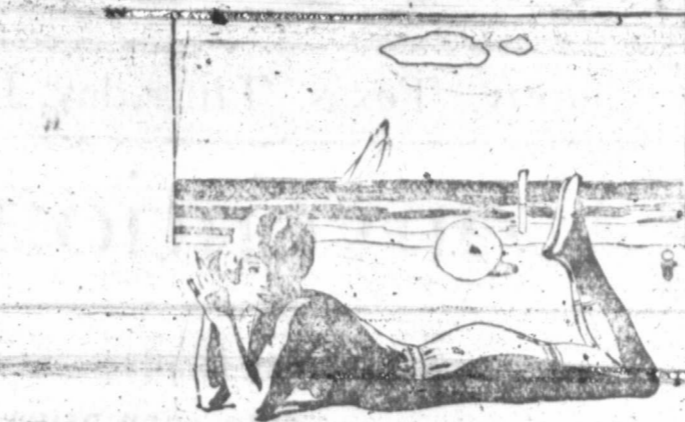
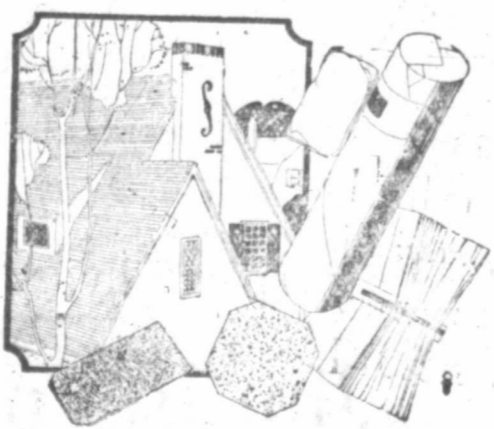
