

HENRY FORD FAVORS LARGE POWER TRUS

Henry Ford declares that the "power trust" has no terrors for him and that, on the contrary. he favors it as the best means of promoting the development of the electrical industry and bringing the advantages of the electrical age to the Nation.

Mr. Ford declared in an interview published by the Electrical World that the formation of a nation-wide power monopoly is inevitable as the natural expression of economic tendencies and the best means of reducing the rigors of human toil and giving cheap light and power to the people.

Asserting that the "use of electricity is yet not what it will be in the next ten years." Mr. Ford predicts the interlacing of the whole country with power lines and that this, in turn, will mean "unification of utility systems in business terms, as well as electrical." Mr. Ford wishes there were power trusts

"People talk about a 'power trust.'" Mr. Ford says. "I only wish that there actually were a power trust, a central directing organization for the development and use of every power source in the country, tied into one national power system for the service of the whole country; that is, welded into one operation and business unit. 


