Major League Baseball representatives Tom Smith, Carroll Barringer and Howard Green are





Finding solutions to sinus problems

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have chronic sinus problems. As a result, I suffer from bad headaches, have constant drainage, and must periodically clear my throat. Do you have any suggestions for control of this problem?

DEAR READER: Chronic sinus inflammation that causes the symptoms you describe could be the result of either infection or allergies. Also, if you're a smoker or work in a dusty environment, you may suffer sinus irritation.

Probably the quickest and easiest solution to your problem is to see an ear-nose-and-throat specialist, who will examine you and order tests, such as a CT scan of your sinuses, to establish a diagnosis.

Once the problem is defined, the otolaryngologist can treat you with antihistamines (for an allergy), refer you to an allergist (for further testing), prescribe antibiotics (for an infection), or consider surgery (for polyps or other complications of sinus inflammation)

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please provide information on vitamin B6.

DEAR READER: Vitamin B6 (pyridoxine) is an essential food factor that is readily available in a balanced diet. The Recommended Daily Allowance is 2 milligrams.

B6 deficiency causes weakness, irritability, nervousness, insomnia, poor coordination, rash, and anemia.

Excess pyridoxine can lead to liver disorders and nerve damage. Also, supplemental doses of the vitamin appear to interfere with the action of some medications, notably L-dopa for the treatment of Parkinson's disease.

Pyridoxine supplements (not to exceed 5 milligrams per day) should only be taken under medical supervision for the following afflictions: some forms of kidney stones, rare types of seizures, and occasional instances of pre-menstrual syndrome.

Lawsuit changes endorsed

AUSTIN (AP) — A House committee has approved a bill that proponents say should result in fewer medical malpractice suits of questionable merit.

The House Civil Practices Committee, with the support of groups representing both doctors and attorneys, sent the bill by Rep. Todd Hunter, D-Corpus Christi, to the full House on Wednesday.

The bill originally called for a \$250,000 cap on noneconomic damages — including mental anguish, pain and suffering and disfigurement — a plaintiff could receive.

But representatives for doctors personal-injury lawyers removed the cap in a compromise that aimed to discourage the filing of questionable malpractice suits instead of limiting the liability of a negligent doctor or a hospital.

The bill: — Would raise the bond, from \$2,000 to \$5,000, a plaintiff must post for each defendant named in a malpractice suit to cover court costs should the suit be dropped.

Require a plaintiff within 180 days of suing to file a report from a medical expert attesting to the validity of the claim.
