

Moffett Field rededication slated today at Towle Park

Former major leaguers, representatives of elected officials and honored guests will be in Snyder today for a rededication ceremony at Moffett Field.

The special ceremony is to recognize volunteers and contributors who have donated time and money to the restoration of Moffett Field, named in 1974 after longtime Snyder High school baseball coach James Milton "Speedy" Moffett.

The ceremony has been scheduled for 6:30 this evening, immediately preceding the Snyder Tigers' District 5-4A opener against Levelland.

On Tuesday, the Texas House of Representatives passed a resolution honoring the citizens of Snyder and the rededication of Moffett Field.

Major League Baseball representatives Tom Smith, Carroll Barringer and Howard Green are scheduled to be on hand this evening.

Smith is an executive with the Texas Rangers and president of the Legends of Baseball Hall of Fame. Barringer is a consultant to the Los Angeles Dodgers and served as an assistant to current Dodgers' manager Tommy Lasorda. He is a member of the Legends of Baseball Hall of Fame.

Green is a former United States Senator and was a past baseball player's association president. He is a Major League Baseball Hall of Famer and a former minor league owner. Currently, Green owns a AAA minor league team in Fort Worth.

Johnny Thomas of KSNV radio will be master of ceremonies. Dave Harmon, president of the Ronald McDonald Children's Charities of the Big Country Concho Valley, will present a \$25,000 check to the Texas Teenage Baseball League.

The check from RMCC will become part of the \$150,000 already invested in the refurbishing of

the field.

Frankie Grimmett and John Hernandez are slated to throw out the first pitches. Grimmett has donated both his time and resources to the refurbishing process. Hernandez has spent countless hours working on the project, as well.

Preceding the check presentation, a plaque recognizing persons involved in the restoration process will be unveiled. The plaque will be permanently mounted on the north wall of the concession stand.

Local anglers set for big day

Local fishermen who want an opportunity to put some trout on the table may want to take advantage of a Fish-a-Thon Saturday at Towle Park, sponsored by local Scouts.

Towle Park Pond has been stocked with almost 1,000 Colorado rainbow trout, ranging from nine to 16 inches, in preparation for the event. It is an open tournament; citizens of all ages are welcome to take part.

The entry fee is \$5 per person. The tournament will begin at 10 a.m. and end at 6 p.m. By order of Scurry County Commissioners Court, there will be no fishing at the pond today or Saturday morning before the tournament begins.

Some of the fish will be tagged. Anyone catching a tagged fish will be eligible for a prize. The angler catching the largest trout will win \$50. In addition, prizes will be awarded for the largest catfish, bass and crappie caught at the pond during the tournament.

Registration will be at Towle Park prior to and during the tournament. Anglers may bring their own bait or artificial lures. Bait will also be available for sale at the park. Scouts will be selling concession items.

Snyder Bass Club members will clean the fish for those who want at no charge.

Area game wardens will assist in the tournament.

Any profits from the tournament will go toward the further benefit of Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts and Explorer Scouts.

A Scout Exposition will be held in conjunction with the tournament from 1-4 p.m. in the park.

Fishing licenses and trout stamps will be waived during tournament hours. However, the legal limit of five trout will be enforced. Local game wardens stressed that anyone catching trout from the pond at any time following the tournament must have a trout stamp as well as a valid fishing license.

Area volunteers ready to talk trash Saturday

It's time to talk trash again in Texas.

On Saturday, some 101,000 volunteers are expected to participate in the 10th annual "Great Texas Trash Off," readying the Lone Star State for another colorful wildflower season.

In Scurry County, three Adopt-A-Highway groups are among 59 AAH groups in the Texas Department of Transportation's Abilene District which have signed up to participate. Those organizations are Ira Church of God youth, Ira National Honor Society and VFW Post 8231 and Ladies Auxiliary.

While AAH groups are removing litter from state roadsides, Keep Texas Beautiful organizations are expected to spruce up city streets, county roads and parks.

As part of TxDOT's "Don't Mess with Texas" anti-litter campaign, the Trash-Off is one of

Michael Gibson takes his spelling seriously

Spelling is serious business to Michael Gibson. Not only is it his favorite academic subject, he has also been competing in spelling bees since he was a fourth grader.

That perseverance is paying off for the Snyder seventh grader, who will compete Saturday in the regional bee to be held at Cavazos Junior High School in Lubbock. The spelloff begins at 1 p.m.

Michael earned the right to advance after winning the Scurry County Spelling Bee on March 10. Previously, he finished in second place at the junior high bee held in February. Both the winner and runner-up of each campus bee in the county were able to compete in the county bee.

Michael said spelling was

always his best subject in elementary school. He never received a grade less than 99 for the fifth and lower grades. Spelling is not offered as a separate subject beyond the fifth grade.

Earlier this week, Michael said he wasn't nervous but that he does get nervous during the actual competition. While his parents, John and Denise Gibson, will accompany him to Lubbock, he said he has asked them not to watch him because "It makes me nervous." In fact, they have never seen him spell in competition.

Michael has been ardently studying his spelling words every day for several weeks, with two to three hour study sessions imple-

Workers walk out at Chrysler facility

KOKOMO, Ind. (AP)—Workers at a key Chrysler Corp. parts factory walked off their jobs today in a strike that could quickly shut down the No. 3 automaker's car and truck assembly plants.

Negotiators for 5,700 members of United Auto Workers Local 685 announced the strike at the plant, which makes automatic transmissions, shortly after a 10 a.m. deadline.

About the same time, UAW Local 594 in Pontiac, Mich., went on strike at General Motors Corp.'s Pontiac East truck assembly plant, which builds about one-third of the company's fast-selling full-size pickup trucks.

Talks, which had gone on through the night, were continuing in both walkouts.

The Kokomo plant builds automatic transmissions for nearly all the cars and trucks with automatics that Chrysler sells. Its shutdown is expected to quickly force assembly plants to close or curtail operations. Chrysler builds cars and trucks in Michigan, Ohio, Missouri, Illinois, Delaware, Mexico, Austria and Ontario, Canada.

"It's unfortunate we have to go

out and do this, but sometimes we have to go on strike to get these issues resolved," said Larry Scott, strike coordinator at UAW Local 685 in Kokomo.

"We'd like to keep the jobs here for our kids who are growing up, so they'll have a decent future and decent jobs," Dennis Brewer, a 17-year Chrysler veteran, said after the strike began.

The workers at Kokomo want Chrysler to commit to producing a new generation of truck transmissions late in this decade, but has not said where they will be built. If they are produced elsewhere, several hundred jobs at Kokomo might be eliminated.

Western Texas College is hosting the District 13-A UIL academic contest for high school students. Schools involved are Ira, Hermleigh, Borden County, Klondike, Lueders-Avoca, Trent, Loraine, Westbrook, Highland, Grady, Blackwell and Sands.

Competition began at 1 p.m. and will continue throughout the day.

The top three students in high school district competition will advance to area.

Simpson jury may not hear 911 tape

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The jury in O.J. Simpson's trial probably will never hear a secretly recorded tape of his ex-wife telling police he became "very animalistic" when he broke down her door in 1993, legal experts say.

Sgt. Craig Lally released the tape Wednesday of comments Nicole Brown Simpson made when he responded to her 911 call. Neither the defense nor prosecution has sought to use the tape in Simpson's trial, although both sides have it.

Robert Pugsley, a professor at Southwestern School of Law, said that using the tape in court could hurt the prosecution by opening police to more scrutiny.

"The defense could stress to the

jury that it was being surreptitiously taped, and say the officers had it in mind to secure a confession using devious means," Pugsley said. "That would not go down well with the jury. It would make police look like they were targeting him and playing dirty pool."

Lally released the tape to ABC's "Primetime Live," saying he wanted to show that the Los Angeles Police Department has acted properly in its investigation of the June 12 killings of Ms. Simpson and Ronald Goldman.

A show spokeswoman said Lally wasn't paid for his appearance.

It is legal to record a conversation without the knowledge of other parties during a police investigation. But the police department requires officers to get approval from their commanding officer and note if a conversation was recorded, Lt. John Dunkin said.

Dunkin didn't know if Lally had received permission or marked the entry in his report.

On the tape, Lally encouraged Ms. Simpson to see a counselor. She told him that she called police because of the look on her ex-husband's face.

"He gets a very animalistic look in him. All his veins pop out, his eyes are black and just black, I mean cold, like an animal," she said.

To get the tape entered as evidence, prosecutors could argue it was "an investigatory tool used by a sergeant as just another form of recording a report," Pugsley said.

But like Ms. Simpson's diary, it could be deemed inadmissible hearsay, said Stan Goldman, a Loyola Law School professor.

Judge Lance Ito allowed Ms. Simpson's 911 call as evidence because it was an excited utterance — an exception to the rule that bars hearsay — but rejected the diary and comments Ms. Simpson made to workers at a battered women's shelter because there could be no cross-examination.

NBC nixes live coverage of speech

WASHINGTON (AP) — NBC says it will cover House Speaker Newt Gingrich's prime-time speech next week based on its newsworthiness but will not carry the address live.

CNN earlier this week said it would cover Gingrich's proposed speech, which is designed to mark the completion of the "Contract With America" and look ahead to GOP efforts to balance the budget.

ABC and CBS have yet to announce plans.

"If it turns out to be newsworthy we will deal with it in 'Date-line NBC,'" which airs shortly after Gingrich's speech is expected to conclude, NBC spokeswoman Heidi Pokorny said Thursday.

Network Affiliated Stations Alliance said, "we are confident that the affiliates would exercise their right to pre-empt network programming to broadcast your address directly to the American public."

Kurt Wimmer, an alliance attorney, said pre-empting network programming to carry a political speech would be an unusual move and "obviously we have not called 650 stations to make sure they would carry it."

But, he said, the group wants to stress the difference between the networks and the local stations "who want to make local decisions."

South shook his head and muttered about his finesse always losing. But was it such a surprise that West had the spade king? After all, he had made a vulnerable two-level overcall.

After winning the second trick, South should have cashed his heart and diamond winners, bringing everyone down to five cards. Now some card-reading might be needed. If West has three clubs and two spades left, South just exits with his last club. West may take his three tricks, but then must lead away from the spade king, giving South two tricks in the suit and nine in all.

However, West might be able to come down to a singleton spade king (though not with this layout). Then South will have to cash his spade ace to drop the king. Not easy, but at least South has a chance to make the contract. It is better than taking a hopeless finesse.

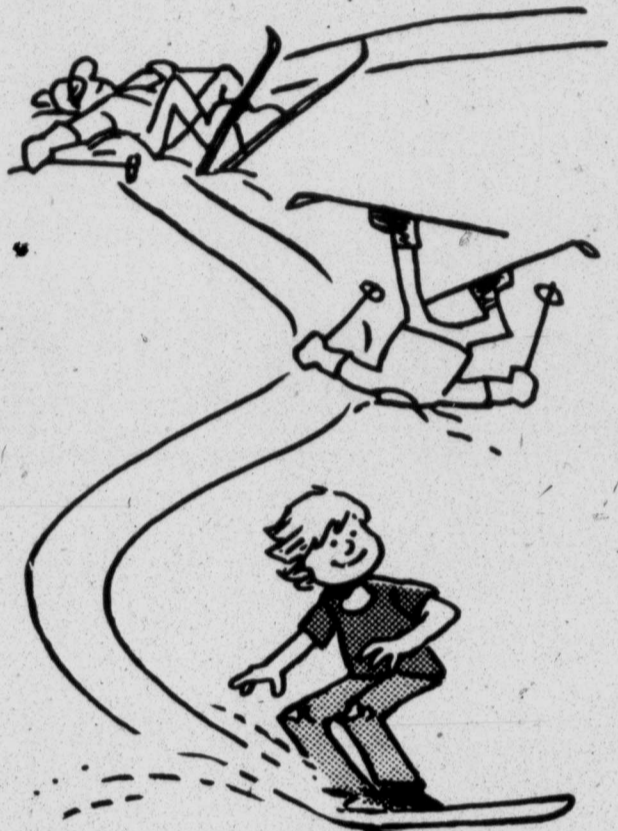
Motor home on the shelf

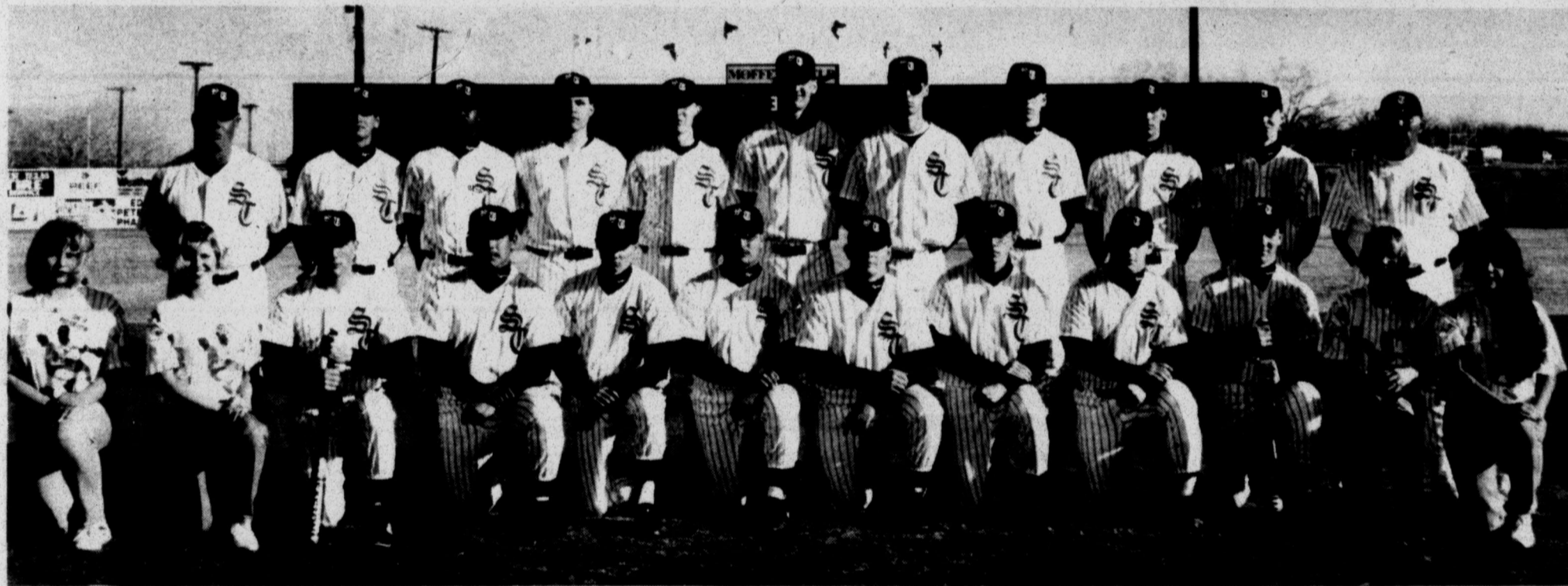
