Morgan Jones has filed notice with the railroad commission that the railroad company will receive the road from the construction company on the 15th of this month and begin the operation of a regular train service on it by the 20th.

No doubt Gen. Funston is overcome with a big feeling of disgust, the Cuban rebels having laid down their arms instead of waiting for him to take them.

A two-cent show can come along and take more money out of a town than it citizens would contribute to some enterprise calculated to benefit the country to the extent of thousands of dollars.

Recently a "Merry-Go-Round" stopped in a certain town that we know of for two or three weeks and claimed that it took in \$900 during that time. That is six times as much money as that town contributed toward getting up a fair that probably would benefit some of its people a great deal and would probably benefit every man in it and the country more or less in one way or another. We think the trouble is that people do not stop and think and measure these things one against the other, else more would go to the good things and less to the useless ones.

Mr. Hearst has taken the stump in New York in support of his candidacy for governor. In speeches delivered this week he has made sweeping denials of most of the personal and political charges of a derogatory nature brought against him by the opposition. He said he would not spend more money in his own behalf than he contributed to either the Cleveland or Bryan campaign, that he had not entered into any agreement or compact with the political bosses before or since his nomination, that he was not and had not employed Chinese on his California property, that he would stand better with other newspaper proprietors of New York if he had not refused to enter into a trust with them to raise the rates to advertisers and keep down the wages of employees.

SHAW ON GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP AND BRYAN.

At Cincinnati, O., a few days ago Mr. Leslie M. Shaw, Secretary of the United States Treasury, in reply to a question, said:

"No, we are in no danger whatever of losing the National House of Representatives. The Democrats have lost all hope of carrying it since Mr. Bryan made his New York speech advocating Government ownership of railroads. That has destroyed all their chances of success for years to come, and they will have to look about for new issues and new men.

"Bryan and Hearst are all the party has left in the Presidential line, and more's the pity, for I like to see strong men in the opposition. Senator Bailey and John Sharp Williams are the only conspicuous figures in the South, and they are impossible. I don't like to delve into a man's motives in answer to your question, but I suppose Mr. Bryan believes in Government ownership and thinks it will win. He will never see it."

Mr. Shaw must be hugging himself with the delusion that the people do not read, else he would know that every blow he aims at Mr. Bryan on the public ownership question will strike Dr. Roosevelt with equal or greater force. Because the people have read and know that, as President of the United States, Mr. Roosevelt said in a message to congress that if railroad regulation failed government ownership would inevitably come. Mr. Bryan as a private citizen put the matter no stronger than that. He announced his belief in the efficacy of government ownership to solve the railroad problem and said he had but little faith that much would be accomplished by regulation, but he was willing to try regulation first, meantime he wanted the people to be thinking on the problem of national and state ownership.

Mr. Shaw might also be reminded—and he can not deny it—that the greater part of his party leader, Mr. Roosevelt's, popularity with the people springs from those acts in which he has gone beyond his party platform and advocated measures previously proposed by the Democratic party. Yet from Mr. Shaw's talk one must think, to grant him any degree of sincerity, that he thinks what has made Mr. Roosevelt great ought to destroy Mr. Bryan with the people. Mr. Shaw's attention might also be called to the fact that another Republican of high degree, to wit; Governor La Follette, is advocating government ownership of railroads more pointedly than either Mr. Roosevelt or Mr. Bryan has yet done.

If the railroads and the corporate interests do not want government ownership of railroads to come they can prevent it. And there is just one way for them to do it—submit to reasonable and fair regulation and give the people a square deal, otherwise government ownership will come when the people see that it is better for the government to own and control the railroads than to allow the railroads to control the government and treat the people in accordance with the promptings of their avarice.

The Reorganized Republican party of Texas must feel lonesome. It made only two nominations, E. H. R. Green for governor and Jas. C. Gibbons for lieutenant governor, and now comes Mr. Green and declines the nomination. The regulars will be still more lonesome after election day and, on the theory that misery loves company, the "reorganized" may then feel better.

The Democratic state convention of Mass. has given a strong endorsement of Mr. Bryan.

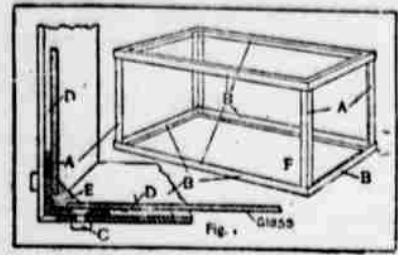

HOME-MADE AQUARIUM.

How an Attractive Home for Fish May Be Built by Boy.

In making an aquarium, the first thing to decide on is the size. It is not to attempt building a very large one, as the difficulties increase with

the size. An aquarium about 12 inches by 12 inches by 20 inches is a very good size, and is inexpensive to build.

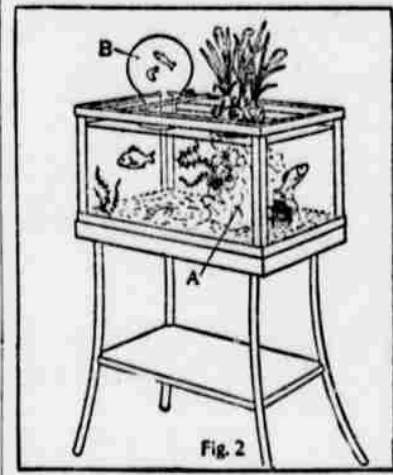
First buy one length of three-fourths inch by one-eighth inch angle iron for the frame, F, Fig. 1. This can be obtained at any steel shop, and should cost but 20 cents. All the horizontal pieces, B, should be beveled 45 degrees at the ends, and drilled for three-sixteenths inch stove bolts. The beveling may be done by roughening out with a hacksaw and finishing with a file. After all the pieces are cut and beveled they should be drilled at the ends for the three-sixteenths inch stove bolts, C. Drill all the horizontal pieces, B, first, and then mark the holes on the upright pieces, A, through the holes already drilled, thus making all the holes coincide. Mark the ends of each piece with a figure or letter, so that when they are assembled, the same ends will come together again. The upright pieces, A, should be countersunk as shown in the detail, and then the frame is ready to assemble. After the frame has been assembled, says Popular Mechanics, take it to a glazier and have a bottom made of skylight glass and sides and ends of double-thick window glass. The bottom glass should be a good fit, but the sides and ends should be made

slightly shorter to allow the cement, E, to form a dovetail joint as shown. When the glass is put in the frame, a space, D, will be found between the glass and the horizontal pieces, B, of the frame. If this were allowed to remain the pressure of the water would spring the glass and cause a leak at E, so it is filled up with plaster of paris.

The cement, E, is made as follows: Take one gill of plaster of paris, one gill of litharge, one gill of white sand, and one-third of a gill of finely powdered rosin. Mix well and add boiled linseed oil and turpentine until as thick as putty. Let the cement dry three or four days before putting any water in the aquarium.

In choosing stock for the aquarium it should be remembered that a sufficient quantity of vegetable life is required to furnish oxygen for the fish. In a well balanced aquarium the water requires renewal only two or three times a year. It is well to have an excess of plants and a number of snails, as the snails will devour all the decaying vegetable matter which would otherwise poison the water and kill the fish.

If desired, a centerpiece (A, Fig. 2) can be made of colored stones held together by cement, and an inverted jar can be supported in the position shown at B. If the mouth of the jar

is below the surface of the water, it will stay filled and allow the fish to swim up inside as shown. Some washed pebbles or gravel should be placed on the bottom, and if desired, a few Chinese lilies or other plants may be placed on the centerpiece.

PENNIES FOR A COLLEGE.

One Hundred Thousand Workers Each Give a Penny to Ruskin College.

The British trade unions had not in their origin any direct concern with education, says the Fortnightly Review. But it is a fact of no ordinary significance that some of the leading unions should be taking very great interest in the higher education of the workman.

For the last three years some 100,000 workmen, members of the Amalgamated Society of Engineers, have made three levies of one penny each to help on the work of Ruskin college at Oxford. This levy produces over £300 a year, and by means of it six engineers are maintained for a year's course of study at the college.

Smaller but substantial sums have been contributed to the same institution by the London Society of Compositors, by the Lanarkshire Miners' County Union, by the Amalgamated Association of Beamers, Twisters and Drawers, by the Derbyshire miners and the Durham miners, while a large number of other societies appear among the donors and subscribers.

Hard-Working Chinese Official.

Everybody in China works hard, even those who have reached the highest positions. It is related of a member of the Chinese cabinet that he left home every morning at two o'clock, as he was on duty at the palace from three to six. As a member of the privy council he was engaged from six to nine. From nine until 11 he was at the war department, of which he was president. As the member of the board of punishment he was in attendance from 12 till two, and as a minister of the foreign office he spent every day from two till five or six there. In addition he frequently served on special boards or commissions.

THE HOUSE THAT BAKER BUILT.

In 1889 the amount of crude cocoa imported into this country for home consumption was only three-fifths of an ounce for each inhabitant. 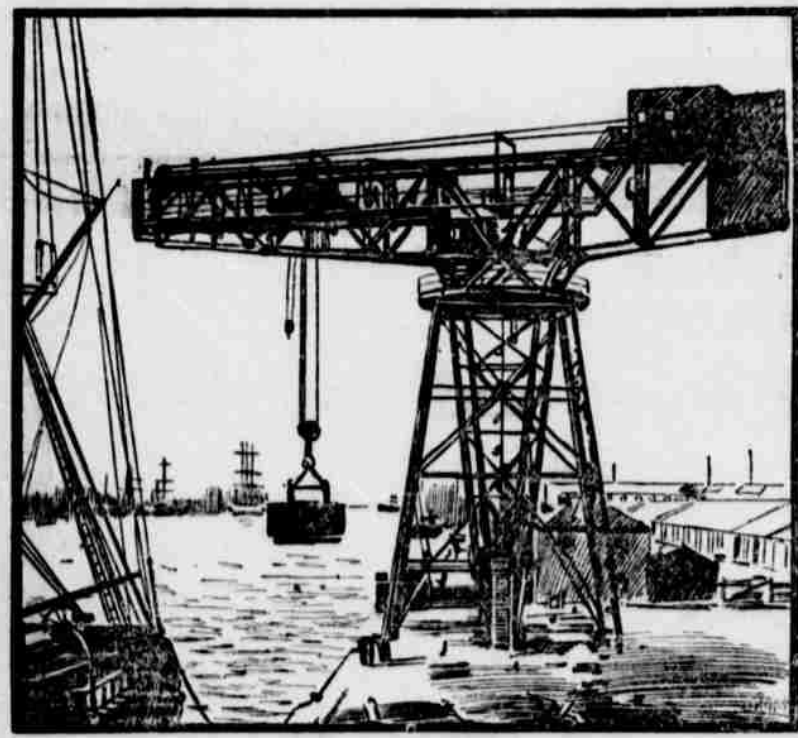

One-Man Hoist and Automatic Dump



Details and General View of Hoist.

Having had considerable experience as a prospector, and not finding a suitable prospector's device for excavating, I decided to make one, and constructed the apparatus to be described. This device enables one person to sink a shaft of practically any depth and hoist the dirt from the shaft and take it away and dump it at a distant pile, without having to come out of the shaft to operate it, as the windlass is located down the shaft. The device weighs but 15 pounds, and can be carried readily in the prospector's pack.

The trolley frame, A, A, is made of flat iron or steel, 1/2 inch thick by 1 1/2 inches wide. When bent to shape as shown, the ends, A, A, are about 20 inches apart.

Six holes are drilled in the frame; four to receive the grooved wheels, B B B; one for the ring, C, and one for the trigger, D. This trigger catches on the hook, E, and locks the trolley in place, thus releasing the trolley and allowing it to travel along the steel wire cable, F.

The rope, G, is connected to the windlass and moves in the direction indicated by the arrow when the windlass is being wound up. This movement of the rope, G, has a tendency to raise the bucket and move the trolley on the cable at the same time, but as the trolley is locked at E, it will not move until the pulley, H, strikes the trigger. The bucket by that time having left the shaft is ready for its trip to the dumping pile.

A second rope, J, is fastened to the bottom of the bucket at one end, the other end being secured to any fixed object in the bottom of the shaft. This rope is fastened at such a length that the bucket on reaching the dumping pile will be turned over, the rope having traveled its entire length. The

trolley cable being slightly elevated at the dumping end causes the bucket to return to the shaft by gravity.

When ready to hoist, the operator starts the windlass at the bottom of the shaft, which causes the bucket to ascend until the pulley, H, strikes the trigger. The trigger is then released from the hook, E, and the traveler moves with the bucket to the dumping pile, where it is dumped by the rope, J, as stated above. The traveler then returns to the shaft, by gravity, and is locked in position by the hook, E. The bucket then descends the shaft trolley for the next cargo.

I had this device in successful operation for many years in Australia, says the correspondent of Popular Mechanics, and am using it at present in the Klondike.

Would Cut Down Accident Losses.

Certain deficiencies in railroad practice which can be readily eliminated with great saving to the operating companies are pointed out by Dr. M. H. Thomas, of Huntington, Ind., state surgeon of the National First Aid association, in a pamphlet sent out to steam and interurban railway managers of the state. He would instruct trainmen, motormen and shopmen in "first-aid methods" and "accident law points," that they might be able to testify in a competent manner. He also urges, as reported in the Western Electrician, "the employment of a skilled surgeon to work with the legal department of the railroad. . . . Dr Thomas thinks that the proper instruction to the trainmen in first aid to the injured and on points of accident law . . . would result in a net saving to a railway company of at least 20 per cent. of the amount now spent annually in payment for personal injuries and death claims."

WHAT A VISITOR SAYS.

Gives His Observations on Changing Conditions in West Texas.

On his return home Mr. Rosson of Campbell Bros. & Rosson Commission Co. of Fort Worth, who was in Haskell last week, was interviewed by a Fort Worth paper and made the following statement of his observations in this part of the state:

In an interview with Jno. K. Rosson, who has just returned from quite an extensive trip through the western part of the State, he advises that the range conditions could not be better. He also says that the cattle industry is fast ebbing out. The large land owners and ranchers are cutting up their pastures in small farms or in tracts to suit the purchaser and the majority of the range country is selling from \$10 to \$20 per acre. Cattle have been selling for such unreasonably low prices during the past few years that the cattlemen recognize that he can no longer continue in the cattle business on land that is valued at these prices and he also recognizes that western Texas is becoming one of the greatest cotton producing sections of our state. In visiting Baylor, Knox, King, Haskell, Jones, Shackelford and Throckmorton counties on this trip in each of the above counties I saw cotton on sod land that, if it matures, it will make at least a bale of cotton to the acre and both in Jones and Shackelford counties I heard reliable men say they had cotton that would make better than a bale and a half per acre and it was selling yesterday on the streets for 10.75c and is as pretty staple as I ever looked at. It requires an average of ten acres of this land to support a cow the year 'round which is worth on the market \$16 or \$17 net. Supposing this land will raise on an average of half a bale of cotton per acre, which is a very low estimate, means five bales of cotton, produced on the same land that it takes to carry one cow, which brings in a revenue of \$250.

I predict the range country is something of the past and of course at a period of five to eight years stock farming will then be an issue and there will be as many cattle raised in that section as there are at the present time, but it will take at least that length of time for the farmer coming in the country at the present time to get his affairs shaped to handle cattle and other live stock as they do in the northern states at the present time, but when this is done the business will be on a much more satisfactory basis from every standpoint to those who are interested.

Yes, I find quite a good deal of interest being manifested in the raising of hogs and quite a few are agitating the culture of sheep, as both classes of this class of live stock have been exceptionally high for sometime and indications look favorable for strong prices to prevail for years to come and I take pleasure in recommending to the farming element throughout the country to diversify their crops and raise a few sheep, hogs and cattle, get a good brood mare or two and raise a good mule or a good horse, either of which are worth from \$75 to \$125 at two years old, and it always pays to use the best blood you can secure. It costs no more to raise a good mule or horse than a beef steer and either of them is worth three or four times as much.

Pushing Work on the Abilene and Northern.

The Wichita Valley Ry. is to be in operation to Stamford within ten days, and the Nelson Construction outfit which built that road, has been transferred to the Abilene & Northern this side of Stamford, and a crew is driving piles for the bridge over California creek, in Jones county, and when done there will come on to the Clear Fork of the Brazos, twelve miles north of Abilene, and will get the structure there ready for the steel by the time the track is built to that point.

Already three cars of steel have been unloaded at Abilene, and other shipments will arrive constantly, until all needed for meeting the track gang from Stamford is here.

The contract has been let for the making of the grade through town and to a track connection with the T. & P. from which point the material will be handled for steel laying north. This is the first time steel has been brought to build a new line, and it convinces the most skeptical that the Abilene & Northern is to be an actuality, and our people are accordingly pleased.—Abilene Reporter.

Japanese Companies Make Money.
Shipping companies are profitable in Japan. For the past year ending March 31 last the Nippon Yusen Kaisha wrote off \$491,500 for depreciation, \$169,000 for insurance, \$233,000 for repairs, carried \$56,000 to reserve, paid \$36,000 for directors' and auditors' fees, gave the managing director a bonus of \$39,000, gave employees generally \$200,000 in bonuses, paid \$825,000 in 15 per cent dividends, and left \$182,000 at credit of profit and loss account.

KING OF SAFE-BREAKERS.

Marvelous Delicacy of Hearing Possessed by Milner James.

"Milner James was the most artistic safe-breaker in the business," said Lecocq the detective. "He is dead now. He opened in his time over 700 safes without tools or gunpowder solely by working out the combination with his delicate and patient fingers." "It took me a year," he once said, "to learn the trick of picking combinations. I studied all the locks there were and I had three safes of different makes to practice on. The ear is the most important factor in my method and it must be held tight against the safe door on a line with the tumblers. When the knob of the lock is turned slowly and one of the tumblers reaches the notch corresponding to the first number of the combination the tumbler will fall with a little click. Care must be taken not to displace this tumbler. You keep on trying the knob back and forth gently till each of the tumblers drops. Then the door opens. Hardly one man in a thousand has an ear delicate enough for this work and to be a success at it you've got to give up tobacco and alcohol."

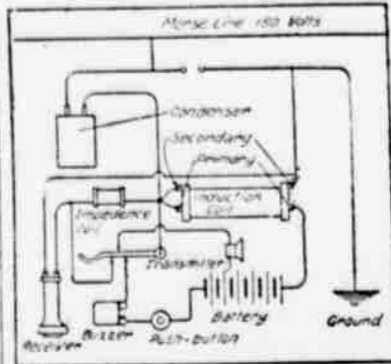

THE ELECTRICAL WORLD

A DOUBLE SERVICE LINE.

The Making of a Combination Telegraph and Telephone Line.

The accompanying diagram shows a system which I recently installed in Kansas for simultaneous telegraphy and telephony and which is giving as good results as could be had were they

entirely separate, says a Kansas correspondent of Popular Mechanics. On account of its simplicity it can be made by anyone for less than the cost of any standard telephone made.

A word explaining its operation may prove useful. When receiver is on the hook in its normal position, the pushing of the button completes the circuit of six cells through an ordinary buzzer, primary of induction coil back to the battery, thus giving an interrupted direct current through this circuit and generating an induced alternating current in the secondary of the induction coil which passes

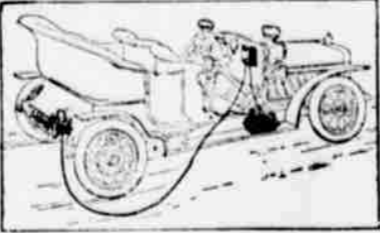
out over the line, actuating the diaphragms of all receivers and vibrating them in unison with the buzzer of the ringing telephone. Receivers in this way act as "howlers" in addition to their usual function.

The condenser of course prevents the Morse current from reaching or working through the telephone to ground. The impedance, or retarding coil, may be made by using one of the coils out of an ordinary Morse relay (150 ohms), as its resistance is 75 ohms. Where Morse sets come between telephones on the line, both key and relay of the set should be completely bridged across with a condenser of small capacity. Where it is possible to use two telegraph wires and make a metallic circuit, a one microfarad condenser on each side of the induction will serve the purpose of the two micro-farad condenser shown in diagram.

REAR LIGHT TELL-TALE.

New Device Used in England by Motorists Proves Successful.

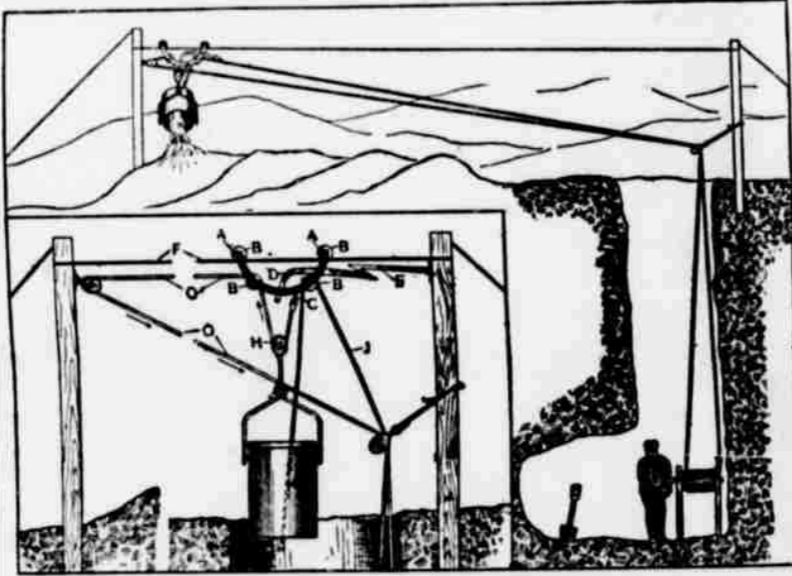
English users of motor cars are adopting a new device which instantly reports the failure of either of the rear signal lamps. The penalties in that country for running without the full complement of lights are heavy. The device is for use in connection

with electric lamps, and the instant a lamp fails the fact is announced by the ringing of an electric bell. For the purpose of illustrating the apparatus, the connecting wire is shown exposed in the cut. In use the wire is concealed.

Huge Electric Rotating Tower Crane

For loading such heavy articles as guns, boilers, machines, etc., the Dublin port and docks board has installed a powerful rotating tower crane, operated by electricity and dealing with normal working loads of 100 tons. The part that rotates consists of a vertical crane post resting on a cylindrical bearing and supporting a horizontal braced truss. The upper horizontal thrust is borne by means of rollers on a ring bearing fixed to the trestle, surrounding the crane post.

On the short arm of the horizontal truss are located the counterweight and the machine room, the latter housing the machinery for hoisting and for traversing the hoisting crab, which which runs on the long arm of the truss between the two side girders and is provided with auxiliary hoisting gear of 20 tons working capacity and 30 tons maximum carrying capacity. The motors for operating the hoists

are of 60 and 40 British horsepower and the one for traveling the crab is of 30 British horsepower. The slewing mechanism is located on a platform at the junction of the crane post and the truss, says the Electrical Review, London, and is operated by a 15 British horsepower motor. On an upper platform above the slewing gear is placed the driver's house, containing the controllers and having a good view of the working field of the crane.

The greatest height of the load hook of the crane above the quay wall is 70 feet; hoisting height, 100 feet; radius for 20 tons, 80 feet; for 160 tons, 75 feet. When hoisting 150 tons the working speed is three feet per minute, and when hoisting 20 tons, 20 feet per minute; speed of traveler, 28 feet; eight minutes are required for a complete rotation.

New Use for Electricity.

The latest, and, it will be thought by many, one of the best uses to which electricity has been put is the destruction of the mosquito. Maurice Chauvin, of Paris, is the man who has thought of electrocuting this most obnoxious disturber of summer peace, says The Reader. He has devised and patented an apparatus with a cylindrical lantern with two rings, suspended one above the other, and joined by parallel and vertical chains. These are connected with the source of electricity, which may be provided by a small accumulator in such a fashion that each of these little chains is always alive. In the center is some sort of a lamp that attracts those ardent lovers of luminosity, the mosquitoes and gnats. They touch the chains, and that instant is fatal to them. They are neatly "short-circuited," and they buzz no more. They even forget what they meant by all their buzzing, or what occult reason they had for seeking the luminary. They are dead and done for. This apparatus can be placed in a room, and the proper owner of the chamber is insured a comfortable night.

Portland Grounding Wires.

In Portland, Ore., work is about to begin on tearing up the streets to put electric light and power, telegraph and telephone wires underground. The corporations interested will spend \$500,000 carrying out the plans.

"Riding the Goat" Electrically.

The published report of the use of electric appliances in certain college initiations moves the Western Electrician to condemn such proceedings unreservedly. It says editorially: "Applied electricity has many uses, and they are important, but when it comes to using the electric current as a means of hazing or as an initiatory performance at a secret society meeting, a foolish step has been taken, and it is not improbable that serious results may ensue. Among some of the more unrestrained students belonging to the upper class of one of our technical institutions recently it was felt that the old and tried methods of hazing were hardly adequate to the occasion, so several under-graduates were subjected to strong electric currents until they became exhausted. Such hazardous tomfoolery as this should be suppressed."

A Glass Bridge.

Colorado is about to astonish the world with a glass bridge. Across the gorge of the wonderful Grand Canyon of the Arkansas river, near Canyon City, a suspension bridge has been built more than 2,900 feet above the surface of the river. Its floor is of plate glass, so that tourists may look down into the wonderful gorge, the deepest in the Rockies. The floor of the bridge is about a mile and a half above sea-level. An electric railway from Canyon City will carry travelers to the edge of the gorge.

AT MINSTER-ON-SEA

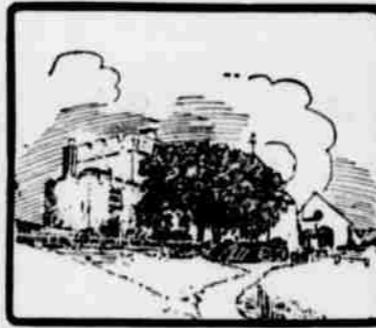
BEAUTIFUL SPOT WHICH LONDON IS JUST DISCOVERING.

So Near to the Great City and So Easy of Access That it Has Been Overlooked by Those Seeking Rest and Health.

With the growth of the summer impulse to get away for an outing, notably in this country as well as in England, there has come as a logical result the discovery of many new places of natural beauty and charm where one can rusticate for a season and recuperate the tired body and mind. Each year finds some new spot claiming attention and offering its hospitality to those who have the price.

London is just beginning to discover the charm of her nearest health resort, Minster-on-Sea. Old London town is considered the most conservative spot in the British Isles. Proofs of this can be seen daily and are abundant. Long before the electric tram and the motor omnibus invaded London they were common objects in the streets of Dublin and Glasgow, and another instance of London's habit of clinging to a fixed idea is to be found in its slowness to adopt new holiday or health resorts. The idea gets fixed in the public mind that the old seaside haunts, however overcrowded they may be, are the only spots on the shore where health and happiness can be found; and though some of these may be distant, and, in some cases, not readily accessible, the habit of repairing to them clings, notwithstanding the irksomeness of the journey and the possibility of not finding a suitable resting place when reached. But happily Londoners are gradually being educated into the belief that there are many beautiful places within easy reach of the great metropolis which have hitherto not received the attention they deserve. One of these is Minster-on-Sea, which seems to have been designed by nature as a holiday haunt for dwellers in or near the capital.

The island is rapidly becoming popular as a seaside resort, but is as yet unknown to the tripper or ordinary excursionist who lounges about and leaves traces of his meanderings in broken bottles and sandwiches that fester in the sun. Those who visit Minster-on-Sea do so on account of its health-giving capabilities, and on account of its being an ideal spot for an idle holiday, or in some cases in an antiquarian spirit to inspect the remains of former times visible in such

buildings as the famous Minster Abbey, which contains tombs of the time of the Plantagenets and even of an earlier date. There are brasses in the Abbey church which date back to 1200. The Minster Abbey is in a good state of preservation, and from all points will repay the close and loving inspection of the student of architecture or of sculpture. But for those who take a delight in inland scenery the island is not without its attractions, although the noble forests have been cut down to make firewood, and the island has been denuded of its finest timber without any attempt being made to re-forest it. The coast-line, which extends three-quarters round the island, is formed of sandy cliffs, in many cases far above the level of the sea, and forming a beautiful little bay, which is an ideal spot for bathers and boaters, and the sandy dunes on the cliffs covered with melancholy seagresses through which the winds whistle and sing, make, with their long uneven stretches, a golfing ground which has no rival in the British Isles. There are also long lanes bounded by hedgerows, the prodigal homes of unmarketable beauty; lanes which rival the far-famed Chantry Lane of Bexhill-on-Sea. And this is Minster-on-Sea, a new place on the summer map of Londoners.

Ants Hard to Kill.

Ants are really very long lived, considering their minuteness. Janet had two queens under observation for ten years, and one of Sir John Lubbock's ant pets lived into her eighteenth year.

Ants are very tenacious of life after severe injury. Following loss of the entire abdomen they sometimes live two weeks, and in one case a headless ant, carefully decapitated by aseptic surgery, lived for forty-one days. A carpenter ant after being submerged eight days in distilled water came to life upon being dried, so that they are practically proof against drowning. They can live for long periods without food; in one case the fast lasted nearly nine months before the ant starved to death.—Scientific American.

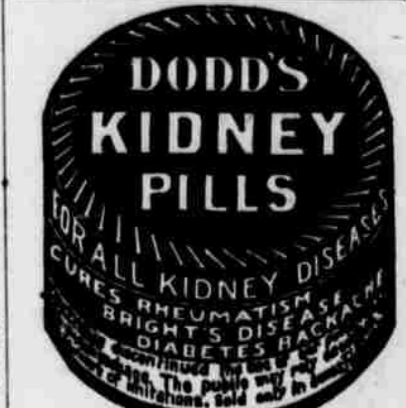

Treasures for the Louvre.
Attention is called by the *Travelers' Gazette* to recent acquisitions by the Louvre, notably of a life size bust in chalk, primitively colored, of the hermit king of the eighteenth dynasty, Akhoumalon, or Amenophis IV., one of the strangest figures in the long line of the Pharaohs. The bust is a remarkably fine specimen of the art of the period, and is well preserved. Besides this, there are four sepulchral urns in blue porcelain from the tomb of Rameses II. In these urns was found, besides funeral linen, certain organic matter, which is being chemically examined.

FOR THE INVALID.

APPETIZING AND EASILY PREPARED DISHES.

Beef Tea, Chicken Broth, and the Like, Are No Longer Considered the Only Proper Food for a Sick Person.

Upon the subject of invalid cookery there seems to be a woeful amount of ignorance, and the lack of interest in getting up a variety of nourishing things daily served is from the habit of thinking that beef tea and chicken broth and milk, perhaps, are all an invalid should care for, writes Jeanette Young, in the *New York World*. Far be it from truth, for there is no appetite so difficult to cater to as that of the convalescent. Here are a few simple recipes for the use of the home nurse:

One pound of solid beef, one ounce of butter, one onion, one quart water and one teaspoon of salt. Cut the beef into dice and place it with the other ingredients in a stew pan, and stir until all melts together and forms a thin gravy, then add the water and simmer three-quarters of an hour, strain and cool, then remove grease. If beef tea be needed in haste, scrape the beef into fibers, cover it with boiling water and salt, cover closely, boil ten minutes and set in a bowl of ice water to cool; skim, warm again and serve. Extract of beef, if not too strong, and made with boiling water, is at times acceptable and convenient.

One calf's foot, three pints of water, one lump of sugar, yolk of one egg, teaspoon of butter, nutmeg and salt to taste. Stew the foot in the water with rind of half a lemon until the quantity is about half, skim carefully and set away to cool. Remove all fat and warm about half a pint, adding the butter, sugar and the nutmeg. Remove from the fire and stir in the beaten yolk, keep stirring, place back on the fire and let it thicken, but not boil, as that would curdle it. Serve in a covered cup with soda wafers.

One fresh fowl, one quart of water, one blade of mace, half an onion, a small bunch of sweet herbs, ten peppercorns and salt to taste. Joint the fowl, place it with the other ingredients in a clean saucepan and simmer gently one and a half hours, carefully skimming. Strain, cool and remove the grease, and warm as needed. If desired a spoonful of rice boiled in water may be added, also a little scalded, and finely chopped parsley. This is convalescent broth; for the very sick avoid all seasoning but salt.

One pound of scrag end of the neck of mutton, one onion, one-half a turnip, one bunch of herbs, three pints of water, pepper and salt to taste. Put all the ingredients in a stew pan; when it boils skim it carefully, cover and cook one hour; strain and cool. If desired, pearl barley boiled in water may be added, or scalded parsley. For "simple broth" leave out all seasoning but salt, and add a jointed fowl.

Clam broth may be purchased in bottles or easily made at home, the latter is more desirable. Wash 50 clams (small round variety), put in a kettle with a cup of cold water, cover and let steam until all are wide open, strain and cool the juice and it is ready for use. The clams may be placed in a rich cream dressing and served on toast for luncheon for the well ones of the family.

Oyster broth is best made by washing the shells and placing in a white glazed dripping pan, with half a cup of water, in a hot oven, and when all shells are open wide strain the juice over a dainty slice of buttered toast with a dash of pepper and serve. The oysters may be also used as suggested for the clams.

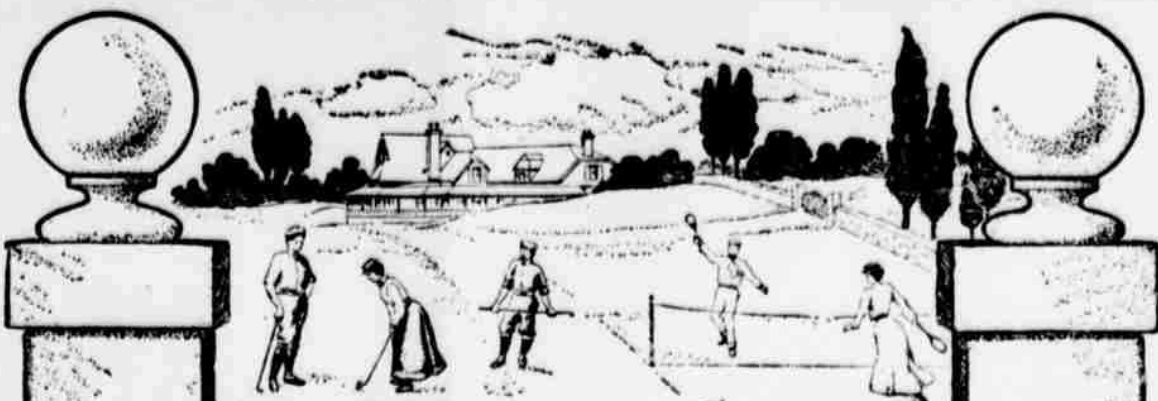
Apple Souffle.

Boil a pint of milk with the pared rind of a lemon in it. Strain off the lemon-rind and put in three ounces of rice. Cook this slowly till the milk is absorbed. Add two ounces of castor sugar. Beat it well with a spoon to crush it, and next press the rice on the bottom and sides of a cake-tin, and let it dry in a cool oven. Have ready some nicely stewed apples which have been rubbed through a sieve; add to them the beaten yolks of two eggs and one ounce of butter. Stir over the fire to cook the eggs, but do not boil it. Beat the whites of three eggs to a stiff froth and add lightly to the apples. Put it into the rice boiler, and bake in a quick oven about half an hour. It must be served immediately.—*Montreal Herald*.

To Make Raw Eggs Palatable.
If you have to take raw eggs to build up your strength (and there's nothing much better) take them without heating them up—without breaking the yolk.

A dash of rich grape juice over the egg, a quick swallow and, although you feel that a glove stretcher has been applied to your throat, the egg is down, and all you taste is a delicious bit of grape juice.

To Clean Fur Robe.
Ordinary cornmeal well rubbed in and then shaken out vigorously will clean the white fur carriage robe, unless there are spots of some foreign substance on it. In that event powdered French chalk, if left on overnight, will probably effect a cure.
