

Parade To Kick Off Rodeo

Politics Steps Up Pace

Politicians have stepped up their pace a little in the last week before election, with more handshaking, etc., in evidence. County Judge Byron Richardson is opposed in his bid for re-election by Roy Gilbreath, owner-operator of Baird Lumber Co., and former acting postmaster.

Also appearing on the ballot for the May 7 Democratic Primary is Glen Swor, Precinct 2 Commissioner, opposed by Howard Johnson.

There are three contested races for Justice of the Peace. They are incumbent Garvin Jones, opposed by Ray Hass in Precinct 1; incumbent Marion E. Jolly, opposed by Vernon Walker in Precinct 5; and J. M. McMullen, Edgar Beard and W. M. Stansbury, all seeking the Precinct 6 office.

Unopposed for re-election are Beatrice Deal, county-district clerk; Hazel Reynolds, treasurer; L. C. Cash, county school superintendent; and Duke Mitchell, Precinct 4 Commissioner.

Polls will open Saturday, May 7 at 8:00 a. m., and will close at 7 p. m.

It is required by law for cities of 10,000 population or more to have their polling places open from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m. However, the Commissioners Court in cities of less population sets the time for polls to open and close.

A total of 52 absentee ballots have been cast in Callahan County as reported by Beatrice Deal, County Clerk. Absentee voting in the May Primary began April 17 and ended May 3.

The Precinct 1 Convention has been set for 2:00 p. m. Saturday, May 7, in the county courtroom at the courthouse. Hugh Ross is Chairman of Precinct 1.

Each precinct in the county will hold a precinct convention, and will select delegates to the county convention, which, in turn, will name delegates in the two-party state conventions. Delegate strength in the precincts is based on the vote in that box for the party's candidate for governor in the last general election.

In order to participate in a precinct convention, a party member must be a qualified voter who has voted in that day's election.

Rain-Tornadoes Lash Area

It has been estimated that from 8 to 10 inches of rain has fallen in the Baird-Clyde area during the past two weeks.

Both lakes at Baird are full and have been going over the spillway for a week. Baird Mayor Lynn Ault and City Secretary James Asbury estimated the lake now contains enough water to last four years.

Friday afternoon, Clyde received a downpour totaling about 3 1/2 inches in a few hours.

An unconfirmed tornado was reported in the area of the Jim Hatchett Ranch, near the Admiral community, Friday afternoon.

The twister demolished a shed near the Hatchett home, strewn the debris several hundred feet. A portion of their yard fence was also mangled due to the flying debris.

A path was cut through the Hatchett pasture land, twisting mesquite trees off at ground level. A wooden gate opening onto the Admiral highway directly across from the Rob Walker place, was splintered. The tornado apparently lifted here as the Walker house was untouched.

18,203.00 Savings Bonds Bought In Quarter

Savings Bonds sales for the first three months of 1966 in Callahan County totaled \$18,203. Of this amount \$5,091.00 were purchased during March, according to Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of the Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee.

Sales in Texas for the first quarter of 1966 amounted to \$38,640,779, which represents 26 percent of the state's goal of \$147.5 million.

"We are delighted to report that Series E and H Bond sales during the month of March were 12.5 percent greater than March 1965. This fine sales increase can be contributed to the fact that the interest rate on Savings Bonds was raised recently to 4.15 percent, compounded semi-annually when held to maturity. 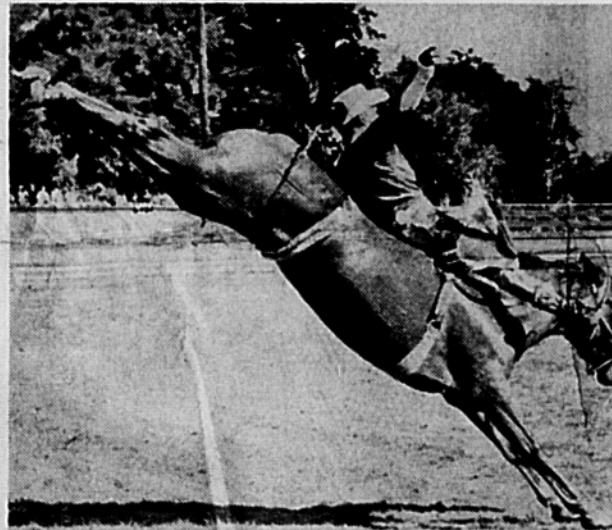

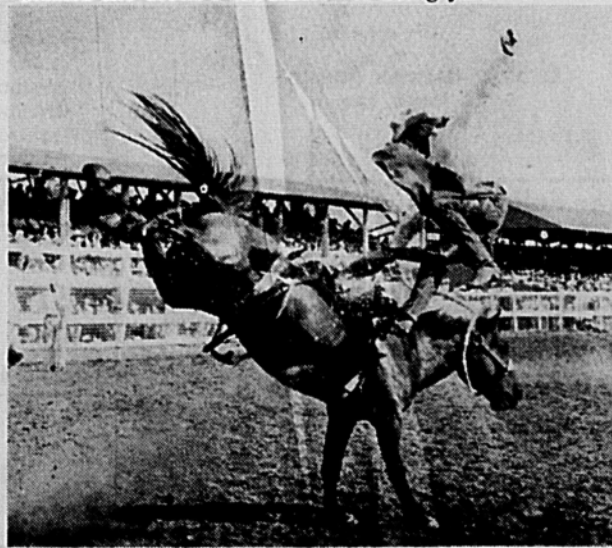
That's A Lotta Beef —

TOP COWBOYS TO COMPETE

Shawn Davis, current national saddle bronc riding champion, paces a field of early entries for the annual Callahan County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo, which swings into action Thursday through Saturday nights, with an estimated \$3,500 payoff awaiting winners.

Davis, 24, from Whitehall, Mont., established a new money record for his event — \$25,599 — in capturing pro rodeo's 1965 title.

As one of more than 500 rodeos approved annually by the Rodeo Cowboys Association, competition in the Sheriff's Posse Rodeo, is conducted under nationally recognized rules.

Prize money, a combination of purses put up by the rodeo committee, in this case, \$1,687, is swelled by added entry fees from contestants. Whatever a cowboy wins here will be credited to his standing in national title races.

Scheduled rodeo events include saddle and bareback bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling and bull riding.

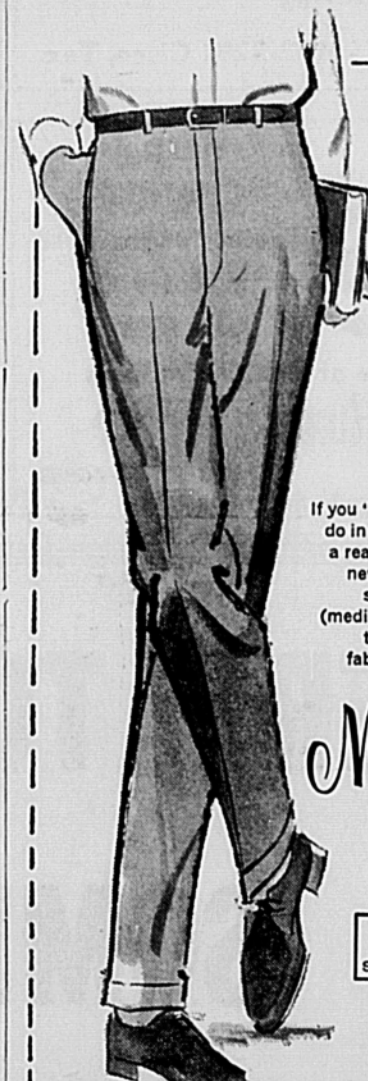

AUSTIN — Next year's legislative session may see state employees battling as hard for a pay raise as school teachers.

Furthermore, help is assured. Gov. John Connally says that "substantial pay raises for state employees" will be among his "strongest recommendations" to lawmakers.

Indications are that the pay boosts could run as high as \$17-500,000 a year.

According to Connally, state government is slipping farther and farther behind in its efforts to keep qualified workers -- not only in the lowest pay levels but in the higher brackets of professional personnel. Connally says that:

More than 7,800 of the 45,000 state employees (not including those at colleges and universities) make less than \$3,000 a year, the federal "poverty line."

Turnover is running 30 per cent per year.

Lower-bracket hospital aides get as little as \$193 a month.

There are 313 vacancies in the hospital system, 77 in parks and wildlife operations, 100 in the prison system, 135 in the highway patrol and 147 in the Texas Education Agency.

"If we do not reverse the trend," warns Connally, "not only will the security and efficiency of our operations be threatened, but we will also weaken our entire system of local self government and responsibility."

Salary issue promptly was injected into the governor's race. Stanley Woods, Connally's opponent for the Democratic nomination, chided the governor for not having spoken out on the subject before election time.

Woods' ticketmate, State Rep. Bill Hollowell, running for lieutenant governor, said Connally should submit the raises to an immediate special session of the Legislature rather than waiting eight months until the regular session opens.

GINNERS FIRST ON CONTROL LIST? — Texas' new nine-member State Air Control Board now has held its second meeting since Governor Connally named the group, whose pur-

pose is to protect the public from air pollution. Indications are that Texas' more than 1,300 cotton gins will be the first area subject to air control rules and regulations.

Conclusions after a year-long study of pollutants caused by cotton gins is that smoke emitted from burr burning contains significant quantities of arsenic and tars. These poisons, along with gin dust, have contributed to the 20 to 30 per cent increase in complaints about respiratory diseases suffered by downwind residents during ginning season. Also, there have been adverse effects on trees and vegetation downwind from arsenic and other evidences of pollutants.

Report states that much of the increased pollutants from the gins are caused from an increase in trash -- leaves, limbs, immature bolls, and dust -- picked up by mechanical harvesters. Recommendations for curing these problems will be in the report of the Board's staff.

WATER QUALITY COSTS GOING UP — Taxpayers, as well as the men who run the sewage treatment plants in growing cities, must get used to the fact that in the future they are going to have to maintain high standards of operation of their plants. Higher quality water means higher cost of treatment. This came out in the Texas Water Pollution Control Board's meeting when the City of Dallas objected to a doubling of the Board's usual chlorination requirement, arguing it would cost more than it would be worth.

Dave Smallhorst, the Board's executive secretary, said: "The cities, including Dallas, have to recognize the fact that an increase in water quality requirements is going to mean an increase in cost." Smallhorst said chlorination is necessary to protect public health and the Board's first concern is the health of the public.

In 1965 some 1509 forest fires burned 19,229 acres of East Texas forests.

It was reported to the Baird Star this week by American Legion Post Commander, C. H. Lunsford, that the Rutherford Fund has been officially closed. Over \$300.00 has been donated to help Mrs. Rutherford and her three children after the death of her husband earlier this year.

Mrs. Rutherford also instructed Mr. Lunsford to express her thanks to the many citizens of Baird who donated, and espe-

cially to the American Legion for the much needed help she and her children has received.

The fund was started by the American Legion some time ago. Donations were received by James Eubanks, Finance Officer for the Legion, and given to Mrs. Rutherford as needed.



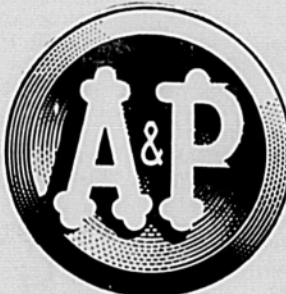

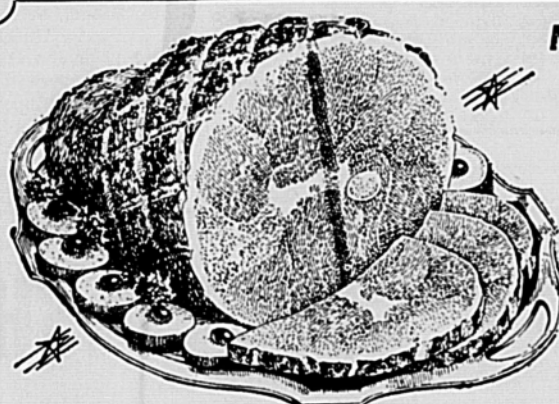

An Ordinance Establishing The Maintenance of Certain Animals Within 300 Feet From Any Hospital, Cafe, Church, Nursing Home, School or Any Federal Housing Authority, A Public Health Hazard, Providing For The Establishment of Minimum Distances in Relation To The Maintenance of Certain Animals; Providing For a Penalty By Fine Not To Exceed \$200.00 And Providing For An Emergency.

WHEREAS, it has been deemed by the City Council of the City of Baird, that the maintenance of horses, mules, jacks, jennies, cows, cattle, hogs, sheep or goats within 300 feet of a Hospital, Cafe, Church, Nursing Home, School, or Federal Housing Authority Unit, is a health hazard, thereby,

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Baird, Baird, Texas:

SECTION 1. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any Person, Firm, Partnership or Corporation to maintain or keep within 300 feet of a Hospital, Cafe, Church, Nursing Home, School, or Federal Housing Authority Unit, any horses, mules, jacks, jennies, cows, cattle, hogs, sheep or goats.

SECTION 2. That the Chief of Police or any Police Officer shall take up, or cause to be removed any such animal or animals listed above, when found, being maintained or impounded within a distance of 300 feet of any Hospital, Cafe, Church, Nursing Home, School, or Federal Housing Authority Unit.

SECTION 3. Any person, Firm, Partnership or Corporation found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$10.00, nor more

than \$200.00, together with the cost of such prosecution.

SECTION 4. Each day during which violation continues shall be a separate offense.

SECTION 5. Nothing in this Ordinance hereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding now pending in any Court, or in any rights acquired or liability incurred, nor any cause or causes of any action accrued or existing under any Act or Ordinance repealed hereby, nor shall any right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired, or affected by this Ordinance.

SECTION 6. The invalidity of any section or provision of this Ordinance shall not invalidate other sections or provisions thereof.

SECTION 7: Any Ordinance, or part of Ordinance conflicting with the provisions of this Ordinance, or inconsistent herewith, is hereby repealed.

SECTION 8: Whereas an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of health and general welfare, and no current Ordinance exists adequate to control the livestock listed herein, an emergency is therefore declared, and this Ordinance shall be effective from and after the date of its passage, and publication as provided by law, upon reading thereof.

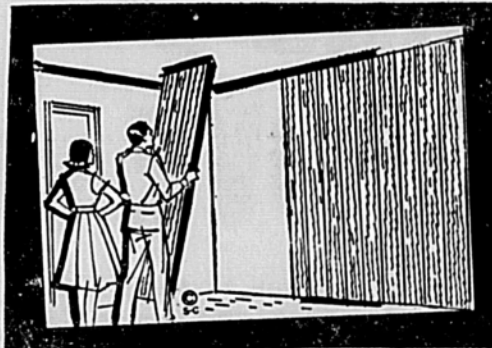

Forty-eight thousand, five hundred persons were killed in 1965 on the nation's highways, according to a report by The Travelers Insurance Companies. In addition, 4,100,000 others were injured in traffic accidents last year.

Drivers under 25 years of age represent only about 18 per cent of all licensed drivers in the U. S., but in 1965 they were involved in more than 30 per cent of all fatal accidents and 28 per cent of all non-fatal highway mishaps.

May Is Senior Citizen Month

May is Senior Citizens Month. Under the new law passed by Congress, May is also the month that persons who reached 65 before March 1, 1966, will have to sign up for doctor bill insurance if they are to have coverage by July 1, 1966, the date that medical coverage begins.

R. R. Tuley Jr., District Manager for Social Security in Abilene urged all senior citizens age 65 or over who have not signed up for doctor bill insurance to visit their social security office immediately, so that they may have protection when the program starts July 1.

Almost all persons 65 or over are eligible for the two types of health insurance under the medicare program, hospital insurance and doctor bill insurance. Social security beneficiaries are automatically enrolled in the hospital insurance program, but persons who are still working or who do not receive social security benefits must sign up for hospital insurance. On the other hand, in order to get protection toward the cost of doctors bills at a cost of \$3 per month, all persons must enroll.

According to Tuley, persons who were 65 before March 1, 1966, and fail to enroll before the deadline, May 31, will have to wait till October 1967 before they will have another chance to apply for doctor bill protection. He added that as senior citizens become 65 they should visit their social security office no later than the month before their 65th birthday to have protection as soon as they reach 65.
