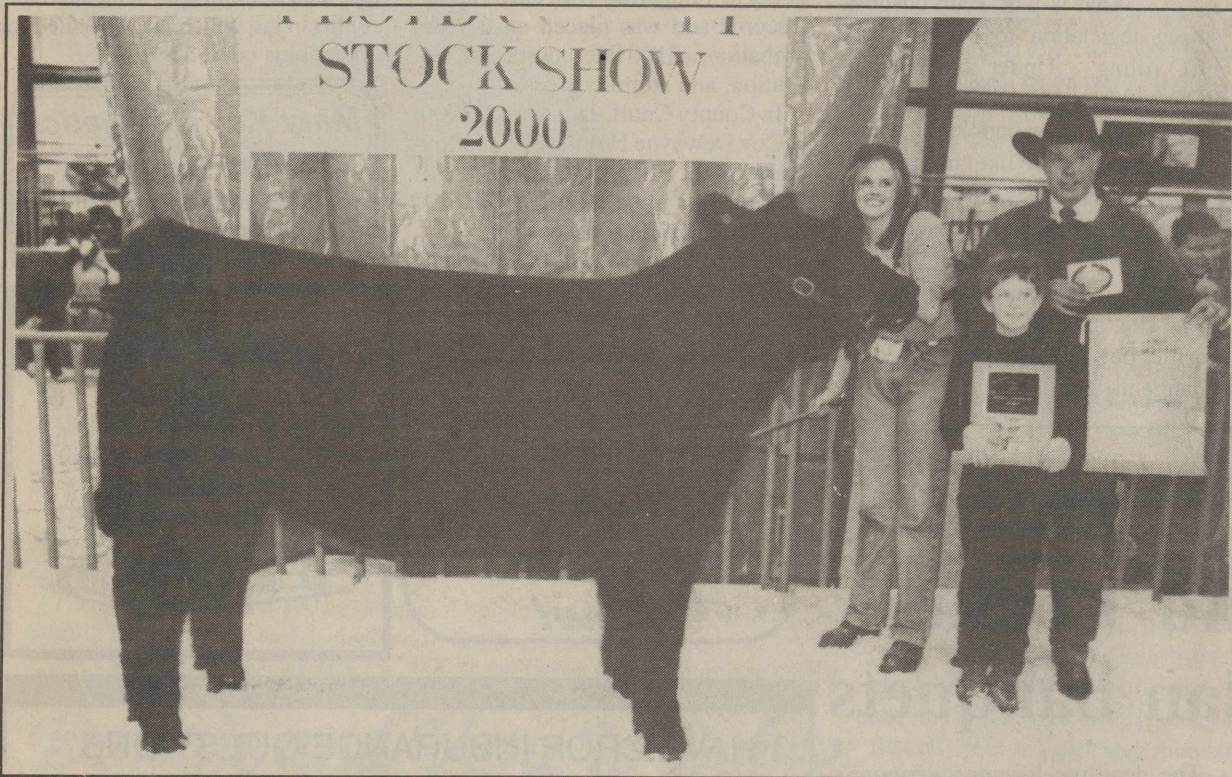

Stock Show competitors enjoy new arena

Exhibitors and guests were treated to a dry, warm, and clean county stock show last weekend inside the brand new community built Unity Center.

To the delight of everyone involved in this year's stock show, the expansive James & Eva Mayer Arena was transformed into a spacious show ring rivaling the professional Houston Livestock Show Arena.

Animals were moved easily among the crowds and into and out of the large show ring. Pigs and lambs were housed in pens built by Lockney and Floydada Ag Departments. Swine were easily herded into the arena with alleys built by Lockney FFA.

A large concession area stayed busy serving the crowds who had a choice of eating at tables or in comfortable stands.

Amanda Williams opened the 2000 Floyd County Stock Show by singing the National Anthem and Jon LaBaume led prayer.

A moment of silence was observed at the start of the Swine Show for Hunter Hagood, a 14 year old boy recovering from a gunshot wound to the head.

Grand Champions chosen at the 2000 Livestock Show were: Desha Smith, Cynthia Martinez, Kristen Kellison, and Senee Foster.

Reserve Grand Champions were: Katy Austin, Randa Shurbet, Janee Hrbacek, and William Foster.

Senior Showmanship honors were awarded to: Brady Rasco, lambs; Shane Lloyd, swine; and Tye Wood, steers.

Junior Showmanship honors were given to: Amanda Hancock, lambs; Randa Shurbet, swine; and Taylor Beedy, steers.

Desha Smith's 136 pound Breed Champion Medium Wool, was chosen as the Grand Champion Lamb.

Katy Austin's 145 pound lamb was chosen from the same class as the Reserve Grand Champion Lamb.

The Grand Champion Swine was a Medium Weight York, weighing 224 pounds, and owned by Cynthia Martinez.

The Reserve Grand Champion Swine was a Medium Heavy Cross, weighing 236 pounds, owned by Randa Shurbet.

Kristen Kellison's Grand Champion Steer was a 1,295 pound Cross Breed.

Janee Hrbacek's Shorthorn, weighing 1,255 pounds was the Reserve Grand Champion Steer.

In the Heifer Division the Foster family took the top honors. Senee Foster was Supreme Champion with her British Breed Angus.

William Foster's European Reserve Champion was the Reserve Supreme Champion Heifer.

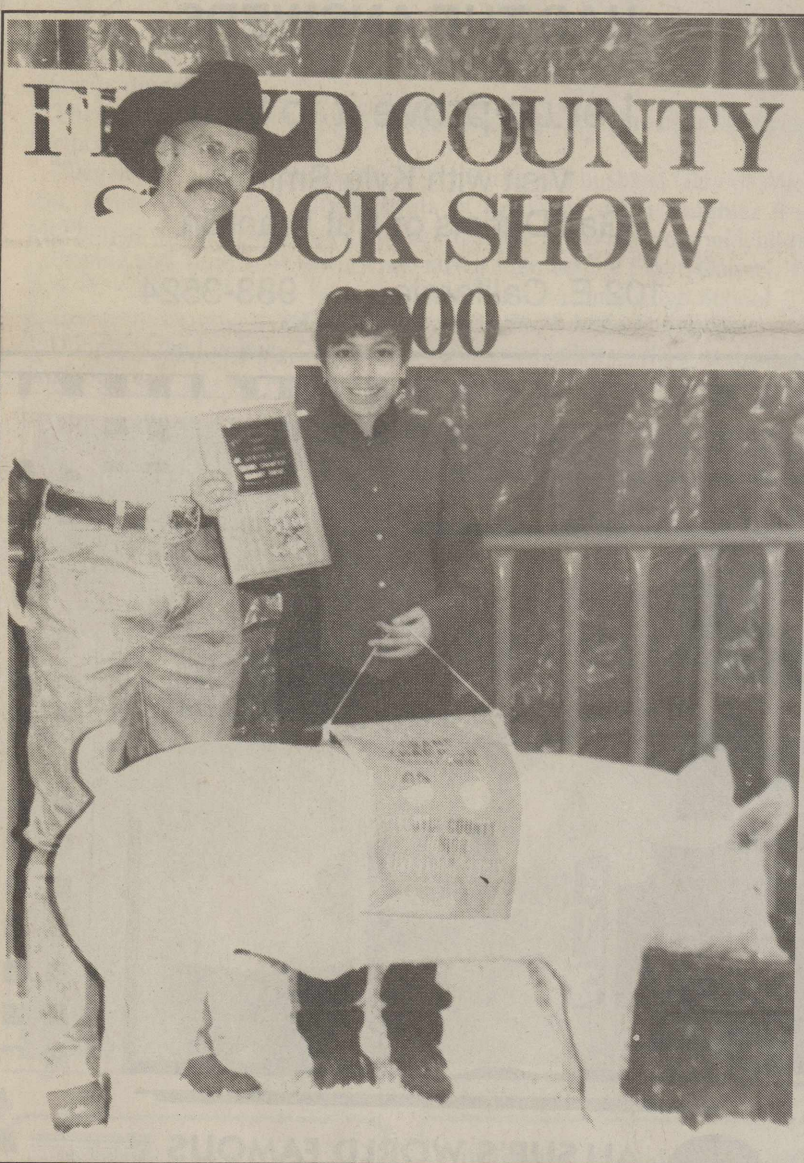

Lockney citizens voice opinions on drug policy at public hearing

For the first time in Floyd County's history, LISD started a new drug testing policy with a Junior High and High School test of all students and staff, Tuesday, February 1.

The school used local media to publicize the future drug testing and last Thursday night, January 27, Superintendent Lusk served as moderator of a Public Hearing concerning the new policy.

Most of those who spoke at the hearing appeared to be in favor of the testing. Although sympathetic to parents who were wary of school intervention into parents child raising, teachers who spoke told of problems teaching students who have spent their weekends drinking or using other drugs.

"We are not always in agreement in what helps children," said Lusk. "Our motive (with this testing) is to help children--to give them tools to resist the pressures they face."

Lusk reminded the citizens in attendance that 2 years ago approximately 300 people met in the gymnasium to address school personnel and law enforcement officials over perceived drug problems. "There were people

then who were very unhappy that we had not already implemented a drug testing policy," said Lusk.

"Our surveys show drug use among our kids. Staff members tell us there are concerns among our students."

Lusk said the school district is not trying to "catch people". "We are trying to help kids and help you," said Lusk. "Lets do whatever we can do to help each other eliminate this problem."

"If the only reason they don't do drugs is they are afraid of getting caught--that's good enough for me."

One Lockney parent, Larry Tannahill, was very vocal in his opposition to the drug policy.

At one time Tannahill stated he was in favor of the policy, but against the stipulation that a parent must sign the policy or his child would be placed in In School Suspension.

"I believe this violates my rights and my son's rights," said Tannahill.

Tannahill referred to the policy which states, "Parental consent for a student to submit to biological testing is required as a condition, grades six through twelve, to be in good standing as a student at Lockney ISD,

and to be able to participate in activities. Any refusal by the student and/or parent, to sign the consent form will be treated as a positive test, and subject the student to consequences as set forth in this policy, and in accordance with student handbook..."

According to the drug testing policy the 1st Offense calls for substance abuse counseling, suspension for 21 days from school activities, and 3 days in ISS.

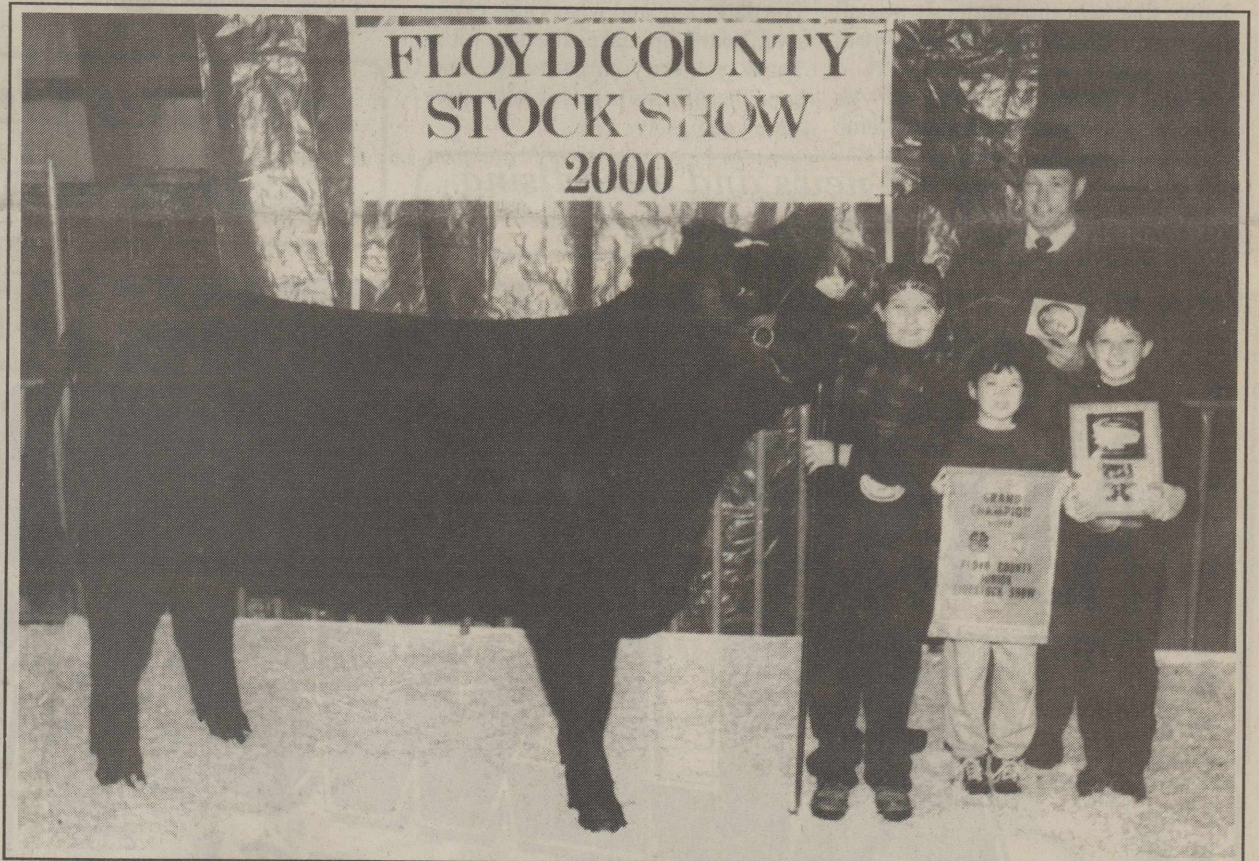
"I believe this has created peer pressure at home between my son and his mother over signing this paper," said Tannahill. "My son has signed the policy but we have not."

High School Principal James Poole addressed some of Tannahill's concerns and said, "In order to be effective we have to have the whole school involved. We need the policy signed to carry through."

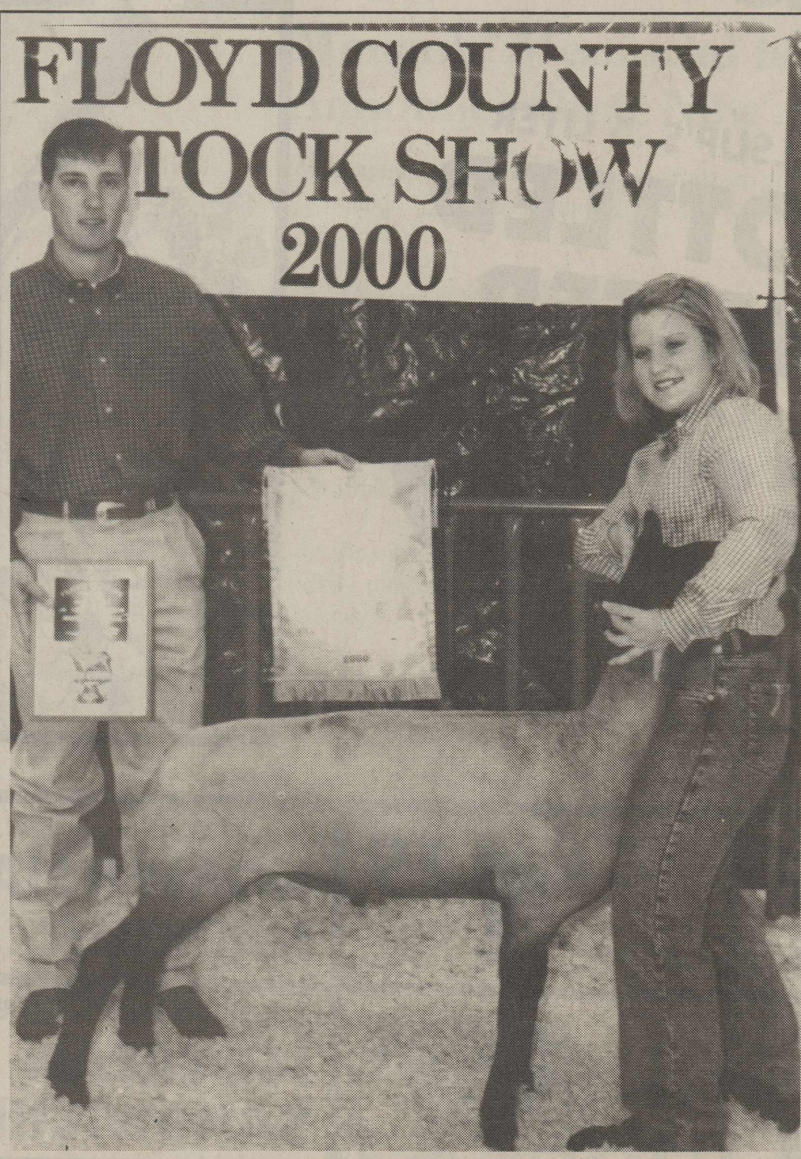
"We have to enforce it totally," said Lusk, "if we don't then we have no policy."

Tannahill told Lusk he had no intention of signing the policy, and that he planned on fighting the policy.

Realignment for 2A schools still in question

Tuesday, February 1, 2000, University Interscholastic League (UIL) made several changes to districts around the area, however there is still confusion at the time of this story, due to an error made in the realignment.

Tuesday morning, the UIL initially placed Lockney and Floydada in District 5-2A. District 5-2A consists of some familiar opponents for Lockney and Floydada, as well as four new teams. The district contains: Lockney, Floydada, Abernathy, New Deal, Hale Center, Friona, Morton, and Olton.

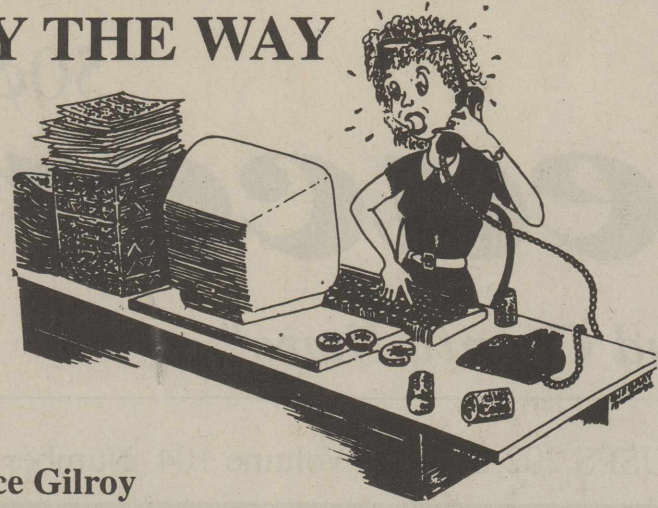
An error by UIL moved the small 1A school of Lorenzo up to 2A. Lorenzo was put into district 4-2A with Tahoka, Post, Ralls, Idalou, and Sundown. With Lorenzo out, district 4-2A would remain with only five teams.

"The UIL is opposed to five-team districts and the UIL will most likely take a team out of 5-2A, which could be New Deal, but there is a chance it could be Morton or Floydada," said Tim Daughtrey, athletic director of Floydada.

If there is a team taken out of district 5-2A, then only seven teams would be left in the district. With only seven teams, there would be a bye week for each of the seven teams

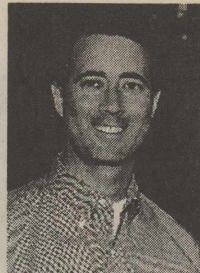
The building is all ready for the next meeting or banquet.

FCC Ruling is Another Attempt by Unelected Bureaucrats to Pass a Law Without Our Consent

Last week, I talked about OSHA's attempt to send government inspectors into home offices.

This week, I want to talk about another federal regulation, one which -- unless overturned -- could lead to government infringement of religious speech.

On December 29th, the Federal Communications Commission said that non-commercial television stations can no longer consider many church services and religious shows to be "general educational programming." This is important because at least 50 percent of the programs on a non-commercial station must be educational. If they are not, a station will lose its license.

There are currently about 95 religious broadcasters in America who qualify for this kind of license.

If this new regulation goes into effect, these stations will have to either change their programming or go off the air. Congress never voted on this regulation, and people were never asked what they thought. In short, it is an attempt by unelected federal bureaucrats to make a new law affecting one of our fundamental Constitutional rights.

That is why I am cosponsoring legislation to overturn the FCC ruling. Under this bill, the FCC will be required to check first with the American people if it wants to issue a directive like this again.

I've heard from a good number of people on this issue in the past few weeks. I suspect if the FCC is forced to hold public hearings on the issue, it will not only get an earful, but will also be forced to change its tune.

A WITCH DOCTOR'S HEX-My guide and Tzeltal Indian interpreter, Enrique, and I had been dropped off by a bush pilot at a little mountain strip high in the Chiapas, Mexico mountains in the early 70's.

We walked down through these mountains for three days until we reached the Tzeltal Indian river village of Chitamuccum. There we were to be picked up by the bush pilot.

I preached three times daily (morning, noon and night) and then walk to a new village and church for the noon service and a new one for the night service. So I preached in six different mountain villages and churches on the first three days of this trip.

Enrique had been a Tzeltal school teacher before he surrendered to preach. He knew the language well.

We had good crowds in all the services the first day and several made professions of faith in Christ.

It was on the second night in a village about half way down these tall mountains in the heart of the Chiapas jungle where things began to unravel.

I preached that night by the light of a little coal oil wick bottle inside a thatched roofed hut crowded with

around thirty Tzeltal Indians. It is bad enough using an interpreter ("interrupter") when you preach from Spanish to Tzeltal, but this night we had the competition of a witch doctor in the next hut over.

She was doing a voodoo hex on me, so I was told. I have never heard so much racket in all my life (except when our grandkids visit). She was shaking pieces of bones in hollow gourds in order to disturb our services.

I did not have liberty in my preaching and I did not sleep any that night. Her hex must have worked!

We finally closed the service and we "all" stretched out inside that tiny hut to sleep the night away. Not so!

As soon as the little wick light was blown out, some ten thousand roaches came down from the thatch roof to join us. Thanks to the witch doctor?

They entered my sleeping bag and tried all night to enter my ears, eyes and nose. However, I fought the good fight all that night. Many dead roaches proved that statement the next morning.

MORAL OF THE STORY: "Never underestimate the devil's power and influence."

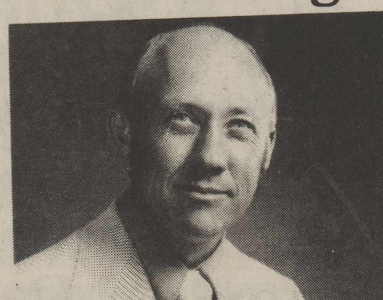

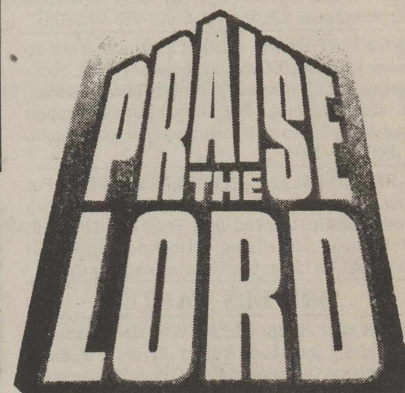
