Baylor College of Medicine receives $\$ 15.5$ million contract for tuberculosis research

Tanning beds an unsafe alternative to sun

With summertime approaching, many people turn to tanning beds and
sun lamps to get a "healthy" sun lamps to get a "healthy" tan.
Whether caused by the sun or tanning Whether caused by the sun or tanning
beds, a tan is actually the skin's injury response to damage from ultraviolet radiation.
"Any type of tan, whether from sunlight or tanning beds, is not a safe tan,"
said Mike Lehman, M.D., a dermasaid Mike Lehman, M.D., a derm.
tologist at Lehman Dermatology. One of the most common skin cancer myths is that tanning beds do not increase the risk of skin cancer. According to the American Medical As-
sociation (AMA), the strong concensociaion of UV rays emitted form tan-
trations of ning beds and sun lamps have been linked to an increased risk of both melanoma and non-melanoma skin cancers. Some scientists believe that
UV rays from tanning beds are stronUV rays from tanning beds are stron-
ger and even more harmful that UV rays from the sun.
"Tanning beds do significantly in-
crease the risk of skin cancer," Dcrease the risk of skin cancer," Dr. Lehman said.
The American Cancer society lists too much exposure to UV radiation
from tanning booths and sunlight the top risk factors for skin cancer People with too much exposure to light from these sources are at greater risk for all types of skin cancer. The AMA suggests altogethe
avoidance of deliberate tanning for anyone who is concerned with their health and the appearance of their
skin. skin.
