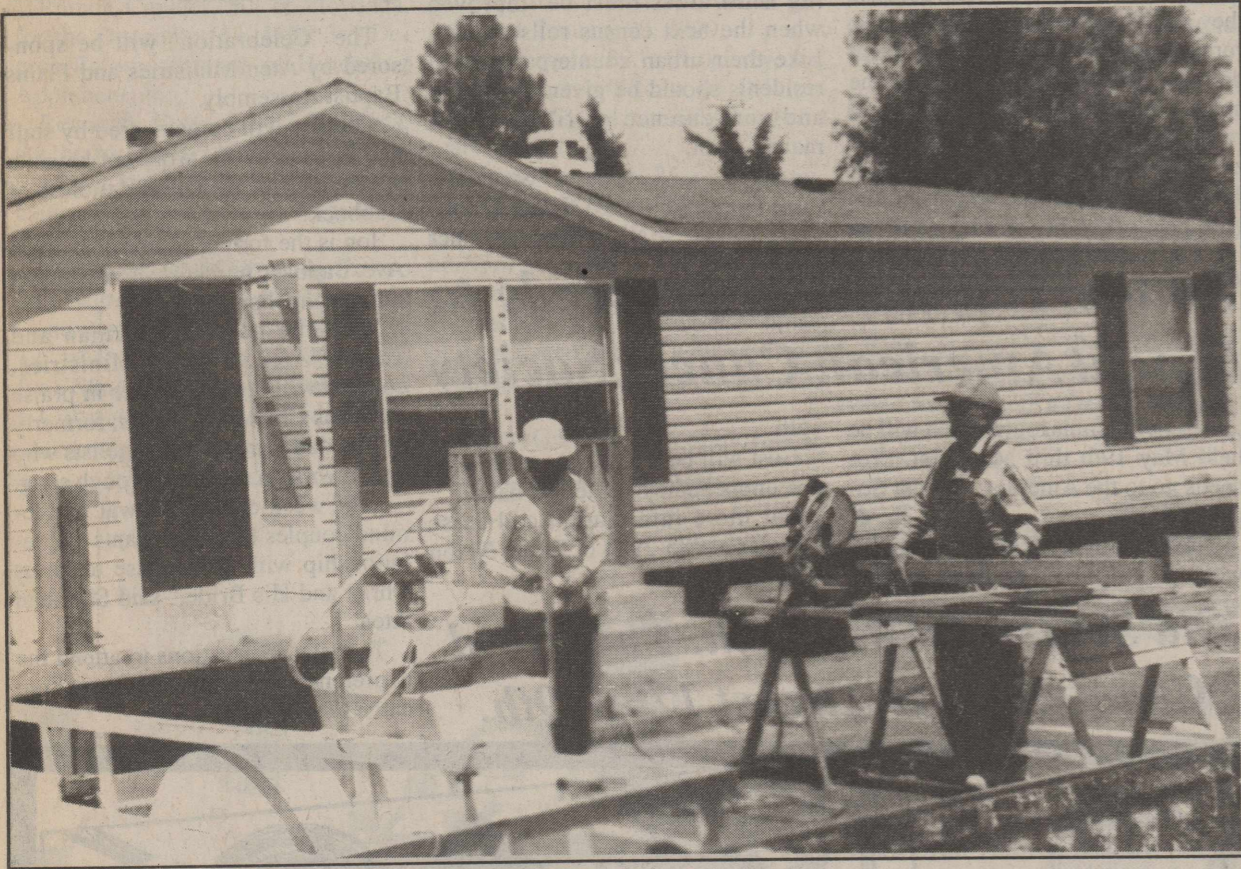

## Floydada police arrest seven in early morning drug raids

Seven suspected drug dealers were arrested by Floydada Police in an early morning raid, April 29th.

At approximately 5:45 a.m., officials with the Floydada Police, Floyd County Sheriff's Department and Lockney Police Department converged on houses around Floydada and arrested individuals who had allegedly sold drugs to undercover drug enforcement agents.

The arrests came after months of investigations done by the Floydada Police Department and undercover drug "buys" by officers with the South Plains Narcotics Task Force.

"The drug buys began in July 1999," said Floydada Police Chief Darrell Gooch.

The evidence was submitted to Floyd County Grand Jurors, who returned indictments against 8 individuals on April 28th. One of the people indicted lives in Lubbock and has not been arrested yet.

Armed with these indictments law officers arrested:

Lucy Burke, 68, of 326 W. Jackson, Floydada, was arrested for Delivery of Controlled Substance/Crack Cocaine.

Reynaldo Cuba Jr., 24, of 328 W. Jackson, Floydada. He was charged with Delivery of a Controlled Sub-

stance/Crack Cocaine. Also found at his residence was a "crack pipe". He was also charged with Possession of Drug Paraphernalia;

Ella Davis, 53, of 519 E. Jackson, Floydada, was charged with two counts of Delivery of a Controlled Substance/Cocaine. Grand Jurors also indicted Davis with one count of Possession with Intent to Deliver;

Wynsdel Davis, 37, of 624 E. Grover, was charged with Delivery of Controlled Substance/Crack Cocaine.

Linda Ratliff, 41, at 326 W. Jackson, Floydada. She was charged with Delivery of a Controlled Substance/Crack Cocaine;

Jesus Sanchez, 51, of 401 N. 1st, was arrested for Delivery of Controlled Substance/Cocaine.

Juan Sanchez, 48, of 225 W. Virginia, Floydada, was arrested for Delivery of a Controlled Substance/Marijuana. While at the location police also seized under 2 ozs. of marijuana and a .22 cal. rifle.

Because he is a convicted felon, it is illegal for Sanchez to own a firearm, therefore he was also charged with "Felon in Possession of a Firearm."

According to Gooch, "We also charged him with Tampering with Evidence, since he started flushing

marijuana down the toilet.

"He has already been convicted of Aggravated Assault with a Firearm and got out of prison in December 1998. Police were buying dope off of him six months later."

District Judge Randy Hollums set bond for all individuals, except Juan Sanchez, at \$5,000. Approximately fifteen percent of the bond must be paid before an individual can be released from jail. Bond for Juan Sanchez was set at \$7,500. As of Monday morning all individuals, except Wynsdel Davis and Juan Sanchez had bonded out of jail.

"We are still conducting investigations," said Gooch. "We hope this sends a strong message to those selling, or to those thinking about selling drugs--that it is going to get very expensive to sell drugs in Floydada."

When asked if there were going to be further arrests, Gooch said, "You ain't seen nothing yet."

In other police action, on April 23rd police were called to a disturbance in the 500 block of S. 8th. When police arrived they were met by a 39 year old woman bleeding from her throat.

"The female victim and a man had gotten into a fight," said Police Chief Darrell Gooch. "She hit him with a

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## Voters to choose council and decide on 1/2 sales tax

Municipal elections will be held in Floydada and Lockney May 6th. The only contested races are for Lockney City Council and Floydada City Council positions. Voting will be held at City Hall in both towns.

Citizens of Floydada will also vote on a very important issue of implementing a 1/2 cent sales tax in Floydada. The sales tax is designed to help economic development.

The contested races in Lockney will be for District 2 and District 3 Council positions. Only those living in District 2 and District 3 can vote (see map of city and breakdown of districts).

In District #2, incumbent Tina Graves is being challenged by Libby Delgado.

In District #3, incumbent J.D. Copeland is being challenged by Robert Luebano.

In Floydada, Councilman Albert

Hill did not sign up for re-election. The District 1 position is being sought by Betty King and Martha Garza.

### SALES TAX VOTE

Floydada City Manager Gary Brown is urging citizens to get out and vote on the sales tax issue.

"We are afraid that because there is only one race in the city election there will be a low voter turnout. We need everyone to get out and make their choice clear on the sales tax."

If approved this 1/2 cent sales tax should generate approximately \$60,000 per year to be used exclusively for economic development.

Citizens of Floydada will always have a vote on the use of the money, should the tax issue pass.

A seven person committee will be appointed to administer the work of a 4B Economic Development Corporation. The Committee can only recom-

mend to the council suggestions for the spending of the funds.

After the recommendation is made, a public hearing must be held on the project before any money can be sent.

After the first public hearing the public has 60 days to gather a petition objecting to the project. The petition may ask the city council to call for an election on a project.

"The projects do not have to just help new businesses," said Brown. "It could help existing businesses expand or improve."

"This sales tax has been one of the most popular and effective tools used by cities to promote economic development."

Other cities on the South Plains who have already passed the Sales Tax are: Littlefield, Clarendon, Friona, Groom, Gruver, and Wellington.

A highlight of Floyd County's Old Settlers Reunion, May 27, will be the Kwahadi Indian dancers.

A guaranteed crowd pleaser, the Kwahadi dancers are a group of one hundred boys and leaders, officially Explorer Scout and Post 80 of the Golden Spread Council, B.S.A.

Since 1944, over 1300 boys and leaders have presented over 2400 performances in 30 states and overseas.

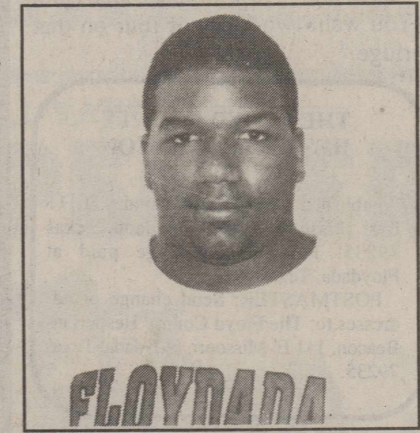

I cannot say enough about these young ladies and how well they competed. I congratulate them and the effort that each one of them showed. It was impressive.

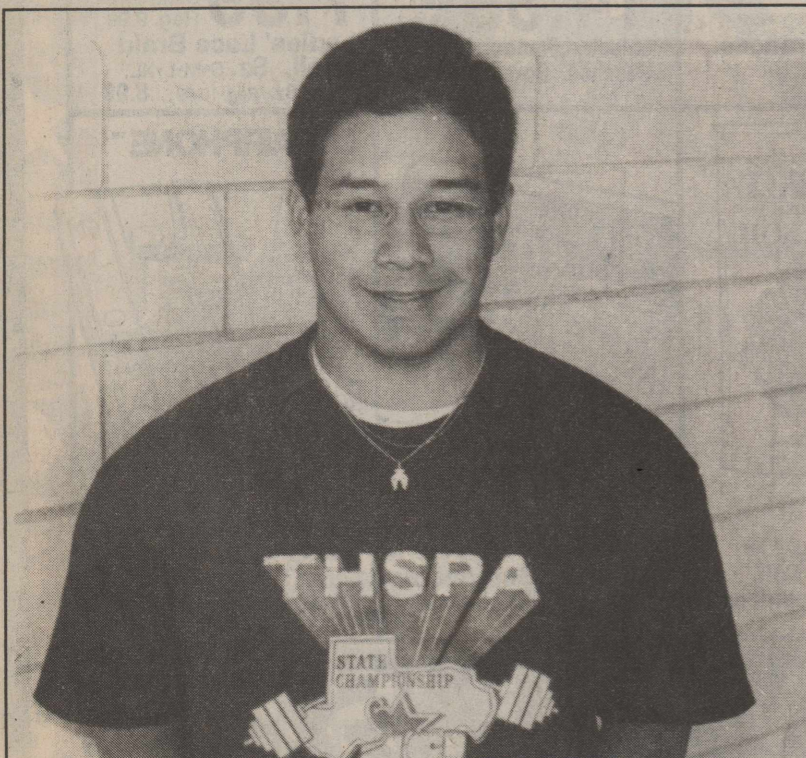
I would also like to say thank you to those that came and supported these young ladies and for your support all year.

The Lady Horns will be traveling to Austin May 11th and competing May 12th and 13th.



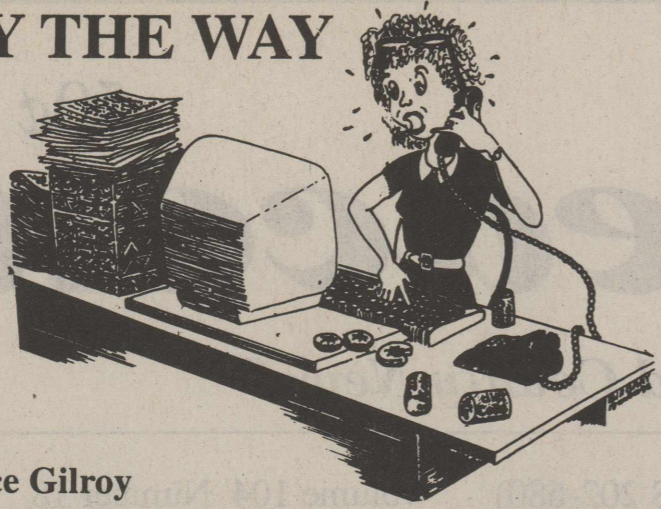

This is the type of information you won't hear when the media debate more gun control legislation.

As of March 15, 2000:

Dear Editor:

If you live in rural Texas and have not received a census form in the mail or at your doorstep, I strongly urge you to contact the U.S. Census Telephone Questionnaire Assistance number at 1-800-471-9424 to make sure you can participate in the census process.

Why is this important? Because rural Texans are already outnumbered with 80 percent of the state's population living in urban areas. An accurate census count is especially critical with our Legislature undertaking redistricting of congressional and state legislative seats next year. It is essential that no one in rural Texas miss this important head count and risk losing representation in Austin and Washington, D.C. due to population growth in urban areas.

While most urban Texans have received and already filled out their census forms, others in rural areas still have yet to receive a form because they get their mail at post office boxes, rural routes, box numbers or general delivery addresses. According to the census bureau, if you live in certain rural areas, you don't "count" unless an enumerator sees you face-to-face. That may be a surprise to those of us with post office boxes who think we

are still hale and hearty. Many local officials are questioning the practicality of "door-to-door" visits in some areas of the state such as Brewster, Jeff Davis and other border counties, where homes can be few and far between. Brewster County officials have been told that enumerators will try to visit residences in the 6,129-square-mile county that is almost the size of Israel. Other rural counties are also facing similar instances of a serious undercount with entire communities still not receiving forms.

Clearly, common sense needs to be applied, and the system for canvassing rural areas must be improved when the next census rolls around. Like their urban counterparts, rural residents should be given the option and convenience of filling out a mailed form.

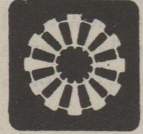

## McLaughlin wins fishing tournament

Thirty-two fishermen in fourteen boats from the Lockney area were at White River Lake this past Saturday, April 29th. Thirteen men weighed in 41 fish for a total of 91.06 pounds. 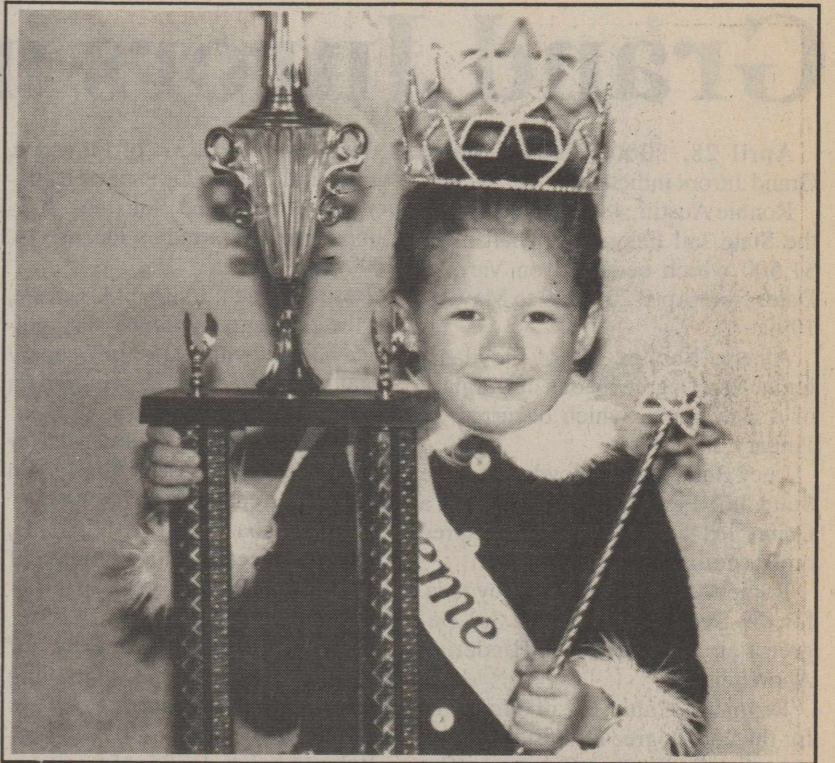

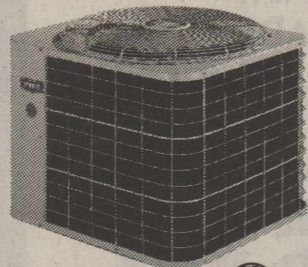

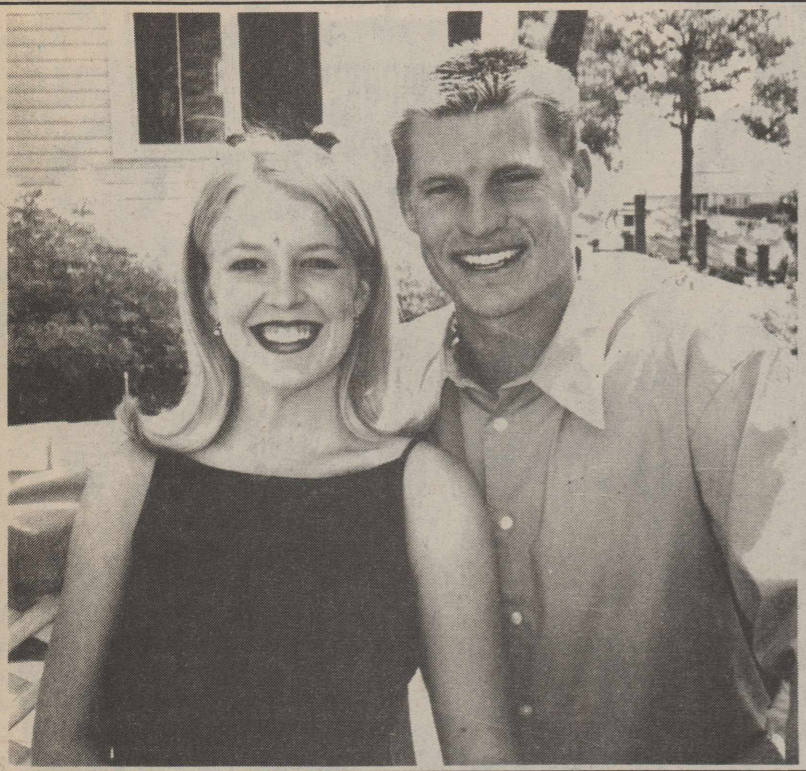

## Always buckle up your baby

What would you be willing to do if you knew that your actions might save your child's life? As part of Texas EMS Week, Floydada EMS and the Texas Department of Health urge you to always buckle your child into a child safety seat when riding in an automobile or truck.

"Buckling your child into a safety seat is one of the most effective ways to reduce chances of serious injury in a crash," said Paul Moore. "Child safety seats reduce fatalities in chil-

dren under 5 years of age by 71 percent. And children in child safety seats should always be back-seat passengers, especially if there are passenger air bags in the vehicle."

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, in 1997, an estimated 298 (54 percent) of the children under 5 who died in crashes were not restrained at all, while 312 children under 5 were saved by child safety seats. It is estimated that child safety seats reduce the risk

of fatal injury for infants by 69 percent and for toddlers by 47 percent.

"Our job in EMS is to provide the best patient care to ill and injured people, but one of the saddest situations we deal with is trying to help an injured child who probably wouldn't have been hurt at all if they had been securely buckled up in a child safety seat," said Moore. "The saddest injuries and deaths are the ones that could have been prevented if someone had just taken the time to buckle the child up."

are all excited about reaching our goal for the years."

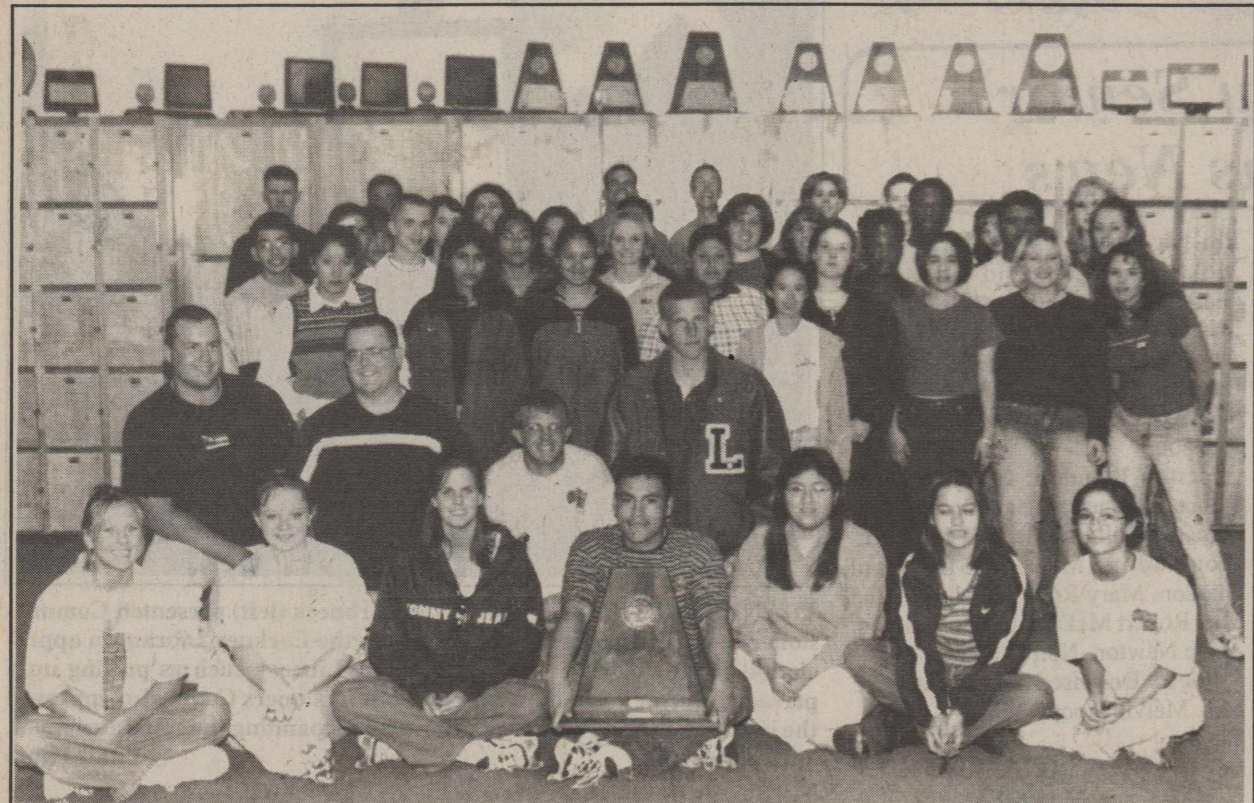

## Baylor College of Medicine receives \$15.5 million contract for tuberculosis research

Researchers hope to learn more about all aspects of tuberculosis (TB) with a \$15.5 million contract awarded to Baylor College of Medicine in Houston by the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Md.

During the next seven years, TB specimens and blood samples will be collected from 500 patients in the Houston/Harris County metroplex for analysis in laboratories at Baylor and the National Institute for Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID).

"We want to identify and describe at the molecular level numerous strains of the TB bacterium found in Houston, where the rate of tuberculosis is two to three times that of the rest of the United States," said principal investigator Dr. Edward Graviss, Baylor assistant professor of pathology and medicine. "This should help us determine whether people who know each other have the same type of TB bug, indicating a likelihood that one person transmitted it to the other." The TB bacterium is transmitted by air from person to person. The bacteria usually attack the lungs and then spread to lymph nodes. If untreated, the disease can be lethal.

"Studies conducted in Houston over

the last five years found that nearly two-thirds of the cases here occur in U.S. born patients," Graviss said. "That would suggest that in Houston the disease is spread directly among high-risk groups or from high-risk groups into the general population. N

High-risk groups include minorities, people of low socioeconomic status and people with compromised immune systems, such as those with the human immunodeficiency virus.

As part of the NIAID contract, Baylor will collaborate with the City of Houston Health Department, the Harris County Hospital District and city clinicians, who will help identify patients with TB. Participants in the study will answer questions about their exposure to TB and provide four to five blood samples for one year. In addition to analyzing the strain of TB, investigators will use the data to study how the patient's body is responding to the disease and to treatment, which should be provided by the patient's physician. Treatment usually consists of four drugs for nine months.

TB exposure is usually confirmed by symptoms, such as coughing, fever and fatigue, a skin test and a chest X-ray. Graviss said the information from his study might result in a better

test to diagnose TB and information about the human genetics of susceptibility to TB.

Much of the analysis at the NIAID will be performed at the Laboratory of Human Bacterial Pathogenesis, Rocky Mountain Laboratories, under the direction of former Baylor faculty member Dr. James M. Musser, laboratory chief.

"This contract provides critical TB research materials that should substantially enhance our understanding of the many aspects of tuberculosis, an infectious disease that kills 3 million people worldwide each year," Musser said.

**Food label "% Daily Value" is explained**

Q: What does the "% Daily Value" on food labels mean?

A: The numbers listed under the "% Daily Value" on food labels reflect the relative amount of 10 important nutrients that one serving of a food contains, say nutritionists at the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Because some of the nutrients the FDA chose to require on food labels did not have an established Recommended Dietary Allowance (RDA), the Daily Value was created. The FDA set the Daily Values for protein, vitamins A and C, iron and calcium at the highest levels of the RDAs in place when food-labeling laws went into effect. Those for fiber, sodium, cholesterol, saturated fat and total fat were set at the level recommended for healthy adults consuming a 2,000-calorie diet. This translates into Daily Value standards of 50 g. protein, 18 mg. iron, 1,000 mg. calcium, 5,000 IU vitamin A, 60 mg. vitamin C, 25 g. fiber, 300 mg. cholesterol, 2,400 mg. sodium, 20 g. saturated fat and 65 g. total fat.

Nutrient content on food labels is expressed as a percentage of these Daily Values to allow consumers to make informed purchasing decisions without knowing their actual nutritional requirements. For example, the label on a can of ready-to-eat chicken noodle soup shows that a one-cup serving has 850 mg. of sodium and a %DV of 35. This informs consumers that one serving contains over one-third of the total amount of sodium a healthy adult should consume each day without requiring them to know that the Daily Value for sodium is 2,400 mg. Expressing Daily Values as a percentage also simplifies comparison shopping.

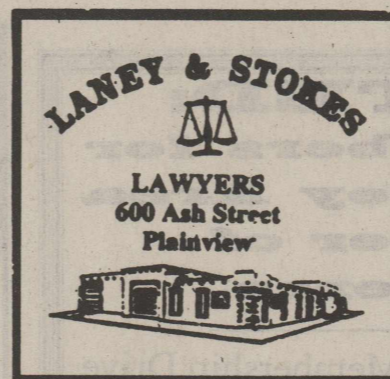
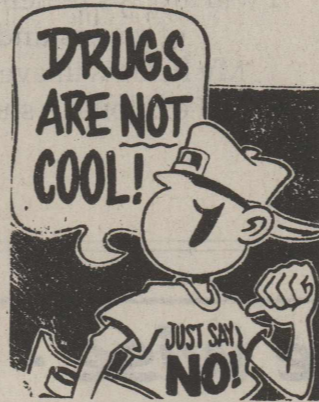

**BMI study to screen kids with weight problems**

An explosion of "super-sized" kids has American health professionals clamoring for improved obesity-screening tools.

But according to preliminary findings from a large-scale study, the body mass index (BMI), an obesity-screening tool being considered for use with kids, can produce inaccurate results if factors such as age, sex, maturity level, ethnic background and physical activity are not considered.

"One out of six children in our study who had a BMI in the normal range had an unhealthy level of body fat," said Dr. Kenneth Ellis, a Baylor College of Medicine professor of pediatrics who studies growth and body composition at the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston. "And one out of four with a BMI in the at-risk-to-obese range had a body-fat level that was normal."

"The study compared the results of two obesity indexes, the BMI and the percent body fat (%Fat), in an ethnically diverse population of 979 boys and girls between ages 3 and 18. The BMI values were calculated using the standard ratio of body weight in kilograms to the square of height in meters (wt/ht). The %Fat was determined with a special instrument called DXA.

Two basic assumptions regarding body composition lead to inaccuracies when the BMI is used as a one-size-fits-all screening tool for fatness, Ellis said. One assumption is that individuals who have a BMI within the normal range have an average amount of body fat. The other is that every ounce of body weight over the standard weight for height is fat.

These assumptions generate the

most classification errors for children with BMI values in the gray area between normal weight and overweight, which is a BMI between 18 and 20 for most ages, Ellis said. The study found that body fat in children in this BMI range varied from 10 to 40 percent. Males with body-fat levels over 25 percent and females with levels over 30 percent are generally considered obese.

Few people think that normal-weight kids can have too much body fat. "If we rely on BMI alone, we risk allowing kids who probably need some type of intervention to improve their physical activity and eating habits to fall through the cracks," Ellis said.

Of equal concern is the risk of mislabeling 25 percent of high-BMI children as at-risk or overweight, despite their normal body-fat percentage. "Children are very sensitive to labeling," Ellis said. High levels of physical activity, early maturation, genetics and ethnicity can all contribute to a child having a high BMI but a healthy amount of body fat.

"We find amazing variations in body composition and percent body fat in different ethnic groups in this country and among citizens of different countries," Ellis said. For example, at any given BMI value, African-American children have more bone and muscle mass and less body fat than their European-American counterparts.

"If the concern is that excess body fat in childhood increases the risk of chronic illness later in life, health professionals must consider ethnicity, maturation, diet and physical activity, in addition to gender and age, when evaluating a child's BMI," Ellis said.

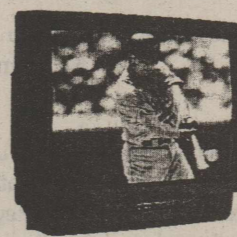

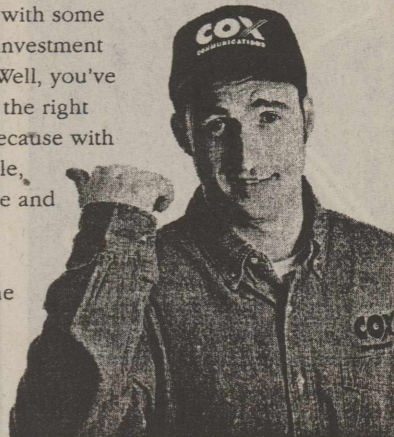
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# Wickware and Payne on their way to state meet

best 12:00.81. Sundown's Andrea Ybarra came from far back in the final two laps to overtake Hobbs and finish second in 12:11.42. Hobbs was third in 12:18.10.

Later that same morning, Wickware shook off some early doldrums in the shot put to earn his ticket to Austin. The senior strongman entered the final three rounds of competition in sixth place as he struggled to find his rhythm with the 12-pound ball of iron.

With just one throw remaining, however, Wickware unleashed a toss of 53 feet, 2 3/4 inches to move into second place behind the 58-5 1/2 of Stratford's Cody Brotherton. He then had to wait and see if any of the other remaining four throwers could match his toss. Post's Billy Crawford caused a few Floydada hearts to flutter with his last fling, but the measurement came out to 53-2 1/2, a quarter of an inch short of Austin.

Payne, not content with a single entry at the state meet, surprised the field in the 1,600 meter run. Not among the top seeds entering the race, Payne doggedly followed Hobbs and the other early leaders, refusing to allow them to pull away.

In the final lap, Olton's Robin Harper took the lead from Hobbs and began pulling away with Payne a full 20 meters back. Heading into the final straight, Hobbs turned on the afterburners to pass Harper with ease and took the win in 5:44.19. Payne was still far behind with 100 meters to go, but was in full stride and methodically closing the gap. Harper faltered in the final 25 meters, and Payne, blonde ponytail streaming behind her, closed the final few yards to take second, 5:45.49 to 5:45.62.

Justin McGuire and Tyrel Fuller each took their best shot at reaching Austin, but came up just short. McGuire, the school record holder in

the high jump, finished fourth in that event with a best leap of six feet, four inches. The meet marked the fourth straight year for McGuire to make the trip to the regional meet.

Fuller, who had the slowest qualifying time of all 16 competitors in the 400 meters, surprised many observers in the preliminaries when he turned in a career-best of 51.7 to reach the finals. Running in windy conditions on Saturday, Fuller finished sixth with a 52.07.

Fuller and his 1,600-meter teammates just missed reaching the finals as they turned in a season-best 3:30.20. T. J. Fuller opened the relay, Brady Rainwater ran the second leg, and Jermaine Wickware ran third. The time was good for ninth overall, with the top eight teams advancing to the finals. The Whirlwinds entered the competition ranked 15th among the 16 teams.

Darryl Henderson, David Lightfoot, and Wickware completed Floydada's individual entries on the boys' side. Henderson took eighth in the long jump with a leap of 20-9. He also turned in a 15.72 in the 110-meter high hurdles and an 11.81 in the 100 meters. Although, he also qualified in the triple jump, a nagging leg injury forced Henderson to withdraw from the competition. Lightfoot ended his high school career by taking seventh in his heat in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles with a 42.53, a career-best by nearly a full second. Wickware had his third-best throw ever in the discus of 127-8 to finish in 11th.

On the girls' side, Lana McCandless took sixth in her heat of the 400 in a season's best time of 1:04.47. Tara Williams, Tricia Coursey, and Kayla Stovall joined her on the 1,600 relay that clocked its best time of the year. The 800-meter relay of Yolanda Bureson, Margaret Martinez, Stovall, and Coursey also turned in its best time of the season, but failed to reach the finals.

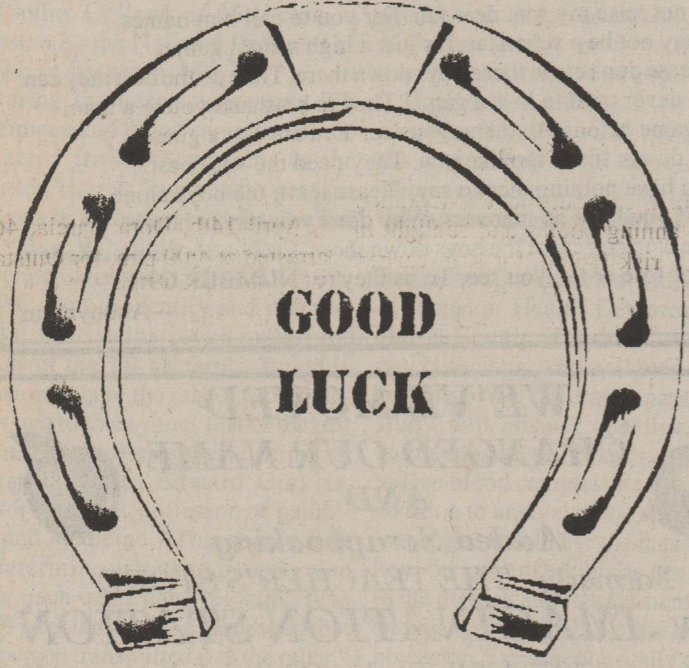

Mexico, Ohio, Minnesota, Kansas, Colorado, Nevada and Nice, France. Texas residents registered from Austin, Waco, San Antonio, Matador, Hewitt, Allen, Chillicothe, Crowell, Hale Center, Miami, Amarillo, Lubbock, Silverton, Canyon, Lorenzo, Crosbyton, Lockney, South Plains, and Floydada.

Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives Pete Laney and Mrs. Laney, along with staff members Mark Bell and Greg Werkenthin, attended the Monday night banquet.

Texas State Archeologist, Pat Mercado Allinger, spoke to the group during the Monday session.

Also present at the conference was Jay Blaine and his wife, Jerrylee, from Allen, Texas. Jay had provided his expertise regarding the metal artifacts throughout the entire project in Blanco Canyon.

The conference was sponsored by the First National Bank of Floydada, the Floydada Chamber of Commerce, the Floyd County Historical Museum, and the Texas Council for the Humanities. It was directed by Richard and Shirley Flint of Las Vegas, New Mexico.

There were many expressions of appreciation voiced by visitors regarding the hospitality extended to them in Floyd County. They also commented on the exceptional facilities at the Plains Baptist Conference Center and the beauty of the location in Blanco Canyon.

The conference closed on Tuesday, April 18th, with a tour of the Jimmy Owens Site and the Floyd County Historical Museum.

### BRIEF HISTORY OF CORONADO EXPEDITION

In a welcome to those attending the conference Richard Flint touched briefly on the history of the expedition and what the recent discoveries have meant to understanding the history of the Southwest.

"European conquest was begun in the 1500's with a century-long series of Spanish-led expeditions of recon-

naissance and expansion. One of those ventures was dispatched from western Mexico in 1540. Led by the governor of Nueva Galicia, Francisco Vazquez de Coronado, it was mounted in response to news of wealthy, populous land far to the north, a place called Cibola.

The expedition, consisting of at least 1,000 Indians from Mexico, more than 350 Europeans, and an unknown number of Black slaves and servants, traveled for more than two years.

"Though Cibola was found in what is now New Mexico and was nominally subjugated, the dreamed-of wealth did not materialize. Disappointed and in increasing peril among the Pueblo Indians of New Mexico and the Opatas of Sonora, nearly the entire expedition returned south in spring 1542.

"In the course of the 2 1/2 year undertaking, the expedition met and attempted to bring into Spain's orbit many and various indigenous peoples. In general, once proximity of the expedition and Southwestern natives lasted beyond a few days to a few weeks, hostility and flight were the common results.

"Our most important varitage on the actions and attitudes of both the expedition and its wary and often unwilling "hosts" have been provided by the rich documentary record generated by and resulting from the expedition. In recent years documentary sources have been increasingly augmented by archeological evidence.

"The discovery in the late 1980's of a portion of a campsite of the Coronado expedition near Bernalillo, New Mexico, and the identification during the 1990's of a second campsite in Blanco Canyon, Floyd County, Texas, have significantly increased our knowledge of the expedition.

"Likewise, the location and analysis of hitherto unstudied documents and reanalysis of previously known documents continue to modify our understanding of this pivotal event in the history of the Southwest."

## Tanning beds an unsafe alternative to sun

With summertime approaching, many people turn to tanning beds and sun lamps to get a "healthy" tan. Whether caused by the sun or tanning beds, a tan is actually the skin's injury response to damage from ultraviolet radiation.

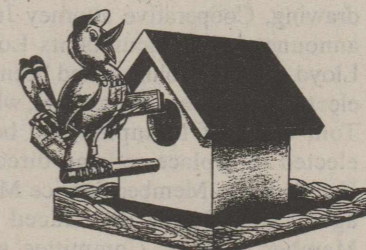
"Any type of tan, whether from sunlight or tanning beds, is not a safe tan," said Mike Lehman, M.D., a dermatologist at Lehman Dermatology.

One of the most common skin cancer myths is that tanning beds do not increase the risk of skin cancer. According to the American Medical Association (AMA), the strong concentrations of UV rays emitted from tanning beds and sun lamps have been linked to an increased risk of both melanoma and non-melanoma skin cancers. Some scientists believe that UV rays from tanning beds are stronger and even more harmful than UV rays from the sun.

"Tanning beds do significantly increase the risk of skin cancer," Dr. Lehman said.

The American Cancer society lists too much exposure to UV radiation from tanning booths and sunlight in the top risk factors for skin cancer. People with too much exposure to light from these sources are at greater risk for all types of skin cancer.

The AMA suggests altogether avoidance of deliberate tanning for anyone who is concerned with their health and the appearance of their skin.

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# Employees recognized for 205 total years of service at Lighthouse annual meeting

The largest crowd in several years attended the 61st installment of the annual membership meeting of Lighthouse Electric Cooperative on Thursday, April 27th, at the Floyd County Friends Unity Center at Muncy.

75 members and guests took advantage of the Health Fair, which ran from 2:00 until 5:00 p.m., to get their blood pressure and cholesterol level checked, screened for glucose, and gather information from the American Cancer Society, the American Heart Association, Rural Nurse Resources, and University Medical Center.

Approximately 575 members and guests attended to visit with friends and neighbors, enjoy the meal catered by Danny's Fins & hens, listen to outstanding entertainment, and hear reports on how their Cooperative fared in 1999.

Prior to the business meeting, the crowd was entertained by "Brass Menagerie," a five piece brass ensemble from Plainview whose members are Jeremy Higginbotham, Gene Lane, James Maddow, Chris Lethgo, and Richard Sanchez. After the meal and musical entertainment, the youngsters present adjourned to the community room to be entertained by "Magic by Russell," a magician from Lubbock.

Cooperative President Louis Lloyd of Floydada called the business portion of the meeting to order and called on Lighthouse director Tom Johnson for the invocation. Following the invocation, Cooperative Secretary Gaylord Groce introduced special guests present.

Emcee Lannie Bennett, with the help of the planning committee, conducted the first of three prize drawings, and Groce presented the roll call, the reading of minutes of last year's meeting, and the reading of the notice of meeting.

Bob Bryant then gave the Golden Spread Electric Cooperative report on the progress of Mustang Station, the 486 megawatt electric generating plant built near Denver City by the Amarillo based cooperative, in partnership with Denver City Energy Associates. "For years, we have been talking about the development of Mustang Station," he reported, "and it is a pleasure to announce it is now a reality. The two natural gas fired turbine generators began operating in June of last year. The combined cycle steam generator came on line about a week ago."

"We planned and built Mustang Station because we anticipated there would be some significant changes in the wholesale power supply side of the electric business, and we had fears that there may be changes on the retail side as well," he continued. "And sure enough, these things are coming to pass."

Bryant went on to discuss the many changes coming which will affect investor owned utilities and their customers, and cooperative members should they opt to enter competition. He advised Lighthouse members to be aware of what is happening, and to be involved with their cooperative in helping their directors to make the right decision concerning whether or not to opt in.

Following Bryant's report, Cooperative attorney Harry Jung conducted the election of directors. While the ballots were being counted, Robert Cobb of the cooperative's auditing firm reported on the 1998 business of Lighthouse. "The board and manager's report in the Annual Report you received as you registered did an excellent job of explaining the results of 1999 operations, and the volatility in weather patterns between 1998 and 1999, and how it affected the cooperative's business," he said. "I don't think there is a whole lot I can add to that, but I am here tonight to tell you that your cooperative remains in good financial condition, as evidenced by the patronage capital checks which were distributed tonight before the meal."

Following the auditor's report, General Manager Bill Harbin discussed pending changes. "We are facing uncertain times in our industry," he said, "and we need your help in the decision we have to make on the strategy your cooperative should follow in what is going to be a very different environment in the electric business in Texas."

"There is going to be an impact on us whether we 'opt in' or not," he continued. "There will be a great deal of impact on the wholesale power segment of the industry. Currently, wholesale power costs are 65% to 70% of our total costs. Even a small percentage change in wholesale power can make a big change in our costs."

"There is still a lot of uncertainty as to what will happen. We will be glad to discuss it with you at any time, but we don't have the answers. There is so much about it that is unknown at this time, as the rules are still being written. What we do know is that we very much want your input as to what our strategy should be and how we should position our Co-op to avail ourselves of any advantages that may become available while providing protection for our members under this deregulation scenario."

Following his business report, Harbin recognized the former employees of Lighthouse, current employees and their families, and introduced the board of directors and their wives. He then called six employees to the stage to be recognized for their years of service to Lighthouse. Awards for 25 years of service were presented to Steve Anderson, Carmen Muniz, Blackie Salazar, and Billy Joe Villarreal. Shirley Morton was recognized for 30 years of service, Bill Lamb for 35 years, and Dale Lawson for 40 years of service to Lighthouse.

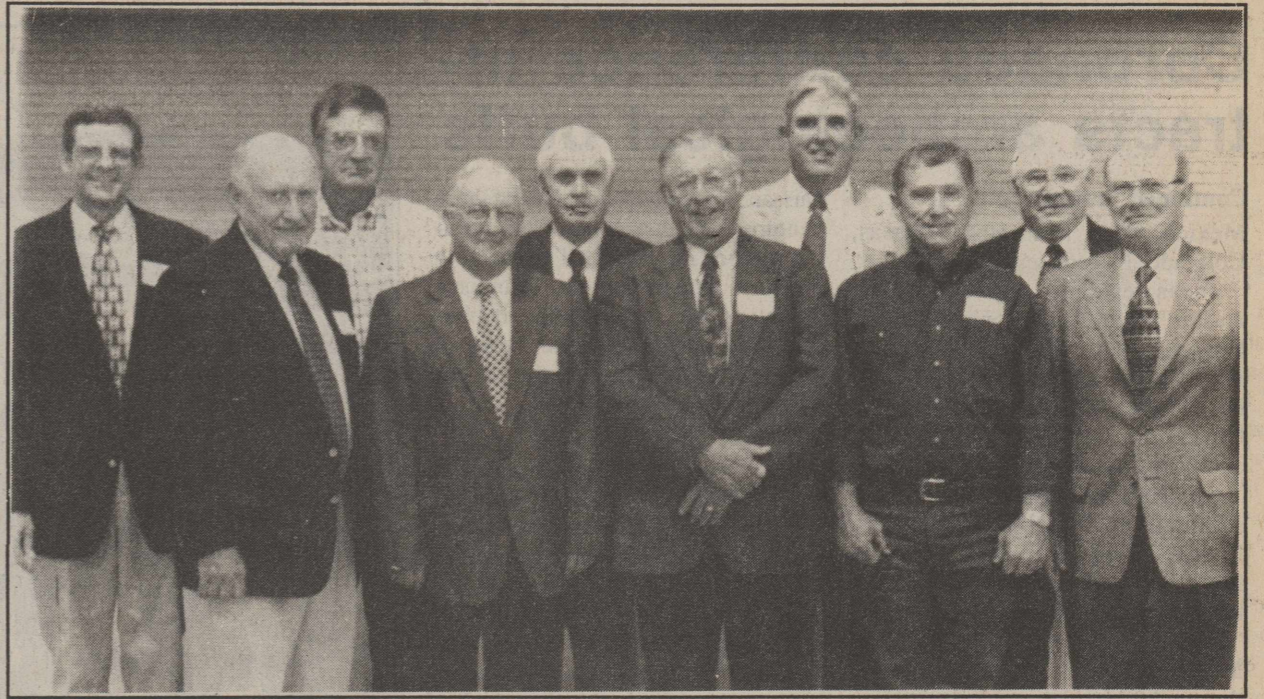

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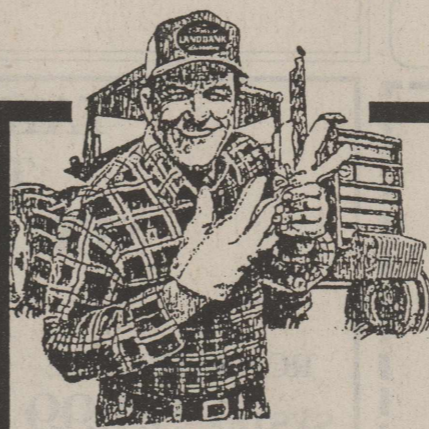

# The Country Preacher

**YOU CAN'T GO NAKED AFTER BAPTISM**-It was September, 1973 when I left my family in Puebla, Mexico and headed out on a 12 day trip to visit the Tzotzil Indians in the mountains and jungles of Chiapas near the Guatemalan border.

I loaded all kinds of supplies into my pickup which had a topper cover over the back. Two Tzotzil Indian families were going back home with me. These preachers had been studying in our Bible Institute near Puebla. We drove hard all day for 14 hours and slept that night in the "Dollar Motel" in Tuxtla, Chiapas. By only costing a dollar per person, you know it was no Holiday Inn. Also, our rooms were already occupied with roaches and mice. The mice would run over my only sheet during the night.

The next day we drove two hours up to the mountain village of San Cristobal and then left the highway for another 6 hours over a winding, rocky mountain road into Los Chorrros. Los Chorrros has 800 thatched roof huts. We held services in the church hut that afternoon and again that night.

We held an early service before walking about 2 hours down the

mountain to the river for a baptismal service. I baptized 20 believers and there were probably around 60 that walked down the mountain with us.

What happened next shocked me! Following the baptismal service, almost everyone began taking off their clothes and bathing as families. The young children were totally naked. Most of the men kept on jockey type shorts, but not all. The women took off their tops only.

I turned my back and spoke to the pastor. I told him this was totally unacceptable to do this. He understood, but explained that this was normal since they only go to the river to bathe. They thought nothing of their nakedness.

The pastor asked them to put their clothes back on. Then I had to go behind a boulder and change into dry clothes. I felt about as native as they were. We finally started our 3 hour return hike back up the mountain for services that night.

**MORAL OF THE STORY:** "You've heard 'Clothes don't make the person', but ever since Adam and Eve's fall, God does want the Christian to be well covered."

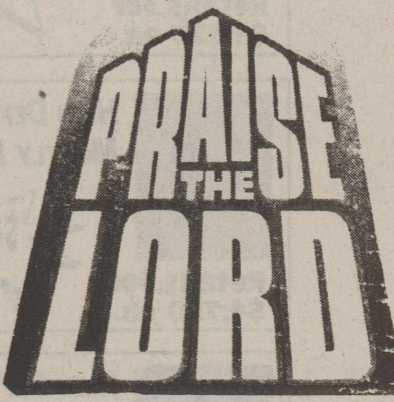

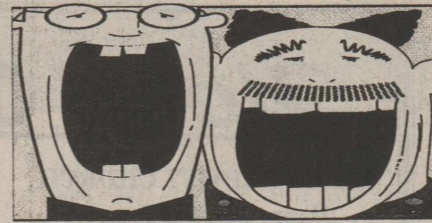

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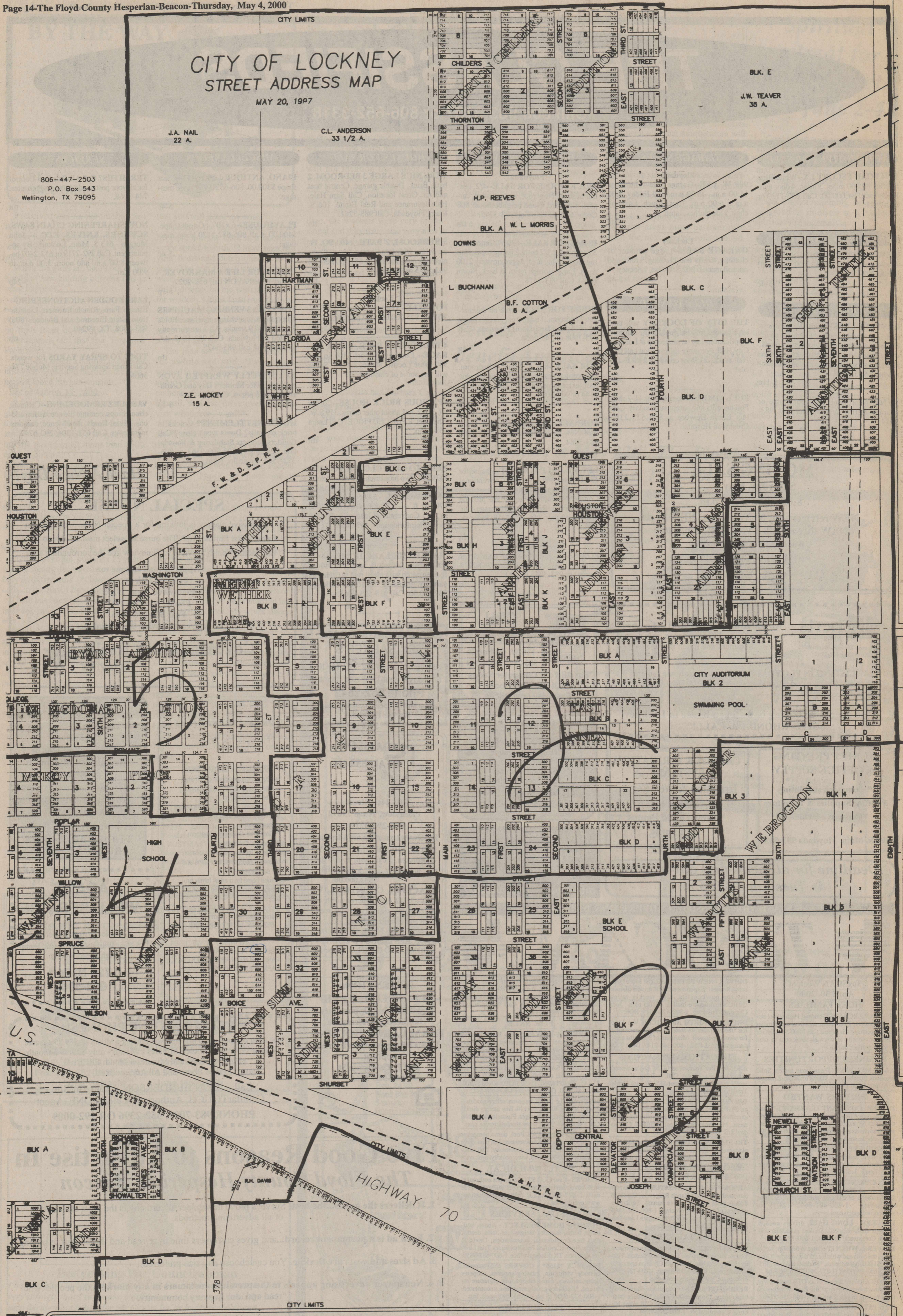
