Hon. H. R. Jones again submits his name to the voters of Haskell county and the 39 judicial district as a candidate for judge in said district. He is serving his first term in that responsible position and his record is an open book before the voters of the district. As we understand it and are informed, the reports of the higher courts show fewer cases which were tried before him reversed than are to the credit of many judges throughout the state, which fact speaks as much as anything could for the ability and fairness of his charges and rulings. We do not, however, have to rely solely upon this evidence, for when judges show partially in their rulings and charges the lawyers whose clients are involved are not slow to speak of it. In the case of Judge Jones we have heard no such complaint but, on the other hand, have heard him commended for the dignity and decorum with which his courts are conducted as well as for his fairness toward attorneys and litigants. Being a man of moral integrity and christian character, these things were to be expected of him and, when we find them fulfilled, the measure is complete; he has measured up to the trust reposed in him. When a public official has done that during his first term, at least, it is customary for the people to show their approval by giving him a second and we think his fellow citizens of Haskell county will do that with great unanimity. Judge Jones has made a good impression throughout the district and it is probable that other counties will vie with Haskell in showing their approval. We quote the following paragraph from the Western Light, a paper published at Snyder, in the far end of the district: "Judge Jones has presided throughout his term with justice to all and dignity to the office so far as his official acts are concerned has made a record that would bear the closest scrutiny. He is a man of earnest, sober convictions and deep probity of character and one from whom the people of the district, using a Rooseveltian term, have received a square deal." Of course Judge Jones makes his announcement subject to the Democratic primaries of the district.

Another Big Business House.

Mr. S. L. Robertson comes second on the business house building program, having this week let a contract for the erection of a house 38 by 120 feet, on the west side of the square. It is to be constructed of concrete blocks and of modern architectural design. The building will be double decked from the rear to within 25 feet of the front and will be fitted up for general merchandise and groceries. The building will be occupied by Mr. Robertson, and will give him room to display his large stock of dry goods, clothing, furnishing goods, shoes, hats, etc., which are so stacked and piled up in his present quarters as to give no adequate idea of the variety and volume of his stock.

THE POWER OF PRAYER. The following paper was read before the Haskell B. Y. P. U., and is published by request:

Too much can never be said on this all important subject, for, in the first place, we notice that the great power and success of Jesus Christ lay in his continually asking the father for help, strength and protection. It is said of our first missionary, William Carey, that his daily motto was the all important text, "pray one for another that ye may be healed, for the effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much." When in trouble Mr. Carey thought of this verse of scripture, thought of it when it was needed that he should heal the heathen sick, and by the faith he had in God and his power gained through prayer, he became one of the greatest missionaries of his day.

But God, to whom no weakness belongs, of whom no infirmity can be predicted; God who holds the universe in his grasp, who is directing the stars daily in their courses, who sustains all his mighty creation in life and enjoyment is able to turn his attention undivided upon one member of his redeemed family. It was God, even he, who sent his angel to the prison and released the apostle Peter from his chains and fetters. It was He, the divine creator, who revealed him living and unharmed from the mighty hands of Herod. And why this? It was because his children were praying without ceasing even then. Sometimes our spirit of prayer may flag and the soul may be dull and downcast, but then is the time we should come into the presence of God and hold communion with him until he has given us power to overcome all difficulty.
