Floyd County's "Old Settlers" honored

Although temperatures were in the 90's, a dry West Texas breeze created a pleasant afternoon for shopping and visiting during Floydada's annual Old Settler's Day.

Saturdays festivities kicked off with a flag raising ceremony by local Boy Scouts and an awards ceremony under the courthouse pavilion.

The traditional recognition for the county's Pioneer Woman, Pioneer Man, and Pioneer Couple were presented to Ruby Lee Cypert Higginbotham, Art Barker Jr., and Carl Olen Lyles and his wife, Josephine Britton Lyles.

Carl Olen Lyles was born July 24, 1920 in Campbell Community, Floyd County. He was the 3rd of six children born to Carl and Ruth Lyles.

Olen attended rural schools at Campbell and Fairview Community, and later at Floydada High School.

He entered the Air Force in 1942, and was later transferred to the Army. The end of WWII found him stationed in Germany.

While in the military Olen married Tommy Josephine Britton March 6, 1944.

Josephine was born September 23, 1924 at Mt. Blanco, Floyd County, to

Tom and Pearl Britton.

She attended school at Pleasant Hill and Floydada. She was employed at Norman's Variety Store when she and Olen married.

They have 3 children, Tommy, of Floydada, Gary of Arlington, and Lori Lloyd of Floydada; and 3 grandchildren, Jeff Lyles, and Tana and Jeremy Lloyd.

After WWII ended, C.O. and Josephine returned to Floydada where they farmed in the Baker Community until they retired in 1987.

C.O. has served as Floydada Riding Club President, on the Board of Directors for the Floydada Coop Gin for nine years, and board member and Sunday School president for the First United Methodist Church.

Josephine has served as treasurer for UMW, official board member and Sunday School President, and Funeral Dinner Director for the First United Methodist Church. She has also pieced and quilted many quilts for the Pioneer Association and the First United Methodist Church. C.O. has served as parade Marshal, and Josephine as parade participant registrar since 1966.

Ruby Lee Higginbotham was born

in the Cedar Hill community on February 12, 1915, to Opal and Ollie Lackey Cypert. She has spent her entire 85 years in Floyd County.

She married Bryant Higginbotham on July 4, 1934 and lived on the family farm in the South Plains Community.

Ruby Lee helped her husband on the farm, and worked in the South Plains School cafeteria and drove a school bus. She also worked for several years in the Lockney school system as a teachers aide.

She was a faithful worker in the South Plains Baptist Church and enjoyed singing in the choir.

Ruby Lee and Bryant had 2 sons: Alton and Bud. She has 5 grandchildren, Kelly Hays of Burleson, Bryant Higginbotham of Lubbock, Lori Battey of Floydada, Bret Higginbotham of Plano, and Shea Higginbotham of Canyon. She also has six great-grandchildren.

Pioneer Man Art Barker Jr., of Lockney, was born and raised in Floyd County.

Pat Frizzell, of Lockney, spent a lot of time looking at stark white walls in UMC's Bone Marrow Transplant Unit during her fight with Leukemia. During that time she made a promise to herself to return and make those surroundings "cheerier" for the next inhabitants.

Frizzell was never able to fulfill that promise. In March 2000, Pat lost her fight with the disease.

When Pat Frizzell came to the realization that she would not be able to return and complete that goal, she turned to her friends for help. Those friends came through with "flying colors".

Since they started the project in February, Pat Nelson, of Floydada, and her friends with the West Texas Cotton Pickin' Painters have painted one room and a 50 foot hallway with colorful birdhouses, birds, butterflies, bees, lady bugs, picket fences, and trees.

"Pat (Frizzell) called me after Christmas and told me she had wanted to do this," said Pat Nelson. "She asked me if I would do her a favor. I told her I would do anything for her."

"Patients in the bone marrow transplant unit can't have real or artificial flowers in their room. They can be very depressing rooms and Pat wanted to change that."

"We aren't finished yet. We still have two more rooms to do. But already the atmosphere is so much better and we are getting a lot of positive feedback."

Nelson and Frizzell had been friends since Junior High School and shared their love of painting. "I've been painting since

Relay for Life teams are ready to walk all night

Relay For Life organizers are busy with last minute preparations for the June 2-3 relay walk. All donations benefit the American Cancer Society.

Close to 600 people, from all over the region, will be participating in the Relay For Life at the Whirlwind Track Stadium.

Opening ceremonies begin at 6:00 p.m., June 2nd, with a flag raising ceremony by Floydada and Lockney Boy Scouts.

A "Survivors Lap" will start the relays immediately following the flag raising. Any individual who has survived cancer is welcome to participate in this first lap.

After the survivors make their round the teams begin their relays. One person from each team begins walking. Individuals trade off all night long and keep the team walking until 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning.

Thirty three teams have signed up

to participate. The teams are made up of church groups, youth groups, teachers, Boy Scouts, accountants, banks, the hospital, clinics, and city workers.

The Boy Scouts will be cooking hamburgers and keeping the walkers fed. Participants eat for free, however anyone else wishing to eat should give a donation.

To keep the teams motivated and awake there is lots of entertainment planned.

Live entertainment will be featured from 7:00 p.m. - 10:00 p.m., Friday night. Throughout the night there will be a variety of games, such as volleyball, football, etc.

A special "Luminary Ceremony" will start at 10:00 p.m., June 2nd.

Paper sacks with the names of cancer victims will cover candles and will be placed all around the track. The lights in the stadium will be turned off

The Lamplighter

Another Memorial Day has come and gone. The dwindling band of buglers have played the haunting sounds of Taps one more time.

Another Old Settlers Day has come and gone. And, thanks to those who hold our society together today, those who came and tamed the plains, and those who fell in various wars were remembered by local folks who appreciate what was bequeathed them. We honor those who took the time to remember, and we salute them.

Otherwise, things go on much the same. Legal troubles continue for the Clinton/Gore camp. Although one would hardly know it from watching national t.v., a committee appointed by the Arkansas Supreme Court has recommended that our President's license to practice law be rescinded. If that finally happens, Mr. Clinton will share one niche in history with Richard Nixon. Mr. Clinton says he will vigorously defend himself. He continues to say he did not "technically" or "legally" lie under oath to federal judge Susan Weber Wright, as he understands the term. Who, pray tell, can dispute that? As he understands the term, he may be right.

Mr. Clinton's defense may go down in history alongside Al Gore's "ice tea" defense. You may remember that, gentle reader, Gore said he was drinking so much ice tea during discussions of his upcoming trip to the California Buddhist Temple fund raiser that frequent trips to the bathroom were required, and he missed all the pertinent conversation. He said he thought the trip west was just another "community outreach".

And, again, who can say him nay? Any Vice President who says, or thinks, or thought, he invented the Internet can understandably have such illusions. Still, those little quirks should be no barrier to his becoming President. As he understands the job.

The State of Maryland has dropped all charges against one Linda Tripp, whose taping of conversations with a Miss Monica Lewinsky led to the President's impeachment, and led to her own indictment, which is now legally moot.

The Secretary of Defense, one of Mr. Clinton's appointees, issued a mild

reprimand to his Assistant Secretary for Public Affairs, Mr. Kenneth Bacon, for violating a federal law designed to protect the privacy of federal employees. (Mr. Bacon had leaked the contents of Miss Tripp's personnel files to the media during the Lewinsky affair in an effort to discredit Miss Tripp.) The reprimand, says Mr. Cohen, will not be made part of Mr. Bacon's personnel file. So officially the reprimand will not show up in Mr. Bacon's list of accomplishments.

On another front, or perhaps we should say on another facet of the same front, a three-member federal appeals panel ruled that Mr. Clinton's flacks will have to answer questions in a lawsuit concerning the FBI's handing over to the Clinton White House some 900 personnel files on aides of former Presidents Reagan and Bush. (For those too young to remember the Watergate years, Mr. Chuck Colson went to prison for mishandling just one FBI file.) Mr. Clinton's explanation of the affair was that it was all simply a bureaucratic snafu.

Truly the President's problems abound, although there was one bright spot for him in recent days. The House passed and sent to the Senate a bill normalizing trade relations with China, which is still run by the same gang he accused former President Bush of "coddling" during his first run for the White House. Most of his fellow Democrats voted against the measure, but most Republicans voted for it. So it passed handily. Now the proof of the pudding will be in the eating. The measure was sold as a way to increase trade and somehow cause the government of China to allow its citizens more freedom. The first part, we'll buy. It may indeed be helpful to our agricultural sector. (The Chinese use a lot of soybean, and they could probably use a lot more beef.) The second argument, we're not so sure of. The regime in China will continue to maintain control as long as they can, trade or no trade. NAFTA was sold, as we remember it, with the twin arguments that it would increase trade and cut down on the massive flow of

illegal immigrants from Mexico. Trade did increase, but the flow of illegal immigrants continues. Chances are very good that the Senate will approve the House-passed measure, or a reasonable facsimile.

And for those who wonder about little Elian Gonzalez. Reports are that he, his father, his teacher, his friends, and some other interested parties have moved from very comfortable quarters at Andrews Air Force Base near Washington to still better digs at Wye Plantation. That, evidently, is home base for the moment, although he does not stay there all the time. Recently, little Elian and a select group of retainers and Castro well wishers were honored guests at the up-scale mansion of Smith and Elizabeth Bagley in Washington. Mr. Greg Craig, who doubles in brass as Mr. Clinton's impeachment lawyer and lawyer for Elian, saw to it that Elian was present. The Bagleys are heir to the R.J. Reynolds tobacco fortune, and big wheels in Democratic fund raising circles. (He used to be Ambassador to Portugal). If press reports are right, the invitees dined on smoked salmon, shrimp, and fruit, while little Elian spent his time in the pool, oblivious to the power politics swirling around him. The Bagleys are also big in the Arco Foundation, which was established with Reynolds tobacco money years ago. The Foundation is interested in "improving the human condition" wherever. They have also, we hear, lobbied for years to lift economic sanctions against Castro. We have heard no word, one way or another, from Mr. Clinton, Ms. Reno, Mr. Gore, Mr. Bush, or even little Elian, concerning the propriety of this particular gathering at this particular time.

While all that was going on, the appropriate authorities were searching high and low for thousands of White House e-mail messages that somehow got lost during the height of the Clinton-Lewinsky saga. For reasons unknown, this does not seem to upset the t.v. networks nearly as much as the 18 minutes missing from one of Nixon's recordings.

Floydada Police Report

Floydada Police arrested Louie D. Buchanan, 63, of Floydada, May 26th, on a Federal Felony warrant in connection with the undercover operation that netted 7 arrests for Floydada Police in April.

Buchanan allegedly sold a firearm with an "obliterated serial number" to an undercover officer with the South Plains Narcotics Task Force". The Task Force had been assisting Floydada Police with undercover drug buys since July 1999. Evidence was obtained and the arrests were made at the end of April.

Because Buchanan was a convicted

felon, the Federal Agency, ATF, presented the case to the Federal Grand Jury. The Grand Jury indicted him on May 16th, and Floydada Police executed the warrant on May 26th.

"We also found him in possession of two other firearms," said Floydada Police Chief Darrell Gooch. "We also found a whole lot of ammunition and a whole lot of alcohol. Charges on the alcohol will be filed in county court."

May 23rd, a Floydada woman told police her vehicle had been burglarized while parked at the baseball game on Crockett Street. A pager and billfold were taken.

May 24, police took a report from a Floydada man that 20 CD's were stolen from his vehicle.

Also on May 24, police were called to a domestic disturbance in the 600 block of W. Lee. A 19 year old female complained that her common-law husband had slapped her. Gilbert Garza Jr., 19, was charged with Assault.

May 25th, a man complained that two young men had thrown water balloons at his car and damaged his windshield.

May 26th, police stopped a driver for Failure to Dim Headlights. John Carroll, 21, of Turkey, was arrested for Driving with Suspended Driver's License.

May 27th, at 12:46 a.m., police were called to a disturbance in the 300 block of W. Jackson. Abel Aguilar, 23, of Floydada, was arrested for Public Intoxication.

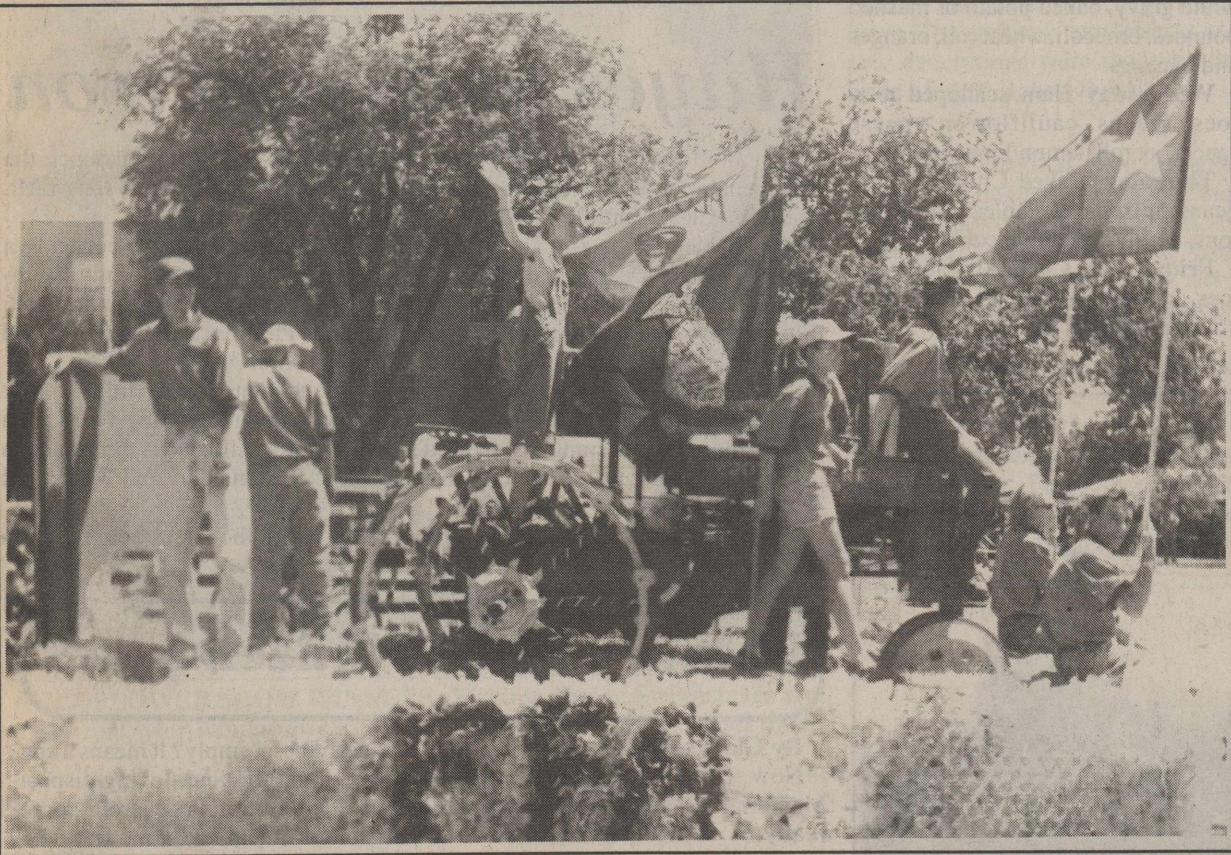
Installation of officers for 2000-2002 club years were installed by our president's daughter, Shirley Parker from Hartley. Those who will serve for the next two years are:

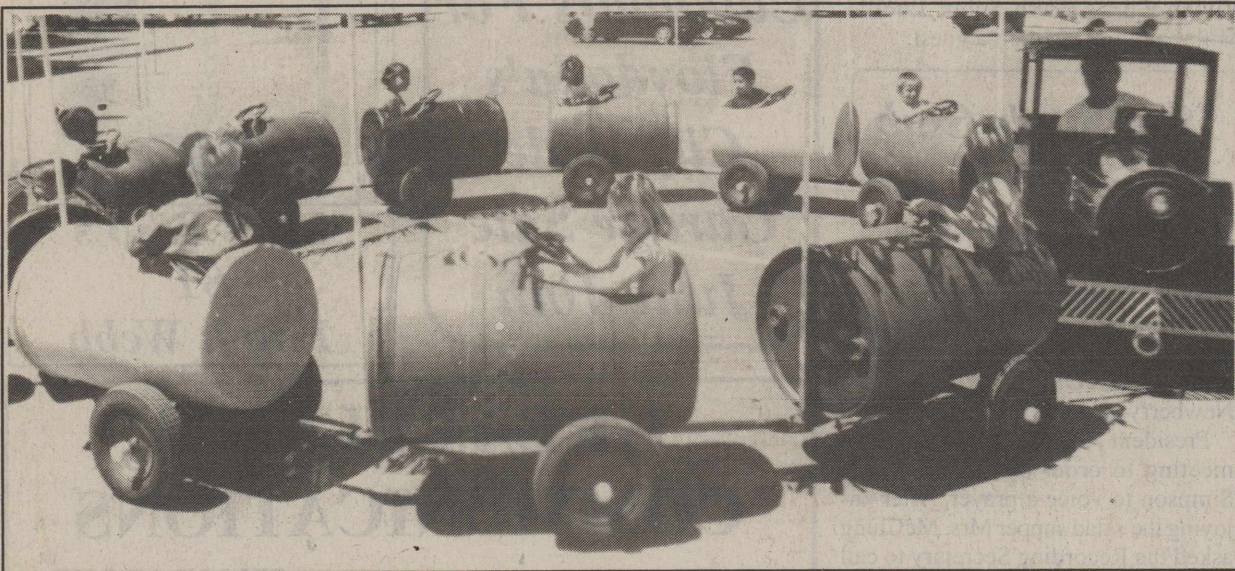

Males not immune to eating disorders

Many males in search of the perfect body are falling victim to eating disorders.

"Approximately 10 percent of patients diagnosed with an eating disorder are males," said Jana Rosenbaum, LMSW-ACP with the Baylor College of Medicine Eating Disorders Program in Houston.

Because most males are unlikely to seek help for this problem, the number of anorexics, bulimics and binge eaters is probably much higher. Unlike females with eating disorders who turn to self-induced vomiting or laxative abuse, males will purge through excessive exercise.

Here are some other signs of male eating disorders:

- * Extreme weight loss
- * Social isolation
- * Avoiding situations where food is the focus

* Visits to the bathroom after meals
Rosenbaum said a person with an eating disorder might also develop unusual rituals about where and how they eat.

from Abernathy, they are a very solid baseball team, we just didn't make the routine plays that needed to be made.

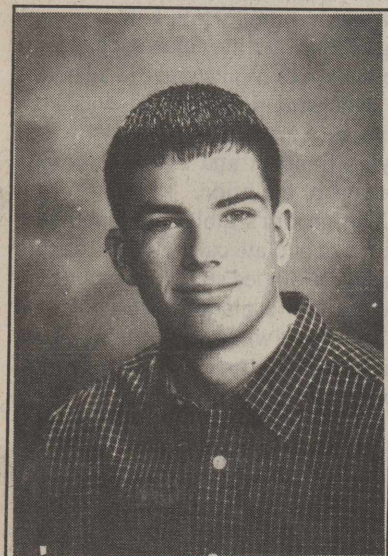
Overall, I'm very proud of these young men and their effort throughout the play-off run.

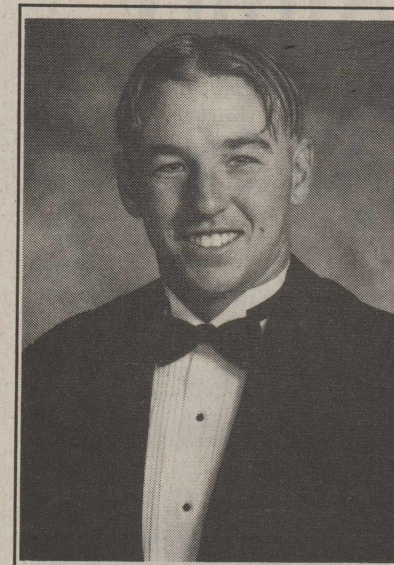
12-16. Team members also recognized for individual placings were Garrett Mathis, second in Prone and Kneeling and Chelsea Kirk, third in Standing.

WHY JUST \$.40 CENTS? It was the first week of June, 1960 when Patsy and I both had just turned 20 years old. We were moving to Chattanooga, Tennessee with our nine month old son, Dean. Our second son, Tim, was born in 1964.

We drove into the "big city" in our 1956 two door Ford. It was packed to the roof with our clothes. We were pulling a U-haul trailer with the rest of our earthly possessions.

I immediately entered summer school at the Bible College to prepare myself for the Lord's ministry.

Did I tell you we had no money? Times were hard. Jobs were scarce. We began to experience "the real world." We were on our own!

Patsy found a job first. She eventually earned the PHTC degree after five years. It was the "Putting Hubby Through College" degree.

Since I was limited to working in the afternoons and at night, it took me over a year to find steady work.

I began pastoring the Battle Creek country church (50 miles away) at age 22. Our weekends were now full.

Now, back to the \$.40 cents. Each semester my school bill became harder to pay. We would do without

groceries for a week or two to pay it. This one particular semester, I was told that I had until Friday to finish paying my school bill of \$67.80. I could lose the entire semester's work. This gave us something to really pray about.

On Wednesday, I had a fender-bender on my way to work. I called my insurance agent. He came that afternoon to adjust the damage.

He looked and said, "I'm just going to give you a check now and you go fix this in the next 30 days."

He wrote the check for \$67.40. I thanked him. I went in the house and thanked the Lord. But I have always wondered, why the Lord shorted me \$.40 cents?

I used that check to pay my school bill with \$.40 cents out of my pocket. I did replace the fender within 30 days at about one-half that check's amount.

Later I learned that the number 40 in the Bible stands for "testing." I guess the Lord was letting me know, He was listening and taking care of my needs, but it was a "test" for me to help out some also.

MORAL OF THE STORY: "The Lord will never 'test' us beyond what we are able to bear."

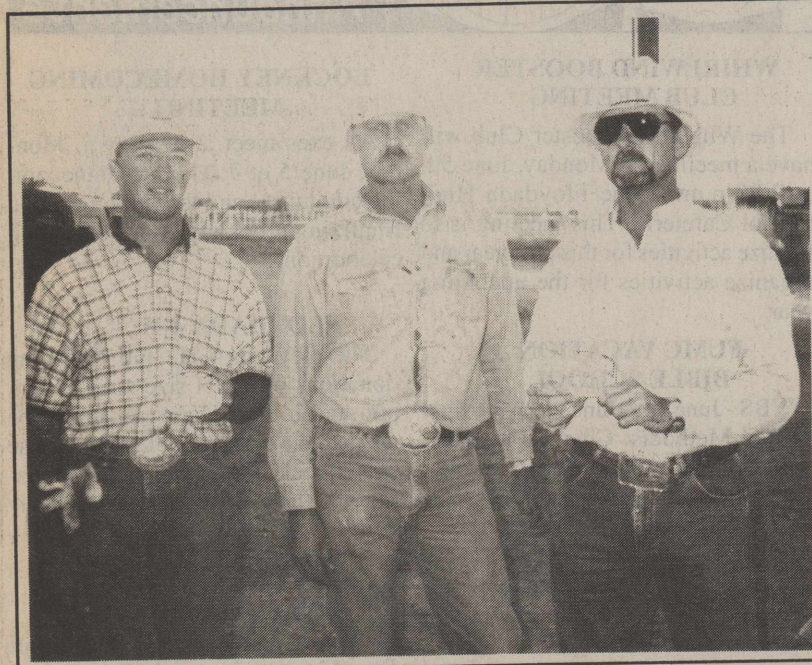

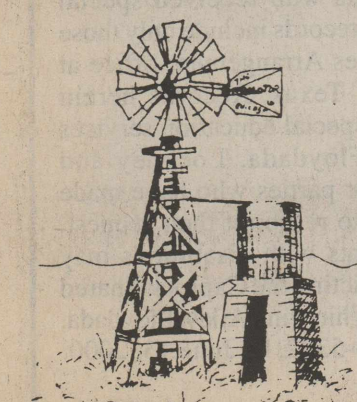

Management plan makes living with asthma easier

The diagnosis is asthma. Check which symptoms you have to live with daily: 3 Coughing Wheezing, Shortness of breath, Feeling a tightness in your chest, Being absent from work or school often and Sitting on the sidelines of sports or games.

None of the above, according to State Epidemiologist Dennis Perrotta at the Texas Department of Health (TDH). "People don't have to live with asthma symptoms as a daily part of their lives." The key, he says, is an individualized, management plan worked out between patient and health care provider and sometimes including other family members.

Asthma, which affects about 17 million Americans including nearly 5 million children, is a serious, chronic lung disease. Often beginning in childhood, asthma affects the way people breathe. Airways to the lungs become inflamed and swollen, produce mucus, often are blocked and are especially sensitive to irritants.

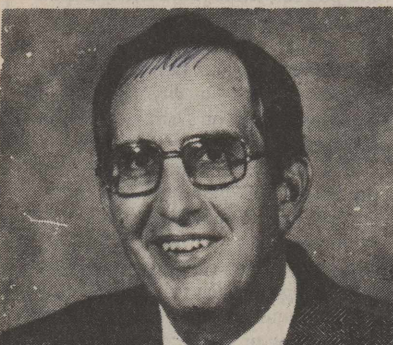
Although the specific cause of asthma is not known, genetics and exposure to a variety of conditions in the environment play a role. Asthma symptoms can be triggered by such things as:

Allergens—dander, dust mites, cockroaches, pollen, foods, Environmental conditions—cold temperatures, indoor/outdoor air pollution such as, smoke, fumes or odors, emotions, stress, upper respiratory infections including flu and the common cold, exercise and other improperly treated medical conditions such as sinusitis or acid reflux.

"We don't know what causes asthma and we can't cure it," Perrotta said. "But we do know it can be managed."

aged successfully so people with asthma can live long, healthy, symptom free lives."

Asthma is the most common chronic disease among children and the leading cause of school absences among youngsters under 16. Children with asthma miss twice as many school days as do children without the illness.

If not well controlled, asthma takes an increasing toll on the health of people of all ages. Those with asthma may visit emergency rooms, may need to be hospitalized or may die. Since 1980 in Texas, the death rate from asthma has nearly doubled, with 343

deaths recorded in 1998. The highest death rates are for people over age 60.

People who guess about symptoms, try different ways of self-medication and use the emergency room for quick treatment often do not get consistent care for asthma. Good control, according to Perrotta, comes with a carefully crafted, long-term asthma management plan. And it becomes a continuous part of a person's daily life.

A health care provider can diagnose asthma by taking a medical history, giving a physical exam and testing how the lungs function. Treatment varies with the severity of the disease and persistence of symptoms. Long-term medications are used to maintain control of chronic asthma and to prevent airway inflammation that contributes to asthma attacks. Quick relief medications are used to treat acute symptoms and to prevent asthma brought on by exercise.

A typical asthma plan, set up by a physician together with the patient, is based on the colors of a traffic light. It helps people anticipate problems and get help when needed. The plan identifies for the individual things that start an asthma episode, when and how to check breathing, daily medications needed and when they should be used.

In such a plan, green means go, use preventive medicine. In the green zone, a person has good breathing, no coughing or wheezing, sleeps through the night and can work and play. Yellow means caution, add quick-relief medicine. In the yellow zone, a person has the first signs of a cold, has been exposed to a known trigger, has a mild wheeze, a tight chest, coughs at night and can do some but not all usual activities. Red is danger, get help from a doctor. In the red zone, asthma is getting worse fast. Medicine is not helping, breathing is hard and fast, the nose opens wide, ribs show and a person cannot talk well.

Living with asthma includes following the management plan and knowing what activities and resources are available in your community.

People have access to such things as summer camps for children with asthma, community asthma screenings, support groups for those with asthma and their families, asthma fairs and educational activities for both health care providers and for asthmatics and their families. Many of these activities are sponsored by local coalitions and advocacy groups within the community.

"Because asthma is a growing problem, TDH is working to develop a statewide asthma coalition," Perrotta said. One goal is to create an asthma plan for Texas that will provide a framework for the activities of asthma groups and community organizations across the state.

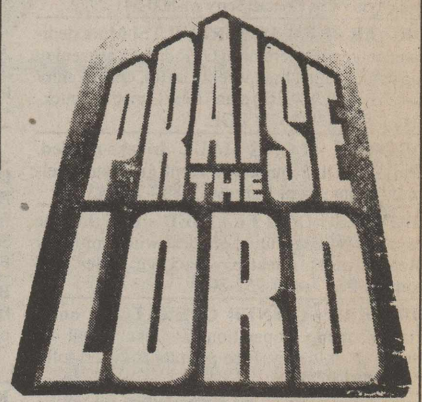
